# Site Cleared For Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial

Crews were cutting trees down in front of the Kewaskum Annex building on Fond du Lac Avenue last Wednesday, April 10. They were making room for the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial that is slated to be built in the space.

"We are looking forward to beginning construction in May," Gordon Haberman said.

Haberman's daughter, Andrea Haberman, was among those killed in the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. The memorial will also be an educational center for visitors to remember the events of that fateful day. The site will be a place to reflect on the strength, resilience and compassion of American people.

Plans are to begin construction on Phase One of the project in May. Phase One includes raising a steel beam that currently sits on the ground in front of the Annex building. The steel beam was recovered from the North Tower of the World Trade Center and will become the centerpiece for the 9/11 Memorial. # KHS Students Win Art Awards

Three Kewaskum High School students received awards at the recent Festival of Arts held at UW-Washington County campus on Saturday, April 6.

Austin Fischer, a senior at Kewaskum High School, received first place in photography and the High School Best of Show award.

Taylor Fischer, a junior at Kewaskum High School, placed third in 3D/Ceramic and Jewelry.

## Lomira Man Injured In Motorcycle Crash Saturday, April 13

On Saturday, April 13, at 11:20 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a two-vehicle, motorcycle and car, crash located on Highway 28 approximately one-half mile west of Lake Bernice Road in the Town of Wayne. Deputies responded, along with personnel from Kohlsville

and Kewaskum fire departments, Village of Kewaskum Police, West Bend Intercept and Flight for Life.

Upon arrival, the injured motorcyclist, a 52-year-old man from Lomira, was located near the scene. Flight for Life was requested to the scene. After being treated by on-scene

emergency medical personnel, the man was subsequently flown to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee with unknown injuries. The driver of the car was not injured.

Highway 28 was closed in both directions for approximately two hours, to facilitate Flight For Life, towing and roadway cleanup.

The crash remains under investigation, although preliminary investigation revealed that the motorcyclist had swerved into oncoming traffic. Alcohol is believed to be a contributing factor to the cause of the accident.





# Kewaskum Board Of Education Bids Farewell To 12-Year Trustee Mary Miller

The April 8 meeting of the Kewaskum School District Board of Education was bittersweet as it bid farewell to 12-year Trustee Mary Miller. The meeting was attended by a standing room only crowd.

"I know she doesn't bring her personal politics to the meeting; she does bring her personal set of ethics," said Robyn Bindrich, district literacy coach. "She has been our district's most genuine cheerleader."

Trustee Sue Miller echoed the sentiment saying that Mary Miller has been a role model on the board. "I hope she reruns in the future," said Sue Miller.

President Troy Hanson presented the outgoing trustee with a framed certificate.

"Thank you from the bottom of our heart. We want you to know how you are appreciated," said Hanson, adding that "Miss Mary" has put in hundreds of hours, especially relating to school policy development.

Mary Miller said she has enjoyed her 12 years on the board, adding that she has had the opportunity to serve with terrific board members.


"I want you guys to remember it's all about the kids," she said in parting, which elicited lengthy applause by those in attendance.

In the April 2 election, Doug Gonring garnered the most votes (2,030), followed by incumbent Board of Education member Timothy Ramthun (1,728), in a four-person contest for two open seats. Miller received 1,529 votes, followed by Craig Staffin with 1,082.

Trustee Jim Leister provided public comment that Hanson was quoted in a newspaper article scolding the voting public of Kewaskum regarding election results.

"Not one time did he say he was not speaking for the board," commented Leister, in reference to the School Board censuring Ramthun in January for not properly stating that he was not speaking on behalf of the School Board when he spoke at a Village Board meeting.

During his public comment at last week's School Board meeting, Leister also contended that Hanson had attacked Ramthun in the published newspaper story and that Hanson committed two policy vi-

olations.

"Grandstanding is not the best way to solve the problem," countered District Superintendent James Smasal, saying that he has said numerous times a trustee providing public comment is not the way the board wants to operate.

Leister responded by saying that Smasal was grandstanding at that moment.

"If you want to be rude and interrupt instead of listening, you can do that," said Smasal, closing the exchange, adding the problem could have been solved outside of the meeting.

