# Washington County Releases The Budget Summary

Washington County published the 2019 Budget-in-Brief. The budget-in-brief is a 10-page summary which gives a broad condensation of the over-200 page budget. Washington County's budget is driven by the mission, values, and strategic priorities previously adopted by the county board. The BIB presents how the county allocates resources, how resources are spent, and the County's top budget priorities. The BIB also highlights county debt trends and clarifies the current county tax rate and tax bill.

"Exhibiting a high degree of transparency is critical to building trust for our taxpayers," said Margaret Hamers, finance director. "This

document is essentially a summary of our pocketbook and spending decisions."

In 2019, the county's top budget priorities include reducing the tax rate, reducing the budget deficit, initiating the compensation plan study and continuing sustainability plans. Budget highlights included:

- The county's property tax rate declined from 2.4901 in 2018 to 2.3930 in 2019 – the lowest county tax rate in over a century.
- The 2019 planned budget deficit level of \$600,000 represents the lowest level in two decades, and the lowest since the strategy was introduced in the late 1990s.
- The County included

dollars to study the County's pay plan and help fund anticipated plan modifications to invest in its human resources and attract and retain a workforce dedicated to service excellence.

- As a lower priority for Washington County, parks was asked to further reduce reliance on the property tax levy by \$150,000. This budget reflects an increase in revenues of \$150,000 for parks.
- This budget "doubles down" on investment in the County's Economic Development Strategy. It funds the County's Revolving Loan Fund programs to the tune of an additional \$2 million. Over time, the result will be an astonishing historic \$18.5 million dollar

evergreen fund for economic development.

- The budget begins funding of the county's new 2050 Transportation Network Sustainability Plan. The 2019 Budget includes funding for the first year of principal and interest payments on debt issued as part of the plan.
- The county's debt per capita is \$63 – the lowest of surrounding counties based on 2017 financial statements. Debt increased in this budget for planned road construction projects without raising expenses.

Dogs were used extensively in many wars fought by our country and provided a variety of services for the troops in battle. The War Dogs group will bring several dogs representing the various breeds that have been used in military service and will narrate a story on each breed. German Shepherds, dobermans, airedales, labs and collies were just a few of the breeds trained for service. Most were used as sentries, scouts, mine detectors and messengers. The dogs were usually returned to civilian service

and sometimes are adopted by their handlers.

The War Dogs Organization is based in Menomonee Falls and works to build awareness of this service to our country by these heros and helps with medical care when needed. ## Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

### Fatal Vehicle Crash

On Friday, March 8, at 8:28 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of, and dispatched deputies to, a two-vehicle crash with injuries in the area of Highway 33 and Riesch Road in the Township of West Bend. Additionally, Allenton Rescue and West Bend Rescue were summoned to the scene to treat the injured parties.

It was reported by one witness that the driver of the first vehicle was trapped inside and there were no signs of life. Upon the arrival of West Bend Rescue, it was confirmed that this driver was deceased.

The driver of the second vehicle sustained no apparent injuries and was released on scene.

The passenger of the second vehicle was transported to Froedtert Hospital by ambulance with leg and back injuries.

Preliminary investigation shows that the first vehicle was heading eastbound in the westbound lanes of traffic on Highway 33 (in the wrong lane of traffic). The second vehicle was westbound on Highway 33 in the left lane. The vehicles then collided in a head-on manner.

Weather and road conditions were not a factor in the crash. The westbound lanes of Highway 33 were closed to traffic for approximately three hours to facilitate the investigation and cleanup.

The deceased driver was identified as Jason

Martin Lisko, a 43-year-old man from the Town of Jackson.

The driver of the second vehicle is a 38-year-old male from Eden, and the injured passenger is a 31-year-old female from Eden.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office continues to investigate the incident. This is Washington County's first traffic fatality in 2019.

**Fatal Train Crash**

On Friday, March 8, at 9:28 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of an incident in which a Canadian National train

struck a person in the Town of Polk, near Maple Ave South in the Village of Slinger. Slinger Police Department officers and Washington County sheriff's deputies responded, along with Lifestar Rescue and Slinger Fire Department.

Upon arrival to the area, a deceased woman was located near the tracks. She was identified as Jodi Renee Schonasky, a 37-year-old woman from the Village of Slinger.

Train traffic was held on the tracks for approximately six hours, and the incident remains under investigation.


In addition to her parents, Beverly was preceded in death by a sister, Barbara Ann Plier.

## Students Compete In Academic Bowl

For instance, in science there's a general science test, a biology test, a chemistry test and a physics test.

"The kids will sign up to be, say on the science team, and then they each take a written test," said Carla Schmitt, who teaches science at KHS.

If more than one student wants to take a test, they will have a test off.

From there, four students are assigned to each subject. Each team must include a student from each grade level.

"So there is some strategy involved," Schmitt explained. "You don't want a freshman taking a physics test if they have never studied physics."

For the most part, the Kewaskum students went into the Academic Bowl armed with what they had learned during their regular classes at school.

"Honestly, I didn't study at all," admitted Andrea Butz, a sophomore who was part of Kewaskum's team.

On the day of the big contest, all of the students from all eight schools gathered in the cafeteria.

"The tradition is to always start with a group meal," Schmitt said.

In the past, some schools that have hosted the event have offered pizza, while oth-

ers have grilled out.

The Kewaskum High School cafeteria staff prepared last week's meal.

"We did crispy chicken bowls, and our kitchen catered it, because that is our students' ultimate favorite meal for our meal program. We thought we would treat our guests to what is our kids' favorite," Schmitt said.

