## Evan Doherty Hits Two Holes-In-One

### – Two Aces Hit Within 24 Hours

Evan Doherty had not planned on golfing on Saturday, Aug. 22.

He had twisted his ankle the previous weekend, so he did not play in the softball tournament that he was supposed to play in that day. Instead, he hung out with some friends in the Hon-E-Kor clubhouse in Kewaskum.

One of the guys suggested that they play some golf. It was getting late, and Doherty did not have his clubs with him, but he agreed to play a round on the white nine with the group.

When they got to the 16th hole, Doherty took his friend's six iron out of the bag. He prepared to tee off at the par-three, 203-yard hole.

Doherty had played the hole countless times before. He had come close to landing the ball

in the hole numerous times. But it had never gone in.

Until now. "I hit it just the way I wanted to, with a six iron, with just a little draw. I was going right at the flag," Doherty said.

And the ball went in. It was a hole-in-one!

Between the people in the group, there are a few different takes on how the ball went in.

"I thought it hit, bounce, bounce, and then hit the flag and went in," Doherty said. "They said they think it landed and rolled in."

Regardless of the details, they all saw the ball go in the hole.

"It is always unexpected. But that one... I wasn't even planning on playing, I wasn't using my own clubs," Doherty said.

Doherty's friend, Mike Korth, has been trying to

sell him the six iron ever since.

"I don't need it any more — it is all used up," Doherty keeps telling him.

When they finished the round, the group went back into the clubhouse. They had been playing a scramble, where they used the best shot at each hole, so Doherty did not have his own score for the entire round.

But he knew his score for that 16th hole, and so he kept up the well known tradition of buying a round of drinks for everyone at the bar after hitting a hole-in-one.

"It is just proper etiquette; I had to buy drinks for everyone," he said. "It is a tradition, and for the guy who gets the hole-in-one, it can rack up a pretty penny pretty quick."

However, since it was so late in the evening,

the place had pretty much cleared out. So Doherty celebrated with his group of friends and the staff at Hon-E-Kor.

## Electors Approve Kewaskum School District Budget

### – Tax Levy Expected To Go Down About 5 Percent

The Kewaskum School District tax levy for 2020-21 is expected to decrease by 5.22 percent, or \$628,004 from the district's levy for 2019-20.

The total levy for 2020-21 is expected to be \$11,407,369. That is down from last year's budget of \$12,035,373, Julie Thoreson, business manager for the district, reported at the district's annual meeting and budget hearing on Monday, Aug. 24.

At the meeting, electors unanimously approved the proposed tax levy. Electors living within the school district are able to vote at the annual meeting.

This year's annual meeting, which was held in the Kewaskum High School auditorium, had the lowest turnout in recent history. This year there was a total of 20 electors who voted on the

budget, compared to 49 electors that voted at last year's meeting. In 2018, 30 electors voted.

The approved tax levy includes \$9,093,694 for operating expenses and capital outlay; \$2,206,550 for debt retirement; and \$107,125 for the operations of the Community Services Fund.

The district's fund balance on June 30 was \$4,019,351, up from the balance of \$3,192,603 on July 1, 2019, according to Thoreson.

The budget will not be finalized until October, when the budget is updated to reflect changes in enrollment and state information. At that time, as other school boards do across Wisconsin, the Kewaskum Board of Education will set the final tax levy.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

### Community Notification

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is releasing the following information pursuant to WI Statute 301.46(2m) which authorizes law enforcement agencies to inform the public of a sex offender's release when, in the discretion of the agency, the release of information will enhance public safety, awareness and protection. The individual who appears on this notification has been convicted of a sex offense. Further, his criminal history places him in a classification level which reflects a low potential to re-offend.

Ellis R. Fields was released from prison on August 28. He will reside at 1725 County Highway NN in the

Township of Jackson. This home has been used by DOC for several years as a "halfway house" for recently released inmates.

In 2001, Fields was convicted of Child Enticement and Second Degree Sexual Assault of Child. Fields will be on probation until March 20, 2041, and will be monitored closely by WI-DOC Division of Community. Fields will have numerous rules and restrictions to follow including wearing a live tracking GPS unit. The GPS monitoring unit will have exclusion zones setup alerting WI-DOC if there is a violation of the exclusion zones rules.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is not wanted by law enforce-

ment at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but rather it is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Sex offenders have always lived in our communities; but it was not until the Sex Offender Registration and Community Notification Law was enacted that law enforcement was able to share this information with the community. More information can be located at <https://apps.doc.wi.gov/public/faq>.

