Restoring History Is A Tall Order

– Werbelow Construction Rebuilds Historic Shipmast

Werbelow Construction routinely creates custom pieces that require special woodworking skills. But the Kewaskum business recently finished a project unlike any others it has done.

It reconstructed an 86-foot tall shipmast that stands at the Milwaukee Country Club in River Hills.

“We don’t know exactly how old the mast

is, but the country club was erected in 1829,” said Dan Werbelow, owner of Werbelow Construction.

The process of restoring the mast began in June. Originally, the country club wanted the mast completed by the Fourth of July.

“It started out that they were hoping that we could repair it. Then we could have turned it around in two or three weeks and had it for the Fourth of July,” ex-

plained Leroy Plautz, who works at Werbelow Construction. “It just was too dangerous.”

The Milwaukee Country Club could have taken the easy way out and simply ordered a new pole. But the club wanted to maintain the integrity of the historical piece, so Werbelow Construction was given the task of reconstructing the giant mast.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

House Fire

On November 24 at 8:51 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call from a resident at 555 County Trunk NN in the Town of Jackson reporting that the ceiling fell down while he was sleeping, that the house was on fire and that there was no one inside the residence. The Jackson Fire Department was paged and the call was upgraded to a MABAS call. Fire departments from West Bend, Slinger, Hartford, Newburg, Fillmore, St. Lawrence, Richfield and Germantown responded to assist.

Upon arrival of emergency personnel, there were smoke and flames observed coming from both the upper and lower levels of the residence. Fire department personnel extinguished the fire by 10:16 a.m. Vehicle traffic on County Trunk NN between County Trunk M and

Pleasant Valley Road in Ozaukee County was closed for approximately two hours and 45 minutes.

The interior of the residence suffered significant damage. There were no injuries to any fire department personnel or to the resident who was home at the time of the fire. An investigation was conducted by a Fire Investigator from the sheriff's office in conjunction with the fire department, and it appears the cause of the fire was electrical in nature.

Structure Fire At Vegetable Farm

On November 22, the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call at 8:19 a.m. reporting a fire at the Witte Vegetable Farm located at 2313 County Highway NN in the Town of Jackson. The caller reported that the metal shed, which is used for retail space as well as

produce storage, was on fire.

The Jackson Fire Department responded to the fire and was assisted on scene by the Germantown, Newburg, Slinger and West Bend fire departments.

Based on the rapid response of the Jackson Fire Department, as well as its mutual aid partners, firefighters were able to contain the fire to the storage portion of the shed; however, the entire building sustained smoke and water damage. There was no one in the shed at the time of the fire. Property damage is estimated at around \$100,000, including losing around \$10,000 dollars in fresh produce. County Highway NN was closed to traffic for a little over two hours.

The cause of the fire is being investigated by the Jackson Fire Department and fire investigators with the Washington County Sheriff Office.

The origin is unknown at this time; however, it does not appear to be suspicious. One Newburg Firefighter sustained minor injuries battling the blaze. He was treated and released from the scene.

OWI Case

A 29-year-old Eden man was arrested for first offense Operating While Intoxicated on November 21 after a Washington County Sheriff's deputy, who was out on patrol, stopped a car for traveling 70 mph in a 50 mph zone on County

Highway D in the Town of Barton. The traffic stop was made at 10:30 p.m. The man had a blood alcohol content over twice the legal limit (.19). He told deputies that he had just left a bar and was driving to a local trucking company, where he was employed as a truck driver. It was his intention to sleep in his truck for the night and sober up prior to work.

On average, alcohol dissipates from the system at .015 per hour. A person with a .19 blood alcohol content would

require approximately 12 hours for the alcohol to no longer be detectable in their system. In the State of Wisconsin, it is illegal to operate a commercial motor vehicle with a blood alcohol concentration over .04. In this case, the operator was not driving a commercial vehicle at the time of the stop; however, the Sheriff's Office is thankful this deputy was able to take this dangerous driver off the roadway and possibly prevent an even more disastrous situation from occurring.

Deer Hunting Accident

A hunter had fallen approximately 12 feet out of a deerstand, injuring his leg. The hunter was located

utilizing the MABAS 113 Drone Unit. He was transported to a local hospital for treatment.

