Voters Go To Polls In Historic Election On April 7

Wisconsin voters went to the polls on Tuesday, April 7, to cast ballots for the Spring Election. Results will not be determined prior to April 13, due to a federal court order.

Just one day before the election, it was not clear whether voters would be able to cast

ballots on April 7. Gov. Tony Evers issued an executive order on Monday afternoon — about 18 hours before polls were set to open — to suspend in-person voting for the April 7 spring election until June 9. Evers cited the need to keep voters safe during the COVID-19 pandemic.

About six hours later,

the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled that the polls would open at 7 a.m. on Tuesday.

Then, about an hour later, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that mailed-in absentee ballots must be postmarked by April 7 and arrive via mail by April 13. That overturned a ruling a federal judge had made on Thursday, April 2, that voters had

an extra week to mail in absentee ballots.

The confusion about whether or not the election was going to occur, compounded with the extra safety precautions that were taken at polling locations, made it a challenging election for area clerks.

Join In The “Wave Parade” On Monday, April 13

– Parade To Bring Joy To Assisted Living Facility Residents Amid COVID-19 Crisis

A “Wave Parade” is being organized so that community members can drive past and wave to Kettle Moraine Gardens residents who are living in isolation through the COVID-19 epidemic.

On Monday, April 13, the community is invited to join in the parade, which will begin at 1:30 p.m. Throughout the parade, social distancing guidelines will be followed, but happiness will be brought to the residents, where no visitors have been allowed over the past month.

Participants are invited to decorate their cars, motorcycles, trucks and tractors for Easter as they ride through the parade. In addition, parade participants are encouraged to make signs to hold up to greet the residents.

No one will be allowed to get out of their vehicles or hand things to residents. The goal is to give the residents a way to safely socialize — something that they have been missing.

Lineup will start coming from the south at the

entrance to the Kettle Moraine Gardens, located at 1038 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum, with the parade heading north.

Cars will be directed to turn right from the south into the parking lot. Parade participants can wave from their cars to residents, who will sit at least six feet from each other outside of the facility.

The parade will loop past the residents of both the assisted living building and the memory care unit and then turn north onto Fond du Lac Avenue.

Please remember all social distancing rules before, during and after the parade. The event is designed to safely socialize under current restrictions and bring smiles to the people of Kewaskum and especially the residents of Kettle Moraine Gardens.

The residents truly miss seeing all of their loving families, friends, and visitors. Although parade participants will not be able to stop and talk with residents, they can at least see one another.

Five COVID-19 Cases Reported In Kewaskum

As of April 7, there were a total of 124 confirmed cases in Washington and Ozaukee counties, according to the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department website. Five of those confirmed cases are in the Kewaskum zip code.

According to the website, there were nine deaths related to COVID-19 in Washington and Ozaukee counties as of April 7. There had been 1,053 people who had tested negative for COVID-19 in Washington and Ozaukee counties as of April 7.

The Washington

Ozaukee Public Health Department began releasing zip codes of positive cases and names of long-term care facilities or organizations with COVID-19 outbreaks on April 2. This information can be found on the Health Department’s online dashboard, at www.washozwi.gov.

After significant deliberation and research, the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department has determined it is in the best interest of the public to make this information available.


Introducing Ourselves

Since Frank's death in 2011, the company he founded has renewed its commitment to newspaper publishing with the purchase of 17 newspapers and over 300 magazines and specialty publications from the former Journal Community Publishing Group and

other local owners. Our mission is simple: To provide local news to the communities we serve, so that people living here have the knowledge they need to make good decisions about their lives.

First Responders Advice To Their Neighbors

As firefighters and emergency medical providers we are all being asked to be safe, healthy and strong during these challenging times that our communities, state and country are experiencing. We are going through a "Safer at Home" time which means limiting travel, limiting interaction with others and much more.

Much of our state is served by volunteer firefighters and emergency medical providers.

These people have full-time jobs to make a living and they have taken the challenge to provide care and assistance to neighbors and strangers 24 hours a day and seven days a week. In recent years our memberships have decreased due to many factors. Those of us that have stayed involved do this because we care!

