The Silver Lining 5K Run/Walk For Kids will be held on Sunday, June 2, to benefit the Boys & Girls Clubs of Washington County.

West Bend Mutual has been sponsoring the annual event for the past decade. However, this year, it will be a little different than in years past.

In celebration of West Bend Mutual's 125-year anniversary, the run and walk will begin on the West Bend Mutual campus at 1900 S. 18th Ave.

Participants will make their way through the West Bend Mutual prairie, as well as on nearby streets. The race will end on the West Bend Mutual grounds, where the company will provide a "Finish Line Party," for all participants.

"West Bend Mutual is going to provide a free lunch for everyone participating in the race. They are going to have a band out there, and some children's games and face painting. So it

will be a little different this year," said Jay Fisher, executive director of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Washington County.


Mascots from local schools, as well as from the Milwaukee Admirals, Milwaukee Brewers and Milwaukee Wave, will be in attendance.

KMS Rocket Blasts Into First Place

The Kewaskum Middle School Rocket Club took home a first place trophy from the Rockets For Schools competition held at Blue Harbor Resort in Sheboygan on May 10 and 11.

The Kewaskum team, made up of nine students, competed against 26 other teams from Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan and New York. Each team was challenged to design and build a six-foot rocket that is four inches in diameter, with a scientific or engineering payload.

"This rocket started as a plastic cone, a cardboard tube and some plywood fins. The students turned it into this beautiful, shiny rocket, which is our best rocket

ever," said Nikki Airaudi, who served as the club's advisor along with Bob Gonwa.

Called NoGo Vertigo, the Kewaskum team decided to focus on how to help astronauts alleviate symptoms they can suffer due to a lack of gravity in space, such as lightheadedness, cramps and chills. For the payload, the students created a structure that would spin at a consistent rate, attempting to keep liquids (representing body fluids) from pooling in extremities.

The students were judged on their presentation of that payload, as well as rocket construction.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Just Vote No

Some members of your Washington County Board are again considering changing County government to include an elected County Executive replacing the current appointed County Administrator. WI State statute allows this change via Board resolution, petition, and /or referendum. My concern: Supervisors and Administrator currently have certain responsibilities and if the board votes for County Executive they will relinquish responsibilities per State Statute.

Here are four issues listed in the 2012 Revised UW Extension Fact Sheet on County Government, comparing those two positions.

1. How Chosen
Administrator - Appointed by majority of County Supervisors using a predetermined job description (Usually degree in Public Admin-

istration etc required)

County Executive - Spring Election every four years, Non partisan. (Now becomes a political position with no predetermined qualifications)

2. Removal
Administrator - County Board majority

County Executive - Removed by Governor (loss of local authority)

3. Veto Board Actions
Administrator - No
County Executive - Yes

4. Dept Heads
Administrator - Appoints and removes with board confirmation

County Executive - Appoints with board approval but Removes at pleasure

County Supervisors should do the job they were elected to do and not relinquish their responsibilities or authority that 61 other counties' Supervisors have per State Statute. Only 11 of 72 WI counties have a County Executive. (Correction: My comment to

County Board at the May 22 meeting included an incorrect source which listed 13 WI Counties with County Executive.)

WI State Statutes mandate a County Executive when county population exceeds 500,000. WI State Legislature certainly did not want or foresee all counties to have a County Executive or I believe they would established a much lower population threshold. Washington County 2017 census was only 135,101, nowhere near 500,000.

This has been tried multiple times since 2005 and each time it was voted down. Please contact your County Supervisor and ask them to Vote No. Hopefully the Washington County Board will Vote No, but if they approve a referendum, hopefully you the voter will Vote No.

No Known Cause For Town Of Scott House Fire

On Thursday, May 23, 2019 at approximately 2:53 p.m. the Sheboygan County Emergency Dispatch Center received a 911 call reporting smoke in the lower level of the residence at N1483 State Highway 28, in the Town of Scott.

Upon arrival of law enforcement units, the house was fully engulfed and everyone was out of the home. There were reports of ammunition discharging inside the house due to the fire in the residence but no injuries reported. The fire was declared under con-

trol at approximately 3:35 p.m.

There is no known cause, no estimate of damage and the fire is still under investigation at this time.

On Saturday May 25, at approximately 6:52 p.m., the Sheboygan County Emergency Communication Center received several 911 cell calls in reference to an injury motorcycle crash in the W7800 block of County Road W in the Town of Scott.

