## Four Vie For Open School Board Seat

Four people have applied for the open seat on the Kewaskum School Board after Jay Fisher resigned last month.

Dennis Aupperle, Mary Miller, Wayne Sargent and Neal Weare all turned in applications to be considered for the seat. The board is expected to discuss filling the vacancy at the next regular School Board meeting next Monday, Aug. 12.

As outlined by state statute, the remaining members of the Kewaskum Board of Education will appoint someone to fill the existing vacancy on the board.

The candidates may be expected to interview with the Board of Education during the month of August, according to information the district released last month. The

appointment may occur following the interviews.

If the remaining six members on the board do not come to an agreement on who to appoint to the position within 60 days, Board President Mark Sette can appoint someone to the position, according to board policy.

Fisher, who served as board treasurer, resigned from the board on Tuesday, July 9, because he is moving to West Bend, out of the Kewaskum School District.

Candidates interested in filling the position were required to submit a letter of interest in the district administrator's office by July 31.

The person who is appointed to fill the vacant school board position will serve the remainder of Fisher's term, which ends in the spring. The position will then be on the spring ballot.

## ATVs Now Allowed On Some Area Roads

All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are not just for off-road excursions anymore in some area towns and villages.

ATVs are allowed on designated roads in the Town of Scott, the Town of Osceola, the Town of Forest and the Village of Campbellsport.

Town boards in Farmington, Wayne, Kewaskum, Auburn and Ashford all have approved ordinances that allow ATVs on their roads. However, the ordinances will not go into effect until signs are posted in those towns.

The new ordinances are coming to area roadways thanks to the efforts of four ATV enthusiasts: Tom Thompson, Tim Rohrer, Rick Welch and Tom Kempke.

### The Presentation

Last fall, the foursome approached a municipality for the first time when they went to a town board meeting in Auburn.

Since then, the group has gone to many town and county meetings to introduce the idea of allowing ATVs on roadways.

# WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

## Safety Resource Program Community Outreach

The Washington County Sheriff's Office continues its commitment to ensuring that all public institutions and private businesses within the county are well equipped and trained to handle an active violence threat within our community.

"Successful prevention, response, and mitigation of an active violence threat cannot be successfully accomplished by law enforcement alone. Law enforcement bears the responsibility to take the lead and ensure that our community is prepared to deal with these threats; however, the success of the mission requires a collaborative partnership within the community," Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said.

Schulteis is committed to funding this initiative within the confines of the existing Sheriff's Office budget but also understands that the financial generosity of our community partners makes Washington County stronger.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is seeking community partners to assist in funding equipment needs of the Safety Resource Program. This new program is intended to take proactive approaches to safety, security, and preparedness in all areas of the County, especially schools. The program has identified certain equipment that will improve law enforcement's response capabilities in an emergency; the ability to collaboratively plan and share planning data with responders; and to address other needs, such as getting high-quality first aid packs.

Examples include: a hardware and software system for quickly digitizing and annotating building floor plans where blueprints may no longer be available, or

are found to not be "as-built"; response equipment which assists law enforcement officers to rapidly enter schools in an emergency; assisting schools to purchase pre-packaged bleeding control kits which can be rapidly accessed in any type of emergency which involves bleeding.

In trauma, the number one preventable cause of death is bleeding out. In a situation with excessive bleeding, the injured party could die in five minutes or less, depending on heart rate and other factors. In many cases, professional medical attention is not able to get to the patient in under five minutes.

"The only thing more horrendous than a tragic death is one that could have been prevented," Schulteis said.

The Sheriff's Office hopes to partner with fire departments and schools to provide "Stop the Bleed" training to all schools, county-wide in the near future.

Safety Resource Program Deputy Chris Parkinson would like to remind everyone that prevention is preferred to having to respond, so "If you see something, say something."

The Sheriff's Office appreciates all of its community members for taking an active role in this partnership and ensuring preparedness within Washington County.

King will be on probation until August 15, 2028. He will be monitored closely by WI-DOC Division of Community Correction. King will have numerous

rules and restrictions to follow including wearing a live tracking GPS unit.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is NOT wanted by law enforcement at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but rather it is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

# DNR Warns Of Hunting And Fishing License Scam

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is urging the public to beware of online hunting and fishing license scams leaving purchasers with an empty hook and wallet.

The DNR is aware of at least two websites appearing to offer fishing or hunting licenses. After paying a fee, consumers only receive information on how to apply for a hunting or fishing license. These sites also collect sensitive personal data as part of their unauthorized transactions.

