Training Wild Mustangs

Amber Hofmaier had never trained a horse before.

But in January, the 15-year-old horse enthusiast got a wild mustang that had never been handled by humans.

She has been training the horse ever since.

This weekend, Amber will bring her mustang, named Atlas, to com-

pete at the Midwest Horse Fair in Madison.

Amber, who is a freshman at Kewaskum High School, will attend the

competition with Amanda Lane-Sommer, a horse trainer who has been working with Amber. Like Amber, Amanda also has been training a wild mustang since January.

Amanda has been Amber's teacher at Western Trails Equestrian Center in West Bend, and the two will compete against each other this weekend in a Mustang Challenge.

There is not a rulebook to follow on how to train mustangs.

"It's not easy. A lot of it is trial and error. You have to kind of figure it out on your own. You have to try this and if it doesn't work, you try that," said Amanda, who has been training mustangs since 2009.

"These horses are untouched. They are wild when you get them. The transformation you can make is so rewarding," said Amanda, who has trained eight wild mustangs.

Amber, who started taking riding lessons when she was 11, has watched and learned as

Amanda has trained horses.

Each horse has been different.

"Some of them have been pretty easy to train, some have been really hard. I definitely found that usually the ones that are harder to train at the beginning end up to be easier as you get going, and the ones that are super easy at the beginning sometimes hit a couple walls later on," Amanda said.

Typically, it depends on how long a mustang has been in the wild and how old it was when it were captured.

"The longer they are in the wild, the more instincts they build," Amanda explained.

Different training techniques work differently on different horses.

"Obviously you have to be careful. Even around well trained horses, you still have to be aware and be smart," Amanda said.

You don't have to be a horse whisperer in order to train a wild mustang, according to Amanda.

"We could not have done it without our stage crew," Alivia explained.


The crew worked hard on creating costumes and sets.



Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

Armed Bank Robbery Town of Addison

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of an armed bank robbery that occurred at the National Exchange Bank at 6278 Blueberry Road in the Town of Addison on April 8 at approximately 11:07 a.m. Washington County Sheriff's Office personnel responded immediately and were assisted by troopers from the Wisconsin State Patrol.

The teller reported that a single white male entered the bank at approximately 11:07 a.m. The suspect approached the counter

and displayed a handgun and demanded money from the bank teller. He escaped with an undisclosed amount of cash.

There were no injuries as a result of this robbery. The Washington County Sheriff's Office would like to commend the staff of the National Exchange Bank for remaining calm during this frightening and dangerous situation.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is handling this investigation and is seeking the public's assistance. The suspect is described as a male white in his early

to mid 20s. He was described as short, possibly 5 feet 5 inches/5 feet 8 inches and slender. He was wearing dark clothing with a dark-colored knit cap. The male was wearing glasses and was holding a cell phone during the robbery.

Multi Vehicle Crash involving School Bus

On April 8 at 8:34 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was noti-

fied of a multi-vehicle crash, involving a school bus, on Hillside Road at Elmwood Road in the Village of Richfield. Sheriff's Deputies and rescue personnel from the Richfield Fire Department were subsequently dispatched to the scene. The Richfield Fire Department requested additional ambulances from the Germantown, Hartford, Jackson and Lisbon fire departments, and Lifestar Ambulance Service.

An on-scene investigation revealed the following: A passenger car driven by a 23-year-old Fond du Lac woman

was southbound on Hillside Road, when it failed to stop for a stop sign at Elmwood Road and struck an eastbound SUV driven by a 50-year-old Richfield man. The impact forced the SUV into the path of a northbound school bus that was on Hillside Road approaching the four-way controlled intersection. The school bus, owned by Riteway Bus Service Inc., was operated by a 56-year-old town of Farmington woman. The bus sustained only minor front end damage.

The school bus contained 44 children who

were en route to Amy Belle Elementary School in Colgate. All of the children were evaluated by EMS personnel at the scene, and four were transported via ambulance to Community Memorial Hospital in Menomonee Falls, for minor non-life threatening injuries. Germantown School District administrative staff also responded to the scene and assisted with parental notification.

