Westbury Bank Damaged By Fire

At about 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 30, Kristy Vogt was sitting in her office at Westbury Bank in Kewaskum when she smelled something burning.

"It didn't smell like smoke. It smelled like something was hot," Vogt said.

Vogt, who is the branch manager, and the other employees searched inside the building, but couldn't find anything burning. The smell did not go away, so two of the employees walked outside.

That is when they saw smoke coming from the roof of the building. Vogt called 911 and all six

employees got safely out of the building. There were no customers in the bank at the time.

The Kewaskum Fire Department was dispatched at approximately 9:48 a.m. to the bank, located at 1052 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum.

Upon arrival, firefighters found the single-story structure with heavy smoke showing from the west end of the building, Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel reported. Additional departments were requested via the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System, or MABAS, to assist.

Five Brothers Involved In Car Crash

– One Teen Dies, Another In Critical Condition

A 15-year-old boy from Kewaskum has died from injuries sustained in a single-vehicle crash that occurred on Wednesday, May 29, and his 13-year-old brother remains in critical condition.

Valentin V. Olla, age 15, was pronounced dead at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin. Luciano C. Olla, 13, remains in critical condition at Children's Hospital.

A total of five brothers were involved in the accident, which occurred

on Interstate 41 southbound, south of Holy Hill Road. The driver, 16-year-old Giovanni J. Olla, along with 9-year-old Alessandro D. Olla and 7-year-old Vitale R. Olla have all been released from Children's Hospital.

At approximately 4:48 p.m. on Wednesday, May 29, the Washington County Sheriff's Office received multiple reports of the single vehicle crash. Witnesses reported that a 2003 Buick was traveling at a high rate of speed, lost control and rolled several times. Three of the pas-

sengers were ejected from the vehicle.

The cause of the accident is still under investigation, but speed appears to be a contributing factor, according to Germantown Police Chief Peter Hoell.

"We have a number of witnesses who told us that they were driving faster than the regular road traffic. One particular witness said he was going 75 and they passed him, so we are not really sure what that means yet, and we are still looking into that," Hoell said.

The three brothers

who were in the backseat, Valentin, Luciano and Vitale, were all ejected from the car. The driver, Giovanni, and the lone front seat passenger, Alessandra,

were not ejected from the vehicle.

Giovanni has his driver's license and was driving legally with his brothers in the car. They were on their way to FC

soccer practice in Germantown.

It is unclear whether all five boys were wearing seatbelts.

Breakfast On The Farm To Be Held At Highland Dairy In Kewaskum

Washington County's 32nd annual Breakfast on the Farm will be held at Highland Dairy, LLC, 1207 Highland Drive in Kewaskum, this Saturday, June 8.

The event will feature all-you-can-eat pancakes from 6:30 to 11:30 a.m. at Highland Dairy, LLC, which is owned and operated by Mike, Linda and Corey Enright.

"We are excited about the opportunity to promote dairy farming. It is important to inform and educate the consumers on where food comes from. It is a very family friendly event for families and kids. For me personally, I just like seeing all the families come out and get their pictures taken with cows and different animals that will be there," said Corey Enright, who serves as the dairy's herdsman.

The farm hosted Breakfast on the Farm

15 years ago. That was before the farm added robotics.

In 2016, construction began on a state-of-the-art milking facility, the second one in Washington County. The farm also installed a manure pit.

By January 2017, the herd moved into its present facility, which houses six DeLaval VMS robotic milking stations, automatic feed and manure pushing equipment, and Comfort Cow technology.

This will be the first time the Washington County Breakfast on the Farm has been at a robotic dairy farm.

"The idea behind it is that the cows can come on their own and milk when they want to milk so they can eat when they want to eat," Corey said.

A robot hooks each cow up to the milker automatically. Laser lighting measures the cow, and the machine cleans the cow, puts on the

milkers and monitors the amount of milk that is produced.

"It also will detect if she has blood or any mastitis in her quarter. That information has become very valuable as far as managing a herd of cows," Corey said.

Before it was automated, the farm had to rely on whoever was milking each cow to detect any disease.

"At times, there is miscommunication that doesn't get relayed," Corey said.

The cows go through a two-week training process to learn how to get milked on your own.

"Obviously, we still need somebody around in case while you are training the cattle and in case one decides not to get up and go get milked. They use the computer reports to figure out which ones haven't been in the robot the last six or eight hours, and they go out and find the cow in the herd and push it in the

area to try and get it milked," Linda said.

About 85 to 90 percent of the herd of 345 cows comes to be milked automatically. It takes a cow seven minutes to milk, and they milk anywhere from two to four times a day.

"I think the biggest advantage has been flexibility throughout my daily schedule," Corey said.

Corey, who has young children, is able to monitor the milking stations remotely. He appreciates the ability to attend after-school activities and appointments with his children.

"It gives him flexibility for him to do things with his children," Linda said.

The downfall is milking occurs 24 hours a day, so the farmers are always on call, according to Corey.

In case of storms, the farm has backup generators that kick in to keep the power.

Corey is the fifth generation of Enrights to be in farming.

The Enright family began farming in the 1800s in the Town of Farmington. Mike Enright grew up on the family homestead, working side by side with his dad, Ken Enright, and his mom, Janet Enright, and two brothers.

