War Dogs

– Presentation Educates Public

A crowd gathered inside the Boltonville Fire Station on Saturday afternoon to for a presentation sponsored by the Farmington Historical Society.

There were about 75 people altogether who came to hear the presentation. There were boys and girls, young and old, in the crowd.

But there were also lots of four-legged animals that took part in the presentation.

They were there on behalf of War Dogs, an organization that was formed in 1998 by Carol Singer and Karen Ilding to remember the important role that dogs have played in the military. War Dogs strives to educate the public about the dedication and service that dogs have provided in military conflicts throughout history.

The dogs that were featured in Saturday's program have not served in any wars. Their owners are volunteers from the Milwaukee chapter of War Dogs who take part in parades, presentations and special events to

share how different dog breeds have helped the U.S. military.

According to War Dogs, some of the dogs that have served include:

- **German Shepherds-** Used as Sentry duty, and Scout Dog duty for early detection of personnel, booby traps, weapons caches, cadaver duty, house searches and explosion detection. On duty from World War II to present day.

- **Belgian Malinois-** Used and bread by the U.S. military for use in today's conflicts around the world. Used by Navy Seals to capture and kill Osama bin Laden.

- **Doberman Pinschers-** Used for Sentry duty, and Scout Dog duty in World War II. They were the official dog of the Marine Corp. in World War II.

- **Labradors-** Used for tracking blood trails and to help rescue downed pilots, and wounded soldiers. Also used for bomb detection.

- **Airedales-** Used in World War I and World War II as messenger dogs.

- **Collies-** Used in World War II as carriers of medical supplies for wounded soldiers in the field. The Red Cross also used them in the same manner.

- **Newfoundlands-** Used for water rescue by the Navy and Marines in World War II.

- **Huskies / Malamutes-** Used in World War II in the arctic regions as sled dogs to help transport men and equipment.

- **Boxers-** Used in World War II for guard duty and intimidation during interrogation.

- **Poodle (Sport Cut)-** Used for Sentry duty, and messenger duty in the South Pacific and Europe during World War II.

- **Giant Schnauzers-** Used in World War I and World War II for guard dog duties. Used also for explosives detection. Used for tracking wounded soldiers.

- **Beagles-** They are often used as drug and bomb-sniffing dogs by the military and at airports around the world.

- **Pitbull Terriers-** Used currently in Iraq and Afghanistan for explosive detection.

- **Springer Spaniels-** Used currently in Iraq and Afghanistan for bomb detection and cadaver duty.

- **Jack Russells-** Used in Iraq and Afghanistan for bomb detection.

- **Yorkshire Terriers-** Used in World War II to pull communication wires through trenches and foxholes.

Career Fair Comes To Kewaskum High School

Representatives from nine businesses visited Kewaskum High School on Thursday, March 21, so students could get a taste of different career opportunities that are available.

"It got me thinking a lot and broadening my understanding of what all is out there. Some of the careers are things I never would have thought of," said Allie Nytsch, a junior who is thinking about going into journalism, photography

or cosmetology.

The business representatives visited different classes to tell the students about various career fields. They also set up a small job fair in the school library that students could visit during their lunch periods.

"I personally think it is a great event to expose students to multiple career pathways," said Jacki Warner, human resources manager at Michels Corporation. "The first class I visited had a lot of students interested in being engi-

neers. This helps them solidify their interests and how they can apply their interests to their potential profession."

"It is great for Kewaskum to do this. It helps them see what careers we see a real need for," she added.

Each of the businesses that visited KHS offer different career opportunities. For example, at Farmers' Implement LLC, there are careers available in service, parts and sales.

"We have opportunities in all areas. But the

area that seems to be the most stressed where we need help is in the service industry," said Dan Drohman, agribusiness operations manager at Farmers' Implement.

Like KHS, many area high schools offer career fairs for students to help them plan their futures. But that has not always been the case.

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Kewaskum Elementary PTO Raises \$50,000 For New Playground

The Kewaskum Elementary School PTO has raised \$50,000 to purchase new playground equipment for the school.

The new equipment should be in place for students to use when school starts in the fall, according to Jessica Steinert, PTO president.

"We have been fundraising for this playground since the 2016 school year," Steinert told the Kewaskum School Board on March 11.

The new playground, which is made in Wisconsin, has a larger capacity than that of the school's current playground. A total of 143 students will be able to

utilize the new playground at one time.

"We ended up going with a bigger brand new piece of equipment than what we had originally planned," Steinert said. "Our original plan was to refurbish what we have and then add a smaller piece. This was a much better deal in the long run. It's going to be even more amazing for all of the students and kids that use the equipment."