"You will not receive a valid fishing license from these misleading websites. But, you will be charged non-refundable fees despite the money-back guarantee declared on the site," said

Kimberly Currie, DNR director of customer and outreach services. "The best way to make sure you don't fall prey to these scammers is to purchase your license directly from the DNR or its authorized agents."

Anglers can securely purchase a valid fishing license for the state of Wisconsin in the following three ways:

- At a Wisconsin DNR Service Center, or
- Through an independent license sales agent authorized by DNR, such as a local sporting goods store, large discount store or local bait and tackle shops, that use the Go Wild point of sale terminal, or
- From the department's only official online license sales site,

GoWild.

The Wisconsin DNR values users' online safety and provides links from its homepage to a safe, secure online purchasing site. The DNR also provides information about where to purchase licenses in person, links to free copies of Wisconsin regulations and helpful tutorials on the DNR website

under Licenses & Regulations.

Nineteen eighty-seven is an awesome number. It is the year my son was born. It was also the year that The Simpsons was seen on TV for the first time. Nineteen eighty-seven is just 13 less than two thousand. For math geeks it is the 300th prime number. How cool is that? 1,987 is also the amount of people we (Washington County Libraries) interacted with at the Washington County Fair this year.

The libraries had a booth at the fair for the first time in twenty years; although we think it was the first time ever, but don't quote me on that. We had several goals in mind for attending the fair. First and foremost, we wanted to reach out to the county and talk about what we do, the services we provide and the programs the five county libraries offer. We talked about the essential services we provided to card holders such as the databases to help with job searches and the convenience and ease of our eBook app.

Additionally, we desired to reach the non-users of the library and we met those at the fair. It was worth our six days there to talk to people about what their libraries of today are doing. I know we reached non-users because the week following, we saw some of them at Kewaskum Public Library. Several new families attended story time, I issued library cards to more than a few residents and I saw the increase of users registered on our databases.

I love the Washington County Fair and have attended almost

every year since I've lived here. We are usual Tuesday night goers because of the fireworks. I like looking at the animals; my favorites are the pigs and goats. Installing a mailbox, building a deck, planting a tree and laying a patio are all examples of digging projects that need Diggers Hotline before starting.

It doesn't matter how deep the digging project will go. The depth of utility lines can vary for a number of reasons, such as erosion, previ-

ous digging projects and uneven surfaces. Utility lines need to be marked because even when digging only a few inches, the risk of striking an underground utility line still exists.

Anyone digging in Wisconsin, homeowners

## continued from front Village Takes First Steps To Improve Facilities

Architects will have a larger footprint to work with than what is currently available for the village facilities, according to Village Administrator Matt Heiser.

The Kewaskum Public Library Foundation, Inc. owns the empty lot located directly east of the library. The foundation wants that property to be used for a public library or a library expansion, so architects will include that space in the design.

On Monday night, the Village Board went into closed session to consider a proposed real estate gift agreement from the Kewaskum Public Library Foundation, Inc.

Following the closed session, the board voted to table the issue until the next meeting on August 19. The board will send a letter of its concerns to the Library Foundation's board.

"We don't want to rush into anything. We want to make sure this is right when we do it," Village Trustee Dick Knoebel said.

The village and library foundation are both hopeful that an agreement will be reached in the near future.

"Even though the land transfer hasn't taken place yet, the village has been taking care of upkeep of the land, including lawn care and snow removal, and we want to express our sincere gratitude for that," said Library Director Lori Kreis, who is also a member of the Library Foundation.

### Architectural Proposal

The village received proposals from six architectural firms to conduct a needs analysis.

"All the proposals were scrutinized on 11 different criteria. Our

committee looked at those individual proposals and scored them individually. We rolled those numbers together and Zimmerman came out on top," said Village Trustee Dave Spenner, who serves on the village's facilities needs committee.

Zimmerman had the most in-house staff to be able to accomplish the task, according to Spenner.

"They can do it in a timeline that is very desirable for the village," he said.

Phase One is slated to be done by the end of September.

"That includes the complete engineering and review of our existing structure, as well as we will have some ideas and collect information about what kinds of needs are needed by the various departments, as well as the library," Spenner said.

Zimmerman will make conceptual plans, with detailed construction drawings and project renderings.

"That will be done by the end of September, which will position us well to use that information as we move to 2020," Spenner said.

### Project Funding

Zimmerman is charging a flat fee of about \$11,500 for the service for Phase One.

The library will cover one-third of that cost, while the village picks up the other two-thirds of the tab.

That brings the village's portion to about \$7,667, and the library's bill to approximately \$3,833.

"Those numbers get tweaked a little bit if the library decides to use the capital money from the county for this project, because the village

has to match that dollar per dollar," Heiser said.

