Dog Groomer Opens New Business

Tina Thompson has always loved grooming dogs.

"It has been my passion since I was 14. Instead of having a paper route or babysitting, I would follow people down the street and ask

if I could groom your dog," Thompson said.

Now Thompson, who is a certified dog groomer, has her own dog grooming business, All-Around Grooming, located at 115 Main St. in Kewaskum. Known as "Auntie Tina" to the dogs, Thompson

opened the business on June 1.

Thompson fell in love with grooming dogs while living with her foster parents on Little Cedar Lake in West Bend.

"I learned about grooming through my foster parents. The first

dogs I groomed were black standard poodles. I learned how to groom on five of them: Carbon, Decker, Tank, Angel and Babe," Thompson recalled.

Agencies Respond To Mask Mandate

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, Gov. Tony Evers declared a Public Health Emergency and issued an Emergency Order on July 30 requiring Wisconsin residents ages 5 and older to wear face coverings when indoors and not in a private residence, with some exceptions as clarified and defined in the order. The order went into effect at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 1, and will expire on September 28 or by a subsequent superseding order.

"While our local health departments have been

doing a heck of a job responding to this pandemic in our communities, the fact of the matter is, this virus doesn't care about any town, city, or county boundary, and we need a statewide approach to get Wisconsin back on track," Evers said.

However, the Washington County Sheriff's Office and the Kewaskum Police Department joined a number of other law enforcement agencies across the state saying they will not enforce the order.

"Masks are not a police matter unless concealing your identity to commit a crime. The

Washington County Sheriff's Office handles approximately 35,000-40,000 calls for service annually. I believe citizens have the expectation that your sheriff's office should expend resources providing a safe

and secure community by investigating real criminal acts," Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis wrote in a statement on Facebook.

COVID Numbers

When Gov. Tony Evers declared a public health emergency on July 30, Wisconsin was experiencing a rise in COVID-19 cases, with 61 of 72 counties (84 percent) representing 96 percent of the state's

population experiencing high COVID-19 activity. This was an increase from where Wisconsin was in June, when only 19 of 72 counties (26 percent) were experiencing high COVID-19 activity.



As a librarian, I am confident in my expertise in library related matters. Adult and children's literature for one, but that is also a passion of mine. I am very proficient in databases, electronic devices and so forth. Ultimately, I feel I am a specialist in information. My degree tells me that, Masters in Library and Information Science. Besides assisting people with finding the information they want, it is just as important to be sure the information is accurate, relevant to their needs and has reputable sources to back it up. There is much misinformation out there and I enjoy helping library users discern data and make good, informative choices. During these times, I am delighted when asked which news sources I rely on or where best to find health related solutions. I consider the answers seriously because I know I am trusted to provide reliable and balanced information.

At this writing, the mask mandate for the state has just gone into effect. I am not a health care specialist but since early March, have been doing a lot of research about Covid-19 and preventative measures. I certainly do not know all the answers and understand that there are contradictory views. I do rely on reputable sources, for instance, the CDC and state and local health departments. I have previously mentioned that masks will not be required in the library unless there is a mandate from a government en-

tity. Now it has. What does that mean for users of Kewaskum Public Library?

We have signs up stating face coverings are required. Staff have been wearing masks since we have been back in the building in April. That was first based on health information from the sources listed above. Secondly, I wanted staff to become accustomed to wearing a mask during their shifts. Finally, I don't see how we could ask others to do something we weren't. I am asking all library users to follow this executive order and wear a face covering in the library. If you do not have one with you, we will provide one for you. If you choose not to follow the order, you can access our library services in other ways. Call us for curbside pickup of your holds. Access our databases online from your home. Check out eBooks using the library's Libby app. Sit outside the library on the picnic table or in your car and access our free Wi-Fi.

My staff and I will not get involved in debates about the pros and cons of mask use. What we will do is help our patrons find reputable sources if you have questions about face coverings, the order or anything else. We are here to help. Please let us do our job safely by wearing a mask in the library.

Kewaskum Village Board Discusses Building Project

At the August 3 Kewaskum Village Board meeting, the board unanimously approved the recommendation by the Shared Facilities Ad Hoc Committee to use Zimmerman Architectural Studios for additional detail of Municipal Building options.

The analysis will cost \$6,000. If the Kewaskum Public Library uses capital funds that it received

from the county, the library will pay \$999 toward the bill; the village will cover the remaining portion, according to Village Administrator Matt Heiser.

