School District Prepares For New Year

The Kewaskum School District is making plans for beginning its new school year on September 1.

"As of right now, we are planning on having all students to be able to attend an in-person option, five days a week, kindergarten through 12th grade, as well as a remote class virtual option that will be available to those parents who are not comfortable sending their child or children to school. The remote option as best as possible will be taught by our teachers. There will be precautions put in place for those attending in person," said District Administrator James Smasal at a community forum that was held on Monday, July 20.

The forum was held to share information about the district's plans for teaching and learning this school year amidst

the COVID-19 pandemic. About 70 people attended the forum, which was held in the Kewaskum Middle School gymnasium.

"Our reopening vision is to create a safe, flexible and equitable learning environment that will close the current learning gap by utilizing in-person and virtual models to address the academic, social and emotional needs of all students," said Dr. Mark Bazata, curriculum director for the district.

Offering virtual learning will not be the only change in the school district this year. The Kewaskum School Board voted Thursday, July 9, to no longer offer 4K classes at i4Learning Community School or Farmington Elementary School during the 2020-2021 school year.

9/11 Memorial Starts Pave The Way Campaign

The Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Educational Center is kicking off its "Pave The Way" campaign as construction on the memorial nears completion.

"We are on our final push toward finishing the memorial. One hundred percent of the proceeds of the sales of the bricks go toward construction of the memorial," said Gordon Haberman, who is president of Kewaskum Remembers 9/11, Inc. and whose daughter Andrea Haberman was killed in

the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.

The red granite pavers, which are being engraved by Miller Monument, are being installed on the walkway around the memorial. The commemorative bricks are available in different sizes for individuals, families, businesses or organizations.

Meanwhile, there has been plenty of activity at the memorial site as local companies have donated their time and resources to building the memorial.



Dear Editor,

I continue to be dismayed at the actions of some Kewaskum School Board members. It is apparent through some statements and actions that approved bylaws and policies are not followed.

A recent example occurred at the regular monthly board meeting, Thursday July 9, 2020. Prior to the "Public Comments" section on the agenda, Board President Leister stated he was limiting comments to two minutes, not allowing any negative or accusatory comments, and would cut people off at two minutes as several individuals were signed in to speak. He stated he does not like long meetings.

Policy 0167.3 limits individual participation to five minutes (not two minutes). Public participation can be extended beyond 15 minutes as allowed by a vote of the Board (did not occur).

Board President Leister stated he would not read the email comments (submitted to him in advance) as he does not like long meetings. Policy 0164.1 states no regular Board meeting should last beyond midnight (not 9 p.m. as adjourned). On May 29, 2020, this constituent sent an email to every School Board member addressing the lack of protocol for changing policies (to follow Policy 0131.1).

I requested a response from Board President Leister and newly appointed Policy Chairperson Ramthun. To date, I have received no response. During my 12.5 years of participation as a Kewaskum School Board member, I never witnessed a disregard for approved policies. Our school district has positively progressed over many years. I do not want to see any regression

occur.

Every Board member and Administration member received a petition (days in advance of the Thursday meeting), which was signed by 471 students, alumni, parents, grandparents, and community members. The petition requested giving students a quality education that would enable them to have the tools to comprehend diversity and complexity of our world. It suggested promoting anti-racist and an inclusive environment where students' differences are recognized and valued.

As one of the authors attempted to present during Public Comments with several students standing behind her, Board President Leister said they were not allowed to be there. What policy is this? The District Administrator addressed actions the district is doing presently and planned in the near future for education with four of the five bullet points in the petition.

One point was given to the Board as its responsibility to pursue. There was complete silence from every Board member, with no acknowledgement of support for the educational plan or the petitioners.

Similar petitions with these topics have been presented in other school districts throughout Wisconsin. I admire the leadership and integrity of the individuals addressing social justice.

I have been taught that when one does not address a wrong doing, it means one is complicit in the wrong doing. I expect the best from our community.