Snowplow Driver Appreciation Day In Wisconsin

Snowplow drivers are critical to the safe operation of more than 115,000 miles of state and local roads throughout Wisconsin. Governor Tony Evers has proclaimed Monday, Nov. 25, as Snowplow Driver Appreciation Day to thank the many winter maintenance professionals who work long hours in tough conditions to help keep life on time for the rest of us.

"Snowplow drivers spend countless hours away from their families so that we can all make it home safely to ours," said WisDOT Secretary-Designee Craig Thompson. "Every clear winter road is a product of dedicated public servants who care deeply about safety in their communities. Their work helps to prevent crashes and save lives, and we can't thank them enough."

As part of a century-old partnership, WisDOT contracts with all 72 county highway departments for winter maintenance on state roads.

Every driver can thank Wisconsin plow drivers by staying safe on the road this winter.

•Before traveling, call 511 or go online (511wi.gov) to check on road conditions and possible incidents. Consider downloading the 511 Wisconsin smartphone app.

•Buckle up, watch what's happening ahead of you and allow plenty of following distance.

•Most traffic crashes in winter are caused by drivers going too fast for conditions. Posted speed limits

apply when travel conditions are ideal. Drivers are advised to slow down when roads are slick or visibility is reduced.

•Stay at least 200 feet behind a working snowplow. Make sure that you can see the plow's mirrors to ensure the driver can see you.

•If you must pass, be careful. Snowplows often create a cloud of snow that can obscure vision. Remember that road conditions in front of the plow will likely be worse.

•Don't be over-confident if you operate a four-wheel or all-wheel-drive vehicle. They still require a considerable distance to stop on slick roadways.

•During major winter storms, postpone or cancel your trip. Stranded motorists and vehicles become hazards that interfere with snow removal efforts.

Story Map Available For County Bike And Trail Network Plan

– Adopted Plan Includes Seven High-Priority “All Ages And Abilities” Corridors

The Washington County Board adopted the county's first comprehensive Bikeway and Trail Network Plan in June. The county now has an online interactive ArcGIS StoryMap of its vision: Quality of life is enhanced by a comprehensive system of bicycling and walking routes connecting destinations throughout the County and neighboring communities.

“The plan articulates a priority to connect all of the cities and villages in the County over the next 30 to 50 years,” said County Administrator Joshua Schoemann. “The county is currently working on an action plan that will take the first steps toward implementation of this plan and improving our authentic quality of life.”

The StoryMap describes the development of the plan, public outreach, existing bikeways, types of bikeway

and trail facilities, trail recommendations and a video highlighting the plan. The full recommended bikeway and trail network includes 72 miles of trails, 81 miles of sidepaths and 195 miles of on-street bicycle accommodation for a total of 348 miles at full implementation.

The plan includes a network of 178 miles of trails, sidepaths and low-traffic, low-speed streets that could be used by “all ages and abilities.” There are seven priority corridors located throughout the County that were determined from the results of extensive public outreach. When built, these seven corridors will create a nearly continuous “all ages and abilities” network across the County and linking to existing trails outside the County such as the Bugline and Interurban Trails. The seven priority corridors include:

1. Jackson to Germantown extension of the Eisenbahn State Trail
 2. West Bend to Jackson via Jackson Drive or County Highway P
 3. West Bend to Newburg via the Milwaukee River Trail
 4. West Bend to Slinger via Ridge Run Park and County Highway NN

Fear Not When God Comes To Visit!

Often when we think of men encountering the Lord in scripture, we automatically remember that they all fell on their faces trembling before the being from heaven. Then the visitor would have to assure the person that no harm would come to them. The words the Lord always used were "Fear not!"

While we are to revere and honor the Lord, we are not to fear an encounter with the Lord. Some scriptural examples we can look at to support this assurance are Abraham, Moses and John, the apostle.

Two angels and the Lord visited Abraham one afternoon (see Genesis 18). Abraham knew who they were. He demonstrated respect for his guests, but he was not afraid. Instead, he ordered a meal prepared to serve his guests. It probably took three or four hours to prepare the meal to honor his company.

Do you suppose during those several hours Abraham left his guests alone to wile away the time? No, rather than groveling on the ground

in fear he was a good host, possibly conversing about the weather and the flocks and the crops while meal preparation continued.

Moses met with God frequently. He was respectful and honored God, but he did not fear Him. The rest of the nation of Israel in the wilderness, on the other hand, were deathly afraid of God. They were afraid of God because they had sin in their lives and they knew God punished sin and rebellion big time.