The Ad Hoc Committee met on July 27 and reviewed the executive summary provided by Zimmerman earlier this year. The summary provides some detail for two options for either renovating the municipal building or constructing a

new building on the Annex site.

The committee recommended that Zimmerman define an estimated cost to relocate staff for temporary operations if the existing building is renovated and define the estimated cost if the Annex site is utilized for a new building.

The committee recommended that the estimated cost of the Annex site must explore or address the following issues: parking concerns, including defining the cost of underground

parking at a new facility; cost of adding a second story to a new building; cost of a reduced footprint to a new building; and cost and impact of using space on First Street.

In addition, the committee recommended that Zimmerman explore options for the original site if the Annex site is used.

“As chair of the committee, I want to thank everyone that has participated on the committee,” Trustee Dave Spenner said. “We are

trying to not force a particular solution down anyone’s throat. We realize that for us to understand what is in the best interest for the village really requires further clarifications. Nobody wants to build somewhere where it is going to cause some adverse impact.”

“The solution that the Ad Hoc Committee came up with is to ask Zimmerman to further define this so that all the actual de-

cision makers have in their toolbox all the information they need to be able to figure out what could be the best solution both from efficiency and effectiveness and quality for the community, but also cost savings. It is legitimate to spend this relatively small amount of money before we invest something so large,” Spenner added.

District Continues Planning For New School Year

The Kewaskum School District held a third forum on Monday, Aug. 3, in a four-part series about reopening the schools for the 2020-2021 school year.

About 30 community members attended the forum, which was an update on the district’s plan for academic, social and emotional learning. At previous forums, the crowd was closer to 70 people.

With a statewide mask mandate now in place, nearly everyone in attendance wore a mask at Monday night’s event. Last week about half the

people wore a mask and the previous week about a quarter of those in attendance wore face coverings.

The district’s current plan is for schools to open on September 1. Parents will have the option for students to attend school in person five days a week or attend online classes.

Registration is now open for the 2020-2021 school year. The registration deadline is this Friday, but changes can still be made after that.

“We put an end date on it so we can start planning for teachers and classrooms and busing,” District Administrator James Smasal said.

But that date is not set in stone. If a parent signs their children up for virtual learning and then decides later in August that they would prefer in-person instruction, that can be arranged.

“You can change your mind at any time,” Smasal said.

“Parents can transition students between the virtual and in-person program at the beginning of trimesters,” Dr. Mark Bazata, the district’s curriculum director, explained during Monday’s forum. “Students with unique circumstances can transition between programs on a case-by-case basis.”

This week’s forum was the first time that the floor was opened to the public to ask questions at the end of a presentation by members of the district’s administrative staff. In previous sessions, community members were invited to submit written questions and suggestions following a presentation.

Approximately 170 questions had been submitted to the district regarding the district’s reopening plan. Answers to those questions have been compiled into a document of Frequently Asked Questions, which is available on the district’s website at www.kewaskumschools.org.

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

Kewaskum Village Board Holds Virtual Meeting

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Kewaskum Village Board meeting was held via video conference on Monday, Aug. 3.

It is the first time the board has met virtually since the governor's Safer At Home order was lifted in May. After the order was lifted, the board had been meeting in the Municipal Annex building, with everyone sitting at least six feet apart.

The board decided to continue meeting virtually at least until the governor's mask mandate ends. The library board will follow the village's lead and hold virtual meetings as well.

"I'm not going to wear a mask in a meeting," Village Trustee Richard Knoebel said.

Bulk Garbage Pickup

The village experienced several issues last week with its bulk garbage pickup last week, according to Village Administrator Matt Heiser.

"The village has to do a better job at communicating that recyclables should not be included as part of the bulk pickup. We had a lot of residents that were leaving cardboard or plastic bins, which were then not collected, and that generated a lot of phone traffic at the village and at the DPW," Heiser said.

Another issue is that the village experienced with the two-and-a-half days of bulk pickup was that Advanced Disposal followed a new policy this year.

"In our contract with them, we do not include as part of the village collection multi-family housing with more than five units or commercial pickup with more than two yards. In the past Advanced still included those two places in the bulk pickup, but this year they did not," Heiser said. "It was a source of frustration when stuff was left out and not collected."