Customers Asked To Wear Masks

When people shop at the local Geidel's Piggly Wiggly, they are requested to wear a mask in an effort to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

"We are following the guidelines from the CDC and the Washington Ozaukee Health Department. They are giving guidance that wearing a face covering is recommended," said Mike Geidel, the store owner.

The new policy went into place this week, on Monday, July 20. The store is following the lead of many major retail stores. Some of the other retailers that now require customers to wear masks in their stores include Sendik's Food Markets, Kohl's, Walmart, Sam's Club, Kroger (which operates

the Pick 'n Save and Metro Market stores in Wisconsin), Festival Foods, Woodman's Markets, Menard's, Home Depot and Costco.

For Geidel's Piggly Wiggly, the policy is being started locally; it is not a corporate policy. However, other Piggly Wiggly stores are also starting the same policy. This Friday, July 24, the Campbellsport Piggly Wiggly will begin requesting customers to wear masks while they shop.

"My wife and I have done a lot of research, and it's highly recommended by the health department," said Kevin Harvey, owner of the Campbellsport Piggly Wiggly. "There is no 100 percent guarantee that this is going to be 100 percent protection from it, but it's one way we

can protect ourselves. We want to protect the employees here at the store, as well as the customers and the community."

"We see the numbers growing, and we want to do whatever we can here at the Campbellsport Pig to make a difference. If this helps prevent it from spreading around and makes it easier for the kids to go back to school in the fall, we are all 100 percent for that," Harvey added.

There were 26 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the Kewaskum zip code as of Monday, July 20, according to the Washington Ozaukee Health Department website. The site also listed that in Washington and Ozaukee counties there were 1,021 total confirmed cases, 36 COVID-related deaths

and 19,370 negative tests.

As of Monday, July 20, there were 14,703,293 cases globally and 609,887 total COVID-related deaths worldwide. In the United States, there were 3,830,010 total cases and 140,906 deaths. In Wisconsin, the numbers were 43,018 total cases and 846 deaths, according to the Washington Ozaukee Health Department website.

At the Piggly Wiggly stores in both Kewaskum and Campbellsport, employees have been wearing masks as part of their uniforms since the beginning of April.

It is just one way the stores have tried to help with the mitigation process. On March 26, plexiglass shields were installed at the checkout

registers at Geidel's Piggly Wiggly. On April 1, the store started a curbside pickup service.

The store is not asking employees to play the role of enforcer to ensure that all customers wear a mask while shopping in the store. Instead, the grocery store is trusting that customers will follow the policy.

For those who do not have a mask, the store has masks available for \$1. All proceeds of the sale will be donated to the Kewaskum American Legion roof project.

Geidel's Piggly Wiggly also offers curbside delivery Monday through Saturday as well as home delivery for customers.

The store posted the new mask policy on its Facebook page on Friday and has received

lots of feedback. Comments on the page have been overwhelmingly supportive of the new policy, but not everyone is happy.

"I'm trying to keep it nonpolitical, which I realize it has turned into a political issue for a lot of people. There seems to be two camps with the masks," Geidel said. "We just are doing what we feel is right and following the guidelines to help keep the numbers in check."

Geidel hopes the new policy will help the entire community.

"I don't like wearing a mask. But I'm doing it. It is a small inconvenience to do our part, I guess is the way I look at it. The small inconvenience will hopefully get this pandemic under control," Geidel said.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

Inmate Death

Correctional officers conducting a routine cell check on July 16 discovered a 30-year-old male inmate non-responsive. He was located with a

bed sheet tied around his neck. Correctional officers immediately began life-saving efforts on the individual and summoned help from on-site jail medical per-

sonnel as well as paramedics from the West Bend Fire Department. Unfortunately, the advanced lifesaving efforts were not successful and the 30-year-old man

was pronounced dead at the jail. The inmate had spoken with a correctional officer less than 30 minutes before the discovery during another routine contact and appeared to be fine.

The deceased had been brought to the Washington County Jail the previous day after he was charged in a domestic abuse incident that occurred at his residence in the Town of Polk. He also had an outstanding arrest warrant from the Wisconsin Department of Corrections for a probation violation. He was scheduled to appear in Washington County Circuit Court later in the day to face additional drug-related charges.