As first responders we are driven to be the link in someone's life that has just had a life changing incident and we can help them start the healing process. This could be extinguishing a fire, going to a car accident, or going to a home where some-

one has fallen or become sick. There is no other more gratifying avocation or vocation than one that allows us to help others.

This all being said, we would like to help you stay healthy and safe with a few pointers. First, if you are going to wear gloves while running errands, please think about the possibility of cross contamination. If you grab a grocery cart with your gloves, then touch your phone with same gloves, then touch your cell phone, and then touch your face, the gloves were not effective.

When you are wearing gloves to do a task, you must remove them safely before starting another task. The CDC suggest the following to remove gloves:

"Peel the glove away from your body, pulling it inside out. Hold the glove you just removed in your gloved hand. Peel off the second glove by putting your fingers inside the glove at the top of your wrist. Turn the second glove inside out while pulling it away from your body, leaving the first glove inside the second."

Second item we would like to discuss is wearing a surgical mask. When you wear a mask the purpose is to give you protection from inhaling contaminated air. You should be sure that the mask covers your nose and your mouth. Pulling the mask down to breathe easier through your nose negates any safety the mask is designed to do.

To wear a mask correctly, be sure that each elastic loop is secured around each ear. We have found that cloth masks work very well and are able to be cleaned and reused. Some cloth masks come with a pocket which allows the installation of a filter. We advise the general public not purchase N-95 masks as this depletes the supply for our medical personnel.

Other important factors to keeping you safe include cleaning your hands when you finish a project or task before you start a new task. Increase ventilation in the building you are occupying by opening windows. If you must have a meeting, be sure it is in a large room and sufficient ventilation to have fresh air movement. If you have been out of the house, be sure to clean your hands as soon as possible. Clean door knobs, handles, cooking preparation surfaces often during the day.

One other concern is this, if you wear gloves and possibly a mask, do not throw them into the shopping cart. Put them in a waste disposal bin or put in a shopping bag to take home and dispose there.

If you need emergency assistance at your home or work place, be sure you advise a dispatcher of the type of medical emergency and if there are any symptoms of any sort of virus present. The more information you can share the better prepared our first responders will be.

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Wisconsin's Tornado And Severe Weather Awareness Week Is April 13-17

Gov. Tony Evers has declared April 13-17 Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week in Wisconsin, and ReadyWisconsin is encouraging everyone to take time this spring to talk about weather safety with their families. ReadyWisconsin, the National Weather Service and Wisconsin Broadcasters Association also encourage everyone in the state to participate in a Virtual

Tornado Drill at 1:45 p.m. on April 16.

"It is essential that people take the time during this important week to ensure everyone living in their home knows what to do when a tornado warning or severe storm is in their area," said Dr. Darrell L. Williams, Wisconsin Emergency Management administrator.

Wisconsin averages 23 tornadoes annually. During the 2019 season, the NWS confirmed 28

tornadoes touched down in the state of Wisconsin. Of those, 18 occurred during a three-day period in late July, downing countless trees and damaging homes and other buildings across the central portion of the state.

The state has already experienced its first tornado this year, when a storm in late March produced an EF-1 tornado that touched down in Grant County. The tor-

nado did not cause any injuries, but it did damage a home and barn. It's a reminder that, while spring and summer are the most active times for tornadoes in Wisconsin, they can happen at any time of year.

While most of Wisconsin has become familiar with the annual statewide tornado drill, the ongoing response to COVID-19 in the state means a break from tradition this year. Due to technical limita-

tions, there will be no live test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) that triggers NOAA weather radios and messages on broadcast stations. Communities should rest assured that these systems are still regularly tested. This departure simply means there will be no coordinated statewide test this year.

"I urge everyone to practice their in-home safety plan during the virtual tornado drill," Ke-

waskum Police Chief Tom Bishop said.

