The Village Board voted 4-3 on Monday, June 1, to cancel this year's Independence Day fireworks display because of health concerns surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic. Kevin Scheunemann, Sarah Severance and Richard Knoebel voted to have fireworks this year.

However, the following day, on Tuesday, June 2,

We have seen all kinds of garbage that should not be disposed of if we want to curb the coronavirus. Dear Editor,

It is no secret that our world has changed drastically over the past few months. Comfort and routine have been replaced by increasing stress and uncertainty.

This is especially true for youth in our community. Being a teenager in today's world is stressful and challenging. According to the 2018 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), over two-thirds of Washington County youth reported having at least one day in the previous month in which they experienced poor mental health.

These challenges have undoubtedly been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. This information is concerning because stress and poor mental health have been shown to be risk factors for tobacco use among youth.

Cigarette use has been consistently declining among youth in Washington County and across the state of Wisconsin; however, other forms of tobacco use, like e-cigarettes, are taking its place. According to the 2018 YRBS, 27 percent of Washington County youth reported using e-cigarettes in the past 30 days, and that percentage is likely even higher today.

Especially alarming during this time are the links that have been made between the health effects of COVID-19 on the lungs and the increased risk of COVID-19 for those who smoke or vape. New research from the University of California-San Francisco published on May 12, 2020 found that COVID-19 patients with a current or past history of smoking were more

likely to experience more severe symptoms than non-smokers. We also know that users of e-cigarettes and other tobacco products have compromised immune systems, placing them at greater risk for contracting infections and viruses like COVID-19.

With retailers beginning to open up again, working to keep tobacco out of the hands of youth is more important than ever, and preventing youth tobacco use starts with making sure kids don't have access to tobacco products in the first place. This is where WI Wins comes in. WI Wins helps stores to avoid tobacco sales through compliance checks and free training for retailers and their employees.

We know that the WI Wins program is working. In 2002, 34 percent of Wisconsin retailers sold tobacco products to minors. Today that number is in the single digits.

Retailers and their employees face new challenges when verifying the age of customers. They can help to prevent the spread of COVID-19 by asking customers to show them their ID through a glass or plastic partition, or by placing the ID on the counter face up. They can also allow customers to self-scan their ID by placing the barcode reader on the customer side of the counter. Customers wearing masks are similar to customers with beards — retailers can confirm their identity using other physical information including height, weight, eye color, and hair color.

SHEBOYGAN COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Injury Vehicle Crash, Town of Mosel

On Sunday, May 31, at approximately 5:48 p.m., the Sheboygan County Emergency Communications Center received several 911 calls in reference to a single vehicle rollover injury crash located on Interstate Highway 43, approximately two miles North of State Highway 42. A northbound vehicle had crossed the median, rolled over and came to a rest on its roof in the southbound lane of traffic.

The 25-year-old female driver of this vehicle and a child passenger were transported by helicopter ambulances from the scene to Froedtert and Children's hospitals with injuries sustained in the crash.

The driver from this crash was identified as Sabrina Walker from Sheboygan. The child was her approximately one-month-old infant daughter. Walker was cited for Operating While Intoxicated causing injury with passen-

ger less than 16 years of age, as well as other traffic offenses.

The following public safety agencies assisted with this incident: Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, Kohler Police Department, Howards Grove Fire Department, Haven Jaws for Life, Town of Sheboygan Fire Department, Sheboygan County Highway Department and Orange Cross Ambulance, with ThedaStar and Eagle III helicopter ambulances.

Peaceful Protest Held In Kewaskum

On Sunday, May 31, as protests and riots were held across the country in response to the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, a peaceful protest was held in the Village of Kewaskum.

About 30 people gathered at the Coffee Corner Bistro on the corner of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue and walked to Dairy Queen on Fond du Lac Avenue. The held up signs that said things like "Justice For George," "Unite Against Racism" and

"Black Lives Matter."

To help prevent the spread of COVID-19, the protesters wore masks and maintained about six feet between one another.

Anastasia Gerhartz, a 22-year-old Kewaskum High School graduate, organized the protest through Facebook.

"I wanted to do something because I think that racism is still a big ongoing problem, and wherever we are, we should stand up and say that this is not OK with me," Gerhartz said. "With everything that is going on in the media, I have been seeing protests going on in big cities, and I wanted to do something also where I live."

Gerhartz did not want the protest to involve any violence.

