designs in the third annual MOWA Art & Chalk Fest. The chalk artists came from across the nation to compete in the chalk art contest, which was held July 27 and 28.


### Chalking Up A Winner

## Kewaskum Theatre Company Presents "Ordinary Days" At River Hill Park

Last year, when the Kewaskum School District was undergoing a building project, Kewaskum Theatre Company was not able to use the Kewaskum High School theatre. Instead, the company presented a musical in the River Hill Park Pavilion.

The show went so well that the Kewaskum Theatre Company decided to add an adult show, to be performed in the park again this year.

The musical "Ordinary Days" will be presented this Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Aug. 1, 2 and 3, at 8 p.m. at River Hill Park in Kewaskum.

"It is in a casual, fun setting for adults," said

Lindsay Dahlberg of the Kewaskum Theatre Company. "It is great for a date night or a fun girls' night out."

The show is suggested for ages 13 and older due to language. Water, soda, alcoholic beverages and popcorn will be available during the show. Tickets cost \$12 each and are on sale at Geidel's Piggly Wiggly or at the door.

Like last year, tarps will be draped over the sides of the pavilion, which will help with lighting. An added bonus is that the tarps help keep bugs out of the enclosed area. Picnic tables will be set up for the audience, but attendees are invited to bring chairs or pillows to place on the

benches.

"Our goal is to have one big show each summer with kids and then have one show in the park that is geared to adults," said Lindsay Dahlberg of the Kewaskum Theatre Company.

After the big production of "Shrek" less than three weeks ago, this new production is more of a minimalistic show. The show, which runs just 75 to 90 minutes, includes just four characters and a piano.

"There is minimal scenery. We don't have to change costumes or anything. It's a very simplistic show in terms of technical requirements, so that helps with the short timeline we had,"

Dahlberg said.

The show, which was written in 2010, features contemporary music. It tells the story of four characters in New York. "It is not as much of a comedy as last year. It still has funny one-liners and jokes, but it also has content and shows that we are all connected somehow," Dahlberg said.

The show features Andrew Dahlberg, Lindsay Dahlberg, Olivia Krautkramer and Matthew Krautkramer on stage, and Andrew Beine on piano. Other members of the Kewaskum Theatre Company are assisting with lighting and sound.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

### Early CPR Intervention Saves 59-Year-Old Father

The early application of CPR and an automatic electronic defibrillator (AED) saved a 59-year-old Town of Farmington man on Friday, July 19. The man, who had no prior cardiac history, was at his Green Lake home hosting a family gathering when he suddenly

became unresponsive at 7:53 p.m. His 26-year-old stepdaughter, who is a lifeguard trained in CPR, immediately recognized the signs of cardiac distress and started CPR.

"The early intervention of CPR by the stepdaughter provided the critical time needed to get first responders on scene with the AED. Thanks to her, this man has a sec-

ond chance at life," Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said. "Stories like this clearly demonstrate the importance for everyone to know basic CPR. One day you may need it to save a loved one, just as this stepdaughter did."

A Washington County sheriff's deputy arrived on scene and provided Fillmore First Respon-

ders with an AED, which was used to shock his heart back into rhythm. The man regained consciousness before he was transported to the hospital. A family representative said the man recovered and was set to be released from the hospital on July 22.

## Help Your Dog Keep Cool This Summer



### A Column By Kewaskum Librarian Lori Kreis

I can't believe it is August already! Where has the summer gone? I know I spent some of it acquiring new items for the library. Here is a brief selection of what we have new for you in August.

It's been a while since Philippa Gregory published a new series. *Tidelands* is the first in the Fairmile series and takes place in 1648 during the English Civil War. Gregory explores a great change for the people of England, especially women.

*Chances Are* by Richard Russo is a book about friendship; male friendship. Forty years ago, a woman they all loved disappeared. They reunite for a long weekend and perhaps solve the mystery of the lost woman.

The long-anticipated second novel from Téa Obreht, *Inland*, transports readers to the Wild West through the juxtaposed accounts of a frontierswoman whose husband and sons have gone missing, and of an outlaw on the run.

