Military Flags Raised At 9/11 Memorial

A small crowd gathered around the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center in Kewaskum on Friday, Sept. 11, the 19th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

There were 2,977 innocent people killed in the attacks on September 11, 2001, when two hijacked airliners were crashed into the World Trade Center in New York, one crashed into the Pentagon and one crashed in a field in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. It was the deadliest terrorist attack in US history.

"As we gather here today on this 19th anniversary to respectfully remember the victims and the impact of this day in our country's history, we also come together at this beautiful and inspirational location, the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial

and Education Center, to reflect upon, and to celebrate the strength, compassion and resilience of America, its communities and its citizenry," said Gordon Haberman, president of the Kewaskum Remembers 9/11, Inc., and father of Andrea Haberman, who was killed in the North Tower of the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.

During the brief ceremony on Friday, the flags from each of the nation's five military branches were raised at the memorial for the first time.

"They will wave proudly in honor of our country's military and to all those who have served," Haberman said.

Among those who took part in last week's ceremony were County Executive Josh Schoemann, his wife Jodi Schoemann, Washing-

ton County Clerk Ashley Reichert and her husband and veteran Justin Reichert. The foursome walked 40 miles across Washington County to raise

\$150,000, of which \$70,000 went toward the military component of the 9/11 memorial.

Crazy Idea Turns Into Something Special In Eden

What started out as a "crazy idea" turned into a special charity ride to raise money for the Eden Fire Department and to remember the events that shook the United States on September 11, 2001.

"I had this crazy idea of doing something different with ATVs/UTVs, classic cars and motorcycles," said Todd Gitter, founder of the Eden 3-Some Charity Ride.

The charity ride was held this past Saturday, Sept. 12. Even though the weather dampened the festivities a bit, hundreds came out to ride in one of the three charity rides that were held.

A different route was planned for ATVs/UTVs, classic cars and motorcycles. Each group started together, but followed different routes on their ride. They all ended at Eden Firemen's Park where there was a band and raffles.

An opening ceremony

was held at 11:30 a.m. at the Eden Fire Station. Members of the Campbellsport Fire Department's Honor Guard helped with the ceremony, which honored those first responders — fire, police and EMTs — who ran to help 19 years ago. Many of those brave men and women lost their lives that day as the "Twin Towers" fell.

The ceremony recognized all those who died that day. On September 11, 2001, four airplanes were hijacked and suicide attacks were carried out against targets in the United States. Two of the planes were flown into the twin towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, a third plane hit the Pentagon just outside Washington, D.C., and the fourth plane crashed in a field in Shanksville, PA. Almost 3,000 people were killed during the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

Dear Community,

This is an update on the Kewaskum American Legion roof replacement project.

First of all, we recognize all the kind outpouring of contributions and support! We have received generous donations from many members of the community and some from those who just follow us from afar. We want to recognize each and every one of you and let you know where we are at on this project.

Apparently, we did not touch all our bases with regard to the overall cost of the project before asking for help and the COVID-19 appears to have decreased our ability to raise funds at our events.

Here is what we found out. The Legion Hall is

considered by the state to be a commercial building. This means that we are required by law to have an architect execute and certify the design plans and specifications. We have contracted with an architect and expect to approve plans early next week. These plans will then be requested for materials, which we understand have experienced a significant increase.

Furthermore, the contractor bid we have received will need to be requested and given the new specifications for a commercial building it is anticipated to increase. The added costs associated with the project will require us to continue to raise funds through our Brat Frys, Farmer's Market Food Stand, Regal Cookware sales, Round-Up at the Pig and through the generosity of community member donations.


commitment to conservative values," the Representative continued.

We had a large amount of walk in donors, but due to the new sanitation to keep our donors safe, a few were very understanding and came back a little later to donate. It was nice to see new faces stop in to donate, especially many people from the Kewaskum area.

We did not have as smooth a drive as we are used to, time waiting was longer, but our donors were very patient, understanding the challenging times we are in. The "Rapidpass" system the Red Cross has allows donors to read material and answer questions online the day of the drive, that speeds up your donation time. This program along with appointments, save donors about 15 minutes. This makes more time for all our donors. We highly recommend future donors to use both of these systems next time they donate blood.