"I made sure to let people know it was only going to be a peaceful protest," she said. "I encouraged everyone to wear a mask because the pandemic is still going on, and we wanted to keep everyone safe."

The protesters did not

chant anything while in Kewaskum; they just held up their signs.

"We had a lot of people honking at us, which was really encouraging," Gerhartz said.

The goal was to send a peaceful message.


"I just wanted to have a peaceful protest here. I didn't want to bring any violence to the area; I just wanted people to be aware of how we feel. We know that racism is still real and prevalent," Gerhartz said.

She hopes that the Sunday morning protest made a difference.

"If we just have one person think differently, then it was worth it," she said. "If that makes a little bit of a change in their household, I think that can be a chain reaction. If we keep gathering more people who have the same views on this, maybe people will listen to us more."

Gerhartz has not had any personal experiences with racism.

"I am not feeling the oppression firsthand, so I just wanted to make a statement and maybe just have people think a

little bit," she said. "I do have a lot of friends that are black and a sister who is black. I want to stand up for them, even if racism isn't necessarily hitting them today because I know somewhere along the line, I know it will, which is really sad."

People of all ages joined in the cause on Sunday.

"I was very happy with that turnout. It was nice to have support from all generations," Gerhartz said.

This was the first time Gerhartz was involved in a protest.

"I really just felt like I needed to do something," she said. "It is important to stand up for the voices that are being unheard."

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Update On Child Enticement Incident

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is announcing a breaking development in the child enticement incident that was reported to have occurred in the Village of Richfield near Whispering Ridge Drive and Scenic Drive on May 8. It was originally reported that a juvenile female was approached by a man who attempted to abduct her and then fled the area in a brown van.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office has been actively investigating this incident over the past several weeks. Over the course of the investigation, several inconsistencies in the juvenile's story were identified by the Sheriff's Office. Washington County Sheriff's investigators confronted the juvenile with these inconsistencies on May 27 at the Sheriff's Office. The juvenile admitted that at no time did a man approach her and attempt to abduct her. She reported that a male subject was walking down the road in her direction from a distance and that she believes she heard him say "come here." She said that she became fearful and ran from the area. She admitted to fabricating the story to authorities.

There is no credible threat in this case. The Washington County Sheriff's Office is no

longer looking for anyone or any vehicle in relation to this report. The Sheriff's Office takes all reports seriously and dedicates all necessary resources to the pursuit of justice. The office received an almost overwhelming response from the community in this case and all leads were looked into. The office is appreciative of the community response to this incident and is saddened by the fear, anger and uncertainty that this report caused within the community. If any good can come of it, it allowed many families to have important discussions with their children about real dangers that are out there and will hopefully initiate conversations about the importance of truthfulness.

It is a crime to file a false police report in the State of Wisconsin. However, in this case no criminal action will be taken based on the juvenile's age and lack of prior contact with law enforcement.

From The Office Of The Sheriff:

On June 1, I authorized a request from the Milwaukee Police Department to send a portion of our Sheriff's SWAT team and our armored rescue vehicle to the City of Milwaukee. The request is to assist with the civil unrest while safeguarding constitutional guarantees of citizens. It is not a request

that I take lightly.

The catalyst for this particular request affects all of us. The entire sheriff's office staff has been encouraged to watch the video(s) of the Minneapolis Police interaction with George Floyd. It is incredibly hard to watch. It is also equally important for those of us in law enforcement to watch. As human beings we all stand united in condemning that atrocity. I still sit in disbelief at how that can happen in modern police work with multiple officers on scene. If only one of those officers would have stood back and tapped the officer on the shoulder and said, "Hey, ease up. We got this." This lack of fortitude certainly justifies righteous anger, but certainly not the burning and tearing down of communities across this great country. Your sheriff's office will fully support any citizen's 1st amendment right regarding peaceable assembly to have their voice heard. Peaceable assembly.

Law enforcement has worked incredibly hard to build community trust and it is completely disheartening how this incident, which is not representative of professional policing, can compromise the work of so many good law enforcement officers who are dedicated to their respective communities and the citizens they serve.

You will rarely ever hear me quote former President Obama, but his recent words are powerful and telling. This is not a partisan issue, and I simply can't express one aspect of this better than he did. He recently publicly stated, "It will fall mainly on the officials of Minnesota to ensure that the circumstances surrounding George Floyd's death are investigated thoroughly and that justice is ultimately done. But it falls on all of us, regardless of our race or station - including the majority of men and women in law enforcement who take pride in

doing their tough job the right way, every day - to work together to create a "new normal" in which the legacy of bigotry and unequal treatment no longer infects our institutions or our hearts."

