

Being Dealt A Tough Hand

– Senior Citizens Group Looking For New Meeting Place

After playing Sheepshead in the Kewaskum Annex municipal building every Wednesday morning for the past 20 years, the XYZ Card Club is looking for a new place to play cards.

The senior citizens' group does not want to move. But last month the Kewaskum Village Board approved a new policy which will require the club to pay \$80 a week to rent the building each time it meets, beginning in March.

"There is no way we can afford that," said Reiny Follmann, the group's treasurer.

"We are on a fixed income," XYZ member Joe Dehler said.

The XYZ Club currently has about 40 members, with about 32 attending each week. The majority of the members are in their 80s, although there are at least a dozen who are

in their 90s. A couple of the youngest members are in their 60s.

Not all of the players attend each week, but when they do, they bring 50 cents, which goes toward that week's pot.

Dues for the club are \$3 a year. That money goes toward three potluck dinners, plus one catered dinner in October for the group's anniversary month.

"And then any member who passes away or who has an immediate family member who passes away, we usually give them a \$10 memorial. Other than that, it is whenever we have to re-supply paper plates or napkins," Follmann explained.

The group also has historically donated money each year to the village for the use of its facilities. About 20 years ago, the group started donating \$100 each year.

Humane Society To Be Renovated

Demolition is set to begin this month at the Washington County Humane Society (WCHS) where much of the existing facility will be razed to make way for a larger, modern, animal-centric building. The 34,435 square-foot space, designed by The Kubala Washatko Architects of Cedarburg, has been

purposefully designed to create a more comfortable, stress-free environment for animals during their stay.

"Our animals in this new shelter will have a safer environment. It'll be less stress for them. And we'll be able to provide more enrichment activities which is critical for their health and well

being," said WCHS Executive Director Marnie Brown. "Cats, especially, have a hard time adjusting when they come into a shelter. But we know that in the right environment, animals will get sick less often and get well faster so they can be made available for adoption sooner. We've already completed

Phase One of the renovation, the intake ward, where the average length of stay for cats has decreased by 50 percent and the average stay for dogs has decreased to a week."

Choral Director Resigns

Andrew Dahlberg will no longer be a choral teacher and drama club advisor for the Kewaskum School District, effective March 9.

Dahlberg, who has been teaching at Kewaskum High School and Kewaskum Middle School since 2011, has accepted a position as a choral teacher at St. Mary's Catholic Schools in Neenah.

"After a period of consideration, I have de-

ecided that a change is needed for the benefit and health of my family and my teaching career. As I consider my growth as a teacher and where I believe I can continue to grow, being involved in a Christ-centered educational system, while it has its financial drawbacks, is where I feel most comfortable and what I feel is necessary to take the next step," Dahlberg wrote in his letter of resignation.

Grain Dryer Fire

On Tuesday, Feb. 4, at 4:05 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a grain dryer silo fire, at Farmers Grain and Feed at 6865 Spruce Court in the Town of Addison.

Washington County Sheriff's deputies responded to a report of a silo fire. Personnel from the following fire departments responded: Allenton, St. Lawrence, Hartford, Slinger, Iron Ridge, Kohlsville, West Bend, Jackson, Theresa and Mayville, as well as

Lifestar Ambulance. Firefighters extinguished the fire, which was contained to the grain dryer silo bin. The grain bin was emptied during fire suppression efforts, which lasted approximately two hours. The cause of the fire is unknown and remains under investigation by the Allenton Fire Department.

No one was injured. Approximately \$90,000 worth of soybeans were lost. Approximate value for a replacement grain dryer is \$100,000.



Choral Director Resigns

Dahlberg broke the news to his show choir students on Monday, Feb. 3, and the Kewaskum School Board accepted the resignation as part of the regular board meeting on Monday, Feb. 10.

Kenny Ellis, a recent graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a former student of Dahlberg at Kewaskum High School, will be the long-term substitute for the choral director position. Ellis has been working as the substitute choral teacher while Dahlberg has been on family leave after the birth of his third child.

During his time working for the Kewaskum School District, Dahlberg has built a show choir program that he said "is gaining respect in and out of the community." In addition to choral activities, he has worked as a football and a tennis coach for

the district. He has directed nine high school musicals, three middle school musicals, two plays and one cabaret.