When it came time to approach God, Israel sent Moses as their mediator. God wanted to have a relationship with Israel, but they would rather hold onto their sin and rebellion than confess it and be set free of it to enjoy the presence of the Lord. When God or an angel comes to us, we don't have to be afraid unless there is some sin in our lives the Lord has revealed and asked us to turn away from.

John, the author of the book of Revelation, was invited to come up to the throne where God was seated (chapter 4:1). John later relayed to the church what he saw

from heaven's perspective regarding the last days in the book of Revelation. While he did fall on his face in fear and trembling the first time he saw the Son of Man (chapter 1) and he had to be told not to fear, by the time of the subsequent encounter he did what he was asked to do — come, look, report.

Since the days when the Bible was written, God has not changed. He is the same today as in those times, and will be the same in the future. He still comes to those who seek Him and desire to serve His purposes on earth. What we read in the Bible is a model, or example, for how God can come to us in our lives. Many Christian writers over the centuries have related encounters with the living resurrected Christ — Saul of Tarsus was the first, but he wasn't the last.

If we are right with God, we have no reason to fear Him when He comes to us. When He does meet us, it is to bless us, promise a future we can't imagine, or send us on a mission that will testify about Him. Fear not!

Winter Driving Tips

A winter wonderland commonly comes with fun festivities and outdoor activities. Unfortunately, it also come with winter storms and icy roads.

These winter driving safety tips can help you keep safe on the road.

10 Winter Driving Safety Tips

1. Keep jumper cables or battery booster cables on hand. Sometimes you need a little jump when the temperature drops. A portable jump starter is a lightweight and powerful way to instantly jump — start your vehicle without the need of another vehicle. It also fits easily in the backseat or trunk of your car.

2. Include a pocket knife for added tools. Keep it along with a first aid kit and double check your kit is fully supplied. A Swiss Army Pocket Knife includes all the tools you might need if you get stranded: large blade, small blade, can opener with small screwdriver, bottle opener with large screwdriver, scissors, pliers with wire cutter, Phillips screwdriver and more.

3. Dress appropriately by wearing layers of lightweight clothing. Also have an extra set of mittens, socks and a hat in the car in case you or a passenger forget them. Grabber hand warmers are also a good idea for instant warmth.

4. Flashlights with extra batteries are always great to have on hand. It gets dark early this time of year, be prepared if you need extra light. The Rayovac Virtually Indestructible three-inch AAA LED Flashlight is water resistant, energy efficient, compact,

and provides up to 160 meters of light. It even has a place to keep a spare bulb in case the old one burns out.

5. Have a distress sign, a brightly colored cloth, reflectors, or combination of the three in your vehicle if you get stuck and have to wait for help. Reflectors or even flares are advised in cases of harder snow. A warning triangle is great to place near your stranded vehicle for safety and visibility.

6. Have extra blankets or sleeping bags in the back or trunk. These will provide extra warmth if stranded. The Armor All 12V Heated Blanket is 100 percent polyester fleece with quick warm-up time, heated by a standard vehicle cigarette socket plug.

7. Find a small shovel you can keep specifically in your car at all times. During snowy weather, a shovel like the Suncast Telescoping Snow Shovel will help get you out if your vehicle gets stuck in the snow. At only 34-inches long, this shovel fits easily into your trunk so you can forget about it until you need it.

8. Create a medium bag of kitty litter, sand, or carpet strips to have in case you get stuck. You can sprinkle the kitty litter or place the strips down for additional traction.

9. Pack high energy foods like nuts, or canned and dried fruit. Water and instant beverages are also suggested.

10. Matches, candles, and a three-pound empty coffee can will provide a pan for melting snow and even heating food if stranded.

Restoring History Is A Tall Order

– Werbelow Construction Rebuilds Historic Shipmast

Rebuilding The Mast

The first step was taking the mast down at the country club and transporting it to the Werbelow workshop at 150 Second St. in Kewaskum.

"It took a lot of pieces of equipment to do it," Werbelow said.

There was a large crane, a forklift, an 80-foot manlift and a semi-truck.

"We got it here and hauled it into the shop," Werbelow recalled.

Then it was up to Plautz to start working on the mast. Once he realized that he did not have a simple repair on their hands, Plautz began to devise a plan.

"I did some head scratching for about a week, trying to figure out how I was going to mill this thing. I had to come up with the design of something that could actually hold it, and spin it. Because the thing started out at 1,800 pounds, so it wasn't something you could manhandle too easily," Plautz said.