That is one layer of this complex problem, but there is more. Another layer is allowing poor policing practices within communities, and not properly identifying officers that have no right to wear the badge. In Washington County, that responsibility falls on me and every other police chief. I am proud of all our Washington County law enforcement agencies that put our community first and treat

people with dignity and respect. This is earned mutual respect.

We are extremely fortunate in Washington County to be afforded the level of community support we have for every law enforcement agency. I can assure you it is not taken for granted. One of the organizational goals is to identify issues before it ever has a chance to become a problem. My commitment to Washington County is that if your sheriff's office ever has a problem, we will own it - and correct it. That is what trust is built upon.



Village Fireworks Canceled? Maybe

However, the village staff has recommended to the Village Board that a large gathering should not be held at the park this year because of COVID-19.

There were 14 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the Kewaskum zip code reported on the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department's website as of 2 p.m. on Tuesday, June 2.

The board discussed different options for the fireworks. Last month, the board considered moving the fireworks to July 4 or Labor Day, or canceling the fireworks altogether.

The board also discussed launching the fireworks from Reigle Family Park instead of River Hill Park. That has been the recommendation of the village staff because it would be easier to close off access to Reigle Family Park so that social distancing could be maintained and a large crowd could not gather.

"I support business as usual despite the health advisory," said Scheunemann, who is the board president. "If people come and expect social distancing, then I think their expectations are wildly out of line. If they don't like that there is no social distancing in

the park, then they shouldn't come."

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop said that Holy Trinity Catholic Church will be holding outdoor Mass, so it will not let cars park in the church's grass lot.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said that the crew that lights the fireworks is dead set against lighting fireworks on July 4. They would prefer that the fireworks be held on July 3.

Groeschel said that if the board was not concerned about social distancing, it is easier for the fire department to launch from River Hill Park because it is closer to the fire department.

"The only concern that I have is that we are going to be a magnet for all the other communities since no one else is having fireworks," Wright said.

The board discussed how the public would be dispersed on streets and sidewalks if all the parks are closed and it could be difficult to control traffic.

"Closing River Hill Park means that the fire department won't be able to sell burgers and fries, and Kiwanis won't be able to raise their ice cream stand money that they usually do each year. So there are consequences to civic

groups for closing the park," Scheunemann said.

"It is going to be difficult to control the River Hill Park because there are so many access points to River Hill Park," Bishop said.

If a large group of people gather at River Hill Park, it could be difficult to keep them out, according to Bishop.

"If people don't want to go, they should just stay home. If they want to come, then they can come," Knoebel said. "Everybody needs some kind of a diversion besides just listening to the news and everything else.... We need to get back a little to normal."

Knoebel said he thought the only park that should be closed off is where the fireworks are launched.

Bishop said it would be difficult to plan for the traffic.

The board first voted to launch fireworks from Reigle Family Park on July 3, but that vote failed, with Scheunemann, Severance and Knoebel being the only ones in favor of the motion.

Then the board voted to cancel the fireworks altogether.

It was not known at press time on June 2 if the board will vote on the issue again.

Kiwanis Swim Park To Open June 15

— Pool Open To Village Residents Only

With a 4-3 vote on June 1, the Kewaskum Village Board decided to open the swim pond at Kiwanis Park on June 15 for village residents only.

Village trustees Richard Knoebel, Richard Laubach and Jim Hovland voted against the measure.

The board considered closing the swim pond for the season to maintain social distancing because of COVID-19. The recommendation of the health department is to keep the pool open at only 25 percent capacity.

To keep the number of swimmers down, the board decided to keep the swim pond open only to village residents. Children must be accompanied by an adult who is a village resident.

Nothing was said at the meeting about swim lessons.

It costs the village about \$50,000 to maintain the pool each summer.

To date, the village has spent about \$1,000 to fill the pool, change some valving and having an aquabiologist have it ready for a June 15 opening date, according to DPW Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle.

The board discussed what other area pools were doing for the summer. In West Bend, the pool at Regner Park is closed for the season and the splash pad is open.

In Jackson, the splash pad also is open. The Hartford pool will open in mid June but will allow only 25 percent occupancy.

Aupperle said at the meeting that swim director Butch Buddenhagen said that if social distancing is still enforced on July 1 that he won't be able to do that because he would not

have the staff to keep them apart. Buddenhagen was worried that the number of available employees would be reduced if the swim pond did not open until July 1, according to Aupperle.

