## Free COVID-19 Drive-Thru Testing Site Opening In Fond du Lac

A free COVID-19 community testing site will be available at the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds located at 520 Fond du Lac Ave., Fond du Lac, starting Thursday, Oct. 22.

"Data for our county consistently indicates a high COVID-19 activity level and positive case rate, and testing capacity in the area has been increasingly strained," said Kim Mueller, Fond du Lac County Health Officer. "By partnering with the Wisconsin National Guard, we are now able to offer additional testing to help all those that need a test to get one."

### Testing Site Details

- The site is located at Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds, 520 Fond du Lac Ave., Fond du Lac.

- Drive-thru testing; public should remain in their vehicles throughout the entire process.

- If you don't have a vehicle, testing is still available to you on-site.

- Masks required.

- No appointment necessary. It is highly recommended

- to pre-register 24 hours in advance to the test date by visiting register.covid-connect.wi.gov. If you do not register online, you may still be tested. Staff will register you on-site but it will take more time.

- Please come prepared for long wait times, have a full tank of gas and use restrooms before arriving. Restroom facilities are not available to the public.

## Community Comes Together To Support Others

The COVID-19 pandemic may have canceled many events in the community this year, but it has not stopped the generosity of people.

"I think people in general recognize that because of COVID, everybody is having a little bit of a struggle raising funds. The community has responded to all of the organizations in town," said Mark Yanke, who chaired the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club's mega raffle this year.

Because of the pandemic, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club canceled its annual Turkey Shoot, which has been the club's largest annual fundraiser since 1952. In lieu of the turkey shoot,

the club held a mega raffle in order to raise funds to help area youth.

"It was one of the best raffles we ever had as part of the Turkey Shoot as far as generating funds," Yank said. "Last year we sold 3,200 tickets, and this year we sold over 4,400 tickets. The community supported us as they always have."

Other Kewaskum organizations have felt the support of the community as well. During the pandemic, people have continued to financially support organizations such as the Kewaskum Fire Department, Holy Trinity Church and School, and the Kewaskum Community Pantry.

# Free COVID-19 Drive-Thru Testing Site Opening In Fond du Lac

### Who Should Get Tested?

Anyone who is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 or has been in close contact with someone who has tested positive is encouraged to get tested. Symptoms of COVID-19 can include fever, cough, difficulty breathing, sore throat, runny nose, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, headache, chills, muscle aches or loss of taste or smell. The community testing site is available to any Wisconsin resident, five years of age and older. Contact a pediatrician or healthcare

provider for children under five years of age.

### Additional Information

•Members of the WI National Guard will be doing the testing.

•Minors must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who can consent to the testing.

•No identification is necessary. You will be asked to provide your name, birth date, address, phone number, race, ethnicity and gender.

•Negative results will be e-mailed via a secure

link to view and print results. For positive results, you will be called by contract tracing staff. Test results should be received via email and/or phone call within three to seven business days.

This testing site was made possible through a collaboration between the Wisconsin National Guard, Fond du Lac County Health Department, and Fond du Lac County Emergency Management.


After high school we all worked on Mackinac Island when our band of brothers and sisters from Denmark, WI, (Jimmy, Bob, Mary, Jerry, Chris,


will be more than just building materials."

## Kewaskum School Board Seeks To Fill Board Vacancy

The Kewaskum School Board seeks to fill a vacancy on the board due to the resignation of Mark Sette, who resigned from the board on September 30 because he has moved out of the district.

Anyone who is interested in filling the position is asked to file a letter of interest. The Kewaskum School District office must receive the letter by 4 p.m. on October 30.

The letter must be signed by the candidate and state that he/she is a qualified elector and

desires to be considered for the appointment to the school board. Candidates must live within the boundaries of the Kewaskum School District.

The letter of interest should include the candidate's name, address and phone number, along with a written statement which indicates the reason for seeking appointment to the board. Candidates may be expected to interview with the Kewaskum Board of Education during the month of November.