"That was key. Having a contraption to spin this huge pole like a lathe. That started the shaping process," Werbelow

said.

Plautz created a locking mechanism to keep the pole from turning as he worked on it. Then he used various techniques to shape the pole, utilizing a variety of tools to create the various components of the unique piece. He used saws and chisels, power planers and hand-hewn knives.

Plautz made a replica of one of the sections from white oak. The seasoned craftsman smoothed surface of the gigantic mast and rounded the bottom of the pole.

"Even though it is 86 feet tall, the mast is designed to tip down for painting every five years," Werbelow said.

Once the mast was shaped, Plautz painted it white.

"The whole process was four months from the time it was torn down and brought in to the time we installed it," Plautz said.

The main reason for the delay was waiting for specialized parts to arrive. In all, the special order took about 10 weeks to process.

Restoring History Is A Tall Order

Installing The Mast

Once the mast was completed, the next challenge was bringing the 86-foot-long mast back to River Hills and installing it.

It was no easy task, but the crew used ropes to carefully lift the mast with a crane and set it onto a semi. Then, a crane was used to mount the mast onto a base that is in the ground.

"The base that is in the ground is huge so that it can hold this thing. It had to be crazy to design something like that back then, and it is incredible that it is still holding up the mast," Werbelow said about the base that is likely two centuries old.

Once again, a crane and 80-foot lift were used as the mast was

installed at the country club.

Plautz made sure the ropes were correctly tied to the pole, and he watched carefully as the mast was lifted to rise straight into the air.

"It was stressful getting that set. If the crane leaned one way too much, you could snap this thing on the bottom, where it was locked in with steel," Plautz said.

But the process went smoothly, and the mast is now standing proudly at the Milwaukee Country Club in River Hills.

Other Projects

While Werbelow Construction has never reconstructed a historic shipmast prior to this year, it has done other work for the Milwaukee Country Club.

Werbelow has re-

placed and repaired dormers on roofs at the club. In the coming year, Werbelow will continue doing work in River Hills, with plans to work on the wood bridges throughout the golf course.

Werbelow Construction has done work on other historic places as well. It is currently creating custom finished carpentry in a historic home on Pine Lake in Waukesha County.

Prior to opening the Kewaskum office two years ago, Dan Werbelow ran the business from his West Bend home. Werbelow Construction offers a variety of services, including custom carpentry, new homes, remodeling, condos, decks and small projects.

Thanksgiving Is By Far The Leading Day For US Home Cooking Fires

—More Than Three Times As Many Home Cooking Fires Occur On Thanksgiving Day As On A Typical Day Of The Year

More than three times as many home cooking fires occur on Thanksgiving Day as on a typical day of the year. That's according to the latest U.S. Home Cooking Fires report recently released by the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA), which shows that there were 1,600 reported home cooking fires on Thanksgiving in 2017, reflecting a 238 percent increase over the daily average. Unattended cooking was the leading cause of these fires.

"With people preparing multiple dishes, often with lots of guests and

other distractions in and around the kitchen, it's easy to see why the number of home cooking fires increases so dramatically," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of outreach and advocacy. "Fortunately, the vast majority of cooking fires are highly preventable with a little added awareness, and by taking simple steps to minimize those risks."

According to the NFPA report, cooking is the leading cause of home fires year-round, accounting for almost half of all US home fires (49 percent) and reported home fire injuries (45 percent). Cooking is the second-leading cause of home fire deaths, accounting for 22 percent of all fire deaths. The report also shows that less progress has been made in reducing deaths from home cooking fires than deaths from most other fire causes. There were more cooking fire deaths in 2013-2017

than in 1980-1984, despite total home fire deaths falling by 46 percent over the period.

Following are tips and recommendations from NFPA for cooking safely this Thanksgiving:

- Never leave the kitchen while cooking on the stovetop. Some types of cooking, especially those that involve frying or sautéing with oil, need continuous attention.

- When cooking a turkey, stay in your home and check on it regularly.

- Make use of timers to keep track of cooking times, particularly for foods that require longer cook times.

- Keep things that can catch fire like oven mitts, wooden utensils, food wrappers, and towels at least three feet away from the cooking area.

- Avoid long sleeves and hanging fabrics that could come in contact with a heat source.

- Always cook with a lid beside your pan. If you have a fire, slide the lid

over the pan and turn off the burner. Do not remove the cover because the fire could start again. Let the pan cool for a long time. Never throw water or use a fire extinguisher on the fire.

- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. Only open the door once you're confident the fire is completely out, standing to the side as you do. If you have any doubts or concerns, contact the fire department for assistance.

- Keep children at least three feet away from the stove. Kids should also stay away from hot foods and liquids, as steam or splash from these items could cause severe burns.

- In addition, NFPA strongly discourages the use of turkey fryers, as these can lead to severe burns, injuries, and property damage. For a safe alternative, NFPA recommends grocery stores, food retailers, and restaurants that sell deep-fried turkey.

Thanksgiving Meal Prices Remain Stable This Year

Thanksgiving meal food prices in Wisconsin continue to remain stable this year according to Wisconsin Farm Bureau's annual Marketbasket survey that rang in at \$61.57.

The Marketbasket survey is an informal look at the price of popular food items used to prepare a Thanksgiving meal in quantities sufficient to serve 10 people. This survey allows for Wisconsin food prices to be compared with food prices from across the country. The American Farm Bureau Federation's survey of the same items came in slightly higher than the state survey with a grand total of \$62.32.

"Thanksgiving is a time for many Wisconsin families to gather around the dinner table and enjoy a home-cooked meal that consists of many local food products," said Wisconsin Farm Bureau's Director of Communications Sarah Hetke.

About The Survey
Wisconsin's Thanks-

giving Marketbasket survey is an informal, annual review of food price trends in relation to changing farm prices, weather and wholesale and retail food marketing. Wisconsin Farm Bureau members collected price samples of 15 Thanksgiving food items in 29 communities in November.

Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers are asked to look for the best possible prices, without taking advantage of special

promotional coupons or purchase deals.

Farmers' Share Is Just \$8.98

During the last three decades, retail grocery prices have gradually increased while the share of the average dollar spent on food that farm families receive has decreased. In the mid-1970s, farmers received about one-third of consumer retail food expenditures in grocery stores and restaurants. Since

then that figure has decreased steadily and is now 14.6 percent, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Using that percentage across the board, the farmers' share of this year's \$61.57 grocery bill is \$8.98.

"After accounting for bills and other payments that need to be made, farmers' net income off each retail food dollar is just eight cents," Hetke added. "Wisconsin shoppers can support

farmers by purchasing food products that are grown and raised in our state and across the Midwest."

The USDA says Americans will spend approximately 10 percent of their disposable annual income on food, the lowest average in the world.

Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation is the state's largest farm organization. Made up of 61 county Farm Bureaus, it represents farms of every size, commodity and management style.

Snowmobile Safety Class Offered — Pre-Registration Is Mandatory

A DNR-sponsored Snowmobile Safety Class will be offered on Saturdays, Dec. 7 and 14, inside the Kewaskum Municipal Annex building, 1308 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum, from 8 a.m. until noon. Attendance both days are required to complete the course.

Any person who is at least 12 years old and who is born on or after January 1, 1985, is required to possess a valid Snowmobile Safety Certificate in order to operate a snowmobile alone on public trails, lands or frozen waters. You must carry the certificate while riding and you must display it to a law enforce-

ment officer when requested.

All snowmobilers under age 16 must obtain certification in a classroom certification course. Internet certification is only available to persons 16 years of age and up, or they may take the classroom instruction.

Prior to enrolling in a safety class, you must obtain a DNR Customer ID number. This nine-digit number must be assigned to you by the DNR. You may quickly obtain an ID number by calling 1-888-936-7463 or visiting a DNR Service Center. If you are not sure if you have an ID number already as-

signed to you, double check first by calling 1-888-936-7463.

A parent must attend the pre-registration for the class and sign, thus allowing the student to attend.

Cost is \$10. Bring your own snacks, pen/pencil and warm clothing for some outside instruction. Water and restrooms are located inside the annex building.

Training is provided by Kewaskum, Campbell-sport, New Fane and Germantown clubs.

Lady Indians Turn Up The Defensive Heat On Two Rivers

Kewaskum and Two Rivers renewed an old Eastern Wisconsin girls basketball rivalry November 21, and the Lady Indians enjoyed the reunion a little more than the Raiders as they outscored the visitors 20-9 in the first half and never looked back, winning their season opener by 21 points, 49-28.

If you have been a fan of KHS basketball in recent years, you might have had difficulty recognizing the Indians, who unleashed a smothering defense which coach Russell Thull hopes will become their trademark this winter.