Music Classes Altered At KMS

School Matters

The Kewaskum School Board held a regular monthly meeting on Thursday, Sept. 10. Sue Miller was the only board member absent. The following was among the action taken at the meeting:

• The board interviewed representatives from four legal firms, including the district's current legal counsel, Strang, Patteson, Renning, Lewis & Lacy. The board voted 4-2 at the meeting to change legal counsel to the law firm of Buelow, Vetter, Buikema, Olson & Vliet, LLC. Board members Mark Sette and Stephanie Bird voted against the change.

• The board advised School Administrator James Smasal to come to an agreement with Little Folks School House for before- and after-school care by the end of the month or the day care program will not be able to operate on school grounds.

• The board voted 6-0 to borrow \$1.7 million. The interest on the amount might be less than 1 percent, according to District Business Manager Julie Thoreson, who added that the amount is 1/3 of what the district borrowed last year.

• The board voted 6-0 to commit to a 2.44 percent increase for employee wages as part of the Above and Beyond Alternative Compensation Model for one additional year, pending the district is not undergoing any unforeseen financial difficulty next year. The district is currently in the third year of a three-year cycle of the compensation model.

• The board voted 6-0 to approve August payroll of \$1,069,363.91.

• The board voted to approve accounts payable for August invoices totaling \$276,681.07. Board Member Doug Gonring abstained because West Bend Elevator received funds in August, and Board Member Timothy Ramthun voted no.

• Purchases over \$5,000 were approved, including data increase for mobile hot spots, supply increase for mobile hot spots, theater equipment replacement, preventative maintenance contract and battling cages.

Because students are being kept in small groups to mitigate the spread of COVID-19, band and choir students at Kewaskum Middle School are in music classes only twice a week rather than five days a week as in past years.

Typically, an entire grade level has music class together at the middle school. This year, however, the classes are broken up into smaller groups so that students can be kept six feet apart while they sing or play instruments. Due to space restrictions, the students cannot meet altogether every day.

"We are holding band and choir. We do feel very fortunate to be doing that. Several districts around us are not. So we are working with the music departments and trying to come up with a compromise to do that safely," said Julie Skelton, principal at KMS.

On the days they do not have music class, students go to music lessons, study hall, library or classes in social and emotional learning. The trick has been organizing classes with available staff.

"It is a giant puzzle to keep everybody covered," Skelton said.

However, not everyone is happy. Sara Lehner, a parent, voiced her concerns at the Kewaskum School Board meeting on Thursday, Sept. 10, requesting that music classes were offered opposite band and choir days.

"There are many options — online music theory, learning to compose on the computer or creative song writing. A great option would be a music mentoring program with a high school student," Lehner said. "Education isn't just about feeding the brain. Art and music feed the heart and soul."

Skelton said the school hopes to add music classes once it is safe to do so.

"Our goal is and always has been to gradually add [music classes] as we monitor things," Skelton said. "We are very optimistic that we will get there, I just don't know when that will be. So right now, if we want to stay open, keep kids safe and minimize contact, this is what we have to do."



Gitter wanted to find a way to commemorate this day so people don't forget about this horrible tragedy, but also find a way to help out our local fire department. He thought about this "crazy idea" and his wife helped him come up with a fun and catchy name.

"I had helped do a couple other 9-11 charity rides," Gitter said. "If we don't do things to remember it, young people won't understand it. I can tell you exactly what I was doing that day. It pulls at my heart strings still."

Gitter is pretty sure that any adult can tell you exactly where they were and what they were doing when they learned of the planes hitting the World Trade Center and the other attacks on the United

States.

After coming up with the idea and a name, Gitter talked to some people about the idea. He wanted to see if anyone else liked it.

Everyone he talked to loved the idea and wanted to help. So the planning began, but a wrench was thrown into things shortly after planning started.

The first official meeting for the charity ride was held at the end of February. Then in mid-March, the state and basically the country was shut down by the Coronavirus pandemic.

