Kewaskum Football Coach Exposes Youth To COVID

An assistant coach for the Kewaskum Gridiron Club, part of the Wisconsin All-American Youth Football League, exposed eighth-grade players and fellow coaches to COVID-19 last week when he attended a practice and a scrimmage.

The volunteer coach, who has not been identified, was tested for COVID-19 on Thursday, Sept. 24, in the afternoon after presenting symptoms of the virus, according to Ethan Hollenberger, public affairs coordinator for Washington County. Later that day, while his test results

were pending, he attended the Kewaskum Gridiron's eighth-grade team practice at Kewaskum High School.

Two days later, on Saturday, Sept. 26, he attended a Kewaskum-Hartford scrimmage held at Kewaskum High School on Saturday, Sept. 26. At the time, he was symptomatic and was still awaiting his results from a COVID-19 test, according to Hollenberger.

During the first half of the scrimmage, the assistant coach received a phone call from the Washington Ozaukee County Health Department that confirmed a positive test result.

Shortly after the phone call, the head coaches of both teams heard about the situation and met during a break. The assistant coach admitted that he was the one who had tested positive, according to a press release from the Wisconsin AAYFL.

The Kewaskum head coach, who is also the president of the Kewaskum Gridiron Club, immediately removed the assistant coach from the premises and relieved him of his coaching duties, according to the press release.

CHS Track Striped In Unique Way

Campbellsport High School's track was completely redone this year. The old track was torn out and a few changes were made to the track before a new one was laid.

The final step to this process was completed about two weeks ago with the striping of the running lanes. Though this seems like a simple process, it is more old-school and precise than you would think.

The striping and stenciling was done by MGL Striping out of New Mexico. This is really an art form not done by many.

"There are less than 30 stripers in the country," said Mike Garcia, superintendent/assistant manager of MGL Striping.

Mike and his cousin Luis Delgado of Denver spent two days in Campbellsport striping

the new track. Mike's father Miquel is the owner of MGL Striping.

"My dad's been doing this since the '80s, Mike said.

The company has two crews who travel throughout the United States striping tracks. Mike is in charge of one crew and his father is in charge of the other. Originally the company did both general contracting and striping but a few years ago they began focusing on the striping only because of the demand.

These lines have to be precise and any mistakes could cost a lot of money. "It can cost you \$100,000 to fix it," Mike said.

Though this seems like something that would be done with paint machines run by computers, it is not. Mike and his father paint these lines with a striping machine run manually.

Miquel even created a

special machine used only by MGL Striping. It can paint two stripes on one pass.

"My dad and I do two lines at a time," Mike said.


To start, the crew has to make some mathematical calculations to figure out where to paint the stripes.

"We get the diameter," Mike said. "From there we get our measuring. I take my time before I start so everything is right."

This gives them their starting point. Mike explained that they start with the straight-aways and paint the those lines first. They then move on to the curves on the track.

They use string to map out the lines where they need to be painted. The crew then uses the string to guide the striping machine as they walk it down the track.

Washington County Sheriff's Report

Fatal Crash

On September 27 at approximately 2:25 a.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a possible single vehicle accident on Highway 45 southbound, just north of the Interstate 41 merge in the Village of Richfield. Upon arrival, deputies confirmed a single vehicle rollover crash. Richfield Fire and Rescue responded.

A 29-year-old West Allis man was the operator of the vehicle. He was determined to be deceased at the scene. He has been identified as Andrew Barton Stevningroe.

A 27-year-old West Allis female was a passenger in the vehicle. She was ejected from the vehicle. Richfield Rescue provided aid on scene. The woman was transported via Flight

For Life to a local hospital with serious injuries.

Initial investigation indicates the vehicle lost control and left the roadway. It then overturned multiple times.

The State Patrol and its Technical Reconstruction Unit assisted with the investigation. It appears alcohol and seatbelt usage were factors in this crash.

This is the third traffic fatality investigated by the Washington County Sheriff's Office in 2020. The crash remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and the Wisconsin State Patrol.



I love this time of year. Besides all the fall sights, flavors, and scents that I wrote about a few weeks ago, October is the month of a multitude of new books releases. Many of them are holiday themed that cannot help but get readers into the spirit of the season. That is the primary reason so many books are released during the month of October. It helps with holiday sales as these titles are fresh in the minds of readers and gift givers. Read more to find out which books Kewaskum Public Library will be adding to our collection this month.