Upon their oldest son's graduation from

college, Mike and his wife, Linda, decided to branch off from the family farm and begin their own business.

In 1997, the family moved their herd to Highland Dairy. In the early years, the herd was milked twice a day in a double-six parallel parlor.

The parlor later expanded to 16 stalls and grew the herd to roughly 330 milk cows. Milking three times a day with hired help, they saw the need to make some lifestyle changes to accommodate their growing families and farming operations.

Mike and Linda have two adult sons: Corey and Jason, a daughter-in-law Jen and eight grandchildren: Abby, Madison, Lauren, Kaitlynn, Ranen, Hadley, Easley and Tysen.

The family is prepared to host 4,000 people on the farm.

Breakfast will be served rain or shine. Tickets for the breakfast are \$7 at the door; advance tickets are \$6 (no refunds). Children 3 and younger can eat for free.

The breakfast includes: all-you-can-eat pancakes, plus a serving of scrambled eggs with ham, applesauce, cheese, sausage, milk and coffee.

Chocolate or straw-

berry ice cream sundaes and root beer floats are available for \$1 each.

In addition to the breakfast and touring the farm, activities will include: wagon ride to the farm, barn tours, petting zoo, pedal tractor pull, live music, Roden Barnyard Adventures, antique tractors and much more.

Breakfast on the Farm is sponsored by the Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee.

House Fire Occurs In Town Of Addison

On Friday, May 31, at approximately 9:50 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a house fire at a single family residence in the 6200 block of Linden Drive West in the Town of Addison.

The fire was reported by the homeowner, who was the lone occupant of the residence. The homeowner first reported observing smoke coming from the attached garage, followed by visible flames. The homeowner was able to

safely evacuate the residence along with his three dogs.

Deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office responded to the scene along with Allenton Fire Department. The fire department was also assisted by Hartford, Iron Ridge, Jackson, Kewaskum, Kohlsville, Slinger, St. Lawrence, Theresa, and West Bend fire departments. Lifestar Rescue also responded to the scene and State Patrol as-

sisted the Sheriff's Office with traffic control.

Linden Drive West and Linden Drive East were closed for approximately two and a half hours during the investigation. The residences on the east and west sides of this home were also evacuated but they did not sustain any damage.

There were no injuries to the homeowner or any personnel on scene as a result of the fire. The residence sustained severe damage due to

the fire, smoke and water. Preliminary damage estimates were believed to be around \$200,000.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and the Allenton Fire Department; however, early indications point to the origin of the fire being a vehicle that was recently driven and parked in the attached garage of the residence.

Summer reading has officially begun, and we look forward to warm months filled with activities, programs and a flurry of checkouts at the library. A previous article I wrote about our summer reading program, "A Universe of Stories," informed the readers about what this year's program entails and some of the incredible performances we have lined up. This week I want to discuss the summer slide and the benefits of participating in a summer reading program.

The summer slide is a decline in reading ability and other academic skills that happens when school is not in session. It's real and occurs more with children from lower income households, however, children from all socioeconomic levels will suffer a loss of skills if they are not engaged in activities during the summer that involve learning. Studies have shown that nine out of 10 teachers reteach lessons from the previous year during the first three weeks of the school year.

Are you aware that summer reading loss is cumulative? Research from Reading is Fundamental states that by the end of sixth grade, children who consistently lose reading skills over the summer will be two years behind their classmates. Findings from a report over 40 years ago shows that more than any other public institution, including the schools, the public library contributed to the intellectual growth of children during the summer. This is still true today.

This year, we have slightly altered the summer reading programs for children and teens. Instead of a sole focus on reading, the children's reading logs and teens' bingo includes spaces to

track activities. Some of the events that can be recorded include volunteering, attending a library program, visiting a museum or involvement in various physical activities. Our summer reading program encompasses this on all levels from infants to adults. Every week we will be having programs that engage the community and bring people together. I look forward to seeing the participants creatively partake in the activities. Lifelong learning, which is my personal agenda, continues during the summer when you sign up for this program.

Be sure to stop in and pick up some information about our amazing summer reading program for children, teens and adults. "A Universe of Stories" program began this week and continues throughout the season. I hope to see you soon.

The Navy's first figures listed one American soldier dead, 73 missing from the Evans and 200 survivors, including the skipper, Cmdr. A.S. McLemore. No casualties were listed on the Melbourne. The survivors were taken aboard the Melbourne and later transferred to the USS Kearsarge, a carrier that rushed to the scene from its station 85 miles away. Casualties from the Evans were expected to be considerable because a lot of crewman were thrown in the water. American warships and planes gave up the search Tuesday night for the 73 missing American sailors, including two from Wisconsin. A last minute check by the Statesman with Petermann's parents before press time Thursday revealed the heartening news that Dennis was presumed safe as a survivor of the crash.

Westbury Bank Damaged By Fire

The West Bend Fire Department, Boltonville Fire Department, Kohlsville Fire Department and Newburg Fire Department all assisted. The Kewaskum Police Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Office also were at the scene.

Fire crews initially were sent inside the structure for fire attack and eventually were pulled out of the structure due to the western part of the roof collapsing. The fire was brought under control within an hour.

Firefighters remained on the scene for approximately three hours.