At this time the crash remains under investigation, but neither drugs nor alcohol appear to be contributing factors.



The Kewaskum Police Department is warning residents of the community to be aware of two burglaries that occurred this month involving the theft of Hummel collectible figurines. According to police reports, the first incident occurred Saturday, April 2, sometime between 6:45 and 10:45 p.m. at the residence of Dorothy Kral, Kewaskum. Officer Gregory P. Zager reported that a perpetrator had forced entry into the home through a back door when no one was home, ransacked the house and removed nine valuable Hummel figurines worth approximately \$450, plus a small antique vase. Kral told the police she remembers a couple of months ago a male, approximately 25 to 30 years old, came to her residence and inquired about having any antiques. Police are continuing to investigate the case and note there were other burglaries around the Kewaskum area during the period of time right before Christmas, 1993. The second burglary took place exactly one week later, on April 10th, between 6:45 p.m. and 12:45 a.m. on Roseland Drive, Kewaskum, the home of Timothy McDonald. McDonald and his wife returned home around 12:45 and discovered the break-in when McDonald tried to open the inside door to his home and the glass was broken. Officer John Thorn reported to the scene and discovered that eleven Hummels of various sizes and colors were missing, along with a crystal vase. Police Chief Richard L. Knoebel also responded to the call, and the residence was dusted for

fingerprints. Nothing else was reported missing.

Following a trend towards being sensitive to ethnic and minority-based team mascots, Kewaskum may be looking for a new school nickname in the coming months. The familiar "Indian" logo may be forced out, after the district was one of 69 in the state to receive a letter from John Benson, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. In the letter, Benson urged school administrators to change nicknames that may offend "religious, ethnic or other protected groups." Cited most often were mascots related to Native Americans, such as "Indians," "Warriors," "Blackhawks," and "Raiders." Kewaskum District Administrator David Heather acknowledged receiving a copy of the letter, which he made copies of and sent to school board mem-

bers. He noted that while he or the district has not received any complaints or protest regarding the current nickname, the issue is still a sticky one.

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

Softball Team Is Envy Of Other Coaches

Kewaskum High's Jeff Gosse is the envy of all the other East Central Conference's fast-pitch coaches, and with good reason.

Gosse returns seven of his starters from the 2018 EC championship team. He has the best pitcher in the conference, perhaps the best pitcher in the state, in senior Kennedy Lehn, and an excellent veteran catcher in Leah Theusch.

Lehn, who finished her junior year at 21-1 and posted the highest strikeout total (300) in the state, is looking good, according to Gosse. He said she hasn't added any new pitches for this year, but is just "refining them ... tweaking them, honing her skills."

"Theusch worked on some stuff this off-season," Gosse said about his regular catcher.

Other veteran returnees include senior second baseman Tara Thuesch, who batted an even .400; all-state senior outfielder Maddie Geidel; and senior Ashley Trapp, who has played the past two seasons at shortstop but looks to be the starter at

first base this spring. Geidel batted .551 a year ago, while Trapp hit a solid .351.

Kaitlyn Miller is another senior Gosse can count on, either in the infield or as a relief pitcher. And the KHS returns junior Abigail Baumann to the outfield, along with junior Kaitlyn Leitheiser, who is a strong hitter.

Junior Morgan Goeden saw action as a pinch runner and backup player last season and is expected to play more. Gosse is happy to have junior Sydney Kertscher back after she missed the entire last season because of a knee injury. "I see no difference in her. She looks like she did prior to the injury," Gosse said.

Another junior who can play infield or outfield is Megan Winkler.

"All seven all-conference players are back," Gosse said, explaining he was doing some experimenting with players to "find out what's going to work best for the team."

Gosse has to find replacements for Skyler Donath (third base) and Megan Marx (first base), and the Indians should be top contenders in the EC league and a good

bet to earn a trip to the Division 2 state tournament, which was the only goal they did not reach a year ago. Eventual state champ Whitnall stopped Kewaskum in the sectional final with a 2-0 shutout.

Could this be the Indians' best-ever season? "I hope so. That's the game plan," Gosse said. "We've had some very, very good seasons in the past. We've been blessed."