If the majority of the board members cannot

agree on a candidate to fill the board position, board policy states that the board president can appoint a candidate to fill the position.

Whoever is appointed to the position will serve the remainder of Sette's term, which was set to end in April 2021.

People wishing to run for the office in April for the three-year term as a school board member will be required to fill out paperwork in December.

Sette was in his second three-year term on the Kewaskum School Board. He served as board president in 2019-2020.

# Campbellsport Fire Department Awarded Life-Saving Rescue Resources To Help Defend Against Grain Bin Accidents

On Tuesday, September 22, local first responders with Campbellsport Volunteer Fire Department were awarded a grain rescue tube and specialized training from Nationwide and its partners.

The resources will be used to help protect against grain entrapments, which result in dozens of deaths across rural America each year and spiked in 2019 and 2020 due to last season's wet harvest.

Every year, thousands of farmers and commercial grain handlers risk their lives by entering grain bins to remove clumped or rotted grain. As rural communities

have come to know all too well, the risks of entering grain bins continue to be overlooked.

"An accident in a grain bin can quickly turn deadly, as adults can become entrapped in flowing grain up to their waist in just seconds," said Brad Liggett, Nationwide's President of Agribusiness. "When these accidents occur, rural first responders are often the only line of defense."

To help lead the fight against these accidents impacting agricultural communities, the country's leading insurer of farms and ranches (by direct written premium, AM Best (2018), Nation-

wide, began its Grain Bin Safety campaign in 2014 to bring awareness to the hazards of entering grain structures and to equip fire departments with the resources needed to respond effectively.

Campbellsport Volunteer Fire Department is one of 41 fire departments to receive these resources through the 2020 campaign, and one of 152 fire departments to benefit from the program since its inception.

The grain rescue tube delivery and training, held at the Campbellsport Volunteer Fire Department conducted by the National Education Center for Agricultural Safety (NECAS), included simulations of entrapments and rescues using a state-of-the-art grain entrapment simulator, which is loaded on a trailer and able to hold about 100 bushels of grain.

Since 2014, at least four fire departments have put the tubes and training to use to save the lives of farmers trapped in grain bins.

"We're passionate about protecting America's farmers through education and awareness, and we're incredibly proud to make these resources available to fire departments," added Liggett.



George H. Schmidt, postmaster at Kewaskum, tendered his resignation to the post office department recently, and the resignation has been accepted.

## 5 Years Ago October 22, 2015

# Heroes Of The Holyland — Duwell Family

Of the nine children of Joseph and Lucille Duwell, five of them served in the Armed Forces during the Korean War era including three being in Korea at one time.

The family began on a farm one mile south of St. Cloud. All nine children were born in the family home. In 1947, the farm was sold and the Duwell family moved to the Johnsbury area to a farm located one mile north of the village. The family attended St. John School and church in Johnsbury.

World War II was over in 1945 and the Korean Conflict was about to begin around 1949.

Verna had the dream that her life would involve air flight in some form.

She completed her primary education with flying colors. By the time she graduated from high school in 1949, the airlines had started to have passenger flights. She applied for training as a hostess but was told she was not tall enough. They had to be able to reach the luggage compartments.

One day she went shopping and happened to see the iconic sign of Uncle Sam pointing his finger at her. It said, "I want you." That made up her mind to enlist in the U.S. Army. In May 1950, Verna was inducted in the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC) basic training at Co 1st Battalion at Fort Lee, Virginia. After basic training she was sent to Fort

Sam Houston, Texas for Dental Tech School. In 1951, she went to Camp Pickett, Virginia to train as a dental hygienist and X-ray technician.

On December 25, 1951, she was on her way to Germany on the USS General C. H. Muir. It proved to be a pretty tough ride. She arrived in Stuttgart, Germany, in January 1952 and reported to 5th General, 7th Army to work as a dental hygienist and X-ray technician. In 1953 she tried out and was accepted in the 7th Army Special Services Repertory Company.

