## The Big Melt

### – Region Sees Flooding With Warmer Temperatures

Water crept over the banks of the Milwaukee River as snow and ice melted when warmer temperatures reached Kewaskum last week.

Over the past week, temperatures rose above freezing, beginning last Wednesday. The warming trend and heavy rainfall caused high waters across the area.

Much of River Hill Park was under water as the winter's snow began to thaw. Just north of the park, the river spread to the west across the field, reaching almost to Kewaskum High School's tennis courts.

The new high school baseball field and softball field, specially designed by engineers last year, remained above water, with the river expanding to just outside the outfield fences.

Farther east, in the Village of Newburg, the baseball field at Newburg Fireman's Park was not so fortunate. There, rushing water from the Milwaukee River caused damage to the baseball field's backstops and fence.

To the north, in Fond du Lac, many residents

were evacuated because their homes were flooded. Some businesses there closed last Thursday and Friday because of flooding. Fond du Lac Schools were closed on Friday because of the floodwaters.

In Sheboygan County, at approximately 8:35 p.m. on Thursday, March 14, the Sheboygan County Emergency Communications Center received a 911 call regarding homes and a business being flooded on Main Road at Franklin Road in the Town of Herman. Deputies arrived to discover buildings flooded with water coming over a bridge from high water. No injuries were reported.

The following resources were involved in that incident: Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office, Sheboygan County Emergency Government, Sheboygan County Highway Department, State Patrol, ADA Fire Department and Johnsonville Fire Department.

## Farmington Considers Offering Curbside Garbage Pickup – Town Seeks Resident Input

The Town of Farmington is considering offering weekly curbside garbage pickup for town residents. The service would come at a monthly charge of \$10.95 for each residence.

Town supervisors are seeking input from resi-

dents on the issue.

"The Town Board can do this, but we would like to know how people feel," Town Chairman Chris Elbe said.

Farmington currently offers recycling pickup twice a month at no charge for approximately 1,300 homes in the township. The town board budgeted about

\$64,000 for 2019 to cover the recycling service.

"This has turned into a bigger expense for the town than originally anticipated, and it has taken a toll on the budget," Elbe explained.

In order to free up funds for road repairs, the town board would like to start charging for

the recycling service.

If the town begins charging for recycling services, the cost would be \$14.84 per month, or \$178.08 a year, for combined garbage and recycling pickup. The fee, which would be a special charge on residents' taxes, would cover garbage pickup every week and recycling

pickup every other week.

The money the town would save on recycling services would cover the cost of grinding and resurfacing about a mile of road three years from now, Elbe stated.

Currently, about 40 to 50 percent of Farmington residents have a contract with either

Waste Management or Advanced Disposal on their own for weekly garbage pickup, according to Elbe.

The town board has gotten bids from both services, and the lowest bid came from Advanced Disposal.

## Continued From Front Farmington Considers Offering Curbside Garbage Pickup — Town Seeks Resident Input

With a contract from Advanced Disposal, town residents would have three 30-yard dumpsters available at town hall to dispose of large items. Residents could simply drop off the large items and town employees could use a loader to lift large items into the dumpsters.

"The town has been talking about curbside garbage pickup for a long time," Elbe said. Information on the issue will be mailed to all town residents.

Curbside garbage

pickup will be discussed at the next regular town meeting on April 9.

It will also be an agenda item for the annual town meeting. Residents are encouraged to attend the annual meeting and provide feedback. The annual meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on April 16 at the Farmington Town Hall.

### Pedestrian Fatality Accident, Town Of Plymouth

On Monday, March 18, at approximately 12:07 p.m. the Sheboygan County Emergency Communications Center received a 911 call reference a report of a vehicle hitting a pedestrian in the parking lot of Mills Fleet Farm located at 3110 Eastern Ave. in the Town of Plymouth.

Upon the arrival of officers, it was confirmed that an individual in the Mills Fleet Farm lot was struck by a vehicle, resulting in the death of the pedestrian.