If the county funds are used, an addition \$1,917 will be added to the village portion, making the total for the village about \$9,584, according to Heiser. With a current balance of over \$58,000 in its municipality outlay account, the village would be able to cover that cost, Heiser said.

The village will have the option to go forward with phases two and three, but is not obli-

gated to do so.

The proposed second phase, which includes fundraising, would run from October 2019 to March 2020. The proposal for Phase Two carries a fixed, not-to-exceed fee of \$16,000.

The proposal for Phase Three includes design and construction of the project, would occur from March to May 2020. The proposal is for construction documents to be completed from May through Au-

gust 2020, with bidding occurring in September 2020. If the board approves this phase, construction would be completed in May 2021. The proposed cost of services for Phase Three would be a 5 3/4 percent fee of the total construction cost. If the conceptual design moves forward with little or no change, half of the Phase One fee would be credited in this phase.

"This is an exciting undertaking. People talked

about the renovation as early as my interview, and seeing the changes happening is very exciting," said Kreis, who started working as the library's director last October.

"It has been a great experience being part of the pre-planning process, and I can't wait for further planning and having a renovated building to better serve the community today and in the future," Kreis said.





# USDA Opens Signup For Market Facilitation Program

## – Enrollment Now Open Through December 6

Signup opened July 29, for the Market Facilitation Program (MFP), a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) program to assist farmers who continue to suffer from damages because of unjustified trade retaliation from foreign nations. Through MFP, USDA will provide up to \$14.5 billion in direct payments to impacted producers, part of a broader trade relief package announced in late July. The sign-up period runs through Dec. 6.

“Our team at USDA reflected on what worked well and gathered feedback on last year’s program to make this one even stronger and more effective for farmers. Our farmers work hard, are the most productive in the world, and we aim to match their enthusiasm and patriotism as we support them,” said Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue.

MFP payments will be made to producers of certain non-specialty and specialty crops as well as dairy and hog

producers.

MFP payments will be made to producers of alfalfa hay, barley, canola, corn, crambe, dried beans, dry peas, extra-long staple cotton, flaxseed, lentils, long grain and medium grain rice, millet, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, rapeseed, rye, safflower, sesame seed, small and large chickpeas, sorghum, soybeans, sunflower seed, temperate japonica rice, triticale, upland cotton, and wheat.

MFP assistance for 2019 crops is based on a single county payment rate multiplied by a farm’s total plantings to the MFP-eligible crops in aggregate in 2019. Those per acre payments are not dependent on which of those crops are planted in 2019. A producer’s total payment-eligible plantings cannot exceed total 2018 plantings.

Dairy producers who were in business as of June 1, 2019, will receive a per hundred-weight payment on production history, and

hog producers will receive a payment based on the number of live hogs owned on a day selected by the producer between April 1 and May 15, 2019.

MFP payments will also be made to producers of almonds, cranberries, cultivated ginseng, fresh grapes, fresh sweet cherries, hazelnuts, macadamia nuts, pecans, pistachios, and walnuts. Each specialty crop will receive a payment based on 2019 acres of fruit or nut bearing plants, or in the case of ginseng, based on harvested acres in 2019.

Payments will be made in up to three tranches, with the second and third tranches evaluated as market conditions and trade opportunities dictate. If conditions warrant, the second and third tranches will be made in November and early January.

MFP payments are limited to a combined \$250,000 for non-specialty crops per person or legal entity. MFP payments are also limited to

a combined \$250,000 for dairy and hog producers and a combined \$250,000 for specialty crop producers. However, no applicant can receive more than \$500,000. Eligible applicants must also have an average adjusted gross income (AGI) for tax years 2015, 2016, and 2017 of less than \$900,000, or 75 percent of the person’s or legal entity’s average AGI for those tax years must have been derived from farming and ranching.

Applicants must also comply with the provisions of the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation regulations.

## Puppy Scams: How To Protect Yourself From Fake Online Pet Sellers

If you are looking for a pet to add to your family, be on the lookout for scams. As more consumers turn to the internet to find new pets, more scams are popping up online. Experts say a shocking 80 percent of sponsored advertisements about pets may be fake.

BBB ScamTracker has 907 reports on this type of fraud and a Federal Trade Commission report found some 37,000 complaints involving pets. A vast majority of those were believed to be puppy sale scams. When you consider that FTC finds that less than 10 percent of victims of fraud actually complain, you can see that the problem is even larger than the numbers indicate.

BBB Serving Wisconsin has seen a rise in this type of scam in recent weeks, with several consumers reporting similar experiences: they find an irresistibly adorable pet for sale online and wire money to the seller, who is tasked with shipping the pet to them, but instead the seller pockets the cash and is never heard from again.

