## O'Connor Ready To Lead

As you drive up to the Campbellsport Middle/High School building in the morning, you will see a new face outside welcoming students to school every morning. Patrick O'Connor has taken over as principal at the school.

"This is a perfect fit for me," he said.

O'Connor comes to Campbellsport from the West Bend School District where he was a high school vice principal. He started out in the Milwaukee School District where he worked for a year before moving to

West Bend. He began as a high school English teacher and coach.

"I was there for 13 or 14 years," O'Connor said.

While at West Bend, his career path changed a bit with some help from the district administrator. In 2011 or 2012, the idea was out there to find a better way to meet student needs.

"My superintendent wanted to find an innovative way to get kids to graduate," O'Connor said.

This led to a charter school in West Bend with O'Connor as one of the main teachers and supervisor of the school.

"In time I really got into what we were doing," he said.

Eventually, this opportunity led to the next one — vice principal at the high school. Then when the Campbellsport principal position became available, O'Connor saw his next opportunity.

"After three years there (as West Bend vice principal), I had learned a lot," he said. "I can now take the experiences here. I feel like the leadership at the charter school prepared me more for this."

## Survivor Pear Trees Bring Hope

— Trees Brought To Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial And Education Center In Kewaskum

After the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City occurred in 2001, the disaster site was covered with rubble and with gray dust for months.

As recovery worker Becky Cloughone sifted through the wreckage in October 2001, she noticed a little bud sprouting out of the debris pile. The rubble was cleared from the area, revealing

a Callery pear tree.

The tree was lying on its side. Parts of the tree were burned, splintered and torn. But it was alive.

That tree, known today as the "Survivor Tree," is now part of the 9/11 Memorial in New York City. The tree has become a symbol of hope and resilience.

Now, that symbol is coming to Kewaskum. Two trees that are offspring of that original Survivor Tree will be

planted at the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center in Kewaskum this fall.

**The Survivor Tree**

Ron Vega, an architect who worked in the recovery efforts of the World Trade Center, was there when the Survivor Tree was found. Later, he became the director of design for the 9/11 Memorial Plaza in New York City.

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# Wisconsin Newspapers Highlight Homelessness In Wisconsin

Newspaper outlets from across Wisconsin are coming together to once again report on the plight of the homeless in Wisconsin.

In 2019 more than 30 news outlets reported on the state of homelessness in Wisconsin. The content from the reporting which was circulated by the Associated Press, appeared in newspapers across the country.

The homelessness reporting project, spearheaded by the newspapers of Multi-Media Channels (MMC) and the Wisconsin State Journal, is once again challenging Wisconsin's newspapers to tell the story of the state's homeless.

This year's reporting will mark the upcoming World Homeless Day on October 10 by continuing the conversation about the ongoing challenges

faced by the homeless.

In 2019, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development reported 4,358 homeless living throughout Wisconsin. This upcoming reporting could see that number change due to the financial impact that the COVID-19 pandemic is having on many Wisconsinites.

The National Low Income Housing Coalition has responded to the COVID housing crisis by highlighting the need for a broad array of resources and protections for people who may be facing eviction including emergency rental assistance and eviction prevention assistance. The coalition is also calling for emergency funds for homelessness service providers, housing authorities and housing providers.

Financial giving opportunities are available in Wisconsin for anyone who would like to assist the efforts of those supporting the homeless. In order to facilitate contributions to the homelessness effort, a Wis-

consin Media Supporting Homelessness GoFundMe page has been established by Multi-Media Channels. Contributions to Wisconsin Media Supporting Homelessness will be distributed by MMC via Wisconsin's Continuum of Care, a nonprofit organization representing county providers throughout the state.

The Continuum of Care is comprised of agencies which serve, support and care about individuals experiencing homelessness. Through the nonprofit organization, hundreds of agencies throughout Wisconsin coordinate resources to provide all manner of services for the homeless – including street outreach, case management, emergency sheltering, rapid rehousing, homelessness prevention, housing navigation and ultimately permanent housing.