Reopening WI Was the Only Choice

Over two weeks ago, the Wisconsin Supreme Court overturned the Safer at Home order extension, effectively lifting restrictions across most of Wisconsin. Supporters of the order voiced their opposition to the decision, claiming that an untold number of people would become infected with and die from COVID-19 as a result.

Governor Evers told MSNBC that our state was now the "Wild West," saying "This turns the state into chaos... People will get sick. Republicans own the chaos." The most vocal supporters of the Safer at Home order claimed a massive wave of new infections and death was inevitable. To them, the order had been the only thing holding that wave back. It was only a matter of time.

Now, two weeks after Wisconsin was reopened (two weeks being the longest it takes COVID-19 symptoms to appear, and only in the rarest cases), none of those claims have come true. Sure, there has been an increase in the total number of positive tests. That is to be expected with our increased testing efforts.

However, the percentage of total tests that come back positive has remained relatively the same as it was prior to the reopening. Hospitalizations have only increased slightly, and they are nowhere near being overrun by newly-infected patients. Over the 14-day period prior to and following the Supreme Court decision, Wisconsin has seen on average around eight deaths per day. While each death is tragic and deserves to be mourned, there has not been a massive spike in deaths.

When Safer at Home began, the goal was to flatten the curve. That was the talking point repeated by all the supporters. Wisconsin submitted to Safer at Home under the sole premise of flattening the curve. The thing many people don't realize is that even by flattening the curve, the area under the curve (the number of infections and deaths) remains the same.

The goal was to spread out those infections and deaths as to not overwhelm our healthcare system, not prevent them entirely. Once that had been accomplished, the narrative switched from flattening the curve to 'preventing the spread' and 'preventing death.' Those goals are not possible without shuttering Wisconsin for an extended period of time, which would have obliterated our state's economy even more than it is now. Fear was and still is being used to attempt to keep people under the thumb of the government.

Given what we know now, reopening Wisconsin was the only choice we had. Small businesses were heading towards bankruptcy at an astonishing rate, many of them closing permanently. Many more will never financially recover. Unemployment rose from 3.4 percent to 14.1 percent over the course of a single month.

The Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development (DWD) was and still is drowning in new unemployment insurance claims. DWD leadership has been unable to update their systems and effectively utilize resources to handle this massive increase. Over 700,000 of those claims are still unpaid. Our friends and neighbors whose businesses and occupations weren't deemed 'essential' were losing their livelihoods right before our very eyes. If Wisconsin hadn't opened then, who knows how many more businesses would've gone under and how many jobs would've been eliminated?

Our state had to reopen when it did, otherwise there wouldn't have been anything left to reopen.

Community Supports KHS Seniors

The program was started by Jen Rinzel, with the help of her daughter Hannah Rinzel, who graduated from KHS last year.

Jen works as a secretary for West Bend West High School, where she participated in an "Adopt A Senior" program.

"They got theirs up and running about a week before I started ours, and so I went through the process of adopting a senior through West Bend," Jen explained. "And then I was like, 'Oh my gosh, this is so cool.' I mean just to see the smiles and the joy on these kids' faces."

Some were surprises, some were not; it just depended on the person who wanted to adopt the senior and how they wanted to go about doing it.

"I didn't see anything that was going for Kewaskum, so I thought this would be wonderful," Jen said. "It's not a school sponsored thing. It is definitely run by a parent," Jen explained. "The intent was never to drag the school into it. They have enough going on their plate to worry about graduation, how they are going to end the school year and figuring out what fall will look like."

So Jen started a group on Facebook on May 11. She relied on social media and the word of mouth to spread the news about the group. By Monday, June 1, 98 KHS seniors had been adopted.

None of the students had to wait long to be adopted. Within minutes of being posted on Facebook, each of the students has been adopted.

"It has been awesome," Jen said. "It just goes to show you what an awesome community we have. People are jumping on board and willing to reach out and spread the kindness,

which was the goal."

Before starting the program, Jen contacted the school and was told there were 165 students in the graduating class. Some of those students or their parents are not on Facebook, so other people have posted for those people with the parent's permission.

Any seniors who are not part of the group are invited to join the Kewaskum High School Adopt A Senior group on Facebook.

While Jen has run the Facebook page, Hannah has worked behind the scenes to create a spreadsheet of the seniors and who has adopted them.