R.H. Herron's *Stolen Things* is a novel loosely inspired by actual events. A 911 dispatcher answers a call and horrifically hears her daughter on the line describing a night of terror.

Personally, I am looking forward to Ruth Ware's newest book, *The Turn of the Key*. This thriller centers around a high-priced nanny imprisoned for the murder of a child. I can't wait to read all the twists and turns Ware manages.

*The Escape Room* by Megan Goldin puts three highly competitive co-workers in team-building exercise. Will any of them get out alive?

The library will get in a few interesting non-fiction titles in August. *Into the Planet: My Life as a Cave Diver* is a firsthand account of cave diving. Jill Hein-erth is one of the most renowned cave divers worldwide and takes us to an unknown region of the earth. NPR notes Timothy Wine-gard's, *The Mosquito: A Human History of Our Deadliest Predator* as a hugely impressive major work. As narrative nonfiction, it is a thorough yet engaging read on the mosquito's reign throughout human history. Haben Girma's autobiography, *Haben*, provides the incredible story of this deaf and blind graduate of Harvard Law School.

Some of the new DVD releases will be at the library in August. We will see *The Secret Life of Pets 2*, *A Dog's Journey* and *Pokemon Detective Pikachu* for the young viewers. Older audiences will enjoy *The Hustle*, *Brightburn*, *Godzilla: King of the Monsters* and *Poms*. We will also be circulating new music by Taylor Swift and Justin Moore.

Just a quick reminder that our summer reading wraps up on August 5 for adults and August 10 for children and teens. Be sure to get your logs, bingos or book reviews in by the due date to qualify for prizes. And don't miss out on our wrap-up party for Summer Reading at Kiwanis Park on August 9 at 11 a.m. Lots of fun for everyone.

# Art & Chalk Fest Draws Crowd

Kimberly Wood, who has competed in the MOWA chalk art contest since it started three years ago, won the People's Choice Award for her chalk depiction of a woman with glistening blue eyes and a chimpanzee. The piece was inspired by a painting by Sophie Wilkins. Outside of chalk art, Wood explores her artistic talents in graphic design, photography, painting, drawing and illustration.

Kaylee Goodman, who was one of three student artists to compete in the contest, won the other People's Choice Award for her depiction of Dolly Parton.

Kaylee considers herself a self-taught artist.

"The only art classes I have taken are the general art classes you take in middle school and high school. Outside of that, I don't take art classes. I just watch other people and what they do and kind of learn from that and improve as I go," Kaylee said.

Kaylee admits that she was first exposed to chalk art when she drew on sidewalks as a young

child.

"When I was little, I scribbled on the pavement. I didn't really have a passion for sidewalk chalk art, though, until two years ago. That's when I really started this passion and something that I want to continue into my adult life," she said.

Kaylee, who will be a sophomore at Slinger High School this year, first competed in 2017 at the Chalk the Walk contest in West Bend. A middle school student at the time, she won first place for her age group for her drawing of a mermaid.

Art teachers saw her work and encouraged her to enter the MOWA's first Chalk Fest that year. So Kaylee entered and won the Online Viewer's Choice Award that year. She has entered the contest every year since.

"I don't expect to win; I just come and do what I love. I put out a tip jar, but I don't come for the

money. I come for the interaction with the public," Kaylee said.

## The Art Of Chalk

To create the chalk masterpieces, the artists used various sizes of chalk in a multitude of colors. Some chalk was applied with paint brushes.

The chalk typically will stay vibrant for about 30 days before fading away.

However, on Monday morning at 9 a.m., less than 24 hours after all of the chalk art had been completed, firefighters came and washed away the chalk. Area children helped the firefighters wash away the myriad of colors.

"The first year we had the Chalk Fest, we were intending to keep the art there as long as it would stay. We figured it

just chalk," Wildes said.

But Janet Tombros, who is the president of the Florida Chalk Artists Association, recommended against that.