The Wisconsin Newspaper Association salutes the work of the homelessness reporting project and the efforts of its members to support the homeless of the State of Wisconsin.

## Census Special Operations Counts People Experiencing Homelessness

From the U.S. Census Bureau Region

The U.S. Census Bureau began the special operations to count people experiencing homelessness in communities across the country on September 22. Specially trained census takers will count people Sept. 22-24 at shelters, soup kitchens and mobile food van

stops in an operation called Service-Based Enumeration (SBE). Census takers will count people who live outdoors, in transit stations, and at other locations where people are known to sleep in an operation called Targeted Non-Sheltered Outdoor Locations (TNSOL).

"The Census Bureau is committed to counting everyone once, only once, and in the right place," said Dr. Steven Dillingham, director of the Census Bureau. "To reach everyone living in the United States, our census takers are conducting special operations to count people experiencing homelessness to ensure we have a complete and accurate 2020 count."

Counting people experiencing homelessness is part of the Group Quarters (GQ) operation, a special process to count people in unique living situations. The GQ operation also counts people living in nursing homes, prisons, missions and dormitories. A complete and accurate 2020 Census can ultimately help organiza-

tions provide better services, food distribution capability, and improved shelter options to those in need.

"We are committed to taking every step necessary to make sure we count everyone," said Dillingham. "Even if you have someone staying with you who doesn't have another place to live, be sure to include them when you respond."

In preparation for counting people experiencing homelessness, the Census Bureau is coordinating with local service providers and has consulted with advocacy groups and other stakeholders throughout the country to adjust this work in response to COVID-19. The Census Bureau is also working with service provider administrators to identify locations where people experiencing homelessness are living to ensure a complete count of this population.

Hotels that are being used as COVID-19 shelters generally fall under the Enumeration at Transitory Locations operation and are not a part of SBE. However, if

100 percent of the hotel is housing people experiencing homelessness, then it is enumerated during SBE.

To count people outdoors in places like tent encampments, teams of census takers wearing reflective vests and carrying smartphones, flashlights and paper questionnaires will visit those locations; often at night. Every effort will be made to collect all the information requested on the census form. If that

isn't possible, census takers will conduct a population count. Census takers will follow the latest local public health guidance regarding the use of personal protective equipment and social distancing.


Census statistics are crucial to programs and service providers that support people experiencing homelessness and inform how state, local and federal lawmakers will allocate billions of dollars in federal

funds for local services such as shelters and soup kitchens, and programs like the Emergency Shelter Grants Program and the Special Milk Program for children. Local nonprofit organizations also rely on census statistics to improve where and how they provide critical services.

## Publisher's Letter

### Homelessness and Matthew 25:35

Dear Reader,

A defining human quality is the ability to imagine what another person is going through, to have compassion for their suffering, and to want to relieve their pain. In many ways this is what Jesus inspired us to do. It is why His words in Matthew 25:35 and following are so compelling even now, 2,000 years after his life and death:

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me."

Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?"

The King will reply, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

This charitable view is a foundational principle of Christianity, yet it is held in common by non-Christians as well. It is, in my view, a universal principle of human relationships: We must love one another and care for those in need.

Next Saturday, Oct. 10, is Homelessness Day which all too briefly rec-

ognizes that being homeless is real, anguishing, and ongoing. Now, more than ever, the need is great for the economic carnage from the coronavirus and lockdowns which have thrown thousands of Wisconsinites into a gauntlet of scavenging for a meal or a safe, dry place to sleep each night. For reasons too varied to describe in this short space, many good, hardworking, accomplished people find themselves out on the street, left to forage a living bereft of any substantial income or support. Some are able to get back on track: others are not.

We must help these brothers and sisters who have fallen on hard times and share what we have. When we help them, we help ourselves to be more compassionate, more forgiving, and more human. When we feel the pain of others, we feel the pain in ourselves. Standing close together absorbing each other's heat keeps us all from freezing to death, physically and mentally.

