Veterans Day Service Held In Kewaskum

A crowd gathered at the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial and Education Center on Wednesday, Nov. 11, for a Veterans Day program.

Although it is nearing completion, the memorial is not yet open to the public. And social distancing measures were in place because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Yet people still wanted to pay tribute to the veterans who have sacrificed so much for the nation.

The program was led by Kewaskum American Legion Post 384. The service began with the Honor Guard processing

to the Military Flag area of the memorial. At 11 a.m., the community siren was activated in honor of all veterans.

John Koerble, who is the commander of American Legion Post 384, welcomed those gathered.

"Today we remember that on the 11th hour, of the 11th day of the 11th month, November 11, 1918, at that moment, the guns stopped. it was a moment to be celebrated as the largest and deadliest war — up until that time — came to a merciful end. Now we call that war World War I and there continue to be wars," Koerble said.

"Yet we still celebrate

that moment, only today we call it Veterans Day. War is never anything to celebrate, but peace is. The peace in between wars is brought to us mainly by our veterans," Koerble added.

American Legion Post 384 Chaplain Wayne Rempel then said a prayer before remarks were made by Staff Sgt. Andrew Maslanka from the West Bend Army Recruiting Station.

"The direction given to me from being an active duty soldier is irreplaceable. I have been given purpose, mission and life goals," Maslanka said.

The service ended with a Laying of the Wreath and a 21-gun

salute to all veterans, followed by the playing of *Taps* and everyone singing *The Star Spangled Banner*.

Richard Leitheiser Appointed To Kewaskum School Board

At the regular school board meeting on Thursday, Nov. 12, the Kewaskum School Board voted 5-1 to appoint Richard Leitheiser to the board.

Leitheiser fills a seat that has been vacant since September 30, when Mark Sette resigned from the board because he moved out of the school district. The appointment ends in April 2021.

The board interviewed seven candidates on November 11 for the position: Andrew Mazurek, Clayton Frounfelker, Lawrence Wheaton, Trevor Owen, Lori Bruno-Sommer, Rachel Moore and Leitheiser. Board Member Stephanie Bird voted for Bruno-Sommer.

Three additional people had filed letters of interest with the district for the position but then withdrew their names: Chris Sabish, Mark

Brunner and Samantha Goehring.

Leitheiser, who is a Kewaskum High School graduate, said that he moved back to the district a couple months ago and would like to get involved in the community. He has a master's degree in business administration and recently retired from M&I Marshall & Ilsley Bank / BMO Harris.

Eden Residents Learn About Proposed Roundabout

Eden residents learned about a roundabout that is proposed for the intersection of County Highways V and B in the village during an informational meeting on Thursday, Nov. 12.

"We are in the preliminary design phase," said Tom Lanser, project manager, Gremmer & Associates. "By no means are we done with

the design, but we are confident in what we have so far."

An intersection study was done in November 2019. This intersection has a four-way stop right now. After studying the intersection, a one-lane roundabout was suggested for the intersection.

Campbellsport School Board Approves Upgrades To Athletic Fields

Members of the Campbellsport Board of Education approved improvements to the soccer and softball fields at Campbellsport Elementary School.

The south end of the soccer field and the outfield area of the softball field will be tiled and regraded. These improvements are necessary because of constant water issues in both of those areas of the fields.

"I have been a part of the Campbellsport soccer program for the last

eight years," said Tyler Witt, girls and boys soccer head coach. "Our field is an injury waiting to happen. It is the worst field that my players play on and it is the worst in the conference. Our field is a tale of two halves. The south end is best described as a mess. It can hold water for days and up to a week. Do not put a bandaid on this problem so we don't have to come back in a few years."



Publisher's Letter

The Aftermath

Dear Reader,

Election Day has passed, but it seems that the conflict still lingers. I'd like to talk about that in a pragmatic, nonpartisan way. That's a tough needle to thread; I'll know I succeeded only if I get ticked-off letters from both sides of the aisle.

Half of us think the victor has been decided, maybe even more than half. But not all of us. Some of us feel that the votes haven't been counted fairly, completely, correctly, or fully, and that the true victor has yet to be recognized.

