– Pinewood Derby Brings Hundreds To Kewaskum


“5-4-3-2-1....GO!” the crowd yelled.

The racecars took off for a race that took only mere seconds, and the zealous fans cheered wildly.

It was the Kettle Country District Pinewood and Blastcar Derby held at Kewaskum Middle School on Saturday, April 6. With over 300 cheering, it was the largest crowd ever gathered for the annual tri-county event.

Scouts from Washington, Ozaukee and Dodge counties had carefully designed their model racecars to speed along the racetrack, where winners were determined by a mere fraction of a second.

With his dad’s help, Parker Brown, an 8-year-old Cub Scout who attends Holy Trinity School, meticulously placed weights on his car to make it go faster.

“We made it light in the front and put weights in the back. We made a slant in the front. If we didn’t do that, and it was straight up and down,

Farmington Residents Weigh In On Garbage Pickup

– Majority Favor Town Service

Cars were parked along State Highway 144 as about 200 people gathered for the Town of Farmington’s annual meeting last Tuesday, April 16, at 7 p.m.

The town hall was not large enough to house the crowd, so by a unanimous show of hands, the meeting was moved to the Town Shop. At 7:10 p.m., Town Chairman Chris Elbe reconvened the meeting in the Town Shop.

Once inside the large garage, people weighed in on whether the Town of Farmington should

offer curbside garbage pickup on a weekly basis. The service would be added to the recycling pickup that is offered every other week. Residents would be charged for both services.

After about an hour of discussion, an advisory vote was taken to see how many residents were in favor of adding garbage pickup. Those in attendance overwhelmingly voted 127-15 in favor of adding the service.

The issue is a Town Board decision.

Washington County Sheriff's Office Continues Investigation Of Armed Robbery

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is actively investigating a bank robbery that occurred on April 8 in Alenton at the National Exchange Bank located at 6278 Blueberry Road. The office is actively following up on all leads and is grateful for the public support and information it has received so far.

At approximately 11:07 a.m., a white male who was described as being in his early to mid-20s, short (5 feet 5 inches to 5 feet 8 inches) and slender with facial hair, and wearing glasses, dark pants, a dark long sleeve shirt, and a dark colored winter knit cap, entered the bank. He was talking on a cell phone as he entered the bank and continued to talk on the phone as he approached the counter. He made contact with

the bank teller and provided the teller with a bag and demanded money. The suspect then displayed a handgun. The suspect continued to talk on the cell phone as he fled the bank.

The investigation has revealed that the suspect most likely got into a larger, older, maroon SUV, similar to a Chevy Tahoe, that was waiting for him near the bank. There is no description of the driver at this time.

The Sheriff's Office is taking this crime very seriously and is utilizing all resources available. In this case, a firearm was pulled on an innocent bank teller and the department wants to ensure that the suspects do not victimize anyone further.

The Washington County sheriff is asking for the public's assistance in apprehending

these dangerous suspects. Anyone with further information is asked

Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department Drug Take Back Day For Washington County

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department and Washington County Sheriff's Department, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), will participate in National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on Saturday, April 27 at the Washington County Highway Department, 900 Lang Street, West Bend, from 8 a.m. - noon.

This effort will continue to bring focus to the issue of prescription painkiller abuse in Wisconsin. Drug Take Back Day provides a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposal, while also educating the community about the

potential abuse and consequences of improper storage and disposal of these medications.

"I strongly encourage Wisconsinites to ensure that their unused medications are properly disposed of," said Wisconsin Attorney General Josh Kaul. "Through proper disposal, we can prevent prescription drugs from being diverted—and help prevent addiction." Unused or expired medicine should never be flushed or poured down the drain. Water reclamation facilities are not designed to remove all of them and trace amounts of pharmaceuticals are showing up in rivers and lakes.

All waste pharmaceuticals must be generated

by a household — no businesses are allowed.

Bring prescription (controlled and non-controlled) and over-the-counter medications, ointments, patches, inhalers, non-aerosol sprays, creams, vials and pet medications.