Her group traveled and performed throughout Germany. While in Germany, she had the opportunity to travel to other countries as well. This opportunity allowed her to combine extensive travel through European countries along with completing her military duties. Being part of the Repertory Company allowed them to entertain the troops.

In May 1953, her enlistment was up. She returned to the U.S. with the rank of sergeant.

In 1954, she applied and was accepted as a hostess at Capital Airlines, finally realizing her dream job. In 1958, she left Capital Airlines and returned to school at the University of Wisconsin. She majored in criminology. She subsequently took a job in Dayton, OH, where she worked at Dayton Juvenile Detention Center.

She was married in October 1962 to Alfred Hallam. They had two children, Laurie and Gary. Verna passed away at 84 years old on February 8, 2016.

#### **SFC Eugene Duwell**

Eugene graduated from St. Cloud Catholic School. He was the older brother whom everyone else looked up to in the Duwell family. He took his siblings to

the movies on many Sunday nights in his new 1949 Plymouth and bought them chocolate malts on the way home.



The Korean war drafted Gene in 1951. Before leaving for overseas duty, he briefly came home. On the day he was to leave, Herb and Sedona Hass, Wilmer and Irma Julka, Oscar Guelig, Eddie Krebsbach, Delmar Flesch, Eddie and Lone Baganz, and Judy and Norbert came over to say goodbye to Gene.

It was a very quiet time because everyone was thinking about Gene as an infantry soldier. They are always on the front line and the first to make the charge.

Gene shook hands and hugged everybody except Mom. They looked at each other for a while and then there was a long hug and kiss. Mom said, "Where are you going Gene?"

"Fort Lewis, Washington for more training."

"I believe you are going to Korea," she said. That ended the party and most of the eyes were not dry.

Gene served nine straight months of active combat duty, thus giving him the 36 points he needed to return home. He got many promotions because most of his friends in combat did not make it.

Gene's children, Bill Duwell and Lucy (Duwell) Hantzsch, wrote the following: "In the spring of 1951, Dad finished his infantry training in Pierce County, Washington at Fort Lewis. Fort Lewis was the home of The 2nd Infantry Division whose motto was 'Second to None.' The 2nd was the first stateside division to reach Korea. That was in July of 1950. North Korean forces had already pushed beyond the 38th parallel into South Korea by late June of 1950.

"Dad joined L Company in the summer of 1951. I remember him often commenting that he never removed his boots for many weeks after arriving. Unclassified documents give a glimpse of how unnerving his day-to-day existence must have been. The month-by-month, day-by-day journals of 2nd Division commanding officers tell a story of

a place defined by dangerous, numbered hills. In Dad's letters home, he did not speak much about the horror of what he was experiencing.

"One hill more than any other had a lasting impact on Dad. I heard Dad refer to it more than once as 'That Damn Hill.' It was hill 472 on an Army map. The hills were numbered for their peak elevations. Hill 472 was 472 meters at its highest. 'L' or Love Company was positioned on hill 717. Attempts to secure this one piece of territory had been ongoing for months. A great deal has been written about the January 12, 1952, battle for hill 472. I have read more than a few accounts — all of them a stark recalling of a brutal few hours.

"Upon discharge, Dad returned to Wisconsin. He and Doris Thome married and settled in Johnsbury where they farmed and raised their family. Dad never spent a great deal of time recounting that brutal January day in 1952. Mom did not want him dwelling on it.

"He struggled at times but Dad survived this experience with his humanity intact. He often recalled his great regard for his Captain Dunham. In Dad's later years he seemed to be a little more at peace with what he had experienced. Shortly before his death in 2001, he opened up and recalled to us the moment when Radioman Chuck covered Tommy Ginger with his field jacket as Tommy lay dying on hill 472. Dad held out hope for 50 years that maybe Tommy made it. He knew Tommy hadn't but needed to think he had. It was better that way."