"She told us that even though they use non-toxic chalk, it leaves a very strong pigment. We wanted to have a blank canvas that the artists could start with every year," Wildes explained.

The artists are all fine with the fact that their chalk art is short lived.

"The artists really want to interact with the visitors when they are here. They consider themselves actually to be more performing visual artists. The whole point is to get people here during

the festival, so they can talk to the artists and see their process from Day One to Day Two," Wildes said.

Each year, many of the artists take part in the chalk send-off party on Monday morning.

"A lot of the chalk artists give that first wash-off. They always say this is just part of the experience, which is really neat, living in the moment," Wildes said.

The sidewalks are later power washed to clean any chalk residue that may be left behind.

"It is sad to see the chalk art go, but we took about three million photos this weekend. They are there forever," Wildes said.

## The Art Fest

In conjunction with the Chalk Fest, an Art Fest was held at MOWA on Saturday and Sunday, July 27 and 28. There were 63 fine artists who sold their work at the free, outdoor fine arts festival. The majority of the artists were from Wisconsin, but there were artists who came from Illinois, Minnesota, Ohio and South Carolina.

In addition, art activities for all ages were offered throughout the weekend along with live entertainment and music, food vendors, a beer garden, an art raffle, and free admission for the weekend to MOWA.

**100 Years Ago  
August 2, 1919**

The minimum wage law for women and minors became effective Friday. Much interest is being taken by all those employing help. Representatives were sent out to some cities where large numbers of women are employed.

The following four points as given out by the representatives should be borne in mind: 1. For experienced adult women and for experienced minor employees who are over 17 years of age, 22 cents per hour.

2. For inexperienced adult women employees and inexperienced minor employees who are over 17 years of age, 18 cents per hour for the first three months, and 20 cents per hour for the next three months. 3. Children of permit age between 14 and 16 years of age, 18 cents per hour, regardless of the length of their experience. 4. Permit children between 16 and 17 years of age, 20 cents per hour if they have had three months' experience, otherwise 18 cents per hour.

Harvesting in this vicinity and Washington County is now in full swing. The intense heat of Saturday and Sunday when the thermometer registered 101 and 98 in the shade put the finishing touches to the grain crop. Oats and barley, which a week ago were turning and ripening were burned to a crisp. Farmers here hoped against hope that a downpour of rain would soon come. Although a little rain fell here Sunday evening, it was not enough to answer the purpose in refreshing the grain for the damage done during the long and dry spell. Indications for a heavy crop were good during the early part of the season, but farmers have not given up all hope, and unless it rains within the next few days the corn and potato crop, as well as all garden vegetables, will be a complete failure, as the leaves of same are curled up and are commencing to dry up. Threshing has already begun here, reports reaching this office are that the wheat and rye yield is from poor to fair, oats will be light and barley will not fare much better.

The total number of autos in Wisconsin will reach 240,000 before the end of the year, according to predictions made in the license department of the secretary of state's office at Madison. 210,000 licenses have so far been issued, which is an increase of 50,000 over that of last year.

## BBB: Storm Damage Tips – BBB Offers Tips When Hiring A Contractor

You have trees down in your front yard, and you've experienced the wrath of Mother Nature in the last couple of days. Now, when picking a contractor to fix the storm damage, don't let a man-made disaster follow a natural one, warns the Better Business Bureau Serving Wisconsin.

"It's a sad fact that 'man-made' disasters typically follow natural disasters," says Jim Temmer, CEO/president of the BBB Serving Wisconsin. "In your haste to do repairs, don't forget to research companies before you hire them. If you don't, you could have an even bigger disaster on your hands."

BBB offers these tips when hiring a contractor:

- Beware of "fly-by-night" contractors or "storm chasers" who come into the area after a storm. They canvass neighborhoods and go door-to-door. They may not be properly licensed or insured, may be using inferior materials and may be difficult to locate later if there's a problem with their work.