The visiting students were impressed with surroundings as well.

"It was neat to showcase our new building. The students came in and were really impressed with the cafeteria," KHS Principal Scott Stier added.

After the meal, students took written tests that were administered in the classroom. Then they gathered in the field house for the Quiz Bowl portion of the competition.

As each subject was called, those respective teams sat at tables on the gym floor while the other students cheered from the bleachers.

A question was displayed on a big screen while a teacher read the problem over the sound system.

Teams then huddled together to come with an answer within the time frame allotted. Then a teacher signaled whether the students had answered correctly

or incorrectly.

"It was a little bit nerve wracking when you are sitting up there," KHS student Jack Paul said.

He worried that some of the onlookers might know the correct answer even if he couldn't come up with it while the spotlight was on him.

"That made me nervous," he said.

Jack was not nervous taking the actual tests, though. Instead, that part was fun, which is something that not everyone understands.

"It feels like a regular standardized test, so when you describe the format of it to people, it is not usually well received when you explain you are sitting down to take a 45-minute test for fun," Jack said.

During the Quiz Bowl, every time a question was correctly answered, the crowd cheered.

"It's fun watching the crowd cheer when kids get a question right," Schmitt said.

The event was rewarding for the teachers as well.

"It's fun to see kids get excited about balancing an equation or deciding where an apostrophe should go," they all agreed.

KHS will host the Academic Bowl again next year.

Kewaskum High School placed fourth overall out of the eight schools at the Academic Bowl.

Team victories included a second place in the Social Studies written portion, a tie for second in Math in the Quiz Bowl, and first place in the Social Studies Quiz Bowl portion.



## USDA Announces Dairy Safety Net Payment

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA) announced this week that the January 2019 income over feed cost margin was \$7.99 per hundredweight, triggering the first payment for eligible dairy producers who purchase the appropriate level of coverage under the new but yet-to-be established Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) program.

DMC, which replaces the Margin Protection Program for Dairy, is a voluntary risk management program for dairy producers that was authorized by the 2018 Farm Bill. DMC offers protection to dairy producers when the difference between the all milk price and the average feed cost (the margin) falls below a certain dollar amount selected by the producer.

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue announced last week that sign up for DMC will open by mid-June of this year. At the time of sign up, producers who elect a DMC coverage level between \$8 and \$9.50 would be eligible for a payment for January 2019.

For example, a dairy operation with an estab-

lished production history of 3 million pounds (30,000 cwt.) that elects the \$9.50 coverage level for 50 percent of its production could potentially be eligible to receive \$1,887.50 for January.

Sample calculation:  
\$9.50 - \$7.99 margin = \$1.51 difference  
\$1.51 times 50 percent of production times 2,500 cwt. (30,000 cwt./12) = \$1,887.50

The calculated annual premium for coverage at \$9.50 on 50 percent of a 3-million-pound production history for this example would be \$2,250.

Sample calculation:  
3,000,000 times 50 percent = 1,500,000/100 = 15,000 cwt. times 0.150 premium fee = \$2,250

Operations making a one-time election to participate in DMC through 2023 are eligible to receive a 25 percent dis-

count on their premium for the existing margin coverage rates.

"Congress created the Dairy Margin Coverage program to provide an important financial safety net for dairy producers, helping them weather shifting milk and feed prices," FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce said. "This program builds on the previous Margin Protection Program for Dairy, carrying forward many of the program upgrades made last year based on feedback from producers. We're working diligently to implement the DMC program and other FSA programs authorized by the 2018 Farm Bill."

## National Groundwater Awareness Week Is March 10-16

Underscoring the importance of Wisconsin's valuable groundwater resources, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is reminding state residents to protect and conserve water as part of National Groundwater Awareness Week, March 10-16. The agency will provide resources to help people learn about the importance of groundwater and how it impacts our daily lives.

"Groundwater is one of the most widely used and valuable resources on the planet, used for drinking, irrigation, livestock, manufacturing and many other purposes, so it's important to protect it," said Bruce Rheineck, DNR groundwater section chief.

Safe groundwater means safe drinking water for Wisconsin families. Approximately two thirds of the people living in Wisconsin, or nearly 3.9 million, get their drinking water from groundwater. Adequate supplies of safe groundwater are crucial not only to the health of those families, but also for the continued growth of agricultural production and cutting-edge industries in Wisconsin. In fact, the importance of safe drinking water is

the foundation of Gov. Tony Evers' declaration that 2019 is the Year of Clean Water and the reason for several initiatives included in his biennial budget proposal.

During this week, homeowners with private wells are reminded to "Test, Tend, Treat" their well. It's the homeowner's responsibility to ensure their well water is safe to drink. The "Test, Tend, Treat" method provides some insight to understanding when to hire a water treatment professional.

Test - Water should be sampled on a routine basis, as water quality can change over time. Well water pollutants are often colorless and odorless, making detection at home difficult. The DNR's well water testing web page has ample information on drinking water supply testing procedures and how to understand the results.

Tend - Regular inspections of wells can protect and reduce the possibility of future issues. Annual inspections should be completed by a licensed or certified water well system professional. Between professional inspections, well owners are encouraged to visually inspect the well to

look for any warning signs which might include a cracked well cap, debris on or around the wellhead, or ponding or flooding around the well after storm events.