The operator sustained severe life threat-

Richard E Zaring Jr.

Richard E. "Rick" Zaring, Jr., 63, of West Bend, passed away on Saturday, May 18, 2019, at his home, in the company of his loving daughter, Rhiannon.

Rick grew up in Kewaskum, and was an avid artist, musician, and athlete throughout much of his life. He obtained his art degree from UW Oshkosh and upon graduation was hired as a designer with Amity Leather in West Bend. He later founded and ran The End Zone, a Jackson sports bar.

Above all, Rick's passion for art endured throughout his life until the end. A talented oil painter, he lived to express himself here,

whether depicting vintage autos in historic settings, recreating lyrical imagery from a song, recalling natural settings and wildlife he'd experienced, or capturing an individual or family in a portrait.

As a student Rick played classical French horn, and in the following years sang and played harmonica in rock bands. He enjoyed competitive golfing, tennis, and basketball, and was quick with a joke and a story from his colorful life.

Rick is survived by his daughter Rhiannon Klotz, of West Bend, and brother Karl Zaring, of Watertown.

Preceding him in death were his parents Richard and Patricia Zaring, sister Julie Zaring, and brother Kurt Zaring.

A memorial service will be held at Peace United Church of Christ in Kewaskum, June 2, at 1 p.m., followed by a celebration of life party at Jug's Hitching Post, Kohlsville, where, in accordance with Rick's final wishes, much of his artwork will be displayed and available for purchase.

Throughout the state and even the country, hundreds of research projects are being carried out. The amazing fact is that most of these projects are not being done by full-time scientists alone, but by everyday citizens.

People are counting birds at their backyard feeders, monitoring the health of lakes, recording the advance of spring, watching monarch butterflies, reporting turtle crossings, and so much more. Pub-

lic involvement through these programs leads to high quality scientific data, offers rewarding and educational outdoor opportunities, and promotes information sharing and collaborations between the public and the Department of Natural Resources.

Join Eva Lewandowski, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Citizen Based Monitoring Program Coordinator, to find out how easy it is to become a citizen-based monitor/scientist. She will describe the wide range of projects going on throughout our state and what it takes for folks of all ages to become involved.

Archaeology And Native American Heritage

This evening is sponsored by the Friends of the Kettle Moraine. The program is scheduled for Saturday, June 15, starting at 7 p.m. at the Ice Age Visitor Center, which is located at

N2875 Highway 67, Campbellsport, which is a half mile west of Dundee. The program is free, but donations are always gratefully accepted.

Be ushered back nearly 10,000 years when the last glaciers retreated from Wisconsin. Get a glimpse into what life was like for the indigenous people of the Sheboygan Marsh area. Learn what tools they

used to make their living off the land and water.

The evening's presenter, Gary Henschel, is the owner and curator of the Henschel's Indian Museum in Elkhart Lake. His family homestead was founded in 1849 on the north end of the Sheboygan Marsh. His ancestors shared the homestead with Native Americans until 1883.

In 1996 a multiple burial site was accidentally discovered on the property. A Menominee Indian shaman performed the ceremony permitting the excavation of the sacred site pending the promise to rebury the remains. Learn about the sacred burial rites and view artifacts and tools discovered during the archaeological excava-

tions by Marquette University and Milwaukee Public Museum. Gary will fit this discovery into the broader picture of ancient Native American history in Southeast Wisconsin.

In the book of Job, it states, "The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away. Blessed be the name of the Lord." In the Milwaukee Archdiocese, the task of taking and giving falls on Archbishop Timothy M. Dolan, who is currently in the difficult position of having to staff parishes with a declining pool of priests. One of the recent assignments made by Archbishop Dolan, in conjunction with Fr. William Kohler, the director of the priest placement board, is not what parishioners at Holy Trinity Catholic Church were hoping to hear. Fr. Mark Jones, the pastor at Holy Trinity for the past six years

and four months, will be leaving on June 20 to accept a new assignment as the pastor of St. Lucy's Church in Racine, a new church built in 1997, with 2,500 families and a parish school.