Do not bring illegal drugs, needles/sharps, acids, aerosol cans, bio-hazardous materials (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens), household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas), mercury thermometers.

Participants may dispose of solid, non-liquid medication(s) by removing the medication from its container and disposing of it directly into a disposal box or into a clear sealable plastic bag. Plastic pill containers should not be collected. Blister packages without the medications being removed are ac-

ceptable.

Liquids will be accepted during this initiative. However, the liquids, creams and sprays must be in their original packaging. Liquids without the original packaging will not be accepted.

Illicit substances such as marijuana or methamphetamine are not a part of this initiative and should not be placed in collection containers.

Washington County continues to offer permanent drop boxes for year-round prescription medication disposal. Drop boxes are available during regular office hours at the Police Departments in Germantown, Hartford, Jackson, Kewaskum, Slinger, and West Bend.

Participants may dispose of solid, non-liquid medication(s) by removing the medication from its container and disposing of it directly into a disposal box or into a clear sealable plastic bag. Plastic pill containers should not be collected. Blister packages without the medications being removed are ac-

100 Years Ago April 26, 1919


The beautiful new Sacred Heart Catholic Church at Allenton narrowly escaped destruction Thursday morning when flames were discovered issuing from the

Immanuel Lutheran Church Celebrates 150 Years

"Celebrating 150 years of God's Faithfulness" is the theme of the Sesquicentennial Celebration of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Town of Scott, to be held on May 19.

Immanuel was organized in 1869. The first congregation members immigrated with their families from Germany. Services were conducted in the homes of the various members since no church building was yet built. In a short time, the homes got too small for the group, and the first building was built in the summer of 1869. In 1885, a larger church was built to accommodate the larger number of members.

This church was enlarged and remodeled prior to being destroyed totally by a fire on January 23, 1944. The new

church was dedicated on the first Sunday in July 1945, and that is the building in which we now worship. The church also had a school with Christian education from 1872 - 1948. In 1982, Immanuel entered into a dual parish arrangement with St. Stephen, Batavia.

The following pastors have served the congregation as shepherds over these 150 years: Rev. G.F. Schilling 1869-1882, Rev. C.M. Otto 1882-1910, Rev. Gustav Kaniess 1910-1947, Rev. Hans Tornow 1947-1954, Rev. Edgar Engelking 1954-1963, Rev. Donald Burgdorf 1963-1974, Rev. Robert Wilcken 1974-1981, Rev. William Robinson 1982 - 2002, Rev. Kurt Ziemann 2003-2015, Rev. Brian Krueger 2016

to the present.

This was the first year that 6-year-old Grant Schellinger competed in the Pinewood Derby. Grant, who is a Kewaskum Elementary School student, was happy with how well he had raced in the local competition to earn a spot in the district race.

"My car is faster than my brother's," Grant said, proud to beat his 8-year-old brother, Jameson Schellinger.

After Grant won the local Pinewood Derby, he decided to try some different wheels for the big race. But the car, which is blue with a red star and a red dot, actually ended up going slower with the new wheels.

"We messed up. We thought we were making it faster," Grant said. "Next time we are going to sand more on the wheels."

Pinewood derby cars come in a kit. There are strict rules that young racers must follow. The overall car length may not exceed 7 inches, the overall width may not exceed 2 3/4 inches and the car must have 1 3/4 inches clearance between the wheels. Pinewood derby cars may not weigh more than 5 ounces.

No illegal wheels or axles may be added to the cars. The Scouts can sand the cars into any shape they wish. Paint and decorations may be added.

Trophies were awarded to the fastest cars at the district race. There even was a trophy for the slowest, but "most fuel efficient car."

The cars with the best designs also earned trophies. At this year's competition, there was a car that looked like a pinball machine. One looked like Pokemon. And another looked like a campsite.

Boy Scouts, who are in sixth grade and older, compete in Blastcar races. Blastcars, which are powered by carbon dioxide cartridges, must not exceed 10 inches in length and must not weigh less than 5 ounces.