KHS did well a year

ago, going a perfect 14-0 in East Central action and winning several challenging tournament.

Whitnall will not be in the Indians' path this spring, at least not in the sectional. The Falcons have been moved to a different sectional, so if all goes well for both teams, they could meet in the WIAA D-2 state title game on Saturday, June 8.

First things first, of course, and that's beating Waupun and Camp-

bellsport, two teams Gosse feels will be the Indians' main challengers in the EC.

About his team's chemistry, Gosse said, "They're friends. They're getting along real well ... They're laughing" in practice but when the games start, they're all business.

Gosse is more than happy to have the new turf softball field right behind the high school. "Without the new field, we wouldn't be practic-

ing outside (right now)," Gosse said, adding it certainly is nice not having to lug all the equipment to the Kiwanis Park.

There will be a special Grand Opening held at the softball and baseball fields on Saturday, May 4, starting at 10 a.m. The Indians will play two games that day, vs. Stevens Point Pacelli and Waterford while the boys will play Ozaukee and Sheboygan Falls.

Baseball Preview

The Kewaskum High baseball team will be undergoing several transitions this season.

Because the WIAA (Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association) dropped summer baseball, the Indians will be switching from summer to spring ball, and they will be moving from the North Shore to their regular conference in the East Central league.

The team also has a new head coach — Mike Heisdorf, who played baseball, golf and basketball while he was at KHS. He is taking over for Doug Gonring, who retired last July. What will help make a smooth takeover is the fact Heisdorf assisted Gonring for

several years. He knows the players well.

"It's going well," Heisdorf said recently about his 2019 squad.

While there had been a concern having a fourth spring sport for boys might mean a smaller squad, Heisdorf was greeted by 18 upperclassmen for the try-outs.

"I kept all of them. I kept nine seniors and nine juniors," he said, a number which will include just three starters from the 2018 team than won the North Shore title but bowed out of the tournament is its opening regional game, losing to Homestead by a score of 3-2.

"We lost a lot of real good athletes," Heisdorf said, referring to catcher

Jared Chesak, pitchers Andrew Neu and Cole Surprenant, outfielder Tony Steger and infielder John May.

"We only have three returning starters, and four others were on the roster," Heisdorf went on, quick to note after a week of practice, "It's coming together."

The returning starters are center fielder Ryan Prochnow, second baseman Brad Buechel and all-conference utility player Lucas Christenson, who pitched some and saw a lot of action at third base. Christenson hit .348 as a junior but was a bit shaky defensively.

"Prochnow's back. He's be our starting center fielder," Heisdorf said, reporting

Prochnow covers a lot of ground in the outfield and batted .268 for the Indians a year ago.

Buechel is moving to shortstop and will doing double duty this spring, trying to play baseball and golf. He struggled at the plate last summer, hitting just .175 in North Shore action.

"He'll (Christenson) be my main guy," Heisdorf said about the pitching staff, reporting "Carson Dogs and Cole Poole will also be starting pitchers. "They didn't throw much (last year), but they're both left handers ... After that, it will be by committee."

One player who may get a look on the mound and as an infielder is sophomore Cale Fransen.

"He'll be up and down, mostly as a JV but sometimes up with us," Heisdorf said.

The catcher position is locked up by senior Kyle Bath, who was on the varsity for three years but only started a few games because he was playing behind Chesak.

Heisdorf said Colten Miller will take one outfield position with Poole and Eric Bauer, who came out this year after a two-year absence, playing the other.

"He's impressing me," Heisdorf said of Bauer.

"Another guy to keep an eye on is Travis Block," Heisdorf said, reporting Block broke a finger early last season and was unable to play. "He going to be a utility player for us."

The infield will have Dogs at first, and Heisdorf said second base is still up for grabs.

One challenge Heisdorf faces is quickly learning about the teams and players in the East Central.

"I know the North Shore inside and out," but not much about the EC, which obviously may not have the depth the larger North Shore schools have, especially pitching depth.

One thing the EC has done this year is schedule the two meetings against a team back to back on Tuesdays and Thursdays. That way, if the weather is bad on Tuesday, the teams will be able to play double-headers on Thursday.