- Check out the company with the BBB. Call the BBB Serving Wisconsin toll-free at 800-273-1002 or visit BBB.org to check out the BBB's free report on the company. The BBB's report will tell you the company's rating, how many complaints (if any) the company has, how long it's been in business, the owner's name and where it's located. You can also see written customer reviews by customers.

- Ask for and check references. Ask for at least three references and take time to call them to find out their experience with the company.
- Beware of price

gouging. Some unethical businesses may be marking up their products or services by as much as 500 percent. Be sure to comparison shop.

- Get all information and promises in writing. Beware of companies who claim your home is structurally unsafe and needs expensive repairs.

- Check with your insurance company, and make sure to take pictures and document any repair needs.

- Compare bids, but determine which company will provide the best quality and not just the lowest price. Some "storm chaser" companies will often offer rock-bottom prices, but may be unlicensed or providing inferior services. Legitimate contractors can provide a "Certificate of Insurance" that verifies they have current liability and workmen's compensation coverage. Every consumer should verify that their contractor is properly insured before allowing them to work on their property.
- Reputable companies don't ask for the entire fee up-front. Never pay up front and in full before the work is completed. A rule to follow may be to pay one-third down, one-third when it is half done, and the remaining one-third at completion. Also, pay by credit card or check instead of cash.



## New Farmers.gov Feature Helps Producers Find Farm Loans

A new online tool can help farmers and ranchers find information on U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) farm loans that may best fit their operations. USDA has launched the new Farm Loan Discovery Tool as the newest feature on farmers.gov, the Department’s self-service website for farmers.

“Access to credit is critical in the agriculture industry, especially for new farmers,” said Bill Northey, Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation. “This new interactive tool can help farmers find information on USDA farm loans within minutes. We are working to improve our customer service, and part of our solution is through improving how farmers can work with us online.”

USDA’s Farm Service Agency (FSA) offers a variety of loan options to help farmers finance their operations. From buying land to financing the purchase of equipment, FSA loans can help. Compared to this time last year, FSA has seen an 18 percent increase in the amount it has obligated for direct farm ownership loans, and through the 2018 Farm Bill, has increased the limits for several loan products.

USDA conducted field

research in eight states, gathering input from farmers and FSA farm loan staff to better understand their needs and challenges.

“We received suggestions from both farmers and our staff on how to improve the farm loan process, and we wanted to harness this opportunity to be more efficient and effective,” Northey said. “This feature is one step in our efforts.”

Farmers who are looking for financing options to operate a farm or buy land can answer a few simple questions about what they are looking to fund and how much money they need to borrow. After submitting their answers, farmers will be provided information on farm loans that best fit their specific needs. The loan application and additional resources also will be provided.

Farmers can download application quick guides that outline what to expect from preparing an application to receiving a loan decision. There are four guides that cover loans to individuals, entities, and youth, as well as information on microloans. The guides include general eligibility requirements and a list of required forms and documentation for each

type of loan. These guides can help farmers prepare before their first USDA service center visit with a loan officer.

Farmers can access the Farm Loan Discovery Tool by visiting [farmers.gov/fund](http://farmers.gov/fund) and clicking the “Start” button. Follow the prompts and answer five simple questions to receive loan information that is applicable to your agricultural operation. The tool is built to run on any modern browser like Chrome, Edge, Firefox, or the Safari browser, and is fully functional on mobile devices. It does not work in Internet Explorer.

In 2018, USDA unveiled farmers.gov, a dynamic, mobile-friendly public website combined with an authenticated portal where farmers will be able to apply for programs, process transactions, and manage accounts.

The Farm Loan Discovery Tool is one of many resources on farmers.gov to help connect farmers to information that can help their operations. Earlier this

year, USDA launched the My Financial Information feature, which enables farmers to view their loan information, history, payments, and alerts by logging into the website.

USDA is building farmers.gov for farmers, by farmers. In addition to the interactive farm loan features, the site also offers a Disaster Assistance Discovery Tool. Farmers can visit [farmers.gov/recover/disaster-assistance-tool#step-1](http://farmers.gov/recover/disaster-assistance-tool#step-1) to find disaster assistance programs that can help their operation recover from natural disasters.

