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Sign Of The Past Found Inside Curve-In Bar

Vinny and KC Egle started renovating the Curve In Bar about two years ago.

The building, which is located on Highway 45 between Kewaskum and Campbellsport, had previously housed Richard Thiemer's barbershop, called Richard's Kut and Style. So when they started renovating the building, Vinny and KC figured they might find barber items that told things about the building's past.

They never guessed they would find an old sign inside the attic advertising for Valve-In Buick cars from A.A. Perschbacher Garage, which was established in Kewaskum in 1893. The sign likely dates back to somewhere between 1913 and 1920.

Finding The Sign

When they redid the building, the Egles removed the ceiling and walls inside the building. They were amazed when they found two signs advertising hamburgers, soft drinks and chips inside the ceiling.

Richard Thiemer IV, an electrician, was helping with the renovation project. Coincidentally, he is the grandson of Richard Thiemer II, who had owned the barbershop in that very building, and great-grandson of Richard Thiemer I, who bought the building in 1954, prior to it becoming a barbershop.

It was Richard Thiemer IV who saw that there was another sign sandwiched between the other two signs.

"The sign was face down between those two other signs, so we didn't even know it was there," KC said.

Holes are visible in the center

of the sign where it had been attached to the ceiling.

"It was actually a part of a ceiling repair here," KC said.

The group wondered: How did a sign from a Kewaskum car dealership end up in their ceiling?

How The Sign Got There

The Egles have been trying to piece together how a sign from A.A. Perschbacher in Kewaskum ended up in the attic of their bar.

"It was probably Richard Thiemer I who put it in there because he was the one who built the barber shop," Vinny said. "He hung out at Serwe's Tap a lot, so he probably got the sign when he was there."

Serwe's Tap was located across the street from where Perschbacher's garage had been, so that is a possibility. It also is possible that Richard Thiemer I picked up the sign directly from Perschbacher's garage.

"My dad was a scavenger and Perschbacher probably said he didn't need it," Richard Thiemer II joked.

Richard Thiemer II said that his dad was very resourceful.

"Dad could fix anything with duct tape. He was a character," he laughed. "He probably put that tin up there so they would have some insulation and so no one would fall through."

"At that time, signage was nothing, it just was a piece of metal. So they just used it to repair the ceiling. So at that time, the sign didn't mean anything," Vinny said.

Campbellsport Woman Healing After Freak Halloween Accident

What started out as a exciting night of trick or treat fun soon turned into a harrowing experience for a local family. A freak accident sent Heather Crass to the hospital fighting for her life.

The 32-year-old from Campbellsport had fallen off a trailer being towed by a Utility Terrain Vehicle (UTV) and struck her head on the roadway of Trail Vu Court, in the Town of Auburn. She was rushed to St. Agnes Hospital where a helicopter was waiting to fly her to Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee.

After Heather was transported in the ambulance and on the helicopter, one of the Campbellsport EMTs who was working on Heather called Adam Crass, Heather's husband, to give him an update. "She let me know that Heather was semi-alert," Adam said.

In the meantime, he also had to find someone to watch their children so he could get to Milwaukee.

"Her mom drove me down there," Adam said. "I was able to go into the trauma room with her."

Adam was told that Heather had a skull fracture and bleeding on the brain. Her brain was also swelling because of the trauma.

The doctors explained to Adam in those first couple of days that the things they were doing were to save Heather's life. They removed a portion of her skull to remove pressure on her brain to help the swelling and bleeding. The doctors also drilled a hole to help drain some of the blood that was building up.

According to Adam, they were in survival mode for the first few days and then started to focus on recovery. Heather was put into a medically induced coma for nine days.

"Then her body could focus on healing the brain," Adam said.

Once she was out of the coma, the doctors — a team of about 10 of them — continued to check on Heather and watch her progress. It was decided that she needed a little more help. According to Adam, instead of another medically-induced coma, they just kept her heavily sedated for about three days.

The newly nominated Treasury Secretary, Janet Yellen, has endorsed a market-based solution, a carbon fee and dividend plan (<https://clouncil.org/>).

