School Board Back At It

Monday night's regular Kewaskum School Board meeting ended with one school board member walking out as the board president chastised another member for violating board policy.

The final item on the agenda was about whether Board Member Timothy Ramthun broke board policy when he contacted Attorney Kirk Strang.

The item had been on last month's agenda, and Board President Mark Sette said that he put it on the agenda again this month because Ramthun was not telling the truth when he said in July that he had contacted the attorney for personal reasons.

"To be perfectly honest with you, Tim, at the July meeting, I smelled a rat, and I didn't think you were being honest about it," Sette said to Ramthun.

At the beginning of Monday's meeting,

Board Member Jim Leister asked for the item to be removed from the agenda. He reiterated that at the July meeting, board members agreed to stop going after one another and instead focus on the kids.

"I thought we agreed to leave sleeping dogs lie, and to move forward," Leister said at the meeting.

"There was talk about not having these types of things on the agenda any more, and I generally am in full favor of that. However, some information became available after the last meeting, and I don't think as a board we have the ability to just bury our head in the sand and not discuss what has occurred," Sette said.

As Sette continued to talk about the issue, Leister walked out of the building in protest.

Staying Alive – Narcan Used To Revive Overdose Victims

The rescue call came in on Saturday, Dec. 19, 2015.

The incident was at a residence on Highway S in Washington County, which falls under the Washington County Sheriff's Office jurisdiction. It is near the Village of Kewaskum, so Lt. Mark Steiner of the Kewaskum Police Department answered the call for mutual aid.

FOND DU LAC COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

On Saturday Aug. 10, at 4:28 p.m., the Fond du Lac County Communication Center received a report of a multiple vehicle crash on I-41 Southbound north of Townline Road in the Township of Eldorado, Fond du Lac County.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office, Wisconsin State Patrol, City of Fond du Lac Police Department, Eldorado Fire Department, Eldorado First Responders, North Fond du Lac Fire Department, North Fond du Lac Ambulance, City of Fond du Lac Ambulance, City of Oshkosh Ambulance, Fond du Lac County Highway Department and ThedaStar Helicopter all responded to the scene.

At 4:28 p.m., Wisconsin State Patrol was engaged in a traffic stop on I-41 southbound, north of Townline Road. Wisconsin State Patrol previously requested back up units from the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office and the City of

Fond du Lac Police Department.

Southbound traffic on I-41 was moving from the slow lane to the fast lane due to these emergency vehicles with their emergency lights activated. Traffic was slowing down as they were merging to the fast lane, at which time a southbound semi-tractor trailer was merging from the slow lane to the fast lane.

Traffic was slow, almost to a stop, when the semi-tractor trailer was unable to stop, striking a southbound vehicle directly in front of the semi. Due to the slow, almost stopped traffic, this caused a chain reaction crash involving several vehicles. There were five passenger vehicles and the semi-tractor trailer involved. All vehicles involved were traveling southbound on I-41.

The first vehicle, which was struck by the semi-tractor trailer, struck another vehicle in front of them, and then

became entangled in the guidewire, of the median. The operator, 35-year-old Christopher Cummings of Oshkosh, was transported via Theda Star, to ThedaCare Regional Medical Center-Neenah with serious injuries. The passenger in this vehicle, 34-year-old Courtney Cummings of Oshkosh, was transported via City of Fond du Lac Ambulance, to ThedaCare Regional Medical Center-Neenah with serious injuries.

One of the vehicles that was struck, overturned and came to rest in the median on its roof. The operator of this vehicle, 35-year-old Adam Conrad of Oshkosh, and his passenger, 36-year-old Emily Conrad of Oshkosh were transported via North Fond du Lac Ambulance to Aurora Medical Center-Oshkosh for treatment of minor injuries.

Another vehicle that was struck, overturned and came to rest on its roof, in the southbound

lanes of travel on I-41. The operator of this vehicle, 63-year-old Sandra Hartley of Kewaskum, and a seven-year-old male from Kewaskum, were transported via City of Oshkosh Ambulance to Mercy Medical Center-Oshkosh for treatment of minor injuries.

The semi-tractor trailer, which was hauling 30,000 pounds of groceries, was operated by 53-year-old Kevin Jones from Green Bay and was uninjured.

The fifth vehicle involved was able to avoid the collision, but did run off the roadway where it came to rest in the west ditch of I-41 southbound.