Board members agreed that they would like to see Advanced

Disposal pick up from all residents next year.

"I don't think it is appropriate for us in our contract to eliminate apartment dwellers who have stuff to get rid of. They pay the same property tax through their rent to the landlord, and we collect from them," Village Trustee Dave Spenner said.

"I would agree with that issue," Village President Kevin Scheunemann said. "We may have to have the attorney look at it. Because if they do something against the contract for so many years, it becomes an expectation they essentially waive those clauses from the contract. So if it comes down to brute legal force, I want to push the issue with Advanced. I think we need to keep up the level of service that they were providing."

Delinquent Utility Accounts

As of July 30, the village had 178 customers who were delinquent on their utility accounts, according to Village Clerk Tammy Butz. Four of the customers had already set up payment plan arrangements with the village.

"So I did send out 174 letters and then an additional 31 to the cosigners," Butz said.

It totaled about \$62,000 in delinquents, which included about \$14,000 that was left over from quarter one. The village assessed late fees in the amount of about \$6,000, according to Butz.





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Area Law Enforcement Agencies Respond To State Mask Mandate

"I am not able to speak on behalf of other municipal police agencies in Washington County, but your sheriff's office will not be enforcing a governmental mandate of what you wear," Schulteis added.

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop has directed his officers to only respond to complaints from business owners in the community.

"Complaints by other patrons should be directed to store management and, if not handled sufficiently by store management, then the

complainant can forward their concern to the public health department for follow up. As always, our department will enforce any disorderly conduct or trespassing complaints that may arise out of this mandate," Bishop said.

The Kewaskum Village Board showed unanimous support for Bishop on the matter during a board meeting on Monday, Aug. 3.

"I think We should let Chief Bishop do the way he thinks he should do it. If he decides that someone should be reprimanded for it, that is entirely up to him," Village Trustee Richard Laubach said. "Let the chief do his job."

On July 31, the Wisconsin Attorney General's Office released guidance to law enforcement agencies in the State of Wisconsin regarding the emergency order.

"The goal is voluntary compliance. For intentional violations of the face covering order, enforcement will depend on the factual setting," the guidance states.

The emergency order has over 20 exceptions when a mask is not required, such as while eating or drinking, while swimming, when entering a bank or financial institution, if you have trouble breathing, or if you have a medical condition, disability or a mental health condition.

"Violations of the governor's face covering order, standing alone, are not subject to criminal penalty. Instead, an intentional violation is enforceable through a civil forfeiture of no more than \$200. Such a violation may be reported to a local public health official for follow-up or to a district attorney, who has statutory authority under Wis. Stat. § 978.05(2) to prosecute state forfeiture actions," the guidance states.

Other area agencies that have stated they will not enforce the governor's order include the sheriffs in Fond du Lac and Dodge counties, as well as the Campbellsport Police Department. The West Bend Police Department has stated that it will respond to complaints and forward to the District Attorney's Office upon completion of the investigation.

"The majority of the law enforcement in the state is not going to respond to these complaints," Trustee Richard Knoebel said at the Kewaskum Village Board meeting on August 3. "If a person has a health issue, they can't even ask them what's wrong with them. That's federal law. So most businesses are saying they are assuming that if you don't have a mask that you have a health issue."

Knoebel said he is concerned about neighbors calling on neighbors.

"I don't want to see people getting in fights with the business owners or with other people. I had someone confront my wife the other day about this even before this mandate came in.

This lady was obnoxious, and I don't want to see that happening. It's just not right," Knoebel said.

Still, local law enforcement agencies encourage residents to wear face coverings when possible.

"I encourage everyone to make their own medical choices based upon what you believe is best for you and your family, but also carefully balance the sensitivity of others. Wearing a mask can make others feel more comfortable around you, and potentially reduce the spread of COVID-19. I encourage all individuals to be sensitive to one another and wear a mask where they deem appropriate," Schulteis said.

In Kewaskum, the police department encourages everyone to wear one whenever possible and unable to maintain proper social distancing.

"Officers of the Kewaskum Police Department will wear masks whenever possible," Bishop said.

In July, a number of retailers, including local supermarket Geidel's Piggly Wiggly, began asking customers to wear face coverings while in their stores. Employees at Geidel's Piggly Wiggly had been wearing masks for months.