"These experiences have shaped me into the teacher I am today, and those memories and friendships will not soon be forgotten," Dahlberg wrote.

Dahlberg said that he appreciates all the support he has received from the Kewaskum community over the years.

"The way this community welcomed me was truly amazing. It made me want to throw myself into everything it had to offer and to continuously give the students more. This desire, however, has also caused me to be overstretched and unable to give my family the time it needs. As my family continues to grow, my time becomes more valuable at home, and I am less available for extra rehearsals at

school. Knowing that the students of Kewaskum deserve the very best from their choral director and I no longer feel capable of giving them that, continuing at Kewaskum is no longer an option. I wish nothing but positivity for the choral program at Kewaskum, and I know that with the students coming up, and the right person at the helm, great things will be happening for years to come," Dahlberg wrote.

At Monday's School Board meeting, board members expressed their appreciation for the contributions Dahlberg has made to the school district over the years.

"I was really disappointed and saddened by the resignation of Andrew Dahlberg," Board Member Timothy Ramthun said. "He made a significant difference in our arts program. He will definitely be missed."

"I think we all feel that

way," Superintendent James Smasal said.


Dahlberg had not anticipated leaving the district midyear.

"The perfect opportunity has presented itself sooner than expected, and I unfortunately cannot pass it up in hopes that something similar will be available at the end of the school year. While I know that the timing is not ideal, it is a decision that I have not made lightly," Dahlberg wrote in his resignation letter.

"I am so thankful for my time in the Kewaskum School District. I have been able to oversee a program that has had amazing growth in state solo and ensemble awards and All-State Choir participants, all while teaching in what I think is the most beautiful choir room in the state," Dahlberg wrote.

Altius Building Company completed Phase One and has been contracted to execute the remaining three phases.

The next phases of the renovation will get underway this year, as WCHS celebrates its 60th anniversary. It was 1960 when an all-volunteer group of concerned residents formed what would eventually become The Washington County Humane Society. Over the decades that followed, WCHS became a thriving community resource that today cares for more than 2,500 animals each year, placing 100 percent of adoptable animals in "forever" homes.

"When completed, the renovated spaces will allow us to build on our success," added Brown. "In the new facility, we'll be able to provide an even greater level of care for the animals,

create a more efficient workflow for employees and expand our relationship with the community by providing educational programming and other services in a safe, posi-

tive, energy-efficient environment. This has been a long-time dream, and I think our animals deserve it. Our community deserves it."

Encouraged by community input from recent surveys the Kewaskum School Board unanimously adopted Feb. 7 a resolution, which puts a referendum on the April 2005 ballot, that requests authorization from electors to exceed budget revenue limits by \$2.15 million over a five-year period. If approved by the electorate, the additional funds will pay for "textbooks, technology, and supplemental materials." Over the five-year period, the referendum will provide the school district with \$430,000 annually to update its academic curriculum. The referendum proposes spending \$168,000 per year on textbooks and \$262,000 per year on technology.

FSA Encourages Producers To Enroll Soon In Agriculture Risk Loss And Price Loss Coverage Programs

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) encourages agricultural producers to enroll now in the Agriculture Risk Loss (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs. March 16, 2020 is the enrollment deadline for the 2019 crop year.

Although more than 200,000 producers have enrolled to date, FSA anticipates 1.5 million producers will enroll for ARC and PLC. By enrolling soon, producers can beat the rush as the deadline nears.

"FSA offices have multiple programs compet-

ing for the time and attention of our staff. Because of the importance and complexities of the ARC and PLC programs; and to ensure we meet your program delivery expectations, please do not wait to start the enrollment process," said FSA administrator Richard Fordyce. "I cannot emphasize enough the need to begin the program election and enrollment process now. Please call your FSA county office and make an appointment soon to ensure your elections are made and contracts

signed well ahead of the deadlines."

ARC and PLC provide financial protections to farmers from substantial drops in crop prices or revenues and are vital economic safety nets for most American farms.

The programs cover the following commodities: barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sun-

flower seed and wheat.