The matter was returned to the board table following the public comment portion when Hanson began to comment about Leister's previous comments.

Leister interrupted Hanson by referring to Roberts Rules' point of order query, about whether or not correct procedure was being followed.

Hanson said that if Leister continued to use public comment time to air his opinions, that he would throw him out of the meeting.

"You can't throw me out," challenged Leister. "You can not use this time to express opinion which oftentimes lacks fact," directed Hanson. "Next time you will be stopped."

#### Action Items

- Approved lunch price increases, which will go into effect on August 1.

- Breakfast prices will increase by 5 cents – from \$1.40 to \$1.45 at

the elementary school and from \$1.60 to \$1.65 at the middle and high schools. Lunch prices will increase 10 cents – from \$2.50 to \$2.60 at the elementary schools and from \$2.75 to \$2.85 at the middle and high schools.

In a related matter, approval was provided to a Wisconsin School Nutrition Purchasing Cooperative Agreement which requires the district to pay \$300 in annual dues.

- Account payables totalling \$499,897 were approved 5-2; with Ramthun voting no and Leister abstaining from the vote.

Smasal said that it is the responsibility of board members, if not comfortable with approving invoice payments, to ask questions ahead of the board meeting. He said most of the bills have been paid and board action is somewhat perfunctory. Smasal additionally commented that perhaps the board does not want to exercise approval of bills.

"Are you going to badger board members?" questioned Leister.

"You keep your mouth shut," Hanson interrupted while Smasal was answering Leister.

"If you pay attention to real things that matter here, we wouldn't be in this spot," Hanson said.

Smasal said he apologized for bringing the matter up, adding if everyone could feel good about approving the payments, it would work better.

"If there's a problem, it

would be wonderful to figure it out and move forward," said Smasal.

Mary Miller pointed out the bill report contains a statement that if anyone has a question, to contact the superintendent before the meeting.

Trustee Mark Sette commented that the district has not been operating outside of its budget, so why are people concerned about tiny, little things.

- Approval was granted to Tiffany Wilson, technology integration specialist, for technology purchases costing more than \$15,000.

Wilson said the reason behind the "giant technology packet" was to line up resources for the 2019-2020 school year.

Items included Skyward, an informational technology, at a cost of \$48,788; SAN informational technology (the brains of the district's infrastructure) costing \$18,371; 300 Chromebooks costing \$94,782 from CDWG; Lenovo 390 Yoga staff devices at a total cost of \$68,530, also to be purchased from CDWG; and front-of-classroom technology at Kewaskum Elementary School; first floor replacements using SMART Flat Panels costing \$53,415, to be purchased from Tierney.

- The board convened into closed session to consider employment of professional staff. No action was taken when it reconvened.

## Let Beauty Come Out Of The Ashes

The Kewaskum Village Board Monday night approved spending up to \$3,000 on cutting down 22 dead ash trees along the Milwaukee River as part of the Mighty River Project.

Spearheaded by resident Peggy Kober, much of the work of the Mighty River Project is being done by community volunteers. The goal is to restore the eastern bank of the Milwaukee River along Riverview Drive, from Habeck Street north to the cornfield.

The tops of the ash trees were recently trimmed, and now the trees themselves will be removed. The stumps will remain in place to help maintain the riverbank. The logs will go to The Mill & Kiln, and the plan is to repurpose the wood back into the com-

munity.

"All of the ash trees have to come down because they are dead and they are going to fall into the street," Heiser said.

"Let Beauty Come out of Ashes! It's a theme that repeats itself in songs, poetry and the sacred mystery of the Christian tradition where every end is a beginning. Apply this to the experience along Riverview Drive where this week 22 large, dead ash trees will be removed to open the experience of our mighty river again," Kober said.

Kober believes the vitality of the community is dependent upon its relationship to its fresh water resource.

"This river is indeed the movement of living water our community was founded on 124 years ago," Kober said.

The stretch of the Mil-

waukee River in Kewaskum is a part of 500 miles of perennial streams in the Milwaukee River Watershed. Many communities are earning the designation of Healthy River Communities where intention and attention is being placed on the fresh water that we drink, to create swimmable, fishable water again, according to Kober.

Kober said she became aware of the importance of the river while traveling across the country last year when she noticed people drank only bottled water.