Giving is an act of compassion and love — a universal language of the heart. Why shake off the world; rather, instead, seize and mold it into something good; so good that at the end it expresses the innermost goodness of the human being.

There is a mixture of quiet heroism and joy in uplifting the human spirit and improving matters. When on this path, we are creating a much richer world — for all of us.

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
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# CMS September Students Of The Month

## UW Health Offers Caution On Indoor Gatherings

As the weather gets cooler and the cases of COVID-19 continue to climb in Wisconsin, UW Health officials want to offer reminders about gatherings, which increasingly are moving indoors.

•The risk of COVID-19 transmission increases in indoor settings, especially if airflow is limited, if people are unmasked and if they are unable to physically distance.

•The risk of transmission decreases outdoors if people are also able to socially distance, but as temperatures drop, outdoor gatherings will become more difficult and people may want to gather indoors.

•Indoor gatherings should be limited to those who live

in your household, or with groups of less than 10 people who are part of the same small stable social "bubble."

•It is always a good idea to wear a mask when spending time indoors with people who do not live in your household.

•Holiday gatherings are on the horizon, which would normally include large indoor gatherings. UW Health encourages the public to limit gatherings to small groups and get creative with virtual options.

Cooler weather also means it is flu season again, so it is important to schedule your flu shot today to keep you and your family protected from influenza during this ongoing pandemic.

## Washington County Sheriff's Report

### Garage Fire

On Saturday, Oct. 3, at 2:22 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a garage fire at 4960 Morning Glory Drive in the Town of West Bend.

Washington County sheriff's deputies and the West Bend Fire Department responded to a report of a garage fire. Initial reports indicated that an attached garage was filled with black smoke. The residence, a single family two-story home, was occupied at the time of the fire, but the occupants were able to evacuate safely. The homeowner was able to close all the garage doors to prevent the fire from spreading to the main residential area. Fire personnel arrived on scene and extinguished the fire and hot spots fairly quickly. Fire personnel conducted

overhaul to verify the fire did not reach the interior of the home.

The fire was contained to the garage; however, the interior of the residence sustained smoke and water damage. Estimated structure damage is approximately \$85,000. The origin and cause of the fire is under investigation by the West Bend Fire Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Personnel from the following fire departments responded: West Bend, Jackson, Newburg, Kewaskum, Allenton, and Kohlsville. WE Energies assisted on scene. The American Red Cross will be assisting the displaced family.

The homeowner was evaluated on scene for smoke inhalation. No fire or police personnel were injured.

# Kewaskum School Board To Discuss Virtual Learning Options

As the number of COVID-19 cases continues to rise across Wisconsin, the Kewaskum School District is looking at options to safely educate students.

The district leadership team is set to share with the Kewaskum School Board on Thursday, Oct. 8, plans that have been made if needed for going all virtual, 4K through 12th grade, or going to a hybrid model. The hybrid model would have 4K through fifth grade continuing with in-person learning on a daily basis and secondary students, sixth through 12th grade, going to an every other day model.

District Administrator James Smasal sent a letter to parents on October 2 outlining the plans.

"We believe in our mission to have in-person learning be a choice for all students and families," Smasal wrote to the families.

"As much as we believe in our mission, the reality is that positive COVID-19 cases continue to rise in our state. The data is showing the increase in positive cases is a reflection of community involvement in spreading the virus, outside of attending school. We ask that you please do anything you can to help decrease those numbers," Smasal wrote.

"For a myriad of legitimate reasons, schools

are moving to virtual formats. Consequently, it would be prudent for the school district to have plans in place if the need arises," Smasal wrote.

Using guidelines set by the county and state health departments, as well as the CDC, the district has been following a plan for dealing with the COVID-19 virus.

When the district receives confirmation of a positive COVID-19 case of a student or staff, it emails a Positive Case letter to families within the building of the student/staff person. This letter does not mean a specific child has been exposed; instead, it is an effort to be transparent and communicating that there is a case in the building.