Treat - Based on the type of contaminants reported in the test results, several types of treatment options are available. Information about water supply treatment options is available from the University of Wisconsin Extension. Wisconsin has established a product approval program for home water treatment devices. Be certain that any treatment unit you purchase or lease has been approved by the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services.

# Band Of Neighbors

– West Bend’s Charity Week Will Help Fund A 9/11 Memorial In Nearby Kewaskum

The rumors were floating around school: Was West Bend really inviting Kewaskum to its charity dance? And was it because of low turnout in the past?

It’s true that attendance for the charity dance is significantly lower than that of homecoming, but according to Randy Reysen, a social studies teacher at West Bend West High, that was not the reason behind the decision to invite Kewaskum High School students to the charity dance this year. The motive was instead a charitable one.

The annual WBHS Charity Week is devoted to helping people throughout the local community by sponsoring a different charity every day. Charity Week this year will take place March 11-15, with the dance on March 16.

But what makes this year special is the charity for Friday and Saturday’s dance—all the funds are going toward a 9/11 memorial to be built in Kewaskum.

“In 1994, I graduated (from Kewaskum High School) with Andrea Haberman,” Reysen said. “Andrea then got a job in the financial district of Chicago that would take her to the Twin Towers. She was at the Twin Towers on September 11, 2001. She died in the attack.”

A teacher from Kewaskum High School and Andrea’s parents

were able to obtain a piece of a beam from the 9/11 ruins. It has been moved from place to place in Kewaskum as a memorial. Now, the community is coming together to raise money for an open air classroom that will also serve as a memorial to all those who died in the attack.

“(It would be) not just a Kewaskum memorial, but a Washington County memorial,” Reysen said. “And we’d create it so that it’s an open air classroom, a destination for people to go, and to reflect on what happened, maybe to reflect

on loved ones lost, to reflect on the impact that that day has had on our country. Washington County’s invited, just bring your kids in on a bus, you could have a speaker. There’s going to be this small, open air amphitheater where you can lecture and do talks in the midst of this memorial.”

Because Reysen is a leader of the WBHS student council, a former classmate of Andrea and a teacher hoping to inspire students to honor those that died during the tragedy of 9/11, inviting Kewaskum to this year’s charity dance was all the more meaningful to him.

“Having myself been a 1994 graduate of Kewaskum High School, I thought, ‘I’m in a place where I can help raise the beam,’” Reysen said. “We give so much in charity and I thought it would just be nice if the ‘next door neighbor’ would help out. So in that spirit of cooperation, I wanted to invite Kewaskum to our dance. To give them an opportunity to give money for

raising the beam as well. I think it would just be fun! Kind of like a community dance of two very similar school districts coming together.”

Though students were initially confused about the change to invite Kewaskum High School this year, many have come to see it as a positive change.

“I think it’s a nice gesture,” said Claire Young, an East junior. “It brings light to the subject.”

Along with the 9/11 charity, there is also another charity this year with special connections. Thursday’s charity donations will go toward Dr. Faustman’s Research at Massachusetts General Hospital, which is a non-profit that researches childhood diabetes. Brenda Henschel, an East Spanish teacher, has found a matching grant donor for this day because of her personal ties to this charity.

“I have donated to Dr. Faustman for several years now as my daughter, who will be 10 on February 19, was diagnosed with type 1 dia-

betes or for parents of children with diabetes, they are always trying to keep their own or their child’s body in balance. But the more we know about the disease, the more that can be done to help those living with it. So supporting Dr. Faustman’s research is a great way to help those with type 1 diabetes.

“All money raised will be used to help Dr. Faustman advance the Phase 2 clinical trial—which is now treating patients—to investigate the BCG vaccine as a type 1 diabetes reversal treatment,” Henschel said. “It will also help support related projects, such as research on pancreas function and human regulatory T cells, that allows us to better understand type 1 diabetes and ways to help people with this disease.”

West Bend High Schools Charity Week has always been a success, especially in the past few years. In 2018, both schools and their matching grants donated a grand total of \$17,522. The hope is to raise even more this year and make an even greater impact on the local community.

Other charities featured this year will be March of Dimes on Monday, the Gingerbread House on Tuesday and the Blue Lotus Farm and Retreat Center on Wednesday.

# School Board Hires New High School Phy Ed Teacher, Approves Curriculum, Reads Censure Letter

At the Kewaskum School Board meeting on Monday, March 11, the board members hired Steve Tennes as a new Kewaskum High School physical education teacher. Tennes was recently hired as the new head football coach at KHS.

The board accepted the resignation of Dan Ross as eighth grade boys basketball coach at Monday's meeting.

The following people were hired as coaches: Erik Gotthart, eighth grade boys basketball coach; Hannah Lindell, JV girls soccer coach; Eugene Peterson, head cross country coach; and Jason Piittmann, JV softball coach.

The School Board covered a variety of other topics at Monday's meeting as well, as follows:

### Summer School

The Kewaskum School District Summer School will be held June 10 through July 3, from 7:45 a.m. to 12:15 p.m., Monday through Friday.

New Courses this year will be: Archery; Creating Comics; Fishing with Art; From Garden to Plate; Full Stream Ahead, Master of Mindfulness; Guys, Gals and Dolls; Holidays Galore; Piece of Italy; Read and Create; Summer Fun; and Wrestlemania.

### Payroll And Accounts Payable

The board unanimously approved the February payroll of \$1,224,979.55. Board member Jay Fisher was absent from Monday's

meeting.

The board voted 4-2 to approve accounts payable for \$1,066,750.44. Board Member Timothy Ramthun voted no on the approval and Board Member Jim Leister abstained from voting on the issue. Ramthun and Leister declined from commenting on why they did not vote in to approve the accounts payable.