Eugene and Doris raised a family of 10 children and farmed near the village of Johnsbury.

Joseph Jr. graduated from St. Claudius Elementary School in 1941. He enrolled in St. Lawrence Seminary and graduated four years later. He tried to join General Chennault's Air Forces, but a burst ear drum caused him to fail the physical at the time. Shortly thereafter he started studying metal-

urgical engineering at the University of Wisconsin. In 1952 his studies were put on hold when he was drafted into the U.S. Army.

Joseph was stationed in Korea for 16 months and was assigned as a barber for the Army troops. He took his work seriously and gave professional haircuts — thanks to previous experience doing haircuts for his fellow seminarians during high school — making all the soldiers look better. While not in his actual duties, he took special concern that each serviceman who sat in his chair also was provided plenty of clothing during active duty.

Joe was given furlough in the spring of 1953 in order to marry Arlene. The whole week before their wedding date, his mother Lucille was on the phone to the Army and on her knees in prayer that Joe would make it home in time. Not having any luck doing this, she finally called the Red Cross. On Thursday night, they notified her that Joe would be home on Friday.

Joe finished active duty in Korea and was released in the fall of 1954. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin School of Engineering and spent many years at various industries, including the Kohler Company. He and Arlene raised eight children.



**Cpl. John Duwell**

In 1952 John enlisted in the U.S. Air Force for the duration of four years. His first two years were spent overseas in Korea, which, at one time, coincided with three Duwell brothers serving on the Korean peninsula at once. John's remaining two years of service were spent in the U.S.

During his stateside rotation, John met his future wife, Lillian, in North Carolina. After both John and Lillian completed their military commitments, John found employment as a heavy equipment crane operator working in construction for Hutter Construction of Fond du Lac and in his later years C.D. Smith of Fond du Lac.

John and Lillian raised three children. They later

moved to the Milwaukee area. John passed away on January 10, 2000, and Lillian passed away on April 22, 2015 — which would have been their 54th wedding anniversary.



**Cpl. James Duwell**

Jim provided the following biography of himself:

"I was born in a farm house in the St. Cloud area. Dad bought the farm from Grandpa Schaefer, my mother's father, who died in 1936, the year of my birth. I was number seven in my family of nine siblings, five boys and four girls. For over 10 years, our family also fostered three motherless girls who were our first cousins. My first five years of elementary school were at St. Cloud, three more at St. John, and graduated from Goodrich High School, Fond du Lac, in 1954.

"In 1940, World War II started the phase of the Duwell family's interest in the military. There was always the buzz of airplanes flying overhead in the sky. This brought the whole family running out of the house to locate and identify the aircraft. We children would wave flags, sticks, and shout. Sometimes the pilots could see us and would buzz over our location.

"Food rationing was a big issue during the war. Sugar and salt were in short supply, and meat was rationed, although we had pork and beef on the farm. My mother, Lucille, had an excellent garden and she was a great cook. Our large family never went hungry.

"From age five, I helped milk cows every morning before school. On Sunday afternoons I liked going to the tavern with my Dad. He liked beer and I liked candy bars! One Sunday, a big man, a master sergeant, came into the tavern shouting that FDR, the president, was an 'SOB.' My Dad was a big supporter of FDR and he got angry. I hid behind Dad, as he walked up to the man and said, 'If FDR is an SOB, then you are a bigger one!' Then bottles flew, spittoons flew, and chairs flew. Oh boy! What excitement.

## Continued From... Heroes Of The Holyland - Duwell Family

"Most of our family served in the military. My mom mandated that the Rosary would be said every evening until all the children returned home. We started praying in 1949 and finished in 1957, some 2,900 Rosaries later.

