## Jay Fisher Resigns From School Board

There is an open seat on the Kewaskum School Board after Jay Fisher resigned from the position on Tuesday, July 9, because he is moving out of the district.

Fisher wrote a letter of resignation, dated July 9, to Board President Mark Sette stating that he is downsizing his home situation. Fisher is moving to West Bend, outside of the Kewaskum School District boundaries.

As outlined by state statute, the remaining members of the Kewaskum Board of Education will appoint someone to fill the existing vacancy on the board.

Any qualified elector of the district who lives within the Kewaskum School District boundaries who would like to be a candidate must file a letter of interest in the district administrator's

office.

The letter of interest must state that the person is a qualified elector who desires to be considered for the appointment to the school board. The letter should include name, address and phone number, along with a written statement which indicates the reason for seeking appointment to the board.

The written letter of interest, signed by the candidate, must be filed with the district administrator on or before July 31 at 4 p.m., to Kewaskum School District, P.O. Box 37, 1455 School St., Kewaskum, WI 53040.

Candidates may be expected to interview with the Board of Education during the month of August. The appointment may occur following the interviews.

## Excavation Begins For Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial

Machinery started moving the earth in front of the Kewaskum Annex building on Sunday, July 14. Excavation work for the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial had begun.

The ground is being prepared for the memorial, which will be a place for visitors to reflect on the events of September 11, 2001.

The excavation work is part of Phase One, which includes construction of the memorial's main rotunda and am-

phitheater. Work will also begin this year on Phase Four, which honors those who have served in the U.S. military.

The memorial is being constructed through the donations and support of numerous individuals, organizations and businesses from far and near.

Mark Schairer Excavating, which is based in Kewaskum, is donating its services for the project. The company will do all the grading and excavating at the site, including digging trenches and holes for the memorial's

footings.

"This could not be done without the population of Kewaskum and good people like Mark Schairer. What a great partnership this is," said Gordon Haberman, whose daughter Andrea Haberman was killed in the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.

Mark Schairer is proud to be part of the project.

"It is rewarding," he said.

## Farmington To Have Curbside Garbage Collection

Farmington residents will have curbside garbage and recycling pickup starting in January.

The Farmington Town Board voted on July 9 to approve Waste Management's proposal for curbside trash collection every week and recycling collection every other week at a cost of \$16.08 per unit per month starting January 1, 2020. The rate is guaranteed for the first year, then in 2021, the cost would follow the fuel price index.

The vote came nearly three months after the town board received feedback from town residents on the issue. At the annual town meeting on April 16, Farmington residents voted 127-15

in favor of having curbside garbage pickup.

Farmington residents currently have curbside recycling collection through Advanced Disposal, with the town footing the annual bill of approximately \$64,000. Beginning in January, that money will be freed up for other uses.

Residents previously could choose whether or not they had garbage collection. Beginning in January, every residence will be charged for garbage and recycling collection, whether or not they use the service.

Because residents cannot be billed for the service in this year, the town will have to foot the initial start-up fee so that service can be offered in January.

The board unanimously voted July 9 to fi-

nance the cost of starting up garbage and recycling collection. At last week's meeting, the board reviewed rate information from State Bank of Newburg and Cornerstone Community Bank. Rates ranged from 3.32 to 4.25 percent.

The board had proposals from two companies for the garbage pickup: Advanced Disposal and Waste Management.

"The service we have right now is Advanced, but there a lot of times we are not very satisfied with it," Town Chairman Chris Elbe said.

The board considered using money it will receive from the county for jurisdictional transfer of roads for the garbage collection rather than financing. However, the board agreed that the

money received from jurisdictional transfer of roads should be used on road maintenance.

"When it comes to the funding side of it, I think we should allocate the money from the county for the roads, and that's it. I feel we should borrow the money, as much as I hate saying that, so that we are not borrowing from one [fund] to pay another," Town Supervisor Mark Foyse said.

Residents will not see the new fee on their tax bills until the December 2020 tax bill comes out. That bill probably will only go through about October, according to Town Clerk Chris Schellinger. The second year that garbage collection is in effect, the tax bills should reflect a full year

## Jay Fisher Resigns From School Board

If the remaining six members on the board do not come to an agreement on who to appoint to the position within 60 days, the board president can appoint someone to the position, according to board policy.

"I am humbled and grateful for the opportunity to have been a part of such a successful and progressive era during my time in Kewaskum. What I am most proud of, during my five-plus years tenure with the school board, is that I have always kept the needs of our children first," Fisher wrote in his letter of resignation.

Fisher has served on the board since 2014.

He was a board member while the district worked on building projects at the high school and middle school.

"I enjoyed working through the referendum, and getting the schools and athletic fields built," Fisher said.

Fisher, who served as the treasurer for the Kewaskum Board of Education, is the executive director of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Washington County.

The person who is appointed to fill the vacant school board position will serve the remainder of Fisher's term, which ends in the spring. The position will then be on the spring ballot.

## Farmington Gets Jurisdictional Authority Of Portions Of DD And HH

At the Washington County Board of Supervisors meeting on July 10, supervisors voted 26-0 to approve the jurisdictional transfers of portions of County Trunk Highways DD and HH in the Town of Farmington and a transfer in the amount of \$640,000 from the General Fund to the Highway Department to fund the transactions.

The Farmington Town Board voted 2-1 on June

11 to approve the jurisdictional transfer of roads. Supervisor Doug Neumann was the lone dissenter on the issue.

"I know you guys don't agree with me on this, but I don't think this is a good idea. I think it is setting the town up for a lot of expense that we don't have funds for in the future. I know there

is a lot of money coming in now that we could use," Neumann said at the June 11 town board meeting.

"We have a couple of roads in this town that are absolutely horrendous that need some serious repair. This money will help make those roads good again for another 30 years also, plus

give us more money to do some other repairs," Town Supervisor Mark Foyse said at the June 11 meeting.

The Farmington Town Board agreed at the Town Board meeting on July 9 that funds received for the jurisdictional transfer should go toward road maintenance.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

### Structure Fire

On Sunday, July 14, at 8:56 p.m., a Washington County Sheriff's deputy had noticed smoke coming from the area of Kettle View Drive near Badger Road in the town of Kewaskum. Upon stopping at the residence of 8468 Kettle View Drive, he noticed an implement shed on fire. It was at this time that the homeowners

called 911.

Fire personnel responded from the following departments: Kewaskum, West Bend, Boltonville, Kohlsville, Campbellsport, Theresa, Fillmore, Allenton, and Jackson. Kewaskum police also assisted.

The shed, which had become fully engulfed, was extinguished by fire personnel. The shed

and its contents, were a total loss estimated at over \$100,000. Kettle View Drive was closed in the area for approximately three hours to facilitate firefighting. No one was injured as a result of the fire.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

## Collaborative Community Health Survey To Be Conducted

When "Management Decisions" calls, it is important to you and your family's health. Why?

Effective as of July 15, a community health needs assessment (CHNA) of Washington County will be underway. Management Decisions is the research firm that will be conducting a telephone survey of 400 randomly selected residents, and they will be making calls to cell phones and landlines until they have reached 400 people.

The CHNA is a collaborative initiative of: The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department, Aurora Health Care, Children's Hospital of Wisconsin and Froedtert & the Medical College of Wisconsin. The telephone survey will supplement a prior survey conducted in 2016 to provide updated data and the ability to analyze changes or trends since then.