### Key Club Overnight Trip

The board approved a Key Club request to attend DCON in Green Bay March 15-17. The Kewaskum Key Club's executive board (six students) will attend, along with their advisor, Stacy La Ronge.

### Boys Golf Team Overnight Trip

The board approved a request for the boys golf team to attend a two-day trip to Sheboygan for golf tournament at Whistling Straits on April 17 and at Blackwolf Run on April 18. There will be five or six golfers going on the trip, and golf coach Casey Scheel will be the only chaperone/coach going. The group will use a school van for transportation.

### Student Fees

The school board approved the following fee schedule for 2019-20:

4K: \$15 general fee (required); and \$25/semester or \$50/year milk break (optional).

Elementary: \$40 general fee (required); and \$25/semester or \$50/year milk break (optional).

Middle School: \$60 general fee (required).

High School: \$60 general fee (required).

All sixth-grade students need to purchase a \$5 school-issued lock, which will be used through high school. If a student is entering the school district for the first time, or needs a replacement, there is a \$5 fee for the lock.

A \$15 activity pass allows a middle or high school student to attend home only, high school sporting events. The issued card is shown at the gate/ticket counter for all regular season games and the student is allowed access without being charged additional fees. The pass may not be used for any conference or WIAA tournament events held at home, and is not available until after September 3 when the new card is issued.

There are co-curricular optional fees for KMS and KHS students participating in different sports/activities. Fees range from \$10 to \$60, depending on the activity. For KHS only, the student cap is \$120 and the family cap is \$240.

### College Credit Programs

The School Board approved spending \$8,095.89 for courses that six students can take in fall 2019 for college credits at Moraine Park Technical College.

The six students will be juniors in high school and each will earn between three and 12 college credits.

Courses include Introduction to Public Speaking, Abnormal Psychology, Introduction to Philosophy, Psychology of Personality, Soci-

ology of Race and Ethnicity, Organic Chemistry 1, University Physics, Calculus and Analytical Geometry II, Introduction to Paralegalism, Material of Industry, Revit, and Jig and fixture Design.

### Math Curriculum

The board approved the adoption of Bridges in Mathematics as the Kewaskum School District elementary math curriculum for \$142,870, based on current enrollment.

The cost is less than the current curriculum the district uses, when looking at a six-year price comparison of the current program at \$161,464, according to Dr. Mark Bazata, curriculum director for the Kewaskum School District.

Other area districts using the Bridges in Mathematics program include Green Bay, Kimberly, Winneconne, Oshkosh, West Bend, Grafton, Germantown, Menomonee Falls, Elm Brook Oconomowoc and Plymouth.

### Censure Letter

Board President Troy Hanson read a censure letter that Hanson signed and sent to Board Member Timothy Ramthun. The letter states that Ramthun violated school board policies regarding: authority, public expression of board members, board member ethics and board-staff communications.

The letter was written because the Kewaskum School Board censured Ramthun at the regular School Board meeting on February 11 for contacting Sheriff-Elect Martin Schulteis about

School Board Member Mark Sette, who is a detective for the Washington County Sheriff's Office. The censure letter cites Ramthun for encouraging Schulteis (as Sette's employer) to "have a conversation with Detective Sette and encourage him to resign from the Board."

The letter also reviews Ramthun's previous censure, citing Ramthun's decision to speak on behalf of the Kewaskum School District concerning a proposed ordinance at a Kewaskum Village Board meeting in August, and Ramthun's "decision to harass a staff member in order to solicit the staff member and/or his class to repair a metal grate for [Ramthun's] personal benefit."

In response, Ramthun said at Monday night's meeting that he had brought the grate to the high school because he thought that the metals class accepted projects for the students to complete.

"There was nothing personal about it, other than wanting to help the school," Ramthun said.

### Update of Kewaskum School District Email Platform Security

At Monday's meeting, Superintendent James Smasal read board policy regarding email usage by board members. According to district policy, "the Board of Education is committed to the effective use of electronic mail (email) by all district staff and board members in the conduct of their official duties. This policy, as well as any guidelines developed pursuant to it, is intended to establish a

framework for the proper use of email for conducting official business and communicating with colleagues, students, parents and community members."

Ramthun said he does not use his district email because several years ago it was breached without an open records request.

One community member, Kelli Schultz, spoke at Monday night's meeting about Ramthun's refusal to use his district email. She said she did an open records request after attending last month's school board meeting.

"From August 2018 to mid February 2019, you did not once log into your school board email, which is a basic component of your elected job," Schultz told Ramthun Monday night. "Mr. Ramthun, you stated you believe your number one priority is serving the district and serving the requests of the constituents, so I ask you face to face, please resign your position. This community deserves better from you moving forward."

Board President Troy Hanson said that there is an expectation that Ramthun will use the district email going forward.

"That expectation will be monitored," Hanson said.

### School District Policies

The board completed the first reading of revised and new district policies.

### Closed Session

Following the regular School Board meeting on Monday, March 11, the Board went into closed session. The following items were on the agenda for the closed session: competitive bids for the high school gymnasium; a staff discipline issue; and district administration evaluations/renewals.

# CHS Students Learn About Philanthropy

Campbellsport High School students are learning about philanthropy and being good citizens.

Danielle Dreher's child development class has been participating in the Main Street Philanthropy program this semester.