Starting with adult non-fiction, we will have a couple of cookbooks for the chef in your house. *Pie Academy* by Ken Haedrich is yes, all things pie; from crust to filling with over 250 recipes with full pictures. I hope the step-by-step tutorials for crust making will help me with my holiday baking. *Milk Street: Cookish: Throw it Together* uses 6 ingredients or less to make delicious meals that should satisfy even the pickiest eater. Ted Kennedy is showcased in *Catching the Wind: Edward Kennedy and the Liberal Hour, 1932-1975* by Neal Gabler. If you have an interest in veterinary services, check out Evan Antin's *World Wide Vet: Encounters in the Animal Kingdom*. Animal Planet's Dr. Antin involves us in his amazing journeys through the animal world.

Several of the new adult fiction books I have ordered for this month take us back to some of our favorite novels. Fannie Flagg reintroduces Bud Threadgoode in *The Wonder Boy of Whistle*

Stop. He is a grown man now who returns to Whistle Stop and discovers surprises about his family, including Ninny and Iddie. Read about Salem and the origin of the Owens bloodline of witches in *Magic Lessons: The Prequel to Practical Magic* by Alice Hoffman. If you like time traveling, check out V. E. Schwab's *The Invisible Life of Addie LaRue*. The adventure begins in 1714 and continues into the current day as this young woman makes a bargain that leaves her forgotten by everyone she ever meets. *The Cold Millions* by Jess Walter is one of the most anticipated books of the season. It features two brothers involved in the turbulent class warfare of the early twentieth century. Rumaan Alam's *Leave the World Behind* is longlisted for the 2020 National Book Award in fiction. This suspenseful novel follows two families, unknown to each other forced to spend a long weekend together. Also look for new novels in October by Debbie Macomber, James Patterson, Donna Andrews, Elin Hilderbrand and more.

In teen literature, check out the fairy tale retelling of Snow White in *Poisoned* by Jennifer Donnelly. CHS Track Striped In Unique Way

"I continue to be fascinated with their work," said Tom Griesemer, CHS athletic director. "I could tell just by watching Mike work that I was observing a true craftsman or artisan at work. He has his basic marks to follow, but he is in full control behind the painter. It was true artistry to watch how skillfully he painted the curves of the track. The track was his canvas and he left us a piece of art that we all can appreciate."

Mike explained that as he pushes the machine down the track he watches closely to make sure the lines are going on straight and smooth. He also listens closely to the machine to make sure there are no problems like clogs with the paint.

He also makes sure to find a good pace for the machine. If he goes too fast or slow the paint could splatter or he might move too much and the line would not be straight.

"That's in the practice and doing it for so many years," Mike said. "It's a tough job. You have to use your brain all the time and be a good worker."

The paint they use is a special blend of paint. It is a mix that Miquel came up with.

"You want your paint to move with the surface," Mike said.

The mix they use works well with the tracks they stripe. It is also good for hot or cold climates, which is good anywhere in the country.

"The paint they use is so specialized that it is difficult to find," Griesemer said.

There are only a few places in the country where they can get this paint. So they try to have enough with them for a couple jobs at a time before they need to travel to pick up more paint.

The company has three sets of equipment and two crews. They keep this equipment in different spots throughout the United States so the crew doesn't have to travel too far with the equipment for each job.

They work for about eight months out of the year. In climate's like Wisconsin, they only have a few months to get the jobs done.

"We can't paint below 40 degrees," Mike said.

When Mike and Luis were in Campbellsport, they had to wait to start

in the morning until around 9 a.m. They then worked until the sun started to set. They work a lot of 12-hour days in order to be at a site for only about two days, depending on the weather.

Mike has only had one job that has taken him almost a week. That was in Hawaii. According to Mike, it rains every morning in Hawaii so they had to wait for the track to dry in order to do the striping, which gave them fewer hours each day to work. Though Mike admitted Hawaii was not a bad place to be on the job for a week.

In a year, MGL Striping does about 70 to 80 tracks a year. Each state has different ways the tracks need to be striped, according to what races are run at the high schools. Colleges can also be slightly different depending on the events.

They have striped colleges and high schools all over. MGL Striping did the track at Texas A&M University. Right after finishing in Campbellsport, they were traveling to Marshfield to do the new middle school track. Mike and Luis had done the high school track earlier this summer.