"The findings of the survey are invaluable to the government, not-for-profit health systems, service and volunteer organizations in Washington County for developing plans and improving services to meet the most pressing community health needs," said Ann Christianson, interim health officer at the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department.

The survey focuses

on issues such as access to health care, tobacco use, alcohol use, diet, physical activity, cancer prevention, heart health, injury prevention, immunizations, children's health, mental health, and chronic disease. The survey responses will be completely anonymous.

The Community Health Survey is being conducted by Management Decisions in partnership with JKV Research, an independent, Wisconsin-based research firm that specializes in community surveys and data analytics.

The results will be released later this year. These community health surveys are aimed at meeting several objectives:

- Gathering local data to document health status related to the health priorities established by the state health plan.

- Identifying local health behaviors or risk factors that present opportunities for health promotion and health care cost reduction.

- Tracking the success of community health improvement activities.

- Allowing these partners to document population health indicators to help guide health improvement efforts.



# St. Lucas Moves Forward With Development

Over the past three weeks, you may have noticed three houses being torn down next to St. Lucas Lutheran Church and School on Parkview Drive in Kewaskum. Two of the houses served as parsonages and the third had been home to teachers at St. Lucas Lutheran School. Guelig Waste Removal and Demolition of Eden is doing the work.

In 2009 St. Lucas Lutheran Church engaged the Groth Design Group of Cedarburg to complete a study of their current church building. The study included input from various groups within the congregation. The need for more gathering space, better accessibility to the sanctuary, and accessible restrooms were identified as primary concerns.

After studying the cost of retrofitting the current church building to address these concerns versus the cost of constructing a new sanctuary, the congregation chose to pursue building a new church building. The master plan includes building a new sanctuary with expanded gathering space, restrooms on the same level of the sanctuary, and no steps up or down to enter the worship space. The goal is to remove any physical obstacles so everyone

can come to hear the Word of God.

The removal of the houses is in preparation for the eventual construction project. The master plan includes building a new church building connected to the school on the east side of Parkview Drive. The parking lot on the west side of the street will be improved and expanded.

Until the construction begins, the two lots on the east side of Parkview Drive will be planted with grass. The empty lot on the west side will be covered with gravel in preparation for eventual paving as a parking lot.

The house that stood closest to the school on the east side of the street served as a parsonage for pastors at St. Lucas Lutheran since the 1870s. The congregation purchased the house next to it in the early 1980s as a home for the Lutheran elementary school's principal. The house that stood on the west side of the street was purchased by St. Lucas Lutheran in 1969. Up until that time it had served as the parsonage for Peace Church. From 1976 through 1993 it housed teachers for St. Lucas Lutheran School. From 1993 through 2017 it was the parsonage for the congregation's associate pastor.



## Boat Trailer Donated To Washington County Dive Team

On July 2, the Washington County Dive Team received a boat trailer donated by the Manitou Group.

"This equipment will respond to water rescue incidents throughout the county. Having such outstanding community partners such as Manitou Group demonstrates their commitment to our community," Sheriff Martin Schulteis said.

Currently the dive team owns two Mercury Marine inflatable boats. One boat is kept at the Sheriff's Office and the other is kept at the West Bend Fire Department. Both boats were purchased around 2005. At

the time of the purchase of the boats, ATV trailers were purchased to transport and store the boats. Due to the trailers not being designed to be used in this fashion, the trailers have deteriorated and are showing their age. This new trailer will replace one of the current trailers.

Since the original purchase in 2005 the boating industry has improved the design and commonly sells trailers made exclusively for inflatable boats. The new trailers support the boat's weight evenly along the hull, keel, and transom. This design extends the life of the boat.

The trailers are made from materials designed not to damage the boat while in storage or while loading and unloading the boat.

Currently, the Washington County Dive Team consist of 32 volunteer divers from four fire departments and the Sheriff's Office. Equipment for the team is stored at the four station houses of the fire departments and the Sheriff's Office. The majority of Washington County Dive Team funding comes from an annual bowling / raffle fund raiser held in March.

## Stay Safe During Heat Wave — Stay Cool, Hydrated, And Informed During Extreme Heat

High temperatures are expected over much of Wisconsin during the next several days, and the Department of Health Services is reminding residents to take steps to stay cool during this heat wave.

"Hot temperatures and humidity can be dangerous and even deadly," said Jeanne Ayers, State Health Officer. "During this heat wave, it's important to stay cool and hydrated, and check weather conditions before heading outside."

Follow these tips to stay safe during extreme heat:

- Stay in air conditioning. When possible, stay in air conditioning on hot days. If you don't have air conditioning, head to libraries, malls, and other public spaces to keep cool.

- Check on loved ones. Be sure to check on older friends and neighbors who live alone and don't have air conditioning.

- Avoid going outside during the hottest part of the day. If you have to be outside, stick to the cooler morning and evening hours. Wear light, loose clothing and take frequent, air conditioned breaks.

- Beware of hot cars. Never leave a person or a pet in a parked car, even for a short time. On an 80 degree day, the temperature inside a car can reach 100 degrees in less than 10 minutes.

- Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water on hot days. Avoid alcohol and hot, heavy meals. Watch your local weather forecasts so you can plan outdoor activities safely.

Pay attention to any extreme heat alerts.

Remember that anyone can get sick from the heat. In Wisconsin, people ages 15-34 are the most likely to go to the emergency room for getting sick from the heat. No matter your age or how healthy you are, it's important to stay cool and hydrated, and check the forecast before heading outside.

If you start feeling overheated, weak, dizzy, nauseated, or have muscle cramps, you could be experiencing heat illness. Move to air conditioning, drink water, get under a fan, and put on cool washcloths. If your symptoms worsen or don't improve, go to the emergency room.

## Washington County Fair To Feature Some Great Musical Headliners

This year's Washington County Fair kicks off on Tuesday, July 25. Check out this year's Silver Lining Amphitheater music line-up, which features country stars Dylan Scott with Travis Denning and Mitchell Tenpenny, and Billy Currington with Nora Collins, and rock stars Stone Temple Pilots.

### Thursday, July 25, Lineup

Kicking off three nights of national entertainment on Thursday, July 25, will be Dylan Scott. The show will feature special guests Mitchell Tenpenny and Travis Denning.

It's a long way from the outskirts of Bastrop, Louisiana, to the number one spot at country radio, each mile marked by passion, perseverance and sweat. But rising star Dylan Scott has made the trek.

"It's like anything else, you have to work at it if you want it," he says. "You can't sit back and expect someone else to make it happen for you, you've gotta do it yourself."

With his romantic, platinum certified number one hit "My Girl," and gold-certified Top 5 smash "Hooked," Scott has certainly done that, paying his dues and transforming real-life experience into chart-topping success. Now with the album Dylan Scott Deluxe Edition, a new chapter begins with three powerful new tracks joining the original 13.

"When you see people smiling and forgetting about the work week and whatever's going on

in their life, that's what's inspiring to me," he explains. "You always think 'How cool would it be to write a song and go out to perform it, and have people know your music?' But when it actually happens, it's even better than you imagined."

Opening for Scott is Mitchell Tenpenny whose first single and number one hit "Drunk Me" has earned more than 120 million on-demand streams and surpassed 500,000 certifiable units in the U.S. The New York Times named it one of the best songs of 2018, and the singer claims that he knew the song was special as soon as he recorded it.

