Campbellsport School Year Gets Off To A Good Start

The Campbellsport School District got off to a good start last week after having to switch to virtual school in the last two months of the 2019-2020 school year and continuing to deal with a nation-wide pandemic. Elementary and middle

school students are going to school in-person five days a week. High School students have been split into two groups. Each group goes in-person two days a week and virtual the other three days.

According to Paul Amundson, district administrator, there was only one small issue that

came up on the first day. "Things went great except for traffic issues with parent drop off and pick up," Amundson said. "But adjustments were made plus fewer parents transported after the first day of school."

Kewaskum Schools Finish First Week

— COVID-19 Cases Found At High School

Kewaskum School District's first week of the 2020-21 school year is in the books.

The district is offering in-person classes as well as a virtual program for students in the district because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"As far as the actual opening of schools, K-8 we had absolutely no

problems whatsoever. It went really well for the online as well as the in-person classes," District Administrator James Smasal said.

Unfortunately, things did not go as smoothly at the high school.

"We had positive COVID-19 cases at the high school this week. We had to deal with that and implement our contact tracing process right

away," Smasal said.

A letter was sent to parents of students at the high school on September 1, the first day of school, informing them that an individual from the school had tested positive for COVID-19. All individuals who tested positive for the virus are now in quarantine.

Publisher's Letter

Beyond Hearing

Dear Reader,

In conversations, many people hear what is being said but do not listen. One is a process that involves the subconscious perception of sound, whereas the other involves an active form of engagement. Too often when someone introduces themselves, the overly rehearsed structure of social introductions keeps us from listening to what the person is saying due to our own ingrained expectations. We expect that, as they introduce themselves, they will say their name and ask for ours in return. Although we hear their name being said, we too often forget to listen to what the name is in anticipation of our own response, and, as a result, we miss the name entirely.

Listening is focused and attentive yet is frequently dominated by our own thoughts and assumptions. All too often we filter out what is being said and substitute, in their place, our personal considerations, biases, and presumptions. As a result, we fill in the conversation with what we already believe or think we know is being communicated. In the process, we run the risk of setting up strainers or sieves that ferret out the diversity of perspectives being offered.

This type of behavior narrows our minds by limiting our cognitive palette to one color to paint the world with and

we become impaired, unable to access the full spectrum of color that represents the diversity of experiences and perspectives of every individual. Take a needle for instance: for a child a needle may be a curiosity, for a parent a choking hazard, for a surgeon a tool, for a patient a potentially life-saving object, for an artist a way to



create, and for a seamstress a way to mend. From objects and events to ideas and concepts, everyone sees things differently based on their unique experiences of the world, which not one person ever to exist can duplicate.

If we engage in listening, we afford ourselves the opportunity to build bridges to new thinking and climb heights to different viewpoints instead of at sea level stranded on an island of our own making. By opening the passageways, we can learn more than we ever thought possible from each other. The world is full of endless possibilities and perspectives — all we have to do is listen.

Washington County Sheriff's Report

Man Arrested In Connection With Death Of Missing Person

On September 3, the Washington County Sheriff's Office announced that it had arrested a 34-year-old Town of Addison man in connection with the disappearance of a 30-year-old Village of Jackson man.

Stephen Lombard was last seen by his mother leaving their residence in the Village of Jackson in the company of the 34-year-old Town of Addison man in the early evening of July 27.

The Village of Jackson Police Department led the original missing person investigation and was later assisted by the Washington County Sheriff's Office as well as the Wisconsin Division of Criminal Investigations.

The several-month, multi-agency, investigation revealed that on the night of July 27, Lombard and the suspect were in the City of Milwaukee using illegal narcotics. It is believed that Lombard stopped breathing while inside the suspect's vehicle. The suspect failed to seek medical attention for Lombard and he died of a probable drug overdose. The suspect drove around the City of Milwaukee for the next thirteen hours with Lombard's body in the passenger seat.

