Campbellsport Area Woman Injured In UTV Incident

A Campbellsport woman was injured in a UTV accident on Saturday, Oct. 31.

According to the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department, a 32-year-old Campbellsport woman had fallen off a trailer being towed by a Utility Terrain Vehicle (UTV) and struck her head on the roadway of Trail Vu Court, in the Town of Auburn. Initial information indicated the female was nonresponsive and bleeding significantly from a head injury.

The call was received at 6:58 p.m. The female was transported from the scene by Campbellsport Ambulance to St. Agnes Hospital and then transported by Flight For Life Helicopter to Froedtert Hospital, where she is in stable condition.

Investigation by the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Office and Wisconsin DNR indicates that she

was riding as a passenger on a utility trailer being towed by the UTV. The UTV was operated by a 38-year-old Campbellsport man. They were part of a group that was travelling around the area of Trail Vu Court and Moraine Drive with the UTV and trailer for Halloween activities.

The woman was attempting to get back on the trailer when the UTV began to move resulting in her falling off and striking her head on the roadway. Alcohol was not a factor and the operation of the UTV was in accordance with state law and local ordinance.

A gofundme page has been set up for Heather Crass. It states that she was injured in a freak accident during a fun night of trick or treating. "Anyone that knows Heather knows that she is a fighter and she isn't going to give up that easily," the page stated.

As of Monday, the

page had more than 100 people donate toward the family's expenses.

James D. Reigle Recognized For 70 Years In American Legion

James D. Reigle has been an active member of the American Legion for 70 consecutive years.

Reigle was recognized last Wednesday, Nov. 4, for the distinction. Jim Dorn presented a certificate to Reigle on behalf of the American Legion Robert G. Romaine Post 384 in Kewaskum.


Reigle, who is 94 years old, served as a sergeant in the Army Air Forces in Germany from 1944 to 1946 during World War II before joining the American Legion.

"The American Legion has been part of community service throughout its history, so I am very proud of this," Reigle stated as he received the award.

The award presentation was held at Reigle Family Park in Kewaskum. Members of

the Reigle family gathered around as the award was presented.

The park itself is symbolic as to the emphasis Reigle places on com-

Lost Hikers Found Near Mauthe Lake

A group of four hikers from Illinois was rescued near Mauthe Lake on Sunday afternoon after getting lost while hiking the Ice Age Trail.

According to the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Department, on Sunday, Nov. 1, at 3:38 p.m., they received a call from a hiker who was lost in the Kettle Moraine State Forest southwest of Mauthe Lake. He stated that he was with three other hikers and they had been hiking since around 11 a.m.

The group started hiking the Ice Age trail near Highway 28 in Washington County and became lost north of Youth Camp road in Fond du Lac County. The Fond du Lac County Communications Center was able to obtain GPS coordinates to assist in the search.

Search teams from the Wisconsin DNR, Mauthe Lake Rangers, Kewaskum Fire Department and the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office began to search for the missing hikers. Around 5 p.m., a Wisconsin DNR Warden and Mauthe Lake Ranger located the subjects. They were cold and wet, but uninjured.

The Campbellsport Fire Department and Dive Team were requested to extricate the parties. At 6:39 p.m., the four missing hikers, the DNR Warden and Mauthe Lake Ranger were brought back to the Mauthe Lake boat landing by the Campbellsport Dive Team.

The four hikers included a 65-year-old male from Evanston, IL; a 63-year-old male from Highland Park, IL, a 59-year-old male from Chicago, IL; and a 55-year-old female from Evanston, IL. They were evaluated by the Kewaskum and Campbellsport Ambulance crews and released.

There were no reported injuries to any of the search team members or firefighters.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office was assisted at the scene by Kewaskum Fire Department and Ambulance, the Wisconsin DNR, Mauthe Lake Rangers, Campbellsport Fire Department and Ambulance, the Fond du Lac County Communications Center and the City of Fond du Lac Police Department Drone Team.