On the heels of his RIAA-certified Gold single, "Drunk Me," comes Tenpenny's major label debut album, Telling All My Secrets. Revealing a wide range of influences and a level of assurance and confidence that comes from already having years of songwriting and touring behind him, the record marks the arrival of an artist recently singled out by Billboard as a pick to "break out" by the end of 2018, and as one of Pandora's Artists to Watch in 2019.

The other special guest, Travis Denning just released his debut single "David Ashley Parker From Powder Springs" and when not touring is working on recording his debut album.

Rocking the amphitheater on Friday, July 26, will be none other than one of the best-selling bands of the 90s – Stone Temple Pilots.

Stone Temple Pilots are no strangers to change. Unpredictably has shaped the Grammy-winning group since it emerged as one of the best-selling bands of the 1990s. More than 25 years later, the band is reborn once again on its seventh studio album – its first with new singer Jeff Gutt, a veteran of the Detroit music scene. STP founding members Dean DeLeo, Robert DeLeo and Eric Kretz introduced Gutt in November, moments before he joined them on stage at the Troubadour in Los Angeles for the band's first concert together.

The path leading up to that show began in September 2016 when Gutt was invited to join the band after an extensive search to find the group's third singer. The transition was virtually seamless, Kretz recalls.

"The chemistry was there from the start, and Jeff kept coming up with one great melody after another. We ended up

finishing 14 songs, which is the most that Stone Temple Pilots has ever recorded for an album."

The group recorded over several months in Los Angeles at Robert's home studio. One of the earliest songs to take shape was "Meadow," a straight-ahead rocker that became the album's lead single. "We'd written several songs before Jeff joined, and he took everything we threw at him and ran with it lyrically and melodically. What impressed all of us is how he lets the song dictate his direction instead of the other way around," Robert says.

Gutt says the band really clicked after writing its first song together, a track called "The Art of Letting Go." "Dean was messing around on an acoustic guitar and I started singing along. Pretty soon, everyone was in the room and all the pieces fell into place. It's such a beautiful song and something we're all very proud of."

The opening band will be announced at a later date.

### Saturday, July 27, Lineup

The final night of national entertainment on Saturday July 27 will

feature Billy Currington with special guest Nora Collins.

Billy Currington's latest album bears the breezy title Summer Forever, but the talented Georgia native has spent more than a decade in the spotlight proving he's truly a man for all seasons. Possessing one of the smoothest and most distinct voices in any genre of music, Currington is equally skilled at delivering upbeat summertime anthems as well as exploring the complexities of life and love with a poignant ballad. On Summer Forever, Currington's sixth studio album, he brings both with a collection of songs that will take the listener on a riveting musical journey and leave them breathless at the end of the ride.

Wherever they're at listening to this album, I want to leave them with a happy and peaceful feeling."

Nora Collins brings a confident and youthful originality to country music – a style she describes as "fun, flirty, relatable and honest." That individuality is evident in her new EP, Strings. Each song captures her energetic spirit and her talent for songwriting. Her music has already gained the attention of Billboard, Rolling Stone Country, CMT, Radio Disney and more. She was recently named one of The Boot's 2019 Artists to Watch.

"When people hear my music, my hope is that they will connect to the songs," Collins says. "There is nothing more special to me than knowing that my lyrics moved someone. Music is the universal language that connects us all, and it's so cool to see that in action."

# 2019 WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR

## Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction Celebrates 50 Years

The first Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction, was held July 23, 1970 at the Washington County Fair Grounds in Slinger.

Washington County patterned the first Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction after neighboring Ozaukee County's "Red Meat Sale," which was held one year prior.

Several community-minded individuals formed the first Washington County Fair Meat Animal Sale Committee. Members of this first committee came from various backgrounds. Maurice Hovland at the time was the Washington County agriculture agent and also served as secretary of the Washington County Fair. Ernst Boehlke was from Jackson. John Kratz, a member of the Washington County Board and manager of West Bend Elevator, was in charge of sales promotion and getting the word out to the

public. Dick Roembke, from Jackson, was in charge of preparing facilities. Dick Roembke is the only surviving member of the original Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction Committee. He remains on the committee, giving his time, talent and knowledge the last 50 years.

When you mention the Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction, you might think of Roy Esser, who played a major role in starting the event. Esser was the first general chairman of the committee and was vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum High School.

This committee's mission was to start an event that would give youth, enrolled in swine, beef and sheep projects, an opportunity to sell their project animal at an annual sale.

All species were judged on Thursday, the first day of the fair, with the auction taking place that night. The philosophy was that the buyers

would be able to advertise their purchase during the duration of the fair.

The first auction was held indoors in the Cattle Barn at the Slinger Fairgrounds. The Auction Ring consisted of a flatbed trailer and a temporary auction ring. In the years that followed, the auction was held either inside the Cattle Barn or outside in the Show Ring, depending on the weather. In the early years, decorations consisted of evergreen branches obtained from the Jackson Swamp. The auction has been at its present location since 1999, when the Washington County Fair moved.

According to an article that appeared in a local newspaper, dated July 21, 1970, a new event was to take place at the Washington County Fair in Slinger. The article states, "A new event this year, which is expected to attract widespread interest, is the 'meat animal' or 'finished animal' auction, which is sched-

uled for 7:30 p.m. on opening or 'Entry Day' on Thursday, July 23."

On July 28, 1970, it was reported, "An enthusiastic crowd of buyers and spectators jammed into the cattle barn at the Washington County Fair on Thursday evening for the first annual Junior Market Sale of finished animals." The article went on to explain that all of the animals brought above market price and were sold on a "per pound" basis.

Two of the champion buyers were West Bend Elevator and Kewaskum Frozen Foods. West Bend Elevator is a family owned operation and has been a supporter of the meat animal sale for the last 50 years. Kewaskum Frozen Foods has changed ownership through the years, but has also been a supporter of the meat animal sale and has hosted the annual Carcass Show for the last 50 years.

Continuously improving and building upon this annual event, dairy beef was added to the Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction in 1985, with Brenda Oelhafen selling her Champion Dairy Beef.

The volunteer auctioneers at that first event were Rollie Bast and Ernie Kueffner, who are no longer with us. Ron Bast (Rollie Bast's son) has continued in his father's footsteps and continues to be an auctioneer at the Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction. Pat O'Brien joined the two auctioneers in 1971, and as the auction grew, additional auctioneers have given their time for the

youth of Washington County. In an effort to thank the numerous bidders and buyers, a pre-sale social was started by the Schmidt, Roembke, and Etta families, who donated the food, respectively the beef, lamb and pork. This grew into what is today's Pre-Sale Social, which served 283 people in 2018.

Mr. and Mrs. Greg Nigh hosted the first annual Carcass Show July 28, 1970, at Nigh's Kewaskum Frozen Foods in Kewaskum. It was conducted in cooperation with Roy Esser, Kewaskum High School Agriculture Instructor; Don Jaworski, West Bend Vo-Tech Young & Adult Farmer Instructor; and Maurice Hovland, Washington County Agricultural Agent. Buyers have been given the opportunity to have their purchased animals processed at various processing facilities, namely Kewaskum Frozen Foods, Loehr's Meat Service, Gehrings Meat Market, and Family Farm Meats.

Without truckers

throughout the years, it would be impossible to provide youth with the full learning experience of raising an animal and then seeing the end results of the quality of an animal from hoof to processor. Truckers gave their time to transport the animals to the various processing facilities. Truckers have included:

Schwartz Trucking, Puestow Trucking, Wiedmeyer Trucking and Wanke Trucking.