The deceased party was identified as Jerome H. Kohlhagen, 69 years old, of Sheboygan.

The driver involved was identified as Ralph E. Gardner, 80, of Bowler, Wisconsin.

## Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

### Fatal Vehicle Crash

On Sunday, March 17, at 7:07 p.m., deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to a two-vehicle crash with injuries in the area of County Highway NN east of County Highway M (Country Aire Drive) in the Township of Jackson. Jackson Rescue was also dispatched to the scene to treat the injured parties.

Upon arrival of the first deputy, the operator of the first vehicle was immediately confirmed as deceased due to the extent of his injuries. The operator of the second vehicle was also tended to and he was confirmed deceased as well. There were an additional three passengers in the second vehicle, ages 8, 10 and 16, and they were all transported to a local hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

Preliminary investigation shows that the first vehicle was operating eastbound on County Highway NN and veered into the westbound lane striking the second vehicle in a head-on manner.

Weather and road conditions were not a factor in the crash, but speed is believed to be. County Highway NN was closed to all traffic for approximately four hours to facilitate the investigation and clean-up.

The deceased operator of the first vehicle is a 52-year-old male from the Town of Barton. The deceased operator of the second vehicle is a 51-year-old male from the City of West Bend.

This is Washington County's second and third traffic fatality in

2019.

The crash remains under investigation.

### Barn Fire

On March 17 at 2:08 a.m. the Sheriff's Office was notified of a barn fire at 4831 Ridge Road in the Town of Barton. The caller was one of the property owners and reported the barn was fully engulfed with animals inside. Deputies were dispatched and Kohlsville Fire Department was paged. The first deputy arrived at 2:16 a.m., confirming the barn was fully engulfed and the homeowners had evacuated the residence.

Kohlsville Fire Department was assisted by fire departments from Kewaskum, Allenton, West Bend, Slinger, Boltonville, St. Lawrence, Campbellsport, Lomira, Knowles and Eden, as well as Lifestar Rescue. The fire was extinguished at approximately 3:08 a.m.

It appears the origin of the fire was on the southwest side of the barn structure where the calf barn was located. There was a heat lamp running in this area, and it is believed that was the cause of the fire. There were eight calves inside the building that perished due to the fire, but all the other cows were out to pasture at the time of the fire.

There were no reported injuries to any personnel on scene and the residence didn't sustain any damage. The damage estimate is believed to be in excess of \$200,000 as the barn and contents are a total loss.

### Silver Alert Subject Located

On March 13 at approximately 10:40 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Communication Center received several 911 calls of a person driving the wrong way, traveling northbound in the southbound lanes of Interstate 41 in the area of Lannon Road in the Village of Germantown. Germantown Police Officers and Washington County sheriff's deputies were subsequently dispatched to the area in an attempt to intercept the vehicle. Ultimately, a deputy located and stopped the offending vehicle on Interstate 41 southbound just north of State Highway 167 (west)/Holy Hill Road in the Village of Richfield.

The operator and lone occupant of the vehicle appeared disorientated and confused. He did not know where he was or what road he was on. A records check of the vehicle's registration noted that the registered owner was the subject of a Silver Alert previously issued by the Manitowoc Police Department. The Deputy confirmed that the operator was in fact, the 75 year-old missing Manitowoc man.

Contact was made with the missing man's family, who made the necessary arrangements to pick him up at the Washington County Sheriff's Office in West Bend. His vehicle was towed from the scene. Neither drugs nor alcohol were contributing factors, but a Driver's Condition Report outlining the man's driving behavior will be submitted to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation for review.



# Spring Snowmelt And Rain Can Contaminate Wells

## – Well Owners Encouraged To Be Vigilant As The Seasons Change

Warming temperatures, snow melt, rain and lingering frozen ground can create conditions that may affect private wells and drinking water.

