Christmas Comes To Kewaskum

The scene was festive on Sunday, Dec. 8, as the Christmas parade made its way through downtown Kewaskum on Sunday, Dec. 8.

The crowd cheered as bands, dancers, llamas, ATVs and floats went by, all decorated with bright lights to welcome the Christmas season. It was the 30th annual Kewaskum Christmas parade, sponsored each year by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce.

A total of 20 floats were in the parade. Each was scored carefully by judges who were mixed in with the crowd at different points of the parade route. After judges filled out forms to rate each float, the scores were tallied and winners were determined.

"We had a lot of really great floats this year. The judges had a hard time choosing winners because everyone really outdid themselves. We ended up with two floats tying for first place and two floats tying for third place," said Sarah Tye, who helped coordinate this year's parade.

The Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce presented cash awards to the top floats:

First Place Tie: Trail Blazers and West Bend Moose Lodge, \$150 each.

Second Place: Gei-

del's Piggly Wiggly, \$100.

Third Place Tie: Holy Trinity and Peace Church, \$75 each.

The final float in the parade transported Santa Claus through the streets of Kewaskum. Before the parade began, the jolly old man was busy greeting children at Christmas Central, also known as the Kewaskum Annex building. There was much festivity going on there all afternoon, as hundreds of people participated in the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce's Cookie Hunt.

Cookie hunt participants visited over 40 businesses as they received cookies and a chance to win raffle prizes. Auburn Accounting held an adult scavenger hunt as well.

"The cookie hunt was a great way to get out and see all the businesses that Kewaskum has to offer," said Katie Kopping, who took part in the cookie hunt.

The Kewaskum Chamber of Commerce board met on Monday, and plans are already being made to make the event even bigger and better next year.

"We think these events are a great way to bring in the holiday season, as well as to celebrate our community," said Kristy Vogt, president of the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce.

School Board Discusses Mascots

In January, when the Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB) hosts a convention in Milwaukee, one delegate from each of the school districts in the state will have the opportunity to vote on 17 different resolutions.

One of the resolutions is to recommend legislation that requires school districts to retire Native American mascots, pro-

vided such legislation establishes adequate timelines; provides state funding to compensate districts for the costs necessary to retire Native American mascots, logos or imagery; and does not require the retiring of images, statues or other likenesses of historic individual figures after whom a school or community is named.

Kewaskum Residents Can View And Pay Utility Bills Online

The Village of Kewaskum offers utility customers a service to allow for electronic billing and payments. Utility customers are able to view their bills online, saving Kewaskum the cost of printing and mailing bills. Customers participating in online billing receive emails when their bills are ready for viewing. They simply click through and the bill appears with all the information they would have received on a paper bill.

Typically the village spends \$400 quarterly, in postage alone to mail utility bills to customers. Add to that paper, ink, upkeep on printing and equipment expenses—it is costly. The cost to post a bill for online viewing is about a penny.

The village would like customers to opt out of receiving paper bills to help reduce costs. Customers who prefer to have paper bills sent, still have the option to pay electronically. When they pay online, by mobile app, or by calling, the payments post to village software, saving time and eliminating manual input. Another benefit is that up-to-date amounts due are posted daily, so customers know how much they owe by simply going online or viewing it on our mobile app.

Residents can pay from the comfort of their homes, seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

They can make payment arrangements with their bank, navigating to its online bill pay feature. They also have the option to log onto www.village.kewaskum.wi.us, download “PSN Payments” from the App Store or Google Play, or call a toll-free automated phone service (877-885-7968) to pay. Customers can pay by credit or debit as well as make an electronic payment from their checking or savings. Residents can pay immediately, schedule a payment or set up Auto-Pay and not have to worry about making payments for each bill. Auto-payments can be set up for the amount of the bill or budgeted amounts.

The Village of Kewaskum is pleased to announce that they offer a service for credit or debit card payments at the Village Hall. Kewaskum’s payment processor charges a convenience fee of \$1 for check/savings payments and 2.75 percent (plus \$0.50 if under \$100.00) for credit/debit card payments.

Keep in mind that online billing and payments are a Green initiative that benefit village residents while at the same time are kinder to the environment.