Not a lot of senior students are on the group page. It began as a somewhat undercover page in order to surprise the students.

After adopting a senior, the person reaches out to the student's parent and finds out what their favorite things are. Gifts have included things such as gift cards, T-shirts, mugs, candy, snacks, balloons or flowers.

"It has been really fun to see all the different ways that people present their gifts. There isn't one that is the same; they are all different," Jen said.

Most have picked a student they know. But not everyone has.

"I picked someone I didn't know. I wanted to meet someone and be able to talk to them for a little while," Jen said, who adopted Madeline Struebing.

Once the seniors are adopted, their parents are able to go back onto the page and post a gratitude post.

"That has been awesome to see because there is so much gratefulness and so many smiles," Jen said.

The graduates are grateful for the thought-

fulness of the community.

"One thing I consistently see emphasized in the midst of this chaos is the truly good people that step up to make a positive difference. I greatly appreciate the generosity and kindness from the Adopt a Senior organization this year. I know that when we're able to see this time as a thing of the past, the seniors may remember the things they've lost. But more importantly, we will remember the people that reassured us there was hope; one of these being our adoptive sponsors and Jen Rinzel. Thank you to all who volunteered to make the seniors feel recognized," said Andrew Beine, who along with his twin sister Elizabeth Beine, was an adopted senior in the program.

The program has also been important to families who have a graduating senior this year.

"It is good that they were recognizing the seniors," said Jenni Bolek, whose daughter Erika Bolek graduated in March. "Erika had graduated early in March, she was thankful for the chance to participate and was very appreciative of the generosity of the families."

Business Support

Besides the Adopt A Senior program, Jen contacted local businesses to do something for the graduating seniors.

"When the grads pick up their cap and gown units this week, some of the businesses in the area are donating coupons," Jen said.

Those coupons will be given to each graduate along with a cap and gown. Participating businesses include: El Pig's Butt, Cousin's Subs, McDonald's, Coffee Corner, Candy Tree, 4 Seasons Tanning, Michaleno's and Dairy Queen.

"A lot of the businesses are hurting right now and they are still willing to reach out with kindness. I just think that is awesome," Jen said. "It is nice when you live in a smaller community. I think people just know how to take care of each other, which is amazing."

Adopt An Eighth Grader

Jen does not have a senior this year, but she does have two other children who are a sophomore at Kewaskum High School and an eighth grader at Kewaskum Middle School. She realizes that while it is not as big of a milestone as graduating from high school, Jen realizes that moving up from middle school to high school is a

big step. So Jen decided to do something for the eighth graders in Kewaskum now also.

"I have now started an Adopt an Eighth Grader page because I actually have an eighth grader and a couple people showed interest in doing something for eighth graders," Jen said.

That page was just kicked off this past weekend.

"I thought if people are willing to do it, it's just a nice gesture, and I really think in these times that are difficult times, it is neat to bring some kindness," Jen said.

KHS Plans Outdoor Graduation Ceremony

Due to health concerns related to the COVID-19 pandemic, an outdoor ceremony is planned rather than an indoor commencement that is traditionally held in the school's gymnasium. In order to maintain space for social distancing, each graduate will be allowed to bring two guests and will be seated with those two people on the football field. Families will be spaced six feet apart on the field.

Graduates will be called up to walk across the stand, in front of the first row of bleachers, to receive a diploma. School board members will be seated in the stands, six feet apart. "It will look very similar to what we usually have," District Administrator James Smasal said at the May 26 board meeting.

Of course, there will need to be some alterations, Smasal pointed out.

"You would have to consider the social distancing, and not using handshakes. It would have to be COVID-19 tweaked," Smasal said.

The plan is to use the scoreboard to possibly show a picture of each

graduate as they are called forward.

"We would use the scoreboard somehow," Smasal said.

The band and choir will not be able to perform at the event. Instead, the plan is to play "Pomp and Circumstance" through the speaker system.

"We will have to control traffic going in and out so not everyone comes at the same time. And we will have to dismiss people by rows so people don't all leave at the same time, trying to appreciate respectfulness of everybody," Smasal said.

There will be some other differences as well.

"You aren't going to be able to stand around and hug each other like we usually do," Smasal explained on May 26. "Senior pictures won't be able to be taken as it stands right now, but that might change between now and July. At this point in time, the senior picture will probably be somebody standing up on top of the press box taking a picture of everybody sitting out in the [field]."

Senior Tributes

The Kewaskum School District has created a video tribute for each of the members of the Kewaskum High School Class of 2020.