"We ask those families to monitor their child(ren) and do not send them to school if they have ANY symptoms of illness. Families may choose to voluntarily quarantine their child for the recommended 14 days (as a potential close contact to the positive individual)," Smasal wrote.

Parents should communicate with the school office their desire to quarantine and move to the virtual format.

"If your child was exposed and named a close contact, which would result in quarantine, separate communication comes from the school. These children will be provided with virtual learning during the

quarantine period. According to CDC guidelines if your son/daughter has received a positive COVID-19 test in the past 90 days and is symptom-free he/she may be considered immune to the virus at this time. Please provide the positive test result documentation to the school nurse as quarantine may not need to take place at this time," Smasal wrote.

It is recommended that anyone who is waiting on test results, including household members, be quarantined until the result

comes back.

"Finally, we reiterate the need for all families to have a back-up plan for their child in the event one or all of our schools need to move to a full-virtual or hybrid model," Smasal wrote. "As stated numerous times before, this is a step we are trying to avoid taking, yet there is a realistic possibility it could happen in the future and we want parents to have a plan ready to implement in the event classes can not take place in person for an extended period of time."

"When Mr. Fisher resigned, we gave people three weeks to put in their application, so we will probably give people three weeks again to apply," Smasal said. "Then the board will more than likely at their November board meeting appoint someone to the position."

Smasal said that he will suggest to the board that they hold interviews prior to the school board meeting on November 12.

"I would suggest that they do interviews and select somebody to be on the board," Smasal said.

If the majority of the board members cannot agree on a candidate to fill the board position, then it will be up to Board President Jim

Leister to fill the position within 60 days.

"I would assume that they would potentially agree on somebody before the November board meeting, that they would pick somebody and swear them in, and then go through the meeting," Smasal said.

Whoever is appointed to Sette's position will serve the remainder of his term, which was set to end in April 2021. The person, as with all candidates, will be required to fill out paperwork in December in order to run in April for the three-year position on the board.

Sette was in his second three-year term on the Kewaskum School Board. He served as board president in 2019-2020.





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# Kewaskum To Have Parking On East Side Of Hwy 45 Only

## – Parking Lane On West Side Of Hwy 45 To Be Eliminated In 2024

When the Wisconsin Department of Transportation completes the Highway 45 project in the Village of Kewaskum in 2024, the village will have parking on the east side of the road only.

At the regular board meeting held on Monday, Oct. 5, the Kewaskum Village Board unanimously approved a motion to have parking on the east side of the road only. Village trustee Richard Knoebel had an excused absence from the meeting.

The village currently has parking on both the east and west sides of Fond du Lac Avenue (Hwy 45). However, keeping parking along both sides of the road as it is now would have cost the village about \$65,000. To have parking along the east side only will cost village taxpayers about \$30,000.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) is scheduled to resurface the road in 2024. The state would have covered the full bill to pave those lanes and have them serve as shoulders. However, the village will have to foot the bill to resurface any parking lanes.

Board President Kevin Scheunemann said at Monday night's meeting that if the village did not pay for the parking lanes, parking would have still been al-

lowed in those lanes for special events such as Kewaskum's Independence Day celebration. However, the village would not be able to go back to the state later to petition for parking lanes.

The board began discussing the issue in August. Several proposals were considered: keep parking the way it is currently; eliminate all parking on Fond du Lac Avenue; or offer parking in front of certain businesses, such as Brother's Family Restaurant or PNC Bank.

The village held a public hearing on the issue on September 8. Several people spoke at that hearing about the importance of keeping a parking lane.

Dave Goeden, who owns a business on the north side of town, said at the hearing that he feels the parking lane helps slow down traffic. Resident Bob Kirst said he likes having a parking lane because he believes it adds a safety factor for when people are pulling out onto the road.

Village Trustee Dave Spenner, who Monday night suggested paving only one parking lane on Fond du Lac Avenue, said he considered the different options and feels that paying about \$30,000 for a parking lane is easier to swallow than paying approximately \$60,000.