"The data is what drives our decisions, and that data tells us we have significant community spread in Wisconsin and need to take statewide action," said DHS Secretary-designee Andrea Palm. "Community spread means that any interaction out in the community can mean exposure, and because people can spread COVID-19 without symptoms or even knowing they are sick, we need to take universal precautions in order for wearing face coverings to be effective."

Recent scientific studies show that wearing face coverings is effective

in preventing the spread of COVID-19.

"Staying home, limiting interactions, practicing physical distancing, and washing your hands thoroughly are still the most effective ways to stop the spread," said Dr. Ryan Westergaard, Wisconsin's chief medical officer and the state epidemiologist for communicable diseases. "But we learn something new about this virus every day. A growing number of scientific studies tell us that face coverings, when used correctly and consistently by a large percentage of the community, are extremely effective for preventing the spread of COVID-19 through respiratory droplets."

"We've said all along that we're going to let science and public health experts be our guide in responding to this pandemic, and we know that masks and face coverings will save lives. While I know emotions are high when it comes to wearing face coverings in public, my job as governor is to put people first and to do what's best for the people of our state, so that's what I am going to do," Evers said.

Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann stated on July 30 that he believes that the governor's declaration of a public health emergency grabs too much executive power.

"Make no mistake, this order is way broader than a mandatory mask policy," Schoemann said. "With many businesses and organizations across Washington County already requiring masks, this unnecessary power grab adds to the fear which is plaguing our county, state and nation. Another public health emergency gives the governor all the tools he needs to close schools, mandate virtual learning, issue another safer-at-home order or worse."

Wisconsin COVID-19 Numbers

On Monday, Aug. 3, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services website showed that 61 of 72 counties were still experiencing high COVID-19 activity.

However, the state saw a dip in daily number of new cases on Monday, Aug. 3, when there were 404 new cases reported in the state, according to the state health department's website. That brought the seven-day average of new COVID-19 cases down to 844. That is about an 8 per-

cent decrease from the previous week on July 27, when the seven-day average of new cases each day was 914.

As of Monday, Aug. 3, a total of 966,763 people had been tested in the state, according to the state health department's website. Of those, there were 55,328 who tested positive while 911,435 tested negative. Of the confirmed cases in Wisconsin, 44,495 (80.4 percent) had recovered and 9,866 (17.8 percent) were active cases.

There have been a total of 36 confirmed cases in the Kewaskum zip code as of August 3, according to the Washington Ozaukee County Health Department website.

The Wisconsin Health Department's website reported on August 3, of those with COVID-19, there had been a total of 949 (1.7 percent) deaths in Wisconsin. A total of 4,732 (8.6 percent) had been hospitalized at some point in the state while testing positive for COVID-19.

Larson Continues Historic Season With Rayce Rudeen All Star Triumph —Davis Moves To Top Of All-Time PDTR Sprint Car A-Main Win List

The hottest Sprint Car driver in the world, Kyle Larson of Elk Grove, CA, paid his first visit to The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth for the second annual Ollie's Bargain Outlet All Star Circuit of Champions-Interstate Racing Association Rayce Rudeen Foundation \$26,000-to-win event on Thursday, July 30. He promptly shined over a stellar field to claim his sixth straight A-main victory in All Star Series competition and his 26th overall triumph on dirt during the 2020 season in the highest-paying Winged Sprint Car race in Wisconsin history.

In the companion, non-points Kristine Hartmann Pleasant View Realty 26-lap Plymouth Dirt Track Racing 360 Sprint Car A-main, two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee nipped the hard-charging Travis Arenz of Sheboygan by mere feet. With the win, he claimed his second overall Midwest Sprint Car Association main event victory of the 2020 campaign and first A-main victory of the year at Plymouth.

All eyes were on Larson throughout the night

as his has been a dominant force everywhere he has raced this season whether in the 410 Winged Sprint Car ranks with the All Star Circuit of Champions and World of Outlaws Sprint Car Series or with the USAC Midget Series, with victories coming in droves for the 28-year-old racing phenom.

After laying down the fastest qualifying lap of the night with a circuit of 11.459 seconds around the third-mile clay oval, Larson placed fourth in the fourth 10-lap heat race. He won the second four-lap dash to start on the outside of the front row for the \$26,000-to-win Rayce Rudeen Foundation 35-lap A-main.