The video includes a photograph of each graduate and a message from a family member or teacher about the student. Once they got information on each student, the video was created.

"We put a tribute together that they will be able to have for the rest of their lives," Smasal said. "It's pretty cool."

Magnet Fishing For Possible Treasures

When Alexander announced that he had caught something, his entire family gathered round. His mom, Sarah, and his 12-year-old sister, Mackenzie, watched as his dad, Jamie, helped pull up a round chunk of metal.

At first, Alexander thought the metal piece was part of an old tractor. It was covered in gunk from the river.

Alexander started wiping that off so he could determine exactly what his find was: a round door to a safe.

In case the door was needed for a case, the family brought it to the Kewaskum Police Department on May 26 at 9 a.m.

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop said that there are no unsolved cases in the village involving a safe. However, in case any other departments have any old, open cases involving a theft or entry to a safe, Bishop sent an alert to the Wisconsin Department of Justice's Crime Alert Network.

According to the report, the round door to a safe measures approximately 17 centimeters. It is unknown how long the door has been in the river. The door has moderate amount of corrosion on it, and no other parts of a safe have been found in the area.

There is no name on the door, but a partial se-

rial number of 4493199 can be seen with a few characters preceding them.

Since finding the door, Alexander has been magnet fishing for more metal finds.

So far, Alexander has found fishing lures, hooks, a couple pliers, a three-foot metal bar, a railroad spike, rusty nails and metallic rocks in the Milwaukee River. He also found a fishing reel, but no pole. Plus he has found fishing lures in Mauthe Lake.

"It's like treasure hunting," Alexander said. "It's fun and cool to bring stuff up to see what's down there. Also, it helps clean up the river and environment."

Angela had received a ukelele from her mother, Joanne, for her birthday approximately seven years ago. She encouraged her coworkers to bring ukeleles to work to play during lunch breaks.

"Ukeleles are cute and convenient," quipped Angela.

The small group jokingly suggested to each

other they should form a band and played their first gig in September 2017 at the inaugural Walker's Point 5th Street Fest in Milwaukee where they held a ukelele workshop. By that time, Joanne, Kayla and Mary M. were band members.

Members of Ukerazy share their enthusiasm by performing in Campbellsport at the Blue Door Coffee Co., Serenity Villa Assisted Living, Coustie Bar and Grill, and St. Matthew Catholic Church. Mayville performances have been at the city's "It's a Wonderful Life on Main" event and at a community breakfast held at St. Paul Lutheran Church.

A highlight for the band was when it participated in an open mic opportunity at the City of Lights Ukelele Festival in Aurora, Ill. in August.

Impromptu performances have occurred when group members have travelled for business, which at one time resulted in offers of free food at a restaurant in exchange for entertainment.

Tips received by Ukerazy, such as at the Blue Door, are donated to organizations supported by the host location.

"Just playing music is fun," commented Joanne.

More information and bookings are done through the band's Facebook page at Ukerazy Ukelele Band/Experience. Interested people can also follow the band on Instagram at ukerazyband.

The two newest members are Sue and Mary B. Sue joined in May 2018 after being coaxed by Angela. "I don't know how to play," responded Sue.

"We'll teach you," Angela confidently promised.

Sue quickly learned to play and sing and has immersed herself into playing the instrument. She can play a variety of music genres with the band including country, rock, pop, Christmas, patriotic, folk, Hawaiian, Disney, kids songs and

Jade's originals.

Less than one year ago, in May, Mary B. (the coach for the Shining Stars, a local all-handicapped dance group, was at the Blue Door when Ukerazy was performing.

"They made me feel so happy," recalled Mary B. Caught up in the mood, she took out maracas and played with the band, occasionally strumming a ukelele, an instrument she had not played before.

"I decided then that I was going to join the band," Mary B. said.

In August 2019, Mary B. went to Hawaii and while there bought a ukelele at an island flea market. She continues to perfect her ukelele skills, but at this time finds it hard to sing while playing.

Angela pointed out that learning to play a ukelele, a member of the guitar family, is easier than learning to play a guitar. Ukeleles have four nylon strings, that when plucked or strummed are gentler on fingertips. Additionally, chord shapes and scales are easier to learn.

Ukerazy members offer a monthly open ukelele workshop to the public. Dates and locations are available by messaging the group through its Facebook page. Participants do not need to own a ukelele – the band has extras which can be borrowed during the workshop.