During that time, the suspect used the victim's debit card at several different locations. It is believed that the suspect discarded Lombard's body on July 28 in the early afternoon in the Allenton Marsh.

On August 24, a body was recovered by Washington County Sheriff's investigators in the Allenton Marsh off County Highway W, north of County Highway S in the Town of Addison. Information from the suspect led authorities to that location. The remains are believed to be Lombard but DNA analysis will be required for positive identification. An autopsy was completed and the results are pending.

"It is unconscionable to think that someone would have such wanton disregard for human life to not seek medical attention for someone in need. It shocks the conscience to think that they would then drive around with the body for 13 hours while emptying the victim's bank account and eventually discarding the body like a piece of trash. No human being deserves that lack of dignity. I am proud of the teamwork that was demonstrated by the Village of Jackson Police Department, the Wisconsin Division of Criminal Investigation, and from my staff at the Washington County Sheriff's Office. These investigators were passionate and unrelenting in finding

answers for the Lombard family. They put in long hours and utilized a significant amount of resources to find Stephen and bring justice to his family," Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said.

The Town of Addison man faces several felony charges as a result of this investigation. He remains in custody and his identity is being withheld pending formal charges.

Assault of a Child. In 2016 Hermann was convicted of two counts of Possession of Child Pornography. Hermann will be on lifetime supervision and will be monitored closely by WI-DOC Division of Community. Nicholas Hermann will have numerous rules and restrictions to follow including wearing a live tracking GPS unit. The GPS monitoring unit will have exclusion zones setup alerting WI-DOC if there is a violation of the exclusion zones rules.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is NOT wanted by law enforcement at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but rather it is our belief that an informed public is a safer public.

Bicycle Crash Results In Serious Injury

On Monday, Sept. 7, at 11:17 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office Dispatch center received a 911 call reporting a bicycle crash with a serious head injury on Dublin Drive just west of County Road K in the Town of Erin. Ambulances from the Richfield and Hartford fire departments responded to the scene along with deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office. Upon arrival of the first rescue personnel, Flight for Life was requested to the scene.

Deputies determined that the rider, a 29-year-old male from Waukesha was traveling with other riders when he lost control of his bicycle after he struck a rock in the roadway at a high rate of speed. The man was transported by Flight for Life with serious injuries. Dublin Drive was closed to traffic for approximately one hour to assist in rescue efforts.

Fatal Motorcycle Crash In Town Of Ashford

A 60-year-old Pewaukee man was killed in a motorcycle accident on Monday, Sept. 7, at 6:13 p.m. on County Highway W at Midland Drive in the Township of Ashford.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office along with Campbell-sport ambulance and fire department were dispatched to the single motorcycle crash.

The initial investigation shows that a southbound motorcycle, driven by the 60-year-old Pewaukee man, failed to negotiate the curve and drove into the ditch. The motorcycle overturned several times, ejecting the driver. The driver was not wearing a helmet.

He was transported to St. Agnes Hospital by

Campbellsport Ambulance, where he died of his injuries.

The cause of the crash remains under investigation by the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office. Assisting at the scene were the City of Fond du Lac Ambulance and the Fond du Lac County Medical Examiner's Office.







Campbellsport School Year Gets Off To A Good Start

With school being cut short so abruptly in March, students and staff were very excited to get back to school. Even with the new safety measures in place to deal with the Coronavirus pandemic, they couldn't wait to get back together.

"It was hard to tell which group was more excited to get going," Amundson said. "There is always anxiety (amplified this year) at the start but an eagerness to just get it going."

Some of the new safety measures include wearing masks throughout the day, social distancing in the hallways and wherever possible, lots of handwashing and extra cleaning in the schools. The students

seem to be adjusting to these changes just fine.

"Students are the most flexible group to change especially if they understand the reasons," Amundson said. "At school, the cleaning focus has changed with cleaning floors (example only) on a lower status then sanitizing student desks."

Bus service changes include masks, sitting with family members only and no shuttle buses to control the number of students on each bus.