They also stencil different things like the lane numbers, starting marks, exchange zones

and school or mascot names. The crew has even been tasked with creating some of the designs for the stencils they have used.

Though Mike loves what he does and likes working with his father, the traveling can be tough. They are traveling around the United States and not home much during the eight months they are working. Around November, they take a few months off.

Miquel began his ca-

reer working for an athletic company who did striping. This is how he got into this line of work.

Mike, who is 23, has been working with his father since he was young. He even has a picture of himself when he was a toddler sitting on his dad's machine while Miquel was striping. Mike smiles while showing that photo.

"I enjoy doing this," Mike said. "You get satisfaction. Doing good quality is my main thing. I'm a perfectionist."

Plasma from whole blood donations made through the American Red Cross that test positive for COVID-19 antibodies may now help current coronavirus patients in need of convalescent plasma transfusions.

Donors are encouraged to make an appointment to give blood now to help ensure coronavirus patients and others who depend on transfusions have needed blood products this fall.

In April, the Red Cross began collecting COVID-19 convalescent plasma from previously diagnosed individuals, who could only give at one of approximately 170 Red Cross blood donation centers across the country. Convalescent plasma contains COVID-19 antibodies that may help the most critical patients actively fighting this virus. Now, whole blood donations made at any Red Cross blood drive or blood donation center could be

helpful in this effort.

"Donations that come back positive for COVID-19 antibodies now undergo secondary testing to confirm antibody results, and that enables the Red Cross to then potentially use the plasma from those donations for COVID-19 patients," said Dr. Erin Goodhue, executive medical director of direct patient care with the Red Cross Biomedical Services. "With approximately two percent of the U.S. population testing positive for COVID-19 antibodies, every donation is important to ensure patients with coronavirus have access to every treatment option available to them."

The Red Cross encourages eligible individuals to schedule an appointment, download the free Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

About antibody testing

Antibody testing may indicate if the donor's immune system has produced antibodies to this coronavirus, regardless of whether an individual experienced COVID-19 symptoms. Donations are tested using samples pulled at the time of donation and sent to a testing laboratory where they will also undergo routine infectious disease testing.

COVID-19 antibody test results will be available within one to two weeks in the Red Cross Blood Donor App or donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org. A positive antibody test result does not confirm infection or immunity. The Red Cross is not testing donors to diagnose illness, referred to as a diagnostic test.

Important COVID-19 information for donors

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and ad-

ditional precautions – including temperature checks, social distancing and face coverings for donors and staff – have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance.

Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive and are required to wear a face covering or mask while at the drive, in alignment with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention public guidance.

Kewaskum Football Coach Exposes Youth To COVID

The (now former) assistant coach left without incident, according to the AAYFL. All of this transpired within 15 minutes, the AAYFL reported. As a precautionary measure, the scrimmage was immediately cancelled.

The Kewaskum Gridiron Club shared the internal video of the scrimmage with site officials as well as officials from the Kewaskum School District and the Washington Ozaukee County Health Department to help with contact tracing measures.

The health depart-

ment also was informed that the coach had attended the Kewaskum Gridiron's eighth-grade team practice on Thursday, Sept. 24. He had been at the practice for less than an hour, and it was determined that he was properly distanced from players and coaches during the practice, as were the rest of the team members, according to Brewer.

Late Sunday evening, the health department cleared everyone from any further measures of required quarantine and the situation was closed.

Parents were notified accordingly, according to Mike Brewer, Wisconsin AAYFL commissioner.

The Kewaskum Gridiron Club has players who have been quarantined this season, but not for issues related to the scrimmage or league play. A press release on the Kewaskum Gridiron website states that the club is committed to providing everyone a safe, responsible way to play football during this unprecedented pandemic.

"The AAYFL applauds the swift action by both

organizations and coaches present," Brewer said in a press release that was released on Monday, Sept. 28, regarding Saturday's scrimmage. "The AAYFL also appreciates the tireless and hard work of all our healthcare professionals and public health officials, who are handling the ongoing and ever-changing circumstances of this pandemic."

Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann, who has a son who plays youth football under the Hartford's head coach, also recognized the Kewaskum Gridiron Club for handling the situation correctly.