I don't want to get into that issue. Whichever side I take, there are half of us who will agree and say "amen," and the other half will think "no way." Neither side is very persuadable, it seems, so I'm not going to waste my time trying to persuade.

Instead, I want to point out that there is one principle that everyone agrees

on, both the red and the blue, and that is that all legal votes must be counted, and no illegal votes can be included in the tally. Listen closely and you'll hear it said on both sides; no one disagrees with this.



Our country is a nation of laws. We have processes for resolving disputes over which votes count. We need to let that process work as our Founders intended. We need to trust that the system will work. The votes will be counted, the disputes will be resolved, and a winner will be declared. Whoever that person is, we then need to rally behind him and do our utmost to insure his success in leading our country.

Please, everyone, let's dial it down just a bit. Give the process a chance to work. We will get there, just as we have before.

Jury Trial Scheduled For Kewaskum Woman In Homicide Case

A jury trial has been scheduled to begin on March 22 for Marie Bourget, a 51-year-old Town of Kewaskum woman, who is charged with first degree intentional homicide with the use of dangerous weapon in the death of her 43-year-old husband, Benjamin J. Brich.

Bourget is accused of cutting Brich's throat and stabbing him three times this past March. If convicted, she faces life imprisonment.

Bourget appeared in custody in a Washington County courtroom on November 10. Judge James Pours scheduled a jury status hear-

ing for February 18 at 1:30 p.m., according to court documents. Seven jury trial dates were set from March 22 through March 30.

Attorney Timothy Drewa stated there are not any unusual Motions in Limine and anticipates four days for the jury trial and anticipate, according to court documents. Drew also anticipates three witnesses and said an investigation is still pending on witnesses.

Deputy District Attorney Stephanie Hanson, who appeared for the state, anticipates there will be seven days needed for the jury trial, according to court documents. Hanson indicated

that witnesses may include: 10 officers; eight possible professional witnesses from the medical examiner and hospital doctor; and 12 potential citizen witnesses.

According to the criminal complaint, police were dispatched on March 11 to a residence on County Highway H in the Town of Kewaskum for a suicidal female who had cut her wrists. While en route, the officers were informed that the woman had allegedly stabbed her husband. She then allegedly tried to kill herself with a knife and pills, according to the criminal complaint.

Bourget had filed for a divorce from Brich on January 31.

Washington County Sheriff's Report

Black Bear Reports

On Monday, Nov. 16, at 11:44 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office received a report of a deceased bear on U.S. 45. A deputy located a deceased male black bear cub, approximately 65 to 70 pounds in weight, on the west shoulder of U.S. 45 northbound, half a mile south of State Highway 145.

The cub had apparently been hit by a vehicle; the driver did not report the incident or stay on scene. The cub was transported back to the sheriff's office and turned over to the Department of Natural Resources.

The sheriff's office had been taking reports of a mother and two cub black bears moving south through Washington County since November 9.

OWI Case

A 40-year-old City of Fond du Lac man is in custody after he was arrested for fifth offense OWI late on Sunday, Nov. 15, on Interstate 41. The driver was traveling 104 mph at the time of the stop.

The man was initially clocked in the area of the I41/U.S. 45 split trav-

eling southbound at 11:39 p.m. A second deputy was able to stop the driver in the Village of Menomonee Falls. The driver's license had been revoked; the driver also was supposed to have an ignition interlock device on the vehicle.

The driver failed field sobriety testing and had a preliminary breath sample at over two times the legal limit for a first time offender.

"It is terrifying knowing that there are individuals out there who simply do not get it. This case is an example of someone who has no regard for the safety of others and needs to be held accountable to society for their complete inability to function within our community," Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said.

"Our goal at the sheriff's office is to reduce victimization and enhance the quality of life for our citizens. I am appreciative of our staff that keeps a watchful eye to protect our good citizens from individuals that make a willful deci-

sion to get behind the wheel when they are clearly incapable of responsible decision making," Schulteis added.

Sheriff Martin Schulteis would like to give local elementary aged youth the opportunity to join him in the squad car to help him lead the parade. The sheriff will pick up and drop off the random drawing winner.

Phyllis M. Chatterton, 93, of Fond du Lac, died on Wednesday, November 11, 2020 after a short stay at St. Agnes Hospital in Fond du Lac, WI.