The Kewaskum Fire Department was called to the bank again several hours later, at about 6:30 p.m., for a fire in a different part of the bank after insulation caught

fire, Groeschel said. Firefighters were on the scene until about 8:30 p.m. that evening.

There were no reported injuries and the fire is still under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Department. The exact cause and dollar loss is undetermined at this time.

Serving Customers

Customers' accounts remained safe throughout the fire.

"Everything is electronic, so their accounts are all fine," said Lisa Dixon, senior vice president of retail banking for Westbury Bank.

However, the Kewaskum branch is currently closed due to fire damage. The closest alternative locations are Westbury's two West Bend branches at 200 S.



West Bend Native Named Sailor Of The Year, Promoted To Chief Petty Officer

A West Bend, Wisconsin native and 2014 Roger Williams University graduate was named as U.S. Fleet Forces' Sea Sailor of the Year (SOY) during a ceremony at the Navy Memorial in Washington, D.C. and meritoriously advanced to the rank of chief petty officer May 16.

Chief Petty Officer Luke Johnson, a Navy builder assigned to Naval Mobile Construction Battalion One, is one of four honorees who visited Washington, D.C., May 14-17, for the SOY Recognition Week, hosted by Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) Russell Smith.

Each year, every Navy command around the world chooses its SOY based on leadership, professionalism, dedication and superior performance. These selectees compete against recipients from other commands, eventually competing at higher echelons until the Navy's four finest are chosen as the U.S. Naval Reserve, U.S. Pacific Fleet, U.S. Navy Shore and U.S. Fleet Forces Sailors of the Year.

Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Elmo

Zumwalt and MCPON John Whittet initiated the SOY program in 1972 to recognize outstanding Atlantic and Pacific Fleet sailors. Navy Reserve and Shore SOY programs were later introduced.

During the ceremony, Smith gave the Sailors of the Year some advice to keep in mind as they continue their careers as chief petty officers.

"Everyone who has ever written a letter for you, made a phone call for you, sat down and gave you advice, took time out of their day — making their day longer — to help you get to this point in your career is the reason you're standing here," said Smith. "Your special obligation for the rest of your career and the remainder of the time you wear those anchors is to earn this."

Throughout the week these four sailors and their families had the opportunity to tour Mount Vernon, the National Archives, and the Smithsonian Museums, among many other leadership, naval heritage, and team-building events.

"The most memorable moment during this week has been being able to share this whole experience with my family," said Johnson. "Being able to represent my community and all sailors makes this experience so impactful. Interacting with the MCPON has given me

foundational tools to take back to my battalion and spread throughout to all sailors."

Johnson, from West Bend, graduated from West Bend West High School in 2006. He joined the Navy in January 2007 and reported to Gulfport, Mississippi for Builder "A" School in April 2007. He reported to his first duty station Naval Mobile Construction Battalion (NMCB) Eleven in Gulfport, Mississippi in June 2007. He deployed with Joint Task Force to Iraq in 2009.

In March 2010, he deployed to Southern Philippines, attached to Combined Joint Special Operations Task Force-Philippines. He then transferred in 2012 to Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island, and was assigned as the Facilities Director.

In July 2015, Johnson arrived to Naval Mobile Construction Battalion One where he deployed to Detachment One as an Outstation Leader. In February 2016, he deployed as the Delta Operations Chief to Rota, Spain. In August 2018, he was hand selected as Detail Poland's Assistant Officer-In-Charge in support of Co-operability between the Polish and U.S. Forces.

Johnson is designated as Seabee Combat Warfare Specialist, Expeditionary Warfare Specialist, and Information Warfare. His awards include the Joint Serv-

ices Achievement Medal, five Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medals, Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal, and various other awards.

"I think that my work ethic is something I attribute to my hometown, and growing up," said Johnson. "Serving in the Navy has been a whirlwind, it is not just a job, but a family. Being promoted is an absolute milestone in my career. It is humbling and has increased my focus to give back. I want to be able to give back to all sailors to mentor and be mentored."

Five Brothers Involved In Car Crash

"We can't confirm yet if they were wearing seatbelts. It rolled so many times, but that is part of the investigation, as to who was sitting where, and who was wearing what for seatbelts," Hoell said.

This is not the first fatal accident at that location. However, this is the first fatal crash since road improvements were made a couple years ago, according to Hoell.

"The vast majority of our fatalities were weather related, whether it be snow or water. Ever since they did the improvements, we haven't had any fatalities. This accident on Wednesday was not a result of road conditions," Hoell said.

Emergency responders were affected by

last week's incident.

"Our chaplain did a debrief with everybody involved on Friday, but it is still difficult," Hoell said. "It's a unique situation that so many family members were involved in a critical accident like this."

The Germantown Fire Department responded, along with ambulances from Menomonee Falls and Richfield. All five were transported to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee.

The Germantown Police Department was assisted by the Washington County Sheriff's Department and the Wisconsin State Patrol, which is conducting a traffic crash reconstruction. The crash remains under investigation.

Olla Family Receives Support From Community

The page features a photograph of Tony and Fay Olla and their 10 children. The Ollas homeschool their children and have a strong faith, which is evident in their posts on the page.

On Wednesday, May 29, five of the brothers were involved in a single-vehicle crash on Interstate 41, south of Holy Hill Road.

Through this ordeal, they have felt the support of their friends and family. They also have felt the prayers and support of people they have never met, from far and near.