Protecting Yourself With A Flu Vaccine Is More Important Than Ever

As the flu season begins and communities continue to combat the COVID-19 virus, public health officials stress that getting the flu vaccine is more important than ever this year. By getting vaccinated, you can prevent one respiratory virus, the flu, from circulating at the same time as another respiratory virus, COVID-19.

"When we protect people from the flu by getting vaccinated, we help keep them from being hospitalized, which helps our health care workers who are caring for people with COVID — a win-win," said Amanda Miller, health and well-being educator at UW-Madison, Division of Extension Fond du Lac County. "By getting the flu vaccine, you protect yourself and help your community too."

In Wisconsin's 2019-2020 flu season, there were 36,175 flu cases reported, 4,425 flu-related hospitalizations, and tragically, 183 deaths, including three children, and the highest number of pregnant people hospitalized for flu. While these statistics are alarming, a combination of flu and COVID-19 cases could result in even more severe illnesses, hospitalizations and deaths this year, and put additional strain on Wisconsin's health care providers working to care for today's COVID patients. "The first step is to prevent a bad flu season by getting as many people vaccinated as possible," Miller said.

Health care providers all across Wisconsin are making sure that you can get vaccinated in a safe and convenient way, whether at a special vaccination drive in a nearby church or supermarket parking lot, curbside at your doctor's office, or at a socially distanced vaccine appointment inside a clinic or pharmacy. Safety precautions related to COVID-19 also include sanitizing at clinics, temperature taking, and special scheduling.

It is important to protect yourself and your family before the flu starts to spread in your community, which typically happens in the late fall in Wisconsin. Since it takes about two weeks for the flu vaccine to protect you against the virus, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS), and local health departments recommend that everybody age six months and older get a flu vaccine.

Call your healthcare provider today to make vaccine appointments for yourself and your family. You can also use vaccinefinder.gov to find a provider near you. At this time of the year, we review our budget for the year to be sure we are within our spending limits. With this unprecedented year, I could not foresee the toll the virus would have on our purchasing. Many publishers delayed release dates until next year or cancelled publications. Now, we unexpectedly must push to spend our book budget and because of that, the new bookshelves are overflowing with wonderful reads for you and your family. Help us out by coming in and checking out a new book or two.

For this month in adult fiction, look for new titles by renowned authors David Baldacci, Janet Evanovich, Clive Cussler, Danielle Steel and James Patterson. Debut author Susie Yang comes out with *White Ivy* this month. This is a coming-of-age novel about a young woman's deep, dark obsession with her privileged school chum. Ivy is full of ambition and works her way up the ranks until she is reacquainted with her high school crush which threatens to bring everything she worked for tumbling down. *Little Cruelties* by Liz Nugent is a domestic thriller which follows three brothers born in yearly succession that learn how to compete for their mother's attention. Part 10 What Was Lost: Bears & Wolves

This series of "What Was Lost" looks at the loss of Native Americans, their philosophy and their culture. Because of this change, one of our biggest alterations in this area came in the replacement of animals. The life of 2020 in Wisconsin is very different than what existed in 1820. The transformation in between those years was the destruction of many species.

For context, one must

For those interested in further information on wolves, one should consider watching Ken Burn's documentary, "Our National Parks: America's Greatest Idea." In one of its six discs, the series examines Denali National Park of Alaska, which became one of the last refuges for wolves in America in the early 1900s. Adolph Murie's (1899-1974) research is impressive in creating the case for why wolves are important, which he did so through facts and meticulous observation. His concern was that people think it is okay to choose which species of mammals live, and which are eradicated. When this happens, nature becomes a garden in which humans just pull the "weeds" out, not realizing they might be flowers with purpose. We are left to consider if such selection by mankind of wolves took the natural out of nature. Murie concluded: "Let us be guardians, not gardeners."


remember that Wisconsin was once part of the the Northwest Territory created in the 1780s by the Articles of Confederation, our first "constitution" before the Constitution. Certain ordinances passed by that first government after the American Revolution set up how to make future states on land north and west of the Ohio River. Thus came a plan for the nation of 13 former colonies to expand, including Ohio (statehood 1803), Indiana (1816), Illinois (1818), Michigan (1837) and Wisconsin (1848).