Kober also noticed that the ash trees along Riverview started dropping their dead limbs onto the road and into the water. Kober also noticed some "large bush-like tree" was tak-

ing over the narrow strip on land between the road and the river.

She discovered the plant was buckthorn, an invasive species that kills all native plants under it. Buckthorn leaves a film that destroys the habitat for salamanders and its berries make birds sick, according to Kober.

Local volunteers Lee and Tina Stoffel recently removed six trailer loads of buckthorn from the river bank.

Kober's charitable organization, Bridget Cen-

ter, invited the Kewaskum High School H.O.P.E. (Help Our Planet Earth) Club to help engage, inform and inspire the community about the value of our river.

Kober said that many have been generous with this project, including Daniel's Landscaping, Exodus House volunteers, Asplundh Tree Service, WE Energies, Tennessees Ace Hardware, Miller Tree Service, HOPE Club students, Bridget Center and The Mill and Kiln.

Other community members have gotten involved as well. Area residents have been working regularly on the project.

The group intends to fund raise this summer for trees and native plants to enhance the river shoreline next fall.

In the words of HOPE Student Faith Mertzig, "What we do is for future generations. We borrow from them."

"Our bodies are filled with the water from this river. We need to appre-

ciate it," added Brandon Tietz of HOPE Club.

"Our hope is to inspire, engage, and inform every villager to appreciate the river as we work toward celebrating the founding of our community 125 years ago on this mighty river in June 2020," Kober said.



## Destination Imagination Team Headed To Globals

The Kewaskum Middle School Destination Imagination team placed first out of 17 middle school teams at the state tournament on Saturday, and will be heading to the Global Finals in Kansas City, Missouri, next month to compete against teams from around the world.

The team is called "Who Lost a Snake/Turtle?" and placed first in the state competition on Saturday, April 13, for the Technical Challenge – "On Target."

The team also finished first for the portion of their challenge called "Instant Challenge," which comprises 25 percent of the overall combined score. The Instant Challenge requires the team to solve a challenge in a matter of minutes with very few resources and are then scored.

Team members include: Zachary Jacoby (sixth grade), Cassidy Krupp (sixth grade), Madison Legate (sixth grade), Samantha Staffin (seventh grade), Isaiah Knaus (seventh grade) and Alexandra Taylor (seventh grade). The team is managed by Tina Knaus.

This is the second consecutive year that Kewaskum has a team that qualified for the global competition. Only two of the students (Samantha and Isaiah) are returning team members. Knaus managed both teams that qualified for globals.

"What is so amazing is very few teams advance to globals. Only 8 percent of teams from 35 different countries qualify for Globals in a given year," said Sarah Moris, Destination Imagination coordinator for the Kewaskum School District.

For this year's competition, the Kewaskum Middle School team built a drone. The challenge was to build a flying device that would be able to carry what is called a payload and drop it in a designated area and then land in a designated area.

The Kewaskum students researched and looked up components of a drone and were able to purchase the components that they needed to build the drone. The drone that they built is now an actual registered drone, Knaus explained.

"Most of the teams they competed against had store-bought drones," Knaus said.

Team member Samantha Staffin programmed a remote control for the drone.

"She programmed it

completely on her own," Knaus said.

For the contest, the students devised a story that they were on the lost island of Atlantis, and two brave scientists are looking for artifacts. They find that there is a treasure on the island, and the drone drops necessary medical supplies and food they will need to get them through their journey.

### i4L Team

The i4Learning Community School team "ZOSAJACK" finished eighth out of 11 teams that competed at the elementary school level at the state competition. The i4L team challenge





candy bars throughout the year. The group plans to hold more fundraisers, such as a brat fry at Pick 'N Save South on May 11.

"The community has been great with support this year, and last year," Moris said.

With his romantic, platinum certified number one hit "My Girl," and gold-certified Top 5 smash "Hooked," Scott has certainly done that, paying his dues and transforming real-life experience into chart-topping success. Now with the album Dylan Scott

Deluxe Edition, a new chapter begins with three powerful new tracks joining the original 13.