All others involved were uninjured. All occupants in the vehicles were wearing seatbelts.

I-41 southbound both lanes, and 1 northbound lane of I-41 were closed for two hours. The crash remains under investigation by the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office.

SHEBOYGAN COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

Armed Robbery

On Friday, Aug. 9, at approximately 11:59 a.m. the Sheboygan County Emergency Dispatch Center received a 911 call reporting that the National Exchange Bank and Trust at 105 E. Main St. in Glenbeulah had been robbed.

The Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office responded and quickly developed suspects with the assistance of Menomonee Falls Police Department and Washington County Sheriff's Office. As a result of this cooperative effort a 26-year-old Waupun man was arrested for Armed Robbery and possession of Cocaine. A 35-year-old Waupun man was arrested for Party to the

Crime of Armed Robbery. The subjects were taken into custody by Washington County Officers as a result of a traffic stop in their jurisdiction. No injuries occurred as a result of this incident.

Single Vehicle Rollover Crash

On Thursday, Aug. 9, at approximately 1 a.m., the Sheboygan County Emergency Dispatch Center received a 911 call reporting a single vehicle rollover crash, in the center median, on Interstate 43, at Wilson-Lima Road, in the Town of Wilson.

The driver of the vehicle was trapped but a deputy on scene was able to extract the driver from the vehicle. South-

bound traffic lanes were partially closed on Interstate 43 due to the crash. The driver of the offending vehicle was transported to the hospital for incapacitating injuries sustained in the crash. Alcohol was believed to be a factor in this incident.

The following resources were dispatched to this incident; Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office, Oostburg Ambulance, Oostburg Fire Department, Jaws, Orange Cross Ambulance and Town of Wilson First Responders.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

Fatal Crash

On Tuesday, Aug. 6, Washington County suffered its seventh and eighth traffic fatalities of the year. At approximately 9:50 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office responded to a motor vehicle crash on Interstate 41 northbound between Highway 60 and Highway 144 in the Town of Polk.

Deputies arrived at the scene shortly after being notified. They located a one-vehicle crash approximately one mile north of Highway 60. Two occupants of the vehicle were observed lying on Interstate 41, one in traffic and one in the ditch. Life saving measures began immediately, continuing as secondary deputies and medical personnel from Slinger Fire and Lifestar Ambulance arrived.

Transport assistance from Flight for Life was requested for both occupants; however, one occupant was pronounced deceased on scene while the second was flown to Froedtert Medical Center. Once there, the transported occupant was pronounced deceased.

Crash investigation is on going by the Washington County Sheriff's

Office and the crash reconstruction team. It appears that both occupants were ejected from the vehicle after making contact with a guardrail on the east side of Interstate 41. For an unknown reason, the vehicle first entered the median, prior to crossing both lanes of traffic and into the guardrail. Occupants of the Ford Mustang were not wearing seatbelts.

The northbound lanes of Interstate 41 were closed for approximately four hours.

The driver was identified as James Allan Debny, 66, of Fox Lake.

The passenger was identified as Daniel Joseph Luedke, 55, of Fox Lake.

Wanted

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is seeking the public's assistance in attempting to locate Brandon Cortez King, whose date of birth is January 25, 1988.

On February 22,



2006, King was convicted of incest with a child and causing a child to view or listen to sexual activity. King was released from the Wisconsin Prison System on August 6 of this year and placed on extended supervision until 2028. A condition of his release was that he was to wear a GPS monitoring bracelet.

On August 6, at 6:46 p.m., only hours after his release, the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified by Probation/Parole that King had cut off his GPS monitoring bracelet. King had been residing at a transitional housing facility located at 1725 County Highway NN in the Town of Jackson.

The bracelet was cut off in the City of West Bend and found by the West Bend Police Department. The Washington County Sheriff's Office continues to attempt to locate King and is asking for the public's assistance.

King's characteristics are as follows:

Apprehension Of Armed Bank Robbery Suspects

Washington County deputies arrested a pair of men on August 9 who are likely responsible for a series of Wisconsin bank robberies over the past several months, including the April 8 robbery of the National Exchange Bank in Allenton.

Sheriff's Office investigators and deputies have been relentlessly examining leads and working with other jurisdictions since the Town of Addison robbery to develop suspects. On August 9 at about noon, Washington County Sheriff investigators were working collaboratively with another jurisdiction to locate two known subjects in the City of Waupun. At the same time, Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office put out a bank robbery alert for a National Exchange Bank in Glenbeulah. Washington County investigators quickly contacted Sheboygan County authorities and determined the armed gunman matched the physical description of the individual from at least two other bank robberies.