"Because of COVID-19, we really didn't get together again until July," Gitter said. "I'm happy with everything we did considering COVID. A lot had to get done at the last minute."

Gitter said the hardest

part of the COVID situation was probably working with the volunteers. The group couldn't physically meet with the volunteers until right before the event. Because of restrictions on the size of group meetings, the volunteers were not allowed to come to the meetings of the planning committee.

The day of the charity ride gave Gitter a new problem. It was a rainy, dreary day for a ride and the band after the ride. A few people probably didn't attend because of the weather.

"That was probably the hardest thing," Gitter said. "The weather can just ruin everything."

He felt bad for all the hard work that so many people put into this event and then to have the weather dampen the festivities. Many people still came out for the ride and for the band later in the day. Gitter admitted that it ended up being a good day.

He was happy to be able to help the fire department. "It is about supporting the community," Gitter said. "They support us and we need to give back to the community."

Gitter also stated that he couldn't have done this without all of the people who stepped up to help.

"It took people to believe in this crazy idea to make it come together," Gitter said. "It took a whole lot of people to get this together. The thanks goes to everyone! I'm just one very little piece of this puzzle."

The group is going to meet in a few weeks to talk about the second annual 3-Some Charity Ride. Gitter, who moved to Eden just a couple years ago, is just grateful to everyone for believing in him and his idea.

"Eden is incredible," he said. "It's an amazing place for me and my family to live."

All Students Can Receive Free Meals Through End Of Year

By Anne Trautner

Students in both the Campbellsport and the Kewaskum school districts can receive free breakfast and lunch meals through the end of December, thanks to a free meal program offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The meals are being offered at no cost to students who are attending school in person as well as those who are in a virtual program. To receive a free meal, all that a student needs to do is say they would like to receive free meals. There is no income requirement.

Through a federal grant, free breakfast and lunch meals were provided for any child under the age of 18 during the summer.

On August 31, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced USDA would extend several flexibilities through as late as December 31. The flexibilities allow summer meal program operators

to continue serving free meals to all children into the fall months.

This unprecedented move will help ensure – no matter what the situation is on-the-ground – children have access to nutritious food as the country recovers from the COVID-19 pandemic, according to a USDA press release.

“As our nation reopens and people return to work, it remains critical our children continue to receive safe, healthy, and nutritious food. During the COVID-19 pandemic, USDA has provided an unprecedented amount of flexibilities to help schools feed kids through the school meal programs,

and today, we are also extending summer meal program flexibilities for as long as we can, legally and financially,” Perdue said. “We appreciate the incredible efforts by our school food-service professionals year in and year out, but this year we have an unprecedented situation. This extension of summer program authority will employ summer program sponsors to ensure meals are reaching all children – whether they are learning in the classroom or virtually – so they are fed and ready to learn, even in new and ever-changing learning environments.”

als. Consider that the river runs through you...it is the same water that courses your veins. We are 75 percent water. Water is life. Nothing living can survive without water,” Kober said.

The public is invited to help with the river project. Volunteers are needed to help with the following tasks:

- Remove aquatic invasive species where detected.
- Remove shoreline invasive plants.
- Add shoreline native plants to filter road salt and debris from entering the river.
- Add nearshore native vegetation, shrub/tree enhancement.
- Explore opportunities

to work with property owners to retain and/or plant native shoreline vegetation as filter strips to protect river water quality.

- Reduce runoff from lawns by creating vegetated buffer strips.

- Voluntary reduction in the use of fertilizers and pesticides by landowners throughout the village; the chemicals find their way to the river by way of storm sewers.

Volunteers are invited to help with river restoration on Riverview Drive in Kewaskum every Friday in September from 3-5 p.m. Safety Vests and hand tools are provided.

Financial backers and volunteers needed for

the following projects:

- HOPE’s Landing: A sitting spot along the north where the river bends.
 - Grass Replacement Project: Large invasive grass patch needs to be removed and replaced with native grasses.
 - ADA Pier Project: For anglers and kayak launching in River Hill Park.
 - Grass/Sedge Planting Project: Modern Woodman are putting \$200 toward this need planting, scheduled to occur in late September. Volunteers and groups are needed to help plant.