He grew up in West Bend and has worked at Hon-E-Kor for 13 years, so he was invited to the employee party.

For the event, Doherty and the other employees played a round of golf.

When he got to the red three, Doherty knew it was a par-three hole. He also knew that the last time he was at a par-three hole, he had hit a hole-in-one.

This time he had his own clubs. He took out his nine iron to tee off for the 155-yard hole.

As soon as he hit the ball, he had the same feeling he had the day before.

"I hit it, and I knew it was a good hit. But it is so unexpected, that you never think it is going to go in the hole," Doherty said.

After all, if the ball actually hits the hole, it could lip out. It has to be at the perfect speed.

"So I hit it, and this is more of a fun social event, so I was not really paying attention," Do-

herty said.

But after he hit the ball, Doherty watched it spin, take one hop, spin and disappear into the hole.

It was another hole-in-one!

This time there were lots of people who witnessed the feat.

And lots of people to help Doherty celebrate.

"It is getting expensive," said Doherty, who had to celebrate with people in his golf league later in the week as well. "Just in the good nature of golf tradition, I have to give back, for good karma. It is all a good time," he said with a smile.

Doherty's friends have given him some ribbing about the incredible feat(s), and said this second hole-in-one counted since he was using his own clubs this time.

Doherty doesn't know what brought about the streak of good luck. He wasn't wearing lucky socks. He didn't have on a lucky shirt or anything like that.

"My ankle has been so tender. That is why I wasn't even going to play," he said, trying to think of an explanation.

Perhaps it was pure skill. After all, Doherty, who is 34, has been

## Beware Of Scammers Impersonating Utility Companies

Looking to save money right now? No matter how COVID has impacted your finances, be sure to say "no" to this scam deal. This summer, BBB Scam Tracker has received reports of con artists impersonating internet, cable tv, or electricity company representatives. They claim to offer a great deal or rebate on your bill, but it's really a way to trick unsuspecting customers into shelling out hundreds of dollars.

### How The Scam Works

You receive an unsolicited call offering you reduced rates on your cable bill. Speaking to the "customer service representative" may be quite convincing. Many scammers use the same hold music as big-name cable companies and duplicate a company's caller menu.

When speaking with the representative, they seem very professional. The caller explains that the company is offering a special promotion. If you pay several months

upfront, you can receive a discounted monthly rate or free perks, like premium cable channels. In another version of the con, the caller claims that you overpaid on a recent bill and are due for a rebate.

Then, things get fishy. Instead of using the payment information your cable company already has, they ask you to purchase pre-paid debit cards to make the upfront payment. Don't do it! If you purchase the cards and send the information to the caller, your money will be lost for good.

### How To Avoid A Utility Impersonation Con

•Never make payments with prepaid debit cards or gift cards. Scammers prefer these payment methods because there is nothing you can do to get your money back. Remember, legitimate companies almost always accept checks and credit cards as the primary means of payment.

•If someone shows up at your doorstep, verify

their identity. If you weren't expecting a visit, ask the person for their ID and then call your cable company to verify that they are an employee.

•When in doubt, verify special deals with your utility company. If you are unsure about a promotional offer you've been presented with, get the customer service number from the company's official website or your latest bill. Call the company directly to make sure the offer is real.

# Electors Approve Kewaskum School District Budget

Board President Jim Leister served as chairperson at the annual meeting. Electors voted to keep the salary of school board members at the current rate of \$3,150 per year, and reimbursement of a school board member is not to exceed \$125 per day

when duties require the school board member to be absent from regular employment.

Electors also decided that the 2021 annual meeting will be held on Monday, Aug. 23, 2021, beginning at 7 p.m.

At this year's meeting, following the budget

hearing, district administration gave a report on the district's plan to re-open schools during the COVID-19 pandemic. The district plans to offer both in-person classroom instruction and a virtual program.

To bridge learning gaps that may have oc-

curred while the school buildings were closed down in spring, the district plans to realign its curriculum to address any essential learning that was not covered during the spring trimester. There will be a strong focus on social and emotional well

being for students and staff focusing on belonging, connection and anxiety reduction.