To purchase the equipment, the PTO has run a variety of fundraisers since 2016. There have been McDonald's teacher nights and various special events over the last several years.

There have even been adult nights out. Last year, the PTO held that event for the first time.

"It was just a night out for parents to enjoy with

a variety of raffles and things like that," Steinert said.

"Parents loved it so much that we decided to offer it again this year. We took a different spin this year, and did it a little more laid back and casual, but we were just as successful," she added.

Last year's "adult night out" raised \$6,000, and this year the event brought in over \$5,000, according to Steinert.

"We are grateful to the families, the parents, the teachers and, of course, the community for all of their support," Steinert said.

Names Released From Fatal Vehicle Crash

The Washington County Sheriff's Office released names of both deceased operators from the March 17 crash on County Highway NN: John David Johnson, 52, from the Town of Barton; and Michael George Roeber, 51, from the City of West Bend.

The two-vehicle crash occurred on Sunday, March 17, at 7:07 p.m.,

in the area of County Highway NN east of County Highway M (Country Aire Drive) in the Township of Jackson.

There were an additional three passengers in the second vehicle, ages 8, 10 and 16, and they were all transported to a local hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

Preliminary investiga-

tion shows that the first vehicle was operating eastbound on County Highway NN and veered into the westbound lane, striking the second vehicle in a head-on manner. Weather and road conditions were not a factor in the crash, but speed is believed to be.

The Sheriff's Office continues with the investigation.







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West Bend Nurse Honored With St. Joseph's Hospital Award

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In Other Words...

– Elections Should Help Communities Move Forward

I am more worried about this Spring Election than I have been about any other election that I can remember.

Since I turned 18 and voted for the first time, I have voted in many elections. And I have covered lots of elections since I first became a journalist some 30 years ago.

I have witnessed some hotly contested races. There have even been some downright ugly smear campaigns.

But this is the first time I have voted in or covered an election where there was no one running for an open seat.

I live in the Town of Kewaskum, and the ballot instructs voters to vote for two people for the position of Kewaskum Town Board Supervisor.

Michael Otten is running for re-election as a town board supervisor, but there are no candidates running for the

second board supervisor position. The position will be filled by a write-in candidate.

That is worrisome to me.

In today's paper, there are profiles of different candidates running for office. Even if a candidate is unopposed, I appreciate knowing a little about who they are and what they represent. They are our leaders.

But for the Town of Kewaskum, I have no idea who one of our supervisors will be. There is no profile for that person.

With no candidate name, I can't look up that person's credentials. I don't know what their values are. I don't know what their vision is for the future of the town I live in.

I imagine that the founding fathers of this great nation never imagined there would be an election with no candidate.

I guess it is a sign of our times. Everyone is

busy.

Plus being an elected official is oftentimes a thankless job. You don't get paid much. And everyone seems to complain about decisions you make.

I cover a lot of government meetings in my position as a journalist. Each week it is surprising to me how few people attend these meetings.

I try not to be disheartened by that fact. I hope it means that everyone is happy with how things are going.

But I can't help being surprised that a lot of people just don't seem to care about what goes on at the local level.

Who can blame them? A lot of the meetings are about the cost of fixing roads, purchasing new snowplows or offering garbage and recycling services. There is a lot of discussion about budgets. Not exciting topics.

But these are important things that affect each of us.



And sometimes a larger issue comes up. It is our town supervisors who decide where a homeless shelter might be located or whether a certain business comes to the area.

When I bemoaned the situation in the Town of Kewaskum to people in nearby Campbellsport, they were unalarmed. They have no one running for an open seat on their village board. This is not the first time that has happened. That is how they have filled School Board positions when no one ran for office there as well.

But municipalities cannot operate without

leaders.

The Village of Kekoskee, located just north of Mayville, has been dealing with this problem. No one there was interested in running for the village board.

Kekoskee, which was established in 1856, started looking into merging with the Town of Williamstown. The merge would increase the village's population from about 150 people

to nearly 1,000.

As I write this column, a 683-page book about the history of Kekoskee is sitting across the room on a shelf. It is so sad as I look at it and know that the Village of Kekoskee could become just that: history.

I hope for better for the Town of Kewaskum. I hope that elections will enable us to build a strong, vibrant future for our community.



Town Of Kewaskum Voters To Decide Whether Clerk And Treasurer Will Be Appointed

Voters will decide on Tuesday, April 2, whether the Town of Kewaskum clerk and treasurer should be changed from elected to appointed positions.