To some historians this is a convenient and fun way to explain how the nation expanded, but to others there is a long pause of wondering what happened to nature. Therefore, between the 1770s and 1850, the land north of the Ohio River and all the way west to the Mighty Mississippi lost many native mammals.

Importance Of Older Sources

This portion of the series also requires the examination of older sources, some of which can go back further than present elders in the community can remember.

One that is most interesting for the topic of species lost is The History of Fond du Lac County Wisconsin (1880). The book set the stage of large animals and their time of disappearance on page 138, in a chapter



covering the fauna of Wisconsin. The *Centennial Jubilee* booklet printed for St. Kilian Parish in 1948 is a great documentation of the founding and continuation of the Catholic Church on the Washington County-Fond du Lac County line that has existed since Wisconsin statehood. It is also a reminder to us on the importance of saving old publications for their historical and educational value.

consin written by P.R. Hoy, M.D. Hoy's piece noted, "Fifty years ago, the territory now included in the state of Wisconsin, was nearly in a state of nature, all the large wild animals were then abundant. Now, all has changed. The ax and plow, gun and dog, railway and telegraph, have metamorphosed the face of nature. Most of the large quadrupeds have been either exterminated, or have hid themselves away in the wilderness. In a short time, all of these will have disappeared from the state."

That was the stage in 1880, reflecting on what used to be in 1830. His prose suggests a litany of exterminated species: "There was a time when the antelope, the woodland caribou, the buffalo, and the wild turkey were abundant, but are now no longer to be found." This part, and the following publications of the series, will examine some large mammals that existed in this area of Wisconsin.

Bears And Wolves


Two animals that were eradicated from Fond du Lac County and Washington County were bears and wolves. Research indicates both creatures were a plausible fear in the area at Wisconsin statehood. One helpful source for this is the *Centennial Jubilee* for St. Kilian's Parish (1848-1948), a souvenir publication for the Catholic-settled community whose church rests on a hill in southern Ashford township. Unfortunately, there is not a pin-point author to that publication to give credit to.

The booklet explains the history of the parish, which includes a snapshot of what nature used to be: "Prior to the founding of St. Kilian's parish Rev. Charles Schradenbach was the first mis-

This postcard published by Schmidt Bros. & Co. of Chicago (1911) is a good reminder of the negative rap the wolf gets. There was a discrepancy in the opinion on the wolf. On one hand, many settlers were fearful and ready to kill it. On the other were natives like the Menominee, who revered the animal and honored them with a clan.

Human fear of animals can have destructive consequences. As mentioned in Part Six of this series, Chief Dan George once said: "If you talk to the animals, they will talk with you and you will know each other. If you do not talk to them you will not know them and what you do not know, you will fear. What one fears, one destroys." In this area, at the time of Wisconsin statehood and after, wolves were destroyed.

sionary who was active in visiting the scattered Catholic families, providing occasional services in private homes and ministering to their spiritual needs when required. On a New Year's Eve, Father Schradenbach got lost in the woods. Because of the dangerous surroundings infested by hungry bears and wolves, he took refuge in a huge tree hole for a night's lodging. A small piece of hard bread he had with him, served to somewhat appease his hunger," (pages 21, 24).

This source alone just slightly prods our minds to imagine what the Washington/Fond du Lac County line used to look like. What lived here? What forest and plant life must have thrived to allow such species as the wolf and the bear to prosper? Then again, perhaps the animals of old would think such a term like "imagination" is offensive. For the nature which used to flourish here was reality, and stark to the one today.

As the series continues, attempts will be taken to focus on additional species eradicated.



