Building Libraries In Vietnam

– Theusch Family Visits International Libraries

Last June, people in the Kewaskum area were introduced to Kim Phuc Phan Thi, the girl known as the “Napalm Girl.”

In October, local members of the Theusch family left Wisconsin and traveled to Kim’s hometown of Trang Bang, Vietnam. The Theusch family visited four libraries, two of which were affiliated with public schools. They also visited two sites for new libraries, including Trang Bang.

Kim’s photo was taken on June 8, 1972, during the Vietnam War. The South Vietnamese military dropped napalm on her small village of Trang Bang. Kim’s photo was taken as she ran naked down the road, filled with pain and fear as napalm burned her body.

Kim was 9 years old at

the time. She is now a Canadian citizen and a Christian. She has become an international speaker, focusing on the importance of faith, forgiveness and peace.

Kim’s hometown of Trang Bang is about one hour northwest of Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon). It is where the Cao Dai Religion was founded and was practiced by Kim and her family. The Cao Dai Temple is where the villagers had gathered when the napalm bomb was dropped by the South Vietnamese.

Kim, who was awarded the German Peace Prize earlier this year, spoke to a group gathered at the Old Courthouse in West Bend last June about how she focuses on staying positive.

Kim’s visit to Wisconsin was coordinated by Chuck Theusch, founder

of Children’s Library International, to help raise funds to build a library in her hometown of Trang Bang, Vietnam. Besides West Bend, Kim visited Milwaukee, Madison and Chicago last June to help raise funds for the library. About \$8,000 to \$10,000 is still needed to complete the \$60,000 library.

This was Theusch’s 52nd trip to Vietnam since 1999.

Theusch was accompanied by his family members from the Kewaskum area, including Marcia, Erin, Tara, Matt, Missy and Carissa. The trip took place from October 13 to October 28. The family members traveled to Vietnam with Chuck Theusch to honor his 20 years of work there.

KHS Students Explore Different Careers

A nurse from Madison Children’s Hospital recently visited Kewaskum High School and talked with students who are interested in nursing or the healthcare profession.

The visit was part of a new Career Pathways program that started at the school in the fall. Through the new program, school counselors met with all of the freshmen students and their parents to determine which career pathway the student was interested in pursuing. The career pathway will help determine which classes

each student will take in high school.

Having students take classes they are interested in helps the students remain interested in the courses and increases learning, according to Kevin Pratt, a retired guidance counselor who is coordinating academic and career planning for the Ke-

waskum School District.

Through the new program, students choose to follow one of following six career pathways: agriculture, foods and natural resources; arts and communication; business and marketing; exploratory; health and human services; or manufacturing and engineering. Once they se-

lect a pathway, they take courses that will help prepare them for that field.

If a student changes his or her mind about which pathway they want to follow, the plan can change, according to Pratt.

Community Notification

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is releasing the following information pursuant to WI Statute 301.46(2m) which authorizes law enforcement agencies to inform the public of a sex offender's release when, in the discretion of the agency, the release of information will enhance public safety, awareness and protection. The individual who appears on this notification has been convicted of a sex offense. Further, his criminal history places him in a classification level which reflects a low potential to re-offend.

Troy J. Wilson was released from prison on December 31. After his release he is residing at 1725 County Highway NN in the Township of Jackson. In 2005 Wilson was convicted of Third Degree Sexual Assault. Wilson was acquainted with all his victims. In 2013, Wilson was convicted of Sex Offender Registry Violations. Wilson will be on probation until February 2, 2020, and will be monitored closely by WI-DOC Division of Community. Wilson will have numerous rules and restrictions to follow including wearing a live tracking GPS unit. The GPS monitoring unit will have exclusion zones set up alerting WI-DOC if there is a violation of the exclusion zones rules.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is NOT wanted by law enforcement at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but rather it is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Sex offenders have always lived in our communities; but it was not until

the Sex Offender Registration and Community Notification Law was enacted that law enforcement was able to share this information with the community. More information can be located at <https://appsdoc.wi.gov/public/faq>.

K9 Ryker Tracks Down Felon

On Christmas Eve, K9 Ryker, the Washington County Sheriff's Office's 2-year-old Belgium Malinois, tracked down a felon who fled from a deputy on a traffic stop.

The incident began around 7:39 p.m. after a 25-year-old Village of Kewaskum man was stopped for an equipment violation on Pleasant Valley Road in the Town of Polk. The man provided two different names to the investigating deputy, and then fled the scene in his vehicle while the deputy was speaking with him.