"Johnson Bus has done a great job being flexible to the different safety concerns," Amundson said.

As the school year progresses, changes may need to be made.

The district will handle any situations or changes with the pandemic as they come along.

For example, one major change has been in the extra-curricular activities. All fall sports that have a lot of contact with other athletes have either been canceled or postponed until the spring. The only sports continuing are those with little contact like cross country and golf.

Within the classrooms, changes may need to be made too. Amundson feels the district can handle this like it does any other year.

"Many tweaks and slight adjustments at the district, building and classroom levels may be made," he said. "It is just

like a 'normal' year where we say 'Oops how can we do it better!'"

As for students being sent home from school, so far this has been like

any other year. Nothing COVID-related has popped up yet. But, the district is definitely keeping track and being more cautious when it comes to students not feeling

well.

"Students have been sent home as is usually the case," Amundson said. "I have not heard of any of those being COVID positive."

Riding To School In Style

Four-year-old Carter Jacobson was very excited about the Kewaskum Police Department's Back To School Scavenger Hunt. He wanted to win a ride to school in a Kewaskum police car on the first day of school.

The scavenger hunt is held each year in the Village of Kewaskum. Police Chief Tom Bishop always hides a piece of "evidence" — an official Kewaskum Police Department key chain — somewhere outside on public property within the Village of Kewaskum. He then posts clues on Facebook about the hiding spot.

The scavenger hunt is always open to any student who lives within the Kewaskum School District limits and attends school in the Kewaskum School District (including i4 Learning Community School and Farmington Elementary School), as well as Holy Trinity School or St. Lucas School.

This year, Bishop decided to make the scavenger hunt more difficult than in years past.

"Over the last number of years, the evidence has been found within Day One or Day Two. So this year I wanted to up my hiding game," Bishop said.

The Hunt officially began on Saturday, Aug. 22, at 8 a.m. with the following clue of where to find the "evidence": It is above ground.

With that initial clue, Carter began searching with his family right away on the first day.

They looked on the Eisenbahn Trail. They

went to Kiwanis Park. They searched downtown. And they looked down by the river.

But they couldn't find the prize.

On Day Two (Sunday, Aug. 23), Bishop posted Clue Number Two about where to find the "evidence": Even if it rains, it should stay dry.

So Carter and his family searched some more that day. But they could not find the elusive Kewaskum Police Department key chain.

Then on Day Three (Monday, Aug. 24), Bishop posted the third clue: "I think I hid it in a fair location."

Some of the young scavenger hunters around town started wondering if the location had something to do with the county fair. So Bishop decided to give them a bonus clue.

"I didn't want people to get too discouraged," Bishop explained.

So that afternoon, on Monday, Aug. 24, he posted this bonus clue: As Bob Uecker would say, "Get up, Get up, Get Outta Here.... Gone!"

With that clue, Carter and his family knew it must be somewhere near the baseball field. They went to Kiwanis Park and searched by the baseball fields.

That is where Carter found the evidence, near the right outfield of Baseball Field #2.

"He was ecstatic!" said Ashley Jacobson, Carter's mom.

The Location

Actually, finding the "evidence" was not completely a smooth operation.

Bishop had hidden the

item just inside the end of the yellow tubing that is on the top of the fencing along the right outfield. It was not an obvious hiding location.

"This is year number six of the Back to School Scavenger Hunt. Each year, these kids find it in about a day. Not this year. I decided we are getting real...I have to step up my game," Bishop said.

The negative about the hiding location was that it was kind of high up for little kids to find.

But Carter was out searching with his family.

It actually was Carter's dad, Tim Jacobson, who first spotted the evidence inside the tubing on the fence. The problem was there also were bees in that location.

"The bees weren't there when I put the evidence in there. I felt bad when I heard that... I didn't want anyone to get stung," Bishop said.

Carter's mom distracted Carter for a little bit while Carter's dad used two sticks to remove the evidence from the original hiding place. He let the key chain, which was inside a plastic police evidence bag, fall to the ground.