Electronic payments and bills are easy to use. Once registered, the payment process is just three, quick steps. Registration is simple. Customers enter their name and account number, and the system will locate their accounts. Customers can also print receipts and bills, view current balances and view their electronic payment histories whether the payments were made online, on the mobile app or by phone. A handy tool is available to “group” accounts so that customers can pay multiple billing accounts in one visit.

If customers have questions about using the online, mobile and phone system, they can contact the PSN Call Center, which operates during extended business hours, 365 days a year. Call Center representatives can also make payments on behalf of customers should the need arise. Call Center support and the automated phone system are available in English and Spanish.

Security of online information is always a concern, so when the Village of Kewaskum looked for a company to provide online bills and payments, that was a top consideration. They chose Payment Service Network (PSN) which has attained Level 1 Certification by the Payment Card Industry – Data Security Standard (PCI-DSS), the highest degree of security awarded by the industry. The company was a pioneer in the online payment industry and is based in Madison, Wisconsin. If residents have any questions, they can call PSN’s HELP line, toll free at 1-866-917-7368.



Chief’s Corner

Holy Cow... another year is already coming to an end. Actually, not just a year, another decade is coming to an end! In a couple of weeks we will enter the “roaring 20s.” Who knows what the next decade will bring – maybe we will get those flying cars my parents were told about when they were in school, or maybe we will get an electric pickup truck that doesn’t look like a triangle (sorry... I won’t be selling my Chevrolet for a Tesla quite yet). But I digress...

Winter is upon us once again! With the change in seasons comes different issues that residents must address accordingly; specifically winter parking restrictions and snow removal requirements.

Winter parking went into effect on December 1 and is in effect until April 1, 2020. Per Village Ordinance, vehicles are not allowed to park on any village street between the

hours of 2am -6am. Violators will receive a parking citation for \$20.

Another ordinance that gets attention during this season is snow removal from sidewalks. Village ordinance 82-6(a) states that all snow must be removed from sidewalks within 24 hours after the conclusion of a snow event. Our department will create a list of properties not in compliance with this ordinance after the 24-hour period. We will then forward the list of non-compliant properties to our Department of Public Works crew who will remove the snow from the sidewalks in question. This will result in the property owner receiving an invoice from the Village for the work completed by Village Staff. The property owner will also receive a citation from our department if the Village is forced to remove snow from the property on multiple occasions.

Residents also need to

be mindful that it is against ordinance to deposit snow from the sidewalk abutting your property into the street. Ordinance 82-6(b) states “no person shall cause to be deposited snow from his premises on the sidewalk...onto any street in the village without a permit from the director of public works...”

Snow removal isn’t a chore most look forward to performing, but it is part of the deal when we live in the “great white north.” Maybe in the next decade someone will invent a product that will solve all of our snow issues (come on Tesla), but until that day comes, snow removal is our responsibility. But look at the bright side, the Farmer’s Almanac says we will be above average for temperatures this winter.... So we’ve got that going for us...

Washington County Sheriff's Deputy Jon Doran and his K9 partner "Ryker" were joined by teams from the Germantown Police Department as well as the Waushara County Sheriff's Office. The course instructor was former Madison Police Department K9 Unit Supervisor Chris Boyd.

The course was three days long and provided valuable advanced tracking training to the handlers and their K9 partners. This training will assist the handlers in better being able to read their dogs on tracks and provide valuable techniques that can increase their success rate.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

OWI/Fentanyl Arrest

A 41-year-old Beaver Dam man was arrested on multiple charges yesterday at 1:10 p.m. after the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a report of a car traveling recklessly at a high rate of speed. Reports were that the car had nearly caused several accidents in the area of Interstate 41 and State Highway 33 in the Town of Addison. The Sheriff's Office is appreciative of the alert citizen who called 911 and followed the car until he could be stopped by law enforcement. The citizen followed the car on State Highway 33 to the Dodge County line at which point the suspect vehicle turned back

around and began driving back into Washington County towards a Washington County Sheriff's Deputy who was responding to the call. The car was subsequently stopped.