The ballot questions ask: "Shall the person holding the office of Town Clerk be appointed by the Town Board?" and "Shall the person holding the office of Town Treasurer be appointed by the Town Board?"

If voters decide yes to those questions, a majority of the board can appoint a clerk and treasurer for a term to

not exceed three years and reappoint the same person for multiple terms. They can be removed from office for cause. The Town Board would set the salaries for the positions.

Currently, voters in the Town of Kewaskum decide who the town clerk and treasurer are.

The Kewaskum Town Board is currently considering making the positions appointed because it is aware that there is limited interest from other residents to run for the positions. Appointed clerks and treasurers do not have to be town residents, giving the town access to a

larger candidate pool.

The Wisconsin Towns Association lists the following as the main differences between elected and appointed positions:

Elected Clerks And Treasurers

1. Do have to be town residents.
2. Are answerable to the electorate and cannot be required by the board to hold specific qualifications or obtain training (unless required by state law-such as election training for clerks).
3. Can be recalled from office like other elected officials, but cannot be removed from office by a board vote.
4. Are elected for two-year terms at the spring election in odd-numbered years.

Appointed Clerks And Treasurers

1. Do not have to be town residents.
2. Have their qualifications, job descriptions, and wages/benefits set

by the town board, as they are essentially town employees hired by the board.

3. Cannot be removed by the board during their term of office, unless there is "cause" for removal (misconduct in office or neglect of duties). The board can simply choose not to re-appoint an official at the end of his or her term without having to establish cause.

4. Can be appointed for a term not to exceed three years at one time. Can be appointed for a shorter term such as six months or one year or whatever the board deems appropriate.

According to the Wisconsin Towns Association website, out of 1,249 towns in Wisconsin, there are currently 240 appointed clerks and 800 elected clerks; 165 appointed treasurers and 875 elected treasurers; and 126 appointed clerk-treasurers and 102 elected clerk-treasurers.

Area Wrestlers Bring Home Pair of Firsts, Two Other Places

Two wrestlers from the Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club and two others who live in Kewaskum fared well in the WWF Kids State Folkstyle State Championships held March 22-23 at the Alliant Energy Center in Madison.

James Racer and Braeden Scoles both won titles by going unbeaten in four straight matches. Racer, who wrestles for Ringers but also works out with the KIWC on Thursday Nights, breezed through the 90-pound weight class for boys born in 2008-09. In his opener, Racer pinned Lancaster's Jackson Sippel

in 1:46, then he posted an 19-3 technical fall over Ethan Fisher of Osceola.

Racer dominated Braylon Stegall of West De Pere in the semifinals, outpointing him 11-2, and in the finals, he shut out Eli Maier of Mt. Horeb, 13-0.

Scoles, who attends Kewaskum Middle School and wrestles for Askren Wrestling Academy, was in the 140-pound class for boys born in 2004-05, posting two tech falls, one major decision and a decision en route to his title. The closest match he had was in the quarterfinals when he edged Tanner Kaufman of Crass Trained Weigh In Club,

1-0.

In the finals, Scoles defeated Owen Kinziger of Coleman 14-4.

James Lawrenz was the KIWC's top finisher. He took fourth place out of 10 athletes at 120 pounds (boys born in 2010-11). Lawrenz started out with a bye, then defeated Tyler Hargraves of NGL in a close match, 3-2.

Lawrenz's first loss came in the semifinals when he was outpointed by Gavin Franklin of Mosinee, 7-4, so he moved to the wrestleback where he pinned Brenden Boe in a quick 1:44, putting him in the match to determine third and fourth places. His opponent was Hargraves,

and this time the NGL athlete was the winner by a score of 5-4.

"It was a tossup until near the end," KIWC coach Justin Rhoads said about the final match, reporting Lawrenz maintained good position to win the first match against Hargraves but made one little miscue that cost him the second match.

Xane Kleinke had a good day, winding up sixth out of 15 wrestlers at 150 pounds (boys born in 2008-09). Kleinke started with a bye, then pinned Derek Ewald of Cameron in 2:39. In the semifinals, he lost to Auberdale's Dawson Baird via pin in 2:50.

Going to the wrestleback, Kleinke lost to Preston Krueger of New London by major decision, 4-10, and in the battle for fifth place, he was pinned by Gavyn Kasten of the Waukesha Wrestling Club in 0:19.

"He enjoyed it (state) ... He came a long way this season," Rhoads said about Kleinke, who will certainly benefit in the future from the experience of competing in the state meet.