The suspect, who was on parole for felon in possession of a firearm, was able to elude the deputy by driving down a long residential driveway about two miles from the initial traffic stop. The suspect then drove around the back of the home to conceal his car. The alert homeowner contacted the sheriff's office to report the suspicious vehicle.

Ryker, and his handler Deputy Jonathan Doran, arrived on scene and were able to pick up the suspect's scent from items left in the abandoned vehicle. Ryker tracked the suspect for

about 400 yards before locating him hiding underneath a fallen tree.

According to Sheriff Martin Schulteis, "During this investigation a felon was tracked down and arrested. Tomorrow, Ryker could locate a missing endangered child or take dangerous drugs out of our community. We are fortunate to have such a valuable public safety resource to serve our community."

The suspect is currently incarcerated at the Washington County Jail and is facing multiple charges including felony eluding, possession of crack cocaine and paraphernalia, obstructing and multiple traffic citations.

Structure Fire

On Saturday, Dec. 21, at approximately 3:53 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a report of a structure fire to a detached outbuilding in the 6000 block of Beaver Dam Road in the Township of Addison. Deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office, along with responders from the Allenton Fire Department and St. Lawrence Fire Department, responded to the scene. Upon the arrival of the first deputy, smoke was observed coming from the roof of the structure. There was no one inside of the structure at the time the fire was reported.

The structure fire was quickly upgraded to the working still level by the Allenton Fire Department. The following fire departments responded to assist in fighting the fire: Hartford, West Bend, Iron Ridge, Slinger, Woodland, Kohlsville and Lifestar Rescue. Upon arrival of fire personnel, it was determined that the fire had entered into the

insulated walls and ceiling of the outbuilding. There were no reported injuries to fire personnel as a result of the fire.

The outbuilding interior and contents suffered damage estimated in excess of \$20,000 as a result of the fire, smoke and water. The fire started in an area containing several flammable materials and is not believed to be suspicious in nature.

Beaver Dam Road was closed for approximately one hour to assist in firefighting efforts.

Criminal Interdiction Deployment/Pursuit

Washington County Sheriff's Office deputies, in collaboration with their local law enforcement partners with the Hartford and Jackson Police Departments, conducted a high visibility criminal interdiction effort on Interstate 41 and U.S. Highway 45 on December 12, which resulted in several arrests for various offenses including dangerous drugs and operating while intoxicated.

These enforcement deployments occur several times a year. Commuters may have noticed an increased law enforcement presence in this area on their evening commutes home. The primary goal of this effort is to intercept dangerous drugs that are being brought into our community and to take dangerous drivers off the roadway while holding those that choose to engage in these dangerous behaviors accountable for their actions. The Sheriff's Office understands that these efforts can cause a few unwanted delays along the interstate and is appreciative of the patience shown on the roadway by the general motoring public, which allows the

department to do its job safely.

A 27-year-old Menasha man was arrested after he fled law enforcement during the interdiction. A police officer with the Village of Jackson, working under the authority of the Washington County Sheriff on the interdiction deployment, observed a car at a red light in the Village of Germantown about to get onto the interstate. The officer observed the driver, who appeared to possibly be impaired. The officer also observed an equipment violation on the vehicle. The officer attempted to conduct a traffic stop and the car fled at speeds in excess of 100 mph. Tire deflation devices were successfully deployed at two different locations on the interstate. The vehicle came to a stop on Interstate 41 near State Highway 60 in the Town of Polk after a nearly seven-mile pursuit. The driver was cap-

tured after a short foot pursuit. The driver is currently on parole for first degree intentional homicide and delivery of dangerous drugs. There was an active arrest warrant out for him for reportedly fleeing from Winnebago County authorities. He remains in custody this morning on numerous criminal charges, including felony eluding, second degree reckless endangering safety and possession of drug paraphernalia, as well as the outstanding warrant.

Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said, "This is the exact type of dangerous offender these deployments are intended to capture. Based on the heavy police presence in the area we were able to quickly react and saturate the area with resources. This response allowed for multiple successful deployments of tire deflation devices and a quick and safe conclusion."



Some of the people in Vietnam were familiar with the name of Marcia Theusch, a Farmington resident. In July, the Marcia K. Theusch Scholarship was presented to Kim Phuc Brotehr, who is attending a special Library Science Certification Course. The \$500 schol-

arship is funding the second month of the three-month course, and he hopes to be able to work in the Trang Bang library when it is built.