During the presentation, administration explained how students and staff members will be quarantined if there is an COVID-19 outbreak during the school year.

If a school needs to shut down, the plan is to provide virtual instruction for all students. The district plans to provide alternative internet access for families who do not have access, as well as provide paper learning materials for those families.

# Sifting, Sifting, Sifting

Wheat seed is surrounded by a husk which must be removed to use the wheat. In Jesus' time harvested wheat seed was beaten with flails to loosen the husk, or chaff. Throwing baskets of gathered beaten wheat and chaff up into the air allowed the wind to blow away the lighter chaff, while the heavier wheat kernels fell back into the basket to be used. In the not so distant American past, bundles of cut and dried wheat stalks were shaken in a threshing machine until the husks

were separated. These days, a combine does it all, from cutting the wheat to separating the chaff, in one quick process.

During the Last Supper, celebrated at Passover, Jesus let Peter know that a time would soon come when he would be tested for his allegiance to Jesus. "Simon, Simon! Indeed, Satan has asked for you, that he may sift you as wheat. But I have prayed for you, that your faith should not fail and when you have returned to Me, strengthen your

brethren." (Luke 22: 31-32 New King James Version, NKJV)

The VOICE says it this way: "Simon, Simon, how Satan has pursued you, that he might make you part of his harvest. But I have prayed for you. I have prayed that your faith will hold firm and that you will recover from your failure and become a source of strength for your brothers here."

Considering people as Satan's harvest is a mind-bending concept! What do we do with a harvest? Eat it! By ex-

tension, Satan wants to eat us. If Satan is the embodiment of evil, then we will be consumed by evil.

I really like looking at the many Bible translations of one passage. A world of understanding opens up when you dive into those varying ways of interpreting the words of the original texts. The Complete Jewish Bible doesn't just suggest Peter's return to Jesus; in verse 32 it speaks of him returning in repentance. "... And you, once you have turned back in repentance, strengthen your brothers!" That puts a whole new spin on the matter! Peter will need to repent from turning away from Jesus. Peter never even considered he could betray Jesus; that would never happen! But in the same conversation Jesus warns him he will deny knowing Jesus not just once, but three times.

If we partner this idea of denying Jesus more than once with the concept of winnowing or separating the chaff from the good wheat, we can see that removing

the chaff from our lives might not be a onetime deal. Just like the woodwright who needs to remove the undesirable elements from the original piece of wood in order to get at the beautiful piece he is working to reveal, we all need to be sifted many times during our lifetime as Christ's brothers and sisters in order to be honed to our optimal position in Christ.

The Message Bible gives us a different view of verse 32: "Simon, I've prayed for you in particular that you not give in or give out. When you have come through the time of testing, turn to your companions and give them a fresh start." We see the Apostle Paul encouraging the Ephesian church similarly in chapter six, verse 18, "Pray for your brothers and sisters. Keep your eyes open. Keep each other's spirits up so that no one falls behind or drops out." (MSG) So not only is Jesus warning Peter there will come times that will test his faith, he is also exhorting him to support other

believers in their times of sifting.

Years later Peter would write: "Keep a cool head. Stay alert. The Devil is poised to pounce, and would like nothing better than to catch you napping. Keep your guard up. You're not the only ones plunged into these hard times. It's the same with Christians all over the world. So keep a firm grip on the faith. The suffering won't last forever. It won't be long before this generous God who has great plans for us in Christ — eternal and glorious plans they are! — will have you put together and on your feet for good. He gets the last word; yes, he does." (1 Peter 5:8-11 MSG)

Peter came through his sifting and still today encourages us to not give up in these difficult times when we — and the world — are being sifted. In the end we will be thankful for the sifting we have endured and we will, in turn, encourage others as they bear the sifting in their lives.

## UW Health Urges Eye Safety And Care For Students With Heavy Screen Time

As many districts begin the school year with virtual learning, students' time in front of screens may increase significantly.

According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, kids age 8-18 already spend an average of 7.5 hours in front of screens each day for entertainment. So, UW Health ophthalmologists are offering tips for parents whose children prepare to increase their screen time through virtually learning.