A Campbellsport woman was injured Monday after the vehicle she was driving was involved in a two-vehicle crash shortly before 1 p.m. Monday. Jean M. May 26, 1944**

The southbound passenger train was in the siding at the time, the last coach being partly over the crossing. The lad passed behind the last coach, apparently failing to see the freight train approaching northbound on the west siding, and rode directly into the path of the fast freight. The locomotive tossed the boy and bike about 50 feet. The train was in charge of Conductor L.N. Bush and Engineer Ray Reuter, Fond du Lac. Authorities decided no inquest is necessary. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Eggert and daughter on Monday moved from the upper apartment in the

Louis Schaefer home on Fond du Lac Avenue onto the Henry Fick farm in New Fane, which Mr. Eggert has rented. Mr. Eggert was formerly employed at the Kewaskum Aluminum Company.

Called to Forest Lake by a report of a "tremendous cow slaughter," Capt. Anton Rafenstein and Traffic Officer Flaherty of the Fond du Lac County police force early Wednesday morning found the report was slightly exaggerated. In place of the slaughtered animals, the officers found a newly married couple from Kewaskum who had undergone the rigors of a chivari by some of their friends from Kewaskum. The telephone call from the proprietor of a resort on the lake about 12:30 a.m. informed the sheriff's department that a number of shots had been fired in the vicinity and the informant said he could hear cowbells ringing, indicating that the animals were "running through the fields in an effort to escape." All was quiet when the officers arrived at the scene and they drove around the lake and found no evidence of dead cows. They stopped at a lighted cottage not far distant from the resort when they returned to the west side of the lake and the mystery was solved.

Indian Golfers Ace Regional Test At Kettle Hills

The rest of the field was no match for the Kewaskum golf team in the Division Two regional hosted by the Indians on Monday, May 20, at the Kettle Hills Golf club near Richfield.

For the fourth straight year, Kewaskum won the title, this time with a 323 total under coach Casey Scheel, who is three-for-three in regional appearances and is looking to take his team to the state tournament for the third year in a row. Kewaskum had a 13-stroke advantage on runner-up Lake Country Lutheran, which came in at 336 behind Ethan Wilkens' medal-winning 77. Far behind in third and fourth at 370 and 371 were Grafton and Kettle Moraine Lutheran, who also advance to the sectional.

Leading the way was senior Brad Buechel, who put together a solid round of 79 on nine-hole scores of 40 and 39 on a cool and rather windy day. "He played well all day, with a couple birdies," Scheel said. "He'd definitely like to have a few shots back, and he left a few strokes out on the course... Overall, very pleased with his round."

Jacob Schlosser came in with a 39-42—81. "He's another one who left a few strokes out there as he had a bad swing on hole 14 that led to a triple bogey," Scheel said. "He made some big four- or five- foot putts that helped his round. I think he'd be the first one to say that his round should have been better, but 81 was a really good score on a windy day."

Talon Ralph also shot an 81, with rounds of 40-41. "He was consistent all day, mixing in pars and bogeys. He Really didn't have the blowup hole and converted one birdie," Scheel said.

Scheel has the luxury of having two good golfers, juniors Andrew Carlton and Toree Ralph, he can rotate in the number five spot. Because Toree Ralph had been playing better in practice rounds, Scheel went with him for this competition.


"Toree Ralph came through at the number five spot with a great round of 82, rounds of 42-39," Scheel said. "Not many teams can have a number five shoot an 82, so we are very fortunate. I really liked the way Toree played the back nine, and that even included a double bogey on hole number 18."

Travis Griesemer shot a 40-44 — 84. "His round started shaky where he was 4-over-par through his first three holes but finished the last six even par on the front nine. "Anytime we can drop an 84 is going to be a good day," Scheel said.

All of the Indian counters finished among the top nine in the tournament.

KHS was at Meadowbrook CC in Racine for the sectional meet on Tuesday, May 28. The top two teams and top three individuals not on a qualifying team, advance to the WIAA State Golf Tournament at the University Ridge Golf Club June 3-4. Kewaskum finished fifth in the event in 2,018.

More Goals Are Within Reach For KHS Softball Team

With its latest victory, the Kewaskum softball team is one win away from a fifth straight 20-win season and a third straight sectional final.

Behind another good pitching effort by Kennedy Lehn, solid defensive play and timely hitting, the Indians erased Grafton 3-0 in the regional title game held in Kewaskum on May 23.

Scoring single runs in the first, second and third, the Indians put themselves in good position for the win, and Lehn did the rest, striking out nine, giving up just two hits and walking one of the Blackhawks.

"They threatened in the first," KHS coach Jeff Gosse said, reporting Grafton's Jordyn Case walked, stole second and went to third on a sacrifice fly.