In 1970, 12 beef, seven lambs, and 19 hogs were sold. In 2018, 40 beef, 40 lambs, and 50 hogs were sold. In 1970, buyers spent approximately a total of \$7,780. In 2018, buyers spent approximately a total of \$249,250.

Since the very beginning, education has been an important aspect of the Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction. As the auction grew, specific sale requirements were added. Through the auction, families work together and new friendships are formed. Youth learn valuable life skills and develop finance, marketing and public relation skills. Youth are given the opportunity to expand their project, save for their future and further their education. The magnificent support from volunteers, supporters and the business community over the past 50 years is truly heartwarming.

This year's Junior Livestock Auction will be held at the Washington County Fair on Thursday, July 25, at 6 p.m. in the Farm Progress Arena.

## Continued From Front Excavation Begins For 9/11 Memorial

Other businesses have stepped up to help with the memorial as well. For example, Lee Schacht of L&S Landscapes and Tree Care LLC, has donated a tremendous amount of work and material to the cause, Haberman said.

The process of building a memorial started in 2011 when Gordon Haberman, along with former Kewaskum High School teacher Jerry Gosa and the late Larry Ammel of the Kewaskum Area Arts Council first applied to obtain a steel beam that had been recovered from the World Trade Center. The beam will become the centerpiece of the memorial.

Sunday marked a major milestone in creating the memorial. That afternoon, as Gordon Haberman quietly fastened an orange fence that encircles the work area. He bent down and straightened a small American flag that had been placed beside the fence.

And he watched the work begin on the memorial.

It was an important day.

"It is fitting. It is my daughter Julie's birthday today," Haberman said.

## Check It Out!



A Column By Kewaskum Librarian Lori Kreis

I have been in some recent discussions regarding the purpose of libraries. The Webster's Dictionary from 1828 defines a library as a collection of books belonging to a private person, or to a public institution or a company. Eighty-five years after, the definition didn't change much. The entry for library in the 1913 edition states "A considerable collection of books kept for use, and not as merchandise; as, a private library; a public library." Today, you can search for the definition of library on the Merriam-Webster site and there have been few alterations, but not much in the definition has changed.

I realize that the purpose and definition of a library can vary. I do agree about the definition. We are a building that houses collections. We have assemblages of books, movies, music, magazines, newspapers, yearbooks and toys. We do not charge for the use of our collections. The function of libraries historically aligns with the definition; as a curated collection of informational resources. However, the purpose has adapted with the changing needs of the users. Resources have surpassed collections as the purpose. Informational resources which include everything in print we cumulate, electronic resources such as databases, access to the internet through our public computers or Wi-Fi and the amassed expertise of the library staff.


I have been asked what I see as our library's future and my answer was instantaneous as I have been contemplating this for some time. I am not

seeking to massively expand our collection and its space, even though we have been running out of room on the shelves. I am also not looking for us to be primarily a resource center. I don't see us just as a building with long lines of tables covered with computers, tablets and electronic equipment.

What I envision for our public library is a community gathering place where people share information and their love of learning. I see the library as the building that provides access to information in a variety of ways for a multitude of reasons. There would be a community room with cutting edge audio-visual equipment to accommodate wonderful programs, entertaining presenters and community events. I conceptualize comfortable seating areas with soft chairs just perfect for reading. A children's room with an area for parents to collaborate while their kids attend story times. A place for teens to hang out to browse reading materials, plug in their devices and share ideas.

There would be resources aplenty and variable ways to access these. Up-to-date electronic devices would be available for use in the library or for check-out. Staff would be accessible to answer questions and provide quality information as usual. Finally, the library would have collections of books for all. I hope one day this vision of a library will come to fruition and of course, there will always be books.

# When Margie Walked St. Kilian Drive

Margie Gitter Beck lived in a lot of places in her life: from Waukesha, Darien, two spots in northern Wayne Township, and around Ashford. She has lived in Fond du Lac for the last dozen years, interrupted by a year or so in Waupun which to her “wasn’t my piece of meat.”

In the course of those 88 or so years, she developed that spunky attitude. My aunt Lori Wilhelm and I were trying to track down a St. Kilian classmate of my grandmother, Helen Weiland McCarty. And this spring we had some luck.

Immediately when meeting Margie for the first time at her apartment in Fond du Lac, she talked about the courtyard and how nice it was in the summer. “But in the winter it’s a pain in the you-know-what.”

Very polite, she could have cared less if you took your shoes off in her dwelling. She was comfortably ready to watch Wayne Brady’s “Lets Make a Deal” and Lori was complimenting her TV choice.

Margie snapped back: “Alright. You didn’t come to watch

here!” She shut off her TV. We laughed. Margie then shot back with a softy: “Unless you wanna watch it.”

Just before the interview started, my aunt had to grab a call from her doctor. To which the woman nearing 90 sassed: “Just don’t fall over dead when I’m here!”

It is refreshing to see that much energy and humor. In addition, intelligent sarcasm is mixed with a good German ac-

cent when saying this (‘dis’) and that (‘dat’). It was in this context that Margie reflected on her time in life which revolved around St. Kilian Church, which is important to consider as another St. Kilian Picnic roles around this Sunday, July 21st.

### The Road To School

One of the aspects of talking to Margie on the old days was her strong recollection of farms she walked by, and the families who used to reside in the area.

Travel to school was easy in the morning. It was hard at night. “About four miles I walked every night to get home.”

That’s what she had to do for a Catholic education. She had three options, two of which were the Lutheran school in Wayne and a small public school house on Highway 28.

“The public school was only a mile from my house. But they would not send me to a Lutheran School or any other kind, except Catholic. So, in the morning the milkman took me to school. I rode with the milkman.”

She was dropped off by John Kleinhans’s cheese factory. “Yea. Then I walked up that hill and went.” She could still remember the truck driver: “Jim Ruplinger.”

Margie recounted her way back home. From Strachota’s General Store (she recalled Simon still running the store until his surprise passing in 1940), she would head east on what today is St. Kilian Drive. It was a very straight shot home, but a hike, as she described her farm: “Oh. That’s way outta town!”

The names came back easy at age 88. “You follow St. Kilian Drive.” One of the first farms you’d hit was Tony and Regina Wondra. They had a farm on the

Ashford side of the road. Then as you continued, you ran past Melzers on the Wayne side to the south.

If you kept going past the first intersection east of Strachotas (what today is Rolling Drive and St. Kilian Drive), “Then you go past Marians.” This too was on the Ashford side of the road, as was the next farm, Jacaks. “And Jacak is my first cousin; my dad’s sister married a Jacak.” Margie too pronounced that last name as people used to, like “Yacht-Saak.”

“And then there was a road going way long in with a long driveway, after the Jacak farm. That’s where my dad lived when he moved up here. That was 60 acres.” Margie’s family didn’t stay there long (this farm with the long driveway was on the Wayne side).

Margie could laugh about how those names came back. But it has been awhile to know who is there now. “I wouldn’t know who in the heck is in it. We did live there when I was a little girl. Three years old. That’s my first place, but I didn’t go to school there.” What she meant was that when she lived across from Jacak’s, she was not going to St. Kilian Parochial School yet. Today, the Breitzmans live there.