That is where Carter Found the coveted key chain on his own. Luckily, no one was stung by a bee during the operation.

The Prize

After he found the key chain that features an official patch that Kewaskum police wear on their uniforms, Carter could not wait to ride in the police car to school. But the 4-year-old was a little apprehensive.

"Mom, he knows to take me to school, not jail, because I'm only a kid, right?" Carter asked his mom, just to make sure the deal would go down correctly.

On September 1, the first day of school, Bishop picked up Carter from his house and transported the young scavenger hunt winner to school in the Kewaskum police car. Carter's favorite part about the ride was that he got to turn on the lights and sirens.

The day was extra special for Carter. Not only did he get to ride in a police car, but he was excited to attend 4K at Kewaskum Elementary School. This was his first day of school ever.

Once in his classroom, Carter was proud to tell all the kids in his class about his ride to school.

The scavenger hunt helped develop even a better relationship with the department.

"I think it's just great that the police department does things like this to foster a good relationship with the youth in the community, especially with everything going on these days,"

Ashley said.

It has had a positive impact on Carter.

"When the police drive by our house on patrol, Carter always stops what he's doing and waves hi. He's so happy when they wave back. It's those little things that make a big difference in the community," Ashley said.

Kewaskum Schools Finish First Week

– COVID-19 Cases Found At High School

In the letter, parents were informed that the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department was following up with families of the specific students and staff who were in close contact with any individuals who tested positive to discuss next steps regarding self quarantine. Close contacts may be assigned to virtual learning for a period of 14 days.

There was a total of 15 active child cases within the school district boundary as of Tuesday, Sept. 8, according to the Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department website.

"We have done the contact tracing per county health department guidelines," Smasal said. "Of course, when those things happen, it's tough. It's tough on parents, it's tough on kids and it's tough on faculty."

The district's process in dealing with positive COVID-19 cases includes:

- Begin contact tracing all students/staff who fall into the contact tracing requirements.
- Notify those students/parents by phone of the need to quarantine due to contact tracing.
- Follow-up email to those "traced" and in need of quarantine.
- Provide information about the district's virtual program.
- A letter will be emailed at the end of the school day to all families in the building affected.

Despite the issues that occurred last week, the district has received positive feedback from a couple dozen families regarding the in-person classes, according to Smasal.

"We had a number of parents contact us and thank us for opening the schools and having in-person instruction," Smasal said. "Of course, there are challenges with that also, and it looks like we are going to be dealing with the challenges for many weeks and months. So we are trying to follow

our process the best that we can and communicate the process out to parents and to staff to make them feel a little more at ease."

The district's plan is to keep schools open.

"Where we are going to need help comes down to a couple of things to keep our teachers and students in the buildings and safe. And that is to try to keep six feet away from others at all times so you will not be identified in the contact tracing. If we do contact tracing and you're not in that bubble, you will have to be told to go in and get tested and/or stay home," Smasal said.

In addition, people need to monitor what they do what outside of school if they want schools to stay open, Smasal pointed out.

"Obviously, the COVID-19 cases can be brought into the school; they don't necessarily happen at the school," he said.

To continue in-person instruction, the district hopes to keep teachers from being identified in contact tracing, at least in the classroom. However, the district does have a detailed plan of how it will utilize substitute teachers if the need arises.

In addition, it is important to keep students healthy.

"If there are more kids that are at home ill than there are in their seats, then at some point the health department may come in and say we need to close our doors for a couple weeks and let everybody get healthy. But hopefully that won't happen," Smasal said.

So far, the students have been doing their part by wearing masks while at school.

"Having them wear masks has not been a problem whatsoever. The kids are just happy to be back in school. They want to be with their friends and they want to be in-person instruction. So the kids are handling it very well," Smasal said.





No Contract In Place Yet For Little Folks To Use School

As in years past, Little Folks School House, a for-profit organization, is offering before- and after-school care at Kewaskum Elementary School. But even though the first week of after-school care is now behind them, there is no rental contract in place between the Kewaskum School District and Little Folks.

