District Makes Plans To Safely Open Schools

When families go shopping for back-to-school supplies this year, one of the items they will see on the Kewaskum School District's list will be face masks.

"We are considering it a school supply, just like a pencil or a pen," District Administrator James Smasal said at a community forum on Monday, July 27. "At this point in time there will be times during the school day when you'll have to wear it and there will be times when you don't have to wear it."

Students who ride the bus to school will be required to wear a mask on the bus. Then there will be certain times during the school day that the students will need to mask up.

It is all part of the school district's current plan to protect students from contracting COVID-19 during the 2020-2021 school

year.

The plan is fluid and will likely continue to change over the course of the school year. The district currently plans to offer in-school instruction as well as virtual instruction for students.

"This is a journey; it is not a destination," Smasal said. "We are going to continue making improvements not only until when school starts, but until this pandemic is over. So it's not going to just end on September 1; we are going to have to continue doing this for many weeks and months."

Parents' opinions on whether masks should be required appear to have changed in the area over the past month. The Kewaskum School District is one of 35 districts that sent a survey to parents in June and July.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

I might agree with parts of Donna Gudex-Kamrath's July 16th editorial, however I take issue with her scaring people by passing on misinformation. She said, "It's been said the masks cause more harm than good."

Below are just three well-known sources that answer the following question: Does prolonged wearing of a facemask cause harm?

Answer from The American Lung Association: "Absolutely not. We wear masks all day long in the hospital. The masks are designed to be breathed through and there is no evidence that low oxygen levels occur."

"There is some evidence, however, that prolonged use of N-95 masks in patients with preexisting lung disease could cause some build-up of carbon dioxide levels in the body. People with preexisting lung problems should discuss mask wearing concerns with their health care providers."

"There is absolutely no scientific evidence that mask wearing or physical distancing weakens the immune system."

Answer from Fox News "No, not for most people. Babies and toddlers should not wear masks because they could suffo-

cate. The same goes for anyone who has trouble removing a mask without help.

"Others can wear masks without risking their health, according to experts, despite false rumors to the contrary. 'When it's humid outside, it could feel like it's harder to breathe if you're not used to wearing a mask,' said Benjamin Neuman, a professor of biology at Texas A&M University-Texarkana. But he said masks don't meaningfully decrease oxygen in the body. 'The body is quite good at adjusting to keep oxygen levels where they need to be,' he said."

"There's also no evidence that the use of masks causes fungal or bacterial infections, according to Davidson Hamer, an infectious disease expert at Boston University. Disposable face masks are meant to be used once, then thrown in the garbage. With cloth masks, it's a good idea to wash them regularly."

Answer from Vanderbilt University Medical Center "Prolonged use of any face mask, including the N95 respirator, has not been shown to cause carbon dioxide toxicity or lack of adequate oxygen in healthy people. For some persons with severe

chronic lung disease, wearing a mask may make breathing more difficult, but not because of CO2 retention.

"Recall, there are health care workers who routinely wear masks for prolonged periods as part of usual care (such as when performing surgery) and adverse effects from this practice have not been reported."

Work To Begin On County Trunk Highway D

Reconstruction of County Trunk Highway (CTH) D, from Nenno Road to the Canadian National Railroad in the

Town of Wayne, is scheduled to begin on Monday, Aug. 3 and be substantially completed by mid-November of 2020.

The prime contractor for the project is Wondra Construction, Inc., from Iron Ridge. The construction area will be closed to through traffic throughout the duration of the project. A new, off-alignment roadway will be constructed and the old road will be obliterated. Improvements will involve grading, asphalt, culvert pipes, acceleration/deceleration and bypass lanes, railroad crossing upgrade and sight line improvements.

Please follow the posted detour routes utilizing CTH W, CTH DW and State Highway 175. Local residents are asked to use extra caution when driving in the

construction area and to obey all flagmen and construction signs. Alternate routes should be utilized if possible to avoid delays.





The cumulative results from all the districts' surveys show that in June, 29 percent of parents believed that the school district should require all students to wear masks during the school day and at school-sponsored events when social distancing is not able to be maintained. The majority, 71 percent, indicated in June that they did not believe masks should be required. The Kewaskum School District's survey, which was completed in June, reflected those same answers.

However, surveys showed that in July, those numbers had shifted so that 53 percent of parents responding to the survey said they believed masks should be required and 47 percent said they should not.

"This topic is so fluid and changing rapidly that it will be hard to predict what it is a month from now from what it is today," Smasal said. "The data shows how these things are changing over a short period of time and how fluid they are."

To devise a plan to keep students and staff safe from COVID-19, the district is following advice from agencies such as the Center for Disease Control, Wisconsin Department of Health Services, Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department, Department of Public Instruction, Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association and American Academy of Pediatrics.

The district will implement various mitigation factors to help keep students and staff safe with a goal of reducing the spread of the virus. This includes following recommendations such as keeping six feet between people, with a total of 15 minutes cumulative time over the course of a day. Spacing as close as three feet may approach the benefits of six feet of space, particularly if students are wearing face coverings and are asymptomatic, according to AAP guidelines.

The advice that the district is receiving from the county and state regarding mitigation efforts is recommendations only; there are no mandates.