The BBB International Investigations Initiative conducted an extensive study of online puppy scams. The study looks at the scope of this problem, who is behind it, and the need for law enforcement consumer education to address the issue. You can read the full study here or download a PDF here.

The study also has tips for avoiding puppy scams:

- Don't buy a pet without seeing it in person. Do an internet search of the picture of the pet you are considering. If the same picture appears on multiple websites, you may be dealing with a fraud. You also can search for text

from ads or testimonials to see if the seller copied it from another site.

- Never pay a stranger with a money order or through Western Union or Moneygram.

- Always use a credit card in case you need to dispute the charges.

- Research prices for the breed you are interested in adopting. If someone is advertising a purebred dog for free or at a deeply discounted price, you could be dealing with a fraudulent offer.

- The Humane Society of the United States refers consumers to local shelters. They also have tips for finding a reputable breeder.



# Wisconsinites Invited To Help Identify Aquatic Invasive Species During Snapshot Day Event

Water lovers of all ages across the state of Wisconsin are invited to join a search for aquatic invasive species on August 17th, 2019. This fun, hands-on effort, known as Snapshot Day, relies on participants to monitor local lakes and streams at designated sites across the state for signs of non-native plants and animals that pose risks to Wisconsin waterways and wildlife.



**ROASTED PORK CHOPS AND PEACHES**

makes about 4 servings

**INGREDIENTS**

- 1 10-ounce package couscous ( 1 1/2 cups)
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 4 bone-in pork chops (3/4 inch thick; about 2 lbs total)
- Kosher salt and black pepper
- 2 peaches, cut into wedges
- 1 small red onion, cut into thin wedges
- 3 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 1/2 cup fresh basil leaves

**DIRECTIONS**

Heat the oven to 400 F. Cook the couscous according to the package directions. Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat. Season the pork with 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper and cook until browned, 3 to 5 minutes per side. Transfer to a plate. Add the peaches, onion, vinegar, and 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper to the skillet, and cook, tossing, for 1 minute. Return the pork and any accumulated juices to the skillet. Transfer the skillet to the oven and roast until the pork is cooked through and the peaches are tender, 8 to 10 minutes. Serve with the couscous and sprinkle with the basil.

## Stroke Risk Higher For Women Than For Men

Everyone should be aware of the warning signs of stroke. In the United States, stroke is the fourth leading cause of death among men and the third leading cause of death in women, according to the American Stroke Association.

"In fact, about 55,000 more women than men have a stroke each year and strokes kill twice as many women as breast cancer every year," according to Nathan Larsen, MD, St. Agnes Hospital Emergency Department & EMS medical director.

A stroke occurs when blood flow to the brain is disrupted due to a blocked or ruptured blood vessel. The brain is very oxygen-dependent, so even a few minutes without oxygen-rich blood can cause brain damage and bring on telltale stroke symptoms.

Classic symptoms include sudden weakness; paralysis or numbness in the face, arms or legs; trouble speaking or understanding speech; vision disturbances; and sudden mental status changes, such as confusion or memory loss.

Some risk factors are the same for men and women:

- a family history of stroke

- high blood pressure
- high cholesterol
- smoking
- diabetes

- being overweight
- not exercising

Other risks are unique to women:

- taking birth control pills
- being pregnant; stroke risk increases during a normal pregnancy due to natural changes in the body such as increased blood pressure and stress on the heart
- using Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT), a combined hor-

mone therapy of progesterin and estrogen, to relieve menopausal symptoms

- having a thick waist and high triglyceride (blood fat) level; postmenopausal women with a waist size larger than 35.2 inches and a triglyceride level higher than 128 milligrams per liter may have a five-fold increased risk for stroke

- being a migraine headache sufferer; migraines can increase a woman's stroke risk three to six times, and most Americans who suffer migraines are women

The key to treating and surviving stroke is quick medical intervention.

"If you notice anyone exhibiting the symptoms above, it is imperative to call 911 immediately," says Dr. Larsen. "Do not attempt to drive the individual to the hospital because emergency medical personnel can begin life-saving treatment in the ambulance en route to the nearest emergency room."

An acronym to help you remember this information is FAST - Act FAST for Stroke!

Face: Facial droop, uneven smile


Arm: Arm numbness, arm weakness

Speech: Slurred speech, difficult to understand

Time: Call 911 and get to the hospital immediately

Strokes caused by a blocked blood vessel can be treated with medicines that dissolve clots, but the medicine must be administered as soon as possible to maximize its effectiveness.