Main Street Philanthropy is a program that inspires future generations to become passionate philanthropists. It is a 10-week course designed to teach students the importance of giving back to their communities and gives them the opportunity to fundraise for a charity they are passionate about. The course is meant to empower students by giving them real life leadership opportunities, including reaching out to local businesses and asking them for donations, public speaking, and choosing charities to donate to.

The CHS program is spear-headed by The Silbernagel Group and Real Wealth® Marketing of Kewaskum, who also lead the program at Kewaskum High School. It is sponsored by many local businesses. Joanne Silbernagel and Kayla Joesse, both of The Silbernagel Group and Real Wealth® Marketing, co-teach the class.

"This is the third year we've been doing the Main Street Philanthropy program," Dreher said. "We are about halfway through the program right now."

As part of the program, the class held a panel discussion with representatives of a couple of the charities they have chosen. In addition, the founder of Main Street Philanthropy — Ryan Ponsford — traveled to Campbellsport from San Diego, CA, to also be a part of this discussion.

He spoke a little bit about why he founded Main Street Philanthropy and feels it is something important for young people. Ponsford stated that he got the idea from helping wealthy families. In seeing the disagreements that would happen settling estates, he wanted to find a way to show people the beauty

of helping others.

The program started out in a school that had three different gangs. This was a way to show those students how to be better people.

"We realized we couldn't not do it again," Ponsford said.

As the program grew a little, Ponsford started talking about it to conferences telling others about the program and its benefits. Then, he has been helping those interested in setting up the program in their hometowns.

"At one of his conferences, Jim Silbernagel raised his hand because he thought it was a neat program," Joesse said. "They talked after the presentation and after about a year of spearheading it together, they got it implemented in Campbellsport High School, eventually Kewaskum High School as well."

"Jim is too busy to manage it himself (advisors see lots of clients!) so his wife Joanne volunteered to teach the class. Once I started working with The Silbernagel Group and Real Wealth Marketing, I became interested and wanted to get involved as well. Now, Joanne and I co-teach the course."

"We continue to make the program grow by teaching in both schools and by always making connections/bringing others on board to help implement it in other schools throughout the state."

In the program, students identify and screen qualified community organizations, find donors to raise funds, and then make actual donations to these charities. The CHS group has already chosen their charities and are researching them now and starting to work on projects to raise money.

"It was hard to decide," said Madi Danza, about choosing a charity.

Ponsford added, "When you start narrowing down, you learn you can't fix everything. I have found that your charities change over time with your life experiences. To me, the beauty of this is that we inspire

people to be givers."

Though getting Main Street Philanthropy up and running has been hard, Ponsford said it is worth it. He sees a lot of value in teaching students to care about others.

"When I started trying to figure this out, the term philanthropy scared me. I think it's a way of life. I think good things happen when you care and love other people"

In addition to Ponsford, Bob Rosch of Stars and Stripes Honor Flight and Connie Schulist of the Kettle Moraine Symphony were also panelist. Both told a little bit about their charity and why they are affiliated with it.

"Our goal is to fly over 1,000 veterans in 2019," Rosch said. "We have about 1,200 on a wait list. It was always important to give back to my community. It's all about the community. I've always felt it important to give back to the military."

For Schulist, it was a way to get an important part of her life back. She had learned to play the cello when she was younger, but hadn't played since high school. After 23 years, she decided to play again and try out for the symphony.

"He (symphony

founder Albert (Bud) Asch) gave me the opportunity to get back into music," Schulist said. "Being in an orchestra is team work. I'm part of the orchestra because I love it."

She played a few pieces for the group. Schulist is also now on the board of directors for the symphony.

"I've always just wanted to help and see the community grow," she said. "I just like to help others."

The students were very excited to listen to these people and had a lot of questions for each other them. Their time ran out before their questions did.

Before adjourning, Ponsford reminded the students why philanthropy is so important. He explained that it will change their live in a good way.

"It has turned into a way of life," he said. "Giving is more about changing the hearts and minds of others. There is nothing better when you do this than to see the impact on people. That's the most important thing we can do is give that epiphany to people about giving."

### NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that dog licenses and rabies vaccinations are required.

Vaccination by a licensed veterinarian against rabies is required of all dogs (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. The certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs five (5) months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog or one-half of these amounts if the dog became five (5) months of age after July 1, of the license year. The governing body of any town, village, or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. Any person who keeps multiple dogs or operates a kennel may apply for a multiple dog license. The fee is \$35.00 for twelve (12) dogs or less and additional \$3.00 for each dog in excess of twelve (12).

Dog licenses may be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year. Dog owners should notify their treasurer if their dog is given away or has died, so that you will not be considered delinquent. An affidavit of death is available.

### PENALTY

Every owner of a dog five (5) months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1, will be assessed a late fee of \$5.00.



# KHS Mock Trial Team Places Ninth In State

The Kewaskum High School Mock Trial Team placed ninth at the state tournament this past weekend. A total of 22 teams participated in the state contest.

Kewaskum also had two individual winners this year. Genna Alexander won the "Best Attorney" award, which is presented to the five best attorneys in the state tournament. Genna received six per-

fect 10 scores in the state competition.

"She crushed it! Her closing argument received three 10s and a nine," said Luke Piwoni, Mock Trial coach.

Sophia Otten won the "Best Witness" award, which is given out to the five best witnesses in the state tournament. Sophia earned two perfect 10 scores and two nines.

"Sophia had the difficult task of portraying the defendant in this

case, yet somehow made you like her by the end of the trial," Piwoni said.