The driver attempted to identify himself as his brother; however, he provided the wrong date of birth. When the officer asked for his phone number he indicated that he did not have it memorized. The suspect then proceeded to look in his phone contacts under the name that he had provided to the officer and provided the phone number to the deputy. The diligent deputy became suspicious and contacted the brother on the telephone who verified that it was

most likely his brother posing as him. The deputy also recognized signs of opiate impairment on the driver. The driver was subsequently arrested for OWI for being impaired by drugs. As a result of the arrest, a search for evidence of his impairment was conducted and a white rock-like substance was located along with other drug paraphernalia. The suspect warned the deputy that the substance was fentanyl. A fentanyl test kit was also located in the vehicle.

Less than five weeks ago, the suspect was arrested by Washington County Sheriff's Deputies for OWI, Operating a Motor Vehicle without Consent, Possession of Narcotics,

and Bail Jumping. As a result of that stop, as well as previous arrests the suspect was currently out on bond. Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said, "It does not matter if it is the middle of the night or the middle of the day, our deputies, assisted by alert citizens, are out there in relentless pursuit of those that choose to endanger the public by possessing deadly substances and driving while impaired."

The suspect was booked in at the Washington County Jail for Possession of Fentanyl, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Bail Jumping, Obstructing, OWI, and Operating without a Valid License and remains in custody.

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Recipe

Name: **PUMPKIN BANANA BREAD**

INGREDIENTS

- 1½ cups white whole-wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 1 cup canned unseasoned pumpkin puree
- 1 medium ripe banana, mashed (½ cup)
- ¾ cup light brown sugar
- ¼ cup melted butter
- ¼ cup orange juice
- 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 0½ cup bittersweet chocolate chips (optional)

COOKING DIRECTIONS

- From: Eating Well
1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Coat a 9-by-5-inch loaf pan with cooking spray.
 2. Whisk flour, cinnamon, baking powder, baking soda and salt together in a medium bowl.
 3. Whisk pumpkin puree, mashed banana, brown sugar, butter, orange juice, eggs and vanilla together in a large bowl. Add the dry ingredients and stir with a wooden spoon until just combined. Fold in chocolate chips, if using.
 4. Transfer the batter to the prepared loaf pan. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center of the loaf comes out clean, 45 to 55 minutes. Let cool in the pan on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Remove from the pan and let cool for at least 20 minutes more before slicing.

Fuel UP To Play 60s December Harvest Of The Month — Pumpkin

Each month, with partnerships from many area businesses and the Washington/Ozaukee County Health department, the Kewaskum Fuel Up to Play 60 High School group features a harvest of the month. This includes highlighting the harvest at Geidel's Piggly Wiggly, hosting a tasting of the harvest throughout the Kewaskum School District, and featuring the harvest on the lunch menu. Some area restaurants have even featured the harvest on their menus.

As we roll into the last month of the year, December's Harvest of the Month is pumpkin. One cup of fresh pumpkin only contains 30 calories and is a great source for daily vitamins, such as Vitamin A and Vitamin C.

It is easy to include this member of the gourd family into your daily eating habits. From pumpkin pancakes to pumpkin yogurt parfaits, there are always healthy and delicious options.

A group of Fuel Up to Play students and I have decided to take this program one step further after securing funding for this project through the AdCap Challenge in Pennsylvania. We have partnered with the Boys and Girls Club, who currently have approximately 100 families in the Kewaskum after-school program. The KES staff prepares the harvest of the month tastings for each of these students on the first Wednesday of each month. We then go to help hand out the harvest and talk with the

kids about the importance of healthy eating. Each family then gets one voucher produced by Geidel's Piggly Wiggly to take to the store during that month for one free item per family and a recipe that includes both the harvest and dairy. It is our hope that families purchase the item and create the recipe at home to share with their family. We want to make sure everyone knows the importance of healthy eating, which includes vegetables and dairy, as well as getting 60 minutes of exercise daily.

Please consider buying a pumpkin this month and make the recipe for your family. Stay tuned for next month's harvest: Horseradish.

PUMPKIN SERVING & STORAGE IDEAS

Whole pumpkins should be stored in a cool place, upside down (so the stalk is on the bottom).

Do not store pumpkins directly on the ground; instead, use a piece of cardboard as a mat.

Cut pumpkins store best in the fridge, wrapped tightly in cling wrap.

School Board Discusses Mascots

"The resolution from the WASB is making a recommendation to the legislative advocates. You are making it to the DPI (Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction) as well as to the legislature. In this particular case, it is interchangeable. This has no authority; it is a recommendation," Superintendent James Smasal told the board at the School Board meeting on Monday, Dec. 9.