One of the most challenging things I have dealt with professionally during the is finding ways to carry out the library's mission. Our mission is as follows: The Village of Kewaskum Public Library is a strong community partner providing programs and services that bring people together, foster creativity, and encourage lifelong learning through access to information, knowledge and ideas. Some of that is difficult to achieve while we are trying to encourage our patrons to keep safe and healthy.

We are still providing programs and services, albeit in ways that we have not done previously. However, bringing people together has taken on a new meaning now. Last year we were in the finishing stages of planning our first annual family fall festival which brought close to 100 people together to interact with farm animals, ride on a horse drawn carriage and taste a scrumptious apple snack. It was crowded but much fun. Bringing people together in that way now is not recommended so we are striving for other ways to do that. An example of this is our StoryWalk® during this month. The article about this published in last week's paper covered it, however, I want to expand on why we chose this program.

First, the StoryWalk® encourages lifelong learning and literacy by giving residents a fun, engaging way to read. The large, colorful pages in business windows will attract children and may become their gateway into reading. Secondly, it is

bringing people together in a way that is not virtual. I think this is refreshing during this time of virtual interaction. Instead of mass gatherings, I think of this as a gentle gathering where a family may be reading a page in one window and see another family reading across the street. They are brought together by sharing in this common activity.

As far as fostering creativity goes, the library has been distributing craft kits for all ages for several months. There is a weekly storytime kit which includes the craft to go with the Wednesday morning storytime on Facebook. We provide monthly kits for children that nurture creativity in abundance. Every month, one of the crafts promotes STEAM education in science, technology, engineering, arts and math. Teens can pick a new themed kit every month as can adults. Starting this month, there are two different grab & go bags for adults. One crafty and the other foodie.

The last part of our mission to encourage lifelong learning continues with providing access to information through printed and electronic material, databases and access to the internet. I am proud to note that we have never ceased providing this essential service throughout the pandemic. I can only hope everyone takes advantage of it.

## The Vital Role Of A Cancer Support Network

The moment a person is diagnosed with cancer can elicit a variety of emotions. - Assist with personal care: Some patients may experience fatigue after treatment. In such instances, support networks can help patients maintain their personal hygiene. Support networks can be vital to helping cancer patients overcome their disease and navigate their way through successful treatment regimens.



text and saving money at the same time."

The regulations are available at many license agents throughout the state. They're also posted on the DNR website in English, Spanish and Hmong.

The DNR plans to continue producing separate trapping regulations pamphlets.

The annual display of fall colors in Wisconsin is beginning now. Enjoying Wisconsin's rich trail system is the perfect way to explore peak leaf season throughout the state while practicing social distancing.

Peak fall color usually occurs in far northern Wisconsin during the last week of September and the first week of October, with peak color generally happening during mid-October in central Wisconsin and during the latter half of October in southern Wisconsin. Now is the perfect time to start planning your fall leaf tour on Wisconsin state properties.

Wisconsin state properties offer biking, hiking and walking opportunities for beginners, families and more advanced explorers.

### Three Types Of Bike Trails

Wisconsin's many miles of trails and varied terrain make it an ideal place for bicycling and Wisconsin consistently ranks as one of America's best places to bike. The state offers three types of bicycle trails:

Bicycle touring trails — Easier trails such as paved or limestone-surfaced former railroad corridors. Generally appropriate for all ability levels and bikes with skinny tires.

Off-road bicycle trails — Intermediate-level trails, often in the woods

with various surfacing, from native soil to wood chips. Appropriate for families with more adventurous riders and hybrid or mountain bikes.

Constructed mountain bike trails — Specially created, challenging narrow-width trails built to specific trail standards.

A state trail pass is required for all people age 16 or older biking on certain trails. A state trail pass is not required for walking or hiking. Wisconsin state trail pass fees are the same for residents and non-residents. The annual pass is good for the calendar year and the daily pass is good for the day of purchase.

To learn which trails require passes and to purchase a trail pass, visit the DNR's website.