The team finished the season with a 9-2 record, a regional championship and received a record number of perfect 10s (average of four per round) against the best competition in the state.

"All the team members worked tirelessly to improve their craft and they represented Kewaskum with confidence, passion and pride. I could not be more proud of this great group of kids and would like to personally thank all of the seniors for their dedication and passion to mock trial and accomplishing great things and many firsts in Kewaskum mock trial history," Piwoni said.

This team qualified for state for the second year in a row. Last year was the first time in school history that Kewaskum qualified for state.

Last year the team finished as runners up at regionals, and this year was the first time KHS won the regional competition ever.

"The work and dedication they put in paid off. Just tremendous, sometimes bordering on obsession, but that is what made them so good and made them think on their feet so quickly. It teaches so many other life skills beyond the competition," Piwoni said.

Kewaskum High School is currently the smallest public school in the state to have three mock trial teams.



# Continued From Front Village Board Approves New Hires

## Preparing For Warmer Weather

The Kewaskum Police Department announced Monday that it has lifted the winter parking regulations because of the 10-day forecast for above-freezing weather.

The Village Board last week approved a \$638,972 bid from Mueller Excavating Inc. to do the work on the Third Street project this summer.

"This was approximately \$120,000 less than the engineer's estimate," Village President Kevin Scheunemann said. "The timing of the year makes all the difference."

The village is preparing for summer weather in other ways as well. At last Monday's Village Board meeting, Department of Public Works Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle announced that the new umbrella for the Kiwanis Park pool has arrived.

## Open Book/Board of Review

Village Clerk/ Deputy Treasurer Tracie Sette reported at last week's Village Board meeting that the village will hold open book for village residents on Friday, April 19, from noon until 2 p.m. The Board of Review will meet on Wednesday, May 8.

## Delinquent Water Bills

In order to collect on delinquent water bills, village staff sent out 246 letters, which was approximately 20 percent of the customer base, Village Administrator Matt Heiser announced at last Monday's Village Board meeting. A total of 37 disconnect notices were posted on doors.

For those with delinquent water bills, the village requires that customers pay 50 percent of the bill down, pay 25 percent two weeks later, and the final 25 percent two weeks after

that.

Heiser said that a few people who were not satisfied with the payment plan that the village offered called Village Hall.

The board was prepared to hear comments from the public, but no one came forward and spoke on the item at last week's meeting.

## Wastewater Treatment Plant

The state of Wisconsin recently audited the village's wastewater treatment plant. This occurs once every three years.

"The state agency was in place six hours, working with the village crew and going over the facilities," Heiser told the Village Board last week.

The department did not receive any write-ups. There were three recommendations from the audit, and all of them involved record keeping, according to Heiser.

## Property Setbacks

A local builder has constructed a house on Silver Fox Drive South that is 2.2 to 3.1 inches too close to the lot line, so the building is in violation of setbacks of the village's zoning code, Heiser said at last week's Village Board meeting. There are three options that Heiser offered as possible solutions. The first option is the owner can purchase land from the neighboring property and go through a land division process. A second option is to create a variance, which would involve the village's Zoning Board of Appeals.

The third option Heiser mentioned at last week's Village Board meeting is for the owner to look into the quit claim process, which is a process between private parties to adjust lot lines.

The builder also requested that the village

look into a temporary occupancy permit, Heiser reported.

## Other Village Matters

In other village matters:

◆ The new GIS system is live on the village website, Heiser reported at last week's meeting.

◆ The Village Board unanimously approved the sale of the Department of Public Works bucket truck for \$5,505, which will go toward the purchase of a replacement bucket truck.

Bidding on the truck started out with the minimum bid of \$3,000, Aupperle said.

care management tools through group discussions, skill building, problem solving, assertiveness training, and brainstorming.



## Paulowske Takes Center Stage With State's Top Shooters

Just think about it. There are some 425 varsity girls basketball teams in Wisconsin, and considering each one has 10 to 14 players, there are approximately 5,100 players annually, and Kewaskum high junior guard Maxine Paulowske is among the top 10 of the state's outside shooters.

Paulowske competed in the fifth annual Three-Point Challenge on March 9 in Green Bay's Resch Center, which was held in conjunction with the WIAA's State Girls Basketball Tournament. Even though she did not advance past the first round, it was a great experience and one she hopes will be a stepping stone for making the field next season.

"I think it's something I'll always remember,"

Paulowske said Monday, indicating there was a big crowd on hand for the competition. "I had cousins, my mom, aunts and uncles and a lot of basketball people there," she said, quick to add the entire Kewaskum eighth grade girls team came to Green Bay to cheer her on.

Each girl took a total of 25 three-point attempts, five each from the right baseline, the right wing, the top of the circle, the left wing and left baseline. They received one point for each three-pointer made, plus two points on the final attempt of each area. The top four players moved on to the semis, and the field was pared down to two for the finals.

"I think I let my nerves get to me," Paulowske, who scored 10 points in the first round, said. "I

didn't finish where I wanted to, but I'm so glad I made it."

Paulowske went on, "I started out great. I guess I just didn't keep it going," anyone who follows the game of basketball knows that with outside shooting, it's a matter of getting in a rhythm and maintaining it, not always an easy task.

Once this past season, playing against **W i n n e c o n n e**, Paulowske hit five three-pointers, helping the Indians to a 56-48 victory.

The winner of the event was Elk Mound's Sophie Cedarblade, who scored 18 points in the first round, 13 in the second when she won a tie-breaker, and then 18 points in the finals. Paulowske said she did not know Cedarblade nor any of the other eight girls in the field, ex-

cept for Waupun freshman Abbie Aalsma.