"Every school district, every entity, is kind of on its own to try to figure out what that means," Smasal said. "There is no blame or judgement in that statement; that is just the way it is set up. There aren't any hard and fast rules, which kind of makes it a little more difficult."

To help keep students safe, the district currently is considering requiring high school and middle school students to carry

their belongings in a backpack throughout the school day so they will not need to go to their lockers, where it will be difficult to maintain proper social distancing.

In addition, students may be asked to bring water bottles to school if drinking fountains are turned off except for the water filling stations, according to Smasal.

The current plan is for teachers to wear clear face shields.

"So the eyes and mouth, the smiling, will continue to be there for the kids," Smasal said.

The district plans to follow guidance from the Washington Ozaukee County Health Department regarding quarantines: individuals who are exposed to COVID-19 should quarantine at home for a minimum of 14 days from the date of last contact with a positive case. Because they likely were asymptomatic for several days, individuals who test positive for COVID-19 or a doctor said they likely have COVID-19 should isolate at home for a minimum of 10 days from onset AND 24 hours without symptoms.

Other safety measures the school district plans to take include: sanitizing classrooms between periods, disinfecting and cleaning buildings nightly, installing hand sanitizer stations in the schools, and educating students on the importance of health and cleanliness protocols.

To help maintain social distancing, classrooms will have staggered release times. Signage will be placed on the floors to help keep students six feet apart. Lunches will feature pre-packed items rather than self-serve buffet items.

Visitors and volunteers will not be allowed in the schools during the academic day. All field trips for

the school year are currently suspended.

Children who become sick at school will be kept separated from others while they wait for a parent to pick them up. While helping those students, school secretaries will likely wear gowns, eye-wear, masks, shields and gloves, Smasal explained during Monday's community forum, which was the second of a four-part series.

"The reason for the community forum is to share information. And we know that information is very fluid. It is changing literally on a daily basis," Smasal told those gathered at the forum. "We want to let you know that we are going to be open and we are going to do the best job we can for kids academically, and for their social and emotional mental health wellness, as well as trying to keep them safe."

The district also is using the forums to gather feedback, which will be used to create a Frequently Asked Questions document, which will be shared on the district's website.

"This is a journey and we always try to be better the next day than we were the day before," Smasal said. "We are going to continue to work hard and we have the utmost confidence in the 232 people that work in this school district that they are going to try to do their best for your children."

The community forums are held at 6 p.m. in the Kewaskum Middle School gymnasium. Upcoming topics include:

- August 3: Academic, social and emotional learning
- August 10: Safety.

William A. Kreis Jr.



The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control considered a number of season schedule models and resolved to maintain fall interscholastic opportunities with a delayed start, as well as an alternate opportunity for schools unable to start and administer the traditional fall season, at its virtual special meeting on Thursday, July 23.

In an 8-3 decision, the board approved conducting the fall sports season with a delayed start. The sports of girls golf, girls tennis, girls swimming and diving, and boys and girls cross country will be permitted to begin practice with prescribed acclimatization protocol Monday, Aug. 17. The earliest practice date for the sports of football, boys soccer, and boys and girls volleyball is Monday, Sept. 7.

"Because of the Board's action, while they can't make any guarantees that things will work out as we plan them, they have given us the opportunity to at least hope and work in that direction," WIAA executive director Dave

Anderson said. "We understand this decision will make some happy and others disappointed, but we will do our best to deliver to our membership what they have directed us to do."

The earliest dates for the first competitions are August 20 for girls golf, August 21 for girls tennis, August 25 for cross country, and girls swimming and diving. The earliest permissible date for the first boys soccer, and boys and girls volleyball contests are September 15, and the first possible football game may be scheduled Wednesday, September 23, if the first practice is conducted on September 7.

The end of the fall sports seasons remained unchanged, but the board indicated the season may or may not culminate with a traditional tournament series. The length and beginning of the tournament series will be determined in the coming days. In addition, the winter and spring season calendars were not altered.

Another component of the board's decision provides schools, which are

unable to start fall sports in 2020, an opportunity in the spring to conduct their fall seasons. The board directed the executive staff to develop details and calendars for an alternative three-sport season in the second semester of the 2020-2021 school year to be presented at a later date. The alternate three-sport season plan was derived from a proposal submitted to the WIAA executive staff by school district administrators from the southwest area of the state.

The board also approved an executive office social media initiative to promote and encourage safe practices to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. The #TeamUpToBeat-COVID campaign will launch this week in efforts to enhance the likelihood of returning to school and school activities by following safe practices. The WIAA encourages school and public involvement and interaction in the campaign on all Facebook, Instagram and Twitter platforms.

The board was informed of a staff initiative to enhance the

"Games Wanted" form on the WIAA website to provide schools with a convenient, comprehensive and user-friendly method of locating opponents and dates available due to postponements and cancellations.

Eric Russell, superintendent at Baldwin Woodville, presided over his first meeting as president during the 2020-2021 school year. Newly elected Karl Morrin, assistant superintendent at Menominee Indian, participated in his first meeting. Mike Beighley, superintendent at Whitehall, returned to the board after completing two successive terms from 2011-2017, serving as president in 2014-2015.