There is a bipartisan market-based carbon fee and dividend plan sitting in the halls of congress with 82 co-sponsors waiting to move forward, the Energy Innovation and Climate Dividend Act (EICDA). (<https://energyinnovationact.org/>). It imposes a steadily increasing fee on fossil fuels as they are extracted from the earth to reflect the high long-term costs of burning the fuel and returns that fee to all of us. It creates jobs, an estimated 2.1 million (<https://citizensclimatelobby.org/energy-innovation-and-carbon-dividend-act/>), and improves air quality and our health. The EICDA also imposes a border carbon adjustment to make sure our industries don't face a competitive disadvantage when selling energy intensive products (e.g., steel) outside the country. The European Union,

the second largest collective economy in the world, just announced they are proceeding with their own carbon border adjustment to take effect in 2023 that will impose a similar tariff on our products if we haven't taken carbon emissions seriously by then. (<https://www.bloomberg.com/news/articles/2020-09-29/carbon-border-tax-emerges-in-eu-as-w-eapon-to-protect-green-deal>). A carbon fee has been implemented by 25 countries (<https://earth.org/carbon-tax-a-shared-global-responsibility-for-carbon-emissions/#:~:text=A%20national%20carbon%20tax%20is,%2C%20Japan%2C%20Ukraine%20and%20Argentina>) and is recommended by thousands of economists (<https://www.wsj.com/articles/economists-state-ment-on-carbon-dividends-11547682910>). A carbon fee and dividend approach world-wide would be a major first step in solving the climate crisis.

We have the talent and markets to solve this existential problem. It must happen and will happen. The real ques-

tion is how quickly will we act. The time must be now. Please tell your representatives to stop dragging their feet across this wonderful home of ours, and to take action!

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Kewaskum Schools To Follow New Quarantine Guidelines

The Kewaskum School District will follow new guidelines set by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Washington/Ozaukee Public Health Department for quarantine and isolation in regard to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The new guidelines outline the following steps to take if you are in close contact with someone with COVID-19:

•Without testing and no symptoms: Self-quarantine for 10 days, and monitor themselves for an additional four days for symptoms.

•With testing and no symptoms: Self-quarantine for seven days, get tested no sooner than day six of your quarantine (Rapid-antigen or PCR), remaining in quarantine until results come back. If the test comes back negative and no symptoms, quar-

antine may end as early as day seven with a return to school on day eight.

The Gold Standard of the Washington Ozaukee Quarantine Guidelines still recommends a 14-day quarantine for any close contacts, and families are encouraged to follow that standard.

James Smasal, Kewaskum District Administrator, sent a letter to all families on December 7 to alert them to the new guidelines.

“Please continue to follow these guidelines to ensure the safety of you, your children and those within our community. A sick or compromised person entering our buildings places everyone at risk. We continue with our desire to teach in-person to those students who are healthy to enter our buildings. I thank you for doing your part in helping us keep children in school learning,” Smasal wrote.

Washington County Sheriff's Report

Home Invasion

Charges were filed in Washington County Circuit Court on Monday, Nov. 30, against a 26-year-old Milwaukee man and 51-year-old Milwaukee women. These charges are the culmination of a six-week, multi-jurisdictional investigation, led by the Washington County Sheriff's Office into a home invasion robbery that occurred in the Village of Richfield on October 23.

The victim, an 85-year-old woman, was home alone the morning of October 23 when two masked individuals entered her house through a rear patio door. The male suspect allegedly pushed the victim in her wheelchair toward the basement stairs until the female suspect stopped him just before reaching the steps.

The female suspect is accused of stealing a bag of jewelry from the victim's bedroom and the male suspect allegedly took the victim's cell phone and then fled

the area.

Several hours later, a Good Samaritan found the victim's cell phone in the roadway and contacted the victim's son utilizing the phone contacts. At that time, the son happened to be on his way to the sheriff's office to meet with detectives about a prior theft incident. He contacted a neighbor to check the welfare of his mother and learned of the robbery while walking into the sheriff's office.

The following day, Washington County Sheriff's Office detectives, with the assistance of the Milwaukee Police Department, took the female suspect into custody on the previous theft incident. The suspect was known to the victims from a previous relationship.

The male suspect is a known drug acquaintance of the female suspect. She provided information to him about the victim, location of the jewelry, and assisted in carrying out the robbery

DHS Announces New COVID-19 Guidance On Quarantine Duration

—DHS Supports Revised CDC Guidelines To Shorten Quarantine For Close Contacts

In response to new guidelines released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Department of Health Services (DHS) has updated quarantine guidance for close contacts of someone diagnosed with COVID-19. The updated guidance went into effect for Wisconsin on Monday, Dec. 7.

“For many, there may be barriers that make quarantining for a full 14 days extremely challenging,” said DHS secretary-

designee Andrea Palm. “While a shorter quarantine carries additional risk of spreading COVID-19, when done responsibly, it can make quarantining easier for more Wisconsinites.”