The race got off to a rough start as Austin McCarl of Altoona, Iowa flipped into the turn two catch fence on the initial start and Tyler Courtney of Indianapolis, IN, spun in turn four on the second start attempt.

When the race finally got under way, polesitter Gio Scelzi of Fresno, CA, bolted into the lead with Larson following in second and Gio's brother Dominic Scelzi of Fresno, CA, who started third, settling into third in the early going.

With Gio Scelzi running the cushion, Larson

worked the low and middle groove to reel in the leader on lap six. On lap seven, the leaders encountered heavy lapped traffic, which allowed Larson to close even further.

On lap 12, Larson pounced as he pulled off a well-executed slide job in turn four to wrestle the lead away from Gio Scelzi. Meanwhile, Kerry Madsen of St. Mary's, New South Wales, Australia, who started seventh, was marching his way to the front of the pack along the high groove.

On lap 14, Madsen worked his way into fourth before charged past Dominic Scelzi into third on lap 16 and eventually powering around Gio Scelzi for second in thick lapped traffic.

As Larson appeared to be bidding his time in getting around the slower car of Tyler Courtney for a number of laps, Madsen closed to within two car lengths of Larson on lap 22. However, once Larson cleared Courtney on lap 24, he quickly pulled away from Madsen to build up a quarter-straightaway cushion on lap 26.

Larson, who has six NASCAR Cup Series victories to his credit, skillfully worked his way through lapped traffic over the final nine laps to score his 20th career All Star Series victory. It was his 11th triumph in 17 All Star starts in 2020 in the third-ever All Star event to be contested at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

"This feels really good," Larson said in victory lane. "I had to earn it for sure. The track was extremely

technical and a lot of fun. The curb was just not going anywhere and it was getting trickier and trickier to run. The lappers were all so even that I couldn't get by for the longest time, but I was able to follow Sunshine (Tyler Courtney) past a few guys, so that helped.

"I was just making a lot of mistakes, but the track was tough, so I didn't know how close second was to me," he said. "Once I got past Tyler though, I felt like I got a good rhythm going again and lapped some pretty decent cars there toward the end. We just had a really good car tonight. It's not often that you get to chase this kind of money in Sprint Cars, especially this year, so thanks to the Rudeen family and what they've done for this race. It's really cool."

Madsen, who appeared that he might overtake Larson for the lead in the middle stages of the race, finished a full straightaway behind in second at the finish.

"We had a great race car and we were really running Kyle down for the lead," Madsen said after the race. "I was trying to be patient and pick my spots, but it just didn't turn out to be our night."

Gio Scelzi placed third after a strong run in the early laps of the race.

"I felt pretty good in the early going running the top then Kyle got past me on the bottom, which surprised me because I didn't think the bottom would be that good," Gio Scelzi said. "I just have to do a better job in these races. Third is not bad, but we want

to win."

Dominic Scelzi came home fourth and fourth starter Cory Eliason of Visalia, CA, placed fifth.

In the 26-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main, 2018 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champ Justin Miller of Plymouth, who started on the pole, second starter Kurt Davis and fourth starter Adam Miller of Plymouth dueling three-wide for the entire first lap before Justin Miller surged ahead in turn one on lap two.

One lap later, Davis ventured up to the high groove to challenge Miller for the top spot. Miller and Davis battled side by side over the next three circuits before Miller eventually regained control of the lead just as the leaders hit slower traffic on lap 10.

Meanwhile, current PDTR 360 Sprint Car point leader Travis Arenz of Sheboygan, who started fifth, vaulted into third on lap 15 before surging past Davis into second on lap 18.

One lap later, rookie Alex Pokorski of West Bend spun in turn two to bring out the first of three caution flags. On the restart, Davis bolted back up to the high line to power around Arenz into second before surging past Miller into the lead in turn four on lap 20.

The second caution flag appeared on lap 21 when Adam Miller and Matt Vandevere of Zion, IL, spun in turn four. One

lap later, the third and final caution flag flew when Tyler Davis of South Milwaukee spun in turn two.

On the restart, Arenz charged in to apply heavy pressure along the high line as Davis switched to the inside lane. On the final lap, Arenz pulled even with Davis entering turn one. Davis battled back to regain the top spot going into turn three.

Arenz didn't back down as he reeled in Davis in the final corner and pulled alongside heading for the checkered flag. However, Davis held on to nip Arenz by a half-car length to secure his 24th career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory and record 62nd career MSA main event win. The triumph pushed Davis past Danny Schlafer of Sussex and to sole possession of first place on the all-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main win list.