The American Academy of Ophthalmology recommends the 20-20-20 rule to reduce eye strain (eye fatigue from

looking at screens too long). That rule is for every 20 minutes you look at a screen, take a break and look at something at least 20 feet away for 20 seconds. This allows your eyes to rest.

Take breaks outside or do physical activities. Breaks are key to allow the eyes to rest and not feel dry. The CDC recommends kids get at least 60 minutes of physical activity each day.

Make sure your child's glasses or eye prescription is up to date. UW Health officials recommend yearly eye exams if your child wears glasses, or a vision screen at school or by

your child's primary care doctor if they have normal vision.

Monitor your child for fatigue and headaches because these could be signs of side effects from screen use that could need a doctor's attention.

"COVID-19 has impacted every part of our lives, including the time students will spend in front of screens for virtual learning this fall," said Dr. Yasmin Bradford, UW Health pediatric ophthalmologist. "The key is balancing screen time with other activities. To take care of your eyes, take frequent breaks."

### PASTA POMODORO

**INGREDIENTS**

- 1 (16 ounce) package angel hair pasta
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/2 onion, chopped
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 cups roma tomatoes, diced
- 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

**DIRECTIONS**

- Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add pasta and cook for 8 minutes or until al dente; drain.
- Pour olive oil in a large deep skillet over high-heat. Saute onions and garlic until lightly browned. Reduce heat to medium-high and add tomatoes, vinegar and chicken broth; simmer for about 8 minutes.
- Stir in red pepper, black pepper, basil and cooked pasta, tossing thoroughly with sauce. Simmer for about 5 more minutes and serve topped with grated cheese.





## How Youth Organizations Can Find Funding For Programs Amid COVID-19 Physical Restrictions

As cities and towns across the country assess their back-to-school plans, athletic teams and afterschool programs are looking at how fall sports and extra-curricular activities can move forward

Review the attached menu. Click on the link to fill out the survey to order food if you are interested in receiving meals for one or more of your children.

The survey must be filled out by midnight on Wednesday. Families are able to select the days they would like breakfast and lunch for the upcoming week.

Please note that the district does not offer breakfast at Farmington Elementary or i4Learning. Therefore, those children are not able to select breakfast; only

lunch is available at those schools.

### To Pick Up Meals:

Meals will be ready for pick up on Monday between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m. at Kewaskum High School.

Open your vehicle trunk for staff to place the food in your vehicle.

If Monday is not a scheduled school day, pick-up will take place on the next scheduled school day.

# September Is Preparedness Month In Wisconsin

Disasters can strike without warning, and knowing what to do during an emergency can mean the difference between life and death. Gov. Tony Evers has declared September Preparedness Month in Wisconsin, and ReadyWisconsin is encouraging everyone to spend time this month developing their disaster plan.

"When an emergency happens, quick decisions often need to be made to ensure you and your loved ones remain safe," said Dr. Darrell L. Williams, Wisconsin Emergency Management administrator. "Having a plan that's been practiced and regularly reviewed by everyone can save you precious time. Remember that disasters don't wait, so make your plan today."

ReadyWisconsin offers several resources to help families with the process of creating plan at <https://readywisconsin.wi.gov>. Your plan should focus on how to safely exit your home, office, or school, identifying

safe meeting places, and making sure everyone knows how to communicate if you are separated. Plans should be regularly reviewed and practiced by everyone in your family.

In addition to creating a plan, building an emergency kit is an important part of making sure your home is prepared for a disaster. Kits should include items such as bottled water and non-perishable foods, first aid supplies and medications, and safety items such as flashlights, extra batteries, and a NOAA Weather Radio. Your kit should be kept in a safe place where it can be easily accessed, just in case you need to leave home quickly during a disaster.

Preparedness month also stresses the importance of getting children ready for an emergency. With the start of the school year different in communities across the state because of COVID-19, now is a great time to review and revise plans for what to do if an emergency were to take place during the school day.

"Children may not know what to do during an emergency, so it's up to parents, teachers and others to help them find their way to safety," Williams said. "During Preparedness Month, we encourage families to make sure kids have the tools needed to stay safe."

To help prepare students, ReadyWisconsin offers the Student Tools for Emergency Planning (STEP) program to schools across the state each year. Designed for 4th and 5th grade classrooms, this curriculum developed by FEMA has helped teach thousands of Wisconsin students about how they can prepare their families for a disaster. More information on STEP, including information on how schools can register for this free program, is available at <https://readywisconsin.wi.gov/step/>.