The blastcars go about 50 feet in approximately 1.5 to 1.7 seconds.

"They get a lot of excitement," said Brian Graff, Scoutmaster for Troop 741, located out of Hartford. "They are a lot of fun."

The blastcar races are technical. The cars run along a fishing line so that they stay straight on course.

"Otherwise they go from here to the moon and back, and we have done that once, and that is a bad idea," Graff said, adding, "It's amazing — I love it! Where else can you have this many people come together and watch a race for 1.5 seconds?"

The Crowd

The derby brought people from all across the area to Kewaskum.

"It was a great opportunity to use the new facility," said Jess Medinger, who is troop committee chair for Boy Scout Troop 744.

The Kewaskum Middle School gymnasium held the record-setting crowd as nearly 200 cars competed. The contest included: 105 pinewood race cars, 60



pinewood show cars and 13 blastcars.

"Powdered sugar ones are the favorite," Cale reported.


Scouts from the different groups volunteered as well. For example, members of the Hartford Boy Scout troop helped with the blastcar races.

"They are all volunteering. It is just amazing the amount of support that we get," Graff said.





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

Farmington Residents Weigh In On Garbage Pickup

"The Town Board does not have to ask the residents for their approval to move forward, because this is a Town Board decision, but we would like the residents' feedback," Town Chairman Chris Elbe said.

Farmington currently offers recycling pickup twice a month at no charge for approximately 1,300 homes in the township. The town board budgeted about \$64,000 for 2019 to cover the recycling service.

The Town Board would like to start charging for the recycling service in order to free up funds for road repairs, according to Elbe.

If the town begins charging for recycling services, the cost would be \$14.84 per month, or \$178.08 a year, for combined garbage and recycling pickup. The fee, which would be a special charge on residents' taxes, would cover garbage pickup every week and recycling pickup every other week.

Currently, about 40 to 50 percent of Farmington residents have a contract with either Waste Management or Advanced Disposal on their own for weekly garbage pickup.

"Going to curbside garbage and recycling will save money for the

people who currently contract privately for garbage services, but for the people who don't currently contract privately for garbage, this will cost them money," Elbe said.

The Town Board has gotten bids from both services, and the lowest bid came from Advanced Disposal.

With a contract from Advanced Disposal, town residents would have three 30-yard dumpsters available at the town hall to dispose of large items. Residents could simply drop off the large items and town employees could use a loader to lift large items into the dumpsters.

"In order to charge the residents for this service, the town would have to pay for the services first, and we do not have the money," Elbe said.

To cover the initial startup cost, the town could borrow the funds, and then the principal and interest payments for a loan would be levied to the property owners.

Another option that the Town Board has been considering is the jurisdictional transfer of several county roads or sections of county roads. If this is approved, then the town would receive some money from the county,

which could then be used to help pay for garbage service.

One resident commented that any money received from jurisdictional transfer of roads should be saved for or spent on roads, since many of the town's roads are in desperate need of repair.

Some of the questions and comments that were voiced at the meeting include:

▪ **Would the charge for garbage and recycling services be part of the normal taxes?** Any charge for these services would be billed as a special charge on the tax bill as an additional charge, and is to be paid with first half or full tax payments.

▪ **Would parcels that are only land be charged?** Each residential property would be billed.

▪ **Would the charge include the cost for both garbage and recycling?** The charge would include the cost for both services, and will increase annually based upon the Consumer Price Index and a possible monthly fuel surcharge.

▪ **Who will clean up the mess if garbage blows out of trucks?** The garbage/recycling companies are responsible for this and would help clean up their mess.

▪ **When would this service start?** Not sure, the board is hoping to keep moving this along, but the town has to fund it first and doesn't have the money, so the board is considering available options.

▪ **Would residents who currently have paid for the year for private contracts be**

reimbursed? This would have to be worked out with the contractor.