Until March 16, producers who have not yet enrolled in ARC or PLC for 2019 can enroll for both 2019 and 2020 during the same visit to an FSA county office. Additionally, farm owners have a one-time opportunity to update PLC payment yields that take effect beginning with crop year 2020. If the owner accompanies the producer to the office, the yield update and enrollments may be completed during the same office visit.

Being Dealt A Tough Hand

Over the years, that amount increased to \$150 and then to \$200 several years ago.

About half of the members of XYZ live in Kewaskum.

"I have been paying taxes in Kewaskum for 70 years. Doesn't that count?" Eileen Petri asked.

The XYZ members think that part of their taxes should pay to improve their quality of life.

"I would think that the community should support the senior citizens. After all, this is keeping us young and healthy. There are so many people who look forward to it all the time," XYZ member Marian Herziges said.

"It is the highlight of the week," Darleen Rochwite agreed.

In January, the Kewaskum Village Board voted to start charging rental fees to use village facilities. Nonprofit organizations are not charged.

The decision was made because the village is losing money on maintaining its buildings and parks. In 2018, it cost the village \$1,732 to maintain the Annex building. During the first nine months of 2019, it lost \$737, according to Village Administrator Matt Heiser.

Other surrounding municipalities charge groups to use their facilities.

However, some villages, such as Germantown and Jackson, have parks and recreation departments that offer programming for senior citizens either free of charge or at a nominal fee. For example, in Jackson, there is a community center that offers senior meals regularly. There is no charge, but

there is a suggested donation of \$3.60 per meal.

"They play cards afterward. There are a lot of friendly seniors who get together and have a nice time. It's really good for community involvement. I know a lot of seniors who really enjoy it because they don't get out of the house much, and they don't see family a lot, so this allows them to get to see their friends," said Jordan Bellante, building supervisor at the Jackson Community Center. "We welcome them with open arms."

XYZ Club

The XYZ Club started over 52 years ago, in October 1967. The group started meeting in a church basement. Then it moved to the American Legion Hall and then the municipal building before moving to the Annex over 20 years ago, Petri recalled.

"When we started out, they had almost 100 members, but members didn't always come to play. So slowly they died and quit coming," Eileen Petri said.

The group is now looking for a new, more affordable place to play cards. The venue must be handicap accessible, with ADA-compliant restrooms and no stairs. The place must also have sufficient parking.

The group considered using the American Legion building, but members worry that it may not be large enough to hold all the players on the first level.

"The American Legion, has an upstairs and downstairs. Who is going to go down steps?" Follmann asked.

The PNC Bank building has a room in the basement. But there is no elevator there, either.

Some members are checking with the Town of Kewaskum to see if the town hall would be available. Others are checking with churches.

Another option is the Senior Citizen Activities, Inc., which is located in West Bend. The center there offers a place for seniors to participate in numerous activities, including Sheephead.

"Where else are the old people supposed to go?" Mary Ciocarelli asked.

Village Board Looks Ahead To Future Projects

As the Village of Kewaskum celebrates its 125th anniversary this year, the History Center of Washington County will have a special display on Kewaskum, beginning in April. One of the things that will be displayed is a painting of Chief Kewaskum that the village commissioned Dan Meilahn to paint when the village celebrated its 100th anniversary.

"We have been approached by the group working on the 125th. They would like to borrow a painting from our lobby that would go in that display from April 8 to August 8," Village Administrator Matt Heiser told the Kewaskum Village Board on Monday, Feb. 3.

The board agreed to loan the painting to the museum for the special exhibit.

Highway 45 Project

At the Kewaskum Village Board meeting on Monday, Feb. 3, Heiser reported that the Wisconsin Department of

Transportation is on schedule to begin a road project on Highway 45 in 2024. Construction would occur on Highway 45 (Fond du Lac Avenue) between Mohawk Road and State Highway 28 west, near the Froedtert clinic.

The Wisconsin DOT plans to host a public involvement meeting on Wednesday, March 11, at the Annex building, from about 5 to 7 p.m., according to Heiser.

The state DOT has been working with the village to coordinate placement of utilities.

"There is a layer of concrete that's underneath the asphalt on Highway 45 that would make this a more expensive project, so one of the things they are exploring is what it would take to not replace that concrete, and change the standards to just asphalt. It would be cheaper for us. They are also exploring what it would take for them to do a total reconstruct," Heiser said.