Through the ongoing investigation, Washington County investigators believed it was likely that the suspects would eventually return to Waupun from Milwaukee.

"Our investigators worked seamlessly with the patrol division to coordinate a saturation of the likely escape routes. We also developed contingency plans if these dangerous felons had decided to flee. I am extremely proud of all of our staff, as well as the collaborative efforts put forth by multiple agencies, to hold these dangerous individuals accountable. I want the bank tellers to know the clearance of this case was the highest priority for your sheriff's office," said Washington County Sheriff Martin R. Schulteis.

At about 2:13 p.m. on

August 9, Washington County Sheriff's deputies spotted the suspect vehicle, occupied by two individuals, near the Interstate 41 and U.S. 45 split. A high-risk traffic stop was done on State Highway 60 just east of Interstate 41, which closed portions of the roadway for about 15 minutes. Both Waupun men, ages 36 and 35, were arrested with evidence linking them to multiple robberies as well as crack cocaine. Both individuals were ultimately turned over to the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office.

Schulteis indicated that the investigation continues and charges for the Allenton robbery will be forthcoming. The sheriff's office is not looking for any other suspects related to the Allenton robbery.

An accident, which might have resulted in serious injury and probable death to some of the occupants, occurred here last Sunday evening, when passenger train No. 218, due here at 7:02 p.m., southbound Sundays only, had the rear coach derailed when pulling into the north end switch to meet the northbound passenger train due here at 6:27, which happened to be late. As soon as the train had pulled into the siding the rear brakeman threw the switch too soon causing a derail thrown under the last coach the rear trucks jumped the track and swerved to one side, rolling down a three foot embankment, and was pulled along in

this manner for about two rods. When the train came to a stop the rear coach was leaning over to one side, and only for the fact that the front wheels stayed on the track the car would have tipped over. Although a great deal of excitement prevailed among the passengers for a short time, none of them fared any the worse, and were loaded into another coach, and soon were on their way toward Milwaukee. The coach was detached from the rest of the train and left here until Monday, when a wrecking crew from Milwaukee placed it back on the track again. No damage was done to the track except that a few ties were badly smashed and had to be replaced by new ones.

Everything is now in readiness for the big Victory Picnic, which will be held at the North Side Park, tomorrow (Sunday) August 17. Great preparations have been made to make this one of the largest and best picnics held in this village for a number of years. A large assortment of amusements has been provided for which will help make the day an enjoyable one, for all who may attend, both young and old. One of the main attractions will be a six round sparring exhibition between "Kid" Schroeder and Young Welk of Milwaukee. A number of concession stands will also be in the park to help bring the occasion to a successful conclusion.

Plans have been made by the Washington County Agricultural Society to erect a large exhibition barn on the fairgrounds. The new building will be two hundred feet long, fifty-six feet wide and about twenty feet high. The roof will have a superstructure for lighting and ventilation. There will be five entrances to the building, two at the front, two at the rear and one at the side. The interior will be divided into stalls of which a number will be removable. The number of rows of stalls will

be four, one running along each wall the full length of the building and two in the middle, with ample walls between the stalls to provide for the visitors. It is estimated that the new barn will house about two hundred head of cattle. This addition to the fairgrounds ought to prove a valuable asset toward the success of Washington County's fairs, as heretofore, the exhibition of stock was very small on account of the poor protection offered to the stock by the old stalls.




March 5, 1951

The West Bend News came today & thanks, Harry's coming over tomorrow nite and look at it. New boys are coming in again from Minn. and Mont. Today we got our US Carbines and learn how to take it a part and the different part names. We also today got our shovels for fox hole digging. In the afternoon we went up in the woods and dig in. The third squad dig in as a diamond shape, me in the center. I had to tell where each man should dig his hole. It was also snowing at that time. Didn't see it over for over two weeks. Got my first pass Saturday and went to Seattle, we looked the town over and went to the show, Kim & a Negro Musical stage show. Also look up in the telephone book the name Strack, found one, call up didn't know and Stracks in WI. They have some people Montana and 68 years ago his grandpa came out from New York. I could not have any beer if I want did my pass had minor stamped all over it, and even if my pass didn't have it on they would look for something with your age on it. Got a hair cut today. Got the things Rev. Sautz last week, I now have two bibles, got one from Fort Sheridan Chapel who gave it to us Protestant and some junk to the Catholics. H/H Co. has more of there clothing than A, but they are now slowly getting theres. I got to go to bed now.