"We cannot even begin to express our gratitude for all the love, support, and prayers our family is receiving from the multitudes of people out there. Although this hardship seems too heavy to bear at times, we are strengthened and comforted by all the

love surrounding us—reminding us that our Heavenly Father is holding us close. The words thank you simply aren't enough," the family wrote on the page.

On Monday night, Fay and Tony gave an update on the GoFundMe page.

Valentin, 15, was pronounced dead on May 31 due to severe trauma to his brain. His heart was kept pumping and oxygen kept his body working until the staff at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin could find matches for his organs. Val was able to donate his strong heart, liver, kidneys and pancreas to people whose lives were on the line.

The hallways in the hospital were lined with close friends, family and hospital staff as Val was given a walk of honor on his way to give the gift of life to others.

Luciano, 13, remains in critical condition at Children's Hospital with a severe injury to his head. According to the GoFundMe page, he had been heavily sedated and on paralytic meds to provide the best environment for the healing of his brain for the first five days in the intensive care unit.

"We saw a beacon of hope yesterday morning when he briefly opened his eyes when the doctor called his name. The nurses and doctors here at Children's have been absolutely phenomenal and we are indebted to them for their care of our sons. Please continue to pray for his healing and recovery," Fay wrote on the GoFundMe page Monday night.

The page started with a goal of raising \$25,000, but by Tuesday afternoon, over \$160,000 had been

raised toward a new goal of \$200,000.

On Monday, another \$7,000 was donated to the family after the Coffee Corner Bistro matched funds donated in a tip jar.

The support has been more than financial. Friends, family and community members have written notes of love and encouragement for the family on the GoFundMe page. There are even notes from people the family has never met from across the country.

"The Olla family has touched so many people's lives. The outpouring of love and support is evidence of that," Hetebueg said.

Four KMS Students Selected For State Music Program

Four students from Kewaskum Middle School have been selected to perform in the Wisconsin School Music Association (WSMA) Middle Level State Honors Music Project.

Two of the students, JJ Banovich (baritone) and Brianna Boegel (clarinet), were selected to play in the honors band, while Abby Gerhartz (vocals) and Mallerie Daley (vocals) were selected for the honors choir.

"It is a big deal — this is the highest honor that there is for middle school students in the state," said Rachael Holmes, band director at KMS.

About 1,100 students from across the state auditioned for the program. Only 311 were chosen for the state band, symphony or choir.

Kewaskum Middle School has been represented for the past several years. Many of the other students in the program come from larger school districts.

"Typically a school this size would have nobody make it in. To have one student would be amazing. And to have this many kids getting in, fairly consistently from year to year, that is comparable to districts that are many sizes bigger than us," Holmes said.

Teachers from across the state select their top students to audition for the program.

"I am pretty select with who I send. It should be

the best representation of what our school and our group is all about," KMS Choir Director Andrew Dahlberg said.

To audition, the Kewaskum students went to Dousman Middle School. They performed scales, a solo and sight reading for a judge. All four of the young musicians from KMS admitted to being nervous.

"It was really scary because I didn't know what to expect at all," said

Abby, who is a seventh grader at KMS.

"I was really nervous," eighth-grader JJ recalled. "I kind of overplayed the night before. My mouth was really sore from practicing. So I couldn't play, and I was really scared. There was one high note in my music. Once I hit the high note, and made a sound, I gained all my confidence back."

All four of the students managed to overcome

their nerves.

"I was nervous at first. I was singing my song in the car to practice on the way there in the car. But once I got there, I was OK once I started singing. The judge was really nice — I was nervous for nothing. I always get that way," eighth-grader Mallerie said. "It was a great experience."

Brianna, who is in eighth grade, found it to be not as nerve-wracking as performing at the

solo ensemble festival. Here, she had to play for only one judge rather than an entire room full of people.

"I wasn't as nervous as I was for solo ensemble because there weren't a lot of people watching," she said.

Letters notifying the students that they had been selected for the state honors music program were mailed out about a week ago. Receiving that letter was a

great moment for the students. They each remember exactly where they were when they got the news.

Brianna was reading when her dad told her there was something in the mail. At first he teased her and told Brianna he wasn't giving her the letter.

"But then he gave it to me," she said with a smile.

"I was mowing the lawn when my dad told me I got something in the mail. I was ready to have my face on like it's OK, next year I will try it," said Abby, who was happily surprised by the good news.

"It is a huge honor to be able to represent the school in this way," Abby said.

JJ was hoping that the honor might get him out of some work.

"It was funny because me and my mom were sweeping the deck. I didn't want to sweep the deck, so I was like is there any way I can get out of this? So I said, 'I'm going to go check the mail,' and I did, and found the letter in there," JJ said.

JJ read the letter and found out that he had made the band.

"Then I had to finish sweeping the deck," he said.

The Middle Level State Honors students will perform at the Wisconsin State Music Conference in Waunakee in October. They will receive their music in August and meet for the first time the day before their fall performance.

Karnitz, Mueller, Scholten, Budzban Tally PDTR A-Main Victories

Despite threatening skies and unseasonably cold temperatures, the Plymouth Dirt Track Racing show pressed on with a highly competitive night of racing action in all four regular divisions on a well-manicured, multi-groove racing surface at the Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth on Saturday, June 1.