"We're pressing ... We're going to play 84-feet. That's what I told them," Thull said afterward. He indicated he has 11 varsity players who all deserve to see action. By rotating them in and out, his team should be fresher than the opponents.

"You could see it in the second half. We just wore them down," Thull went on.

Starting for KHS were seniors Maxine Paulowske and Megan Winkler, along with juniors Kennedy Adams and Nicole Butz and sophomore Annie Chris-

tenson.

Thull had his other senior, Katelyn Leitheiser, go in with Paulowske and freshman Madilyn Dogs, Julia Steger and Morgan Adams. That group erased a one-point, 4-5, deficit and turned it into a 10-5 lead as Leitheiser hit a three-point shot and Paulowske came up with a steal and made an old fashioned three-point play with 12:13 remaining in the first half. Two Rivers committed three straight turnovers, caused in large part by the KHS defense, and KHS extended its lead to 12-5 after Megan Winkler hit a pair of free throws. It was 14-5 after the leftie Dogs swished a layup and later 20-7 after back-to-back threes by Morgan Adams and Paulowske.

At the break, the Indians were up 20-9, and they showed no signs of let-up in the second half. In fact, they looked better offensively, scoring 29 points led by Paulowske's 10 after the break for a 16-point total.

"I told Max her shots were right on target. They were just a little short," Thull said, adding, "You know Max, she isn't going to stay cold for long."

About the freshmen

playing their first games, Thull said, "I thought all of them played well," and, "I was really excited with the way we played against Kiley Graff. She had 20 (points) Tuesday night" vs. Omro. The Indians held Graff, a 5-foot, 11-inch senior to seven points. "Nicole (Butz) and Morgan (Adams) took away the inside (on her)," he said.

Thull said his 1-2-2 defense was effective, as was his team's trapping. "Our goal is to make them play faster than they wanted to play," Thull said. It must be accomplished without fouling a lot. With just six fouls in the first half, the Indians accomplished that.

BUILDINGS AND BUILD-
ING REGULATIONS

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Sections 8-17 of Chapter 14 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to Buildings and Building Regulations, should be created as follows:

14-8 – DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter, the following terms are defined as follows unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

(a) "Contractor" means a person holding an electrical contractor's license from the State of Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services.

(b) "Electrical Work" means the installation, modification, or superintending of electrical wiring or equipment within the scope of Wis. Adm. Code Ch. SPS 316.

(c) "Inspector means Commercial Electrical Inspector defined and licensed by the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services, as a journeyman electrician.

(d) "Journeyman" means a person holding a current, valid license from the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services as a journeyman electrician.

(e) "Master" means a person holding a current, valid license from the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services as a master electrician.

14-9 - STATE REGULATIONS ADOPTED. The provisions of Wis. Adm. Code Ch. SPS 316 and any Wisconsin Statutes governing matters within the scope of said chapter SPS 316 are adopted and by reference made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth herein. Any future amendments, revisions or modifications of the statutes and administrative code provisions incorporated herein are also made part of this chapter upon their effective dates.

14-10 - FEES. The Fees for permits and inspections under this chapter shall be determined from time to time by the Village Board. A schedule of such fees shall be kept on file in the office of the Inspector.

14-11 – PERMITS.

1) Permit Required. Permits are required as described in SPS 316.012(1).

2) Application.

a. Any application for a permit shall be completed on a form furnished by the Inspector, describe the electrical work to be performed, include payment of the permit fee and include such other information as the Inspector may require.

b. The Inspector may require submission of plans, drawings, data, specifications, schedules, literature, information, material samples or tests as the Inspector deems necessary to determine the fitness of equipment for safe installation.

c. Refunds. No fees paid under this chapter shall be refunded unless the Electrical Inspector determines that the fees were not owed to the Village. Any related costs incurred by the Village, including the cost of making the refund, may be deducted from a refund made under this section if the Inspector determines that the person to whom the refund is made bears some fault in creating the conditions of the refund.

3) Late Permits

a. Electrical work made necessary by emergency conditions may be commenced prior to application for or issuance of a permit provided that all of the following conditions are met:

i. The work conforms to the requirements of this chapter

ii. The work is necessary to protect the public health or safety

iii. The person performing the work reports the work to the Inspector and submits a sufficient application for a permit by the next business day

b. Except as provided in paragraph (a), if electrical work is started before a permit is issued, the fee for the permit shall be double the usual fee charged. Issuance of a permit after work is started shall not relieve the owner or the person performing the work from liability for penalties for commencing the work without a permit.