"She was stranded there," Gosse said, noting Kirsten Krause was up next and after a 12-pitch at bat, flied out to Maddie Geidel in right

field.

In Kewaskum's half of the inning, Geidel set the tone, smashing a triple and scoring on a wild pitch. The lead was stretched to 2-0 in the second, starting with Lehn's single. Morgan Goeden came in as a courtesy runner and showed her speed as she went from first to third on a Kaitlyn Miller single. Goeden scored on a passed ball.

Gosse said run number three came via a single by Tara Theusch, a Grafton error and a fielder's choice.

Kewaskum had eight hits in the contest. Miller and Theusch each had two.

"It's nice, the defense played real well, and it took the pressure off Kennedy," Gosse said, indicating her performance also took the pressure off the defense. In the past couple games, Gosse has switched Tara Theusch to short and Sydney Kertscher to second, and the swap is working out well.

"Sydney just feels more comfortable at second," Gosse said. "She made a heck of a diving catch at second."

KHS, now 19-5, hosted Kettle Moraine Lutheran on May 28. The two split during the regular season, with the Indians winning the first game 3-1 and losing the second 8-6 on a Charger home run by Kyra Herman. Six KHS errors also helped KML in that game.

The winner advances to the sectional final May 31 at Plymouth

against either Cudahy or New Berlin West. "Hopefully we will play one of those teams, but we have to take care of KML first," Gosse said.

The Kewaskum faithful, bundled up in blankets and winter attire to battle the strong east wind, were hoping the game would be shortened by the 10-run "mercy rule," but KHS coach Jeff Gosse wanted to make sure all of his players could get a chance to bat. He sent two pinch hitters to the plate in the bottom of the sixth with the score 8-0 and Leah Theusch on second after stretching a single into a double.

had struggled for much of the year, finished with the second-best time in the field in the first of the two heats, then stayed right with the 1-2 finishers, clipping over the hurdles in a time of 17.02 seconds, good for a KHS record, third place and a trip to state.

"The support my teammates have given me is phenomenal," an excited Thull said after hearing the final results, also praising her coaches. "They (coaches) knew my potential ... They knew where I should be, and they got me where I should be!"

Hurdle coach Jim Brock nearly set a record running from near the starting line to the finish to congratulate Thull and give Last a high five. Later, Evans said Thull "made amazing progress the last three weeks, and it couldn't happen to a nicer girl."

The weight events were hampered a bit by a strong wind, but it didn't affect Halterman, who

tossed the discus 115 feet, 3 inches (115-03), winning by 11 feet and "holding serve" so to speak since she came in first with the best throw from the regional.

The boys led off in the pole vault, and when Abby Meidl and the girls got started, it was a two-girl race for the top spot between her and freshman Allie Orlowski of Wisconsin Lutheran. They both continued to clear one height after another until 11-3 when both missed three times. Meidl won because she had fewer misses than Orlowski.

This will be Meidl's second trip to La Crosse, and she should reach the podium this weekend.

Freshman Brenna Meidl didn't qualify in the high jump where she finished eighth after clearing 4-10, but she turned heads in the 400 where she found another gear for the second half of the race and finished third with a personal record (p.r.) of 1:01.28.

Tyler Heus went from experiencing a low to the top of the mountain, taking third in a very close 200 race. Earlier Heus lunged for the finish line in the 200 qualifying, tumbling to the ground and sustaining a few scrapes in the process.

Would this affect his open 400 and the finals of the 200? No, he had a good time of 50.55 in the 400, missing fourth place by .03 of a second. Heus had plenty left in him, however, and with a burst the final 50-60 meters, he finished the 200 in third at 22.79.

"I knew it was close," Heus said. "I wanted it."

When asked if he liked his starting spot in lane one, he answered in the affirmative. "Yeah, it was nice. I could see everybody."

Heus had run the 400 since his freshman year but only started running the 200 this spring to become the Indians' best sprinter.

Heus still had one more race, the anchor leg of the

4x400, and he helped teammates Ben Frase, Eli Bartelt and Jermaine Thull to a fourth place with a 3:32.41, so they will all be going to state.

Kewaskum's other qualifier is senior Jon Leister, who finished fourth in the discus with a toss of 128-03. He will compete at approximately 11 a.m. on Saturday, June 1.