"Responding to this pandemic is easy," Schoemann said. "Stay home when sick, period. I have not found anyone who agrees with the coach's decision to attend practice and a scrimmage while waiting for his test results. Individuals who blatantly ignore the Trump Administration and CDC guidelines play right into the hands of those who want to see our economy, schools and sports shut down. Every outbreak begins with a sick person not staying home. I believe the vast majority of our citizens are following CDC guidelines."

The Kewaskum Gridiron Club correctly im-

plemented the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines, according to Schoemann.

"Washington County will not be issuing orders or heavy handed government orders. We trust organizations, such as the Gridiron Club, to appropriately apply CDC guidelines for close contact," Schoemann said.

The Washington Ozaukee Public Health Department urges anyone who is symptomatic

or waiting for test results to stay home until the results are received.

"If you test positive, keep your community safe by staying home. We all need to work together in order to slow the spread and keep our most vulnerable citizens safe," Schoemann said.

Kewaskum Public Library Offers StoryWalk

This is the first time the Kewaskum Public Library has done a StoryWalk. However, the concept has been around since 2007, when Anne Ferguson of Montpelier, Vermont created the StoryWalk Project. She wanted to develop something that promoted early literacy, physical activity and family time together in nature.

Thus, the StoryWalk Project was born. It was developed in collaboration with the Vermont Bicycle and Pedestrian Coalition and the Kellogg Hubbard Library. The project has since spread to all 50 states and at least 12 different countries.

Other libraries in the area offer StoryWalks as well, such as the libraries in West Bend and Horicon. The Monarch Library System is currently putting together a StoryWalk kit that area libraries can use. The Kewaskum Public Library, however, created its own StoryWalk.

"We didn't really know that much about it. But with the pandemic, we wanted to have something people can do outside that is different from just sitting at home or playing in their yard," said Kimberly Kluge, children's librarian/assistant director for the Kewaskum Public Library.

Because of the pandemic, the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce has canceled its Christmas Cookie Walk this year. The library staff thought this was a way to still involve area businesses with a community activity.

Unlike the Cookie Walk, participants will not need to go inside businesses. Two oversized pages from "Leaf Man" are hanging in a window of each participating business, so participants can read the book from outside.

"We are doing that for several reasons. Because of the pandemic, we don't want people congregating indoors. But also people might be walking by when the business is closed on a Sunday, at night or earlier in the morning," Kreis explained.

The pages in the windows are filled with colorful pictures of fall leaves.

"We chose 'Leaf Man' because Lois Ehlert is actually a Wisconsin author. She is very popular and has great

illustrations. It is perfect for October," Kreis said.

Kewaskum Fire Department Reminds Residents: “Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!”

The Kewaskum Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) — the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years — to promote this year’s Fire Prevention Week campaign, “Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!” The campaign works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Almost half (44 percent) of reported home fires started in the kitchen. Two-thirds (66 percent) of home cooking fires start with the ignition of food or other cooking materials.

“We know cooking fires can be prevented,” said Lorraine Carli, NFPA’s vice president of outreach and advocacy. “Staying in the kitchen, using a timer, and avoiding distractions such as electronics or TV are steps everyone can take to keep fami-

lies safe in their homes.”

The Kewaskum Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the 2020 Fire Prevention Week theme.

“The most important step you should take before making a meal is to “Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!” said Lt. Amy McCartney. “A cooking fire can grow quickly. I have seen many homes damaged and people injured by fires that could easily have been prevented.”

Kewaskum Fire Department wants to share safety tips to keep you from having a cooking fire.

■Never leave cooking food unattended. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling or broiling. If you have to leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove.

■If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you’re cooking.

■You have to be alert when cooking. You won’t be alert if you are

sleepy, have taken medicine or drugs, or consumed alcohol that makes you drowsy.

■Always keep an oven mitt and pan lid nearby when you’re cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame. Turn off the burner, and leave the pan covered until it is completely cool.

■Have a “kid-free zone” of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

The Kewaskum Fire Department is providing a virtual presentation for area daycare and grade school students in support of this year’s Fire Prevention Week campaign, “Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!”. Through these educational presentations, your students can learn more about the importance of being safe in and around the kitchen.

A Learning Lesson For KHS Boys Soccer

"From every challenge we face in this beautiful life comes a commensurate opportunity for us to learn and to improve," head coach John Kenworthy stated after the Kewaskum High School boys soccer team was soundly defeated 8-1 by non-conference challenger Random Lake on Thursday, Sept. 24, at home on Doc Mitchell Field. "And if that's the case, boy did we get an octet full o' learning!"