While a 14-day quarantine is still the safest option, this new guidance takes into account emerging scientific evidence on quarantine periods, and recognizes the difficulty many Wisconsinites may have complying with the full 14-day quarantine.

DHS now allows that people who do not develop symptoms can end their quarantine:

•After completing day 10 of quarantine without testing.

•After completing day seven of quarantine and receiving a negative test result (molecular or antigen) that was collected within 48 hours of the end of quarantine.

People must continue to monitor for symptoms for the full 14 days. If symptoms develop following the end of quaran-

tie, people are advised to immediately isolate, contact their health care provider, and get tested.

DHS is currently working to update all communication and guidance materials to reflect this change.

in exchange for money and drugs. She did not know him by name. Investigators ascertained the 26-year-old Milwaukee man's true identity.

While investigators attempted to locate the male suspect, they discovered he was likely in the process of transporting illegal drugs from the west coast back to the City of Milwaukee. Sheriff's investigators began coordinating with agents from the Wisconsin Division of Criminal Investigations and the Wisconsin State Patrol to intercept the male actor.

On October 31, the male suspect was

stopped in La Crosse County by the Wisconsin State Patrol. He was a passenger in a rented minivan with his girlfriend and four children.

Thirteen pounds of marijuana were located in the vehicle and he was arrested for possession with intent to deliver. Simultaneous to the male suspect's arrest, Washington County investigators, along with Wisconsin DCI Agents and the Milwaukee Police Department, executed a search warrant in the 2700 block of N. 57th Street in Milwaukee. Jewelry from the initial robbery was located along with

firearms, U.S. currency, and the vehicle used in the robbery. Evidence gathered at the search warrant also led to the recovery of other jewelry from a local pawn store.

Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulteis said he was thankful with the outcome in this case.

“Our office, along with our law enforcement partners, dedicated a significant amount of resources to this investigation in the interest of

justice. It is unconscionable to think someone could victimize an elderly woman who is bound to a wheelchair. To leave her terrified, alone, and unable to get help is morally reprehensible; she was absolutely helpless against these two criminals. My staff takes pride in being able to serve justice for the victims and being a voice for the vulnerable. This is why they take the oath to serve the community,” Schulteis said.

doza.







This was during the Korean Conflict. In August, he was shipped overseas to Germany and was discharged in December 1952. He started deer hunting at age 16 and shot 31 bucks in his lifetime. Getting The Bar

In 1954, Richard Thiemer I drove up from his home in Milwaukee to go fishing in the Kettle Moraine.

He happened to drive by the tavern now known as the Curve In Bar and decided to stop. He struck up a conversation with the owner of the bar, which was called Spanny's at the time, and found out that Spanny's was for sale. He decided to buy it.

He went home and told his wife they had just bought a bar.

"My mom was not very happy. Not at all," Richard Thiemer II said.

Their new property had an outhouse, and she much preferred indoor plumbing. There was no built-in heating, either.

So the Thiemers put some work into the place. They put in a well and indoor bathrooms, and converted the crawl space into a basement.

It turned out to be a good move. The Thiemers got to know and love their customers, and the entire

family grew to love the business.

"My mom ended up really loving it," Richard Thiemer II said.

Coincidentally, a similar thing happened again when the Egles purchased the Curve In Bar.

"Six years ago, my husband called me and he told me we had just bought a bar," KC recalled.

Vinny explained that the original owner of the

business was in some financial trouble.

"Either you buy the bar today or somebody else is coming in tomorrow to take it," the owner told Vinny.

"So lo and behold, we bought a bar, and I didn't know anything about it," KC said.

The Egles operated their bar out of one side of the building, and Thiemer II ran his barbershop on the other side. When Thiemer II

retired about two years ago, the Egles purchased the entire building and began renovating the space to expand the bar area and create a cathedral ceiling.

Now the customers, as well as the building, have a special place in both Vinny's and KC's hearts.

Sign Of The Past Found Inside Curve-In Bar

Original Location Of Sign

The sign that the Egles found is originally from the A.A. Perschbacher Garage, which was located on Fond du Lac Avenue, just to the north of where Miller's Furniture store is located today.


In November 1893, the A.A. Perschbacher Garage was founded as

a partnership between Arey A. Perschbacher and Louis Siegel. The two business partners purchased a blacksmith shop, carriage shop, and dwelling from Leopold Schaefer for \$2,175 at the properties located at what is now 1317-1325 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum. Perschbacher became the sole owner in 1897, and

he added a carriage repository to the business in 1898.

In April 1912, Perschbacher opened a garage next to his blacksmith shop. He began selling Buick vehicles in 1913.