KHS Students Explore Different Careers

"Kids used to take a class because they thought, 'I like the teacher, I want to be with my friends, or it is easy.' Those are the three worst reasons to take a course. We want it to be related to their pathway, we want it to be rigorous, and we want it to have purpose," Pratt said.

The school district is partnering with different businesses and colleges to offer classes and internships that will help students land jobs after they graduate from high school. The school has received positive feedback on the new program from parents.

"When we started the process of picking courses for my daughter [two years ago], it was a little stressful, so I was really excited when they said they wanted to meet with the freshmen students and their parents to develop a plan," said Pam May, who has

two children who attend Kewaskum High School, a junior and a freshman.

"We got a lot out of it to see how to help the kids. I see it as a huge benefit for the kids and the ones who are coming up through the grades to get to know the counselors and let them know they are here for them. I think it is a very positive thing," she added.

Through the new program, students have worked with different organizations in the community. For example, students who are interested in obtaining a career in healthcare go regularly to Cedar Community and Kettle Moraine Gardens to gain experience in assisted living programs.

"I believe that the outside experiences and the partners are a critical, fundamental piece of the whole thing," Pratt said.

Students who are in-

terested in the human services pathway have become involved with the Boys and Girls Club. Not only has this connection helped the students, but it has helped fill employment vacancies at the club.

"I think our partnership has been a bonus for the Boys and Girls Club as well," said Jamie Leoni, a counselor at Kewaskum High School.

To help students prepare for life after high school, counselors worked with seniors in the fall to discuss a transition plan, whether that involved going into the workforce, college or the military. Counselors taught the students how to do things such as apply for colleges and fill out financial aid forms.

The Kewaskum School Board voted last June to hire Pratt to work for the district on a half-time basis to provide Academic and Career Planning services.

Kewaskum had eight wrestlers in the varsity tournament. Most won at least one match. Some came in the "pig-tail round" which helps to fill out the 16-man championship brackets. Mason Pomeroy at 138 went 2-2, but did not place. Pomeroy (9-8) had two wins on the day.



Good Team Play On Both Sides Of The Court Earn KHS Girls Another Win

Earning its fourth win of the year, a 49-35 decision over host Winneconne, wasn't as easy as it looked. The Kewaskum girls basketball team had to work hard to get it.

"We won a hard-fought game. Winneconne is a very aggressive and physical team," KHS coach Russ Thull said about the victory, which gives the Lady Indians a 2-1 record in East Central play and a 4-2 mark overall. "Winning on the road is never easy, but I felt like even though it was an 11-point win, we controlled the second half...Biggest key offensively was that we attacked the rim a lot, especially in the second half."

Kewaskum got to the free throw line 30 times while limiting the Wolves to 16. "We shot them well, connecting on 23 of 30. Max (Paulowske), 11 of 12, and Madi (Dogs), 9 of 11, set the tone with their aggressiveness offensively. Both players played extremely well on both ends!" Thull said.

Paulowske scored an even 20 points, bringing her career total to 911, 89 from the coveted

1,000-mark. The freshman Dogs was also in double figures, hitting a personal-high 15. When asked if he expected the 5-11 freshman to become a double-figure scorer this soon, Thull said, "To be honest, yes I expected Madi to have an impact. She doesn't play like a freshman. She understands her strengths and she plays to them. She is such a hard worker and I believe that she will only get better."

Thull continued, "It was really a team win despite the scoring differential with Max and Madi scoring 35 of the 49."

While offense is important, Thull has the Indians concentrating on defensive pressure this year, and they came through in this game. "Biggest key defensively was our team defense. Our press absolutely has something to do with the poor shooting percentage from Winneconne. We were able to keep the pressure on throughout the game, and we really saw the effects of our depth take a toll on them," he said.

"I thought that Annie (Christenson) had a big impact on the game on the defensive end. She

had a lot of deflections and was very disruptive. Grace (Leitheiser) played some solid minutes when Kennedy (Adams) got into foul trouble and also injured her right thumb. Kennedy battled through the injury...such a tough kid, but it definitely bothered her," the coach said.

Another key was playing team basketball. "No player attempted more than eight shots against Winneconne. Our girls share the ball, and we really are letting the game come to us...We are moving the ball and letting the game dictate who shoots," Thull said.