The back of this picture was labeled “July 1932,” with Margie’s oldest sibling, Wilbert Gitter at the far left at eight years old, as he holds Margie at nine months. Next is non-relative (“Betty Kasten” a friend). Margie said that random child was a neighbor who, according to Margie’s ma, wanted her picture taken. The kid “jumped in there.... You know how kids are,” Margie said. Then the last child at far right is brother Donald Gitter at three and a half years old.

This picture is evidence of a transient life for the Gitters in the early 1930s. Margie emphatically responded that that picture was neither from Ashford nor Wayne: “Waukesha. I lived — I was born in Waukesha.”

So why did she end up in this area of Wisconsin? “Why does anybody do what they do? They just keep moving until they don’t know what they’re doing and then that’s it.” She laughed then answered seriously: “No. I was born in Waukesha. Donnie was born in Waukesha. And Wilbert was born in Hartford.”

Margie was asked why dad moved and there was some explanation thru her German accent: “They hadta because dat was the Depression and they were losing everything. And he lost his job. And den he read in the paper. That’s how my dad got to be on farming. My dad read dat in the paper dat they were looking for a nice house in Waukesha. And they would exchange the farm for the house, and den my dad and mother and us went to Darien, on the boarder of Illinois and Wisconsin but still in Wisconsin.”


In this context, it appears the Gitter children pictured above had already spanned Hartford, Waukesha and Darien before they came to the Town of Wayne in the 1930s. The Gitters initially were south of St. Kilian Drive across from Jacaks and west of today’s BB. Then the family soon settled on Lake Bernice Drive in the Town of Wayne, north of 28.

To get where Margie Gitter Beck grew up, one would have to turn right on Lake Bernice Drive when going east on St. Kilian Drive, then the farm would be on the left side of the road. Margie said she lived “at the first farm on the left” once you get on Lake Bernice Drive. Here’s the view at the intersection looking south/southeast, and it would include where the Gitters lived.

# When Margie Walked St. Kilian Drive



Pictured here is Katherine Zwaschka, who married Frank Gitter. "That's the maiden name of my grandma Gitter. Which is my dad's mother. But I never got to know him [grandpa], because I was only nine months old when he died."

This was Margie Gitter Beck's grandparents in 1922. The back of picture is labeled: "Parents of Frank Gitter married to Margaret Stommel." Margie commented: "My dad's name was Frank. And my grandpa's name was Frank; And now my brother [Donnie] has a boy named Frank."

Margie (Gitter) Beck never lived in St. Kilian, but rather three miles away near the Ashford/Wayne township border. However, "In St. Kilian. My grandmother lived years and years and years by herself. There was a little house. No garage. She didn't drive anyhow."

"Then you keep going. And then you get to the Jung place on the left side." If one looks at a 1920s or 1930s plat map of Fond du Lac County, one would notice multiple Jungs on the north side of St. Kilian Drive.

At this point in Margie's head, she was at about present day BB and St. Kilian Drive intersection heading east. Still, there's about another mile to keep going to get to her dad's (Frank Gitter) farm in 1940. "Yea, you gotta go through that four corners until you get to the next four corners, and then you turned right. First farm on the left." Between those last two four corners Margie went past the Fleischman and Rauch farms.

She said a lot of neighbors went to the small public school-house on the corner of 28 and Lake Bernice Drive. That wasn't the case for the Gitter kids. It seems likely that if Margie's neighbors didn't go to the public school on 28 and Lake Bernice Drive, then they might have went to what elders described at the time was the Lutheran church in Wayne.

For example, one of the Gitter's neighbors was the Rauchs in Ashford on St. Kilian Drive. Bob Hilbert described his childhood summers spent in Ashford township. His mom (a Rauch) was a Lutheran near Wayne but his dad (a Hilbert) was a Catholic near Ashford. And the Hilberts and Rauchs didn't

talk to each other for a while when Bob's parents married.

As a boy, Bob Hilbert would go by both grandparents, but the grandparents on different sides did not speak to each other because a Catholic had married a Lutheran. Many were territorial about their religion mid-century. That's just one of many stories on Lutherans vs. Catholics.

Religion explains why a child like Margie would walk four miles after school when in fact most people had less than a two-mile walk had they just gone to the intentionally spaced public schools within a township. She reflected: "I walked every night from that [St. Kilian] school to my mother's house."

The good news was that it was a straight road on St. Kilian Drive. "I was about this fat," she said as she motioned a width between her hands not more than five inches, indicating there wasn't much meat on her then. And it was funny when she said it because there isn't much weight on her now either.

### Fr. Reichel

Margie talked about the priest of her childhood, who also married her. Fr. John B. Reichel was there from 1920 to 1964. When asked what Fr. Reichel's personality was, Margie said, "He was good to me. But why not? I was always good, you know." Then she coughed sarcastically.


But there was a demeanor to him. Other people liked him, some people didn't. "Yea. Some didn't like him because he was stern with his ways. His religion. You know. If it was a fasting day or whatever the fastings [they] had, he expected you to do it."

When asked on the other days she was expected to fast, she just noted when it came to Lent, "There he was very strict. No meat on Fridays. And I think Wednesdays." Fr. Reichel did stop by with the students. "He would come over to the school once in a while," as "We had a chapel in the school."

She was married by Fr. J.B. Reichel too. "I remember when we had to go in there when we got married, you know. Go in there and talk to the priest. I think he talked five minutes if he did that. Then walked out." Then she laughed.

### Brother Passed On The Beans

Born in November of 1931, many of Margie's

As per expectations in the ordinances passed under the Articles of Confederation (our country's first constitution) in the 1780s, a way of gridding was established in which each typical township divided into 36 square miles, and 36 sections. By this logic, Margie Gitter Beck is accurate when she recalls walking home from St. Kilian at Strachota's General Store to the border of Section 35/36 is three miles on St. Kilian Drive, then Margie would have turned south on what is Lake Bernice Drive into the Town of Wayne.

As one can see, Margie's recollection of family names on the walk home is vindicated here, as she verified walking past Wondra's, Marian's, Jacak's, Jung's and Fleischman's. Besides the three miles on St. Kilian Drive, Margie is accurate on the four mile total given the quarter mile to church from Strachota's, and the length of the walk on Lake Bernice Drive to her home, and the sheer fact that the poor girl was walking hills. The shortest distance to a point is a straight line that's flat, unheard of on Margie's up-and-down walk home.

childhood memories revolve around being raised in the Great Depression. She was the first person I've met to talk about the beans at the old school.

Margie said everybody brought their own lunch to St. Kilian Parochial School, though she did recall there was some food offered. "For a while there they had beans. And I didn't like beans. And my brother didn't like beans. And when nobody was looking, he, my brother, had such a [container], you know, where you carry water or milk or whatever. He stuck all the beans in there and took 'em home and dumped 'em."

One did not waste food in those days. Especially if a Sister was looking: "Yea. Sure. We'd a caught hell if we didn't eat what they gave us. We didn't get much. We carried mostly our own lunch."

Margie was open to the possibility that because it was during the Great Depression, the beans offered might have been just for extra food. She said she couldn't remember if parents paid for it, or if the church ran into a stock pile of beans that they fed. "Can't tell ya that. I never paid for 'em."

### The Sisters

Margie talked about the convent attached to the new school built in the 1930s. "That was a nice place. Cause my mother had chickens, and every Sunday we went to church, I had to take a dozen or two of eggs over by the nuns. That's how I got to see her house." Margie said it was impressive and impressionable.