"I chose the Shining Stars because those girls mean a lot to me. Seeing them dance makes me happy," Ashley said.

Ashley received the Champions of Change Rising Star Award after being nominated by Karla Daane, a counselor at Kewaskum High School.

"Ashley is one of the most dedicated students in our school. Her leadership and the community involvement that she has portrayed throughout the community is just exceptional," Daane said.

During her high school career, some of the things Ashley was involved in were National Honor Society, Peers for Peers, Student Government, Freshmen Mentors and FFA. She has volunteered as an activities aide at the Samaritan Health Center, stock rotator at the Kewaskum Food Pantry and mentor for a Youth Girls Basketball Team.

With the help of her parents, Randy and Jes-

sica Trapp, Ashley started and coordinated the Travis Trapp Memorial Foundation in honor of her brother, who died in a car accident five years ago.

"I previously lost my brother. I also lost my childhood home in a house fire. When tragedy hits a person so hard, you start to realize the importance of what life and others mean to you. To me, volunteering is not about the paycheck. It's about making connections with people that are at a hardship or just needing a friend at a time," Ashley said.

Over the past few years, the family has given out over \$75,000 through the Travis Trapp Memorial Foundation. The funds have gone to scholarships and various nonprofit organizations.

The Shining Stars is one of the groups that has received funds from the foundation.

The Shining Stars dance group has always had a special place in Ashley's heart.

"Before she was born, when I was pregnant with her, we thought she was going to have Down syndrome," explained Ashley's mother, Jessica Trapp.

"I could have been like that," Ashley said.

The Shining Stars dance group is an organization that serves people with special needs in the Campbell-sport and Kewaskum school districts.

"They dance and have a good time, and they make me happy," Ashley said.

The Shining Stars dance team was started by Mary Bilgo, who is originally from Kewaskum. The group is comprised of children and adults from age 8 now to about 34.

"Our little group is so thankful to people who have helped in many ways, and who donated money toward our group," Bilgo said.

She started the group wanting to raise funds for an "upsee," a special harness that would enable one of the girls to stand and perform with the help of a dance partner. Without the special equipment, the girl is confined to a wheelchair.

"I went on Facebook and I asked if I could find 50 friends to give me \$10, so I needed \$500 to get this upsee for her, and we raised about \$2,100. The community really pitched in," Bilgo said.

The Trapp family was one of the donors for that equipment.

"Every year they have donated to our team. It amounts to about \$2,000, so we are really thrilled and happy to have such great people in our community who think of our little team. Thank you," Bilgo said.

"I feel like everyone should have an opportunity to happiness, and with their life. These girls definitely make me happy and make me smile," Ashley said.

School Board Back At It

Sette said that at the end of the June meeting, Ramthun commented that there had been good discussion among board members during the meeting.

"Then it was the very next day that a phone call was made to the school district's attorney by Mr. Ramthun that was not approved by the board. So in July, at that meeting, I posed the question to Mr. Ramthun about that, at which time Mr. Ramthun had a very long, drawn out explanation of how this was nothing more than a personal phone call," Sette said.

"You looked at me with somewhat contempt that I even asked you the question, and there was contempt in your voice as well. And then you played the victim card that this board doesn't let you do anything, and you can't even make a personal phone call without the board coming after you. And you went through a very long, arduous process of detailing how that all went," Sette said to Ramthun during Monday night's meeting.

So, the district obtained a copy of the audio recording of the voicemail that Ramthun left with Strang. That recording was played for everyone in the room to hear Monday night.

That is when Leister walked out of the building.

On the recording, Ramthun says: "Good morning Kurt, this is Timothy Ramthun calling from the Kewaskum School District. I wear a couple of other hats, but I'm calling from a School Board, school district perspective, that as you may recall, I was given your name and number from Bob Soderberg from Germantown. I know you support that district from a legal perspective. It has been a while. We've had some evolution and process, an evolution and events, and yet I think I need to reach out to you, at least to your perspective on something that happened as late as last night at the board meeting to see from a school board perspective if there is some merit to do something about it, and so being a little cryptic, I'd like to know if it would be possible for us to

schedule some time... to chat that is convenient to you."