She was born on August 4, 1927 to Bernard and Mabel (Humbright) Sielaff in Omro, WI and married Russell C. Chatterton on September 3, 1949 in Omro.

Phyllis Chatterton was an independent woman, ahead of her time in many ways, and a role model and mentor for her family. She had a zest for living and embraced new adventures with gusto.

Her revolutionary attitude surfaced while in high school. She was one of a few girls to take shop class, where she learned to weld and use a wide variety of tools; no cooking and sewing classes for her. Throughout her life, she had her own workbench and delighted in small repairs and refinishing furniture.

During high school, she worked at the Omro Pharmacy's soda fountain. It was there that she decided to become a pharmacist. She was the first in her family to go to college; and, in 1949, she graduated from the University of Wisconsin Madison-School of Pharmacy, again one of only a handful of women graduates. She worked and helped put her husband, Russell, through college; he also became a pharmacist. Together they opened and successfully ran Chatterton Pharmacy in Fond du Lac, WI for many decades.

To unwind and relax, Phyllis and Russell would pack up their three kids and head to their cabin in Wild Rose, WI. Phyllis loved this piece of heaven with its birds, woods and trout stream. She loved fishing and deer hunting. For over 50 years, until she was 92, Phyllis never missed an opening weekend of trout fishing and rarely did

she get skunked.

Phyllis had many interests. She enjoyed quilting, playing bridge, going to casinos, traveling and watching sports. The Wisconsin Badgers and Green Bay Packers were her favorite teams. Even in her 80s she still loved going with her son to a Badgers basketball game or to see the Brewers play.

Phyllis had a lively sense of humor, enjoyed a good laugh and loved her family deeply; she gave them many great memories. Phyllis will be lovingly remembered by her family and friends.



Kewaskum Park And Rec Committee Discusses Athletic Agreements

Reigle Family Park, the newest village park in Kewaskum, continues to be developed by the work of volunteers.

Walking trails are currently being created throughout the park. The trails, which meander through the park's five-acre prairie, and around the two-acre pond, link the nine soccer fields with the playground.

Several weeks ago,

the catch-and-release pond was stocked with fish through a donation from Drexel Building Supply, which has committed to keeping the pond stocked.

This most recent addition to the pond included: 45 pounds of minnows; 100 5- to 7-inch perch; and 78 6- to 9-inch crappie.

Volunteers from the Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO) have spent

countless hours creating soccer fields over the past year. Their hard work has paid off, and hundreds of youth played soccer at Reigle Family Park this fall.

The park is expected to open to the general public in 2021.

The Village of Kewaskum is now making plans for how the park will be maintained in the future.

The village's Park and Recreation Committee

met on Wednesday, Nov. 4, with representatives of the KYSO and the Kewaskum Athletics Association (KAA) to discuss development and maintenance agreements regarding village parks.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser presented drafts of memos of understanding between the village and the two youth athletic organizations. One was a draft of a memo of understanding between the village and the KYSO regarding the development and

maintenance of Reigle Family Park. The other was a draft memo of understanding between the village and the KAA regarding the development and maintenance of Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park.

In 2017, both the KYSO and KAA signed a contract agreeing to develop and maintain Reigle Family Park.

However, since then, the Kewaskum School District built a new baseball and softball field on school grounds, so there was no longer a need for

the village to create additional baseball or softball fields. This meant there was no need for KAA to develop or maintain baseball fields at Reigle Family Park.

The draft memo that was presented on November 4 regarding Reigle Family Park outlines that the KYSO will be responsible for soccer field preparation; and the construction/installation/maintenance of soccer-related facilities.

The draft memo states that the village will be responsible for cutting grass; open/close/clean/winterize the bathrooms once constructed; dump the garbage; trim weeds; replace burnt out light bulbs; and maintaining facilities not related to youth soccer (such as playground facilities and walking trails).

Similarly, the draft memo of understanding regarding Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park that was presented at the November 4 meeting states that the KAA will be responsible for base-

ball diamond/flag football field preparation; and the construction/installation/maintenance of baseball/flag football related facilities.

The draft memo also states that the village will be responsible for: cutting the grass; open/close/clean/winterize the bathrooms once constructed; dump the garbage; trim weeds; replace burnt out light bulbs; and maintaining facilities not related to youth baseball/softball/flag football (such as the rental shelter, pool and playground facilities).