Mary Miller is the district's WASB representative, but she is not able to attend the convention. School Board President Mark Sette asked Board Member Timothy Ramthun if he was interested in representing the district at the convention, since Ramthun has voiced his opposition to that particular resolution.

"I know this is something that is near and dear to you," Sette said to Ramthun.

However, Ramthun said he had to recuse himself from being the WASB delegate because he had a conflict of interest with some of the other resolutions that were being introduced.

The board decided that either Sette or Board Member Sue Miller will represent the district at the convention.

Smasal told the board members that the delegate will have an opportunity to speak at the convention before a vote is taken. A microphone is available for delegates voice the opinion of their districts.

"If you have a problem with something, you need to let people know

you want it voted down and why. The other delegates like to hear what the reasoning is. Sometimes the votes are very close," Smasal said.

Sette said that board members should look over all of the resolutions and let Miller or Sette know if they have an opinion on any of the issues next month.

"I don't even have to wait a month. I would be very against us changing our mascot name or the Indian symbol," School Board Member Doug Gonring said.

"The side note I would put, it has been very vocal, and very newsworthy over the last month over what has been going on in Menomonee Falls, and it is tearing the district apart. I can tell you that I have spoken to the DPI representative and I have said, 'Please don't do that to us,'" Smasal said. "This district does not want to change the Indian mascot... I think we need to respect that," Smasal said.

Smasal said that in the bigger picture, at some point either the DPI or legislature has to make a decision and either say it is OK to use Native American mascots or it is not.

"To throw people to the wolves like they did in Menomonee Falls is not right. Don't make it a local control issue because that is just tearing that community apart. We don't ever want to be torn apart," Smasal said.

While the Kewaskum School Board met on Monday night, the Menomonee Falls School Board met and voted to change its Indi-

ans mascot.

Other School Board Matters

- Applications to be on the spring ballot for the Kewaskum School District are due by 5 p.m. on January 7.

- It was announced that the Kewaskum School District is in the bottom 20 percent of all public schools in the state for mill rates.

- It was announced that the Kewaskum School District is in the top 20 percent for the state in student achievement.

- The board voted 7-0 to approve the November payroll of \$1,288,313.39.

- The board voted 4-3 to approve November accounts payable of 566,747.05. Gonring, Ramthun and Jim Leister voted against the measure.

Currently, accounts payable reports are made available to board members to review on the Friday before a board meeting. Leister said that does not give sufficient time to review.

It was decided that beginning next month, Business Manager Julie Thoreson will make that report available the Monday preceding a regular board meeting.

- The board approved: new course proposals for the 2020-21 school year; the 2020-21 school year calendar; a KHS Show Choir trip to Iowa; a KHS wrestling team overnight trip to Oshkosh; and an overnight trip for students to attend the FFA Leadership Conference in Stevens Point.

Recently, Marshall's Country Corner in Boltonville announced that a 2,800-square foot convenience store would be built adjacent to the current store. Preliminary work for the new store started a week ago. Marshall's plans to open the store in March 2005 and then relocating the pumps to where the current store stands. It's anticipating the new pumps will be finished by May 2005. Groundbreaking was held December 6.

A one-vehicle accident in the Town of Farmington is being blamed for knocking out power to about 2,500 WE Energies customers December 6. The crash occurred at the intersection of STH 144 and Elm Tree Drive.

City Of West Bend Seeks Grant For Land Acquisition

The City of West Bend has applied for a 50 percent matching grant from the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program to assist with the purchase of approximately one acre along the west bank of the Milwaukee River. The property includes two parcels currently used as parking lots for businesses. When developed, the property will remain parking lots open for public use and will include connecting existing sections of the Milwaukee Riverfront Parkway.

The Milwaukee Riverfront Parkway is a 4.6-mile east-west trail that follows the meander of the Milwaukee River through West Bend. The Downtown Riverwalk is the section of the trail that lies adjacent to downtown West Bend between Highway 33 to the north and Veterans Avenue to the south. The Downtown Riverwalk joins the Eisenbahn State Trail, a multi-purpose 5-mile north-south trail that bisects the city with the Milwaukee Riverfront Parkway via several pedestrian bridges and is the link between the downtown and cultural districts.