"My oldest brother, Joe Jr., tried to enlist in 1945, hoping to fly with Chennault's Tigers over Burma. A busted ear drum saved him from a possible disaster. My oldest sister Verna was then the first to enter the Army in 1949. My brother Gene was drafted in 1951, followed by Joe in 1952. My brother John enlisted in the Air Force, and in 1954, the last year of the Korean War, I became an 11th Airborne Paratrooper.

"I joined the Army with a high school friend, John Bunker, who lives and worked on the Wilber Moersch farm on Highway 151 bordering Lake Winnebago. On November 15, 1954, we passed our physicals, took the oath of office, and boarded the train for Fort Leonard Wood, MO. This was the first time I ever rode on a train.

"At camp a bugler woke us up the first morning and we were marched to the barber shop. The second day we did what makes the military so boring sometimes, being on cigarette butt pick-up detail. Almost 100 percent of the military smoked at the time. Whenever the first sergeant was disgruntled with us, we had this detail.

"We had eight weeks of infantry training — taking weapons apart, firing live ammo on the range, bayonet practicing, and swimming across the river with full field pack. Most of the guys went home for the Christmas holiday, but I stayed at camp. I wanted to save my leave time for Europe, as I knew this was our future destination. Next, I moved to Fort Campbell, KY, for either more

weeks of advanced infantry training and three weeks of jump school. Physical exercise was emphasized. Long runs and 25-mile hikes were the hardest.

"As a trainee, I started jumping from 30-foot towers and moved to 250-foot towers. The last week included five jumps from B-19's. This plane had a double fuselage. As we taxied down the runway it reminded me of Eddie Ender's thrashing machine in St. Cloud. I hoped the plane held together until I could jump out! We were jumping at 1,300 feet, which gave us little time to open our second chute if the first one failed. Failures were not very frequent. I finished the five jumps successfully and received my treasured wings. I was now a paratrooper!

"I was then shipped to Fort Sam Houston, TX, for eight weeks of Medical Field Training School and on to Fort Benning, GA, for eight weeks of Field Hospital Training. I returned to Fort Campbell in time to be shipped off to Germany. All my medical training was put on hold there, as I was assigned to regimental headquarters for office and record keeping. Germany was a beautiful place and I enjoyed working with the wonderful people. I bought a VW in Germany and traveled a great deal. I was not a beer drinker, but an occasional beer tasted very good. I shipped my VW back to the states and drove it over 100,000 miles.

"For me, the military was a good experience, transitioning from life on the farm to college. I graduated from Marquette University Dental School in 1963 and had a dental practice in Waupaca for 40 years. I married the love of my life, Melodi Mather, in 1966. We have two adult children, Dr. Armond Duwell, and Dr. Monique Duwell, and four wonderful grandchildren."

## Cougar Boys Cross Country Take First In Conference

Campbellsport hosted the 2020 ECC Conference cross country meet on Thursday, Oct. 8. The meet was held at the Campbellsport Elementary School. It also happened to be the last Conference Meet for the Cougars in the ECC. All Campbellsport sports will move to the Flyway Conference starting with the 2021-2022 school year.

Campbellsport placed four runners in the top 20 to take first place in the varsity boys' race. It was a closely contested race with only 10 points separating the top four teams. The Cougars winning score was 79 points. Winneconne took second with 82 points. Kewaskum finished third with 85, and Kettle Moraine Lutheran was fourth with 89. Plymouth was fifth with 107, Waupun sixth with 138, Berlin seventh with 141, and Ripon eighth with 170.

It is the first Conference Championship for the Cougars in the ECC. Their best previous finish was fifth place in 2019.

Kettle Moraine Lutheran's Logan Measner was the individual champion. Measner covered the course in a time of 16:52. Junior Isaiah Lubner of Kewaskum was the runner-up with a time of 17:14.

Skyler Fryman earned First Team All-Conference Honors for his run. Fryman had his typical fast start and settled into seventh place for most of the race. Skyler passed one more runner near the end of the race to take sixth place in a time of 18:06.