# Flags Fly Over Reigle Family Park

A flag raising ceremony was held on Wednesday, Aug. 26, at Reigle Family Park in Kewaskum.

Members of American Legion Post 384 led the ceremony at the new village park, which is being developed by volunteers. Those in attendance said the Pledge of Allegiance after the American flag was raised and then watched as the Wisconsin flag and then the Kewaskum flag were raised.

The three flagpoles are located at the entrance of the new park. The flagpoles were donated by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club, American Legion Post 384 and the family of Bob Zarling.

The flagpole in the center, which is 30 feet tall and flies the American flag was donated by the family of Zarling, who passed away in 2019. Zarling was a veteran, a member of the American Legion and a longtime member of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club. At a public hearing when the Village Board was considering accepting the donation of land for Reigle Family Park, Zarling spoke eloquently in favor of the village accepting the land and providing a resource for the youth and the future members of the community.

A plaque on the flagpole has the following message engraved on it: "In Loving Memory of Bob Zarling 4/26/31 - 3/5/2019. The purpose of human life is to serve, to show compassion and

the will to help others.' — Albert Schweitzer."

The American Legion Post 384 donated the pole that is 25 feet tall and holds the Wisconsin flag. On the pole is a plaque that states, "Dedicated To All Kewaskum Area Veterans: Duty - Honor- Country."

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club donated the other 25-foot flagpole, which holds the Kewaskum flag. The green flag bears the logo that was designed to promote the village's 125th anniversary, which was earlier this year on May 7.

The logo contains landmarks and elements that help identify Kewaskum. The background depicts the Kettle Moraine State Forest, which is fitting for the village named "Gateway to the Kettle Moraine State Forest." The feathers and arrowhead are a subtle nod to Chief Kewaskum of the Potawatomi nation, after whom the village was named. In the foreground is a farm field, which represents Kewaskum's rich agricultural past and present. The parent and child in the canoe enjoying time on the Milwaukee river represents the many outdoor activities modern day Kewaskum has to offer.

Jim Dorn, a Kewaskum resident who is a member of both the American Legion and Kiwanis Club, coordinated the installation of the flagpoles.

The park is still under construction and is closed to the public.

# Plans Continue For Highway 45 Project

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) plans to resurface 1.2 miles of U.S. 45 from westbound County H to westbound State Highway 28 in the Village of Kewaskum in 2024.

When that work takes place, the right northbound lane will end just north of the north entrance of Geidel's Piggly Wiggly, before the intersection of U.S. 45 and County H (Mohawk Road), the Kewaskum Village Board decided at a meeting on August 17.

"Currently the right-hand lane when you are going northbound on 45 gets merged back into a parking lane right after the hill by Cousins," Village Administrator Matt Heiser told the board at the meeting.

DOT representatives had asked village leaders if they wanted to change that configuration.

"My recommendation was to make some sort of a change. Where the current lane drop occurs is right over the crest of the hill, not the best location," Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop said. "Some of our more serious accidents that we respond to are in front of Piggly Wiggly. Most traffic is over in the left lane, and they stop for the red light. They will then wave for somebody to turn left into Piggly Wiggly, and a car in the righthand lane will then strike that vehicle."

Bishop said that the DOT considered extending the lane farther north, near Westbury Bank. However, he said that he did not feel that would solve the problem.

The issue of merging lanes at the hill near the traffic light was raised on March 11 when the WisDOT held a Resurfacing Public Involvement Meeting in the Kewaskum Municipal Building Annex.

"When we had the informational meeting with WisDOT on the Highway 45 project, this issue by far was the biggest issue on residents' minds," Village President Kevin Scheunemann said.

After discussion at the August 17 meeting, the board unanimously approved ending the lane south of the intersection.

The board decided to hold a public hearing on September 8 to get community input on whether the village should pay to continue offering parking spaces along Highway 45 when the road is resurfaced.

"The DOT is asking us to identify how many parking spaces we want within that project," Heiser said. "The caveat is that they only provide driving lanes. They don't provide parking spaces. So whatever we identify as a parking space the village will have to pay for when it comes time to paving the road."