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

Kewaskum Golf Team Should Be Near Top Of Conference

Mother Nature hasn't been very cooperative for high school golfers this spring, but when the season does get going, the Kewaskum High team should right at the top of the field in the East Central Conference just like it was a year ago.

"It's going to be tough to replicate what we did last year," KHS third-year head coach Casey Scheel said recently, referring to the fact the Indians were a perfect 8-0 in the EC mini-tour events, won the Division 2 Regional played at the Washington County Golf Course and the Sectional at Kettle Hills, earning a berth in the D-2 State Tournament.

Kewaskum did stumble a bit in the State test at University Ridge, finishing fifth out of the eight teams with a 661 total, 56 strokes behind

the champion Madison Edgewood team and 17 behind runner-up Edgerton.

"We do have six of our top seven golfers returning," Scheel went on, noting seniors Jacob Schlosser, Talon Ralph and Brad Buechel are starting their third seasons on the varsity team. "The experience is there."

Schlosser, who averaged 38.6 strokes per round in 2018, finished 11th at State behind 18-hole rounds of 78 and 80 for a 158. Schlosser also was edged out for the EC medal by Kettle Moraine Lutheran's Solomon Zarling, so he has an individual goal in addition to trying to help the Indians repeat as conference champs.

Buechel played at No. 4, averaging 40.0 strokes, and this spring is going to be playing baseball and golfing. Ralph was steady most

of the year, averaging 39.5 strokes per round.

Jordan Carlton was the lone senior on the 2018 team. He played at No. 2. "Those are big shoes to fill," Scheel said, looking at Travis Griesemer, who played at No. 5 and averaged 42.5, to possibly move up, with juniors Toree Ralph and Andrew Carlton pushing for the final spot.

Carlton had indicated to the track coach he was going to concentrate on running this spring, but Scheel said, "He originally told me he was going to do both ... Now he's just going to be a golfer, from what I've heard from him."

Scheel figures the younger Ralph and Carlton could switch around, depending in which one is playing better or they could be in the lineup together.

"Our first goal is the conference," Scheel

said, reporting other schools in the league might be down this season, like KML now that Zarling is gone and Plymouth, which graduated two starters.

Graduation hit Waupun, which finished second in the Sectional, even harder as its top five are gone, while a couple of the other schools, including Ripon, barely had

enough players for varsity and JV a year ago.

Kewaskum's roster is at 22 with 12 from the freshmen and sophomore classes. Scheel said freshman Connor Griesemer "down the road could be a useful asset," while juniors Sam Lemler and Aidan Rettler and sophomores Kyle Hoeft and Trevor Geldnich have potential. "We still haven't got-

ten in nine holes," Scheel said, looking ahead to the season-opening mini-tour meet at the Lake Breeze Golf Club, which was held in Winneconne on April 9.

"We have some big tournaments this year," Scheel said, including a two-day event at Whistling Straights and Blackwolf Run on Wednesday and Thursday, April 17-18.

Just days before his team's first meet, Kewaskum High boys tennis coach Andrew Dahlberg is not settled on who will start at several varsity positions.

The Indians lost two-time state qualifiers Brent Goeden and Jared Chesak at No. 1 doubles, and Dahlberg knows it will be nearly impossible to replace this duo that was 17-4 a year ago, went 3-0 in their careers vs. Kohler's No. 1 teams, qualified for the D-2 sectional three times, won the East Troy sectional in 2018 and won one

match at the Nielsen Center in Madison in the state tournament before bowing to a team from Madison Edgewood, which eventually finished fifth.

"The experience they brought ... just being able to watch them helped (the others) a lot," Dahlberg said, and he was always counting on them to win.

Also lost via graduation is Devon Schneider, who played No. 1 singles for two straight seasons, and finished the 2018 season with a 5-10 record. The Indians will also miss the No. 3 team of Patrick Krier and Tyler

Deggnitz (10-6), who came out their senior year and finished pretty close to .500, helping the team to win several matches.

Dahlberg is close to settling on his singles lineup, with seniors Kyle Loehr and Matthew Krautkramer and junior Bryce Halverson each moving up one spot to take the Nos. 1, 2 and 3 spots.