Abby Meidl will vault on Friday morning at 9:45 a.m., and Halterman will throw the discus at 11 a.m. Thull, Heus, Brenna Meidl and the boys 4x400 relay will all run on Friday in an effort to qualify for Saturday's finals.

Normally four hits isn't enough to win a high school baseball game but that number was enough for Kewaskum to make its game against Campbellsport interesting in the first round of WIAA Division Two tournament action on Thursday, May 22, in Kewaskum.

The Indians were the higher seed but struggled against two CHS pitchers, Kade Walsh who went the first three innings, and Jalen Gellings, who gave up just one hit the rest of the way to help the Cougars take the 7-6 win and advance to Round Two.

Even with the low number of hits, the Indians were ahead twice and had the tying run in scoring position in the bottom of the fifth after they scored two runs to close the gap to 7-6.

"Errors killed us," KHS coach Mike Heisdorf said about the game. "We drop a routine pop up, then we were a little lazy going after the ball... That ended up being the winning run. The guy scored from second base."

The Indians also muffed a chance for a double play, according to Heisdorf, who said his fielder threw the ball into right field, allowing Campbellsport to score.

This is the second year in a row KHS has exited after its first tournament game. Last summer, after winning the North Shore title, the Indians were upset by Homestead, which rallied for a 3-2 win.

The Indians got off to a good start, taking a 1-0 lead in the bottom of the first on a triple to right field by leadoff man Brad Buechel and a sacrifice fly by Eric Bauer.

Lucas Christenson, in just his second start after missing 13 games, put the Cougars down in order in the first and got out of a mini-jam in the second when CHS got a runner to third. He gave up a pair of runs in the third, however, thanks to a hit batsman, a single by Joe Nerat, a wild pitch and a sacrifice fly by Nick Narges for the first run.

The second came in on a head-up play by Nerat, who tagged up and scored from third on a foul out to Travis Block in left field.

The roof caved in on KHS in the fourth when the Cougars sent 10 batters to the plate and scored five times. Kyle Koltz started the rally with a single, then after a fly out, Christenson walked one, and Campbellsport used an error to score the first run, and a bunt single by Roman Skorupa for the second.

At this point, Heisdorf called on left-hander Carson Dogs to come on in relief. Nerat's sacrifice fly to center was enough to bring home Luke Eichstedt, who had reached on the error, gone to second on a single and stole third base.

The score was now 5-3 in the Cougars' favor and they added another run when Christenson dropped a ball hit by Narges. Gellings finished off the five-run outburst with a single to center to score Narges. Koltz made the third out when he flied out in foul territory. CHS now led 7-3.

Ryan Prochnow came on in relief of Dogs, pitching the fifth, sixth and seventh, giving up two hits. "He pitched well, held down the fort for us," Heisdorf said.

Two CHS errors helped the Indians score a single run in the fourth without a base hit, and in the fifth KHS drew within one run on a pair of walks, a fielder's choice and a single by Peyton Donath. Donath then advanced to second on a passed ball, but Gellings got Travis Block to fly out to end the inning.

Kewaskum still had two chances to score one run and tie the game up, but Gellings did not let that happen. He got Buechel, Bauer and Prochnow all to fly out in the sixth. In the seventh, the Indians went three-up, three-down with Christenson grounding out; Colten Miller making the second out on a third-strike foul tip and Kyle Bath flying out to center to end the game.

KHS finished the year at 16-9, while the Cougars, 11-12, moved on to play at Ripon on May 28.

Loehr had a great start in his match, according to assistant coach Peter Garcia, who accompanied the players to the tournament. Loehr won the first set against the eventual sectional champion, McFarland's Carter Johnson, then lost the second 3-6 and the tie-breaker 2-10.

Loehr was playing well and Johnson was getting frustrated with his double faults, 19 of them, but once he started getting the serves in play, Loehr, who ended up 9-5 on the year, had difficulty staying with him.

At number one singles, one loss eliminates the athlete from the competition and a chance for state. There are open spots for special exemptions, voted on by a committee of coaches. Garcia nominated Loehr for consideration, but the open singles slot went to Donovan Pfaff of Madison Edgewood, who had a 26-0 record, mostly at number three singles.

Krautkramer came in with a record of 12-2 but lost both of his matches, 0-6, 0-6 to Christopher Boll of Madison Edgewood, who was 18-1 on the year, and to McFarland's Jack Newman, 1-6, 0-6.

"Tennis is a game of match-ups and Matthew fell victim to some bad ones today," Garcia said.