"Currently we allow parking on virtually all of Highway 45, excluding a couple spots. One of them is kind of in front of the new 9/11 Memorial," Bishop said.

However, Bishop added that most of the parking spaces are typically not used.

"The only spot that is really utilized really often is in front of Brothers Restaurant. It gets fairly busy on Sunday mornings. And there are some parking spaces painted on the block in front of PNC Bank that gets utilized by the bank or by the cabinet store across the street," Bishop said. "Otherwise it is not utilized very often except for those few locations and maybe up by the soccer field on the north end of the project."

The DOT estimates that it will cost \$1,100 for every 8-foot-wide and 100-foot-long stretch of asphalt.

"If we abandon that entire project cost to the DOT, we won't have those parking spaces, they are forever gone. So I guess the difficulty for me is I really think we need to have a public hearing possibly to decide this issue because I am inclined to abandon the parking spaces and let the project costs fall to the DOT because I'm going to be honest, with PNC Bank, the issue is they do have plenty of parking on the side streets and in their lot. When it comes to Brothers, I think that is a little more difficult issue to wrestle to find them alternate parking space," Scheunemann said.

"I'm uncomfortable making a decision until there is a resolution for that business in terms of

parking spaces. I know it's a pretty radical thought to abandon all parking on Highway 45, but financially I think it is better for the village longterm, given how they want to use Highway 45 outside of special events," Scheunemann added.

The board agreed and voted to table the issue until a public hearing could be held.

At the August 17 meeting, the village board also voted to add four crossing signs with flashing orange lights at the Second Street intersection if the DOT will pay for the signs, which cost \$5,000 each. The village would be responsible for maintaining the signs.

Whether or not the state pays for the signs is dependent on the results of a pedestrian count. If 20 or more pedestrians cross the intersection in an hour, the state will fund the signs. Children under the age of 12, adults over the age of 85 or disabled individuals each count as two pedestrians.

The village board decided to not install signs at the Roseland Drive intersection because it probably would not qualify to be state funded. The four signs would have cost \$4,000 each.

Proposed improvements for in the Highway 45 Project include: Improve the pavement by resurfacing the roadway; signal improvements at the U.S. 45 and County H intersection; curb ramp upgrades to meet ADA requirements; replace pavement marking; and local water main and sanitary sewer replacement.

New right of way acquisition is needed for this project to upgrade the pedestrian curb ramps at intersections to meet ADA requirements. Small areas of fee and temporary limited easement (TLE) will be

needed to allow construction of the new curb ramps. Right of way needs will be determined during the preliminary design phase. WisDOT expects real estate acquisition to begin this summer.

The project's planned schedule is as follows:

- Preliminary Design Fall 2019 - Summer 2020.
- Final Design- Summer 2020 - Fall 2022.
- Public Meeting #2-Summer 2021.
- Construction- 2024.

## Versiti Begins COVID-19 Antibody Testing To Identify Convalescent Plasma Donors

Coronavirus cases are still rising across the country and the world. As this continues, the need for convalescent plasma from recovered COVID-19 patients is great. To help identify potential donors Versiti, Inc., a national leader in blood health innovation, is now performing a screening test for COVID-19 antibodies on all successful donations.

"Versiti is very happy to announce that we have begun testing our donors for COVID-19 antibodies as of Monday Aug. 17," says Thomas Abshire, M.D., Versiti's chief medical officer. "It is our hope that providing these results will help us identify potential donors for convalescent plasma. This information will also be helpful to public health authorities who are tracking the prevalence of the coronavirus. Convalescent plasma can be one of several therapeutic options to help save the lives of some patients who are suffering from the more severe symptoms of COVID-19."

The testing is being conducted in addition to standard FDA mandated tests on all blood donations. Because samples are collected at the end of the donation process, the test will not be performed if a donor is deferred or unable to complete their donation, nor can the test be provided on its own.

Testing will be done at Versiti's laboratory in Indianapolis. Donors can find their results through their online account at [versiti.org](http://versiti.org) or the Versiti app. Positive test results will also be mailed to the donor.

formed if a donor is deferred or unable to complete their donation, nor can the test be provided on its own.

The test will inform donors if they have antibodies reflective of a prior COVID-19 infection. The test does not screen for the virus itself and does not inform donors if they currently have COVID-19, nor does it indicate future immunity against the virus.