In the Village of Kewaskum, sirens are tested regularly to ensure they are in working order and to promptly address any issues that may arise. A short growl test is done in the village at noon on Mondays through Fridays, and sirens are sounded with a short test at noon every Saturday.

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
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Local Student Wins New Fane Kettle Riders Main Prize


There were 24 additional winners drawn. The New Fane Kettle Riders snowmobile club appreciates the support from all who purchased tickets.

Moraine Park Commencement Rescheduled To June 27

—Venue Moved To Beaver Dam High School Field House

Due to the still-evolving COVID-19 pandemic, Moraine Park Technical College has decided to postpone its 2020 commencement ceremony, originally scheduled for Saturday, May 16.

While the situation is still fluid, the College is moving forward with a new commencement date of Saturday, June 27, at 10 a.m. The ceremony will also be held at a new location, the Beaver Dam High School Field House, 500 Gould St., Beaver Dam.

Regalia (caps, gowns and tassels) will be available for purchase through the College bookstore online. More information, including purchase dates, will be available on the

student portal in the coming weeks.

The college has invited Beaver Dam Mayor Becky Glewen, Moraine Park graduate Barbara Turner, and Moraine Park alumni Steve Peterson, to participate as speakers at the ceremony. Commencement is expected to last approximately one-and-a-half hours.

College officials continue to monitor state and national regulations related to the COVID-19 pandemic. If social distancing guidelines are still in place, further extended or enhanced, the commencement ceremony would then be canceled. If cancellation occurs, graduating students will be offered the opportunity to

participate in the 2021 commencement ceremony and celebrations.

"We recognize how significant the commencement ceremony is to our graduates," Bonnie Baerwald, president at Moraine Park Technical College, said. "Commencement is also an opportunity for families, friends, and Moraine Park employees to surround our graduates with support and offer congratulations for this momentous achievement. For these reasons, we are hopeful that by postponing the date, it will allow all of us to celebrate together."

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Local Government Meetings Held Virtually Due To COVID-19

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Kewaskum Village Board met through a video conference on Monday, April 6, rather than in person.

It was the first time the village had ever held a virtual board meeting. To attend, members of the village board and the public attended the meeting by logging into a website or by calling a toll free phone number.

Many of the topics that the board discussed had to do with the COVID-19 crisis.

To keep employees safe, board members agreed that residents should be encouraged to pay by check or credit card rather than cash so that employees would not be exposed to as many germs. Although cash is still accepted, any overpayment may be applied to the resident's account. That money would be go toward a future bill, and employees would not need to handle as much cash.

The board voted to issue full refunds for facility rentals canceled due to COVID-19. The board also voted to pay village staff for normal working hours during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Village Board also approved changes

to several ordinances. A public health nuisance in the village now includes violation of a public health order, including any act, activity or use that violates a public health order. Also, the chief of police and village police officers are now authorized to enforce public health nuisances.

Kewaskum Board Of Education

The Kewaskum School District will hold its next School Board meeting on Monday, April 13 through a video conference.

According to the Kewaskum School District's public notice, the district will be taking precautionary measures consistent with CDC recommendations and the governor's orders. School board members and administration may participate in a remote video conference. The public is encouraged to listen to the meeting remotely through the audio conference.

Farmington Historical Society Brings History To Life

Edith Wilson, who was the First Lady of the United States from 1915 to 1921, made an appearance in the parish center of St. Michael's Catholic Church on Saturday, March 14.

Portrayed by Jessica Michna, Edith Wilson told the story of her life to a group of about 20 people. The program was sponsored by the Farmington Historical Society.

The soliloquy took place in 1925, when prohibition was the law of the land. The decade would later be known as the "Roaring Twenties". The stock market was booming, Hollywood was cranking out silent films; there was bathtub gin and "Flaming Youth". Mrs. Wilson had greeted another New Year qui-

etly after the death of the President in February 1924.

The "war to end all wars" was now a memory. Mrs. Wilson had stood by the President stoically as she saw his strength sapped from the stress of the war and his dream of a League of Nations fade. Edith Galt Wilson sat alone, answering the hundreds of letters of condolence.