Arenz placed second, 2017 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh moved up from his sixth starting spot to finish third, Justin Miller finished fourth and seventh starter **Shane Weninger of Kewaskum** placed fifth.

The sixth PDTR racing program of the 2020 season drew a total of 68 cars, including 41 All Star Circuit of Champions-Interstate Racing Association 410 Sprint Cars and 27 PDTR-MSA 360 Sprint Cars.

On the restart, Jack Vanderboom of Dousman and **Doug Wondra of Campbellsport** got together in turn three, which sent Vanderboom flipping on lap five.

Davis pulled off an impressive low move in turn four on lap six to wrestle the lead away from Wondra. Meanwhile, 2017 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh was using the high groove to vault into second from his sixth starting spot on lap seven.

Just as the leaders were about to catch the back of the field, the

checkered flag flew with Arenz claiming his third career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory and ninth overall Midwest Sprint Car Association main event triumph.

McMullen wound up second, Davis was third, 2008 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett took fourth after starting eighth and 2011 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Howards Grove charged up from his 16th starting spot to take fifth.

Polesitter Justin Ritchie of New London seized the lead in the opening lap of the 25-lap Late Model A-main. On lap two, Letizia used a big run on the frontstretch to dive under Ritchie for the lead in turn one. As Letizia encountered lapped traffic on lap eight, Ritchie began to

close. On lap 12, Ritchie moved to withing striking distance in heavy lapped traffic before making contact with Letizia along the front stretch, which caused Ritchie to spin into the infield and bring out the first of four caution flags.

The third caution appeared on lap 22 when Mullen spun in turn three. On the restart, Ritchie, Eric Michaels of Cleveland and Charlie Schmidt of Cedar Grove collided exiting turn four to bring out the fourth and final caution.

On the restart, Letizia held strong to pull away from Schmidt over the final four laps en route to his third career PDTR Late Model A-main victory and first main event win at Plymouth since 2014.

Schmidt was second. **continued on page 12**





Brad Mueller of Random Lake, who started fourth, placed third. Buhler took fourth and 2017 PDTR B Mod champion Justin Green of Sheboygan Falls placed fifth in his first-ever night behind the wheel of his father Glen Blanke's 4B Late Model after starting 15th.

In the 25-lap B Mod A-main, rookie outside front row starter Trevor Frank of Sheboygan grabbed the lead from the start. The first of three cautions appeared on lap four when Steve Lorier of Sheboygan stopped in turn three.

On the restart, fourth starter Jesse Cullen of Chilton moved up from his fourth starting spot to take second with a move along the high line before polesitter **Brandon Kneprath of Kewaskum** battled back to challenge for the runner-up spot.

The second caution appeared on lap 10 when Patrick Hanson of Sheboygan Falls spun in turn four. Two laps later, defending PDTR B Mod champ Tim Warner of Fond du Lac and Cullen made contact, which sent Cullen spinning in turn four to bring out the third caution flag.

On lap 13, Maas, who started sixth, began to make his presence felt as he moved into second along the high groove. One lap later, Maas, who owns one career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victory, worked the inside groove to work past Frank for the lead with a nifty low move in turn three.

Kneprath wasn't finished though, as he worked around Frank and closed on Maas over the final circuits. On lap 23, Kneprath ducked under Maas and stayed within striking distance all the way to the checkered flag before Maas, a former Winged Super Modified racer at Plymouth, prevailed by a one-car margin to seize his first career PDTR B Mod A-main victory.

Kneprath recorded a career-best second-place finish, Warner placed third, Frank equaled his career-best A-main finish by placing fourth and 11th starter Gary Glander of Sheboygan Falls placed fifth.

Jack Vanderboom won the 15-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car B-main.

The seventh PDTR racing program of the 2020 season drew a total of 80 cars, including 32 PDTR 360 Sprint Cars, 16 Late Models, 17 Grand Nationals and 15 B Mods.

The PDTR 360 Sprint Car, Late Model, Grand National and B Mod divisions will next be in action on Saturday, Aug. 8, at The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth.

Dog Groomer Opens New Business

Grooming dogs became a constant in Thompson's life as she moved to different foster homes during her childhood. As an adult, she worked as a dog groomer for businesses in Barton, West Bend and Kewaskum before opening her own business.