By 1920, Perschbacher liquidated the entire stock of his blacksmith shop. He renamed the business Rex

Garage and remodeled the building to become a 2,000-square-foot, two-story garage. In 1935, the business added an Allis Chalmers farm machinery dealership. Within the next few years, Gehl Bros. and New Idea dealerships also became part of Perschbacher's business.

Perschbacher died in 1942, and his son Myron Perschbacher took over the business until 1974, when Miller's Furniture purchased the property.

Framing The Sign

Today the A.A. Per-

schbacher sign hangs on a wall inside the Curve In Bar. It is in a wooden frame that is made from quarter-inch planking that used to be in the attic door of the bar.

"So what it was resting in for so many years is where it continues to rest today," KC said.

To make it a focal point, LED lighting was installed around the sign so that it changes colors.

Vinny did some research on the sign and found that the Valve-In-

Head logo on the sign was used from about 1908 to 1930. The sign was likely used by A.A. Perschbacher sometime between 1913 when Perschbacher started selling Buick and 1920, when the business name was changed to Rex Garage.

The two signs advertising hamburgers, soft drinks and chips that were found with the Perschbacher sign are currently being framed as well.

Planning Continues For New Municipal Building In Kewaskum

The Village of Kewaskum's Shared Facilities

Committee continues to plan facility upgrades for the municipal building that houses Kewaskum Village Hall, the Kewaskum Police Department and the Kewaskum Public Library.

At a meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 8, the committee discussed the latest conceptual drawing, which calls for constructing a new municipal building where the village's annex building and a portion of the municipal parking lot are currently located between Main Street and First Street.

The building project is still in the planning stage. Before a final plan is approved, a public hearing will be held.

This latest drawing took into account input that was gathered at the previous meeting on November 10. At that meeting, nine business owners and community members voiced concerns about the new construction.

Chief among the concerns that were voiced at the November meeting was the need for adequate downtown parking. Owners of businesses on Main Street want their customers to be able to park in the municipal lot.

The committee listened to the concerns, and the latest conceptual drawing is an attempt to meet those needs. Zimmermann Architectural Studios created a new drawing, which offers 41 stalls in the existing public lot. In addition, there are 13 parking spots available to the north of the proposed building on First Street.

The drawing also includes a municipal parking lot with 72 stalls where the current municipal building stands. The committee feels that this could serve as a venue for events such

as the Kewaskum Farmers Market and the annual car show that is held in Kewaskum.

This brings the total proposed parking spots to 144 stalls, which is a net increase of 32 stalls from the current parking lot, which offers 112 stalls.

As many as eight of those stalls are assigned to The Silbernagel Group, which is located in the building at 114 Main St. Village Administrator Matt Heiser said at Tuesday's meeting that he will find out if the village can alter those parking spots or if there is a permanent easement on the stalls.

All parking on this latest conceptual drawing is on ground level. A more expensive option was presented last month that included below grade parking situated below the new building.

Before the committee meets again, it would like the village's police chief to conduct a study of how many parking spaces are routinely used in the municipal parking lot.

Heiser said that he talked with representatives of Engelhardt Dairy, who told him that the dairy has a garage that needs to have access to First Street. However, the gravel parking lot on the east side of the dairy building does not need to have access to First Street.

Based on that, Village Trustee Jim Hovland, who serves on the Shared Facilities Committee, suggested that perhaps the police department could extend onto First Street to create more available parking spots in the main parking lot. If this is done, First Street would dead end between Fond du Lac Avenue and Railroad Street near that gravel parking lot.

The plan that was presented on Tuesday features a new two-story building with about

21,590 square feet. On the first level are the library, lobby and police department. The second floor on the plan houses the village administration and a community room.

The committee voiced some concerns about the community room being on the second floor and questioned whether that would be easily accessible for the residents. The proposed community room is about 1,224 square feet. That space would serve as a meeting space, village board chambers, voting location and space for the monthly Mid-Moraine Municipal Court.

The proposed community room would replace the current village board chambers and community room that are located in the municipal building, as well as the space that is currently available in the village's annex building. Although the total square footage is currently larger, the space is not all available for community use because the current community room is not in a secure area.

"We want to have more efficient space that can be shared," explained Village Trustee Dave Spenner, who chairs the shared facilities committee.

The most recent conceptual drawing provides access to the Eisenbahn State Trail and relocates the historical signage that is currently located in the municipal lot east of the Eisenbahn Trail.

The total cost of the proposed building is \$8,223,350. The cost of demolition still needs to be determined.