Stewardship-purchased land cannot prohibit nature-based outdoor activities (hunting, trapping, fishing, hiking or cross-country skiing) unless the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has determined that prohibiting one or more of those activities is justified to protect public safety.

Should this property be acquired as planned, city ordinance will prohibit the discharge of a firearm, hunting within the park, and trapping on the property. The department is proposing

the prohibition of gun hunting and trapping on this property because it is necessary to protect public safety. The department has examined the following factors in making this determination: the property is located within the densely populated downtown area of the city of West Bend, and the area is highly developed both commercially and residentially.

Indians Needed to Sweat Out Extra Period To Gain First Win

Momentum went back and forth like a tennis ball in Kewaskum's non-conference boys basketball game on December 3 against Kiel. Fortunately the Indians (1-1) grabbed control of it during the overtime period to post a 72-67 victory over the Raiders (0-2) for their first win of the 2019-20 season.

"If it wasn't for (our) missed free throws, it probably wouldn't have gone into overtime" KHS coach Don Gruber said about being comfortably ahead with several minutes to go, then seeing the lead disappear. "We didn't handle the ball very well down the stretch" while missing 50 percent of their free throws.

Kewaskum was down by eight points at the end of the first half, but the Indians played much better after the break, taking over the lead with 12:00 to go. "A little better shot selection and fewer turnovers" certainly helped out, according to Gruber, who said, "We made a little run and got the lead," eventually stretching it to 12 points.

Kiel fought back, however, chipping away at its deficit and getting within three points with just seconds remaining. The Raiders got off an errant three-point shot with :03 left, and they managed to grab the rebound and call a quick time out.

When play resumed, the Raiders got the ball to Carson Lepisto, who was on target with his three-point shot, tying the score at 64-64 and sending the game into OT.

"John Mark (Bocher) was right on him (Lepisto)," Gruber said, so it wasn't just a long shot but one that was contested.

In overtime, the Indi-

ans regained their composure and quickly took a two-point lead. That's when freshman Antoine Coleman-Thull came up with the play of the game, according to Gruber. He said an errant pass was heading out of bounds when Coleman-Thull "dove for it, caught it and (while in the air) underhanded it to Toree Ralph, who attacked the basket, and gave a shuffle, no-look pass to John Mark. He finished the play" with a basket. "That kind of got everyone pumped," the coach said.

The Indians went on to score four more points to win by five.

For the second straight game, Joshua Bocher led the Indians in scoring with 25, while John Mark chipped in with 21. Ralph was the third KHS player in double figures. He had 13 points to go with seven assists and four steals.

"The boys rebounded well," Gruber said, reporting the Bocher triplets teamed up for 29, including 14 by Joshua, nine by John Mark and six from Joseph, who also blocked three shots.

Kewaskum, 1-1, was scheduled to play at Ripon on December 5 but the game was postponed after a threat incident at the school the day before. KHS Athletic Director Jason Piittmann confirmed that was the reason for the postponement. He and officials at Ripon are working on rescheduling the game.

The Indians resume action Friday, December 13, when they entertain defending East Central champion Waupun.

Kewaskum Uses Balanced Scoring, Tough "D" To Run Past Ripon

Coach Russ Thull wanted his Kewaskum High girls basketball team to set a tone in its season opener at Ripon on December 6. That wasn't the case in the first half vs. the Lady Tigers, but the Indians certainly got the message in the second when they scored 33 points, breaking a 26-26 tie and coasting to a 59-45 victory.

"The difference in the second half was that we had better patience," Thull said about the game. He added, "One thing that we talked about at half was that we felt we were settling for OK shots by taking the first shot that we saw. We felt that if we rotated the ball from side to side that we would find better shots. We did exactly that in the second half and we were able to find the inside off of cuts and drives."

As had been the case in the previous two games, senior guard Maxine Paulowske led the Indians in scoring. In this game, however, Paulowske got plenty of scoring help from

Kennedy Adams, Annie Christenson and freshman Madilyn Dogs.

Paulowske poured in 22 points on three regular baskets, four 3-pointers and four free throws. Adams was a perfect 4x4 in shooting and 6x7 at the free throw line for an even dozen points. Dogs chipped in with 10 points and contributed seven rebounds and three assists. Christenson added seven points.