"Their original proposal was just to do a mill and overlay, so just

to shave off the first few inches, and then pave over that. But since the village is proposing enough changes under the road, it might meet some thresholds for the DOT to be considered a total reconstruct, which might change the timing of the project by a year," Heiser added.

This would also mean that the state would do more work on the storm sewers, at no extra cost to the village. Currently the DOT is not planning any work on storm sewers; it is just planning to replace bad catch basins, according to Heiser.

Administrative Committee

Beginning this month, the village's administrative committee is working on completing the village's capital improvement plan so that it will know how to budget going forward. Department heads will be asked a series of questions to research and consider so that longterm budgeting plans can be made.



2019 Novel Coronavirus Case Is Confirmed In Wisconsin

—Risk To Wisconsin Public Remains Low

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS), UW Hospital and Clinics, the local health department, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have confirmed the first case of 2019 novel coronavirus in Wisconsin. The case was confirmed at the CDC. The immediate health risk to the general public for contracting this virus is low.

The patient is an adult with a history of travel to Beijing, China, prior to becoming ill and was exposed to known cases while in China. The individual is isolated at home, and is doing well. Out of respect for the privacy of the patient and their household, this is the only information that is available.

While the risk to the general public remains low, DHS, UW Hospital and Clinics, the local health department, and the CDC are working together to prevent disease transmission by evaluating close contacts of the patient and health care personnel who cared for the patient.

“DHS is operating with an abundance of caution and is working very closely with the local health department and UW Hospital and Clinics to ensure that this patient and any close contacts are closely monitored,” said state health officer Jeanne Ayers. “The risk of getting sick from 2019 novel coronavirus in Wisconsin is very low. We are responding aggressively to the situation and monitoring all develop-

ments. We are committed to keeping the public fully informed and will continue to provide updates as this situation unfolds.”

“UW Health has taken precautions, including ongoing staff training and recently expanding our travel history questions,” said UW Health medical director of infection control Dr. Nasia Safdar. “Since initial treatment at University Hospital, the

patient has been self-quarantined at home. We are coordinating with the CDC, DHS, and local health authorities.”

Symptoms of the virus include fever, cough, and difficulty breathing, which may appear anywhere from two to 14 days after someone is exposed to the virus. Symptoms have ranged from a mild illness (like a common cold) to severe pneumonia requiring hospitaliza-

tion. We are encouraging travelers returning from China or contacts of patients with a confirmed case who become ill to let their health care providers know of their possible exposure before arriving at the health care facility.

The steps that all Wisconsin residents can take to help prevent the spread of this virus are the same as those used to protect against colds

and flu: cover your coughs and sneezes, wash hands frequently, and stay home when you're sick. Influenza and other seasonal respiratory viruses are common in Wisconsin at this time of year.

A Column By Kewaskum Librarian Lori Kreis

There was recently a story in the media that stated more people went to libraries last year than to the movies. This data has been shared across many news sources including social media. This was the result of a Gallup Poll taken in the first week of December last year and was a random sample from a little more than one thousand American adults by phone. While I can honestly say I am not surprised with the results, I am pleased that it is being reported so widely. I have seen it many times on social media and was happy that it was recounted in local media.

If you haven't read the article yet, here are some of the results of the survey. On average, people visit a public library 10.5 times a year while they see a movie 5.3 times a year. Women frequent a library over double the amount that men have reported. The youngest group questioned, adults 18 – 29, are the most common visitors to libraries. Predictably, people with lower socio-economic statuses have the highest use of libraries over the other leisurely activities reported. As our services including internet access are free, that result was to be expected. There was no marked difference of library usage between those with children and those without. I found it highly interesting that

geographically, Midwesterners visited libraries more than others in the country.

I have heard statements that libraries are obsolete; that they are no longer relevant. It sure doesn't seem like it from this Gallup Poll. I also recently finished reporting Kewaskum Public Library's annual statistics to the state for 2019. While physical check-outs were down about 6%, there were increases in wireless usage (14%), eBook downloads (20%) and program attendance more than quadrupled from 2018. I keep a folder of facts to back up and disprove the statement that we are irrelevant and now thanks to the recent poll, have more information to add to my growing file of libraries' importance in the world.