"It was nice to know someone I played against," she said.

When asked about next year, Paulowske said she and the Lady Indians have the opportunity to challenge for the East Central title. To reach that goal, she said over the summer she plans to "push myself to improve my inside game, which will open up my threes."

Paulowske's coach, Russell Thull, beamed about having a girl qualify for the event.

"It means a lot to our program that she was able to represent us. Only 10 schools were

represented and one of them was us!! She is a special player and I think its important that we don't take her ability to shoot the basketball for granted as she is truly one of the top shooters in the state," he said.

"The three-point challenge was a great experience for Maxine. She represented us well, but unfortunately just missed the second round," Thull went on. "It was a really cool atmosphere. We had a lot of Kewaskum parents and players come up to support Maxine. Really cool to see!!"

## Leister Decides UW-Oshkosh Is A Perfect Fit

Plans for the upcoming summer and fall are starting to fill up for Jon Leister, a starting offensive and defensive lineman for the Kewaskum High football team the past three years.

First, the Indians' All-East Central, All-District and All-State standout decided he will play football for NCAA-3 UW-Oshkosh, and then Leister got word he has been selected to play for the North Large School team in the annual Wisconsin Football Coaches Association's All-Star game, which will be held in Oshkosh on Saturday, July 20. Kick-off time for that game is 5 p.m. (The Eight-Player game will be played at 10 a.m. that day with the kickoff for the small school teams set for 1:30 p.m.)

"It's a real blessing, that's for sure," Leister said Sunday evening about being selected to play in the All-Star game, noting he has attended the game for the past several years, watching teammates Ben Watzig, then Brady Hanson and a year ago, Riley Donovan and Tony Steger, and now he is in it.

Leister, who stands 6 feet 3 inches and tips the scale at 290 pounds, got the call from the North head coach, David Crall from River Falls. Crall asked if he would like to participate in the game ... It took Leister less than a second to answer in the affirmative.

Concerning where the coaches will have Leister play — Leister started on the offensive and defensive lines for the Indians — he said, "They said most likely offensive line."

"We check in July 14 to the UW-Oshkosh dorms, and I think it's two practices a day" for the next five days leading up to the game.

The WFCFA have partnered up with Children's Hospital of Wisconsin for the game. "I know it's a huge fund raiser for the hospital," Leister said, indicating he thinks the game has raised over \$4 million since it was originated.

Slinger High will be represented by d-back Jeraed Lighthizer and lineman Ben Hoitink, but Leister said he does not know either of the Owls. He does know Fond du Lac's Logan Berndt through football camps the two have attended while in high school.

Leister had a little more control over his college decision, and it came down to UW-Oshkosh and two D-2 schools, Minnesota State University-Morehead and Southwest Minnesota State, which both offered him partial scholarships. He made a visit to Morehead, which is an eight-hour drive from Kewaskum.

"The first thing that appealed to me was the coaching staff," Leister said about UW-Oshkosh, noting, in addition to saying they will develop him as a football player, they commented, "We'll take care

of you ... We're like family."

The proximity to Kewaskum also figured into the equation. "I'm a big family guy," Leister said, indicating his parents have watched him play every game he has been in while in high school, and considering Oshkosh is just 50 miles away, they will be able to continue that tradition.

Steger and fullback Faton Elmazi were "grey-shirted" at Oshkosh this past fall and will be on the Titan roster this fall, but Leister said the coaches told him he might have a chance to make the varsity his freshman year. If not, he is prepared to work on his strength and conditioning while waiting for a chance to play.

While at Oshkosh, Leister said he plans to major in business management.

Leister still has several months of high school to go and he is already practicing with the track team for the spring season.

"I am throwing the shot and discus," he said.

The Indians have a meet this Saturday, March 16, hosted by Wisconsin Lutheran High School at the UW-Parkside indoor track facility.

When summer rolls around, Leister said he'll be working out with Steger in preparation for his first collegiate season as a Titan. And he has the date July 14 circled on his calendar.

## College Sports Notes

One sport has come to a close for former Kewaskum High athletes, Hailey Herriges and Mikayla Dogs, while a new one is starting for Cade Peterson.

**Herriges** played guard for the Carroll University Lady Pioneers, who finished with a record of 9-15, including a mark of 5-11 in the College Conference of Wisconsin and Illinois.

Starting one game and seeing action in eight others, Herriges hauled down 22 rebounds for 2.4 rebounds per game, while averaging 1.0 point per game.

Early in the season, Herriges was hampered by an injury.

**Dogs** was a leading reserve for the Milwaukee School of Engineering women's basketball season, which concluded its season with a mark of 13-13, including an 11-9 record in the Northern Athletic Collegiate Conference.

The 5-foot 8-inch sophomore guard wound up averaging two points per game, playing about eight minutes per contest for the Raiders. With five seniors graduating from the program, Dogs is a good bet to have an opportunity to start for the 2019-'20

season.

**Peterson**, the starting punter for the University of North Dakota football team, has traded in his football shoes for track spikes this spring. Peterson, a standout on the KHS track team a year ago, is running the 60-meter dash, at times the 200 and the four-by-400 meter relay during the spring indoor season.

The Fighting Hawks have already competed in several indoor meets, the latest the Summit League Championships, which were held in Brookings, South Dakota. In that meet, Peterson turned in a time of 22.36 seconds in the 200-meter dash, to place 12th in the field of 15. He missed qualifying for the finals by .37 of a second.