Kewaskum School District Receives \$24,900 Peer Review And Mentoring Grant

The Kewaskum School District received a grant for \$24,900 to enhance its new teacher mentoring program. The mentoring program will help teachers and their students by providing teachers who are new to the district with a peer mentor and extra training, which will ultimately help develop and retain high-quality teachers in the district.

The school district partnered with its local Cooperative Educational Service Agency (CESA 6) to apply for the 2020-2021 Peer Review and Mentoring Grant. The

grant includes covering the cost of the mentoring program and includes professional development, training, and coaching for new teachers.

"This year, supporting our new staff is more important than ever. Some of our new staff members are coming with experience, while for others this is their first teaching job. Either way, teaching this year with both in-person and virtual learning is going to require a lot of extra work, so we want to make sure our teachers are getting the support

they need," said Superintendent James Smasal.

"Each year we survey our new teachers to determine the best ways to support them and provide opportunities for them to grow as educators. We use that information to make improvements to our mentoring program to help retain high-quality teachers in Kewaskum," said Principal Jody Heipp, the Mentoring Program coordinator.

The Peer Review and Mentor Grant is a program for all public schools, independent

public charter schools and CESAs to improve mentoring programs for new teachers in Wisconsin. This year the Kewaskum School District has eight mentors and nine mentees in the pro-

gram, including seven new hires for the 2020-2021 school year. The maximum award for the program is \$25,000. Schools with strong mentoring programs are more likely to improve

student learning, and teachers are more likely to be satisfied with their jobs and stay in schools with a good mentoring program, according to the Kewaskum School District.

COVID-19 Concerns To Alter State Tournament Plans In Madison

The uncertainty of conducting culminating events and tournaments, and given the challenging situation with COVID-19 restrictions in Dane County, the Wisconsin Inter-scholastic Athletic Association and the University of Wisconsin-Madison announce WIAA tournaments will not be conducted at UW facilities this fall.

The WIAA has acknowledged all tournament schedules and venues are subject to change if conditions warrant in accordance with local, state and national health guidelines.

The events impacted include the state girls golf championship at University Ridge on October 12-13, the state girls individual and team tennis tournaments at Nielsen Tennis Stadium on October 15-17 and October 23-24, respectively, and the state girls swimming and diving championships on November 13-14, formerly held at the UW Natatorium with plans to move to the Nicholas Recreation Center when completed. The executive staff is in the process of identifying prospective alternate locations and venues for the three State events.

In July, the Board of Control's approval of a reduced, 11-week fall football season ruled out conducting the 2020 State Football Finals held at Camp Randall Stadium since 1982.

"Since July, we've been talking with the Board of Control, our members and UW Athletic Department personnel, and we understand our need to take a new

and different approach to this year's events," WIAA executive director Dave Anderson said. "Through our great relationship with the UW, we share the hope and look forward to more normal times."

John Horn, chief of staff to vice chancellor for finance and administration at UW, expressed similar sentiments.

"We regret, given the situation here in Dane County related to COVID-19, it will not be feasible to host the WIAA state tournaments this fall," Horn said. "We look forward to when the conditions of the pandemic improves and Dane County and campus policies change to allow larger, non-essential events."

"The WIAA events benefit not just our campus and greater Madi-

son, but the entire state," he said. "Most importantly, they are once-in-a-lifetime experiences for student-athletes and their families."

The WIAA will announce the locations and sites of culminating events and tournaments when determined and approved by the board of control, provided the tournament series is conducted as scheduled.

The WIAA, as defined by its constitution, is a voluntary, unincorporated, and nonprofit organization.

The membership oversees interscholastic athletic programs for 513 senior high schools and 49 junior high/middle level schools in its membership. For more information, please contact the WIAA office at (715) 344-8580.