With talk of the Kewaskum Public Library's renovation, I hope to see our citizens support any expansion project we undertake. With this important survey showing that people are very much using the libraries, along with my statistics from 2019, the relevance of libraries should not be questioned. They are now and shall remain vital cornerstones of a healthy community.



Study: Local Newspapers Produce More Original Stories Than TV, Radio, Digital Combined

Although local newspapers accounted for about 25% of the local-media outlets sampled, newspapers accounted for nearly 50% of the original news stories, according to the study from the DeWitt Wallace Center for Media & Democracy at Duke University.

by consultants, vendors, clients, or friends.



Fiscal Facts: Wisconsin’s State And Local Taxes Down Again As Share Of Income

For the eighth straight year in 2019, Wisconsinites paid a smaller share of their income in state and local taxes, dropping this measure of tax burden to its lowest in a half century.

The reduction occurred at the same time state and local tax revenues increased by 4.5 percent in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019, the biggest percentage increase since 2011 and

nearly double the rate of increase in 2018.

Yet the tax burden still fell because Wisconsinites’ incomes grew more quickly. Total personal income, which includes wages and salaries, investment income, and government benefits, rose 5.1 percent to nearly \$300 billion in calendar year 2018, the most recent year available. This left residents paying 10.3 percent of income in state and local taxes last year, down from 10.4 percent in 2018.

This share has declined each year since 2011 and has been on a largely downward trajectory since the mid-1990s. It now is at its lowest point in Forum records going back to 1970.

In 1994, Wisconsinites paid 13.2 percent of their income in state and local taxes, meaning that in 2019 they paid about 22 percent less. If state and local taxes in 2019 accounted for the same

share of personal income in Wisconsin as in 1994, those taxes would have been nearly \$8.5 billion higher. However, that hypothetical number assumes that higher taxes and spending would not have affected Wisconsinites’ total income, which is highly unlikely.

In 2019, the growth in state and local taxes was mostly due to an increase in state collections, which rose by six percent overall. Corporate income tax revenues rose by nearly 50 percent, the biggest annual increase in decades, thanks in part to changes in federal tax law. Individual income taxes, the largest state tax, increased by 6.1 percent.

Enjoy And Help Care For State Natural Areas This Winter

Winter is a great time to explore and help care for the State Natural Areas that belong to all Wisconsinites. There are more opportunities to do both in 2020 thanks to expansions of these sites over the past decade and increased staff and volunteer capacity to manage them.

"Now is a great time to get out and enjoy these special places," said Drew Feldkirchner, who leads the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Natural Heritage Conservation Program staff who care for State Natural Areas (SNAs). "Explore on your own on snowshoes or join us for a volunteer workday at a site near you. Come see for yourself why volunteers say the exercise, camaraderie and beautiful views at these workdays are a great way to start the new year."

In the last decade, the number of State Natural Areas grew from 602 to 692 and from 348,000 to 404,000 acres. They constitute about one percent of the 34.7 million acres in Wisconsin. Some natural areas were new designations on existing state properties, while others were

new land acquisitions or donations.

A Decade Of Growth For State Natural Areas

Although the DNR holds more than half of these sites in trust for Wisconsinites, the U.S. Forest Service, The Nature Conservancy, and more than 50 other partners own and manage sites under a system established in 1951 that was spurred by Aldo Leopold and other Wisconsin conservation giants.

State Natural Areas are identified to conserve the best of Wisconsin prairies, forests, wetlands and other habitats that provide support for 90 percent of rare plant species and 75 percent of rare wildlife species. Nearly all properties are open to the public to enjoy while bird watching, hiking, hunting and fishing. However, most SNAs are largely undeveloped and do not have restrooms, trails and other facilities like state parks do.

Beefed Up Work Crews, Volunteer Opportunities Boost Invasive Species Control On Natural Areas

Increased grant funding over the last decade has beefed up property

management crews throughout Wisconsin to help manage State Natural Areas. In turn, crew members have fought invasive species using prescribed fire and other land management activities on a greater number of acres.