With feedback from customers and field employees who serve those customers, farmers.gov delivers farmer-focused features through an agile, iterative process to deliver the greatest immediate value to America’s agricultural producers – helping farmers and ranchers do right, and feed everyone.

The All-Sprint Car event, which was a make-up date for a previous rain out on May 18, marked the second-ever official appearance for the All Star Circuit of Champions at The Plymouth Dirt Track and the first since 1995 when Kevin Huntley of Indianapolis claimed the victory.

The event drew a stellar field of 36 All Star-IRA 410 Sprint Cars and 34 PDTR 360 Sprint Cars and the largest crowd of the season to the Plymouth one-third mile clay oval.

Polesitter Justin Peck of Monrovia, IN,

grabbed the lead on the drop of the green flag of the All Stars-IRA A-main. McFadden, who started fourth, and third starter Cory Eliason of Visalia, CA, engaged in a spirited duel for second place on the opening circuit.

On lap two, the first of four caution periods was displayed when two-time IRA champion Scotty Neitzel of Beaver Dam and Gerard McIntyre Jr. of New Oxford, PA, spun into the infield after getting locked together in turn four.

On the restart, Peck powered away as McFadden passed Eliason to gain second on lap two. One lap later, two-time All Star Series champion Greg Wilson of Benton Ridge, OH, slipped past Eliason to seize third.

Peck lapped traffic on lap five, which allowed McFadden to close the gap. On lap nine, McFadden closed to Peck's rear bumper in turn one after the leader had to check up in turn four for a lapped car in turn four on the previous lap.

Peck and McFadden engaged in a heated side-by-side duel over the next three laps before McFadden switched from the outside lane to the low groove on the slick and smooth racing surface on lap 12 to dive under Peck for the lead entering turn three. Seconds after McFadden gained the lead, Peck hooked the cushion and flipped between turns three and four, which

brought out a red flag on lap 12.

Following the restart, six-time All-Star Series champ Dale Blaney of Hartford, OH, worked his way into third from the seventh starting spot on lap 13. On the next lap, the third caution flag appeared when Jordan Goldesberry of Springfield, IL, spun in turn four. The fourth caution flag of the race appeared two laps later when Sheboygan's Scotty Thiel flipped in turn two.

After the final restart, with McFadden holding the lead and Wilson running a half straightaway behind in second, defending All-Stars champion and current point leader Aaron Reutzel of Clute, TX, was flexing his muscle as he worked his way up from the 14th starting spot to pass Eliason into fifth on lap 25. Two laps later, Reutzel powered around eighth starter Paul McMahan of Nashville, TN, to grab fourth in the running order.

Out in front of the field, McFadden had to deal with some slower traffic over the final five circuits, which allowed Wilson to close slightly. However, McFadden held strong to record his third career All Stars A-main victory and first All-Stars main event victory since 2015 in his debut appearance at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

The victory also marked McFadden's first main event win behind the wheel of

Kahne's number nine machine and first IRA A-main triumph. McFadden is presently filling in while Kahne recovers from an injury.

Wilson had to settle for second, Blaney wound up third, Reutzel charged up to finish fourth and McMahan rounded out the top five.

"Oh man, this feels good," McFadden said in victory lane. "We've been close on so many occasions, so it just feels great to get it done here tonight. I can't thank Kasey Kahne and this entire team enough for this opportunity. The track really played into our favor tonight."

Arenz, who came into the night as the hottest Midwest Sprint Car Association driver in the pit area on the strength of victories in three of the past four MSA events, grabbed the lead of the 25-lap A-main event from the pole.

By lap four, Arenz had built up a full-straightaway cushion over third starter Kevin Karnitz of West Bend. The first of two caution flags appeared on lap five when Spyder Akright of Sheboygan Falls spun in turn four.

When the race resumed, 2018 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh was making his presence felt as he moved up from his ninth starting spot to challenge fifth starter Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum for third on lap 10.