Loehr finished last season at 10-9 at No. 2 singles. He advanced to the sectionals, where he went 0-2. Krautkramer also went winless in sectional action at No. 3, finishing the year at 11-5. Dahlberg said Loehr is

a solid player, but the conference traditionally had some pretty talented players at No. 1, so he will have to work hard for wins. The good news is at least three of the No. 1 singles players have graduated, included Kohler's Casey Johnson.

"We've got to figure out our order," Dahlberg said, indicating Ben Read may be his man at No. 4 singles or perhaps at a doubles spot. "He (Read) played one varsity match last year at Kohler," the coach said, adding, "Bryce (Halverson) has gotten a lot better.

Isaiah Cochran and

Bret Fahrenkrug (12-7) will move up from No. 2 doubles to No. 1. Cochran is a very athletic junior, and the sophomore Fahrenkrug will benefit from playing varsity tennis for a year. "They're coming along," the coach said, indicating he and assistant coach Peter Garcia are working on getting them to go to the net.

"After that I have no idea who is playing where," Dahlberg said, he's looking at different combinations, including Connor Toth and Aaron Singer, who were JV No. 1 doubles a year ago.

Concerning the Eastern Wisconsin Confer-

ence — in tennis teams from the Eastern Wisconsin, the East Central and Big East make up one conference — defending champion Kohler and Roncalli are Dahlberg's top picks to content.

Already one team, Waupun, has dropped the sport for the year since they only had three candidates. The Waupun quad may still be played, however, even if Port Washington, Ripon and Kewaskum, are the only teams competing.

Kewaskum was slated to open conference play on April 11, hosting Roncalli.

Among the top goals of the Kewaskum girls track team are improving on last year's fifth-place finish in the East Central Conference and having Abby Meidl finish first or second in the Division 2 pole vault competition.

Co-head coaches Kris Evans and Jason Last have veteran performers in the distance events, sprints, hurdles and the pole vault. Improvement will be needed in the other field events for the Indians to have a shot at a top-four finish.

Meidl cleared a per-

sonal-best 10 feet, 9 inches (10-9) in the Ripon Indoor Invitational and the EC Championships, which she won. In the state competition, Meidl finished in a tie for fourth place with a vault of 10-6.

Jillian Braatz is also back in the pole vault, so that should be one of KHS' stronger events, along with the distance events where the team returns seniors Grace Marchello and Romela Olla, junior Faith Mertzig, sophomore Alyssa Butz and freshman Lisa Bolek.

"They're a group to watch," Evans said of

that quartet, who will run together in the 4x800-meter relay, which in past years has not been a good event for the Indians because of a lack of depth.

This year is different, according to Evans, who said, "We're happy to have a group of distance girls who have a lot of talent."

Marchello leads the pack, and Evans has high hopes she will have an excellent year because she's healthier than she has been in recent years.

In addition to running the relay, Marchello can compete in the 1,600 or

800, while cross country teammates Olla, Butz and Mertzig are also able to compete in more than one distance race.

When it comes to the 100 and 300 hurdle races, Last and Evans will be able to count on junior Maddy Thull, who showed a lot of improvement last spring and could be even better this year. Thull was the runner-up in the EC 100 hurdles (16.98 seconds) and third in the 300s (52.70).

A new hurdler this spring will be Bolek, and Evans said watching her compete in the Middle School showed him

"She had the flexibility and speed for it (hurdling)."

Leading the sprint corps will be junior Anna Peterson, who is expected to be the Indians' top 200 runner and help with any of the relays. Peterson could also be counted on to pick up points in the open 400. Other sprinters are Hailey Hasenberg and Braatz.

Evans said Emily Halterman and Ashley Krause will carry the load in the weights; Kelli Oelke should do well in the discus; and Katie Vorwerk is the best long jumper on the squad.

Halterman threw the discus over 100 feet on four occasions last year, and it is hoped she can add another 10-15 feet to that mark.

The coaches have been looking for a new high jumper to replace Liz Lightner, who qualified for state meet last season. It looks like freshman Brenna Meidl can fill the bill as she has already cleared 4-10 in two meets.