▪ **What are other municipalities doing?** Only one other town in Washington County does what the town is proposing. Others have residents contract privately and use transfer stations/drop-sites.

Comments for town-wide garbage service included: Save money for those who contract privately for garbage service; the hope that it would help clean up the town; would eliminate burn barrels; and it would reduce truck traffic.

Comments against town-wide garbage service included: Losing the right or privilege to choose whether to have service; an increased cost to residents who don't currently have pri-

vate garbage service; control for making decisions would transfer to the Town Board; and if the town borrows money to pay for this service, it would be an additional tax levy increase to all property owners.

Annual Financial Report

At last week's annual town meeting, residents voted 149-0 to accept the 2018 annual financial report as follows: General Account \$201,891.37; Reserve Fund \$165,481.79; Recreation Fund \$5,266.08; and a combined loan balance of \$348,147.41. Total Income was \$852,416.83, Total Expense was \$844,672.59, reflecting a Net Income of \$7,744.24.

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

KHS Girls Are Champs, Boys Finish Second In Indian Invite

Thanks to some great efforts in the sprints, distances and field events, the Kewaskum girls track team captured top honors in the annual Kewaskum Invitational on April 18.

The weather conditions were far from ideal, but that didn't stop the Lady Indians from winning seven events and piling up 154 points, 16 more than Port Washington.

The KHS boys also had a great night, placing second behind Ripon, 161 to 121. No question about the top individual performances by Indians — Ben Frase's outstanding time in the 800 and Tyler Heus' excellent run in the open 400 and his efforts in the victorious 4x100 relay. Two other top efforts came from Eli Bartelt in the long jump and Sam Schultz in the high jump.

With the rain and cold, it was touch and go for a while, according to KHS co-head coach Kris Evans, who said Athletic Director Jason Piittmann made the call to have the meet, and looking at some of the results, Evans was glad they got it in.

The girls got off to a good start when the 4x800-meter relay, comprised of Romela Olla, Lisa Bolek, Faith Mertzig and Grace Marchello, won with a time of 10:54.21, 14 seconds ahead of the runner-up Lake County team.

Hailey Hasenberg, Jill Braatz, Abby Meidl and Saioa Carrascal were victorious in the 4x100 (55.93), while Courtney Butzlaff, Abby Meidl, Anna Peterson and

Brenna Meidl were way ahead in the 4x400 relay, hitting the finish line in 4:26.94. All three groups are showing great potential.

Once again, Abby Meidl won the pole vault, clearing 10-feet (10-0). Her freshman sister, Brenna, didn't win the high jump, but she cleared 5-0 for a personal best and could do even better when the weather gets better.

"That's a huge improvement," Evans said about Brenna Meidl, confident she will go higher.

The Indians had a 1-2 finish in the 400, with sophomore Lindsey Landvatter clocked in 1:05.07, and Brenna Meidl an eyelash behind her in 1:05.11. Also, Peterson won the 200 in a photo finish, winning by .04 of a second over Cudahy's Camryn Kratt, 28.04 to 24.08, and Emily Halterman was the best discus thrower on this day with an effort of 97-07.

Olla and Alyssa Butz picked up big points with their 2-3 finish in the 3,200-meter run; Carrascal finished third in the 100 (14.08); Maddie Thull was 3rd in the 100 hurdles (19.32); Marchello 4th in the 1,600 (5:42.11); and Bolek 4th in the 800 (2:46).

Taking a look at the boys, Heus turned in a time of 51.87 to win the 400. This time is currently the best among Division 2 schools in the state. With a short break after the 400, Heus also anchored the 4x100 relay (Jermaine Thull, Jed Ermer and Trevor Degnitz) to a winning time of 46.24.

"He was very proud of

his effort," Evans said of Heus.

Also Evans was ecstatic about Frase's time of 2:03.91 in the 800 where he finished second. This was 4.49 seconds faster than his previous best outdoors, and is currently the fifth fastest outdoor time in D-2.

"He's running smart ... He's strategic and he's strong," Evans said of Frase.