On lap 19, Karnitz closed the gap on Arenz slightly when the leaders encountered heavy lapped traffic. Two laps later on lap 21, the second caution appeared when McMullen's strong run was spoiled after contact with a lapped car sent him flipping in turn two, which brought out a red flag.

Following the restart, Arenz again pulled away over the final four laps to seal his fourth A-main victory in the last five MSA main events, sixth career and fifth MSA A-main victory of the 2019 season. He won by a quarter straightaway over Karnitz, who placed second. Wenninger finished third, 2010 PDTR 360 Sprint champion, current PDTR and MSA 360 Sprint Car point leader Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee finished fourth after starting 11th. Second starter Nich Melis of Plymouth rounded out the top five.

"It feels really good to get this win in a Sprint Car at Plymouth," Arenz said. "My last win at Plymouth was back in 2015 in a Sport Mod."

In preliminary action,

the All Star-IRA fast qualifier was James McFadden, who turned in a fast lap of 11.732 seconds. All Star-IRA heat race winners were Cory Eliason, Brock Zearfoss of Jonestown, PA, Justin Peck and Wayne Johnson of Oklahoma City, OK. The All Star-IRA B-main winner was Marcus Dumsney of Nelson, New South Wales, Australia, while Peck and Zearfoss recorded dash victories.

PDTR 360 Sprint Car heat race winners were Shane Wenninger, Jim Melis of Glenbeulah, Jason Johnson of Kewaskum and Kevin Karnitz. Bill Taylor of Boltonville won the first PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main and Adam Miller of Plymouth claimed the second PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main.

Plymouth Dirt Track racing will resume on Saturday, Aug. 3, with autograph night and past champion's night presented by Hopf Farms, which will distribute draw string bags and checkered flags to kids at the gate. Hot laps will begin at 5:30 p.m. with racing to start at 6 p.m.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**  
 August 1, 2019

**PINEAPPLE UPSIDE DOWN CAKE**  
 makes about 10 servings

*Adapted from www.allrecipes.com*

**INGREDIENTS**

**Topping:**  
 1/2 cup packed brown sugar  
 1/4 cup vegan buttery spread  
 7 canned or fresh pineapple slices  
 7 maraschino cherries

**Cake:**  
 3 tablespoons boiling water  
 1 tablespoon ground flaxseed  
 2 cups all-purpose flour  
 2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon of salt  
 1 cup granulated sugar  
 1/2 cup vegetable oil  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 cup refrigerated coconut milk beverage  
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
 1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar

**DIRECTIONS**

Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease 9-inch round baking pan.

For topping, cook and stir brown sugar and buttery spread in medium skillet over medium heat until melted and smooth. Remove from heat. Pour into prepared pan. Arrange pineapple slices in pan, placing cherries in centers of pineapples.

Combine boiling water and flaxseed in small bowl. Let stand until cool. Whisk flour, baking powder and salt in medium bowl. Whisk granulated sugar, oil and vanilla in large bowl until well blended. Whisk in flaxseed mixture. Stir in flour mixture just until moistened. Stir in coconut milk just until blended. Place baking soda in small cup; stir in vinegar. Gently stir vinegar into batter just until blended. Pour batter over pineapple.

Bake 45 to 50 minutes, or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack for 10 minutes. Run thin knife around edge of pan to loosen cake. Invert onto serving plate. Cool completely.

Note: The cake can also be baked in a 12-inch cast-iron skillet. Melt the buttery spread and brown sugar in the skillet, add the pineapple and cherries and pour the batter over the fruit. Check the cake for doneness at 40 minutes.





## Red Hot Sheppard Romps To Second Straight World Of Outlaws Triumph At Plymouth

The hottest Dirt Late model driver in the nation, Brandon Sheppard of New Berlin, IL, scorched The Plymouth Dirt Track for the second consecutive year as he survived nine caution periods and held off a mid-race challenge from Chase Junghans of Manhattan, KS, to secure his 15th Morton Buildings World of Outlaws Late Model Series A-main triumph of the season Monday, July 29, at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth.