Ukerazy will be appearing in Mayville on March 14 at the St. Paul Lutheran Church Community Breakfast and on April 18 at the Mayville American Legion. The band also continues to play at the Blue Door in Campbellsport.

The following are requirements to appear before the Board of Review and procedural requirements if appearing before the Board:

No person shall be allowed to appear before the Board of Review, to testify to the Board by telephone or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the Assessor to enter onto property to conduct an exterior view of such property being assessed.

After the first meeting of the Board of Review and before the Board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the Board of Review may contact, or provide information to, a member of the Board about the person's objection except at a session of the Board. Open Book shall occur no less than 7 days prior to the Board of Review.

The Board of Review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the Board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the Board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the Board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, and the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48 hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the Board of Review within the first 2 hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The Board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the Board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that

land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objection and made full disclosure before the Board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

When appearing before the Board of Review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or subject or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor all of the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under Sec. 73.03(2a), that the assessor requests. The Village of Kewaskum has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph which provides exemptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or of the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under Section 19.35 (1) of Wis. Statutes.

The Board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the Board a letter from a physician, surgeon or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other person may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the Board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under Section 70.47(3)(a), Wis. stats, that person provides to the clerk of the Board of Review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of

review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular session via video conference.

President Scheunemann called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Sarah Severance, Dave Spenner, Jim Wright, Jim Hovland, Richard Knoebel and Kevin Scheunemann. Staff members present: Administrator Matt Heiser, DPW Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle, Police Chief Tom Bishop, Fire Chief Mark Groeschel, Treasurer Julie Hundertmark, Library Director Lori Kreis and Clerk Tammy Butz. Members from the community and the news media were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on Friday, May 1, 2020. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney and the news media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Trustee Wright to approve the April 20, 2020 and April 27, 2020 meeting minutes, Trustee Severance seconded, voice vote, motion carried.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT HEADS

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel – no report

Police Chief Tom Bishop – no report

DPW Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle reported on DPW activity:

•Sewer main has been installed on Brooklane Drive, water portion is being worked on

•Tree trimming has been done in the parks

•Tree grant of \$5,000 should be received soon.

Trustee Spenner inquired if the grant funds been designated for any existing projects. DPW Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle stated that the funds must be used for parks. Dennis Aupperle intends to use the funds to remove trees and for planting of trees this year.

Administrator Heiser provided an update on Summer Programs. Numerous events have been postponed for the summer, including the 125th Anniversary Celebration, Jakes Free Fishing and the Village Wide Rummage Sale. Music in the Park starts June 23rd, bands require a 30-day notice for cancellation. Recreation league play is also pending. Peggy Kober, in conjunction with the Nature River Center, will be hosting a kayaking event on the Milwaukee River in Kewaskum on June 27th. Fireworks in other communities have been cancelled. These events are waiting

for the Village Board to provide direction.

President Scheunemann indicated that he is inclined to have the July 3rd Fireworks. Trustee Severance asked what the lead-time is for ordering of the fireworks. Fire Chief Mark Groeschel stated that we need to place the order soon and stated that the fireworks company is willing to work with the Village. If the fireworks order is placed and then the event is cancelled; the fireworks company will store them for next year. Trustee Laubach expressed concern that more people may come to Kewaskum's fireworks if their local fireworks are cancelled. Police Chief Tom Bishop shared this concern and stated it is not a good idea to open the park. In addition, there may be chaos in the Village with parking, littering, etc. Discussion ensued on the July 3rd Fireworks. President Scheunemann concluded that the consensus is to order the fireworks and decide later. For Music in the Park, President Scheunemann stated that the event could fairly be social distanced and is not inclined to exercise authority and believes the board should leave it up to the group to decide. Trustee Spenner agreed and clarified that the social distancing needs to be in line with the health department parameters.

Administrator Heiser reported that the Municipal Building boiler is not working properly. The boiler has two pumps, the lead pump is no longer working. The cost to replace is \$2,000 plus labor. The backup pump is making a lot of noise.

Clerk Tammy Butz reported that utility delinquent notices have been sent. The notices reflect Executive Order #11 and the PSC order that restricts assessing late fees and disconnection of customer accounts. Trustee Spenner inquired when we can proceed with late fees and disconnection. Administrator Heiser advised that the PSC needs to provide direction.