There are two other programs that offer before- and after-school care for children in the school district, both of which have a signed contract with the district. The Boys and Girls Club, a non-profit organization, offers before- and after-school care at Kewaskum Elementary School. Tuttle Creek Learning Center, which, like Little Folks, is a for-profit business, offers before- and after-school care at Farmington Elementary School.

Tuttle Creek has a new contract with the district for this school year. Tuttle Creek now pays 10 percent of the amount it receives from families for after- and before-school care to the district. The Boys and Girls Club has a longstanding agreement in which it pays the district \$12,500 a year for

20 years to use the district's facilities, according to Smasal.

"It is very frustrating that we have three different entities that use our facilities for before and after school student care wrap-around services, and two of the three work very well with us and are very pleased with the process and the formula used for charging and willingness to work with the district," district administrator James Smasal said.

The district offered new contracts this year for both Little Folks and Tuttle Creek.

"We have not had a contract in place for 10 years. This was the time to do it with COVID-19 and trying to cohort kids," Smasal said. "It's number and formula driven; it is not personal bias and anything else."

However, Little Folks School House did not agree to the terms.

The day before the first day of school, a special School Board meeting was held to try to come to an agreement.

"We are here to respond to changes that Mr. Smasal has proposed in our before- and after-school program," Dodie Sargent, owner of Little Folks School House, told the school board at the

special board meeting on Monday, Aug. 31. "Three weeks prior to school, we were invited to a meeting with Mr. Smasal and two of the elementary principals to discuss the options for the new school year and implementing the COVID-19 procedures. Mr. Smasal allowed us one week to process and come up with additional solutions. One of the options that was discussed was for Little Folks to relocate out to Wayne [i4L] Elementary School for before and after school. Mr. Smasal indicated he would offer this space free of charge."

Sargent said offering day care services at i4Learning Community School rather than Kewaskum Elementary School was not a good option for parents.

"After one week time frame had left, Mr. Smasal provided minimal information to us. However, he requested numbers such as general numbers, cost per child, etc. Although we were offered to play in the sand together, Mr. Smasal took the liberty of making a contract on his own, without taking our input into consideration."

Sargent said that when Little Folks originally

started offering care at Kewaskum Elementary School, it paid \$1 per child per month.

"When administration changed, our rental rate jumped to \$9.50 a day. It has now quadrupled. We are asked to pay \$800 a month, which I think is ridiculous," Sargent said.

Little Folks provided care at Kewaskum Elementary School this past summer and was not charged any rental fees. The School Board had voted to not charge any programs any rent for using the district's facilities over the summer to help them overcome losses due to COVID-19.

Smasal said that the district would like to charge Little Folks using the same 10 percent formula that it is using for Tuttle Creek.

"They [Tuttle Creek

representatives] were very appreciative about the contract that we put together for them, using the same percentages as we did for Little Folks," Smasal said.

The district is still losing money on the deal this year because of the added cost to sanitize the facilities during a pandemic, according to Smasal. He said that he feels the district should charge the day care organizations something to use the school facilities.

"We do appreciate the fact that we have wrap-around services and we do want to see them be successful. But on behalf of the taxpayers, there should be some kind of charge," Smasal said.

Smasal said that no one from Little Folks contacted him and said they would like to rework the

contract.

"If you have an issue, let's talk about it," Smasal said to Sargent at last week's meeting.

Board member Mark Sette was not happy that the last week's special meeting even occurred.

"I think that it is incredibly disrespectful to parents of the district to be having this meeting tonight. It is the night before school is starting," Sette said. "It is very disrespectful to the staff that has a lot of preparation and things going on. This meeting did not need to be held tonight."

Board president Jim Leister asked Sargent if she had reached out to Smasal, and she said that she had not. He told Sargent that she needed to talk with Smasal to try to come to an agreement before bringing the issue to the board.