"Once at the hospital, a patient may have a procedure to further open the blood vessel by delivering clot-busting medication directly to the blockage or removing the clot through a catheter," says Dr. Larsen.

**BBB Tip: Back To School**

**Jot everything down on a list and stick to it!** Impulse buying can jack up your overall total in a hurry.

**Shop your home:** You may already have some of the items from last year hidden in your home. Why purchase the same thing twice?

**Research big ticket items:** Before purchasing that expensive laptop, tablet or dorm refrigerator, be sure to do your research. Research the brands, warranty, customer reviews and the prices at various stores to be sure you're getting the best deal. Also, find the retailer on BBB.org.

**Look for the sales:** Compare prices between different retail stores, save your coupons, sign up for email alerts and redeem any cash-back or rebate offers. This will help you get the best deals, saving you a nice chunk of dough.

**Ask for student discounts:** Many stores and software companies offer discounts to students that have either an .edu email address or a student ID. Even if you don't see a discount advertised at the store, it doesn't hurt to ask.

**Shop in bulk:** Some teachers ask parents to buy bulk items for the entire classroom to use throughout the year. Talk with other parents about what they're getting, and see if you can all split the cost.

Do your research. An unknown website may offer a similar product at a lower price. The lowest price isn't always the best route. Check for user reviews and badges for consumer protection agencies.

Be sure to use your credit card instead of your debit card, as credit cards not only provide additional protection, but it's also easier to dispute a fraudulent charge.

Be extremely wary of any website or store that asks for your child's personal information in order to access special deals.

If you're buying supplies through a website like Craigslist, make sure you don't wire money to someone you've not met. Use PayPal if possible, but if you are using cash, make sure you meet in a public place and bring a friend.

If you use Facebook you know banner ads are all over the place and many ads are even catered to what you like. Some of them, however, are just click bait ads to drive you to a different website where you could potentially be asked to input personal information. Take note of the ad and go to the store's website directly.

**Protect Your Child From Identity Theft**  
Another thing to think about while getting your kids ready for back-to-school is identity theft. Believe it or not, children are especially good targets because they have zero credit history and no questionable banking transactions in their history. A child can have their ID stolen through their social security number or social insurance number and you may not find out about it for years.

Here are some tips for protecting your child's identity as they head back to school:  
Don't allow them to carry around their social insurance number or social security number. Leave it at home and locked in a safe place.  
If a business or school asks for their SIN or SSN, ask questions. Why do they need it and where and how is this information being stored? How long is it being stored and how will it be terminated? Who has access to it?

## Military Consumers At Higher Risk For Marketplace Losses, According To BBB Report

Military consumers face unique challenges in the marketplace that can result in higher median losses to scammers and other marketplace fraud, according to the Better Business Bureau's new report, Military Consumers & Marketplace Trust: An Analysis of Marketplace Challenges Facing the Military Community (BBB.org/MilitaryReport).

The report looked at the more than 28,000 business complaints and 5,000 scam reports submitted to BBB by military consumers in 2018 and then compared those to reports of all consumers in the U.S. and Canada to highlight key differences reported

by military consumers. The Better Business Bureau Institute for Marketplace Trust (BBB Institute) partnered with the Association of Military Banks of America (AMBA) to release this report during Military Consumer Month.

"Trust is vitally important in the military community," said Melissa Bittner, who manages BBB's Military & Veterans Initiative, including BBB Military Line®. "Knowing which businesses military families can trust while navigating life in the military is essential, because scammers prey on individuals who must make quick purchasing decisions."

One scenario where

military consumers are often forced to make quicker purchasing decisions than the majority of consumers is during Permanent Change of Station moves. Military consumers filed more complaints about securing and maintaining their homes, moving, and purchases related to relocation than the general population, and they also reported higher rates of losing money to home improvement scammers. Relocation can also make finding secure, stable employment a challenge for spouses and other family members.

Military consumers reported losing a median of \$200 when falling victim to a scam, according

to data collected through BBB Scam Tracker®, BBB's interactive online reporting tool (BBB.org/ScamTracker). This is 32 percent higher than the \$152 reported by all consumers in 2018.

"Employment scams were the riskiest scams for military consumers, as they were for all consumers in 2018, according to the BBB Scam Tracker Risk Report (BBB.org/RiskReport)," said Melissa Lanning Trumpower, executive director of the BBB Institute. "The difference is that for military consumers the median losses reported were \$2,460 — more than double that of all consumers."

"There are legal protections in place to support service members and their families in the marketplace, but scammers don't care about what is legal or ethical," said Steven Lepper, president and CEO of AMBA. "Education is our best defense to prevent military consumers from losing their money to fraudsters."