Per policy, all new inmates are being held in a quarantine area where they are in individual cells and have no contact with other inmates.

Wisconsin State Statute 175.47 requires an outside agency to lead all investigations with officer-involved deaths. This particular death investigation does not fall within that statute; however, in the interest of transparency, trust, and thoroughness, Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis is having the City of West Bend Police Department conduct the full investigation into this death.

Schulteis extends his deepest sympathies on behalf of the entire Washington County Sheriff's Office to the family and friends of the deceased.

Schulteis said, "This is a tragic day for the family and friends of this young man. I appreciate my staff who work tirelessly every day to maintain the safest possible

environment within our facility and when these tragic incidents occur, it affects them deeply. On behalf of all my agency, I would like to extend our sympathies to the family and assure the community that a comprehensive and thorough independent investigation is being conducted."

The name is being withheld pending family notification. Any further inquiries should be directed to the West Bend Police Department.

Burglary

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is investigating a second residential burglary in the past several weeks involving criminals posing as laborers doing work at a residence and scamming their way into the victim's house.

The latest occurred on July 13 at around 1:30 p.m. in the area of Hubertus Road near Friess Lake in the Village of Richfield. The suspect vehicle in the latest burglary was described as possibly a gray-colored pickup truck pulling a wood deck utility trailer. A middle-aged male white suspect who was described as a short and heavyset made contact with the elderly victim at her residence. He began talking to her about how he had done work for her in the past and was looking to do some yard work. While the first suspect was distracting the victim a second middle-aged, heavier-set male entered the house and stole personal items.

Sheriff investigators are working closely with our law enforcement partners throughout southeast Wisconsin on these investigations, as similar offenses have been occurring through-

out this region. They are utilizing all resources available to bring these criminals that prey on the elderly to justice.

Citizens are being asked to be diligent and report any suspicious behavior they observe. These criminals target elderly residents and confront the victims about doing work on their house. This work is commonly in the form of driveway sealing or utility work. If someone that you are not expecting arrives at your house to do work, be extremely cautious. You should secure your house and contact law enforcement if there is any question to the validity.

House Fire

On Tuesday, July 14, at 7:51 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of smoke coming from a residence at 1128 Country Highlands Drive in the Village of Richfield. All of the residents evacuated the home.

Washington County sheriff's deputies were dispatched along with personnel from the following fire departments: Richfield, Jackson, Germantown, Hartford, Alenton, Slinger, St. Lawrence, Sussex, Cedarburg, Lisbon, Menomonee Falls, Mer-ton and Lifestar Rescue. Firefighters found the home to be on fire and they extinguished it. Two dogs perished in the fire. Scenic Road in the area of the fire was closed for several hours.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office. No one was injured, and the estimated amount of damage is unknown.

School District Prepares

All 4K students in the district will attend Kewaskum Elementary School during the 2020-21 school year.

The change comes because the number of 4K students is projected to be lower this year. As of July 7, 82 students were projected to attend 4K in the Kewaskum School District this fall.

The remaining grades at the elementary schools will be split as follows:

i4Learning: one class each for first through fifth grade.

Farmington Elementary: one class each for 5K and first grade; and two classes each for second through fifth grade.

Kewaskum Elementary: three classes each for 5K through fifth grade.

The goal in changing the attendance lines is to offer equal class sizes at the three elementary schools.

"To ensure safety, equity and consistency at all three elementary schools, we will need to reassign some elementary students to even out class sizes. We will make these reassignments in a manner that moves the least number of students as possible, using board policy as our guiding principles," Smasal wrote to families.

Parents who are interested in voluntarily moving their child to a different school should contact their elementary school principal.

Board members Jim Leister, Sue

Miller, Dennis Aupperle and Stephanie Bird voted for the change in attendance lines at the July 9 School Board meeting, while Doug Goring and Timothy Ramthun voted against the proposal. Board Member Mark Sette was absent.

At the meeting, the board left a window open for the i4Learning Community School to once again become a charter school, but it does not appear that will happen in the near future.