The event drew a strong field of 33 World of Outlaws Late Models and a large crowd of spectators for the series' second appearance at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

In the support divisions, Luke Scholten of Oostburg used a daring three-way pass with three laps to go to secure the 20-lap Klips & Tips Grand National A-main victory and Cory Kemkes of Appleton made the most of his first appearance at The Plymouth Dirt Track by claiming the 20-lap Cellcom B Mod A main.

Three-time World of Outlaws Late Model champion Darrell Lanigan of Union, KY, paced the opening circuit of the 50-lap A main from the pole position before Sheppard, who started fourth, bolted up to the high groove to seize second from outside front row starter Boom Briggs of Bear Lake, PA, on lap two.

One lap later, Sheppard powered around Lanigan to take the lead in turn two on lap three. On lap four, fifth starter Ricky Weiss of Headingly, Manitoba, Canada used the extreme low groove to challenge Sheppard briefly before the first of nine caution flags was displayed on lap five for Briggs, who had stopped in turn two.

After the restart,

Sheppard held control of the top spot with Weiss in tow. Just as the leaders began to encounter lapped traffic on lap 13, the second caution flag came out on lap 14 when Tyler Bruening of Decorah, IA, who was scheduled to start third, but lost a tire during a warm-up lap and did not get on the track until the first caution flag on lap five, stopped in turn two.

Two laps later, the third caution was displayed for Nick Anvelink of Navarino, who spun in turn four on lap 16. Action began to pick up during a 17-lap green-flag run, as Junghans, who started eighth, passed Weiss to gain second on lap 28.

On the next lap, Junghans moved in to challenge Sheppard for the top spot and the two drivers dueled side by side over the next three circuits before Junghans used some heavy lapped traffic to his advantage. With Sheppard boxed in behind two lapped cars running the high and low grooves, Junghans ducked low on lap 32 to seize the lead in turn four and officially lead the 32nd lap of the race.

However, Sheppard battled back to regain the top spot on the very next lap before the fourth caution appeared when Paul Parker of Kaukauna slowed after contact with Junghans in turn four on lap 33. On the restart, Justin Reed of Camp Point, IL, and Justin Ritchie of New London spun after contact in turn three for the fifth caution.

The final 17 laps were plagued by four more caution periods for single-car spins as only 12 of the original 24 starters were still racing in the closing laps.

Sheppard, who captured the 2017 Morton Buildings World of Outlaws Late Model Series championship, pulled

away following the eighth and final caution flag on lap 48 to secure his 52nd career Morton Buildings World of Outlaws Late Model Series victory, 15th A-main triumph of the season and second straight win at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

"This has been a dream season and I'm so lucky to be driving for Mark Richards and this great Rocket Chassis team," Sheppard said. "I've worked a lot of years to get here and I got a great break when Mark first asked me to drive his car in 2012. It is really a unbelievable feeling to drive this thing."

"Things got a bit crazy for a little while and I had to go to the top line to try to work through the lapped traffic," he said. "I came up to cars that were running the top and the bottom at the same speed, but luckily it worked out in our favor in the end."

Junghans had to settle for second, Weiss placed third, 2018 and 2019 UMP Summernationals champion Brian Shirley of Chatham, Ill. came from the seventh starting spot to finish fourth and Dennis Erb. Jr. of Carpentersville, Ill.

completed the top five after starting ninth.

Both Junghans and Weiss were pleased with their podium finishes.

"It was a challenge to get around the lapped cars, which helped me to close the gap on Brandon and get the lead very briefly," Junghans said. "I'm glad that things seem to be going in the right direction for us. We keep getting a little bit better, which is encouraging."

"We've been real good all year with a lot of top-threes and top-fives," Weiss said. "We've been racing really well and I hope we can keep it up. We will just keep digging."

Justin Pearson of Burnett grabbed the lead on the opening lap of the 20-lap Grand National A main from the outside front row starting position before Jason Juech of Plymouth battled back to apply pressure on lap two. The first of five caution flags appeared later on lap two when Dave Holm, Bruce Troesch and Derek Kaat collided in turn three.