Featuring an entire contingent of emerging young players earning their first varsity minutes, Kewaskum struggled to match the size, athleticism or sheer experience of the well-coached Random Lake Rams.

Things started off well for the home team, taking an early lead off of a long run and unassisted goal by junior midfielder Ben Poschmann, who also did yeoman duty by helping anchor the defense at times during the contest. After that first optimistic goal unfortunately, there was little room for the vaunted Kewaskum scoring attack to shine. Sophomore striker Denali Fellenz, who had been lighting up the nets previously – with six goals in four games – was brought down to earth by an observant and effective strategy by Random Lake wherein he was man-marked or double-teamed throughout the game, thus neutralizing his normally

potent attack.

"Listen, that's on me," said Kenworthy, "I didn't anticipate early enough that possibility and thus I didn't have Denali prepared adequately for what we should do when that happened. Every coach I know is a stat junky watching Wissports or Googling results. They know who he is. I expect Denali to be a key element of our scoring attack for years to come so this is just the first of what is sure to be many efforts of this kind."

That being the case, Kenworthy lauded the remainder of the squad for playing with effort all the way through to the final whistle despite their age and relative inexperience at this level.

Along with standout freshman Hayden Johnson, who again earned praise from his coaches for his outstanding intelligence, ability and skill, numerous younger players earned significant time on the field in the otherwise disappointing match, gaining valuable experience in doing so. Jacob Parodo, Daniel Jungers, Brandon Weinreich, Jayce Rhoads and Jayson Maas all earned their first varsity play of the year while Hudson Curtin, Diesel Fellenz, Austin Jantz and Austin Loehr picked up where

they left off at the Kiel Tournament the previous weekend.

Also earning coach Kenworthy's recognition in the game was Junior Tony Busalacchi who "... always plays smart, knows what Coach [Chuck] Grover and I are looking for, and gives it his all in the passing lanes – no matter where or when we play him. Just a great kid!"

Asked if he was looking for the team to quickly forget this game and move on to the next one, Kenworthy replied thoughtfully, "Maybe. But not really. I obviously don't like losing – especially to teams with whom we match up well on normal days, but I never want us as a program to forget anything, or to take any aspect of this lightly. In the big scheme of things, it's only one game, one brief, not-so-shining moment in time, but I hope that we can learn from it. I hope that we can learn technical things certainly. But more so that we can learn we have the ability within each one of us to put 100 percent effort into everything we do in life: whether it is sport or school or whatever it may be that they endeavor to do with their lives. I hope the guys don't forget that part. That's kind of important."

The next game for Kewaskum will be a non-conference effort at home against East Central Wisconsin foe, KML on Thursday, October 1, at 6:45 p.m. on Doc Mitchell Field. Soccer passes are required for admittance to the stadium.

McMullen Outduels Vanderboom At Dodge County To Extend MSA Winning Streak

Three-time Midwest Sprint Car Association champion and current point leader Brandon McMullen Oshkosh held off a spirited challenge from 17-year-old Jack Vanderboom of Dousman to rack up his third straight MSA A-main victory in the 20-lap Fuzzy Fassbender Memorial Race at the Dodge County Fairgrounds in Beaver Dam, Wis. on Friday, Sept. 25.

The 16th full MSA program of the COVID-19-shortened 2020 campaign was run in honor of the late Fuzzy Fassbender, father of current MSA competitor and former series champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett, who was one of the most successful open-wheel racers in Southeastern Wisconsin racing history.

The event drew 24 entrants for the second MSA event of the 2020 season at the sprawling "horsepower half mile" facility.

Outside front row starter **Shane Wenninger of Kewaskum** got the jump on polesitter Tyler Davis of South Milwaukee to lead the opening lap of the 20-lap main event, while fourth starter Jack Vanderboom bolted

into second and sixth starter Lance Fassbender slipped into third.

On lap two, McMullen made his presence felt as he worked his way up from the eighth starting spot to power around Fassbender into third in the running order exiting turn four.

One lap later, Vanderboom bolted in to pressure Wenninger for the top spot along the low groove of the lightning fast track surface. Wenninger and Vanderboom dueled side by side for the lead over three consecutive laps, before the lone caution flag of the race was displayed on lap six when rookie Austin Hartmann of Plymouth spun in turn three.