"After numerous discussions, the i4Learning Governance Council and School Board are unified in tabling the discussion of a charter school contract," Smasal wrote on July 16 in a letter to district families.

MPTC's Fall 2020 Semester Will Begin On August 24

Moraine Park Technical College's fall 2020 semester will begin, as scheduled, on August 24, and end December 18. As of now, the college is moving forward with a typical semester schedule.

- Student activities and gatherings will be restricted to smaller groups.

"The health and safety of the students and employees remain at the forefront and continues to drive the college's decision making," Bonnie Baerwald, Moraine Park president, said. "Many accommodations have been put into place to help navigate a safe return for everyone. We look forward to welcoming students and staff back to campus this fall."

The college is working its way through a phased-in reopening plan, which includes five phases. Currently, the college remains closed to the general public. Moraine Park will begin welcoming back limited staff throughout the summer to prepare for the fall 2020 semester. Details of the reopening plan can be found at morainepark.edu/coronavirus.

The Washington County treasurer would like to remind taxpayers that their postponed/second installment 2019 property taxes are due on or before July 31, 2020. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we strongly encourage you to mail your payment to the Washington County Treasurer.

If you are paying by check, please make sure that the numeric and written portions of the check are the same and that your check is signed otherwise the check will be returned, and this could result in interest and penalty charges, if postmarked after the due date. Postdated checks will not be held and will be returned to you. Checks should be made payable and mailed to the Washington County Treasurer,

PO Box 1986, West Bend, Wisconsin, 53095. If you would like a receipt, please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the County Treasurer strongly encourages you to mail your property tax payment. Please do not wait until the last week of July. Mailing your payment early helps make sure that the USPS postmark is timely and provides greater opportunity to correct errors before the due date deadline.

"The cost of missing the July 31 deadline is severe. Under state law, interest and penalty charges are 1.5 percent per month back to February 1, (10.5 percent in August 2020) and continue to accrue until the taxes are paid in full. It is

imperative to pay property taxes on time to avoid delinquent charges."

You can also pay your property taxes online using a credit card or electronic check through Point & Pay. Please be advised that Point & Pay will charge you a convenience fee of 2.39 percent of the amount that you put on your credit/debit card or \$1.50 for an electronic check. 

Check It Out!



A Column By Kewaskum Librarian Lori Kreis

The library has resumed in person services for almost two months now and things have been going smoothly. This could not have happened if most library users were not following the guidelines that we have in place. Whether it is wearing a face covering, maintaining social distancing, or limiting your time in the library, it has all added to a successful reopening. I am not an expert by any means on the science of staying healthy from Covid, but I follow the CDC guidelines. We will continue to follow those guidelines and any subsequent information from the local health department while we are open.

We are also following the CDC guidelines about quarantining returned items. The study being conducted by the Institute of Museum and Library Services from the scientists at Battelle have preliminary results showing that the virus causing Covid-19 is not detectable on five common library materials after three days. Basically, when we receive items in our book drops (the only way we are accepting returns), they are put in our quarantine area and are not touched again for at least 72 hours. This is for the safety of our staff and patrons. When the items are checked in, they are backdated to reflect the quarantine period so as not to incur any fines if the material was returned on time. Additionally, holds are taking longer than normal to come in because of the quarantine at the lending library and the

hub where materials are sorted to be delivered to your home library. I appreciate everyone's patience in this.

I have noticed items in our book returns that are not library items. By this, I mean books without any library markings that may be meant as donations. We are not taking donations until we no longer need to quarantine items. If there is an item returned that is meant to be a donation, these items may be recycled. While I appreciate you thinking of us for your book donations, we cannot accept them. If you want to hold on to them, please do so until quarantining is over. If not, I know that some donation centers have reopened in the area and will not feel slighted if you choose to donate them there.

I have mentioned some of these guidelines before but find it important to repeat them. Why? Because the library will be back to our pre-Covid hours beginning Saturday, August 1. These hours are Monday – Thursday 10 a.m. – 8 p.m., Friday 10 a.m. – 5 p.m. and Saturday 10 a.m. – 1 p.m.. Restrictions will still be in place. Besides the above regulations, this also includes occupancy restrictions, computer time limits, no gathering of groups and limited in-person programming. We hope that we can continue to stay open and that everyone stays healthy and safe.