The committee discussed changing some of the verbiage in the memos of understanding. Committee members also agreed to add guidelines to scheduling fields to the memos of understanding.

Heiser said he would make the suggested changes and then have the village attorney review the memos.

The memos of understanding will then be brought back to the Park and Recreation Committee for review before going to the Village Board for final approval.

Kewaskum's Days Gone By

5 Years Ago November 26, 2015

Members of the Kewaskum Village Board approved a \$1,999,034 tax levy for the village's 2016 budget on November 18. The amount is a 4.32 percent increase over last year's levy. The approved budget results in an \$18.90 mill rate on all entities. That means homeowners will pay \$81 more than what they paid in 2014 for a \$225,000 property.

Daniel Stoffel who has served as a Washington County supervisor for the past 32 years will not be seeking reelection this spring. The 64-year-old will continue serving as treasurer for the Town of Kewaskum. He has served on the Town of Kewaskum's board in some capacity for 36 years.

Kewaskum will host a Christmas Cookie Hunt on December 6.

The Kewaskum Community Schools Long Range Planning Committee met November 17 to identify needs and determine possible solutions to facility and ground needs within the school district. Over the past five years, the district lost approximately \$2 million in revenue limit, and expenses continue to increase more than revenue. The committee will meet December 8 to discuss needs and solutions for the middle and high school.

In September, Kewaskum High School became the first high school in Wisconsin to offer the Main Street Philanthropy Academy, a program that teaches students to give back to the community. After researching charities, students raised \$1,226 through various fundraisers. This was added to money donated by area businesses and organizations for a total of \$2,726, which was allocated to three different charities: Make-A-Wish, Variety, and the Kewaskum Food Pantry.

Washington County approved the 2016 budget, which reduces the County tax levy \$250,000 and continues the County's diligent financial management. This marks the lowest county property tax levy in 12 years and the low-

est property tax rate in nearly a half century.

Kewaskum's girls varsity basketball team opened the season with two victories. The first was 44-41 over Ozaukee and the second was 36-31 over Random Lake.

15 Years Ago November 24, 2005

Village of Kewaskum residents shouldn't notice too much of a difference in their 2006 tax bill from 2005. The Kewaskum Village Board will present a balanced budget showing only a one cent increase in the tax rate for 2006 to taxpayers at the budget hearing scheduled for November 28. It wasn't easy as Village Administrator Dan Schmidt and Deputy Clerk Janet Knops needed to shave \$231,000 from various departmental accounts to make it happen.

Town of Auburn residents will notice a tax decrease when their tax bills arrive. Auburn officials reduced the 2006 tax levy by three percent. Mild increases in state aid for transportation, recycling and shared revenue helped residents see the decrease. Because of problems with non-town residents using the town recycling center to drop off bulk waste, the town board voted to have all town residents place stickers on the inside of car windows to identify themselves as town residents. Each household will receive two stickers.

The annual KEYS Christmas Concert will be held December 5.

Kewaskum Motor Cars has been working hard since September to open its doors. Currently, the business has 18 cars on the lot, with hopes to increase the fleet to 30. The business is owned by two brothers, Don and Tony Krause. Each has experience in the business.



Eden Residents Learn About Proposed Roundabout

In the material handed out at the meeting, the need was explained like this, "Both highways are heavily traveled and include a relatively high percentage of trucks entering the intersection. The geometry of the intersecting roads, coupled with the high truck traffic, results in an expansive intersection footprint that reduces stop sign effectiveness and creates a more challenging crossing maneuver for both vehicles, pedestrians, and bicyclists."

It was explained to the residents that the size of the intersection sometimes creates some confusion for motorists.

"It's probably one of the biggest intersections I've seen," Lanser said. "It's just a large area and it kind of creates a little confusion. The roundabout is more efficient. The roundabout also really takes those serious injury accidents out of the picture."

Some maps with the proposed intersection were on display. Residents spent time looking at them and asking questions about the pos-

sible impact to their property and the village.

Over the next couple months, the project planners will take comments from residents about the project. They will then continue work on the plan through the end of the year.