"When you see people smiling and forgetting about the work week and whatever's going on in their life, that's what's inspiring to me," he explains. "You always think 'How cool would it be to write a song and go out to perform it, and have people know your music?' But when it actually happens, it's even better than you imagined."

Opening for Scott is Mitchell Tenpenny whose first single and number one hit "Drunk Me" has earned more than 120 million on-demand streams and surpassed 500,000 certifiable units in the U.S. The New York Times named it one of the best songs of 2018, and the singer claims

that he knew the song was special as soon as he recorded it.

On the heels of his RIAA-certified Gold single, "Drunk Me," comes Tenpenny's major label debut album, *Telling All My Secrets*. Revealing a wide range of influences and a level of assurance and confidence that comes from already having years of songwriting and touring behind him, the record marks the arrival of an artist recently singled out by Billboard as a pick to "break out" by the end of 2018, and as one of Pandora's Artists to Watch in 2019.

The other special guest, Travis Denning just released his debut single "David Ashley Parker From Powder Springs" and when not touring is working on recording his debut album.

I like horror as a genre in films and books, although since I have grown older, I have shied away from those types of scary stories that I loved so much when I was younger. I don't seem to get thrilled from being scared as I once did. Sometimes I feel that just living in this world is frightening enough.

The book I have just finished reading is a combination mystery, library history, human interest and for me, a type of horror story. It is *The Library Book* by Susan Orlean. *The Library Book* tells the story of the fire that took out much of the Los Angeles Library in 1986. However, it is more than just a historical narrative about this disaster. It tells the story of the library's background, the people involved and interesting information about the library world. It is also a kind of love story about libraries and librarians.

I do not recall anything about this fire that decimated hundreds of thousands of books and other material including rarities that can never be reproduced.

My mother had moved to Los Angeles about the time of the fire; April 1986. I asked her about it, and she does remember. I am sure she told me but since that was before I became a librarian, I doubt it made an impact on me at that time.

*The Library Book* is a mystery in that there was a suspected arsonist, but the investigation was a difficult process. I found the book to be a slice of library history. There are chapters about the Los Angeles Public Library System, information related to library theory and processes and data about libraries that the general public may not know.

The human interest aspect of Orlean's writing makes it an easy read that flows like a novel. The cast of characters includes staff members of the library, past and present, in addition to people involved in the fire and aftermath.

This may be exclusive to me, but the horror story aspect of this book is mainly because of the loss of materials when the inside of the building reached over 2,000 degrees. It reminded me of other library losses from disasters and war and Orleans touches on that in the book. Additionally, I feel the need to revisit the safety of our building and if such a tragedy would occur, what type of loss we would face. All very frightening to me.

I found *The Library Book* by Susan Orlean a wonderful read and highly recommend it to everyone. I hope you have the chance to check it out and when you finish it, stop in and let me know what you think.

"We'd written several songs before Jeff joined, and he took everything we threw at him and ran with it lyrically and melodically. What impressed all of us is how he lets the song dictate his direction instead of the other way around," Robert says.

Gutt says the band really clicked after writing its first song together, a track called "The Art of Letting Go." "Dean was messing around on an acoustic guitar and I started singing along. Pretty soon, everyone was in the room and all the pieces fell into place. It's such a beautiful song and something we're all very proud of."

The opening band will be announced at a later date.

This is an annual event for the daycare and their families. Prince crowns and princess tiaras were given out. A kid-friendly meal was provided along with a spring art project.


Professional photographers from Lifetouch were in attendance to take family photographs. The Easter Bunny also



# Site Cleared For Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial

In-kind donations will be used to offset part of that cost.

"We are working with contractors for in-kind donations of materials services. Those are going to be significant," Gordon Haberman said.

There are enough funds to complete the foundations for all of the memorial's learning stations and to raise the beam, according to Melzark. All electrical work is scheduled to be laid out this year.

The memorial, which has been officially recognized as Washington County's 9/11 Memorial, will have five learning stations. They will feature information and artifacts about the twin towers, the airline crews and passengers, the first responders who gave their lives, the volunteers who worked at Ground Zero during the aftermath and the military.

The memorial has been in the works for several years. The process began in 2012 when an application for the steel beam was sent to the Port Authority of New York/New Jersey.