The term "Old Northwest," pictured here, is really in reference to the territory of the United States north and west of the Ohio River after the Revolutionary War (1775-1783). The ordinances (laws) passed by the fledgling government in the 1780s set the stage for the formation of five new states (Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin), and a sliver of what became Minnesota in 1858. The formation of the Erie Canal in Upstate New York by the 1820s funneled a massive immigration wave from Europe to the Old Northwest. The canal also pushed New Englanders to what became known as the Midwest. This population boom, settlement and development from the Ohio River Valley to the Mississippi River had dire consequences on the population of many animals.



High Speed Chase Ends In Washington County

On November 2 at 1:51 a.m. the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office requested assistance from the Washington County Sheriff's Office with a high-speed chase entering northern Washington County on I41. The initial report indicated Fond du Lac deputies were chasing a Fox Valley area stolen vehicle at 110 mph southbound on I41. Additionally, the operator, who was later identified as a 23-year-old Wautoma man, allegedly "pistol whipped" a female passenger in the car during a domestic dispute that occurred somewhere along I41 north of Fond du Lac.

The male suspect stopped the stolen vehicle in the right lane of I41 north of State Highway 33. The female victim, identified as a 22-year-old from Wautoma, ran from the stopped vehicle towards law enforcement assistance. Deputies then began negotiation with the suspect for his surrender.

After 25 minutes of stalemate, the Washington County SWAT team was dispatched to the scene.

Tactical negotiators attempted to gain the suspect's compliance for over two hours with limited success and a tactical plan was then initiated, which included the use of two armored vehicles, to compel the suspect out of the vehi-

cle. The suspect exited the vehicle before any physical force was used during final negotiations.

The suspect is being held in the Washington County Jail on several charges including a parole violation related to an armed robbery charge, operating without owner's consent, felon in possession of a firearm and failure to comply with a lawful order to surrender. The suspect will also face additional charges outside of Washington County.

Interstate 41 was closed for 3.5 hours during the standoff, and it was later determined the suspect stopped only because he ran out of gas.

"I am delighted with the seamless cooperation demonstrated by agencies even outside Washington County. I am equally as pleased with the members of the Washington County SWAT team that brought this dangerous armed offender into custody without harming anyone," Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said.

The following departments responded to the situation: Washington County Sheriff's Office, Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office, Germantown Police Department, West Bend Police Department, Slinger Police Department, Allenton Fire Department and Wisconsin State Patrol.

Federal Fugitive Arrested In Washington County


On October 30, the Washington County Sheriff's Office and West Bend Police Department attempted to locate a stolen rental vehicle from the state of Michigan in the area of Trenton Road and Wallace Lake Road. The vehicle was subsequently located at a nearby business in the Town of Trenton.

The investigation revealed the suspect, a 53-year-old City of West Bend woman, had rented the vehicle from Avis in January 2020 and failed to return it. The suspect removed the Michigan plates and placed Wisconsin plates on the vehicle. During the course of the investigation, it was determined the woman has been using a false Wisconsin driver's license and documents to obtain employment, housing and transportation under an assumed name.

She has been on the run as a wanted federal

fugitive since 2017 for financial crimes in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and Kalamazoo, Michigan. She has been living in West Bend since January 2020 under the assumed name. The woman was arrested and turned over

to the U.S. Marshal Service to face federal charges. Investigators continue to investigate and have been consulting with the Washington County District Attorney's Office to determine if the woman will face any local charges.

FDL County Health Department Offers Free Radon Test Kits

The Fond du Lac County Health Department would like to remind community members that regular testing for radon, every two years, in your home, office and school is an important way to protect your health.

To encourage testing, the Fond du Lac County Health Department is offering a free short-term radon test kit in exchange for a non-perishable, non-expired food item to be donated to a local food pantry in November and December. The test kits are easy to

use and testing instructions are included in the kit.