He ends recording by signing off as "Tim Ramthun from the Kewaskum School District."

Sette said that the voicemail is not what Ramthun had described last month as happening.

"I asked you specifically on at least two occasions, possibly more, if any part of this phone call had anything to do with school board business, and you were adamant on each occasion that it was nothing but a personal phone call. Personal only. That is what you said," Sette said to Ramthun after the recording was played.

"There is nothing about that voicemail that is personal in nature. You say on at least a couple occasions that you are calling about school board business. And it's not a personal phone call. And your all but tearful reply last month was a lie. Dishonest and not true," Sette said.

"I was very willing to maybe say after I heard that maybe there is some misunderstanding here. But there is not. And that is not a personal phone call. And you did not have board approval to call our attorney or talk about school board matters. And I was somewhat appalled at how much you were lying last month at the July meeting with respect to this being a personal phone call. Because it is not," Sette continued.

"I was willing to try and let bygones be bygones, and not have this kind of stuff on our agenda anymore. But what you said last month was flat out untruthful. In my line of work, I would be out of a job because if I lie, and my name is attached to anything that goes across to our district attorney's office, they are not going to touch me with a 10-foot pole," said Sette, who works as a detective with the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

"Your credibility was already thin with me when you called my employer, making accusations about me with absolutely no basis whatsoever, and some of the other shenanigans that you have pulled. And you would like everybody in this forum to believe that this board that is out to get you is the problem. And it is not. You are the problem. You are the problem when you lie, when you cheat, when you go behind people's backs like you continually do," Sette continued.

"Your credibility is completely shredded. You have none with me. It is an embarrassment. I'm embarrassed for the people that voted you into this position and the position that you voted into the 59th Assembly. It is terrible that you are allowed to go on like this and carry on and act like you do and willfully lie at an open meeting. With a straight face, and you don't seem to care about it. That's all I have to say. Your credibility is gone with me. I really don't have too much interest in anything else you have to say because it probably is not true. Thank you," Sette said in closing.

With that, Troy Hanson made a motion to adjourn. No other board members spoke and no action was taken. Ramthun was not given a chance to respond during the meeting. "I know you wanted to say something, but I don't want to hear it. So the meeting is adjourned," Sette said to Ramthun.

Following the meeting, Ramthun maintained that he had called Strang to ask for personal legal advice and that the two had never actually connected in a phone call. He said he did not know that Strang was with the same firm that the Kewaskum School District uses.

"I really wish Mark [Sette] would have called me last month to say here's what we got, do you have anything to say about it? He didn't. He got the recording and said that I wasn't calling about anything personal, and let's bust him on that. I could have sat down with him to talk this through professionally and properly, but he never gave me the chance. It was an ambush again," Ramthun said after the meeting ended.

The Kewaskum Boys & Girls Club will receive \$30,000 in each of the three years, totaling \$90,000, providing reapproval each year based on successful performance.

STEAM is an educational approach that integrates science, technology, engineering, art and math in a project-based environment. Students are encouraged to engage in critical thinking and inquiry to solve real-world problems in collaborative teams.

"We want to thank the United Way of Washington County for their support and funding for this

program. The field of STEAM is observable in daily living, as well as current and future careers. The need for STEAM and STEM-related jobs in Washington County and Wisconsin will grow. We want to prepare our youth to be competitive for these high-paying jobs. We believe that if we can expose more students to STEAM activities and curriculum at the elementary level, we can encourage all kids to explore STEAM careers, especially those populations underrepresented, like women, minorities and economically disadvantaged students," said Washington County Boys & Girls Clubs Director of Operations Max Roy.

This part of the evening will be held only if the skies are clear.



INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 cup seasoned bread crumbs
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pound lean ground turkey
- 3/4 cup (6 ounces) reduced-fat plain yogurt
- 1/2 cup finely chopped peeled cucumber
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 8 whole wheat pita pocket halves
- 2 cups shredded lettuce
- 1 cup chopped tomatoes



DIRECTIONS

In a large bowl, combine the bread crumbs, egg and seasonings. Crumble turkey over mixture and mix well. Shape into 16 balls.

Place meatballs on a rack coated with cooking spray in a shallow baking pan. Bake uncovered at 400 F for 15 to 20 minutes, or until no longer pink.