Joe Krahn and Nathan Seefeld earned Second Team All-Conference Honors. Both Krahn and Seefeld started outside of the top 14 and moved up throughout the race. Krahn took 11th in a time of 18:21 while Seefeld

finished right behind in 12th with a career best time of 18:26.

Jerid Waddle had a fast start and hung on to earn Honorable Mention honors. Waddle finished 17th in 18:36.

Max Engle, Isaac Timm, and Cameron Guell all ran in their first Conference race and had good results. Max took 33rd place in 19:37, Isaac was 36th in 19:58, and Cameron placed 39th in 20:06.

Winneconne placed seven runners in the top eight to easily win the JV Conference race with a score of 16 points. The CHS Cougars took home runner-up honors with 47 points. Plymouth was third with 91, Kettle Moraine Lutheran fourth with 99, and Ripon fifth with 139. Berlin, Ripon and Waupun did not have complete teams.

Cougar sophomore Ostin Blanchard spoiled a perfect score for Winneconne by taking home fifth place. Ostin's time on the 5,000 meter course was 19:50. Garrett Roehl (20:18), Wyatt Blevins (20:18), Owen Blevins (career best 20:18), and Aydan Meilahn (20:23) took ninth through 12th place. The four Cougar runners crossed the finish line only five seconds apart.

Jon Thelen finished 17th in 21:00, Nick Timm 20th in 21:22, Andrew Jenkins 26th in 21:39, and Karsten Krueger 27th in 21:44. Also running for the Cougars were Nick Moran 39th in 23:38, and Aidan Polzin 53rd in 27:49.

In the girls' varsity race, Winneconne placed four runners in the top 10 to edge Plymouth for the championship. Winneconne's low score of 40 points was four better than Plymouth's 44. Kewaskum was a close third with 57 points. Kettle Moraine Lutheran was fourth with 117, Berlin fifth with 136, Ripon sixth with 157, Waupun seventh with 166, and Campbellsport eighth with 233.

Maggie Munson from Plymouth was the individual winner. The senior runner's winning time was 19:12. Freshman Sophie Yetter from Winneconne was a very close second with a time of 19:16.

Sara Scannell had the best finish for the Cougars. Scannell ran a season best 24:32 and finished in 39th place. In 42nd place was Morgan Yahr with a time of 24:51. Elli Scannell was 49th in 26:30. Macy Pawlowski, Hannah Thelen, Taylor Kleinke, and Alayna Meilahn finished 51st through 54th. Macy ran a time of 27:32. Hannah had a season best 27:58. Taylor finished in 28:16, and Alayna ran a 28:25.

Winneconne also won the girls' JV race with a low score of 25 points. Runner-up Kewaskum had 64. Kettle Moraine Lutheran took third with 81, Plymouth fourth with 83, Berlin fifth with 108, and Campbellsport sixth with 162. Ripon and Waupun did not have complete teams.

Emily Reigle was the top Cougar JV runner. Reigle finished in 43rd place with a time of 29:44. Harper Poquette ran her first race of the season and finished in 45th place. Harper's time was 30:11. Ashley Sanders took 48th in 31:28. Desiree Erickson was 49th in a season best time of 32:13. Samantha Zimdahl ran a 32:35 and finished 51st. Katrina Ohme was 52nd in 33:33. Makayla Stommel finished 54th in 34:21, and Hala King was 55th in 35:23.

Campbellsport will be heading into tournament action later in the month. The Cougar varsity will travel to Kiel to compete in a sub-sectional meet to determine who advances to sectionals. The meet will be held on Tuesday, Oct. 20. The Cougar JV team will head to Kettle Moraine Lutheran on Thursday, Oct. 22, to compete in a pre-sectional junior varsity only meet.

## The Piitt Stop

### Character

One of my favorite areas to work with in athletics is in character development. I have had a colleague whose email signature included a quote attributed to the great John Wooden — "Sports don't build character; they reveal it."