Radon is an odorless, colorless, tasteless gas that occurs naturally in Wisconsin soil and can enter homes primarily through cracks and openings in basement or foundation floors and walls. Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer, behind smoking. The only way to know if you have safe levels of radon inside your home is by testing.

While supplies last, non-perishable, non-expired food items can be

exchanged for a free short term radon test kit through December 31st at the Fond du Lac County Health Department, 160 S. Macy St. in Fond du Lac, Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Only one short-term radon test kit per household.

Short Term Radon kits are available all year-round for \$10.



Packers Foundation Awards \$1 Million In Annual Grants

The Green Bay Packers Foundation announced it has distributed \$1 million in annual grants to 237 civic and charitable groups throughout the state of Wisconsin in its annual distribution of grants. Tom Cardella, chairperson of the Foundation, made the announcement, and checks recently were mailed to the organizations.

The recipient groups typically receive the grants at a luncheon in the Lambeau Field Atrium in December, but due to the pandemic, this year's grants were issued earlier to assist those organizations impacted by the pandemic.

"We're proud to award \$1 million through our annual Packers Foundation grants this year, a year in which many nonprofits are seeing a greater need in their communities due to the pandemic," Packers

president/CEO Mark Murphy. "So many people from the recipient organizations are on the front lines, and we are inspired by them and honored to help as they continue to serve those in need every day."

This year's grant cycle focused on organizations that will direct the funds toward the need areas of elderly, homelessness, human services and hunger. The grants awarded by the Foundation must be used for the specific program or initiative for which the organizations applied. These grants are not recurring, and the 2020 recipient organizations will not be eligible to apply for grants again until 2023.

Of the Foundation's contributions in 2020, 26 grants — aggregating \$114,000 — were awarded to Brown County organizations. Additional grants, totaling \$886,000, were made to 211 other groups around the state.

The Foundation now has distributed more than \$14.43 million for charitable purposes since it was established in 1986 by Judge Robert J. Parins, then president of the Packers Corporation, "as a vehicle to assure continued contributions to charity."

Additionally, under the Packers Scholarship Program established in 2002, \$53,000 was awarded — \$26,500 to Scholarships Inc., for distribution to students in four-year colleges, and \$26,500 to Northeast Wisconsin Technical College (NWTC) — for distribution to students in two-year associate degree or apprenticeship trades programs. A portion of the scholarship funds come from National Football League Properties which, at the Packers' request, returns to the Foundation royalty fees paid for using the Packers logo on Wisconsin automobile license plates. Because the royalties do not fully cover the scholarships, the Green Bay Packers fund the remainder of the amount, a figure which totals \$401,000 since 2006. As in recent years, the Packers Foundation will also distribute additional dollars to various NFL Foundation programs later this fall.

The Green Bay Packers Foundation Trustees, in addition to Cardella, include Marcia Anderson, Nancy Armbrust, Susan Finco, Jeffrey Joerres, D.J. Long, Jr., Larry McCarren, Dexter McNabb, Eric Torkelson and Mike Weller. The Green Bay Packers Foundation and its annual grants are part of Green Bay Packers Give Back, the Packers' all-encompassing community outreach initiative that comprises appearances made by players, alumni, coaches and staff, football outreach, cash and in-kind donations, Make-A-Wish visits and community events.

Kewaskum Girls Cross Country Team Places Third In State; Isaiah Lubner Places Eighth

After claiming the sectional title on October 31, the Kewaskum High School girls cross country team went on to place third in the Division 2 State Meet held in Colby on Saturday, Oct. 31.

For the boys cross country team, KHS junior Isaiah Lubner qualified for the state meet and finished eighth in Division 2 State Meet.

KHS Girls Team

This marked the third time KHS has had a girls cross country team com-

pete at state since the program started in the late 1970s.

"It is super exciting," head coach Eugene Peterson said. "We went into state this year with the intent of being a top 10 team at the state meet."

Winneconne won the

Division 2 state title, followed by Osceola, just three points ahead of Kewaskum.