"I get you don't like the price," Leister said. "How do you get negotiations together and work out something without talking?"

Leister requested that Sargent contact Smasal and try to negotiate an agreement.

As of Monday, Sept. 7, Sargent had still not reached out to Smasal.

"I figured I would wait a week before I try to negotiate with him," Sargent said.

Military Flags To Be Raised At Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial

Military flags will be raised during a ceremony at the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Educational Center in Kewaskum on Friday, Sept. 11.

The brief Patriot Day ceremony, which will be open to people by invitation only, will be recorded and released to the news media on September 11 so that members of the public can view the ceremony. First Street will be closed in the block adjacent to the memorial at 9 a.m. so that attendees can remain socially distanced during the ceremony to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The memorial site is currently under construction. The memorial's board of directors is working with the Village of Kewaskum and BMC Construction to address a storm drainage concern along the south side of the site. After a catch basin is installed to resolve that issue, a sidewalk will be added along the south side of the site. Then, Flagstone Landscape Design plans to

plant pear trees and then sod and seed the site.

That work is expected to be completed this fall, which will enable the orange snow fence that currently surrounds the site to be removed this year, according to Dustin Melzark, a member of the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial Board of Directors.

Meanwhile, legs for a teaching podium are being completed by BMH Manufacturing, and foundation work is being completed where two towers will stand on the site. Bricks are currently being installed for the memorial's "Pave The Way" campaign. While some of the bricks cannot be installed until the sidewalk is completed, part of the brick walkway goes through the military portion of the memorial. There, flagpoles are lighted, thanks to the work of volunteers from Pieper Electric.

"The progress that has been made even in this short time has been amazing, and the response from the community is humbling. This is truly a Kewaskum

community effort," said Gordon Haberman, president of Kewaskum Remembers 9/11, Inc.

The Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Educational Center will be represented at an exhibit that will be displayed at the Washington County Historical Society's Tower Heritage Center in West Bend. The "Old Courthouse" museum will have a temporary exhibit highlighting Kewaskum from September 16 through July 31 of next year.

"They have been gracious enough to include the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center within that exhibit," Haberman said.

The exhibit, which will be a celebration of Kewaskum, will feature historical pieces from Kewaskum. To recognize the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Educational Center, the exhibit will include artifacts from the World Trade Center and information about Andrea Haberman, a Kewaskum High School graduate who was killed in the North Tower of the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.



FDL County Health Department Fall Recommendations

We continue to face unprecedented times in our world and within Fond du Lac County surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic. As we continue to respond to COVID-19 every day within our Health Department, we also want to continue to prepare our community for upcoming challenges, including an increase in influenza cases and the reopening of our schools.

To help mitigate and slow down the spread of COVID-19, the Fond du Lac County Health Department recommends social distancing, wearing a mask or face covering, washing hands often, and staying home when sick. In addition, we highly recommend every resident receive an influenza vaccine.

The Fond du Lac County Health Department will no longer be administering paying influenza vaccines due to the continuous contact tracing efforts from COVID-19. However, we strongly recommend everyone get their influenza vaccine this year, especially with other respiratory infections (including COVID-

19) circulating.

There are multiple local places to get your seasonal influenza vaccine, including your primary care provider, local pharmacies, and grocery stores. You can also call the number on the back of your insurance card to find an in-network provider.

Influenza vaccine will still be offered to children who attend Fond du Lac County schools. Additional information regarding influenza vaccine for students will be shared with schools and parents at a later date.

The Fond du Lac County Health Department will still be offering childhood vaccines (including influenza) to children (ages 0-19) with no medical insurance or medical assistance/coverage gaps. We will also continue to offer other paying vaccines such as Hepatitis A and B, Prevnar 13 and Pneumovax 23, Shingrix (which has a waiting list), and Tetanus.

Please call the Health Department to schedule an appointment (920) 929-3085. Appointments are required and walk-ins will not be accepted.