After the start, Pearson continued to lead with Juech in second and fourth starter Steven Weber of Plymouth moving into third on lap three. The second caution flag was displayed when Tyler Kulow of Plymouth and 2018 PDTR Grand National champion Matt Loehr of Dotyville got hooked together and stopped in turn four on lap eight.

When green flag action resumed, eighth starter Josh Pierce of Random Lake charged in to pressure Juech for second beginning on lap 12. After three consecu-

tive laps of heated side-by-side action, Juech spun in turn four after apparent contact with Pierce. Both Juech and Pierce were both sent to the rear of the field for causing the caution.

On the restart, sixth starter J.J. Pagel of Mount Calvary flexed his muscle to move into second place and mount heavy pressure on Pearson for the lead starting on lap 16. One lap later, Pagel and Pearson collided in turn three, which opened the door for Luke Scholten to charge up from his 13th starting spot and into the lead with a daring three-wide move entering turn three on lap 17.

One lap later, a five-car caution flag appeared on lap 18 following contact between Pearson and Pagel, along with three other cars. The fifth and final caution flag appeared on lap 18 when Nick Schumacher of Eagle stopped on the frontstretch with an apparent mechanical problem.

Scholten held down the top spot on the final restart to earn his 12th career PDTR Grand National A-main victory, which moves him into a tie for second on the all-time PDTR Grand National A-main victory list behind Brad Lubach, who leads the way with 24.

Pearson placed second in his PDTR debut, Loehr finished third, Derek Schrauth of Omro wound up fourth after starting 10th and Jeff Muehlbauer of Elkhart Lake placed fifth after starting ninth.

First-time PDTR competitor Cory Kemkes of Appleton seized the lead

of the 20-lap PDTR B Mod A main from the pole. On lap three, outside front row starter Tim Warner of Fond du Lac gained the runner-up spot with fourth starter Jesse Cullen of Chilton settling into third.

The second of three caution flags appeared on lap six for a four-car incident in turn four. On the restart, Warner stayed in close contact with Kemkes with Cullen in tow in third and 2018 PDTR B Mod champion Tim Sheppard of Beaver Dam, who started 17th, and Chris Budzban of Appleton, who started third, dueling for fifth on lap 11.

After the third and final caution was displayed on lap 12 for a single-car spin, Sheppard advanced to fourth and moved in to challenge Cullen for third. Out in front, it was all Kemkes as he fended off Tim Warner to claim his first career PDTR B Mod A-main victory in his first attempt.

Warner placed second, Cullen wound up third, Sheppard placed fourth and Budzban was fifth.

Brandon Sheppard set a new Late Model track record in Morton Buildings World of Outlaws Late Model Series qualifying with a circuit of 13.709 seconds around the third-mile clay oval. The World of Outlaws Last Chance Showdown 1 winner was 10-time NOS Energy Drink World of Outlaws Sprint Car champion Donny Schatz of Fargo, N.D. and Terry Casey of New London captured the second Last Chance Showdown race.



Section 1. That Section 94-105(a) of Chapter 94, Division 3 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to Meters & Fees, should be repealed and adopted as follows:

(a) On quarterly water bills due and not paid within seven business days of due date, a late payment charge will be added to the bills per PSC rate file Mg-1 and a past due notice will be mailed warning of possible disconnection. This late payment charge will be applicable to all customers. The utility customer may be given written notice that the bill is overdue no sooner than 20 days after the bill is issued. If water bill is still not paid ten business days after the past due notice was mailed a disconnection notice will be attached to the front entry of the building. Unless payment or satisfactory arrangement for payment is made with the clerk/treasurer service will be disconnected between 24 and 48 hours after the disconnection notice was attached to the front entry

of the building, pursuant to public service commission rule 185.37, Wis. Adm. Code. The total amount due and a reconnection fee of \$35.00 (\$45.00 if outside office hours per public service commission rate form R-1) must be paid before the water service is restored.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and posting or publication as provided by law.