Freshman Abigail Gerhartz led the Kewaskum team, placing 13th in the individual race with a time of 19:51.56. Other Kewaskum runners included senior Andrea

Butz, (33rd) 20:39.09; senior Alyssa Butz, (46th) 21:10.16; freshman Avalon Olla (50th) 21:21.53; freshman Allison Heipp (72nd) 22:07.73; sophomore Josey Curtes (77th) 22:12.93; and junior Tierney Herman (78th) 22:15.11. Kendra Schmitt was the alternate for KHS.

All seven of the Kewaskum runners came in before the fifth-place runners from seven other teams, something that Peterson says is indicative of how deep of a team Kewaskum is.

"We have Abby Gerhartz, who is our top runner as a freshman. She's out there with some of the top girls in the state," Peterson said. "It is great to have a front runner, but the strength of our team is our pack. I would say between us and Winneconne, we are two of the strongest pack teams in the state."

For the team competition, the depth of the field was important for figuring team scores

"We had all seven of our girls in by 50th place out of 84. That is pretty spectacular," Peterson said of the team contest. "The fact that we had super strong sixth and seventh runners really helped us out a lot because they displaced all but two teams behind us with their fifth runner. So they were really important to getting us where we were as a team this year."

Next year, the team will be losing two seniors, Andrea and Alyssa Butz.

"Obviously, they are two really strong runners. Andrea was our number two runner all year. Alyssa was anywhere from three to five for us this year," Peterson said about the two sisters on the team.

However, the Kewaskum team is relatively young, so the future looks bright. In fact, the young runners helped the team return to state after KHS placed 15th out of 16 teams at the state meet last year.

"It was an amazing experience because we took a step further than I think I really could imagine coming in after losing a runner like Faith Mertzig at graduation. I thought it would take us some time, but our freshmen really settled in. From the get-go, they just really pushed the envelope with where they could get to as freshmen, and as a result, it made the whole team better," Peterson said.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic,

this year's state meet was held with smaller groups competing at one time. Instead of running a usual race with everyone going at the same time everything is split into three races, consisting of four teams and 10 individuals in each race. To figure out the scores, all of the times were compiled together at the completion of all the races.

"Overall, it was a really good experience. We took care of business in our race, but we don't know what would have happened if we had all run together," Peterson said.

The top two teams, Winneconne and Osceola, competed in the same session, while Kewaskum was in a different race.

The race was held in

Colby rather than Wisconsin Rapids, where the state meet has traditionally been held. The course in Colby was relatively flat compared to the Wisconsin Rapids course, according to Peterson.

"There was some elevation change, but everything was real gradual so you don't notice it as much when you are running. I think the bigger issue with the course was the wind. It was a pretty windy day, and that can kind of screw up your stride a little bit," Peterson said.

Peterson, who is in his second year of being head coach for the Kewaskum team, is looking forward to next year.

"It is amazing to see the growth that the girls team has made in the past two years. The program has gone from a bunch of runners who really enjoy the sport of running to a program that not only enjoys the sport of running but is striving to take those next steps to be a real force at the state level. I think that is a real good indicator of the quality of athlete and the mental makeup of our girls team," Peterson said. "This is a girls team that is super invested in seeing the program have a lasting impact both in the community and

"Isaiah has led the Indians the whole season," Peterson said of Lubner.

At the state meet, Lubner placed fifth in his session, but eighth overall in Division 2 with a time of 16:50.78

"I was really happy with his race. He really pushed it in the last 800 meters to catch up with

a group of guys who were in front of him. With about a half mile to go, he started fighting for it, and he ended up passing two guys right at the finish," Peterson said.

Peterson hopes Lubner will help propel the

boys team to state next year.

"My hope is that Isaiah can bring this experience back to his teammates and they can take hold of it and make a run at state next year," Peterson said.