On January 25, Peterson and the Hawks hosted the UND Indoor Open, and the four-by-400 meter relay team captured top honors with a time of 3:21.32. Peterson ran the third leg on the winning Hawk quartet. He also finished fourth in the finals of the 60-meter dash with a clocking of 7.10 seconds, besting his time in the preliminaries by .06 of a second.

The Hawks' outdoor season starts March 14 at the UIW (University of Incarnate Word) Invitational in San Antonio, Texas.

Peterson will also take part in North Dakota's spring football practices.

# Wanted: Innovative Business Ideas For Seed Fund

Ideadvance Seed Fund is inviting innovators with current or past ties to the UW System to apply to the program with business ideas that could contribute to Wisconsin's "knowledge economy."

The Ideadvance program provides business funding and mentoring toward a scalable, profitable business model. Grant dollars are earned by teams after they demonstrate key learnings toward their commercialization goals.

Last year's awards went to a range of ideas, from scaled-up specialty food businesses to fledgling smarter recycling programs.

The deadline to apply is April 19. Diverse teams from all parts of Wisconsin are invited to connect early to take advantage of resources that can guide them through the application process. An introductory YouTube video and hands-on assistance from Ideadvance consultants are available.

The program is open to UW System staff, faculty, students and alumni. At this time, teams consisting of only UW-Madison founders are not able to apply. However, hybrid teams with founders that include key members from eligible UW System schools are welcome to compete.

Ideadvance, launched in 2014, has awarded grants to 56 Stage 1 teams and 19 Stage 2 teams, totaling over \$2.4 million in funding. Stage

1, with funding up to \$25,000, focuses on achieving commercialization milestones to reduce risk and determine need in the marketplace to solve a problem. Stage 2, with follow-on funding up to \$50,000, helps a select few to advance their business models to deliver customer solutions and attract investors.

"More than the idea, Ideadvance focuses on learning and execution strategies," Ideadvance New Idea Concierge Idella Yamben said. "From a team with a new idea to an existing startup with sales, Ideadvance meets awardees where they are and helps them identify actionable milestones to take the next step."

Luis Rivera, founder and CEO of Tactical Athlete Health & Performance Institute (TAHPI), credits the Ideadvance program for his company's success. TAHPI has taken a new approach to first responders' safety and continues to grow and create new product lines.

"TAHPI would definitely not be where it's at now had we not won that grant, had I not

learned the process," Rivera said.

Awards are determined by an Investment Committee with representatives from UW System, WiSys Technology Foundation, the Center for Technology Commercialization, Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) and an entrepreneur affiliated with an eligible UW campus. The committee selects proposals with a compelling case for a significant solution to a market problem and a dedicated team focused on learning about risks to their business model. The committee also focuses on the skills and preparedness of the team.

Although high-tech ideas are welcome, entrepreneurs do not need to present a biotech or information technology. The types of eligible businesses are very broad, including ideas in agriculture, manufacturing, music production, textiles, art or business. The only restrictions are that the business cannot be in real estate, direct consumer retail or hospitality, including restaurants.

Ideadvance is part of WEDC's effort to ex-

pand collaboration with the UW System, business leaders and others throughout the state. Through their special S3 initiative, WEDC is removing commercialization barriers by providing financial and operational assistance for business startup and seed-funding challenges.

"Ideadvance is a critical tool for moving ideas from the academic setting and into the business world," said Aaron Hagar, vice president of entrepreneurship and innovation for WEDC, the state's lead economic development organization. "Many of the participants are students, faculty and staff that don't have business experience or training necessary to successfully capitalize on their innovations and creativity. The academic environment is very different from the world of startups, and Ideadvance helps to bridge the gap that often prevents good ideas from becoming successful businesses."

## BBB Sees More Phony Government Agency Calls

In 2018, BBB Scam Tracker received more than 500 reports about scam calls claiming to be from Medicare representatives. Protect yourself and your loved ones from this unfortunately common scam.

### How The Scam Works

You receive a call that appears on your caller ID as Medicare or Social Security Administration. In one version of this scam, when you pick up the phone, a Medicare impersonator offers you something for free, such as a back or knee brace, medical equipment, or new Medicare cards. All you have to do is share some personal information, such as your Social Security number, to "confirm" your identity.

In another version, scammers attempt to intimidate you by claiming there is a problem with your Medicare or Social Security benefits. They may claim there has been suspicious activity on your account and if you don't give them the information they need right away, you are in danger of losing your benefits or worse.

Sometimes, scammers even use robocalls

to tell you there is a problem and ask you to call a different number to resolve it. Regardless of the method, the scammer's goal is to steal your personal information for their personal benefit.

### How To Protect Yourself

Don't answer calls from unknown numbers. If you receive a call from a number you haven't saved to your contacts, or if your caller ID says "unknown," don't pick up the phone. Also, be aware that scammers can dupe caller ID and mask their true phone number.

When in doubt, hang up. If you do answer a call from an unsolicited caller and are greeted by a robocall or even a person who claims to be with a government agency, just hang up. Don't press any buttons, don't engage in conversation and don't ask to be removed from the calling list.

Know how government agencies work. Government agencies don't call consumers unsolicited. Instead, they send letters if they need to contact you.

If you receive a particularly convincing call from someone claiming to be an SSA employee, hang up and call their toll-free number at 1-800-772-1213 to verify the issue. Likewise, you can call 1-800-MEDICARE to verify Medicare issues.