AMBA is comprised of banking institutions that serve military personnel and their families around the world. "It's our duty to ensure high-quality financial readiness resources get into the hands of our men and women in uniform. Reports like these help

guide our education efforts, and we are proud to partner with the Better Business Bureau in advancing a trustworthy marketplace."

# Back Home Surprise! Tractors Teach Life Lessons

If the measure of success is the ability to climb back up on the horse that bucked me, then I have the saddle sores to prove it.

The bell rang for round two of my seemingly endless and so far fruitless quest of putting up some hay this summer to feed my animals. Round one ended when Mother Nature delivered a knockout punch of six inches of rain on the hay. I was left with a few dozen moldy bales.

It's a 30-year-old Ford 6600 tractor without a hood, with a dead battery, iffy hydraulics and a cracked seat that always leaves my butt wet. Climbing back up on it is hardly the iconic image of a cowboy hopping up on a saddle. But that's what I did to answer the bell.

I had parked the tractor on an incline so I could start it by popping the clutch. But the old iron horse was temperamental so I was forced to resort to a battery charger once I ran out of speed.

My first order of business was to rake the now three-week-old hay that was still on the field. The regrowth was thick enough that I needed to rake the windrows twice to pull the old hay out of the new. Some of the ground on the lower-lying parts of the field was still wet from the recent deluge.

Surprisingly a lot of the hay was not rotten because it had not been raked prior to the rains and was able to dry. We put that field into large round bales, which will have little nutritional value. But it can always be used for bedding.

The forecast was a rare occurrence so far for this summer — three consecutive days of

warm weather and sunshine. So we cut two smaller fields of about four acres each, of mainly grass. I planned to put those fields into small squares.

I hated raking hay when I was a kid because it was so boring, driving around and around a field with no distractions to occupy my busy young mind. Now I enjoy raking hay for the exact same reasons. It's a rare opportunity to empty a busy old mind and fill it with self-reflection and contemplation.

The advancement of summer was all around me. There were small green apples developing in a tree next to the field. Black-cap raspberries are beginning to ripen, with blackberries to follow in a few weeks.

The hilltop fields were once woods. They were cleared by my great-grandfather and grandfather with a horse and stump puller — the same one I found this past year. On the same hill is an old hay loader that was once used to pile loose hay on wagons. Four generations of family have worked this land.

As I raked under the hot sun, dozens of monarch butterflies accompanied me. A healthy milkweed patch surrounds the fields, with monarchs flitting from plant to plant. Milkweeds are essential to monarchs for nectar. They also need the plants to lay their eggs; monarch caterpillars only eat milkweed plants.

Those amazing creatures made me realize that we can't live in the past nor fret about the future. We must do our best today. Time marches on. We grow older. The cycle of life continues.

This is the first year I haven't made hay with Dad, whose health won't allow it anymore. He once worked from sunup to sundown, putting up bale after bale in the barn. He set the tone for the work that was expected from others.

I didn't realize at the time, but along with building muscle, it built character and a tough inner fiber that created a man out of this boy. I learned to work until the job is done and I'm satisfied to see the results. Equipment breaks down and, as they say, stuff happens. But I roll up my sleeves, dirty my hands and move on.

I finished raking the hay and retrieved the baler. The hay was dry. No rain in sight. All systems go.

I had only a few bales into the wagon when I smelled burning leaves — again. My suspicions were confirmed. A bearing in the thrower chute was burned out. I shut the baler down and headed for home.

Plan B was implemented; the hay was put into round bales. New bearings are on the way — as long as I need to remove the shaft I might as well replace both of them.

My hands will become greasy, my knuckles will be scraped and my patience will be tested. But I'll do my best to repair the baler for the next time.

It's what I was taught to do.

# Fassbender Returns To MSA Victory Lane At Outagamie

Former Midwest Sprint Car Association champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett snapped a two-year main event victory drought with an impressive triumph in the 25-lap Dave "Hagar" Nelson Memorial MSA A-main at Outagamie Speedway Powered by EWSC Racing in Seymour on Friday, Aug. 2.

The 17th MSA racing event of the 2019 season drew a field of 29 cars to honor Dave "Hagar" Nelson, a dedicated supporter of the MSA, who passed away on July 5.

After a spin by two-time MSA champion Danny Schlafer of Sussex on the opening lap prompted a complete restart, the race ran caution-free with highly competitive green-flag action throughout the third-mile clay oval the rest of the way.

Kewaskum's Shane Wenninger jumped out to the lead on the drop of the green flag from the pole position with outside front row starter Will Gerrits of Waupun falling into second along the inside groove of slick and tricky track surface.