4) Expiration

a. Permits shall expire twelve (12) months after being issued. No work shall be performed after a permit has expired unless a new permit is obtained.

b. An application for a permit for temporary work

shall specify a period of time not to exceed ninety (90) days during which the work will remain in service. Service to the work shall be terminated at the end of the specified period and shall not again be connected without written permission from the Inspector.

5) To Whom Issued. Permits shall be issued only to the following persons:

a. A contractor

b. The owner of a single-family residence as provided in section 14-14(2)

14-12 INSPECTION

1) General. The Inspector shall be notified upon the completion of any electrical work and before any wiring or equipment is hidden from view and the Inspector shall inspect the wiring and equipment within two (2) business days of receiving notice. If the Inspector finds that such wiring and equipment is fully in compliance with this chapter and does not constitute a hazard to life or property, the Inspector shall approve and authorize concealment of the wiring or equipment. If the wiring or equipment is incomplete or not installed strictly in accordance with this chapter or otherwise creates a hazard, the Inspector shall issue orders to remove all hazards and make other necessary changes or additions. Concealment of wiring or equipment before inspection or failure to comply with an order of the Inspector is a violation of this chapter.

2) Certificate of Inspection. No electrical installation shall be energized until a Certificate of Inspection has been issued by the Inspector. No Certificate of Inspection shall be issued unless the electric installation and all other electrical apparatus connected with it are in strict conformity with the provisions of this chapter. Any person who performs electrical work shall be responsible for the same. Any person who makes any additions, corrections, alterations or connections to the installation thereafter shall be responsible for the correct operation of the installation.

14-13 LIABILITY OF OTHER CRAFTS. No Person shall in any way alter the approved character of wiring or equipment by the placement of materials or equipment proximity, by concealment, by making inaccessible, or in any way affecting the approved wiring or equipment so as to render it in violation of this chapter.

14-14 WHO MAY DO ELECTRICAL WORK. Except as otherwise provided in this section, only journeymen and master electrician pay perform electrical work in the Village. The following persons may perform electrical work without being a journeyman or master electrician:

1) Contractor Employee. Employees of a contractor may perform electrical work provided they are licensed with the Wisconsin Department of Professional Services.

2) Homeowner. A homeowner may perform electrical work on a

single-family dwelling, if he or she owns and occupies it as his or her permanent residence, except that the homeowner may not repair or replace the electrical service to the dwelling or install electrical wiring to hot tubs, spas or swimming pools. Any electrical work must be permitted, inspected and approved according to this chapter. In addition, if required by the Inspector, a homeowner must demonstrate his or her ability to conform the work to all applicable rules and regulations by furnishing drawings or plans of proposed work.

14-15 INSPECTOR.

1) Enforcement. The Inspector shall be under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Division of Building Inspection and shall enforce all the provisions of this chapter. He/She shall prepare suitable forms for applications, permits and other reports.

2) Right of Access to Building. The Inspector and his/her assistants shall have the right to enter any public or private building or premises during reasonable hours. Failure by the owner or person in charge to permit prompt access to any premises is a violation of this chapter.

3) Authority to Discontinue Electrical Operations. The Inspector shall have the authority to turn off of all electric power to any equipment which he/she finds it to be in an unsafe condition, and cut or discontinue electrical service in case of emergency where such electric power is dangerous to life or property or may interfere with the work of the Fire Department. No person shall reconnect any equipment thus disconnected until permission is given by the Inspector in writing.

4) Periodic Inspection. The Inspector may periodically make thorough examinations of any electrical wires and equipment installed within the Village. When such wires or equipment are found to be in a dangerous or unsafe condition, or not in conformity with the requirements of this chapter, the Inspector shall notify the person installing, operating, using or owning the wires or equipment to repair, replace or remove the wires or equipment. Any such person failing or refusing to do so within the time specified by the Inspector is in violation of this section.

14-16 LIABILITY OF VILLAGE This chapter shall not be construed as imposing any liability on the Village for injury or damage to any person or property resulting from any electrical work or any defect in any electrical wiring or equipment or by reason of any inspection made or not made by any Village official or employee.