The Winneconne girls captured the EC title a year ago, piling up 182 points, 49 points ahead of Berlin. KHS and Waupun tied for fifth with 68 points.

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Some Events Will Need New Personnel, Others Return For Another Season

The standouts from the 2,018 track and field season, including Cade Peterson, Tony Steger, and Cole Surprenant, are gone and their efforts — the trio combined with Tyler Heus to win the Division 2 4x100-meter relay — may not be duplicated. Still, co-head coach Kris Evans is optimistic his newest athletes have the talent and determination to make their own marks this spring.

Evans was greeted by runners on the first day of practice, including veterans like Heus, Cameron Dodge, Trevor Degnitz, Jon Leister, Gannon Kreuser, Kyle Toth, Sam Schultz and Sam Melzer.

“That was a special moment ... To win a state championship,” Evans said, referring to the win by Peterson, who also placed in the state 200, Steger, Surprenant and Heus with a time of 43 and .01 sec-

onds (43.01).

Heus’ improvement last year is what earned him a spot on the quartet, and now Evans looks for him to be a standout. “Tyler’s a captain for this year. He’s a senior ... He’s come a long way,” Evans said.

Senior letter winner Cameron Dodge will be a good bet to be another of this year’s relay group, after running with the 4x100 for most of the ‘18 season. He will also run sprints, along with the junior Degnitz.

No question about who will do well in the high jump. Junior Sam Schultz did well last year and cleared 5 feet, 10 inches (5-10) in his first indoor meet this season at UW-Parkside.

The pole vault crew and the distance runners also have talent. Melzer and Kyle Toth both have the capability of clearing 12 feet, according to Evans, who said, “Sam, Trevor and Abby Meidl all went to camps during the win-

ter,” which will help them improve on their heights from a year ago.

Evans is pleased with the crew he has for distances, starting with sophomore Gannon Kreuser. “He’s a worker. He’s a versatile guy,” who can run the 800, 1,600 and 3,200-meter races. Other distance candidates include Ben Frase and Clayton Kappler.

One nice surprise this spring is Andrew Carlton’s decision to come out for track. Evans said he decided to switch from golf to track, “to concentrate on his talent” in cross country.

Promising individuals in other events include: weights — Jon Leister and Zachary Van Beek; high jump — Zack McNab; Long jump — Eli Bartelt; middle distances — Isaac Schmidt; and sprints — Bartelt, and Jermaine J.J. Thull, currently not available to compete.

Evans is the co-head coach along with Jason

Last, who will handle the jumpers this year. Jim Brock is back to work with hurdlers while T.J. Schlice is the pole vault coach; Eugene Peterson directs the sprinters, and newcomer Katie Jungers will be in charge of the throwers.

As far as who will be good in the East Central

Conference this spring, Evans said, “The ‘players’ are always Plymouth, Berlin and Winneconne, which always has good distance runners.” At this point he is not certain where the Indians might finish. “I’m hesitant to say where our ceiling is this year in conference.”

Last year, the Indians scored 65 points in the conference test, which was good for fifth place. Claiming the EC title with 162 points was Berlin.

The EC Conference Meet will be hosted by Berlin on Tuesday, May 14.

Kewaskum opened its conference play at Waupun on Tuesday, April 9.





Just under one week remains to file income tax returns, and the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) recommends that taxpayers not wait until the last minute to file. Returns must be received or postmarked by midnight on Monday, April 15.

"We process around three million returns annually," notes Department of Revenue Secretary Peter Barca. "Around a half million returns came in the last two weeks. Our season total is just under two

million, so activity is really picking up. The March lull is definitely over."

•Download the WI Revenue mobile app (available in the Apple and Android app stores) and watch tax assistance videos, check the status of your return or refund, find VITA sites, take action if you received an ID Verification letter, and more.

•Please note: DOR will not contact you by

telephone or email regarding your income tax return. If the Department needs more information to verify items on your return, it will contact you by letter.