Speaking of impressions, when asked if there was anything else to say about St. Kilian Parochial School,

Margie answered: "Sr. Josella. Donald (Margie's brother) didn't like her at all. She had that thing with the ruler too. One day she slapped him and he got a nosebleed. They couldn't get the nosebleed to stop."

So did Sister say she was sorry? "What do I know. I didn't ask," Margie laughed. And if she would have asked, "I probably would have had one on the other side."

Now Donald is gone. "Yea. I'm all alone. The whole family is wiped out. And all my friends are gone. ....Now look at that...Now how many are left? My wedding picture's in there. They are all dead but me. So why am I here, and they're not?"

Her son Art answered: "Somebody's always gotta be last." Indeed, and Margie's a sharp, intelligent one to remain.



Margie Gitter Beck's picture here is labeled "1st Communion at St. Kilian Church," roughly from 1940. The only five identified where the bottom two girls in row one, and the three girls who were communicants in row two.

In this picture, the bottom two girls in the first row are candle holders. Margie said one of the two girls was her candleholder, "One of the Marian girls." She explained where their farm was: "Yea. They lived by Jacak's there. Then she was just a little girl here. But I know her and I would walk sometime from school [with her]."

The second row of girls are First communicants, and would eventually graduate from St. Kilian Parochial school. The farthest right in the second row of girls (a row of three) is Helen Weiland. The middle girl is Corrine Wahlen, and the girl to the left is Margie Gitter with her head slightly cut off by the girl in front of her.

## Walter Fends Off Arenz To Capture Remembering Randy Tracy PDTR Sprint Car A-main

The record book will show that Josh Walter of Plymouth led all 30 laps of the Plymouth Dirt Track Racing Remembering Randy Tracy Mid-Season Championship 360 Sprint Car A-main at the Plymouth Dirt Track in Plymouth on Saturday, July 13.

However, a closer examination will find that Walter used all of the skill he has accumulated in his 14 seasons of Sprint Car racing to negotiate heavy lapped traffic and turn back a heated challenge from Travis Arenz of Sheboygan in the closing laps to earn his second A-main victory of the 2019 season in the Richard's of Dunbar PDTR 360 Sprint Car division in the first Remembering Randy Tracy Night celebrating the life and racing career popular late driver affectionately dubbed "The Meat" during his 24-year racing career at Plymouth.

In other A-main action, Tayler Scheffler of Waukesha rode the high groove to his second Gasroots Project Late Model A-main win of the 2019 season. J.J. Pagel of Mount Calvary earned his first career Klips & Tips Grand National A-main win. Jeff Steenbergen of Watertown raced to victory in the Cellcom B mod A-main.

In the 30-lap Remembering Randy Tracy Sprint Car A-main, Walter got the jump on the drop of the green flag from the pole position with third starter Will Gerrits taking second on the opening circuit. Riding the high line around the multi-groove racing surface, Walter had built up a full straightaway cushion over Gerrits when he encountered slower traffic beginning on lap eight.

On lap nine, fifth starter Jim Melis of Glenbeulah dove underneath Gerrits to wrestle away the second spot in the running order. However, Gerrits battled back to regain the position before the lone caution flag of the race appeared on lap 10 for a three-car incident in turn two involving Paul Pokorski of West Bend, Anthony Knierim of Franksville and Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum. Pokorski and Wenninger were forced to drop out of the race, while Knierim was able to return.

Following the restart,

Jim Melis pulled off a slide job to move past Gerrits into second in turn four on lap 12, while Travis Arenz of Sheboygan, who started eighth, used the low line to advance to fifth on lap 13.

By lap 14, Walter had again bolted out to a full-straightaway advantage over Melis. However, lapped traffic began to become a factor starting on lap 16 when Walter had to deal with the cars of Anthony Knierim and Bill Taylor dueling side by side for multiple laps.

As Walter struggled to find a way through the lapped traffic, Melis closed significantly along the high groove before Walter was finally able to split Knierim and Taylor on lap 24. As Melis faded with a power steering issue in the closing laps, Arenz was on a charge as he worked his way past 2011 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Howards Grove, who started seventh, on lap 26 to secure second.

Arenz pulled even with Walter with a low move in turn two on lap 29, but he was unable to make the move stick as Walter held strong along the cushion. On the final circuit with Arenz still hot on his heels, Walter made a bold low move underneath the slower car of Tyler Brabant in turn three to clinch his sixth career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory and second A-main triumph of the 2019 season.

Arenz, who came into the event as the winner of the last two Midwest Sprint Car Association A-mains, had to settle for second, Schmidt, who was sporting the No. 42 made famous by Randy Tracy for the evening, placed third, Gerrits wound up fourth and 2010 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion and current point leader Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee moved up for the ninth starting spot to place fifth.

Polesitter Kevin Baldry of Omro seized the top spot in turn one of the opening lap of the action-packed 30-lap Late Model A-main. On lap two, second starter Justin Ritchie of New London worked the high groove to challenge Baldry for the top spot. The two drivers dueled side by side for the next five laps before Baldry pulled away.

On lap nine, four-time PDTR Late Model track champion Brad Mueller of Random Lake, who started seventh, worked the cushion to pass Ritchie for second in turn two. One lap later, Mueller shot past Baldry exiting turn four to assume the lead.

Meanwhile, 10th starter Taylor Scheffler was also finding speed along the high line as he darted around Baldry into second on lap 13. Scheffler hounded Mueller over the next eight laps as the leaders found themselves in heavy lapped traffic.

On lap 21, Scheffler played the lapped cars perfectly to power past Mueller into the top spot in turn four. Mueller was able to stay in contact with Scheffler in the closing laps and cut the gap on lap 28. However, he was not able to mount a serious challenge as Scheffler secured his third career PDTR Late Model A-main victory and his second main event win of the 2019 season at Plymouth.

Mueller was second, defending PDTR Late Model champion Justin Schmidt of Cleveland placed third, after starting ninth, Ritchie placed fourth and Baldry completed the top five in the caution-free race.

In the 30-lap Grand National A main, J.J. Pagel grabbed the lead on the drop of the green flag from the pole with second starter Jeff Muehlbauer of Elkhart Lake and third starter Dick Hed of Plymouth in hot pursuit.

Muehlbauer worked the high line over the next seventh laps as Pagel and Muehlbauer mounted a spirited side-by-side duel for six straight circuits. On lap 13, Luke Scholten of Oostburg pulled in to join Pagel, Muehlbauer and Hed in a four-way battle for the lead.

On lap 15, the first of two caution flags appeared when an infield tire was pushed onto the track in turn three. On the restart, sixth starter and current point leader Tyler Kulow of Plymouth moved in to challenge for second as Muehlbauer, Hed and Kulow went three-wide in turn four on lap 16.

Kulow emerged in second while Scholten worked past Hed to claim third on lap 17 as positions were swapped at a lightning pace. Once again, Muehlbauer ventured up to the high groove to pressure Pagel for the top spot as the laps wound down and the two drivers again waged a side-by-side battle for the victory.

With one lap remaining, the second caution appeared when Jason Juech of Plymouth spun in turn four to set up a green-white-checked flag finish. Pagel got a big jump on the restart to pull away as Hed made a daring move in turn three on lap 29 to move from fifth to third.

Pagel held on to earn his first career PDTR Grand National A-main victory. Muehlbauer took second, Hed was third, Scholten placed fourth and Kulow completed the top five.