“Our recent rain, mixed precipitation and local flooding throughout the state is a reminder that changing spring weather can lead to well contamination,” said Liesa Lehmann, DNR private water section

chief. “At this time of year we encourage well owners to watch for signs of flooding and note any change in the color, smell or taste of their drinking water.”

Owners who see flood waters very near or over their wells should assume their drinking water could be contaminated. Take the following steps:

- Stop drinking the water and find another

safe source.

- Once the waters recede, make sure the well is properly disinfected.

- Before drinking the water again, sample the well to assure the water is safe.

Flood waters and rain runoff may contain bacteria and other contaminants that can affect water supplies and cause illness. Wells located in pits, basements

and low-lying areas are especially susceptible to contamination.

“Disinfection and sampling is best done by a licensed well driller or pump installer,” said Lehmann. “Any water supply system that has been submerged by flood waters should be pumped out once the floodwater recedes, then thoroughly disinfected and tested to determine that the water is safe.”

To ensure safe drinking water, well owners are encouraged to learn whether they have a properly constructed well and test it annually for bacteria. More information on bacterial contamination of drinking water wells, along with lists of licensed well drillers, pump installers and labs certified to analyze water samples can be found on DNR’s website.

For individuals who receive drinking water from a public water supply, these systems are designed and operated to keep out contaminants. If you have concerns about the safety of your community’s drinking water, contact your public water supplier.

# Washington County Offers Household Hazardous Waste Collection Throughout Year

Need to dispose of hazardous waste material? You no longer need to wait for special one-day Clean Sweep events that have been held in the past. Washington County residents can now utilize the Veolia Environmental Services disposal site in Menomonee Falls throughout the year.

The disposal site will be open to Washington County residents on Mondays and Wednesdays from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., closed on holidays. The Planning and Parks Department partnered with Waukesha

County in order to provide a greater cost effective program and increased accessibility for the disposal of household hazardous waste.

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection is an opportunity for county residents to properly dispose of hazardous waste from their home. Properly disposing of hazardous waste protects our environment and water resources. For the last nine years the Planning and Parks Department has hosted a Full Service Clean Sweep where

residents could bring hazardous waste, electronics, appliances, tires and medicines.

"We continually evaluate our programs in order to be as cost effective as possible, disposing of household hazardous waste is expensive" said Paul Sebo, county conservationist.

"Last year the cost to dispose of hazardous waste was approximately \$105 per program participant," Sebo said. "Waukesha County averages \$70 per participant due in large part with utilizing a perma-

nent collection site."

"Over the years the one complaint we have always heard is that we should offer this program more than just twice a year," continued Sebo. "Right now we are not planning a collection for electronics, appliances or tires."

There are many options available to residents in and around the county to dispose of those items. See the department's website listed below for a comprehensive guide for recycling and disposal alternatives. Residents should always look to use alternatives to hazardous materials when possible, use up all of a product, and use safe hazardous waste disposal sites as a last alternative.

In order to participate in the Household Hazardous Waste Collection a \$20 registration fee is required.

Please note when registering for the program the permit expires 21 days from your date of purchase.

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection disposal site is located at:

Boundary Road, Menomonee Falls, WI 53051.

Residents will need to show proof of payment by printing their receipt. No payments will be accepted at the waste disposal site.

The following materials will NOT be accepted during the Clean Sweep: latex paint, motor oil, medicines, needles/sharps, radioactive items, smoke detectors, and propane tanks and cylinders.

• Facility operators reserve the right to refuse any substance that cannot be disposed.

• Participants will be checked against the registration database.

• Drop off materials ONLY during regular operating hours. Closed holidays.

• Please bring your items in boxes which can be recycled on site.

• Staff will NOT accept an expired receipt.

• NO appliances/white goods, computers, TVs, electronics or tires.

• DO NOT BRING LATEX PAINT.