"Yes, we felt that the balance of scoring was a big reason for us putting up 59," Thull said. "We know that we have more scoring than Max, and it was good to see Kennedy, Madi, and Annie step up in that area."

With her 22 points, Paulowske is now at 870 points for her career, 130 away from 1,000.

The defense also received an "A" grade from the coach. "I think one area that I was most proud of was our defense. We held (Kerstin) Sauerbrei, who was averaging 18 points per game coming in, to two points - she had no field goals and had two free throws," Thull said. "We had an excellent

team effort that allowed this to happen."

The Indians won't have much time to rest on their laurels. Next up on the schedule are two tough opponents, December 10 hosting Mayville and two days later entertaining Waupun, the prohibitive favorite to win this year's East Central title. "Mayville on Tuesday is our focus. They are a very physical team," the coach said. About Waupun he added, "We are looking forward to the challenge. They are the conference favorite in most eyes. We are excited for the opportunity to see where we stack up and we feel very good about our ability to defend."

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Indians Pick Up Medals In Gunslinger Test

The Kewaskum High wrestling team was unable to advance a single individual to the finals in the December 7 Gunslinger Invitational held in Slinger. But senior Braden Maertz placed third at 152 pounds after going 4-1 on the day, while Nathan Heberer placed fifth at 132.

The Indians, who were only able to fill nine of the 14 weight classes, wound up in 13th place as a team after scoring 169 points.

Burlington was impressive in winning the title with 414.5 points, while DePere was second with 363, followed by the host Owls with 338.5. West Bend East and Arrowhead rounded out the top five with 333 and 271.

"They both wrestled really well. I think they both had three pins in five matches, and that's pretty good wrestling," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said about Maertz and Heberer.

Maertz's day included three straight pins in pool action, in 0:40, 1:28 and 3:12. The three wins put Maertz in the semifinals, where he ran into Hartland Arrowhead's Jack Ganos, who pinned him in 1:51.

"Braden was actually leading the match. He got the first takedown," Rhoads said, reporting the score was 2-1 when Maertz shot in on his opponent. Maertz got caught in a cradle and pinned by Ganos, who finished fifth at state last year in Division 1.

Maertz bounced back to outpoint West Bend East's Crosby Schlosser 7-4 to earn the third place medal.

Heberer started his day with two victories via pin before getting pinned in 1:30 by Slinger sophomore Aiden Ford. This loss sent him in a bracket with three others who would fight for fifth through eighth places.

First Heberer took care of Caleb Frey of Burlington, pinning him in 2:42. In the battle for fifth and sixth, the junior Indian prevailed with an 11-4 decision over Arrowhead's Jonah Luther.

Another top-eight finish was produced by junior Kannon Muckerheide at 182 pounds. Muckerheide started his third season on the varsity, going 2-1 in pool action, which placed him in the bracket vying for fifth through eighth places. Muckerheide then lost to Carter Amidon of Slinger by a single point, 4-5, but came back to pin

Loran Woodart of Waukesha West in :37 for fifth place.

Sophomore Josh Vogt also picked up a seventh place, wrestling at 126. He went 3-2 on the day, ending up with a pin in 3:10 over Cole Fredrick of Waukesha West in the battle for seventh and eighth.

"Pretty good wrestling from both of them,"

Rhoads said about Vogt and Muckerheide.

Other KHS wrestlers who finished in the top 10 included: Mason Pomeroy, ninth at 138 pounds; Isaiah George, 10th at 170; Jordan Mixon, 10th at 220. Jadon Rhoads (160 pounds), Colin Duren (170) and Sam Gauthier (285) also participated in the meet. Pomeroy was

in just one meet last year before getting injured in a non-wrestling incident, and Rhoads is confident he will do well after wrestling a couple of meets.

Kewaskum was missing freshman Braeden Scoles, who will be the starter at 145. "He is having a bit of a struggle with his weight so he did

not weigh in," Rhoads said.

KHS is at Waupun December 12 for a dual meet vs. the Warriors in East Central Conference action. Then the Indians travel to Wisconsin Dells December 14 for the 32-team Adams-Friendship Duals, where each team is expected to wrestle five times.