"It went really well," said Shelly Oelhafen, FFA advisor at Kewaskum High School.

The youth who showed their animals have been working for a long time to prepare for the fair. Some who showed steers bought them over a year ago.

Isabell Janz, who had the champion steer, spent eight to 10 hours a day working with her steer. She spent time walking, washing, brushing and blowdrying the animal in preparation for the fair.

"I look forward to the fair every year; I'm glad we had the show this year," said Isabell, a Slinger High School graduate who is now majoring in elementary education at UW-Oshkosh. "It was unfortunate that the fair was canceled, but at the same time it was an opportunity to do things ourselves and show our animals."

For 10-year-old Sawyer Maney, last week was a good experience. It was his first time ever showing an animal at the fairgrounds.

"I will probably do it again," said the novice

pig handler.

Samantha Fischer, who will be a junior at Kewaskum High School, is used to showing animals each year at the fair.

"It definitely was smaller this year, but I'm glad we were still able to do it," she said.

Planning The Show

The show was headed up by Steve Janz. He was the one who made the first phone call, saying, "We can do this, let's do this."

Steve Janz has been to plenty of shows before, one as recent as the Saturday before the Washington County Fair was canceled. There were six families from the area who went to that beef preview show.

There were about 300 head of cattle there. None of them were allowed in the barns. The participants had to show their animals out of their trailers.

"But it went really well," Steve Janz said. "There wasn't a kid who didn't have a smile on their face because they finally got to show their animals," Steve Janz said.

Two days later, the

county fair was canceled.

"That night we had a little meeting with the fair superintendent. At that meeting, the seed was planted that we could possibly do something for the kids," Steve Janz said.

Steve Janz went home that night and calmed down his daughter. He thought about how they had just been to a show that Saturday.

"And I decided we can make this happen for the kids," Steve Janz said. "It was something that was important to a lot of kids. An extreme amount of discipline and effort went into this. They really wanted to show their animals and there was no reason we couldn't make it happen."

The following morning, he made a phone call to Randy Strupp, and they got the ball rolling. Before long, parents and former exhibitors were helping to plan the event.


"They kind of knew how things needed to be put together, and they ironed it all out," Steve Janz said.

Oelhafen joined the committee and helped out with the fundraising efforts. She also organized the office supplies and filled in wherever she was needed. Her main gig, though, was serving as the announcer for all three shows last week.

The fair park staff worked with a group to enable the shows to take place.

"The fair staff has been wonderful," Steve Janz said. "The speaker system went down on Thursday during the sheep show. They ran and got the office speaker system and wheeled it out here and left it for the weekend in case we needed it again. They were extremely helpful."

In total, about 30 cattle, 30 sheep and 21 pigs were part of last week's shows. None of the animals could spend the night at the fairgrounds. Other animals, such as rabbits and dairy cattle, will be shown at private shows

at the fair park this week as well.

For the participants, it is almost like going to the regular county fair that they look forward to each year.

Awards

"You really have to hang your hat on what these kids are doing. It takes a lot of dedication and a lot of hard work to get these animals to this point," said E.J. Lillesand, one of the judges for last week's beef show. "This is a good program. It teaches these kids to become good citizens. These animals keep them grounded."

Lillesand said that it will help the youth later in life. His daughter, Sarah Lillesand, is proof of that.

"She was hired at an insurance company. One of the biggest reasons they hired her out of 150 people is because she has an agricultural background, and they are familiar with the work ethic that comes

along with that," he said.

Each of the youth who showed at last week's show received a participation ribbon.

In addition, there were banners for the top five of each of the species. First and second place awards were presented to the top two finishers in each age group for showmanship.

All awards were donated money.

"The community really stepped up," Steve Janz said.

Participants paid a \$10 entry fee, so the money they get back will help cover their expenses on top of the entry fee.