In August 2014, Gordon Haberman and fellow 9/11 Memorial Board Member Jerry Gosa drove the beam from Ground Zero to Kewaskum in August 2014.

"So it has been a long road to get this point, but there have been good people and good businesses in the community all along the way," Gordon Haberman said. "It would not have been possible without the co-operation of the village board and support from the citizens in this community."

### Collaborative Donation

On Thursday, April 4, students from Kewaskum High School and the West Bend high schools gathered at Delta Defense in West Bend. The students, along with representatives from Delta Defense, presented a

check for \$20,332.94 to the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial committee.

The donation resulted from a joint effort between the student governments of Kewaskum High School and the West Bend high schools. Delta Defense partnered with the schools, matching every dollar raised.

"That was a huge cooperative effort. It was humbling and inspiring," Gordon Haberman said.

The student groups from the high schools used creative incentives to solicit donations both in school and throughout the community during the week of March 11. The efforts concluded with a joint dance held at

the West Bend High Schools on March 16, with all proceeds donated back to the 9/11 Memorial.

"It really is an exciting partnership, because one of our goals is to be a platform for education regarding events for 9/11," Melzark said.

West Bend social studies teacher Randy Reysen, who graduated with Andrea Haberman from Kewaskum High School, helped organize the partnership.

Also helping coordinate the schools' involvement were West Bend West Principal Ralph Schlass, KHS Student Government Advisor Lois Volesky, KHS Student Govern-

ment Advisor Megan Hilbert and KHS Principal Scott Stier.

"It's always heart-warming to see students band together in order to make a positive impact on their community. An occasion such as this where students come together from different schools is even more gratifying," Stier said.

### Business Support

Delta Defense is one of many businesses helping make the memorial a reality. For example, Pizza Ranch recently held a fundraiser.

Other businesses contributing to Phase One of the project include LS Landscaping, Steiner Electric, Mark Schairer Excavation and West Bend Sand and Stone, Inc.

Moraine Park Technical College is pitching in by incorporating some of the metal and wood-working projects into its curriculum. MPTC students also will create applications for the 9/11 learning stations.

"When people go up to a learning station, they will be able to listen on their phone to someone like Gordon [Haberman] talking about why that part is significant," Melzark said.

### To Donate

"We are deeply appreciative of all who have donated to date," Gordon Haberman said.

However, another \$70,000 is needed to ensure that Phase One will be completed.

"Anytime you can be in the same conversation with those two schools is a great feat. They are ranked number one and number two respectively in Division 1, and were first and second place at the state tournament last year," KHS coach Casey Scheel said.

The schools from the County also put their scores up against each other, and Kewaskum was an easy winner. Germantown finished second at 333, followed by Slinger, 353; Kettle Moraine Lutheran, 372; West Bend East, 377; Hartford, 402; Living Word Lutheran, 414; and West Bend West, 427.

Sheboygan North's Max Schmidtke and Ben Monty of Wauwatosa tied for the medal with 74. KHS junior Andrew Carlton finished in a

three-way tie for 15th place with a 39-41-80.

"Andrew, playing in only his second varsity match, carried himself really well. He hit the ball solid all day, and most importantly really played mistake free. His day started off with a birdie on the 9th hole (his starting hole), which is huge because it gets the momentum going and you expect to shoot a good round," Scheel said.

## KHS Boys Finish First, Girls Take Second In Quad Meet

After only experienced, selected athletes were involved in the early season indoor track meets, the Kewaskum Quad meet was set up so everyone on the girls and boys teams get a chance to compete. It's a meet KHS co-head coach Kris Evans is always excited about.

"They could all compete and in whatever events they wanted to. It was great," Evans said.

While the meet had plenty of quantity, it also showcased a lot of quality — good competitions in the running and the field events, with the host Indians showing they are going to be better in the East Central Conference this spring. The KHS boys won their side of the meet with 90 points, 21 ahead of Plymouth. Ripon finished third with 64.5, and Campbellsport was last

with 39.5.

In most sprint races, KHS had two runners among the top four finishers. The 200-meter race is a perfect example, with Tyler Heus winning in 23 and .89 seconds (23.89) and Eli Bartelt fourth in 24.75; In the 100, Cameron Dodge and Trevor Degnitz placed 3-4 with respective times of 11.85 and 11.86, behind the winner, Niko Heinz of Ripon who hit the tape in 11.30.