Jesse Cullen of Chilton led the opening circuit of the 30-lap B Mod A-main from the pole. Cullen maintained a solid lead over second-starter Mark Hoepfner of Rubicon before sixth starter Tim Warner of Fond du Lac passed Hoepfner for second on lap nine. The first of six caution flags appeared on lap 10 for debris.

On the restart, Cullen continued to lead with Warner in tow, while Jeff Steenbergen, who started ninth, worked his way into third on lap 12. After another caution flag for a spin on lap 14, Steenbergen moved into second with a low move on Warner on lap 16. Three laps later, Cullen spun in turn four to bring out the third caution flag. With Cullen relegated to the rear of the field for bringing out the caution, Steenbergen assumed the top spot on the restart.

Following the fourth caution period for a spin, seventh starter Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls darted past Warner into second as Steenbergen built up a big advantage. After a caution on lap 27 for infield tires on the track in turn four, Warner and rookie Brian Wieland of Elkhart Lake, who started third, waged a duel for second with Wieland getting the best of Warner on lap 28.

After the sixth and final caution flag on lap 28, Steenbergen again flexed his muscle on the restart to earn his third career PDTR B Mod A-main victory. Wieland finished a career-best second, Glander placed third, 11th starter Brandon Knepprath of Kewaskum finished fourth and Randy Theys, who started 18th, completed the top five.

Danny Schlafer of Sussex won the first PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main and Doug Wondra of Lomira captured the second PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main. Justin Bauer of Sheboygan Falls was victorious in the B Mod B-main.

The Remembering Randy Tracy Mid-Season Championship program, which was sponsored by Cupcake Wonders of Sheboygan Falls, drew a total of 90 cars, including 36 Sprint Cars, 25 B Mods, 15 Late Models and 14 Grand Nationals.

## Arenz Goes Back To Back With MSA At Outagamie Speedway

Travis Arenz of Sheboygan made it two-for-two in the span of seven days as he collected his second consecutive Midwest Sprint Car Association A-main victory, during the series' first of two scheduled appearances at the Outagamie Speedway Powered By EWSC Racing in Seymour on Friday, July 12.

Two-time MSA champion Danny Schlafer of Sussex started the 25-lap main event from the pole flanked by Franksville's Anthony Knierim. Schlafer got the jump on the drop of the green flag to lead the opening circuit on the smooth, wide and dry slick third-mile racing surface as fourth starter Adam Miller of Plymouth settled into the second spot.

On lap two, Arenz, who started fourth used the high groove to power around Miller and Schlafer into the lead entering turn three. Arenz, who also won the fourth MSA 10-lap heat race earlier in the program, immediately pulled away from Schlafer utilizing the high line around the track.

Meanwhile sixth starter Josh Walter of Plymouth worked the

high line to pass Adam Miller for third on lap five. However, Miller battled back around the low groove to regain the third spot two laps later. As Arenz began to encounter slower traffic on lap seven the lone caution flag of the race was displayed on lap 8 when Anthony Knierim rolled to a stop in turn one.

On the restart, Arenz darted away from the field, while 2018 Plymouth Dirt Track Racing champion Justin Miller, who started ninth, dove underneath Josh Walter to take fourth on lap 10 and worked past his brother, Adam, for third on lap 12.

Out in front, it was all Arenz as he maintained a solid half straightaway cushion over Schlafer. However, as the laps wound down, Arenz encountered a throng of lapped traffic, which allowed Schlafer to cut the gap significantly.

On lap 23, Schlafer pulled to within striking distance as Arenz tipped his way through the rear of the field. On the final lap, Schlafer ducked low in turn two to briefly pull even with Arenz. However, Arenz used his momentum along the cushion to pull

away down the backstretch.

The determined Schlafer again pulled nearly even with Arenz in turn four, but Arenz fended off the challenge to earn his fourth career MSA A-main victory and third MSA victory of the 2019 season by a two-car length margin over Schlafer, who had to settle for second. Adam Miller finished third, four-time MSA champ and current point leader Kurt Davis of Milwaukee worked his way up from his 10th starting spot to finish fourth and Josh Walter rounded out the top five.

The event drew 31 MSA cars to the Outagamie Speedway facility. Scott Conger of Eagle won the 12-lap MSA B-main and heat race victories went to **Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum**, Josh Walter, 2005 MSA champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett and Travis Arenz.

During the National Anthem, MSA competitors Paul Pokorski and Scott Conger honored longtime MSA supporter Dave "Hagar" Nelson, who passed away on July 5, by carrying the black flag in his memory. It was also announced that the Dave "Hagar" Nelson Tribute Night will be held during the next MSA appearance at Outagamie Speedway Powered by EWSC Racing on Friday, Aug. 2.

The MSA competitors will return to action with a doubleheader weekend of 360 Sprint Car action on Saturday, July 20, at The Plymouth Dirt

Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth and Sunday, July 21, at Angell Park Speedway in Sun Prairie.



Check kids' toys, tarps and pool covers that also retain water. Drain the water and store these items in the garage or turn them over to keep them from becoming a mosquito breeding ground. Even small containers hold enough water for hundreds to thousands of mosquitoes to breed.

Change the water in birdbaths at least once a

week. Make it part of your routine maintenance; rinse birdbaths when watering containers. Or install a small pump to keep water moving to prevent mosquito breeding.

Use organic mosquito control like Mosquito Dunks and Mosquito Bits (SummitResponsibleSolutions.com) in birdbaths, rain barrels and water features. Mosquito Bits quickly knock down the mosquito larval population, while Mosquito Dunks provide 30 days of control. They both contain a naturally occurring soil bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis* that kills mosquito larvae, are certified organic and safe for pets, fish, wildlife and children.

Use Mosquito Dunks to manage these pests in areas subject to periods of standing water. One dunk provides control of 100 square feet of water surface for 30 days. Slide a dunk over

a stake secured in the problem area, preventing it from washing away in heavy rains. It remains in place and provides control when the area is flooded again.

Attract insect-eating birds to the landscape with a few birdhouses. You'll enjoy their beauty and benefit from their diet of insects, including many garden pests and mosquitoes.

Reduce the mosquitoes' daytime resting spaces by keeping your garden weeded. Removing weeds and managing neglected garden spaces will make your landscape less inviting to these pests.

Keep mosquitoes away when hosting a party, gardening or relaxing outdoors. Use a fan to create a gentle breeze that keeps the weak-flying mosquitoes away from you and your guests. Some gardeners even take a small fan into the garden while weeding.

Light a few citronella candles for a bit of ambience and mosquito control at your next evening party or event. Citronella oil and the scented candles do have some mosquito-repelling properties. Scatter lots of candles throughout your entertainment space. Position the candles within a few feet of your guests for some short-term relief from these pests.

These strategies and some personal protection will help you increase your summer enjoyment. Wear light colored, loose fitting clothing, covering as much of your skin as possible with long sleeves and pants.

For Deet-free personal repellent options, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention has also approved products with the active ingredient picaridin (found in Skin So Soft products), IR3535, and the synthetic oil of lemon

and eucalyptus. Avoid products that contain both sunscreen and insect repellents as you need to apply the sunscreen more often than the repellent.

Using a combination of these mosquito-management strategies is sure to provide a summer filled with more enjoyable gatherings with family and friends.