Under caution, Wenninger's machine slowed to a stop in turn one and failed to refire, forcing him to retire to the pit area as Vanderboom inherited the lead.

McMullen used a strong run on the restart to surge past Vanderboom into the lead with a high move in turn three on lap seven. McMullen wasted no time in building up a solid cushion over Vanderboom as the leaders began to slice their way through lapped traffic during the second half of the race.

On lap 13, five-time MSA champion Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee, who started seventh, pulled off a slide job to pass Fassbender for third in turn three.

Meanwhile, McMullen had his hands full with lapped traffic over the final five circuits, which allowed Vanderboom to close the gap drastically

in the closing laps.

On the final lap Vanderboom appeared that he was going to make a challenge for the lead with a big run in turns three and four. However, the second-year MSA 360 Sprint Car competitor jumped the cushion entering turn four and was unable to mount a serious threat in the final corner as McMullen held on to secure his seventh MSA A-main victory of the season, second victory of the 2020 campaign at the Dodge County Fairgrounds and 30th overall career MSA main event win.

After the race, McMullen seemed more impressed with Vanderboom's runner-up effort, than his own performance.

"It's awesome to get a win, but I'm pumped for Jack," McMullen said. "He really gave me a run and made me earn it tonight. He has an awesome future in racing."

Vanderboom equaled his career-best MSA A-main finish with a second-place showing.

"I almost had him at the end, but things were a little sketchy in turns three and four on that final lap when I got up too high," Vanderboom said. "Overall, it was a really good night and it feels good to bring the car home second."

Davis was satisfied with a third-place showing at one of his favorite tracks on the MSA schedule.

Tim Haddy of Waupun placed fourth after starting fifth and Fassbender rounded out the top five.

Thanks for reading my thoughts in The Statesman each week. I hope to be able to provide you a little insight as to what a long-time coach and athletic director sees, to provide you with what might be a little different perspective.

This week I want to write about the relationships that coaches develop through school activities. Honestly, the experiences kids tend to have are mirrored by what coaches experience. The people you coach with, whether or not in your same sport(s), become good friends and often become lifelong friends.

You all have a common goal. That is what is great about a school our size...the same kids are needed for a number of the programs. We can work together to try to help kids get the best out of themselves, competitively, as well as teaching them the many lessons that go along with these opportunities. If it does not click with one person, it may click with another.

What is it like with

opposing coaches? That is always interesting to see. There may have been some opposing coaches for whom I may not have had greatest amount of respect. I'm just being honest. They may have felt similarly towards me. However, those individuals have been few and far between.

I have many very good friends whom I have coached against over the years. Some are from rival schools. I do not know how many people realize the friendships and collegiality that exists between rival coaches. Often times we are good friends. I will use my newspaper counterpart - Coach Mark Peterson - as an example.

Mark is supposed to be evil, from that rival “school up north.” (Referencing Woody Hayes and Bo Schembechler.) Coach Pete being “evil” could not be further from the truth, with him and practically all of the coaches I have competed against from Campbellsport over the years. We are all in

the “same business” and while we do want to beat each other when we compete, we know that the respect from the arena of competition and the lessons we take from it are what really matters – even as adults.

Coaches and athletes also have a special bond. You spend many hours together, working to do the best you can with and for each other. I know that during the years of my tenure as head football coach I considered the dozens and dozens of young men in the program each year as surrogate sons. I am honored to have had many “sons” and “daughters” whom I have coached over the years. You do have that parental pride when you see them move on from their time with you and see them become great young people and adults.

The relationships we have and what we do with them is a big part of life. I hope this gives you a glimpse of what it looks like from this perspective.



Coach P's Corner

Back On The Right Track

Back almost 33 years ago I was sitting in Superintendent Joe Bertone's office about to sign my first teaching contract in the Campbellsport School District. One of Joe's final questions was can you coach football? I said yes; I played in high school. He said “good you're one of the JV Coaches”.

He obviously knew about my wrestling skills and added me to Jerry “Sarge” Markings staff alongside Steve Engelland. Then he asked if I could handle the head boy's track job and I almost jumped out of my seat. As a former track athlete at Fondy, I was excited for the opportunity. I was a miler and that's about all the credentials I brought to the table; too small for jumping events and not enough power to be a thrower.