Next year will be spent with land acquisition for the project and the finalization of the design. Utility relocation will begin in fall 2021. Construction of the project should start in spring 2022.

Lanser estimated the project should take three to four months to complete. During that time, this intersection will be closed to through traffic with detours in place. Access to businesses and private properties will be maintained throughout the project.

"This is going to cut Eden off for close to four months," Jim Baumhardt said.

Some residents asked if the project could be completed or at least to a point where it could be utilized on Sunday, Aug. 7, 2022. This will be the date for the Eden Fire Department's annual pa-

rade, which starts at that corner.

Officials explained that everything is preliminary right now. They will be working over the next year to finalize plans and time frame for the project.

Next summer, Fond du Lac County will be repaving County Highway V between Campbellsport and Eden. Then, the year of the roundabout project, County Highway V between Eden and Fond du Lac will be repaved.

The county will be doing most of the construction work on the roundabout. As part of this intersection project, the county will also repave the portion of County Highway B from the end of the roundabout project to where the Highway 45 project ended last summer.

"That way you won't be leaving an island there of old pavement," Lanser said.

This will be a county project as far as the funding for the roundabout. It is estimated to cost a little less than \$1.5 million. The village may have some ex-

penses in the project depending on utilities and sidewalks.

When completed, the roundabout will be similar to the one in Fond du Lac at the intersection of County Highway V and

Pioneer Road. The intersection in Eden should be a little bit wider than that one. It will have a truck apron like the others in Fond du Lac.

Kewaskum School Board Discusses Mask Mandate

By Anne Trautner

During the November 12 board meeting, the Kewaskum School Board listened to three people make public comments about the importance of wearing masks during the pandemic.

Anna Baltz, a teacher with the district, said that the members of the Kewaskum Education Association had discussed the issue and appreciated school board members wearing masks.

"When you walk through these doors, you represent Kewaskum School District," Baltz said. "Our

students have done an amazing job of being responsible and adjusting to wearing masks throughout their school day. It seems to us that if our kids can figure out how to separate what they do at home from what they need to do at school, then the adults that are making vital decisions about their education, could do the same."

Sue Miller and Stephanie Bird were the only School Board members who wore masks during the meeting. All School Board members were seated at least six feet from others.

The board discussed

the district's policy during the meeting, but did not make any changes to the current policy, which requires masks to be worn inside school buildings.

School Board Member Timothy Ramthun said he has heard many opinions.

"I see and speak to many, and I hear both sides. I hear a common expression as was expressed in public comments this evening, and I hear 180 degrees from that. People talk about rights and tyranny and control. My desire was to ask the question about what's mandated and what's choice," Ramthun said.

Ramthun said he respects anyone who wears a mask but has heard that science does not necessarily support wearing masks.

"You breathe through it; you develop condensation on the mask. The mask can attract virus and other particles," Ramthun said. "One of the things they are looking at is how effective are face masks in general."

Ramthun said he feels that parents should be given the choice of whether their children should be required to wear masks.

School Board Member Stephanie Bird pointed out that the dis-

trict is following recommendations set by the Washington Ozaukee County Health Department.

The county health department, the Wisconsin Health Department and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) all recommend wearing masks and maintaining a distance of at least six feet from other people.

Board Approves Hiring Paraprofessionals

At the November 12 meeting, the Kewaskum School Board approved spending up to \$80,000 to hire additional paraprofessionals this year to help with staffing is-

issues due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

District Administrator James Smasal said the paraprofessionals would be hired on a part-time basis to help supervise classes if teachers are absent. If a teacher is quarantined, it may be possible for that teacher to teach a class virtually from home while a paraprofessional would supervise the classroom.

Last week the district had 20 staff members absent due to COVID-19 reasons in addition to teachers who were absent for other reasons, Smasal told the board.

Campbellsport School Board Approves Upgrades To Soccer And Softball Fields

Soccer player Cole Theisen said, "We are unable to practice on it and that affects us. We earned a spot for a playoff game last season and we were unable to have it on our field and we had to play it in Kewaskum. We were extremely sad, because we were excited to play it in our hometown that day. I want to give my team the best chance to win and that starts with a good field."