It is hard to argue with the "Wizard of Westwood" when you look at all the success that he had at UCLA from 1948 to 1975. However, I think I will decide to take on this monumental challenge in disagreeing (somewhat) with one of the legendary coaches of all time.

I do agree with Coach Wooden — to some degree. At the college level — particularly at a large, well known, Division I university — a coach has the opportunity to select the people he thinks will work with his/her philosophy as a coach. That pertains to not only their skills, abilities, and potential, but also to what is perceived as their level of character. Not many coaches have the opportunity to work within that sort of system.

As a long time high school, middle school, and youth coach, I

firmly believe in the development or building of character in the athletes I have had the honor to coach. It needs to be an intentional effort to include this in the day-to-day operations of coaching. It does take some time away from other things; however, I believe that the impact of teaching young people how to build upon the character they have has a great carryover effect.

It has short-term positive effects within the sport. The athletes will be more reliable and more effective. In the long-term, the lessons that are associated with building character have an impact that can last a lifetime. My goal, as a coach building character, has always been to augment what has been taught at home. The athletes all come in at different places in their journeys, but they all have that potential and that opportunity to grow in to "better people" through the sport and the lessons provided by it.

Going back to Coach Wooden. If you read what his former players have said about him and how his

philosophies shaped their lives, it is remarkable. Kareem Abdul-Jabbar (formerly Lew Alcindor), citing his mentor and coach, "Don't think about winning the game," he'd say. "Just do everything possible to prepare. As long as you know you have done everything possible and you have given your best self on the court, that is your reward." Personally, I think that quote speaks volumes about how Coach Wooden approached his sport and his influence on his athletes.

## CHS Cross Country

### Cross Country Season Continues Amid COVID

As the summer progressed, the Campbell High School cross country teams were not sure if they would even have a 2020 season. With the Coronavirus pandemic affecting spring sports and all events throughout the summer, the season was up in the air.

"We didn't know if we would even have a season," said coach Mike Kulibert. "The first two weeks of the season we

seemed to get an email everyday with changes to our schedule."

Because cross country is not really a contact sport, it was decided to carry on with some changes.

"Runners had to start a race with a mask or gaiter for the first 100 meters or so, and were suppose to put it back on at the finish," Kulibert said. "All invitationals were made much smaller

— the biggest being eight teams. Some meets we were not invited to because they kept it to local area schools only. A couple of meets we chose not to go to because they were too big — Slinger for example. We created conference quads for the first time ever as a way of getting races for our athletes. The 50th annual Cougar Invitational was postponed until 2021. The WIAA has created

sub-sectionals which will be broken into two separate races of four teams each. The two races will be run two hours apart so as to not have too many people at one time. Sectionals will consist of only four teams (at least at this time) instead of the usual 15 and the State Meet will be smaller."

One exciting thing for the team this year was the success of the boys team. The varsity and JV teams did well. The varsity took the conference title for the first time in 25 years.

"Our boys season went very well," Kulibert said. "The varsity won two of

four quads. We won the Markesan, Mayville, and Lomira Invitationals and we won the ECC Conference Meet last week for the first time. Our best previous finish in the ECC was fifth in 2019."

The girls team had a tougher season.

"Our girls struggled this year," Kulibert said. "They were not able to overcome the graduation of Calla Loehr and Missy Gilles who were a big part of the team last season, so it has been a rebuilding year for us."

Overall, it was a good season for the Cougars.

"It doesn't matter if you're the fastest runner

on the team or not, it is always exciting for me to see a runner improve from the start of the season to the end," Kulibert said. "Every personal record that they set or course that they run well on is so much fun. We had four individual award winners in the boys' ECC Conference Meet this year. The most before that was two. Our boys showed so much fight and toughness this season."

"As you can guess, it has been a strange season with a lot of changes, and lots of challenges. But as someone said, it will be a season that no one will ever forget."