Testing will be done at Versiti's laboratory in Indianapolis. Donors can find their results through their online account at [versiti.org](http://versiti.org) or the Versiti app. Positive test results will also be mailed to the donor.

Versiti blood centers, among the first in the U.S. to begin collecting convalescent plasma, are working with its partner hospitals to identify recovered patients. As per the guidelines, hospitals must request FDA approval in order to treat coronavirus patients with plasma. Donors are then referred to Versiti through hospitals, or the recovered patients' physicians.

# BBB Tip: Back to School Internet Safety Tips

Several school districts may be picking up where they left off in March when many schools in the country suddenly shut down due to concerns over coronavirus. Now, as we approach the beginning of the school year, teachers, administrators and families are adapting to an unusual first day of school, and many schools have a focus on online learning. The Better Business Bureau (BBB) encourages everyone to stay safe while online and avoid being easy targets for online scammers.

## Parents: Be Careful

•Creating accounts on websites without permission: Social media sites are ripe with strangers with intentions that may be quite different than yours. Many sites are designed to collect and sell unauthorized user details and behaviors to advertisers looking to engage in targeted marketing.

When creating an account, some kids may falsely create a birthdate to meet the minimum age requirement. Know what your child is doing online, and keep track of the social media sites and accounts to which they have access.

•Contests and giveaways: Contests and giveaways often collect a hefty amount of personal information on their entry forms. Many are thinly disguised ways of collecting personal or financial information that could lead to identity theft. Make sure your child doesn't have access to banking or credit card information, and supervise the filling out of any forms.

•Phishing: Adults are not the only ones who receive spam and junk mail. Kids often get junk mail, and since they don't have much online experience, are more likely to be susceptible to click on links and answer questions they probably shouldn't.

While some emails may be legitimate, the last thing parents want, or need, is a \$500 bill from a fraudulent website where a purchase may have been made- or worse, giving up personal information that can be tracked back to your home.

•Understand apps. Short for "applications," apps are downloaded software that operate on various devices, such as smart phones. However, certain apps might collect and share personal information about your child, or target your child with ads.

Even free apps may include paid features, and children may not understand that some apps or game features cost money, since they were labeled as free to download. They may click on these so-called free games and end up costing parents or guardians a hefty bill at the end of the month.

•File sharing sites: Many websites allow children to download free media. What they may not know is these sites often come with the risk of downloading a virus, allowing identity thieves to access the gaming device, personal computer or even cell phone that's being used. From there, the cyberthief can track financial transactions, physical location or even tap into the household wifi without anyone knowing it.

## Teachers And Administrators

•Videoconferencing tools: Just like businesses, make certain the online software used to deliver lectures, classroom work and other online interactions is secure. The days of Zoom bombing, phishing and other forms of cyber criminal activity aren't over.

Evaluate and update cybersecurity plans: The sudden shut down of in person activities left many scrambling to change course in creating and delivering a curriculum. Now is the time for educators to create a plan to notify students, faculty and staff should there be a data breach or security problem once classes are back in session.

•Keep a clean machine and update devices that connect to the internet: Backing up critical lesson plans, personal information and assignments is the best defense against viruses, malware and other online threats. The only way to do this is to stay up to date on the most current software to protect against them.

## Tips On How To Manage Online Privacy For The Family

•Know about Children's Advertising Review Unit (CARU). CARU's self-regulatory program provides detailed guidance to children's advertisers on how to deal sensitively and honestly with children's issues. These guidelines include, but go beyond, the issues of truthfulness and accuracy to consider the uniquely impressionable and vulnerable child audience.

•Know about COPPA. The Children's Online Privacy Protection Act protects personal information of children under the age of 13 on websites and online services — including apps. COPPA requires those sites and services to notify parents and get their approval before they collect, use or disclose a child's personal information. However, if your nine-year old tells Instagram they are 13 (the age requirement to use the app), he or she won't be protected by this law.

•Know about FOSI. The Family Online Safety Institute brings an international perspective to the po-

tential risks, and harms as well as the rewards of our online lives. The Good Digital Parenting web portal is a great resource for families looking to educate online safety measures in the Internet age.

•Read privacy policies together and understand privacy settings. Parents can have their children read the privacy policies and terms of use of any apps they want to use.