Over an inch of rain fell hours before a Sheboygan River Progressive Farmers (SRPF) field day opened to sunny skies for committed farmers to join in a discussion about interseeding soybeans into corn as a cover crop.

Brothers Joe and Mark Loehr, who are charter members of the farmer-led watershed conservation group, hosted the Friday, Aug. 28, event in one of their fields for 16 attendees, including farmers and ag business professionals.

"We have a big challenge as dairy farms to help the soil and grow the most productive crops," said Joe Loehr, whose farm, Loehr Dairy, milks 500 cows. "The crops also need to have a certain nutrient profile for the cows to make high-quality milk. Digestibility of the plant and how we store it makes a difference in the end and that is why we go with the longer, more mature soybean so the plant isn't drying

out when we need to harvest the corn for silage."

The Loehrs explained how in past years their corn silage tested poorer than this year.

"We look at the digestibility of the corn silage for our herd and we noticed this year's corn silage was two percentage points higher in protein content and two points higher in total digestibility compared to last year," Joe Loehr said. "In different years we tested our corn silage with and without soybeans as a cover crop, and we found the soybeans make our corn silage better."

Along with making the corn silage more nutritious for the cows, the added benefit of having a soybean cover crop is the root structure, which leads to healthier soil and keeps the soil and nutrients in place. Parts of the Loehr's fields have lower elevation and are susceptible to runoff. Among other benefits, cover crops

also help prevent nutrients from leaching into groundwater. An important part of SRPF's mission is to use innovative practices that protect the environment.

The soybean cover crop mix has cow peas, chickpeas, forest peas, crimson clover, rape seed, sunflowers and soybeans. Mark Loehr said the research they did before choosing the mix is paying off.

"We found we were having to apply more and more nitrogen because our (nearly 1,000) acres have a lot of corn because we need the silage," Mark Loehr said. "We wanted the benefits of the soybeans and the nitrogen it provides."

Last year, the brothers tried planting cereal rye as a cover crop with their corn but noticed that with 22-inch rows the canopy of the corn hurt the rye, which at harvest time was yellow and burnt from not getting enough sunlight and moisture.

"We have combined

the corn with the soybeans as a cover crop and haven't had any issues," Mark Loehr said.

The Loehrs planted 20-25 pounds of soybean cover crop mix per acre and they plan to continue to expand the number of acres.

My favorite call by a sportscaster was at the 1986 Masters when Jack Nicklaus drilled a clutch putt dead center the whole way, the crowd came unhinged and the great Verne Lundquist gave a three word description that is legendary. I could literally watch that clip over and over and never get sick of it.

Lundquist made another one of my favorite calls, this one was at the 2005 Masters. Tiger Woods chips one in, a miraculous ball that hung on the edge of the cup for seconds before falling in, all Verne could say was “Oh wow, in your life have you seen anything like that!”

My second favorite pick goes to the charismatic Howard Cosell. I watched a lot of boxing in my day and when I saw Joe Frazier take a series of punches from George Foreman and a right upper cut to the jaw, all I can remember is Howard's voice saying “Down goes Frazier” three times. Everybody including myself was stunned as Foreman knocked out Smokin' Joe in a huge upset.

The third best call goes out to Al Michaels in probably my favorite sporting event ever watched, the 1980 USA hockey victory over the Soviet Union. The call is beyond legendary as movies have been made about it.

Michaels' final words as the clock was ticking down in the biggest

upset in Olympic history are bone chilling. With 8,500 screaming Americans in the Olympic Center, Al gave us these words as we watched from our TVs at home, “Do you believe in miracles!”

Number four I love watching and listening to over and over, it just gets better each time. The Kirk Gibson 1988 home run in game one of the World Series. A hurt Gibson comes off the bench and smacks a walk-off homer over the right field fence off Dennis Eckersley. The great Vin Scully (a long-time Dodger announcer) said it best “High fly ball to right, she is gone!” Jack Buck's radio call isn't too bad either, “I don't believe what I just saw.”