Bartelt continues to contribute points in the long jump. In this meet, he took second and went over 20 feet for the first time this season, reaching 20-08, one inch out of first place. The 20-08 is tie for third best in the state.

"He did something real special," Evans said about Bartelt. "Now he's got to do that every week. He's got it in him."

The coaches were also pleased to see Sam Schultz clear 6-0 in winning that event.

Another win came in the discus with Jon Leister posting a throw of 121-10.

Other top-four finishes included: Degnitz, fourth in the 100 (11.72);

Schultz, third in the 110 hurdles (17.37); Damareyon Taylor, fourth in the 300 hurdles (48.06); Jon Leister, tie for fourth in the shot put (30-09); and Sam Melzer and Kyle Toth, third and fourth in the pole vault (11-06 and 10-06).

New Conference Alignment Coming For Football

It's now official ... The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association has approved a football-only conference realignment. Beginning in 2020, the East Central Conference will have a new look to it, but it wasn't exactly what Kewaskum Athletic Director Jason Piittmann was expecting.

The issue was in the works for a couple of years, prompted by the fact many conferences have schools that are able to compete in most sports which require just five to 10 athletes but have difficulty fielding a competitive football team, resulting in lopsided scores which perhaps leads to less interest in the sport.

Piittmann had indicated last fall he was in favor of a plan which would help the smaller schools or those struggling to compete in football. At that time, he said he thought Kettle Moraine Lutheran and Campbellsport would be the schools re-assigned to other leagues for football. Moving into the EC would be Port Washington and Sheboygan Falls.

When the vote was passed, however, Kettle Moraine Lutheran, the smallest team in the EC, was not moved. Instead, Winneconne, which won the EC conference football title last fall, was moved to the Bay Conference, where it will be the smallest school and Campbellsport will be in the Flyway.

"Yes, when the most recent plan came out and moved Winneconne out, I was very surprised," Piittmann said last week after the move was finalized. He was not as surprised about KML remaining in the league, stating, "Based on other conversations, I had a feeling that KML would end up staying with our group."

"I'm not sure what this does for KML," Piittmann went on, adding, "They did have some success in the mid-2000s. Shortly after dropping us from their non-conference schedule they ended up winning a silver ball in Camp Randall."

Since then, however, it's been tough for the Chargers who went 1-6 in conference action and 1-8 last fall and 0-7 and 0-9 in 2016 and '17. In the past four seasons, they are 3-25 in conference play and 4-32 overall.

Port Washington and Sheboygan Falls have opposite reactions about being moved into the EC, according to Piittmann, who said, "Port Washington, I believe, is good with the move. They will be one of the larger schools. They already have a history playing us and Plymouth (playoffs some years), but, their participation numbers have been down in recent years."

"I know that Sheboygan Falls is not happy about moving in with our group. They don't like the travel involved," Piittmann went on. "For Plymouth, it gives them

their geographic rival back in the league, like they had been for so many years in the EWC (Eastern Wisconsin)."

Having Sheboygan Falls will be good for KHS.

"For us it is a positive on the travel side - 35 minutes to Sheboygan Falls versus 65 minutes to Winneconne," Piittmann said.

Enrollments of the football-only conference are as follows: Plymouth, 784; Port Washington, 767; Kewaskum, 626; Waupun, 553; Berlin, 550; Ripon, 532; Sheboygan Falls, 500; and KM Lutheran, 450.

Winneconne and Campbellsport remain in the East Central for all other sports.

This Fall

Kewaskum will still open against Milwaukee Lutheran, and Piittmann said he got a non-conference game with Victor J. Andrew High School from Tinley Lake, Illinois. The JV and varsity teams will be coming to KHS on the Saturday of Labor Day weekend, for a doubleheader. Other options were Menomonie or Osceola, meaning four-hour bus trips.

"One of the big benefits of the football-only conferences was being able to find non-conference opponents within a stone's throw," Piittmann said, reporting in 2020, the non-conference foes will be Campbellsport and West Bend West.