Northwestern Wisconsin got its first crew members, strengthening the program's ability to detect and control invasive species before they can take a firm hold of a site, which is critical, Feldkirchner said.

The State Natural Areas volunteer program also has helped increase the number of sites getting needed invasive species control. By 2019, 34 volunteer groups were helping at 45 State Natural Areas, benefiting thousands of acres every year.

Morning workdays, mostly on Saturdays, are scheduled at many sites. Volunteers need no training and are provided equipment on site.

"We have volunteer groups stepping up all over the state to care for Wisconsin's State Natural Areas, and these winter volunteer workdays are a great way to get involved," said Jared Urban, who coordinates the SNA Volunteer Program.

After suffering through a disappointing dual meet season, the Kewaskum High wrestlers put on quite a show in the East Central Conference Tournament held February 8 in Campbellsport.

Behind four first places and one second, the Indians piled up 153.5 points, seven ahead of Waupun and 9.5 in front of Plymouth.

"They ran away with it," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said.

"Overall, I was very impressed that we were able to dig deep to bring our team up to second in the ECC," Rhoads said, noting the week leading up to the tournament was focused on the theme, "earning redemption."

Braeden Scoles and Braden Maertz certainly didn't need any redemption. Everyone in the conference and south-eastern Wisconsin who follows wrestling knows who they are. Scoles breezed through the competition, using a bye, a pin in 1:34 and a 19-3 tech fall over Waupun's Trevor Roecker to win the 145-pound title.

Maertz, who has more than 40 wins this sea-

son, was just as impressive. He won at 145 via a bye, pin in :48 and a 15-4 major decision over Campbellsport's Devyn Urban.

Juniors Nathan Heberer and Kannon Muckerheide also came away with titles. Heberer sailed through the five-man, 132-pound class with a bye and two pins, the first over Campbellsport freshman Sam Koth in :15. In the finals, he pinned Isaac Glewen of Waupun in 5:47.

finals to Plymouth's Andrew Steinhardt. The two split during the regular season, but Pomeroy was able to score just a single point this time around as he lost 7-1. Rhoads still felt he had a good tournament.

KHS also got a third place at 170 from Isaiah George, who has been out since late December after injuring his ribs. After winning his first match by pin, George was going to have to face Berlin's Brady Wagner, the top seed and eventual champ, but he sat out the match, taking a medical forfeit.

Later, George came back to take a bye, then beat Ripon's Brice Perth for third with a pin in 4:38.

Rhoads cited Jordan Mixon and Sam Gauthier, at 220 and 285, for efforts that helped the Indians get bonus points to take second overall. Gauthier, who went 0-6, in the dual meet season, got two big pins while Mixon placed fifth with two pins.

"We are looking forward to the regional at Port Washington (February 15)," Rhoads said. He indicated the competition - there will be six teams there - will be about the same as the conference. "We should have a good group making it through to sectional the following week."

Muckerheide had the task of facing a couple wrestlers he had not seen in the dual meets, according to Rhoads, who said that may have made his run to first place a little more impressive.




"John Mark also did an outstanding job on the boards ... He brought the Windex," Gruber went on about how the 6-4 senior cleaned up the glass with his rebounding.

'Wild Wisconsin' Podcast Back With New Episodes

New year, new podcasts. "Wild Wisconsin - Off the Record" podcast is back with new inside voices on Wisconsin's outdoors. Available now wherever you get your podcasts is the latest episode, "Call It A Comeback: Bald Eagles Soaring in Wisconsin," which explores the miraculous comeback of bald eagles in Wisconsin and across the country.

Bald eagles were once on the verge of extinction. Today, nests for these distinct birds now exist in 71 of Wisconsin's 72 counties, typically near a water body such as the Mississippi River. In the last year alone, the number of bald eagles in the southeastern part of the state

increased by 27 percent.

The DNR's Digital Media Coordinator and host of Wild Wisconsin, Katie Grant, sat down with Rich Staffen, a DNR zoologist and conservation biologist working with our Natural Heritage Inventory, to learn a bit more about these raptors. We also hear from Carly Lapin, a DNR National Heritage Conservation ecologist, to learn how Wisconsinites can help with continued conservation work for eagles.