Scholarship Opportunities

Former Campbellsport School District Superintendent Joe Bertone had a vision, to create scholarships for students for their academic excellence. Bertone's dream became a reality back in 1988 when he started the Campbellsport Scholarship Foundation. Thanks to a large donation (over a million dollars) from a local philanthropist, Bertone was able to get the scholarship foundation off the ground.

The Campbellsport Scholarship Foundation is a permanent nonprofit endowment created for Campbellsport High School graduates. Its mission is to award scholarships to CHS seniors and graduates on the basis of outstanding academic achievement. By assisting these students financially, they may pursue excellence through continued education.

For the past 30-plus years, the Campbellsport Scholarship Foundation has handed out thousands of dollars so that stu-

dents in the Campbellsport School District can achieve their dream. The scholarships have helped turn former students into doctors, nurses, teachers, engineers, accountants, business people and lawyers.

The scholarship foundation is made up of nine local people from different parts of the school district — similar to how the board of education operates. The Campbellsport Scholarship Foundation is spearheaded by their president Dave Schellhaass who has been on the committee since its inception. Jan Soyk, a former kindergarten teacher in the Campbellsport School District, has also been on the committee since its birth in 1988.

I had a chance to talk with both Schellhaass and Soyk last week about how the scholarship foundation works. Students fill out an application, which is easy to obtain either at school or on the school website. The applications are reviewed by each committee member and if

the students make the cut, they are invited for an interview session with the scholarship committee.

After the interviews, the committee breaks down the candidates and they vote on the winners. They have been averaging around 20 applicants per year but would certainly like to see that number even higher. The Campbellsport Scholarship Foundation usually hands out 70 to 80 thousand dollars of scholarship money each year.

The Campbellsport Scholarship Foundation also has scholarship opportunities for any students who wish to go to technical college and if you're interested in anything in the agricultural field, there's the Pat and Marilyn O'Brien Agricultural Scholarship. "The main reason this needs to be done is that flows have been larger than it can handle," said Leo Kucek of Applied Technologies. "Ed (Costello) has been working miracles with that plant. That plant is old. It has served its purpose and it is time to retire it."

The total project cost is estimated to be \$3,970,000. During the next year, the design will be completed along with getting approvals needed from the Department of Natural Resources. In early 2022, the project will go out for bids to secure the financing and construction should begin in April 2022.

Sewer rates will need to go up in the village to cover the costs of the loan. Kucek told the board that it will be their decision on how and when to start implementing the rate increases.

He gave them a couple different options. He explained that they could spread it out over a few years to try to lessen the burden on users.

"You guys know your community better than I do as far as that goes," Kucek said.

The board approved \$218,500 for the design contract.

In other business, the board approved the snow plow contract with Baumhardt.

They also discussed a request from a resident to move the cluster box on

Seybold Street to the opposite side of the street. This would cost approximately \$1,400.

"I'd rather leave it where it is," said Cory St. Mary, village president.

"I looked at it and I really don't see a problem," Jay Baumhardt agreed. "It's going to open a can of worms."

Board members chose not to do anything on this agenda item which means the cluster box will stay in its current location.

Costello, public works director, reported to the board on a few items. He explained that the timer was out on the tornado siren, which is why it hadn't been sounding at noon on Saturdays.

He was going to have Lakeview Electric replace the timer. Lakeview is also going to be installing electric for three new Christmas decorations in the village.

Costello also told the board that he was closing the buildings at the parks for the winter months. He had planned to have that done by the end of October.

Eden Village/Town Annual Meeting

An annual meeting of the Village and Town of Eden was held on Monday, Oct. 19. The two entities oversee the Eden Community Center, Eden Community Park and the Eden Fire Department.

Eden Community Center

The boards approved waiting to repave the parking lot at the community center. A new private road is planned for the condo project that will be built behind the former school building. The boards thought it would be a good idea to hold off on the parking lot paving when

that road is built and have both paving projects done at the same time.

New energy efficient lighting is going to be installed in the hall. The lights in the village and town offices, hallway and bathrooms have already been done.