The Indians also got a 2-3 finish from Sam Melzer (57.30) and Max Melzer (57.83) in the 400, and the duo of Dylan Maechtle and Sam Schultz finished second and third in the 110 hurdles with times of 18.43 and 18.58.

"They both have all the tools," Evans said of his hurdlers. "We just have to work on their form."

Other first place finishers included: 800 —

Bren Frase, 2:09.59; the 4x100 relay (Jermaine Thull, Jed Ermer, Degnitz and Dodge), 45.99; 4x400 relay (Frase, Max Melzer, Bartelt, Heus), 3:45.24; high jump — Sam Schultz, 5-10; long jump — Bartelt, 18-05.50.

Evans said Frase came within a second of the school's indoor record, and without much competition, he did well in winning the 800 in under 2:10.

The coach expects him to break the indoor mark next spring and said, "I wouldn't be surprised if he goes under two minutes next year."

Those taking seconds or thirds were: 300 hurdles — 2. Maechtle, 47.01 and Damareyon Taylor, 3rd, 48.17; shot put — 2. Jon Leister, 43-10.00; discus — 3. Leister, 112-03; high jump — 3. Ermer, 5-4; pole vault — 2. Sam Melzer, 11-0 and 3. Kyle Toth, 10-06; long jump — 2. Maech-

tle, 18-03.25; and the 4x800 relay — 2nd. Gannon Kreuser, Toth, Kirk Johnson, Adam Walls, 9:31.43.

On the girls side of the ledger, Plymouth still had too much talent and depth for the other teams to challenge. The Lady Panthers won nine individual events and two relays toward scoring 104 points. Kewaskum was next with an impressive 89, while Ripon and Campbellsport were far back with 34 and 25 points.

The Lady Indians captured top honors in five individual events and one relay. Excellent efforts came in the distance events from Faith Mertzig (800, 2:44.17), Alyssa Butz (3,200, 13:24.31) and Grace Marchello (1,600, 5:46.33).

Marchello was happy

with the win but not totally with her time. "I had a strong start ... took the lead and never gave it up," she said, admitting the straightaway heading north "was a killer." What helped, she said, was having Olla right behind her to push her.

"It was our first outdoor meet ... I'm right where I want to be," Marchello concluded.

Also junior Madelyn Thull won the 100 hurdles 19.07, and Abby Meidl stayed perfect, again winning the pole vault, this time with a jump of 10-06, not bad considering how cool and windy it was.


The lone relay win came in the 4x100 with Thull, Jill Braatz, Abby Meidl and Brenna Meidl totting the baton around one lap in 55.93.

In Game Two, Kewaskum scored a run in the bottom of the seventh to tie the game. The inning opened when Brad Buechel was hit by a pitch and Eric Bauer and Colton Miller drew walks to load the bases. Buechel scored on a fielder's choice.

The Indians had nine hits, led by Miller and Buechel, who each had two hits. Kyle Bath had an RBI double in the sixth, and Christenson doubled in a run in the first.

Buechel started and pitched five innings, giving up four runs on seven hits with four Ks

and two walks. Prochnow finished off the fifth and sixth, giving up no runs on no hits, with two strikeouts.

"Even with the errors, we should have won," Heisdorf said, referring to the fact the Indians out-hit the Wolves nine to seven and had runners in scoring position.

"The pitching has been OK," the coach said, adding, however, "I think we're throwing too many pitches in the zone."

### April 8 Game

KHS is currently 0-3 in East Central play with the one game suspended. The Indians are 1-4 overall.

"Hopefully we can start turning things around," Heisdorf said.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Board of Review for the Village of Kewaskum, of Washington County, Wisconsin, will hold its first meeting in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street on Wednesday, May 8, 2019 commencing at 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

Please be advised of the following requirements to appear before the Board of Review and procedural requirements if appearing before the Board:

No person shall be allowed to appear before the Board of Review, to testify to the Board by telephone or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the Assessor to enter onto property to conduct an exterior view of such property being assessed.

After the first meeting of the Board of Review and before the Board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the Board of Review may contact, or provide information to, a member of the Board about the person's objection except at a session of the Board. Open Book shall occur no less than 7 days prior to the Board of Review.