For Halvorsen at number three, it was a similar story, as the KHS junior lost to the undefeated Pfaff 0-6, 3-6 and then lost a three-set battle with East Troy's Mac Dudkiewicz, 6-2, 2-6, 4-6 to end his season at 11-4.

"He (Halvorsen) struggled early but managed to take three games from a great player. He then

played a tough match for third place against an East Troy player losing 6-2, 2-6, 4-6," Garcia said.

At number one doubles, Cochran and Fahrenkrug (8-6) drew the number three seeded team from McFarland, Tyson Laux and Logan Snelling, losing 1-6, 4-6. "They held their own but eventually fell to two upperclass men," Garcia said. "Their continued growth bode well for KHS tennis next year."

The team from Madison Edgewood will not be defending its state title this year, as Catholic Memorial captured the sectional title with 48 points, two more than the Crusaders. McFarland was next with 21 points. KHS placed sixth with 14 points.

The all-Eastern Wisconsin Conference awards were announced recently. Ben Read was awarded a silver medal for second team at number four singles, while Kyle Loehr, Matt Krautkramer and the Indians' number one doubles team, Isaiah Cochran and Bret Fahrenkrug, were all honorable mention picks.

First-time Winners Sweep PDTR A-Mains Taylor, Schmidt, Juech, Cullen Visit Victory Lane

It was a night of firsts for four Plymouth Dirt Track Racing competitors as victory lane was graced by nothing but first-time A-main winners in their respective divisions, during PDTR's Military Night Memorial Day weekend racing program on Saturday, May 25, at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth.

Despite heavy overnight rain showers, dry and warm weather allowed the show to go on as planned with 100 competitors in four divisions and a solid race-hungry crowd of spectators turning out for the third PDTR racing program of the 2019 season, which was sponsored by Pedal Down Promotions.

Bill Taylor of Cedar Grove turned back repeated challenges from Interstate Racing Association 410 Sprint Car Series standout Scotty Thiel of Sheboygan to capture the 25-lap Richard's of Dunbar 360 Sprint Car A-main. Cedar Grove veteran Charlie Schmidt scored a flag-to-flag victory in the 25-lap Gasroots Project Late Model A-main.

Jason Juech of West Bend notched a wire-to-wire win in the time-shortened 20-lap Klips & Tips Grand National A main. Chilton's Jesse Cullen survived an action-packed, heated three-way duel with visiting Beaver Dam drivers Tim Sheppard and Elijah Koenig to come out on top in the Cellcom B Mod A-main.

In the 360 Sprint Car A-main, Taylor started on the pole flanked by Nich Melis of Plymouth. Taylor got the jump on the start and pulled out to a quarter-straightaway advantage over Melis by lap 4. Two laps later, 2017 PDTR 360

Sprint Car champion Brandon McMullen brought out a red flag when he flipped his machine in turn two after making contact with Waldo's Chris Clayton. McMullen was uninjured, but he was done for the night.

On the restart, 2010 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champ Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee, who started third, bolted past Melis to take over the runner-up spot, while seventh starter Tim Haddy of Waupun followed Davis into third place on lap eight. Davis was reeling in Taylor on the lightning fast and tacky, but treacherous third-mile clay oval when the second caution appeared on lap nine when Plymouth's Adam Miller spun in turn two.

Visiting IRA 410 Sprint Car Series racer Scotty Thiel, who started eighth, made his presence felt in a big way on the restart as he pushed his Randy Sippel-owned 39s machine up to the outside line to power into third place on lap 10.

Six laps later, Taylor caught the rear of the field, which caused him to alter his line slightly to negotiate slower traffic. Thiel had moved into striking distance when the third and final caution of the event appeared on lap 16 when Sheboygan's Travis Arenz stopped in turn four.

On the final restart, Melis and Haddy dueled feverishly for third while Thiel reached into his bag of tricks to try everything he could to unseat Taylor from the lead. However, Taylor held strong to turn back Thiel's challenges on the way to his first career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory.

Thiel had to settle for second, Haddy placed

third, Melis was fourth and Davis rounded out the top five.

With Charlie Schmidt starting the Late Model A-main from the pole position and Mark Rose of Dorchester on the outside of the front row, a five-car incident involving Kevin Baldry of Omro, Zack Kessler of Plymouth, four-time PDTR Late Model champ Brad Mueller of Random Lake, Jim Juneau of Milwaukee and Justin Ritchie of New London brought out a caution flag before the first lap of the race was completed.