In his first match, Kleinke lost a 7-5 SV (sudden victory) to Henry Erdmann of Whitlaw, then turned the tables on Erdmann the second time around, pinning him in 2:29. In Round 3, Kleinke had no trouble handling New Berlin's Mason Erchull, pinning him in a brief 1:15.

Lawrenz was one of only two wrestlers in the 120-pound weight class for boys born in 2010-'11. He pinned his only opponent, Brendon Bowe of Berlin in 29 seconds.

Racer (2008-'09, 90 pounds) went 3-0 in a six-man bracket, defeat-

ing Jonathon Englebert 6-0 in the finals. Racer had a first-round bye, then beat Sullivan McManigal of Hartford 7-0 in the semis.

Just missing a state berth was seventh grader Nicholas Deheck, who advanced to the finals with a bye, a 13-0 major win over Sam Schmalz of Reedsville and a pin in 2:21 over Neenah's Nick Novak before losing in the finals to Gianno Blas of Neenah by 12-4 major decision.

The loss sent Deheck to the wrestleback for a try at second place, and he lost this match to Tanner Hart of Kimberly/Fox Valley 6-1.

"His (Deheck's) bracket looked really loaded. I didn't think he would get to the finals," Rhoads said, pointing out Deheck was going

up against mainly eighth graders in the 10-man bracket.

Rhoads' son Jayce also had a tough ending to a good day. After receiving a bye, Rhoads won by pin over Clayton Quick of Menasa, 2:36, then lost in the semis to Carson Peterson by pin in 0:39. In the wrestlebacks, young Rhoads (2006-'07, 88 pounds) defeated Bryce Britton of Laconia 1-0 before losing in the battle for third place to Draysias Stathopoulos of Sussex, 6-0, ending his day with a 3-2 record in the nine-man bracket.

Eli Ogi placed fourth in the 90-pound weight class for those boys born in 2008-09. Ogi received a bye in the first round, then lost a close 3-2 decision to Jon Enggelbert of Hortonville in the semifinals.

In the wrestleback, Ogi posted a pin in 2:50 over Oliver Luedtke of the West Bend Wildcats, then ended his day with a 2-1 loss to Hartford's Sullivan McManigal.

Young Brayden Herman (2010-11) finished fourth at 63 pounds. He won his first match by pin in 2:31, then was pinned in 0:59. After that he won three straight matches, via pin in 0:45, by 15-9 decision and 8-4 before losing a 7-2 decision in the battle for third place to Broken Butzke of the Neenah Rockers.

Also in the 2006-07 age group, Elijah McChain went 1-2 in the 85-pound weight class.; Christian Oldenborg went 0-2 at 60 pounds, 2010-11, and Jack Bruckner went 1-2 with one pin at 69 pounds in the same age group.

## March Madness Ignited By UW-Madison Grad

### -Harold Olsen Changed College Basketball And The Country Forever

The annual rite of spring and national obsession known as March Madness is about to begin. Did you know that one of the founding fathers of what is otherwise known as the NCAA Division 1 Men's Basketball Tournament is a Wisconsin native and UW-Madison alumnus?

Rice Lake's own Harold Olsen started playing basketball at the University of Wisconsin in 1914. He went on to be named a two-time All-Big Ten player and first-team All-American. In 1915, Olsen and the Badgers compiled an enviable 20-1 record, and the Helms Athletic Foundation later named the team the national champion for that year.

Shortly after his graduation from the University of Wisconsin in 1918, Olsen began a coaching career at Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois, and at Ripon [Wisconsin] College, where his teams won three conference titles. In 1922, he became head coach of Ohio State University and eventually earned the distinction of being

the longest-tenured basketball coach in that school's history. During his 24 years with the Buckeyes, Olsen amassed a 259-197 record and five Big Ten championships.

Olsen's national legacy, however, began as chair of the NCAA Basketball Committee. In 1937, he helped to initiate the 10-second rule, which requires teams to advance the ball over the center line within 10 seconds of gaining possession.