Coach P's Corner

Attendance Required

In this day and age of the worldwide coronavirus pandemic, we sit and watch sports in near empty stadiums and arenas. The only people in the stadiums are workers, players, television people, owners, refs, medical staff, and probably a few extra miscellaneous hands. The crowd is what really makes the games exciting and you can ask anyone who has played any sports from little league baseball to high school football — you get charged up from hearing your own crowd going wild!

Just how important is sports to us Wisconsin Badger folks? I broke down the attendance for the University of Wisconsin athletic events. I think you'll find that we like our sports in Badgerland. I studied eight sports, four men's and four women's and came up with some interesting stats.

Let's start with the big daddy, football. Nobody has more fun at Badger games than Wisconsin fans, I've witnessed it more

times than I can count. But Wisconsin only comes in the Big Ten as the fifth best school in average attendance in the conference. The Badgers average 76,000 fans, the Big Ten has the three best averages in the nation! Michigan packs 111,000 every home game, Penn State is number two with an average of 105k, Ohio State is third at 103k.

The Badgers do very well in the winter sports attendance, leading the Big Ten conference in four sports. The men's basketball team is number one, averaging 16,900 fans at the Kohl Center. Both men's and women's hockey draw the largest crowds in the conference, men draw 9,200/game and the ladies average 2,200/game.


The fourth leading sport in the conference is not only number one in the Big Ten but number one in the nation. Women's volleyball at Madison leads the country with a home average of 8,200/game. Volleyball has been a big draw in

Wisconsin as the ladies play their home games in the historic UW-Fieldhouse and were NCAA runners-up last season.

Three other popular sports the Badgers finished in the middle of the pack. Women's basketball is ninth in the Big Ten at 3,000/home game, Iowa leads the conference with 7,000/game. In women's softball, the Badgers are ranked sixth in the conference drawing 720 people/game, Michigan leads with an average of 1,800/game.

The Badger wrestlers draw the sixth largest home crowds at just under 4,000/home meet, they also use the Fieldhouse for their home meets. Iowa wrestling has led the Big Ten attendance for the last 13 years. The Hawkeyes usually pack 12,000 to 13,000 rabid fans into Carver-Hawkeye arena for a home dual. Iowa once wrestled out in the football field at Kinnick Stadium and drew 42,000 people for the Oklahoma State match.



ORDINANCE 2020-9-1

TOWN OF OSCEOLA, FOND DU LAC COUNTY, STATE OF WISCONSIN

ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE OPERATION TOWN OF OSCEOLA, FOND DU LAC COUNTY

AN ORDINANCE DESIGNATING ALL TOWN ROADS WITHIN THE TOWN LIMITS OPEN FOR ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE OPERATION AND REGULATING THE OPERATION OF SUCH VEHICLES ON THESE ROADS

Section I – Intent 8.4.1

The Town of Osceola hereby adopts Wisconsin Assembly Bill 442 and 2017 Wisconsin Act 193 which allows all town roads to be designated as ATV/UTV routes unless posted, and point of entry signs erected in compliance with State Statutes 23.33(8)(e)1. and 2.(a) & (b).

Following due consideration of possible danger, public health, liability aspects, terrain involved, traffic density and history of automobile traffic, this ordinance has been created for public use.

Section II – Statutory Authority 8.4.2

This ordinance is created pursuant to Town authority under Section 8.4.01 and supersedes any previous ATV/UTV ordinances.

Section III – Route 8.4.3

All Town roads within the town limits are open for all-terrain vehicles unless posted otherwise.

Section IV – Conditions 8.4.4

As a condition for the use of these roads, the following conditions shall apply to all operators (and passengers):

- All ATV operators shall observe a posted speed limit sign
- All DNR, State, County and Town rules and regulations apply
- All ATV operators shall ride single file

Section V – Enforcement 8.4.5

This ordinance shall be enforced by any law enforcement officer and Town officials authorized to enforce the laws of the State of Wisconsin and the Town of Osceola.

Section VI – Penalties 8.4.6

Wisconsin State All-Terrain Vehicle penalties as found in S 23.33(13)(a) Wis. Stats., are adopted by reference and supersedes all previous Town ATV Ordinances.