On lap two, Fassbender, who started sixth, ventured up to the high line where he found a groove to his liking. One lap later, the 2005 MSA champion swept past 2014 MSA Masters Series champion Paul Pokorski of West Bend, who started fourth, to assume third in the running order.

As Wenninger was setting a strong pace at the front of the field, Fassbender continued his charge as he powered around Gerrits on lap four and set his sights on the lead. Two laps later, Fassbender

seized the lead from Wenninger in turn one.

On lap 10, Fassbender encountered lapped traffic, which proved to be challenging at some points with cars running two-wide for position throughout the field. On lap 16, Fassbender was briefly boxed in behind two cars at the rear of the field, which allowed Gerrits to close the gap considerably.

Gerrits moved to within striking distance of Fassbender on lap 19 and applied pressure for the remainder of the race. On lap 24, Gerrits ducked low to pull even with Fassbender briefly.

However, the 27-year veteran held on to secure his first MSA A-main victory since July 8, 2017, and the 20th main event triumph of his MSA career. Fassbender is the ninth different driver to win an MSA

A-main event this season.

Gerrits finished a close second, seventh starter Travis Arenz of Sheboygan, who came into the event as the winner of four of the past five MSA A-mains and co-leader in the MSA point standings, placed third, Adam Miller of Plymouth finished fourth after starting eighth and Pokorski rounded out the top five.

Danny Schlafer won the 12-lap MSA B-main and 10-lap heat race victories went to Lance Fassbender, Justin Miller of Plymouth, Paul Pokorski and Adam Miller.

The next MSA touring race will take place Sunday, Aug. 11, with the series' third and final visit to Angell Park Speedway in Sun Prairie of the 2019 season. Hot laps will begin at 5:30 p.m. with racing to follow.

# Managing, Harvesting and Pricing Late Planted Corn For Silage

The 2019 growing season opened with cooler and wetter conditions than what we have observed in recent memory, resulting in many acres of late planted corn. These late planted acres may require a new approach to managing, harvesting and pricing late planted corn for silage and will be among the topics discussed at the Sheboygan County Forage Council Twilight Meeting scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 22, at Double Dutch Dairy, The Stapel Families, W3653 Hoitink Road, Cedar Grove, Wisconsin. The farm opens to guests at 6 p.m. with brats and the educational program kicking off at 7 p.m.

Among the featured speakers are specialists in corn silage management and dairy nutrition. Dr. Joe Lauer, UW-Madison Extension Corn Specialist, is responsible for conducting applied research and delivering Extension programs relating to corn grain and corn silage production for Wisconsin. Joe will provide an in-depth look at Managing, Harvesting and Pricing Late Planted Corn for Silage.

Dr. Steve Woodford is a Dairy Nutritionist with Nutrition Professionals Inc. in Sheboygan Falls. Woodford will discuss The Benefits of High Quality Forages and What I Have Learned Feeding High Producing Dairy Herds.

The Sheboygan River Progressive Farmers will also be available to share information on how to participate in cost-share programs for on-farm water quality and conservation practices. There will also be information available on fall seeding crops after silage or grain crops.

# Bonus Antlerless Deer Harvest Authorizations Available For Purchase Starting August 19

Bonus harvest authorizations (formerly known as tags) for antlerless deer during the 2019 Wisconsin deer hunting seasons will be available for purchase starting Monday, Aug. 19, at 10 a.m. through the Go Wild website and license sales locations.

The fall deer hunt is just around the corner. Hunters can search the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources website, [dnr.wi.gov](http://dnr.wi.gov), for keyword "deer" to prepare for another season in the woods.

Bonus antlerless harvest authorizations will be sold at a rate of one per person per day until sold out or until the 2019 deer hunting season ends. The cost is \$12 each for Wisconsin residents, \$20 each for non-residents and \$5 each for youth ages 11 and under.

For a list of units with bonus antlerless harvest authorizations available for purchase, search for keywords "bonus availability." These and all other deer hunting licenses and harvest authorizations are available online through the Go Wild website or at any of more than 1,000 license sales locations.

To prepare for the sale, each day at 9:45 a.m., an online queuing system will be put in place to manage volume in the Go Wild system. At 10 a.m., all online users that are on the site will be randomly assigned a number and

staged into a "virtual" line regardless of the actual time you entered into the system. There is no advantage for customers who enter the site before 9:45 a.m. Please note that customers who enter the site after the randomization that occurs at 10 a.m. will move to the end of the "virtual" line in the order in which they arrive. All visitors to the site during this time will go into the queuing system.