Kevin Karnitz of West Bend became the first repeat winner in PDTR A-main competition this season as he captured the 25-lap Richard's of Dunbar 360 Sprint Car main event. After going winless at Plymouth during the 2018 season, four-time PDTR Late Model champion Brad Mueller of Random Lake broke into the victory column with a win in the 25-lap Gasroots Project Late Model A-main.

Oostburg's Luke Scholten survived a heated duel with Tyler Kulow of Plymouth to capture the 25-lap Klips & Tips Grand National A-main, while Chris Budzban of Appleton made his first-ever trip to The Plymouth Dirt Track pay off with a victory in the 25-lap Cellcom B Mod A-main.

The initial start of the 360 Sprint Car A-main was aborted when 2017 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champ Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh bicycled his machine in turn one and rolled to a stop in turn two to bring out the first of two caution flags in the event. McMullen made suspension repairs in the work area and returned to the track at the rear of the field.

On the complete restart, polesitter Tony Wondra of Campbellsport outpowered 2008 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett, who started second, to seize the lead in turn four of the opening lap. Two

laps later, fourth starter Jim Melis of Glenbeulah found grip in the middle of the fast and smooth racing surface to work his way into second.

On lap six, Melis used the middle lane to gain the top spot from Wondra in turn two. By lap 10, Melis had built up a half-straightaway cushion over Wondra, while fifth starter Kevin Karnitz passed Fassbender to gain third place on lap 12.

As Melis encountered lapped traffic, Wondra was able to cut the gap significantly as the hard-charging Karnitz, who was hooked up along the inside groove, moved in to make it a three-way duel for the top spot.

Entering turn four on lap 16, the trio went three-wide for the lead with Melis riding high, Wondra using the middle groove and Karnitz working the low line. Karnitz powered under both Wondra and Melis to grab the lead in a thrilling, hold-your-breath move exiting turn four.

Two laps later, Travis Arenz of Sheboygan brought out the second and final caution flag when he stopped in turn four. After Arenz went to the work area, made repairs and returned to the track, Karnitz seized the lead on the restart, while Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum, who started third, used the high groove to maneuver around Melis into second place in turn two on lap 19.

Karnitz held on the rest of the way en route to his fourth career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory and sixth career Midwest Sprint Car Association main event triumph. Wenninger finished second, Melis placed third, sixth starter Josh Walter of Plymouth wound up fourth and Wondra completed the top five.

In the Late Model A-main, two caution periods for spins negated the first two attempts to start the race. The next attempt to start the race resulted in polesitter and defending PDTR Late Model champion Justin Schmidt of Cleveland and Taylor Scheffler of Waukesha being sent to the rear of the field for failing to comply with restart regulations.

With a revamped front row featuring polesitter and 2016 PDTR Late Model champion Tim Buhler of Greenbush and Brad Mueller on the outside of the front row, Buhler snagged the lead on lap one along the low groove while Mueller road the high groove and sixth starter Turk Letizia of Milwaukee ducked low to pressure Mueller for second place.

Mueller continued to work the high line to perfection in the opening laps to pressure Buhler for the lead. On lap five, Mueller shot around Buhler with a high move in turn four to assume the top spot.

With Mueller holding his own at the front of the field, Schmidt was slicing way through the pack after restarting the race from the rear of the field. On lap 12, Schmidt moved into fourth along the outside lane.

Six laps later, Letizia dove low to slip underneath the high riding Buhler to assume second on lap 18 with Schmidt following into third on lap 19. By lap 20, Mueller had built up a half-lap cushion over Letizia. On lap 21, the hard-charging Schmidt bolted around Letizia with a high move in turn two and quickly cut into Mueller's large advantage.

Schmidt's stirring run through the field came up a bit short as he simply ran out of laps in the race, which went non-stop after the initial

string of unsuccessful starts. Mueller beat Schmidt to the line by a quarter-straightaway margin to secure his 20th career PDTR Late Model A-main victory, which ranks him second on the all-time PDTR Late Model A-main victory list. It was Mueller's first PDTR Late Model A-main triumph since September 9, 2017.

Schmidt had to settle for second, Letizia was third, Buhler finished fourth and Joe Bongiorno of Milwaukee finished fifth after originally starting seventh.

Donny Kulow of Elkhart Lake worked around polesitter Josh Pierce of Random Lake to lead the opening lap of the Grand National A-main, while 2018 PDTR Grand National champion Matt Loehr of Dotyville, who was behind the wheel of J.J. Pagel's car, worked the high groove from his fourth starting spot to take over second lap two. A pair of caution flags for spins on lap three and lap five slowed the pace before third starter Tyler Kulow used a well-timed restart to seize the top spot with a high move on lap six.

Meanwhile, Luke Scholten was making his presence felt moving into third place from his eighth starting spot on lap eight. One lap later, Scholten moved in to pressure Tyler Kulow along the low line. With Scholten running low and Tyler Kulow riding high, the two drivers battled side by side for five consecutive laps before Scholten finally surged ahead in turn four on lap 13.

As the leaders began to encounter slower traffic on lap 15, Tyler Kulow cut the gap and moved into the lead in turn four on lap 19. After two more cautions for spins on lap 19 and lap 21, Tyler Kulow held the top spot as Pierce

grabbed ahold of the high line to power into second on lap 22.