A college football game comes in at number five. Joe Starkey made one of the craziest calls to end a football game that you will hear. Cal runs back the kickoff to end the game against rival Stanford and all Starkey (a long-time Cal announcer since 1975) could say was “The band is on the field,” among a series of other classic lines as he nearly lost his voice describing the chaos.

Vin Scully gets the nod at number six with his famous call in the 1986 Game Six World Series. Scully had such a recognizable voice for baseball, it was almost like watching a movie when he was behind the mic.

Here's how he described the meaningless grounder, “little roller along first behind the bag, it gets through Buckner! Here comes Knight, and the Mets win it!”

Number seven is Russ Hodges for his call of Bobby Thomson's legendary home run that won the 1951 NL pennant. The shot heard around the world was described like this “The Giants win the pennant” two loud times.

Number Eight belongs to Johnny Most calling the famous Boston Celtic win in 1965. Philly inbounced the ball with five seconds in the game. Here's how the jubilant Johnny Most called it “Havlicek steals the ball, John Havlicek stole the ball.”

Number nine is Milo Hamilton calling Hank Aaron's famous home run in 1975. With millions watching anxiously on their television sets, what Milo said is so perfect, “Outta here! It's gone! It's 715! There's a new home run champion of all time and it's Henry Aaron.”

Number 10, another Verne Lundquist moment, this one on the basketball court. Duke's Christian Laettner made one of NCAA basketball's most famous shots over Kentucky on a turnaround jumper from the top of the key. Verne had it looking like this “There's the pass to Laettner... puts it up (buzzer sounds) YES!!”

McMullen Bags First MSA Harry Neitzel Tribute Triumph

Three-time Midwest Sprint Car Association champion Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh added one of the MSA's crown jewels to his trophy case by claiming the fourth annual Harry Neitzel Tribute Race Friday, Sept. 4, at the Dodge County Fairgrounds in Beaver Dam.

The prestigious 14th MSA event of the 2020 season was run in honor of the late Beaver Dam resident, who was one of the most beloved figures in the MSA and the entire Southeastern Wisconsin racing community. It drew a field of 23 competitors to the "horsepower half mile."

After an aborted start for a four-car incident in turn two involving Nick

Daywalt of Hubertus, Justin Miller of Plymouth, Chris Clayton and Waldo and Plymouth's Justin Erickson, outside front row starter **Tony Wondra of Campbellsport** outpowered polesitter Tim Haddy of Waupun to take the lead on the opening circuit of the 20-lap MSA main event.

On lap two, Brandon McMullen, who started fourth, worked his way past Haddy into second and quickly set his sights on the leader. By lap five, McMullen had reeled in Wondra and attempted to dive low in turn three to take over the spot.

However, Wondra battled back along the outside groove to maintain

the top spot in turn four. On lap seven, the leaders began to encounter lapped traffic, which allowed McMullen to again move within striking distance of Wondra.

On lap 11, Wondra drifted high over the cushion in turn four, which allowed McMullen to seize the top spot along the low groove. Once ahead, McMullen opened up a solid lead, while fifth starter Travis Arenz of Sheboygan, who entered the race with a five-point lead over McMullen in the MSA point standings, charged in to work around Wondra into second on lap 23.

McMullen cruised over the final two laps to post

his 28th career MSA A-main victory, fifth MSA main event victory of the 2020 season and first Harry Neitzel Tribute Race trophy.

Arenz finished second and Wondra ended up third. 2005 MSA champion Lance Fassbender moved up from the 13th starting spot to place fourth and ninth starter Jack Vanderboom of Dousman rounded out the top five.

After the race, McMullen ranked the victory at the top of his 28 career MSA wins.

"This race really means a lot to me," McMullen said. "Harry was a really good to us when we first came into the 360s and he was friends

with everyone. Pretty much everyone in this pit area tonight knows who Harry was and what he meant to racing in this area. This wins means a ton. I'd say it is the biggest win of my career so far."

Arenz was satisfied with his second-place run on the high-speed half mile.