There might be a little grumbling that the policies "are too long" or that "it takes too much time," remind them of the importance of knowing what they are signing up for and insist that they are read. Then, take time to learn and understand the privacy settings on each of the apps and games. Less is more when it comes to sharing information.

•Don't share your location. Nearly every app automatically tracks a user's location. From placing an online order for groceries or fast food to playing an online game, review the apps on all of your devices to see which ones are tracking your location. Then, if it's not needed, look in the settings to see how to disable this feature.

Advise a friend or family member to avoid geotagging their posts with their location. Why? For example, you don't want to announce the fact your family is vacationing out of state while the house sits empty. A simple review of the geo-tagged post will reveal where you really are.

•Use parental controls if necessary. Although the best way to keep a child's online privacy safe is to teach them to manage it themselves, it doesn't hurt to have their backs by using parental controls.

Today Android, iOS, and most web browsers offer built-in features that allow parents to monitor their children's online activities, but third-party apps are available as well. Research the option that works best. Follow through with the child the reasons why you're monitoring their activities.

•Share with care and remember, personal information is like money. What is posted online can last a lifetime: parents can teach children that any information they share online can easily be copied and is almost impossible to take back.

Talk to them about who might see a post and how it might be perceived in the future, and show them how anything they do online can positively, or negatively, can impact other people. Sharing personal information can also give online thieves an idea of what login information or passwords might be used for banking accounts or other online accounts.

## Knowing The Signs Can Help Prevent Drug Overdose Deaths

Marking International Overdose Awareness Day, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) called on state residents to take action to end drug overdose deaths by learning the signs of an overdose and how to respond.

Different drugs require different medical interventions and responses. For example, naloxone is the proven method of reversing an opioid overdose but it does not work for a stimulant like cocaine, which requires reassuring the patient, putting them in a comfortable position, and making sure they don't get overheated. All drug overdoses are a medical emergency. Call

911 if you suspect someone is experiencing a drug overdose.

"Drug overdose is a significant public health issue in Wisconsin, with devastating impacts on individuals, families, and communities," said DHS Secretary-designee Andrea Palm. "Hundreds of people from all walks of life die or experience a permanent injury each year from a drug overdose in our state. These deaths and injuries are preventable and help is available."

The #EndOverdose campaign has useful tips on how to recognize and respond to overdoses involving the following drugs:

•Depressants:(link is external) includes ben-

zodiazepines, barbiturates

•Opioids:(link is external) includes oxycodone, morphine, codeine, heroin, fentanyl, methadone, and opium

•Stimulants:(link is external) includes amphetamines, cocaine, and ecstasy

According to the DHS Wisconsin Drug Overdose Death Dashboard, overdose deaths involving all drugs, excluding alcohol, increased by 10.5 percent in 2019, driven primarily by a nearly 10 percent increase in overdose deaths involving opioids.

There is evidence that the stress and uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 pandemic is

contributing to more harmful drug use. Preliminary numbers show that suspected opioid overdose Emergency Department (ED) visits increased 41 percent since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic in Wisconsin compared to the same time period in 2019. There were 1,688 suspected opioid overdose ED visits from March through July of this year, compared to 1,196 suspected overdose visits during the same period in 2019.

An opioid overdose can be reversed with naloxone. People who take opioids and their family and friends are strongly encouraged to carry naloxone. It is available for sale without a prescription at

many pharmacies around the state and at no cost through the DHS NARCAN® Direct Program.

"Taking care of yourself and others may be more challenging right now," Palm said. "It is okay to ask for help. Help is available. Treatment for harmful drug use works. Recovery is possible."

Those struggling with any type of drug use can call 211 for the Wisconsin Addiction Recovery Helpline. Operated by 211 Wisconsin through a grant from DHS, this free and confidential service has handled nearly 10,000 calls since it launched in October 2018.

Resilient Wisconsin, a DHS effort launched

in April to help Wisconsin residents find healthy ways to cope with life's challenges, features a directory of other helplines, hotlines, and virtual support meetings for people struggling with any type of drug use.

To expand access to treatment services for harmful drug use, DHS will also be piloting a hub and spoke model to treating substance use disorders. This approach will link the expertise of regional addiction medicine specialists with local clinics and primary care providers to manage the individuals' unique health and treatment needs and connect them with appropriate levels of care.