### Plan A Fall Color Hike

Wisconsin's state properties also offer more than 2,700 miles of hiking trails. Hiking is allowed at all properties, and trail information and maps can be found on the DNR's website.

Plan a fall color hike by exploring Travel Wisconsin's 15 fall color hikes list, including easy and advanced hikes.

### Share The Trail

Before trail goes make plans for fall adventures, the DNR wants to remind everyone to keep trail etiquette in mind and share the trail.

Know what types of trail use are permitted at your destination and obey traffic (and other) laws and signs.

Ride or walk single file. You can ride two or more side-by-side if you will not block other traffic, including those who may wish to pass you.

All users should stay right except to pass. Always pass on the left.

When passing, move to single file and announce yourself (verbally or with a bell) before passing. Slow down when maneuvering around other trail users.

Downhill traffic yields to uphill traffic; slower traffic has the right of way.

Always use safe speeds and be respectful of all users.

Pets must be on a leash eight feet or shorter and kept under control. Keep your pet out of the path of oncoming or passing traffic. When possible, walk with your pet on the outer edge of the trail. Not all trails are dog-friendly, so make sure to check signage before hiking with your four-legged friend.

Pack it in, pack it out. Pick up your litter.



As time winnowed away, Bolek continued to play big as did goal-

keeper Carter Curtin, who proved why he was an all-conference player as a freshman last year with three entertainingly acrobatic saves in the second half.

“Man, oh, man,” exulted Kenworthy, “Those were some highlight reel saves there, my goodness! And they showed the full range of Carter’s prowess! There was a full-extension dive that

saved a goal, a tremendous leap to tap a ball over the bar, and a crazy double-dive, double-save on the same play, first one way and then the other. Great stuff!”

### Fenrick Running For State Superintendent Seat

Joe Fenrick, a 2001 Campbellsport High School graduate, is running for the top job in education — Wisconsin State Superintendent.

Fenrick announced on September 17th that he would officially run on a non-partisan ticket. Fenrick is vying for the position that is currently being held by Stanford Taylor, who was appointed in January of 2019. Taylor is not running for the April 6th election which leaves the field without an incumbent for the first time since 2009.

Fenrick’s platform is basic and makes sense. “I want the focus of our schools to be on education and preparing our children for the future.” Fenrick also added that he would like to see the focus on more teaching and individual learning and less on testing. Fenrick says “my vision is for every school to have a fully developed curriculum where every child has a chance to enhance their skills and talent, and where the art and

science of teaching is valued.”

Fenrick learned those values from a very young age growing up in the home of two former Campbellsport teachers — Duane and Vicki Fenrick. His dad was a teacher, principal, and coach in the Campbellsport School District for nearly 40 years.

Meanwhile Vicki stayed at home with her three boys until they all got in school and then went back into education. Mrs. Fenrick taught three- and four-year-old kindergarten at St. Matt’s for 20 years. Joe’s older brother Mike is a computer specialist at Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee, and his younger brother Jon is a State Trooper in Madison.

What does the former Campbellsport Cougar bring to the table? Fenrick was a standout student-athlete in his days at CHS. Joe played football one year then ran cross country his last three. He loved his basketball and played

# Survivor Pear Trees Bring Hope

While designing the memorial plaza, Vega kept remembering the Survivor Tree.

"It was all burned and gnarled and tattered. It basically just had one branch saying, 'I want to live!'" Vega recalled.

Vega wondered what had become of the tree. Determined to find it, he tracked the tree down to where the New York City Department of Parks and Recreation was caring for it.

"They didn't expect the tree to live. But they loved the tree so much at the Parks Department that they actually set up a mini World Trade Center with rocks around it. They put a flagpole up. They put two tall rocks depicting the towers. And they put the other five buildings around it," Vega said.

The Parks Department staff watered the tree and took care of it the best they could.

"And sure enough, the next spring, a pair of morning doves nested in it. Morning doves! And they built a family and they grew," Vega said.

And that is how the tree was when Vega found it in 2007: full of life.

"It was the most beautiful ugly tree I had ever seen in my life. And I fell

in love with it," he said.