"I took the best of everything I learned from all the places I worked over the years and put them in here," Thompson said. "It is always safety, honesty and compassion for the dog and the owner."

Thompson is certified in Reiki for hands-on healing. The holistic, ancient healing practice can be used on humans as well as animals to help treat anxiety and to ease symptoms associated with anxiety, old injuries, pinched nerves, slipped discs, ACLs and surgeries, according to Thompson.

"The first time I ever did Reiki was on a dog named Roscoe who lives down the street from me. He had anxiety and he fell asleep on my table," Thompson said.

Thompson has been a member of the International Professional Dog Groomers, Inc.

"It is the Olympics of dog grooming. We com-

pete against groomers from other countries," Thompson said. "It takes skill to work on a moving target."

In 1997, she competed through the organization against 11 other groomers from 11 different states in a mixed breed category and took first place.

"When they said Kristina Thompson, first place for mixed breed, I was looking around the room for another Kristina Thompson," she said.

Winning the award took a lot of work.

"That was a lot of prepping for one client's dog. I used a complete mutt of a dog. His name was Fudgy Bear, and every four weeks he was in the shop, with me prepping him. It was a lot of work and commitment from the owner and commitment on my part," Thompson said.

She feels it is important to continue educating herself on dog grooming.

Thompson, who is a member of the Wisconsin State Professional Dog Groomers Association, is certified in First Aid for Pets by the Emergency Medical Services. She has attended courses such as the All American Spring Dog Grooming Contest and

Seminar. This past May she attended the Barbicide COVID-19 certification for the Professional Beauty Industry training.


In addition to continuing her education, she also hopes to get to know the other dog groomers in the area well.

"I would love to be able to be on a first-name basis with the other groomers in the area," said Thompson, who hopes to collaborate and even carpool to different grooming seminars with the competition.

She is catering her new business to local residents and small businesses by incorporating other small businesses into her own. For example, she is selling Dan Stoffel's Drumlin Honey in her shop. She also has homemade dog treats baked by a local 11-year-old entrepreneur. And she carries natural bug sprays and repellants.

Each month she hopes to offer something special for her clients, such as Reiki, photos or free teeth brushing. She hopes to soon carry a stock of tennis balls, light-up collars, leashes, bandanas and walking sticks.

"I want to cater to Kettle Moraine hikers with their dogs getting out and about," Thompson said. "We live in the heart of the Kettle Moraine so there are a lot of people out with their dogs on the trails."

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM ORDINANCE NO. 20-08

ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RECREATE SECTIONS 10-3 OF CHAPTER 10 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE ON ANIMALS

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Section 10-3 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to Animals, should be repealed and recreated as follows:

Sec. 10-3. - Records required by kennels, pet shops; licensing. a) No person operating a kennel or pet shop or other person selling pets within the village shall sell or place such animals without first preparing accurate and complete records of such sale. Such records are necessary in tracing the location and movement of animals suspected of rabies exposure. b) Owning or housing more than three dogs is

allowed only subject to Sec. 10-3(a) and only in business zoning districts for commercial pet shops, kennels, or professional pet or animal care facilities. Owning or housing more than three dogs is prohibited for properties zoned as residential. The annual kennel fee shall be as set from time to time by the village board for any business owning or housing four or more dogs. A conditional use permit is required for first issuance of a kennel license. 1) All animals and animal quarters are kept in a

clean and sanitary condition and so maintained as to eliminate objectionable odors. 2) Animals are maintained in quarters so constructed as to prevent escape. Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the

decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict. Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law. Passed and adopted by the Village Board of

Notice of Partisan Primary and Sample Ballots

OFFICE OF THE WASHINGTON COUNTY CLERK TO THE VOTERS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Washington County on August 11, 2020, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office under the appropriate party, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, if any, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary, the voter shall select the party of his or her choice. Voting for candidates of more than one party may invalidate the ballot. The voter must cast a vote for individual candidates.

Where Optical Scan Voting is used

- If a party preference is designated, and votes are cast for ballot candidates of another party or write-in votes are cast in another party, only votes cast in the designated party will count. If a party preference is not designated, and votes are cast for candidates (or write-in votes are cast) in more than one party, no votes will be counted

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an electronic ballot marking device to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the party of his or her choice. The voter shall then touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils a paper or optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.