It didn't seem to bother Joe and it was one less coach he had to find. I could sense Joe trusted me and had a little interest in improving the track program. Turns out I was right. After the meeting, Joe took me out to see the track. It was an old cinder track (not many of those around anymore) and it was getting prepped for new asphalt and a rubber coating surface. I told Joe he didn't have to do that

for me. Joe turned and chuckled and said “just get kids out for the sport”.

I took those words to heart, and with a brand new track I had plenty of selling points. I snagged a lot of football players and wrestlers during the fall and winter and when spring came, I had decent numbers.

I was head coach for six years at CHS and we could never reach the top of the Flyway mountain. Our best finish in the conference was third place but I got kids out, promoted the heck out of the sport and even created an All-District Youth Track Meet. I also got a chance to coach several outstanding athletes and witness some unbelievable performances. I was by Matt Thull's side at the WIAA State Track & Field Meet when he finished second in the state in the 3,200 meter race. His time of 9:35 back in 1993 still stands as a school record. I was also around to see Joe Stoffel go 6'6” in the high jump to qualify for the state meet, a school record that stands since 1994.

That takes us to the present day. If you haven't seen the new CHS Track facilities, you need to check it out - you will be proud. The track and field got a whole new facelift

this past spring and summer. The track got completely torn out and re-paved. A new base was poured and covered with a fresh base of rubber coating. The whole bleacher area and its surroundings were upgraded, landscaped beautifully, and given all new fencing.

The new track facilities come at a perfect time as the program is led by former star athlete (and Campbellsport Hall of Famer) Derek Toshner. Toshner was a state runner-up in the 300 low hurdles and a multi-national champ at UW-LaCrosse. Toshner still holds the CHS record in the 300 lows at 38.3 seconds.

“Tosh” is assisted by his wife Shannon (also a star track athlete for the Cougars). The Toshners have improved the track programs immensely since taking over. Numbers are way up, the teams are very competitive, and they are very big promoters of the sport. The Cougars have not won a conference title ever on the girl's side and only the 1973 boys' team can say they won a conference team championship. The Toshners hope to change that trend and bring championship fever back to their new track.

Getting A Flu Vaccine Now Is Critical During Ongoing COVID-19 Pandemic

State Health officials are urging Wisconsin residents to get vaccinated against the flu as soon as possible. Annual flu vaccines are always important, but reducing illness and hospitalization from flu is critical this year to protect our frontline health care workers and hospital systems who will continue to care for people with COVID-19.

"Now more than ever, getting your flu vaccine is one of the most important and proactive steps you can take to protect yourself, the people you love, and people around you," said DHS secretary-designee Andrea Palm. "Getting sick from the flu could result in hospitalization at a time when our frontline health workers are doing all they can to help COVID-19 patients recover."

Last flu season, 42 percent of Wisconsinites received at least one dose of flu vaccine, leaving nearly two-thirds of people at higher risk of getting the flu. During Wisconsin's 2019-2020 influenza season, there were 36,175 flu cases reported, 4,425 flu-related hospitalizations, and tragically, 183

deaths, including three children. Last year, we saw the highest number of pregnant women hospitalized for influenza.

Flu season is right around the corner in Wisconsin and it takes about two weeks for the flu vaccine to protect you against the virus. Make a plan today to get yourself and your family vaccinated by contacting your health care provider to schedule an appointment, or checking with your local pharmacy. You can also use vaccinefinder.gov or call 211 to find a provider near you. If cost is a concern, your children may be eligible for the Wisconsin Vaccines for Children program.

"Both influenza and COVID-19 are respiratory illnesses, but until

we have a vaccine against COVID-19, the way to help prevent these two viruses from circulating at the same time is to get your flu vaccine now," Palm said. "We all need to do everything possible to make a difference this flu season, so let's keep people flu-free while we focus on ending COVID-19."

Providers are being creative this year to help make vaccinations easy and convenient, from holding vaccination drives at churches and grocery store parking lots, to providing them curbside at clinics. Safety precautions related to COVID-19 are in place, including social distancing and sanitizing at clinics, temperature checks, and special

scheduling. Simple steps we're already following to stop the spread of COVID-19 are also successful for warding off the flu. In addition to the flu vaccine, people should also:

- Stay home when they're sick.

- Cover coughs and sneezes.

- Wash their hands frequently and thoroughly.

To help increase flu vaccine rates statewide, the Department just announced new funding for community organizations to reach out to underserved communities. DHS will award \$950,000, provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), to five-10 organizations, each receiving up to \$200,000.