•File an extension request with the IRS if you won't make the April 15 deadline. You must request an extension from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) by April 15 to avoid late filing penalties. Go to the IRS website at www.irs.gov and search "extension" for more information. Taxpayers who file an ex-

ension request with the IRS automatically receive an extension from the state. Keep a copy of the IRS federal extension application (Form 4868) for your records. Please keep in mind that even if you have an extension of time to file

your return, you will owe interest on any tax not paid by April 15. You can avoid interest charges during the extension period by paying any estimated amount owed by April 15, using a 2018 Wisconsin Estimated Tax Voucher.



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Continued From Front Training Wild Mustangs

By nature, horses are prey animals, so their instinct is to be ready to flee, Amanda explained. Part of training is learning a horse's body language so that a trainer can move in a way that will not intimidate the horse. Even raising your voice a little bit can make a horse cower back.

Training horses requires a soft voice and gentle touch. Positive reinforcement, such as petting the horses and talking to them, go a long way in getting horses to do what you want them to do.

"A lot of it is helping the mustangs realize what is expected of them and helping them to realize you are not going to hurt them. It is about getting the mustangs to trust you," Amanda said.

Although Amber has never trained a horse before, she has owned another horse, an Arabian named Mr. Bingley, since she was 11. That

experience helped her to figure out how to communicate with Atlas.

"I haven't really had to help Amber at all. She is doing an awesome job on her own," Amanda said.

Purchasing Mustangs

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) monitors wild horses and burros that roam on public lands in the western United States. Each year, the BLM gathers excess wild horses and burros from areas where vegetation and water have become scarce for the animals to survive and offers the animals for adoption.

An adoption fee for a mustang is usually about \$125. Youth are able to adopt yearlings for just \$25.

Both Amber and Amanda filled out paperwork to adopt wild mustangs. On January 12, they went to southern Illinois and picked up their horses.

They were among

more than 50 horse trainers who picked up mustangs that weekend who signed up to compete in the Midwest Horse Fair.

While most people think of mustangs as small horses, that is not always the case. Mustangs come in all different sizes, colors and varieties.

"There are short ones, tall ones, thicker, wider ones, and there are little tiny, thinner ones," Amber said.

"The horses have such crazy personalities. If you let them be themselves. They are quite different, each of them," Amanda added.

Special Mustangs

Amber's mustang, Atlas, was born in the wild in Eagle, Nevada. He was 10 months old when Amber got him in January.

Atlas is larger than the average mustang. He has grown quickly and is already taller than Amanda's older mustang.

"Mine was gathered from Bible Springs, Utah. I wanted to pick a Bible name for him, and so I chose Zacchaeus," Amanda said.

In the Bible, there is a short man named Zacchaeus, so the name is fitting.

Zacchaeus was a 4-year-old stallion when he was captured. By the time Amanda adopted him, Zacchaeus was 5 years old. The older age made him a little more challenging to train.

"He has a little more wild instincts, I guess you could say. He is very alert, he is watching everything," Amanda said.

Even though he is small, Zacchaeus can jump to great heights. Amanda is taking advantage of that strength and has taught the horse to jump over hurdles.

"My guy is quite the jumper, even though he is little, that guy has springs on him," Amanda noted.

Amber's mustang, on

the other hand, was a still a baby when she got him.

"He was very nervous the first few days. He really didn't want anything to do with me. He would start snorting, like I don't want you coming near me," Amber recalled.

However, that all changed as Atlas got to know Amber. Now, as soon as he senses Amber coming near, Atlas hurries toward her.

"Now he thinks I am the best thing in the world," Amber admitted.

Within six weeks of getting a mustang, Amber was teaching her horse to sit on command and to raise his front legs while performing the showy Spanish walk.

His favorite thing, though, is playing on the teeter bridge as Amber jumps on one side to make him go up and down.

"He thinks it is awesome and just wants to stay on there," Amber said.

Midwest Horse Fair

Both Amber and Amanda will bring their horses to the Midwest Horse Fair, which will be held April 14, 15 and 16 at the Alliance Energy Center in Madison.

There will be hundreds of horses there over the weekend. There will be different

breeds of horses, of all different ages and disciplines. Most of the horses are there as part of the expo, which will be complete with clinicians and presentations. A rodeo will be held Friday night.