Board members questioned how much the hall rental was down this year because of the Coronavirus pandemic.

"It was down substantially," said Sheila Zook. "We're down about \$1,000-\$1,500."

Costello pointed out that the rentals are starting to come back. He explained that some area companies and organizations are beginning to rent it out for meetings. They like the fact that the hall is bigger than their meeting spaces so people can be socially distanced a little better.

Fire Department

Eden Fire Chief Kyle Salter told the board the new fire truck is ordered and will be delivered in 2021. He also reported that fire calls are average this year.

"I suspect that if we continue on the trend we are on now, we will be right up there around 90-100 calls," Salter said.

Jackie Welsh reported that the first responder calls are up a little bit from last year. "We had a total of 198 calls this year," she said. "We're a little higher than last year, but down from 2018."

Tanner St. Mary reported that the department has a total of 1,600 hours in training and schooling logged for members of the department.

Salter told board members that the yearly equipment fund contribution to the fire department from both the village and town will stay the same this

year. The village pays \$5,000 and the town pays \$7,500.

"These have been the numbers for years," Salter said. "I am not asking for any changes now, however, I ask that we possibly put it on a future agenda because of the rising costs of the apparatus."

Salter then gave board members an update on the COVID situation for the department. A special meeting was held in March to implement some COVID guidelines for the department and first responders.

"We felt this was important," Salter said. "We had come up with guidelines. They are still in place at this time. I suspect that we will amend those in the future."

He also explained that the virus has not hit the department to the point that they cannot respond to an emergency.

"That really hasn't affected our staff because they have notified me right away (if they are infected or have to quarantine)," Salter said. "We have been able to keep it out of the fire house so far."

Fond du Lac County has come up with a plan to be utilized in case a fire department would be affected by the virus to a point that it cannot properly respond to emergencies in its area.

Eden Park Commission

Two main items were discussed in regards to Eden Community Park.

One was the need for two new scoreboards on the baseball fields.

"It was very frustrating for us when we went to turn our score boards on and they didn't work," said Dan Mayer.

Bob Zook told the boards that the cost for

two new boards would be \$6,413.66. This would include the two boards, the controllers for the boards and the equipment needed to attach the boards. This quote did not include the cost of the labor to install the score boards.

The village and town board members approved getting the score boards. The cost will be split equally between the town, the village and the Eden Junior Athletic Association. A second issue that was discussed was the use of the soccer fields in the spring. Zook and Mayer told the boards that the Campbellsport High School soccer programs asked about usage of the soccer fields in spring 2021.

The boys soccer team will be playing in the early spring, starting in March. The girls soccer team will also be playing in the spring, starting in May. Because of COVID-19, the boys season was postponed from the fall to the spring.

"It was brought to our attention that CHS may need to use our fields in the spring," Zook said. "Is there any objections to that?"

"I don't have a problem with them coming here, but they need to pay their bills," said Jay Baumhardt, Eden Village Board. "We're talking wear and tear on the facilities. This is new territory we're treading."

Board members agreed

the school could use the fields but there might be a fee involved.

Mayer told board members that many new organizations have been using the park this past year. He explained how exciting this is for the village and the town.

"I want to say this, this last year because of COVID, we have had a lot of people from out of town using our facilities," Mayer said. "They like them. People are starting to notice Eden."

Zook added, "I know the park is going to be used a lot again next year for the Scorpions girls softball team."

Board members also talked about some tree removal in and around the park. Some trees need to be cut down around the walking trail and park area near the Eden Community Center. A huge oak tree in the park also needs to be cut down before it falls down.

"It's too bad to have to cut a tree down, but it looks like it is going to fall over," said Cory St. Mary.

Baumhardt added, "The board walk is in real good condition right now. Let's hope the winter doesn't wreak havoc on it. There are dozens of trees in that area that need to get taken down too. There's a couple of them that look like they are going to tip over any day now. Marv Grahl does a beautiful job down there. It was terrible the way it was and it looks good now."