Olsen then came up with the idea to create the NCAA postseason national playoffs, now known as the NCAA tournament. He wanted to hold a true national championship tournament and compete with the more prestigious National Invitational Tournament, which was held at Madison Square Garden in New York. The first NCAA tournament in 1939 hosted a field of eight teams on the campus of Northwestern University. Event organizers had to give tickets away just to get fans in the stands, and it lost \$2,600 that first year.

Olsen led Ohio State to the tournament four times, clinching a second-place finish in the inaugural event, when the University of Oregon beat the Buckeyes in the 1939 championship game.

Sixty-eight teams now go to what is now known as The Big Dance. The single-elimination bracket format has made the terms Sweet Sixteen, Elite Eight, and Final Four a part of our national lexicon. Millions of Americans fill out a bracket, hoping to predict the outcome of all 67 games and the eventual national champion, with more than just a few wagers riding on the outcome.

Olsen was only 58 when he passed away in 1953. He was inducted posthumously into the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 and the College Basketball Hall of Fame in 2006.

As you fill in your brackets and start watching the madness, tip your hat to Harold Olsen, the University of Wisconsin alumnus who helped to turn the doldrums of March into something truly special.

## KHS High Jumper Has Good Effort In Parkside Meet

Selected members of the Kewaskum High track teams were in fast company, real fast company on March 16 when they competed in the Performance Running Outfitters Invitational held at UW-Parkside in Kenosha.

Out of the 18 teams in the meet, 14 were from Division 1 schools and several are usually the cream of the crops in the state. Still, KHS co-head coach Kris Evans was happy he took a contingency of Indian athletes. "We had an OK showing, some highs and some lows," Evans said Sunday about the meet. "It was a good early-season meet to show our kids the kind of work that needs to be put in" to be successful.

Junior Sam Schultz was the lone Indians to bring home a medal. He placed fourth in the high jump after clearing 5 feet, 10 inches (5-10).

"Sam put in a lot of work in the off season," Evans said, fulling expecting he will clear 6 feet early in the year and then go after the school's indoor record of 6-4.

Kewaskum's boys earned 11 points in the meet, finishing 15th overall. Powerhouse Hartland Arrowhead came away with the team title, scoring 84 points, eight more than runner-up Waukesha North's 76. Kenosha Indian Trails placed third

with 68.

Senior sprinter Tyler Heus had a good day, according to Evans, taking seventh in the 55-meter dash with a time of 6 and .80 seconds (6.80), missing a medal by one place. There were 37 runners, starting out in the preliminaries in this event.

Heus also played seventh in the 200, and again the field was quite large with 34 athletes participating.

"He's very important to us this year," Evans said.

Other notable performances included: Gannon Kreuer's 16th place in the 800 (2:18.58) and 21st in the 1,600 (5:11.69); and the seventh by Sam Melzer in the pole vault (11-6).

The KHS girls, missing Abby Meidl, who undoubtedly would have placed in the pole vault, scored five points and tied for 17th place. Winning the team title with 75 points was Wisconsin Lutheran. Muskego took second with 67.33, while Brookfield Central was third at 62.33.

Four of the Lady Indians' points came from the 4x800 relays, which Evans indicated will be a strong event this spring. Teaming up for a fifth place were Romela Olla, Alyssa Butz, Faith Marchello and Grace Marchello. They were clocked in 11:07.26.

"That was awesome ... They're a team to watch," Evans said.

Butz had a fine showing in the 3,200, placing eighth with a time of 13:58.25, while Machello, who is healthy and very focused this spring, turned in a 5:46.69 in the 1,600, which was good for 10th.

"She was four seconds off her all time personal best" indoor or outdoor, Evans said.

Anna Peterson did the best in the sprints, ran a time of 28.46 in the 200, which was good for 10th place.

Next up for the Indians is the Ripon Indoor Invitational Saturday, March 23. It starts at 10 a.m.