In a presentation filled with bouts of humor, the audience learned about Edith Wilson's personality and her life. She told the group about how she met Woodrow Wilson, who was a widower, and then married him in December 1915, during his first term as president. His second term ended in 1921 and he passed away in 1924.

Actress Jessica Michna captured the audience's attention throughout the program. Michna founded "First Impressions" as a result of her love of theater and history. Since founding the organization in the year 2000, Michna has expanded her reper-

toire to include 17 historic figures. She is widely known for her riveting portrayals of First Ladies, notable women of history and fictitious characters.

Kewaskum firemen were kept on the run during the past week, answering five grass fire calls in five days, two on Saturday, one on Sunday, and two on Wednesday. The grass is unusually dry for this time of year and Sunday night's rainfall apparently did not alleviate the situation to any extent.

"Expansion" was the key word in the business transacted by the village board at its regular meeting Monday night. It gave its approval to the final plat of a new subdivi-

vision and granted a building permit to Regal Ware, Inc., to construct a four-story building at its Tower St. location. Already state-approved, the building is the second in a three-phase office complex. The first was built several years ago. The subdivision is known as Bel-Ric Acres and it is located south of County Trunk H and west of Highway 45 on the southwest boundary of Kewaskum.

A teacher salary schedule that reflects an increase of between seven and eight per cent over current salaries was ratified by the Board of Education Monday night after having reached an agreement with the welfare committee of the Kewaskum Education Association. The salary increases will cost the district from \$60,000 to \$65,000 over current figures. The schedule is based on a 191-day school year, two fewer than the 1969-70 school year. One teaching day and one in-service day were cut. The 1970-71 calendar calls for 180 teaching days, eight in-service days and three holidays.

Five COVID-19 Cases Reported In Kewaskum

The department's goals are to protect the health of our residents by sharing the most accurate information, slow the spread of COVID-19 and promote a culture of transparency and honesty.

"The intention of our orders and the release of this information is to help us return to normal life as quickly as possible," said Health Officer Kirsten Johnson.

An outbreak in a long-term care facility is defined as one resident with a laboratory confirmed test or two employees with laboratory confirmed tests.

For all other organizations, an outbreak is defined as any two people with laboratory confirmed positive tests who are affiliated with the organization and were exposed at the same time.

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department believes people have a right to know where outbreaks are concentrated in order to protect themselves and their loved ones from exposure to the virus. Additionally, a long-term care facility should be aware of outbreak locations to make appropriate

staffing decisions, especially if staff work at more than one facility. Individuals who may attend religious services as a guest or non-member, where they otherwise may not be informed through communication to regular members, should be made aware of possible exposure as well. Finally, the health department asks organizations and businesses to be forthcoming with their employees and clients when there is a positive case among them to help slow the spread of COVID-19.

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health

Department is sharing this information to protect the health of our communities. As the number of cases increases it becomes more difficult to conduct contact investigations quickly. Sharing information publically will become more crucial as time goes on. There is evidence of community spread in both Washington and Ozaukee Counties and the health department wants residents to continue to be diligent with handwashing, social distancing and staying at home.



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
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
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Village Alters Services During COVID-19 Crisis

Bulk Pickup Postponed

Advanced Disposal has postponed this spring's bulk pickup day. Date is to be determined.

Brush Chipping On Hold

In an effort to keep vil-

lage workers safe, the village will not pick up brush until after the Safer At Home order is complete.

The village's Public Works Yard is open for residents to bring in brush themselves. The yard, which is located at 1002 Fond du Lac Ave., is open Mondays through Fridays, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. and on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to noon.

Local Governments Receive More Than \$99 Million In Transportation Aid

This week local governments will receive quarterly payments totaling \$99,147,647 for General Transportation Aids (GTA), Connecting Highway Aids and Expressway Policing Aids from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT).

For calendar year 2020, local governments will receive an estimated \$521 million in financial assistance to support transportation related projects. This is a ten percent increase over the previous biennial budget.