Track Teams Continue To Improve In Indoor Tests

The Kewaskum High girls and boys track teams each turned in several good performances at the Ripon College Showcase Meet held on March 23.

The Meidl sisters, Abby and Brenna, provided a first and third place, respectively, to lead the Lady Indians to a seventh place finish among small school teams. They came in with 39.5 points, just 2.5 points out of fifth place. Freedom ran away with the team title, amassing 97.5 points while Baraboo and Little Chute were second and third with 77 and 60.

On the boys' side of the ledger, Sam Schultz, Jon Leister and Tyler Heus and Ben Frase did well, leading the Indians to a 10th place with 20 points. Freedom easily completed the sweep, piling up 121 points, with Little Chute second with 77 and Kiel third with 60 and Waupun fourth with 54.

"I was actually very proud of our team." KHS co-head coach Kris Evans said Sunday. "We

had a lot of good performances by our athletes."

After having a conflict with last week's competition, Meidl won the pole vault in her first appearance of the year. She cleared 10 feet 6 inches (10-6) to come within three inches of her personal best. She won the event by two feet.

Brenna Meidl, only a freshman, cleared 4-10 in the high jump to take third place in her first-ever varsity appearance.

"There's something about those Meidl girls," Evans said, adding, "Brenna's a natural athlete," and can be successful in several events.

Brenna Meidl also finished an impressive fourth in the 400 with a time of one minute, 5.52 seconds (1:05.52), and Evans said she has never run that event before.

Junior Anna Peterson switched from the 200 to the open 400 in this meet, and she responded with a 1:05.85 which was good for sixth, giving the Indians two places in the event.

Then there were the

distance runners, led by senior Grace Marchello, who finished third in the 1,600 with a time of 5:46.60, which is 0.09 faster than she ran a week ago. Marchello also combined with Romela Olla, Alyssa Butz, and freshman Lisa Bolek to take a sixth place in the 4x800 relay, which was clocked in 10:57.19.

"This is the first time they've gone under 11 minutes," Evans said, reporting the newcomer Bolek turned in an excellent split of 2:40.

Olla and Butz also ran the open 3,200, placing third and eighth, respectively, with times of 12:49.82 and 13:49.72.

KHS had no entries in the 60-meter hurdles, the 4x200 and 4x400 relays, the triple jump and the 800.

The Indians boys got a third place from Leister in the shot put (44-0), while Tyler Heus garnered a fourth in the 60-

meter dash (7.34), who finished just .05 out of second place, and Sam Schultz cleared 5-10 in the high jump, which was good for fourth place.

"Leister is a captain this year and working real hard," Evans said, adding Heus is "going to do well all season."

Other top-eight finishes by Indian athletes included: Trevor Degnitz's eighth in the 60 (7.58); eighth by Ben Frase in the 800 (2:14.02); and eighth by Eli Bartelt in the long jump (18-08.25).

Evans predicts Frase will be close to 2:05 during the outdoor season.

The Indians have two more indoor meets at Ripon, then they are scheduled to begin the outdoor campaign on Friday, April 5, hosting an East Central quadrangular with Plymouth, Ripon and Campbell-sport.







INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("ImageCast Evolution-ICE") to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballot

If the voter spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the voter shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

State Health Officials Warn The Flu Season Is Far From Over

—Stronger H3 Flu Virus Making The Rounds Throughout The State

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) expects this to be one of the longest flu seasons in recent memory with the powerful influenza A/H3 virus currently affecting young and old alike.

"The average peak for flu activity is the first week of February, but we expect this season to extend at least through the end of March, if not beyond," said DHS influenza coordinator Thomas Haupt.

The H3 type of the virus is more powerful

than the A/H1 virus that circulated earlier in the flu season. While the first wave was hard on younger people, Haupt says the H3 virus is hitting people 65 years old and older especially hard.

"H3 is covered by this year's flu vaccine, so if you haven't already, know there is still time to get a flu shot," Haupt added.

The flu vaccine is safe and effective and is a better match to this season's virus than last year's vaccine. Plus, by

getting the flu shot, you're protecting yourself and everyone around you from serious illness.

In addition to the vaccine, people are strongly urged to cough or sneeze into a sleeve or tissue (and throw the tissue away after one use), wash their hands and use hand sanitizer, and stay home if they're sick to avoid spreading germs to others.

Hospitalizations for flu-related symptoms are increasing to about 50 a day in Wisconsin,

with one in five hospitalized patients being admitted to the intensive care unit due to the severity of their symptoms. So far this season, there have been 36 influenza deaths in the state.