**NFPA Underscores Electric Safety In Pools And At Marinas During Summer Months**

With the arrival of summer, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is reminding people about potential electrical hazards that exist in swimming pools, hot tubs and spas, on-board boats and in waters surrounding boats, marinas, and launch ramps.

Most people have

never heard of nor are they aware of electrical dangers posed in water environments such as electric shock drowning (ESD), and each year people are injured or killed from these hazards.

Electric shock drowning happens when marina or onboard electrical systems leak electric

current into the water. The current then passes through the body and causes paralysis. When this happens, a person can no longer swim and ultimately drowns.

NFPA reminds people about the potential electrical hazards onboard boats and in waters surrounding boats, marinas and launch ramps.

Here are tips for swimmers, pool and boat owners:

**Tips For Swimmers**

•Never swim near a marina, dock or boatyard, or near a boat while it's running.

•While in a pool, hot tub or spa, look out for underwater lights that are not working properly, flicker or work intermittently.

•If you feel a tingling sensation while in a pool, immediately stop swimming in your current direction. Try and swim in a direction where you had not felt the tingling. Exit the water as quickly as possible;

avoid using metal ladders or rails. Touching metal may increase the risk of shock.

**Tips For Pool Owners**

•If you are putting in a new pool, hot tub or spa, be sure the wiring is performed by an electrician experienced in the special safety requirements for these types of installations.

•Have a qualified electrician periodically inspect and — where necessary — replace or upgrade the electrical devices or equipment that keep your pool, spa or hot tub electrically safe. Have the electrician show you how to turn off all power in case of an emergency.

•Make sure any overhead lines maintain the proper distance over a pool and other structures, such as a diving board. If you have any doubts, contact a qualified electrician or your local utility company to make sure power lines are a safe distance

away.

**Tips For Boat Owners**

•Avoid entering the water when launching or loading a boat. Docks or boats can leak electricity into the water causing water electrification.

•Each year, and after a major storm that affects the boat, have the boat's electrical system inspected by a qualified marine electrician to be sure it meets the required codes of your area, including the American Boat & Yacht Council. Make the necessary repairs if recommended. Check with the marina owner who can also tell you if the marina's electrical system has recently been inspected to meet the required codes of your area, including the National Electrical Code® (NEC).

•Have ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI) installed on the boat; use only portable GFCIs or shore power cords (including "Y" adapters) that are Marine Listed when using electricity near water. Test GFCIs monthly.

"With continued education and awareness about ESD, we can help reduce the risk of ESD from happening," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. "Before participating in water activities, have swimming pool equip-

ment, hot tubs and spas, or your boat inspected by a qualified electrician; have them regularly maintained to ensure life saving measures and protection systems are functioning properly during the summer and throughout the year."

For industry professionals, the 2017 NFPA 70, National Electrical Code® (NEC®) has been revised to improve pool safety and help reduce the risk of ESD; proposed revisions to the 2020 NEC edition include ground-fault protection in marinas and boatyards. NFPA has additional codes and standards that apply to boats and marinas and their related electrical safety issues. Find these resources and more by visiting NFPA's NEC webpage.

"NFPA continues to raise awareness and help educate people about this troubling trend," said Carli. "We encourage everyone to share these safety resources with people they know so everyone can safely enjoy water activities during the summer and all year long."

## Reigle Family Park Gets Playground Equipment

However, when the Kewaskum Elementary School PTO raised money to purchase new playground equipment for the school, an opportunity rose for the park.

PTO representatives announced at the March 11 School Board meeting that they had raised \$50,000 to purchase new playground equipment for the school, which is slated to be installed by the time school starts in the fall.

“Our original plan was to refurbish what we have and then add a smaller piece,” PTO president Jessica Steinert said at the March board meeting. “We ended up going with a bigger, brand new piece of equipment than what we had originally planned.”

A couple volunteers from the Reigle Family Park committee were at the meeting and heard that news. Immediately, they thought of what this could mean for the park.

Following the school board meeting, the park volunteers spoke with the PTO representatives, and a plan was formed.

“When we were approached by the volun-

teers, we thought it was a great opportunity for the playground to get used instead of just thrown away,” Steinert said. “We were really happy that it will continue to get used locally. It is still a great piece of equipment, it just no longer was meeting our needs and the growing number of kids who were using it.”

Donating the equipment helped both groups financially. The Kewaskum School District was going to have to spend \$3,000 to have the old equipment removed and thrown away. The park volunteers would save the school district that fee.

The school district also was advised that it would cost approximately \$12,000 to move the playground equipment to be used at a new location. With volunteers doing the work, that was another \$12,000 saved.

Typically, playground equipment is one of the final things added to parks. Because Reigle Family Park was still in the early stages of development, excavation equipment was on site. This meant that the play-

ground area was able to be prepared at no extra cost.

“Acquiring the playground was an exciting surprise. The timing of it all just sort of fell into place perfectly,” said Amy Uhlig, a volunteer on the Reigle Family Park Committee.

Reigle Family Park’s new playground equipment is about 20 years old. However, many of the pieces of the playground equipment have been replaced over the last several years.

The plan is to paint the playground set, which will breathe new life into the equipment, according to Dan Fischer, president of the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization, which is heading up the park’s development.

Melissa Rasmussen, a representative for GameTime, which manufactured the playground equipment, came to examine the playground on Friday.

“This playground is in really great shape. I’m so glad someone is still going to be able to use it,” said Rasmussen, who estimated that a similar set manufactured today can cost up to

\$80,000.

Currently, volunteers are reassembling the playground pieces at the park, which is located on Edgewood Road in Kewaskum. Next, volunteers will cement the playground footings into place. Then the playground area will be filled with a drain and stones so that rainwater will flow out of the playground area. The base will then be covered with manufactured wood chips to create a safe playing surface.

The plan is to enclose the playground area with a cement curb and sidewalk lined with several park benches.

The playground will be

situated just east of a walking path that will meander through the park. The Kewaskum Village Board approved the playground’s location last month.

Kewaskum Elementary School’s new playground set, which is being made in Wisconsin, will be installed this summer. A total of 143 students will be able to utilize the new, larger playground set at one time.

“We are really excited for the kids to be able to use the new playground when they come to school in the fall, and we are really glad that this equipment will still be in use by the kids of Kewaskum,” Steinert said. “It is a win-win for both groups.”

The playground at Reigle Family Park will not be available for use until after it fully assembled and passes inspection.

### Reigle Family Park Development

After record amounts of rain delayed work on the park this spring, excavation work is now almost completed at Reigle Family Park, according to Fischer.

The grading has been completed, and volunteers laid conduit in the park so that the park is now ready to have electricity added.

The earth will be discd this week in order to till the soil and prepare it for grass seed. Next week the plan is to

have rocks removed from the soil before it is discd a final time before grass is planted.

“The ideal time to plant grass in Wisconsin is between August 15 and September 15, and we are right on target for that to happen,” Fischer said.

The hope is that grass will be established and soccer games can take place in 2020. A pad has been laid for a concession stand and restrooms to be located on the south side of the park. Plans are to erect the building by the time soccer games are played at the park.

A five-acre prairie is scheduled to be planted on the north side of the park next spring.

The park boasts a two-acre catch-and-release fishing pond. A lighted trail going around the pond is slated to be finished by this fall.

Donations are still being collected in order to build a family lodge that can be used by groups for gatherings or weddings.

“We really appreciate all the support we have received. This is such a great thing for the community,” Laatsch said.