Following a complete restart, Schmidt gained the lead with Rose in tow. On lap six, 2016 PDTR Late Model champion Tim Buhler of Greenbush moved in to pressure defending PDTR Late Model champ Justin Schmidt of Cleveland for third. One lap later, Rose powered in to challenge Charlie Schmidt for the top spot, while Justin Schmidt cleared Buhler and closed in on Rose for second.

On lap 12, Justin Schmidt nearly spun as he attempted to duck underneath Rose in turn four, which caused him to lose a lot of ground. Meanwhile, Rose kept hounding Charlie Schmidt at the front of the field.

However, Charlie Schmidt was too strong as he held on over the second half of the race to secure his first career PDTR Late Model A-main victory. Rose placed second in his first appearance of the year at Plymouth, Justin Schmidt placed third, third starter Paul Parker of Kaukauna was fourth and Buhler finished fifth.

Jason Juech grabbed the initial lead of the Grand National A-main from the pole position with Donny Kulow of Elkhart Lake falling into second from his outside front row starting spot. On lap three, Oostburg's Luke Scholten powered up from his eighth start-

ing spot to seize third along the outside line.

One lap later, Scholten rode the high line of the narrow track surface to secure second place before the first of a string of four caution flags appeared on lap four for debris. Another caution flew one lap later for a three-car incident in turn two, which involved a lengthy clean-up period to unhook the cars of Jacob Muehlbauer and Don Singer.

After two more caution periods involving multi-car incidents on lap nine, the race ran up against the time limit. On lap 12, seventh starter Tyler Kulow of Plymouth moved to take over second place along the low line. Scholten battled back along the high groove to duel with Tyler Kulow for second for two laps before Tyler Kulow suged ahead for good.

On lap 19, Tyler Kulow closed the gap on Juech as the leaders encountered lapped traffic. However, the race hit the time limit, which caused the checkered flag to fall on lap 20 with Juech earning his first career PDTR Grand National A-main victory to add to his four previous PDTR Outlaw Compact A-main triumphs.

Tyler Kulow placed second, Scholten was third, Plymouth's Steven Weber finished fourth after starting ninth and Donny Kulow rounded out the top five.

Polesitter Andy Welter of Milwaukee, who was making his first appearance of the season at Plymouth, led the first two laps of the B Mod A-main before third starter Jesse Cullen moved in to grab the top spot in turn three on lap three.

Meanwhile, 2018 PDTR B Mod champion Tim Sheppard of Beaver Dam, who was making his first appearance at Plymouth of the season, used the high groove to take third from his sixth starting spot on lap 10.

One lap later, Beaver Dam's Elijah Koenig,

who started 11th, used the low line to move past Sheppard to gain the third spot on lap 11. Koenig then ventured to the outside line to take second on lap 14 in turn four with Sheppard following into third.

With Koenig running high and Sheppard down low, the two Beaver Dam visitors continued to duel for second, while also reeling in Cullen for the lead. Just after Sheppard surged into second place he got sideways and spun in turn two, which dropped him back to seventh place in the running order before the first of four cautions appeared on lap 19 for debris in turn two.

After another debris caution, Koenig dove low to take the lead from Cullen in turn three on lap 20. However, the pace slowed again for a spin on the front stretch involving Don Singer on lap 21.

On the restart, Cullen battled back to regain the lead in turn three as Cullen and Koenig duelled side by side. Contact between Cullen and Koenig in turn four on lap 22 brought out the fourth and final caution flag. On the final restart, Cullen fended off Sheppard, who had recovered from his spin on lap 18 to gain the second spot, to earn his first career PDTR B Mod A-main victory to add to a previous PDTR Grand National A-main triumph.

Sheppard placed second, fifth starter Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls was third, Andy Singer of Cedar Grove placed fourth and Marcus Hoepfner of Hartford placed fifth after starting 20th.

Justin Miller of Plymouth won the first 12-lap 360 Sprint Car B-main and Travis Arenz captured the second 12-

lap 360 Sprint Car B-main. Mark Hoepfner of Rubicon was victorious in the B Mod B-main.

The program featured a large field of 38 PDTR 360 Sprints, along with 29 B Mods, 19 Grand Nationals and 14 Late Models.

4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require such objections to be submitted on forms approved by the department of revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. 