Meegan Theisen, Cole's mother, added, "I have been present for both fall and spring soccer seasons for many many years. I know the spring field conditions are usually worse, but I have seen many issues in both fall and spring on the Campbellsport soccer fields. There have been so many games that I have seen turn into big muddy messes and have been worried about the safety of the players. I don't see the fixing of these fields as optional."

"As a parent of two soccer players, I have personally seen the work these athletes have put into their sport and the pride they have for the Campbellsport soccer program. I can tell you with certainty that facilities matter to players. Having a place to play their sport that they take pride in matters. I believe that having a field that is playable is the least that we can provide our athletes."

In addition to the soccer supporters, Campbellsport High School softball coach Dan Heisdorf was on hand to ask that the outfield on the softball field be fixed also. He explained that the infield was fixed last year and it made a big difference on the field. Now they would like the outfield to be fixed.

"I am just asking you to consider tiling the outfield," Heisdorf said. "It is swampy when it rains. It has been brought up to regrade it, but I don't think that is going to work. We have a fabulous infield now. It is great! I'm just asking you to consider using the tile for the outfield to fix that situation. The infield is awesome so I am asking you to finish it."

"I think the girls deserve to play on a really solid field. Last year, our state run, we were only able to play one game there, the rest were played at Columbus Parc."

After listening to the comments, the board discussed the situation later in their meeting. They had two bids to look at for the project.

"If you go down far enough, you find a soil or subsoil that will not allow water to penetrate it, so it goes out instead of down," said Tom Griesemer, athletic director. "It just doesn't move water."

Mueller Excavating of Campbellsport was one of the bids the board looked at. Mueller would tile and

regrade the ground. They would also put a ditch along the outside of the soccer field so the water has a place to flow, rather than sitting on the field.

"The thing I like about Dusty's (Mueller's plan) is he is making a ditch and making it pourous," said Paul Amundson, district administrator. "You will still have this pourous ditch that the water would pour to if he slopes it right."

Then, Griesemer explained that the reseeding of the field would be done by the FFA and ag students with help from the district maintenance staff. A few students were looking for a project like this so the ag teacher, Shawna Henke, asked if they could take it on as a class project.

"They want to do this," Griesemer said. "Litterally you're talking around \$400 of seed."

When comparing the two bids, Griesemer explained that Mueller's quote contained some things the other one didn't. "There's a lot more built into the Mueller one because you're getting 15 loads of top soil on the soccer field and seven on the softball field," he said.

Board members liked the idea of a local contractor working on the project.

"Dusty lives in the area and he knows the ground around here," said Danielle Neitzel. "He knows the expectations of what may or may not happen."

Deb Senn added, "I also like that working with Mueller will involve working with our FFA. It's always great when students can learn from it."

Before voting on the motion, Keith Peters asked if there was money in the budget. Since these were larger projects — estimated around \$55,000 — he wanted to make sure these can be done in addition to some other larger projects coming up.

Peters was assured that there is money in the budget for both of these projects and the other upcoming building projects, either out of the fund balance or the building and maintenance funds that have been established. The other projects, some roofs at the elementary schools, can be stretched over a few years.

"We have enough in my opinion and Shelley's opinion to do some of these projects," Amundson said, referring to Michelle Eilbes, director of business services for the district. "You have also been saving money in Fund 46 that would help take care of that."



Winter Parking Rules Go Into Effect In Campbellsport

Winter parking rules in the Village of Campbellsport went into effect on Sunday, Nov. 15, and will run through April 15, 2021.

This means that, per village ordinance #32-70, a parking ban is in place and no one is allowed to park on village streets between the hours of 2:30 a.m. and 5:30 a.m. This is done in the winter months to allow the Department of Public Works time to clear snow more easily off the streets after a snow event.

Campbellsport Police Chief Tom Dornbrook wants residents to know that the police department will be strictly enforcing the ordinance again this year. Chief Dornbrook stated that they do not want anyone impeding snow removal during the snow ordinance hours, especially on Main Street.

In addition to the win-

ter parking, a reminder about clearing of sidewalks has been issued. All village sidewalks need to be cleared of snow and ice throughout the winter months.

"It is that time of year, please be reminded that sidewalks need to be cleared of snow, slush, and ice within 24 hours of the last accumulation of snow or ice," stated the Campbellsport Police Department. "Last winter we received many citizen complaints of sidewalks that were not cleared within the 24 hour period. We hope that everyone takes this message serious so that we do not have to issue citations."