"The importance of a sound transportation system is especially evident as we face the challenge of the COVID-19 public emergency," secretary-designee Craig Thompson said. "The local system is the essential first and last miles, making sure that vital goods like food and medical supplies are getting to where they're needed."

Payments to Wisconsin's 1,850 villages, towns and cities include:

- \$95,875,797 in General Transportation Aids;
- \$3,015,875 to municipalities eligible to re-

ceive Connecting Highway Aids; and

•\$255,975 to Milwaukee County for Expressway Policing Aids.

General Transportation Aids help cover the costs of constructing, maintaining, and operating roads and streets under local jurisdiction. Connecting Highway Aids reimburse municipalities for maintenance and traffic control of certain state highways within municipalities.

Quarterly payments for cities, towns and villages are sent the first Monday in January, April, July and October. County payments are made in three installments, with 25 percent of the total annual payment on the first Monday in January; 50 percent on the first Monday in July; and 25 percent on the first Monday in October.

Area municipalities will be receiving general transportation aids of Town of Barton, \$30,399.39; Town of Farmington, \$42,783.84; Town of Kewaskum, \$24,998.85; Town of Wayne, \$35,652.68; and Village of Kewaskum, \$51,197.06.

Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s.73.03 (2a), Wis. Stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Kewaskum has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or by order of the court. *The information

that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35(1), Wis. Stats.

7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.

8. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under s.70.47 (3) (a), Wis. Stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.

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Extend Your Garden Season

No matter where you garden there never seems to be enough time to grow all the fresh vegetables desired. Planting earlier or just providing plants with some added warmth on chilly days and nights can reduce the time from planting to harvest. Southern gardeners will enjoy the additional time for harvesting heat-sensitive plants before the stifling heat moves in and plants begin to decline.

Prepare the soil as soon as it can be worked. Cover the prepared soil with clear plastic, row covers or high tunnels for several weeks when planting earlier than normal. This warms the soil for planting and helps germinate many of the weed seeds. Lightly cultivate to remove the young weed seedlings without bringing more weed seeds to the surface. You'll be pulling fewer weeds throughout the growing season.

Once the garden is planted, enlist some of these season-extending helpers (gardeners.com). Homemade and commercial cloches, cold frames and row covers can help you plant earlier and harvest later in the season.

Row covers made of spun fabrics let air, light, and water through while keeping the plants warm. Anchor the fabric with landscape pins, stones, boards, or other heavy items. Leave enough slack in the fabrics for the plants to grow. Lighter weight garden fabrics also protect plants from insect pests like cabbage worms and bean beetles.

Garden covers take this method one step further. These structures fit over plantings in the garden, raised beds or elevated planters. Look for those with durable greenhouse fabric covers that let water in and keep excess heat out.

These types of structures protect plants from cold and wind, speeding up your harvest by as much as 25%.

Raise the roof on these structures with high tunnels and plant protection tents. These are perfect for growing tall plants like tomatoes. As temperatures rise, the tops can be ventilated or in some cases replaced with a mesh that keeps out insects and critters, while providing plants enough room to reach full size.


Or maybe you just can't wait for that first red ripe tomato and only want to jump start a row of greens. Garden cloches have long been used for this purpose. They capture the sun's warmth to protect plants from frosty weather. Gardener's Supply Company's Early Season Row Cloche Set allows you to expand your protection to the desired size. These clear PVC plant protectors have water wells to capture rainwater and gently disperse it to the plants below and vents for managing the temperature.

Further boost your tomato harvest with red plastic mulch, red tomato teepees and tomato boosters. University researchers found using red plastic mulch increased the individual fruit size and weight and overall tomato harvest by as much as 20 percent. They found the red plastic mulch reflected certain growth-enhancing wavelengths of light back onto the plants.

With a bit of extra effort and investment you'll be harvesting fresh vegetables long before your friends and neighbors. Then be sure to keep these season-extending devices handy to use again in fall. Protecting plants from those first few fall frosts can keep you eating garden-fresh tomatoes, peppers and greens well into winter.

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