The tree still showed the damage from 9/11, with original branches all gnarled and burned. Yet brand new upper growth with very smooth bark was popping out of it.

"So we had an instant totem pole, a story that could be told. Before 911 and after 911, in the tree itself," Vega said.

### Obtaining The Tree

Once Vega found the tree, he had to go through several years of filing paperwork to obtain the tree for the memorial.

"It was owned by the Parks Department. I had to secure the rights to it, so that they would give it back to me so we could return it to the plaza," Vega said.

Vega went through all the steps of getting the transfer approved. He figured out the logistics of how to properly move the tree. It was decided that the tree would be transferred to a holding yard in New Jersey. Everything was set.

But in March 2010, a nor-easter came through New York. The Survivor Tree was completely uprooted and knocked onto its side.

"I was actually in Italy picking out the stone for the plaza when I got a

call that a nor'easter came through and knocked the tree down. I dropped everything and took a plane back," Vega said.

Efforts were made to save the tree. It was determined that the tree could not withstand being moved to the holding lot in New Jersey before being placed in the 9/11 Memorial Plaza in New York City.

"To this day, I say that tree purposely fell over because it did not want to Jersey," joked Vega, alluding to the jabs New Yorkers make about New Jersey.

A large crane was used to lift the tree and place it into a movable planter. The tree was cared for, and that spring it flowered. It was a survivor, stronger than before.

On December 22, 2010, the tree was repatriated to the 9/11 Memorial Plaza in New York City.

### Pear Tree Heirs

In November 2001, seeds were taken from the Survivor Tree to carry on its legacy. The seeds were taken to a nursery in Connecticut, and 400 baby trees were propagated. Each year since then, more trees have been propagated from the Survivor

Tree.

That is, until about three years ago, when the tree stopped producing seeds.

The Survivor Tree's saplings have been planted at different memorials throughout the country. One of the trees was even planted in Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria hit as a symbol of resilience.


Now, two trees that are from the final batch of trees that were propagated directly from the Survivor Tree have found a new home. They will be planted at the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center in Kewaskum.

### The Wisconsin Connection

Vega developed close bonds with the other recovery workers he was with at the World Trade Center. One of those workers is Mike Kenny, who he still works with today.

A couple weeks ago, Vega and Kenny, drove in a Chevy truck to bring the trees halfway across the country to Wisconsin. They pulled over every couple of hours to water the trees.

While in Wisconsin, the two New Yorkers stayed in Farmington at the home of their friend Gordon Haberman,

whose daughter Andrea was killed at the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. Vega and Kenny have been friends with Haberman since 2002, when they met in New York at a gathering of firefighters, police officers, recovery workers and families who had lost loved ones on 9/11.

"These are important people and it is my honor to know them. What these guys did 24 hours a day, for nine months, was to recover Andrea, to recover pieces of people for families," Haberman said.

Vega and Kenny liked what they saw during their recent visit to the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Educational Center in Kewaskum.

"Knowing Gordy for the last 18 years, and speaking with him throughout the years, to see his vision jump off the pages to start actually coming together, is really moving and very peaceful. It's a great thing," Kenny said.

"It's a whole different experience here than in New York," Vega added. "It's honoring those who were murdered on a site that no one was murdered on. It's a spiritual experience. It's a faith-based experience. It is all about honoring, recalling, remembering." Vega stressed the im-

portance of the memorial.

"There is going to come a time when people are not going to remember. We remember, we were there. We have to let other people know what happened. I wasn't on the Titanic, but I will never forget what happened because I know the story. There is going to come a time when those of us who were there won't be able to stand up and speak for these people who were murdered. But this place will," Vega said.

Vega and Kenny have agreed there is something special about the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial.

"Coming here is such a breath of comfort. We really appreciate what was done here. The design of this is amazing. It says it all. In a little compact corner, it is all here," Vega said.

"It has a hometown feel and a personal touch that is kind of lost in the hustle and bustle of New York City," Kenny added.