However, the fifth and final caution slowed the pace one again for a single-car spin in turn two. On the restart, Scholten used the high groove to find some extra bite, which launched his car into the top spot for good exiting turn two on lap 23.

Scholten then pulled away over the final two laps to secure his 11th career PDTR Grand National A-main victory and his first of the 2019 season. Tyler Kulow took second, Pierce placed third, Steven Weber of Plymouth finished fourth after starting sixth and 10th starter Dustin Weiss of Iron Ridge placed fifth in his first appearance of the season at Plymouth.

The B Mod A-main featured a pair of visiting drivers to PDTR as Bill Edler of Howards Grove rolled off from the pole with Chris Budzban, who was making his first-ever appearance at Plymouth, on the outside of the front row.

After a close battle through the first three corners, Edler grabbed the initial lead in turn four of the opening lap. The first of three caution flags appeared on lap two for a spin involving Marcus Hoepfner of Hartford. On the restart, Budzban flexed his muscle to challenge Edler utilizing the inside lane, pulling even briefly on lap six.

As the leaders negotiated slower traffic, Budzban used the slower cars to his advantage and slipped ahead of Edler and into the lead on lap nine. Not one to back down, Edler regrouped and mounted another challenge for the lead starting on lap 15 as the leaders encountered more lapped machines.

The pace slowed again on lap 18 when

Steve Lorier of Sheboygan spun in turn two. Another caution appeared on lap 19 for a Marcus Hoepfner spin. On the restart, Budzban powered away from Edler and was not to be denied as he racked up his first career PDTR B Mod A-main victory in his debut main event start at the Plymouth track.

Edler was second, Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls, who started fourth, placed third, Cascade's Barry Maas came up from his ninth starting spot to place fourth and seventh starter Travis Schmidt of Waldo rounded out the top five.

Justin Miller of Plymouth won the first 12-lap 360 Sprint Car B main and Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee captured the second 12-lap 360 Sprint Car B main. Brandon Knepprath of Kewaskum was victorious in the B Mod B-main.

The fourth PDTR program of the 2019 season, which was presented by Pit Stop Pizza, featured a total of 92 cars, including 35 PDTR 360 Sprint Cars, 25 B Mods, 19 Grand Nationals and 13 Late Models.

The next PDTR racing program on Saturday, June 8, will feature the first of four scheduled appearances during the 2019 season for the Bumper to Bumper Interstate Racing Association 410 Sprint Car Series, which will be joined by the PDTR 360 Sprint Cars and Badger Midgets. Hot laps will start at 5:30 p.m. with IRA qualifying and racing to follow.

Meidl Is Lone Medal Winner In State Test

Kewaskum High's Abby Meidl made the podium in the pole vault in the WIAA State Track and Field competition held May 31 and June 1 in La Crosse.

On Friday, Meidl was perfect through 10-0, then missed once at 10-06 before clearing the height. She had three misses at 11 feet (11-0), bowing out of the competition. There were six girls tied at this 10-6, and based on misses, Meidl took fifth place in the competition. A year ago, she tied for fourth at 10-6.

The winner was Richland Center junior Abby Rynes, who cleared 11-06.

"She was disappointed. She thought she had more in her," KHS co-head coach Kris Evans said about Meidl, indicating the coaches reminded her getting to the podium "Is a pretty

darn good day."

"Abby represented Kewaskum well. She's a great student and a great athlete, and she had a great season," Evans said.

Jon Leister was the only KHS athlete to compete in Saturday's portion of the meet, and he had a good outing. After coming in with a throw of 128-03, which was last in the field of 16 in the discus, Leister finished his high school career with a throw of 136-07, which put him in ninth place overall.

"He (Leister) went in with low expectations, but he surprised himself," Evans said. "To go from last to the finals, he was more surprised than anyone."

Emily Halterman and most of the other Division 2 discus throwers had difficulty duplicating their sectional marks in the competition on Friday. Halterman's best toss was a 101-05, good

for 13th in the field of 16.

"She (Halterman) was happy to be there. We're super proud of her," Evans said, indicating Halterman graduated early so, "This was her last hurrah."

Evans also praised weight coach Katie Jungers for her efforts.

Kewaskum's other female qualifier, Maddy Thull, tripped on one of the hurdles and finished last in her heat of the 100 hurdles. Still, that

doesn't take away from the good efforts she came up with in the regional and sectional meets, according to Evans, who said Thull plans to work hard in the off-season and get back to La Crosse again next year.

The boys' 4x400 relay also ran into some difficulties. The foursome of Ben Fracs, Eli Bartelt, Jermaine Thull and Tyler Heus turned in a time of 3:41.79, the slowest in

their heat.

"We were disappointed in the outcome and the effort," Evans said about the race.

Also Tyler Heus was unable to reach the finals of the 200. In his heat on May 31, Hues was clocked in 23.13, which was the 13th best time in the trials. Only the top-10 make finals.

"You go to state. You're in a field with the best runners in the state," Evans said, not-

ing Heus did amazing things this spring. "He was the leader on our team this year."

The state meet marked the final time Evans would coach the Kewaskum teams. He had taken a teaching and coaching position at Evansville for next year.

"It's been a pleasure serving the Kewaskum community and especially the students," Evans said. "It's been fun."