14-17 PENALTY. Any person that violates the provision of this chapter shall be subject to a municipal citation at the current bond schedule Each day the violation continues shall constitute a new violation

Four Gun Incidents Reported During Opening Weekend Of Gun Deer Season

– DNR Seeks Public's Help in Washburn County Hunting Incident

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reported four gun incidents during opening weekend of the gun deer season.

Locally, a hunter shot toward a running deer and struck a 19-year-old female in the left hand in Fond du Lac County on November 23.

Two other incidents that occurred that same day, which was opening day, took place in Oneida and Marathon counties. The two separate incidents involved hunters who discharged their firearms. In both cases, the hunter's left foot was struck. The Oneida County incident involved a 38-year-old male and the other incident involved a 29-year-old female in Marathon County.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is seeking the public's help in the case of an adult male shot while deer hunting in Washburn County on Sunday, Nov. 24.

The DNR's Bureau of Law Enforcement is looking for information regarding individuals or groups who would have been hunting around 11 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 24, in the block of Washburn County land in Minong Township bordered by these roads: East Sleepy Eye Road, south of Sleepy Eye Fire Land, north of Nancy Lake Road and west of CCC Road.

Anyone with information, no matter how insignificant it may seem, may confidentially relay their information by text, phone call or online to the WDNR Violation Tip Line: 1-800-TIP-WDNR or 1-800-847-9367. Here is the link to file information online.

The hotline is in operation 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Trained staff relay report information to conservation wardens.

Positive Partnership Is The Main Thing Needed For Education

An American Education Week Editorial Message

During my childhood, I found myself in a challenging school environment. Through no fault of myself or my siblings, our peers did not welcome us. It was the civil rights era and we had recently enrolled as the first black children in the well-funded "white school" in my Southern hometown, after the courts gave us the go-ahead.

My life would have been easier in a different situation. But, with guidance and dedication from the educators at our school who supported us, I learned a valuable lesson that sticks with me to this day.

I want to share this lesson with you for two reasons. First, because it is American Education Week. Second, because we are in an era when everyone seems to agree that we want and expect more successful

outcomes for our students — as it should be, since they're our future leaders.

Many people will offer ideas, many practices will be proposed, for our students' education. What works in any given community may be hard to predict, but what I learned from my childhood teachers is something that applies everywhere, to all of us.

The role of the educator is to help to unearth and shape the great potential our students come with. There was one teacher in particular who expressed confidence in my writing ability.

It was the first time I had heard anyone say this, and the words seemed to open up a future of possibilities I couldn't see before. This is one of the incredible things about teaching. Educators can take pride in many other people's accomplishments, because they help make those accomplishments possible.

From this one teacher, named Mary Thompson, I learned the power of a supportive voice in one's life. It is easier to achieve academically — or professionally as an adult — when you are supported, socially and emotionally.

Educators know this well. They reach out to students to see how their days are going, and whether they have everything they need both inside and outside of school. This work of the heart is the core of education. Our state as a whole today is putting more weight behind this wisdom, for example by funding mental health supports and embracing social and emotional learning.

At the Department of Public Instruction, one of our five focus areas is encouraging positive relationships between stu-

dents and the adults in their school. Another is helping all students feel safe and supported. These are protective hands that cradle a child so they can realize the benefit of other focus areas around instruction, leadership, and partnering with families and communities.

But the lesson I learned about the power of a supportive voice is not just for the classroom. It is for our whole society. When we talk about people, an organization, or an entire system, we have a choice. Down one path, we let any amount of failure to reach our dreams become an excuse to become negative and give up on ourselves, others, or our whole society.

Or, like the best teachers from your childhood, we maintain high expectations while also cele-

brating successes along the way. Like great educators, we remember that all of us are in this continuous cycle of learning throughout our lives. We remember that when we build up other people, or improve existing systems, we help everyone work better and everyone benefits.

In this spirit, my request of you is your positive partnership.

Schools are the lifeblood of our communities, and they share with families and communities a need to help youth become contributing adults. We can only create the right environment for this to happen through the work of many hands: positive, collaborative relationships in which all voices are heard. Your teachers, school leaders, and education system value your input. In fact, today many in education are working to build stronger partnerships with families and communities.



Please share your positive energy, your ideas, and your time at the school, district, and state level not only during American Education Week, but all year round. Look for opportunities to thank a classroom teacher, support staff, school leader, or other educator for contributions to the life of your child, grandchild, or neighbor; lend your voice to recognizing and celebrating them outside of school; and join me in the positive, collaborative spirit that will bring the best for our students and our state.