Just remember to clear those sidewalks as soon as possible after an accumulation of snow or drifting snow, but have it done for sure within 24 hours.

Options For New Hunters As They Head Into 2020 Deer Hunting Season

As COVID-19 cases continue to rise in our state, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is offering alternatives to traditional in-person hunter education and outdoor skills classes in order to keep people safe while hunting this season.

The following options are available to new and returning hunters in 2020.

Hunter Education:

New Online-Only Certification Option For Youth

As of October 15, students of all ages can earn their Wisconsin hunter education safety certification through a single, online-only hunter education course under a temporary change approved by the DNR.

While online-only hunter education safety certification has been available to adults since

2018, this year's temporary change allows those under age 18 to take the online-only course now through December 31, 2020. Those interested in taking the online-only course who are over 18 years of age may continue to do so after December 31.

Mentored Hunting

If there is someone in your household who is interested in trying hunting, check out Mentored Hunting. This program allows novice hunters of any age to purchase a mentored hunting license without first completing a hunter education course, as long as the novice hunts within arm's reach of a licensed mentor over the age of 18.

If you have not passed Hunter Safety but would like to hunt with a mentor this year, you may

buy your license through Go Wild. Upon completion, the license will automatically print as "Mentored Only."

Tips For New And Returning Hunters

- The DNR is committed to providing hunters with free and easy access to public lands. To locate public hunting land near you, go to <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/lands>.

- Consider taking the online-only hunter education course as a refresher or to earn your hunter education safety certificate.

- Check out your local shooting ranges for rifle and shotgun sight-in opportunities.

- Don't forget to buy your license.



Coach P's Corner

Ups And Downs

I was sorting through a stack of old WIAA Bulletins last week and ran across an issue from 1982. As I paged through and did some reminiscing, I ran across a section that had the school enrollments listed for the school year of 1982. I was amazed at the growth and decline of some of the schools across the state of Wisconsin. The number of students has changed drastically for some school districts in nearly a 40-year span.

So what are the causes of these increases and decreases? There are several factors that have unfolded with the biggest one being, families just aren't having a lot of children compared to 1982. Another huge factor is the economic growth and housing development in certain cities. The expansion of virtual schools, open enrollment, athletics, and safer environments have all had a hand in the equation.

The Madison suburbs have seen the greatest increase in student numbers. Middleton, Sun Prairie, and Verona have all increased over a thousand students since 1982. Waunakee, De-

Forest, Oregon and McFarland have all increased their enrollment numbers substantially as well.

Other areas of the state that have had huge enrollment increases are Hudson (up 906 students), Franklin (up 685 students), Oak Creek (up 607 students), Holmen (up 570 students), and Kimberly (up 547 students).

The Milwaukee schools are getting hit the hardest with enrollment numbers. Every school in the MPS has decreased drastically with the exception of Milwaukee Riverside, who is up over a thousand students. Milwaukee Bay View, Milwaukee Madison, Milwaukee Tech and Milwaukee Vincent have all dropped over a thousand students since 1982.

The old Wisconsin Valley schools are getting hit hard with decreases as well. Antigo, Merrill, Rhineland, Stevens Point and Wisconsin Rapids all have lost at least 500 or more students. Rapids has lost the most with a decrease of 935 students.

How does Campbellsport and area schools fare as far as

enrollment figures? The Cougars have dropped 151 students since 1982. New Holstein has been hit the hardest as they have lost 465 students since 1982.

Old Eastern Wisconsin Conference foe Two Rivers has decreased 492 students, an amazing dip as they were once at 999 students in their high school. Waupun, Kewaskum and Kiel have all lost over 200 students since 1982.

In the old Flyway Conference, Horicon has seen the greatest decrease in 177 students. Markesan and Mayville have both dropped over 100 students while Lomira has remained somewhat steady, losing only 34 students since 1982.

North Fond du Lac is the only area school to see an increase as their school is up 38 students. One of the Cougars conference opponents, Winnebago, has also seen an increase of 14 students in this span of 38 years. The West Bend schools have not been hit too hard with enrollment decline. West Bend East has lost 274 students, while West Bend West is down only 72.