KHS Softball Season Has A Heartbreaking End

This wasn't just the end to a season. Kewaskum's 6-2 loss to Kettle Moraine Lutheran in the May 28 Division 2 softball sectional semifinal was the end of an era.

The six KHS seniors, playing in what would become their final game, won 85 games in their four years of high school ball, made one state appearance, won one conference title and tied for another.

"These four last years ... five last years, I have been blessed," veteran KHS Jeff Gosse said after consoling the Indians who had so many highs during their career which unfortunately ended rather painfully.

Gosse was forthright about how the Chargers came out on top. "They came in, and they hit the ball very well tonight. They got the clutch hits, and we didn't," he said. "You've got to give them a lot of credit. They made defensive plays when they needed to."

The visiting Chargers did all their damage in the fourth and seventh innings. They scored two runs in the fourth to erase Kewaskum's early 1-0 lead which came when cleanup hitter Ashley Clausing lashed a double down the right-field line to score Maddie Geidel who singled after one out.

After going three-up, three-down in the first three innings, the Chargers got to KHS ace Kennedy Lehn in the top of the fourth, starting with a single to

center field by Sophia Heckendorf, who stole second but was gunned down at home on a great throw by center fielder Abby Baumann after Jordyn Heckendorf's single.

Jordyn Heckendorf went to second on the throw home, then pitcher Kaitlyn Scherf helped her own cause with a single, putting runners at the corners for Brooke Voigt, who hit a fly ball deep enough to left to allow Jordyn Heckendorf to tag up and race for home. The throw was on the money, and KHS catcher Leah Theusch put the tag on her but it was too late, according

to the home plate umpire.

With the score now all knotted up at 1-1, Jamie Maas, the Chargers number seven hitter, hit a 1-and-2 pitch to center field for a single and a 2-1 KML lead.

Kewaskum had been behind in several other games this year but rallied to win. This time, the Indians just couldn't come up with a hit at the right time. They had the bases loaded in the fifth, via a two-out single by Lehn, an intentional walk to Maddie Geidel and an infield hit by Tara Theusch.

Up next was Clausing, who was 1x2, but this time the left-handed

Scherf got her to hit a comebacker near the mound for an easy third out.

Kewaskum had the tying run on second in the sixth after Kaitlyn Miller singled and was sacrificed to second by Kaitlyn Leitheiser. This time Ashley Trapp popped out to the shortstop and Leah Theusch hit a fly ball to left that was gathered in by Maas.

One inning to go and KML lead by a single run. Kewaskum fans were still optimistic because the Indians would have the top of their batting order coming up in the seventh. That optimism waned when the Chargers scored four times in their last at-bat.

The big hit was a bases-loaded double to

right field by Scherf. Before that, Ellie Kudek singled over the shortstop; Kyra Herman beat out an infield single; Sophia Heckendorf hit a 1-and-2 pitch to center field and Jordyn Heckendorf, looking at a 1-and-2 count, followed with a bloop single to the first pitch from Lehn.

The inning ended when Lehn got Voigt to ground out to short and Maas on a liner to second, thanks to a good catch by Sydney Kertscher.

Now down by five, the Indians needed base runners and then big hits. Lehn delivered a one-out single up the middle, and after Geidel hit into a fielder's choice,

Tara Theusch and Clausing had back-to-back singles, scoring a run, but the game ended when Kaitlyn Miller hit a grounder to the second baseman.

"Lefties (pitchers) give us a hard time. We struggle against lefties," Gosse said, adding, "All year long, lefty 'slappers' have been giving us fits, and they did again tonight," referring to KML's hitters from the left side.

Lehn gave up 12 hits, struck out six and didn't walk a single batter, and Gosse said, "Kennedy had an off night ... That happens. Her rise ball wasn't going to the level it needed to." Lehn ended the season with a mark of 13-3, 163 strikeouts and just 15 walks.

Sophia Heckendorf had three hits, while Jordyn Heckendorf, Scherf, Maas and Kudek all had two. Lehn, Tara Theusch, Clausing and Leitheiser all had two for the Indians.

Scherf gave up 10 hits, while striking out three and issuing one intentional walk.

Kewaskum ends its season at 19-6, while KM Lutheran (20-4) moved on to play New Berlin West on May 30 in Plymouth for the sectional title and the right to play in the Division 2 state tournament.

1973 Was A Memorable Year For Kewaskum Golfers

It was a record-breaking year for the Kewaskum High golfers.

The Indians finished the 1973 season with a perfect 11-0 mark in dual meets, set new individual and team records in winning the Scenic Moraine Conference title by 29 shots and advanced to the WIAA sectional tournament — there was just division for boys' golf in those days — for the third year in a row.

The dual meet season ended with the Indians defeating Pewaukee, 165-173 on the Naga Waukee Golf Course behind a three-over-par 39 by Jim Gaffke. Then it was tournament time,

and what a time it was for Kewaskum, which featured four seniors and a sophomore.

Kewaskum hosted the 18-hole test, and senior Jeff Koth had a great day, driving, hitting approach shots and putting. He finished with a round of 69, breaking the current Scenic Moraine record by six shots.

The Indians finished with a 305 total, also a Scenic Moraine record and took home four of the first-team all conference medals. The Scenic Moraine broke up several years later, and the two KHS records were never broken.