Treasurer Julie Hundertmark – no report

Library Director Lori Kreis stated that curbside pick-up started last week and staffing is limited to two people per shift. She added that their online programming, included Facebook Storytime, have been very popular. The Library is also hosting an Online Recipe Club. President Scheunemann asked if she is promoting it in Facebook Community Groups. Lori Kreis stated that she will be more proactive and post events in the Statesman and on Facebook.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

In response to COVID

19's impact on local taverns and tattoo shops, Administrator Heiser presented the revisions to Ordinance 6-72 and 18-281 to remove license fees amounts from being defined in our ordinances and a summary of the current alcohol and tattoo shops license fees. The impact on revenue, if the fees for "Class B" licenses are lowered to the state minimum of \$50, is \$2,100. In addition, if the Village waived the \$115 license fee for tattoo shops, a loss of \$230 in revenue. For a total revenue loss of \$2,330. Trustee Spenner motioned to approve ordinance changes with the requirement to offset loss revenue by reducing expenditures, seconded by Trustee Laubach, voice vote, motion carried.

Trustee Knoebel motioned to reduce the fees for "Class B" licenses to the state minimum of \$50 and no license fee for tattoo shops, Trustee Wright seconded, voice vote, motion carried.

Administrator Heiser suggested postponing the pool opening. The Pool expenditures average \$5,400 per week in 2018 and 2019. Trustee Knoebel motioned to postpone the pool opening to June 15th, seconded by Trustee Wright, voice vote, motion carried.

Administrator Heiser presented Resolution 2020-02, State Trust Fund Loan for the purpose of financing the Brooklane Drive project. Trustee Hovland motioned to approve, Trustee Wright seconded, motion carried by roll call vote: Hovland – aye, Wright – aye, Severance – aye, Laubach – aye, Knoebel – aye, Spenner – aye, Scheunemann – aye (7-0).

Administrator Heiser provided the 2020 Seasonal/Part-time EMT Employment Compensation. With the exception of the Fire Department EMS, there are no changes to wages from 2019. Trustee Knoebel motioned to approve, seconded by Trustee Spenner, voice vote, motion carried.

Police Chief Tom Bishop requested approval to purchase Pro Phoenix RMS. This software replaces TIPPS that has been in use since 1988. Switching to Pro Phoenix will allow access to crime data that the FBI collects. Pro Phoenix is widely used in Wisconsin and Washington County. The Pro Phoenix contract is for \$28,731 and includes rolling data over from the last 30 years. Funding will come from the Police Department capital outlay account. In addition, the Police Department will have savings of \$3,000 each year for maintenance costs. Trustee

Knoebel stated it is a big plus to have information on people from outside of the Village. President Scheunemann inquired if there is a limit on increasing the annual maintenance cost. Chief Bishop stated it may only increase by 3%, the same rate the Sheriff Department receives. Trustee Spenner clarified that these outlay accounts are not specifically earmarked. As part of the Capital Improvement Plan, these accounts are being defined. Trustee Knoebel motioned to approve request, seconded by Trustee Severance, voice vote, motion carried.

DPW Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle requested confirmation on proceeding with sidewalk inspections. Dennis Aupperle stated that if we hold off one year, we can double up next year. Trustee Spenner suggested that instead of being behind on inspections, could we amend to proceed this year with the Village offering 12-month hardships for those that cannot afford to pay for fixes. Trustee Laubach motioned to approve moving forward with amendment by Trustee Spenner, seconded by Trustee Wright, voice vote, motion carried.

Trustee Hovland motioned to approve the application of a Temporary Class "B" Retailer's License from Mike Schickert of Kewaskum Fire Fighters Association for the Village Fireworks on July 3, 2020 (rain date of July 4, 2020), seconded by Trustee Severance and carried by roll call vote: Hovland – aye, Wright – aye, Severance – aye, Laubach – aye, Knoebel – aye, Spenner – aye, Scheunemann – aye (7-0). Trustee Knoebel motioned to appoint Timothy McDonald as agent for the aforementioned, seconded by Trustee Severance, voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Trustee Knoebel to approve an Operator's license for Nicole Bakum, seconded by Trustee Severance, voice vote, motion carried.

PUBLIC COMMENTS - no comments

Trustee Severance noted per Aaron Laatsch, May 7th is the official date the Village of Kewaskum was incorporated in 1895.

Trustee Knoebel motioned to adjourn meeting at 7:53 p.m., carried by roll call vote: Hovland – aye, Wright – aye, Severance – aye, Laubach – aye, Knoebel – aye, Spenner – aye, Scheunemann – aye (7-0).