When hunters access the Go Wild site, they should follow the prompts until they reach their personalized dashboard. To purchase a bonus antlerless harvest authorization, click the "Buy Licenses" button from the dashboard to open the sales catalog. From there, look for Bonus Antlerless Harvest Authorization at the very top of the list. People who haven't had the chance to get a license in advance will be able to purchase one through Go Wild after selecting the Bonus Antlerless Harvest Authorization.

Hunters will need to know the deer management zone and unit in which they intend to hunt. They will also need to determine whether they will hunt on public or private land to make their purchase.

The first three days of bonus sales are management zone-specific and will be available as follows:

•August 19, 10 a.m. - Northern and Central

Forest (Zone 1);

•August 20, 10 a.m.- Central Farmland (Zone 2);

•August 21, 10 a.m.- Southern Farmland (Zone 2); and

•August 22, 10 a.m. - remaining bonus harvest authorizations (all zones).

As a reminder, Farmland (Zone 2) antlerless harvest authorizations are now available for distribution. A Farmland (Zone 2) antlerless harvest authorization is included with the purchase of each deer hunting license in units that offer them. Some units will offer more than one antlerless deer harvest authorization with

each deer license.



This year, the Local Working Group meeting will be held on Wednesday, Sept. 18, from 1 p.m.-3 p.m. at the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center, N2875 State Highway 67, Campbellsport.

Local Working Group meetings are open to the public. Anyone interested in becoming a

"Local Working Groups offer a seat at the table for interested individuals and groups to advise NRCS on how best to set priorities and locally implement conservation programs," said Angela Biggs, Wisconsin State Conservationist. "Members are diverse, with an interest and focus on local agriculture and various natural resource issues," added Biggs.

Farmers representing a variety of crops and livestock raised within

the local area, private woodland owners, representatives of agricultural and environmental organizations, and representatives of other agriculture and natural resource agencies are welcome and should be represented.

Wisconsin LWGs represent two or more counties grouped together by geography, similar land use, resources, and type of agriculture. See a map of Local Working Groups. This will allow greater flexibility and access to funding for the groups.

One of the main programs discussed at the meetings will be the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), a federal conservation program that helps agricultural pro-

ducers in a manner that promotes agricultural production and environmental quality as compatible goals. EQIP offers technical and financial assistance to help landowners with needed conservation practices for water quality, soil health, wildlife and other natural resources.

**ATVs Now Allowed On Some Area Roads**

The group brings a proposed ordinance, which it got from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) website. The ordinance has certain restrictions, such as ATVs must have headlights and seatbelts.

The ordinances do not apply to all roads. Once an ordinance is passed, ATVs are allowed on town roads unless marked otherwise. Conversely, county and state roads are open to ATVs only on sections where it is posted that ATVs are allowed and where the speed limit is 35 mph and under.

Wisconsin passed a law in 2017 that allows ATVs and UTVs (utility task vehicles) on state roads with speed limits of 35 mph or less. On designated municipal roads, ATVs can go the posted speed limit unless marked otherwise.

Numerous other states across the nation also allow ATVs on roads.

ATV riders are reminded to check with local authorities regarding any locally enacted ATV/UTV ordinances, which may be more restrictive than state law. Insurance is not required for ATVs.

Once an ordinance is approved, it can take a couple months to get all the proper permits from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

At that point, the ATV enthusiasts begin raising funds to purchase signs.

The larger state signs cost around \$50, while the smaller signs for county and town roads are in the \$13 to \$15 price range.

**Long Road Ahead**

So far, every municipality that Kempke, Rohrer, Welch and Thompson have approached has approved ordinances.

Now the four are being asked to help in-

roduce the idea to municipalities in outlying areas.

"Our original goal was to do the area around the Kettle Moraine, and now it's been blowing up with people from all over contacting us," Kempke said.

The group has been contacted by ATV riders in Theresa, Lima, Leroy, Allenton, Addison and Ripon. When the group started getting requests from ATV enthusiasts from north of Sheboygan, they decided to start training others on how to approach municipalities to allow ATVs on their roadways.

On Saturday, Aug. 3, 12 people came to a training session the group held to learn how to effectively approach town leaders about opening roads to ATVs.

ATV riders are typically careful drivers who get involved with the sport later in life, according to Kempke.

"I don't see 20-year-olds on \$20,000 machines. It's middle aged and later aged people," he said.

"I think a lot more older people are getting into it. It is a way for them to get around without having to jump in the car or van," Rohrer agreed.

The Wisconsin ATV-UTV Association published a trail planning map earlier this year, but the map is already obsolete because of the numerous roadways and trails that have been added since the map was printed.

"It is catching on like wildfire. There are so many people who want ATVs to be allowed on the roads — they are calling us daily," Kempke said.