In addition to Koth and Gaffke, the other regulars were Chuck McClain, Tom Hensler and Scott Koth, with Steve Spoerl also seeing action on the varsity squad.

Kewaskum then placed second in the regionals with a 328 total, three shots behind Sheboygan North. Not much went right at the sectionals. Playing on a rain-soaked course with some unusual rules in force, the Indians missed out on qualifying for state after finishing fifth in the field.

Jeff Koth went on to become a Lutheran minister in Illinois. Hensler has retired from his position as a metallurgist for Rolls Royce in Indiana. Gaffke still resides in Kewaskum. He worked in tool and die, while Scott Koth is a businessman in Illinois. McClain passed away in his mid-40s. Spoerl still lives in Kewaskum.

Other KHS scores included a nine-over par 81 by Andrew Carlton, who drew the nod to play in the fifth position for the Indians. Brad Buechel and Talon Ralph both shot 82 while Toree Ralph carded an 83.

The 36-hole test was set to conclude June 4, which was after publication time. **Writer's note:** A committee is currently working on establishing a Hall of Fame at KHS. Interested parties are invited to an open meeting on June 12 at 6 p.m. in the KHS Library. Until then, the Statesman will be featuring accomplishments of former KHS athletes and teams.

KHS Golfers Get The Three-peat And Head For State Again; In Fifth Place After First 18

Even though they only got in nine holes of practice on the Racine Meadowbrook Country Club course, the Kewaskum High team pretty well mastered it during the WIAA Division 2 sectional held there on May 28.

The veteran Indian golfers came in with a 326 total to win the title by 10 strokes over Lake Country Lutheran. Those two teams advance to the University Ridge Golf Course for the state meet, which was held June 3-4.

"For the third year in a row, we are sectional champs and state bound," KHS coach Casey Scheel said after the meet. The Indians used a familiar blueprint to come out on top — consistent scoring and

staying away from high numbers. The four counters posted scores from 77 to 85, led by seniors Jacob Schlosser and Brad Buechel, who carded a six-over-par 77 and seven-over-par 78, respectively.

Schlosser, who played in the number one spot all season, was very consistent with nine-hole scores of 38 and 39. Buechel had the best score of the day on the front nine, a one-over par 36, then had three shaky holes on numbers 10-11-12 before getting back on track to finish with a 42.

The other two counters were the Ralph brothers, Talon, who shot a 44-41—85 and Toree an 86 on identical 43s. Had any of these players stumbled, senior Travis Griesemer shot a 46-44—90, which was

good enough for tied for 29th in the field of 71 players.

"The guys played consistent today and were able to avoid big mistakes. We only had one birdie as a team which is a surprise but also shows we were steady throughout," Scheel said. "It was a pretty difficult course with long thick rough and fast greens," Scheel went on. "The weather conditions weren't ideal with temps in the 50s and pretty breezy."

The Indians finished fifth at state a year ago and realistically have a chance for a top three finish this year. The main competition is likely to come from defending champion Madison Edgewood Sacred Heart, which won the Prairie du Chien Sectional with a 312 total,

Lakeland High School, the winner of the Hayward Sectional with an impressive 303, one shot ahead of Rice Lake's 3-4.

For the first round, the Indians will play in foursomes with Edgewood, Lakeland, and Marinette.

For much of the second half, the May 30 regional soccer match between Kewaskum and Seymour had overtime, perhaps even shootout, written all over it.

With the score knotted at 1-1 since the 18-minute mark, both teams had scoring opportunities but neither could convert until the KHS' Kennedy Adams drilled a low shot into the left corner of the net at 82:30, giving the home team a 2-1 lead which the Indians were able to protect until the final horn sounded.

It certainly was, helping to break the ice after being shut out in recent East Central tournament games against Winneconne, Plymouth and Kettle Moraine Lutheran. Also helping was the goal tending by sophomore Nicole Butz, who

was credited with six saves, none more important than one that came at 71:00 off the foot of Seymour speedster, Taylor Olson. Butz dove for the ball, tapping it safely away from the net on her right side.

"I thought it was close so I dove for it," Butz said, figuring, "Better to be safe than sorry."

KHS coach Luke Piwoni also felt this was a big play in the game. "That one was looking like it could have found the far post," he said, indicating Seymour was missing a few players in their first meeting, and the Thunder looked a little faster and stronger this time around.

"She's a really good player. She's really fast, and she handles the ball well," Butz said of Olson, who scored Seymour's lone goal at 18:22 in the first half with the assist

going to Kelcie Karweick.

Butz, who has been playing goalie since fifth grade, said what she likes best about the position is, "how you can see everything (in front of you)."

Piwoni, who came to the game with his arm in a sling from a mishap that occurred during an assembly at the high school, said he got a good defensive effort

from Andrea Butz, who has only played there several times before, and he was happy he was able to have Elena Vlotho and Emma Penfield available for short spurts after the two had missed games because of injuries.

Piwoni also praised Krueger for helping to "set the tone," adding the girls are developing a good sense of setting up shots. "It's just a mat-

ter of finishing, and thankfully we were able to do that at the end."

In the regional final on June 1, Kewaskum struggled to stay with powerful Appleton Xavier in the game played in Appleton. The final score was 10-1 in the Hawks' favor. The Indians finished the season at 15-9-1. The 15 victories is a school record for the Indians.