Additional Conservation Efforts

Another recent episode, "Saving Wisconsin's Special Species," looks at other critical conservation work in the state. The

DNR's conservation biologists, Rori Paloski and Jesse Weininger, hop on the podcast to discuss their efforts to bring back the natural habitat for freshwater mussels and eastern massasauga rat-

tlesnakes.

USDA Reminds Producers Of February 28 Deadline For Conservation Reserve Program General Signup

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reminds agricultural producers interested in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) 2020 general signup to enroll by February 28, 2020. This signup is available to farmers and private landowners who are either enrolling for the first time or re-enrolling for another 10- to 15-year term.

"This is the first opportunity for general sign up since 2016, and we want producers and private landowners to know that we have just one month remaining," FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce said. "It is critical that they make their final determinations and submit offers very soon to take advantage of this popular conservation program."

Farmers and ranchers who enroll in CRP receive yearly rental payments for voluntarily establishing long-term,

resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees (known as "covers"), which can control soil erosion, improve water quality and develop wildlife habitat on marginally productive agricultural lands.

CRP has 22 million acres enrolled, but the 2018 Farm Bill lifted the cap to 27 million acres.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest private-lands conservation programs in the U.S. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. The program has evolved over the years, providing many conservation and economic benefits. Marking its 35th anniversary in 2020, CRP has had many successes, including:

- Preventing more than nine billion tons of

soil from eroding, enough soil to fill 600 million dump trucks;

- Reducing nitrogen and phosphorous runoff relative to annually tilled cropland by 95 and 85 percent respectively;

- Sequestering an annual average of 49 million tons of greenhouse gases, equal to taking nine million cars off the road;

- Creating more than three million acres of restored wetlands while protecting more than 175,000 stream miles with riparian forest and grass buffers, enough to go around the world seven times; and
- Benefiting bees and other pollinators and increased populations of ducks, pheasants, turkey, bobwhite quail, prairie chickens, grasshopper sparrows and many other birds.

The CRP continuous signup is ongoing, which enables producers to enroll for certain prac-

tices. FSA plans to open the Soil Health and Income Protection Program, a CRP pilot program, in early 2020, and the 2020 CRP Grasslands signup runs from March 16, 2020 to May 15, 2020.

February 6, 2020

PEANUT BUTTER BARS

Adapted from www.allrecipes.com
makes 3 dozen

INGREDIENTS

- 1 3/4 cups reduced-fat creamy peanut butter, divided
- 1/3 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cups quick-cooking oats
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

DIRECTIONS

In a large bowl, cream 1 cup peanut butter, butter, brown sugar, and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in the applesauce and vanilla. Combine the flour, oats and baking soda; gradually add to the creamed mixture and mix well (batter will be thick.)

Spread into a 15 x 10 x 1-inch baking pan coated with cooking spray. Bake at 350 for 18 to 22 minutes, or until lightly browned. Cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes; spread with the remaining peanut butter. Cool to room temperature, then refrigerate for 30 minutes.

In a large bowl, beat frosting ingredients until light and fluffy. Spread over the peanut butter layer. Cut into bars.

Frosting

- 4 1/2 cups powdered sugar
- 1/3 cup fat-free milk
- 1/4 cup baking cocoa
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Notice is hereby given of a spring primary election to be held in Washington County on February 18, 2020 at which the officers named below shall be nominated. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device ("ImageCast Evolution-ICE")* to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone in a manner that would reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If the voter spoils an **optical scan ballot**, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Expand Your Edible Garden Indoors

No matter the season, size of your garden or climate, you can inject homegrown flavor into your meals. Just clear a shelf, countertop or windowsill and get busy planting herbs, greens and even tomatoes to enjoy year-round.

For quick results, grow microgreens. These nutrient packed edibles are ready to harvest in as few as 10 days. Plant microgreen seeds in a quality potting or seed starting mix. A recycled fast food container or other shallow pot with drainage holes works well. Plant the

seeds according to label directions, moisten the soil and place in a warm location. Keep the soil moist and move to a sunny window or under artificial lights as soon as sprouts peak through the soil. Then break out the scissors and start harvesting when the second set of leaves appears. Use microgreens on salads, sandwiches, soups or as a snack.