Getting Involved In Youth Programs, Overload Detection Hints

Youth are more likely to grow up healthy when they spend three or more hours per week in sports, clubs, school and/or community organizations. Effective afterschool programs can boost academic performance, reduce risky behaviors, promote physical health and provide a safe, structured environment for the children of working parents. Many schools have actually switched from using the phrase “extracurricular activities” to “cocurricular activities” because they are so important. Unfortunately, many young people do not have this asset in

their lives. For many young people, youth programs at school and in the community are the highlight of their day. They meet new people who share their interest or introduce them to new ones and they create connections to caring adults. Youth programs can also increase their self-esteem, skills and knowledge. Often times, young people who aren't particularly interested in academics get turned on to a subject through an after school activity. Attending after-school programs can improve students' academic performance. A national

evaluation found that over 40 percent of students attending 21st Century Community Learning Center programs improved their reading and math grades, and that those who attended more regularly were more likely to make gains (Naftzger et al., 2007). Participation in afterschool programs has also been associated with reduced drug use (Investing in Our Young People, University of Chicago, 2006) and criminal behavior (UCLA National Center for Research on Evaluation, Standards and Student Testing, 2007).

Getting Involved in Youth Programs

1. Ask your school or community center for a list of after-school activities. Discuss the options with your child.
2. Consider helping your child start a new club if one that interests him or her doesn't exist. Find out how to get an advisor.
3. Model having an “extracurricular activity” yourself. If they have time, parents should also have hobbies or activities they do outside of a job and/or home.

Helpful Hints for Detecting Overload

Activities through youth programs are important, but kids can get

activity burnout. Watch for these signs your child is too busy:

1. Has little time to relax, hang out, and have fun.
2. Seems unhappy.
3. Often complains about being tired or ill. Struggles to concentrate.
4. Becomes more irritable.
5. Wants to drop out of everything.

As with anything, finding the right balance is hard. Make sure to be clear about priorities. School comes first, activities comes second. Help your child find balance so that he or she isn't scheduled from morning to night.

Arenz Masters Angell Park With MSA Season Sweep

Series point leader Travis Arenz of Sheboygan continued his dream season in Midwest Sprint Car Association competition by nailing down a season sweep of 2019 MSA A-main action at Angell Speedway in Sun Prairie on Sunday, Aug. 11.

Arenz' stranglehold over his fellow competitors at Angell Park Speedway includes triumphs in each of the past four MSA events dating back to last August and including all three 2019 A-mains at the historic third-mile clay oval track.

The second-year MSA racer's latest victory at Angell Park Speedway was far from a cakewalk as he had to hustle his way up through the field from the 12th starting spot, outduel four-time MSA champion and fellow co-point leader Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee for the lead and persevere through five yellow-red flag restarts.

Campbellsport's Tony Wondra seized the lead on the drop of the green flag from the pole position, while outside front row starter Adam Miller of Plymouth falling into second in the early going.

On lap two, rookie Justin Erickson of Plymouth lost control and hit the turn two wall to bring out the first of five caution flags. Wondra controlled the ensuing restart and maintained a solid edge over Miller and fourth starter Kurt Davis when the leaders hit lapped traffic for the first time on lap five.

One lap later, Wondra made hard contact with

the slower car of rookie Nick Daywalt of Slinger in turn three, which sent Wondra's car into a series of flips. With no where to go, Miller made contact with Daywalt's stalled car as well. All three drivers emerged uninjured, but they were all forced to retire from the event.

On the restart, Davis inherited the lead with two-time MSA champ Danny Schlafer of Sussex, who started seventh, assuming second. Schlafer pressured Davis briefly for the lead in turn four on lap seven, but Davis maintained the top spot and gradually stretched out his advantage over the ensuing laps.

Schlafer brought out the third caution when his car began to smoke in turn one before rolling to a stop in turn two on lap 11. On the restart, Arenz restarted in the third spot and quickly bolted past third starter Bill Taylor of Boltonville to seize the runner-up spot on lap 12.

The fourth caution was displayed on lap 13 for debris in turn two, which bunched up the field once again and allowed Arenz to line up directly behind Davis on the restart.

Sensing that he had to make something happen, Arenz pulled off a daring slide job in turn one on the restart to vault ahead of Davis for the lead in turn two on lap 14. Once again, Arenz built up a solid cushion over Davis and 2018 Plymouth Dirt Track Racing 360 Sprint Car champion Justin Miller, who started sixth.