Amber and Amanda will take part in the fair's Mustang Challenge. To participate, trainers must adopt or buy a wild mustang and then compete. A total of \$20,000 in prize money will be offered to the top 10 horses.

For the challenge, participants have to do things such as walk in a certain pattern. The mustangs will need to trot, stop and back up. They will be required to do things like step sideways and weave between cones. They will have to load in and out of a horse trailer, walk through a gate and possibly over a bridge.

The top 10 horses in

the preliminary classes will move on to the final competition, in which they will be required to do a freestyle performance. For the freestyle, they will demonstrate various tricks. The stunts are open to whatever competitors wish to do, and they can use props.

Judges will look for horses to be relaxed and obedient. For the freestyle competition, judges will look for some sort of "wow" factor.

Regardless of how they do at the competition, both Amber and Amanda are glad they have their mustangs.

The competitors will not ride the horses in the contest, but Amber plans to one day ride Atlas. She looks forward to continue working with him after the competition, and hopes to one day work as a horse trainer like Amanda.

Behind a 1-2 finish in the 60-meter hurdles and eight, top-three finishes, the Kewaskum High boys track team surpassed the 100-point mark in the East Central Conference Indoor Meet held at Ripon College on April 5.

Berlin, with its powerhouse program, won the team title with 121 points, and the Indians wound up an impressive second at 101.

The Lady Indians also made a statement in the meet, taking third place with 81 points behind Berlin (116) and Plymouth (100).

"I thought we had some really great performances," KHS co-head coach Kris Evans said about the Indian athletes.

The best event for the boys was the hurdles with Sam Schultz, Dylan Maechtle and Damareyon Taylor going 1-2-5 with respective times of 9 and .66 seconds (9.66), 9.95 and 11.77.

"How about it! They're working hard and improving every day."

Evans said, indicating he's hoping Maechtle will be able to do well in the 300s for the outdoor season.

KHS's other win came in the 400 where senior Tyler Heus was clocked in 53.07, which a good time for indoors and this early in the season. Heus also contributed a third in the 60-meter dash where he was clocked in 7.28, with Trevor Degnitz taking fifth in the race at 7.48.

"Tyler is one of our all-stars," Evans said, reporting he could put Heus in any of the sprint races right up to the 800.

The Indians also did well in the distance runs, with Ben Frase clocked in a very fast 2:06.91 for second place in the 800. "I love Benny. That was a p.r. (personal record) for him," Evans said. "He loves to run, and he's driven."

Other top-five finishes included: Gannon Kreuzer, fifth in the 1,600 (5:10.15); third by the 4x200 relay (Jed Ermer, Degnitz, Eli Bartelt, Donny Derosia), 1:40.04; second in the 4x400 (Frase, Bartelt,

Sam Melzer, Heus), 3:41.47; Jon Leister, fourth in the shot put (42-10.50) Schultz, third in the high jump (5-08); Sam Melzer, second in the pole vault (12-0); and Bartelt (19-08.00) and Maechtle (19-03.50), third and fourth in the long jump.

The Meidl sisters, Abby and Brenna, had great outings for the KHS girls. Both had victories. Abby cleared a personal high 11-3 in the pole vault to win that event by over three feet, while Brenna won the high jump with a jump of 4-10. "That time was actually fast enough to set the (school's) outdoor record as well," the coach said, reporting that Bolek, running the second leg, turned in a

2:40, and "That's good for a freshman."

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that equipment up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s.73.03 (2a), Wis. Stats., that the

assessor requests. The Town of Kewaskum has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of the court. *The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35(1), Wis. Stats.

7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.

8. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under s.70.47 (3) (a), Wis. Stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.

ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RECREATE SECTION 7 OF CHAPTER 14 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE BUILDINGS & BUILDING REGULATIONS

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Chapter 14 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to Buildings & Building Regulations, should be repealed and adopted as follows:

Sec. 14-7 Codes Adopted by Reference. Wisconsin Administrative Code Electrical SPS 316, Building and Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditioning requirements. Wisconsin Commercial Building Code Chs. SPS 360-366.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If

any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and posting or publication as provided by law.

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
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KofC Easter Dance To Be Held On Sunday