9/11 Memorial Starts Pave The Way Campaign

"It has been absolutely amazing," Haberman said.

Lee Schacht of LS Landscapes & Tree Care, LLC, as well as Mike Borst of Outdoor Design, Inc., headed up the work in the northwest corner of the lot, which will serve as the military portion of the monument. The corner was designed by Flagstone Landscape Design.

The railing at the top of the amphitheater was recently completed. That was a six-week project that was headed up by Mark Herriges of BMH Manufacturing. He collaborated with Flagstone Design on the actual final plans for the railing and then brought in various companies to help make it all happen.

"There are a lot of good people involved in this whole thing, from the railings to the teaching podium that we are working on right now," Herriges said.

To construct the railings, Dean Derge Ornamental Ironworks rolled metal tubes to the correct radius.

"Some companies might hold back because they are competing, but Dean [Derge] helped us with anything

we needed," Herriges said.

Once the tubes were completed, everything was fabricated together by BMH Manufacturing.

Wollner Excavation transported the railing from BMH to the site. Workers from several of the companies were on site to help install the railing.

"When you look up and see that I-beam from the World Trade Center there while you are working on this, it really makes you think," Herriges said. "Everybody really enjoyed being part of it."

The railings were constructed through the donations of numerous companies. Herriges worked with Josh Neu at JD Laser, which donated material and all of the laser cutting for the project and is helping with the teaching podium, which will have stainless steel legs. He also worked with Tim Verbeke of Central Wire & Steel, which donated materials for the project as well as provided materials at cost.

"They have all just been great," Herriges said.

In addition, Dave Tennes of Tennes Ace Hardware donated any

rentals that were needed.

"Anytime we needed anything, Dave was there to offer help," Herriges said.

"It's just been awesome to see everyone come together. And working with people like Gordy [Haberman] and Jerry Gosa of the 9/11 Memorial Committee has been phenomenal. I can't say enough about these people," said Herriges.

All of the donations of time, labor and material are valuable. The contributions of BMH Manufacturing alone are worth approximately \$40,000.

Haberman has been moved by the generosity of all of the businesses.

"I'm humbled. It is humbling to have all these donations coming in. It points to the strength of Kewaskum, the strength of the community. It really shows the power of Kewaskum businesses and their belief in the importance and the relevancy of this memorial," Haberman said.

Moraine Park Students Will Benefit From Historic Credit Transfer Agreement

Moraine Park Technical College students seeking to transfer credits to one of the state's private, nonprofit colleges and universities will have a much easier time in the future thanks to a historic, comprehensive credit transfer agreement.

More than a dozen popular introductory courses are included in the agreement, such as chemistry, psychology, and speech. "Wisconsin's private colleges and universities have long been leaders in recognizing the rigor of a technical college education, and the value of creating transfer opportunities for our students," Foy noted. "This agreement sets a strong foundation for the future by allowing all of our institutions — in both sectors — to make lifelong learning opportunities even clearer for stu-

dents."

The two organizations have negotiated "course equivalencies" that provide great value to transfer students by reducing or eliminating the need to spend extra time and money retaking courses. The ability to smoothly transfer credits provides more flexibility for students — especially those who wish to start their college career close to home as well as nontraditional students who are already in the workforce and are looking to further their careers with bachelor's degrees. With the new agreement in place, students can look forward to an educational experience that is more efficient and simpler to navigate, while shortening the time to graduation and reducing costs for students.

"Streamlining the process to transfer credits from a technical college to a four-year

private college opens doors for more students to earn bachelor's degrees in Wisconsin," Wegenke said. "Our private colleges have longstanding relationships with the technical colleges, and this new agreement will make a difference as the state strives to increase the level of educational attainment and improve our position in the competitive knowledge economy."

All 16 Wisconsin technical colleges are participating, in addition to a first cohort of WAICU-member institutions, including: Alverno College, Cardinal Stritch University, Carroll University, Carthage College, Concordia University Wisconsin, Edgewood College, Herzing University, Lakeland University, Marian University, Marquette University, Milwaukee School of Engineering, Mount