With Arenz holding a

half-straightaway advantage over Davis, the fifth and final caution period came on lap 23 when 2008 MSA champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett clipped an infield tire and spun in turn one.

The caution set up a single-file green-white-checked flag finish. Arenz got a big jump on the restart to thwart a potential Davis slide job attempt and essentially secure the victory. Arenz then hit his marks perfectly over the final two laps to secure his sixth A-main victory of the 2019 season and seventh overall MSA A-main win.

"I knew I had to make something happen on that restart to try and get the lead," Arenz said in victory lane. "Kurt is fast and I didn't know how many chances I would have. I just went for it. This has been an amazing season so far."

Davis had to settle for second, Justin Miller finished third, 2014 MSA Masters Series champ Paul Pokorski of West Bend charged up from the 15th starting spot to place fourth and Tim Haddy of Waupun took home fifth after starting ninth.

MSA 10-lap heat race victories went to Jack Vanderboom of Dousman, Al Schlafer of Sussex and Tim Haddy. A total of 23 MSA cars were on hand for the event.

The next Midwest Sprint Car Association event will take place Saturday, Aug. 17, at The Plymouth Dirt Track and the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth. The next travelling MSA event will be held on Saturday, Aug. 24, at Beaver Dam Raceway.

Overcoming Addiction

Steiner was the first officer to arrive at the scene. He recognized Joseph Klahn right away.

“He was lying in the kitchen, blue from the neck up. I looked at him and I quickly assessed that it probably was an overdose, knowing his history,” Steiner said.

Klahn had almost no pulse. He was not breathing.

The rescue workers arrived and took out Narcan. Steiner handcuffed Klahn.

John Thull, an EMT

with the Kewaskum Fire Department, put the nasal syringe in one of Klahn’s nostrils and administered half a dose. Nothing happened.

He then put the syringe in Klahn’s other nostril and inserted the remainder of dose.

“He immediately came off the ground, came to a sitting position, and was wide awake,” Steiner said.

Klahn looked around and wondered why everyone was in his mom’s kitchen looking at him. He didn’t know why

he was handcuffed. He wanted to know what was going on.

“It is common policy to handcuff. He was handcuffed for our protection, since when people come to that quickly, their arms and legs fly everywhere, and officers and EMTs and medical people have been injured by the person coming to that quickly,” Steiner explained.

In fact, when Klahn had come to, Steiner had pushed both his legs and his body back to the ground because it had convulsed that violently.

Once Klahn was alert, Steiner removed the handcuffs from Klahn, and the case was turned over to the county.

Klahn refused transport. Steiner and the rescue workers left.

Narcan As A Lifesaving Tool

Klahn was the first person the Kewaskum Police Department helped save with Narcan.

The department had just approved a policy to use Narcan on December 11, 2015, less than two weeks before Klahn’s emergency call.

Since then, the department has used Narcan several times to save overdose victims. Kewaskum police officers carry two units of Narcan and gloves.

an injection and as a nasal spray. The Kewaskum Police Department uses the nasal spray version only.

“It is easy to use for anyone without any medical background,” Steiner said.

Narcan works only on someone with an opioid overdose. If someone has not been using opiates, there is no effect from Narcan, according to Steiner.

“If you use Narcan and haven’t been using opiates, it would be like water vapor. There would be no effect because your brain is not being overrun with opiates,” he explained.

When someone has overdosed on heroin or an opiate, the classic signs are that they turn blue because they stop breathing.

“Your heart is still pumping, but you are not respirating,” Steiner said.

Drug Addiction

That was not the last time Klahn overdosed.

Klahn, who is now 33, started using drugs when he was 15.

He overdosed at least nine times.

“When you are using, it is just crazy. You don’t think about what you are doing,” Klahn said.

Klahn has not used drugs since February 2018.

Had it not been for Narcan and all the people who worked to save him, he never would have had the chance to turn his life around.

When he was using, Klahn would get the drugs from Milwaukee.

He would frequent

clinics where they would hand out clean needles and Narcan.

“Without that, people would use dirty needs and not care. So at least you have a clean needle. It doesn’t do anything to stop the problem of drug abuse; it just saves their lives,” Steiner said.

Narcan Nasal Spray is now available for purchase directly from a pharmacist without a doctor’s prescription as well.