The Board of Review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the Board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the Board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the Board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, and the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48 hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the Board of Review within the first 2 hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The Board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the Board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question.

Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objection and made full disclosure before the Board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

When appearing before the Board of Review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or subject or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor all of the informa-

tion about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under Sec. 73.03(2a), that the assessor requests. The Village of Kewaskum has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph which provides exemptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or of the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under Section 19.35 (1) of Wis. Statutes.

The Board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the Board a letter from a physician, surgeon or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other person may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the Board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under Section 70.47(3)(a), Wis. stats, that person provides to the clerk of the Board of Review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.



## Here Are The States That Give Renters A Tax Credit

When it comes to tax benefits, you may feel that as a renter, you're getting the short end of the stick.

After all, homeowners can get some pretty incredible tax breaks — they may be able to deduct some or all of their property taxes and mortgage interest, and they can possibly exclude up to \$250,000 (\$500,000 if married) of gain when selling their primary residence.

But did you know that a handful of states actually offer renters like you a tax credit that can put cash back in your pocket when doing your taxes?

It's true, and in this article, we'll tell you what you need to know.

•You must be a resident of the state in which you rent

•You can't be claimed as a dependent on somebody else's return

•Your landlord paid property taxes on the property in which you rented. This may sound random, but the fact is that in nearly all states that offer some kind of tax benefit for renters, one purpose for the credit is to mitigate the effect of rising property taxes potentially being passed on from landlords to their tenants.

That being said, each state has its own unique set of rules, and we get into these specifics below.

### Rental Tax Benefits – With A Catch

Many states only offer tax benefits to renters who are older (for example, aged 65 or older) and/or are disabled. These are the states with such benefits: Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut,

Iowa, Missouri, Montana, North Dakota, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Utah.

However, there are other states that offer a general renters tax benefit not limited by age or disability status.

### Rental Tax Benefits For The Masses

California — In California, renters who make less than a certain amount (currently \$41,641 for single filers and \$83,282 for married filers) may be eligible for a tax credit of \$60 or \$120, respectively.

Hawaii — Hawaii renters who make less than \$30,000 per year and who paid more than \$1,000 in rent for their principal residence may be able to take a tax credit.

Indiana — Indiana renters may be eligible to deduct \$3,000 in rent paid on their principal residence to reduce your taxable income rather than a credit that directly reduces your tax liability.

Maine — Subject to certain income limitations based on household size, Maine renters may be eligible for a tax credit equal to 15 percent of the rent they paid during the

year.

Maryland — Maryland renters may be eligible for a tax credit of up to \$1,000 based on certain income limits, age and household requirements.

Massachusetts — If you paid rent in Massachusetts, you may be eligible for a deduction of 50 percent of the rent you paid during the year, up to a maximum of \$3,000.

Michigan — Renters in Michigan may qualify for the Homestead Property Tax Credit based on the difference between the property taxes you pay (or are deemed to pay as a renter) and your "total household resources."

Minnesota — Minnesota renters are eligible for a credit equal to a percentage of rent paid (17 percent in 2018). You'll need to obtain a Certificate of Rent Paid from your landlord in order to claim the credit.

New Jersey — The New Jersey benefit is interesting because it gives renters a choice as to whether they would prefer a deduction of 18 percent of rent paid or a credit of \$50 on their tax return. To determine which option would put more money in your

pocket, you have to do the math.

New York — If you live in Manhattan, you may laugh at this, but New York State offers a potential \$75 credit to renters if your average monthly rent is \$450 or less. Your total household income must be \$18,000 or less, and you must have lived in New York State for the entire year.

Vermont — Vermont offers a rebate to renters making \$47,000 or less per year.

Washington D.C. — Washington, D.C. offers a credit of up to \$750 for renters with a household income of \$20,000 or less.

Wisconsin — Wisconsin offers credit to renters with less than \$24,680 in household income. Similar to Minnesota, you'll need to obtain a rent certificate from your landlord before taking the credit.

### Should You Take The Renters Tax Credit?

Our verdict is that you should typically take the government up on offers of free money. But do your research, review the information above and go get that paper!