Section VII – Severability 8.4.7

The provision of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and it is expressly declared that the Town of Osceola would have passed the other provisions of this resolution irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid. If any provision of this ordinance or the application to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions to other persons' circumstances shall not be deemed affected.

Section VIII – Effective Date 8.4.8

This ordinance becomes effective upon passage and publication.

1. No person will be allowed to appear before the board of review, to testify to the board by telephone, or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the assessor to view the property.

2. After the first meeting of the board of review and before the board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the board of review may contact or provide information to a member of the board about person's objection, except at a session of the board.

3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the boards; first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good case and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the sessions or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

4. Objections to the amount or valuations of property shall first be approved by made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first two hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon day of the session or up to the end of the final session, if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the land or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object only to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and to specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor of the objector unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified using the income method of valuation, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.03 (2a), Wis. Stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Eden has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. * The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (1), Wis. Stats.

7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled person who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability No other persons may testify by telephone.

8. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the board or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under s. 70.47 (3)(a), Wis. Stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.



- Lt. Col. Dean E. Mattson, U.S. Army (Mattson was born and raised in Luck, Wisconsin).

- Commander Dan Frederick Shanower, U.S. Navy (Shanower attended Carroll College).

In addition to the active military victims, the following individuals from Wisconsin were civilian employees, retired military, who were killed at the Pentagon. They also will be recognized with engraved bricks within the walkways of the memorial:

- John J. Chada, SFC, Retired Army (Chada was born in Milwaukee).

- Janice Scott (Scott was born and raised in Milwaukee).

- Patricia A. Statz (Statz was born in Eau Claire and attended

UW-Milwaukee).

Also recognized at the memorial is Lt. David Johnson, son of Kewaskum Remembers 9/11 Board Member Andrew Johnson. David Johnson was killed in Kandahar Afghanistan on January 25, 2012.

"We should all be extremely proud that this section of the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center will honor and recognize the strength, the commitment and the sacrifice which members of our armed forces have made and continue to make in keeping this nation free and safe. We will Never Forget," Haberman said.

Campbellsport School Board Looking For New Member

The Campbellsport Board of Education is looking for a new school board member to fill the position covering the Town of Auburn and the part of the Town of Osceola north of County Trunk F.

Chad Warnecke, school board president, resigned from the board. This leaves his seat open until a new board member can be found.

"It is up to you where we go from here," Paul Amundson, district administrator, told the board. "You do have your policy on what to do when there is a vacancy on the board for you to follow. I would suggest we go ahead and do that and try to have somebody in place by the second week of October. Chad's position was up in April."

Because Warnecke's seat is one that will be up for election in April, whoever is appointed would only be appointed to serve until that time. This person or anyone else will be able to take

out nomination papers and officially run for the seat in the April spring election.

The board will take applications for the position and approve a candidate at a future board meeting. Anyone who would like to fill this seat on the board should send a letter of interest to board secretary Sharon Gazzola. You can send the letter to the district office at 114 West Sheboygan St., Campbellsport, WI 53010.

In other business, board members approved a \$4,000 donation from the Campbellsport Cougar Booster Club. This donation will be used toward the "Hudl" sports program. This is a video system that will be installed in the high school gym. The total cost to install and the fee for the first year totals \$8,000.

"It will allow us to live stream games in the main gym here," Amundson said. "The Booster Club jumped in and donated for part of it — \$4,000. Our conference schools are doing it and not only our conference

but schools throughout the state. We're going to give it a try and see how it goes."

Amundson told board members that this system will allow people to watch the sporting events from a different location. In addition to sports, he stated that this could also be used for other functions held in the gym.

"It could also be used for concerts as well," Amundson said.

Board members agreed that, especially during the Coronavirus pandemic, this system could be important to the district as a whole. Grandparents, parents and others could watch events online instead of being in person. It could also be a way to keep in-person attendance numbers down to socially distance at events.

According to Amundson, the fee each year will be around \$4,000. The installation of the system will cost around \$4,000 this year only.

The board unanimously approved the donation and the system.