The Shared Facilities Committee, which was created about two years ago, met for the first time on January 8, 2019. The next meeting is tentatively planned for Tuesday, Jan. 12, at 9 a.m.

That second round of heavy treatment did the trick for Heather. Adam could not believe how good Heather was when they took her out of the heavy sedation in that second round of treatment.

"The ICU down there was truly incredible with what they do," Adam said. "Truly incredible! Everyone at Froedtert is awesome!"

Heather's entire head was swollen at first. She also broke her nose in the fall and damage one of her eyes.

"I couldn't open my eyes for days," Heather said.

Adam watched the swelling on her face and all the monitors very carefully. He knew how to gauge the good and bad progress by the fluctuations in the monitor numbers.

The doctors also told him the swelling on Heather's face was a good indication on the healing in her brain. At one point, he knew the fight was starting to go in the right direction. As he looked at the swelling on her face, Adam knew this was the worst it would be and it would get better from there.

"You knew that was the peak of swelling," he said.

Once Heather woke up from both sedations, she was starting to piece things together. Adam had to explain to her where she was and why she was there. Her memory and cognitive abilities were a little shaky at first, but both got stronger quickly.

Though she had trou-

ble remembering things or finding the words to use when she talked, there was one thing she never waived on. Heather always knew her children, her husband and all of their names.

"That's the one thing she never mixed up in the hospital," Adam said.

While in the hospital, Adam was the only person who could visit Heather. With COVID-19 gripping the country, visitors were limited to just one and only during specific times.

"I could go down from 8 a.m.-8 p.m.," Adam said.

Heather added, "No one else could come in by me."

After waking up and gaining most of her cognitive abilities, Adam brought Heather's phone down to her. That way she could interact with her children and other family and friends while she continued to heal.

Heather has worked for Froedtert in West Bend in the orthopedics department for six years now. So, when she was transferred to a regular room in that part of the hospital in Milwaukee, it was familiar for her.

"I ended up knowing some of the nurses," she said. "That was the best building."

Coming Home

Heather was able to come home from the hospital about two weeks ago. She was excited to be able to be home for Thanksgiving.

"To see the kids was my main thing," Heather said.

She is obviously still

healing. Heather has to travel to West Bend for physical, speech and memory therapy every week and is making tremendous progress.

"She (her therapist) said I've been doing really good," Heather said. "I'm doing good with memory (short term and long term). I remember everything but the incident."

There is still some swelling that will need to subside quite a bit in the next month or two. As soon as all the swelling is gone and everything is healed, Heather will have one final surgery that will be needed.

The piece of her skull that was removed to relieve pressure has not been put back in place yet. This cannot be done until everything is healed and the swelling is completely gone. So, that piece of Heather's skull is being preserved at the hospital until it can be replaced.

Campbellsport Community Steps Up
Heather and Adam did not have enough good

things to say about their Campbellsport community throughout this entire ordeal. The way everyone has stepped up to help the family in one way or another will never be forgotten.

"Campbellsport has just been amazing," Heather said. "People continue to reach out to us."

One example of this occurred this past Saturday. Members of the Campbellsport American Legion stopped by the Crass house to deliver some donations.

The Legion reached out to LeNore Schill at the Campbellsport Food Pantry to find out if she knew of a family who could use their help this Christmas season. Schill told them about the Crass family and their recent difficulties so they decided to help.

Once word got around that the Legion was doing this, donations poured in to them. They were able to collect a total of \$300 to give to the family. One gentleman donated a frozen turkey to the family for

their Christmas dinner.

The manager at Kohn's Filling Station in Campbellsport heard about the Legion's donation drive and told some of her customers about it. In total, Kohn's and some of its customers donated \$150 in gas cards along with a \$50 Piggly Wiggly gift card.

"Word got around and man, this snowballed," said Scott Rajek, treasurer of the Legion.

Others have just given the family their time and talents. Neighbors and family have helped care for Heather and Adam's three children.

Neighbors, friends and family have been bringing meals for the family. One neighbor just happens to be the principal at Campbellsport Elementary School, so Shanda Cerny has been making sure the children are keeping up on their studies and school work.

"She has helped the kids a lot," Heather said. "Their teachers made a lot of things easier for them."

Tricia Walker, another neighbor, brought over a Thanksgiving meal for the family on Thanksgiving.

One person has even donated a month's worth

of Christmas gifts for the family. Everything is under the tree and they have one to open each day in the month of December until Christmas day. On Saturday, they opened an Oreo cookie house kit. The children could not wait to open it and make their house! The family will not know who these gifts are from until they open the final present on Christmas day.

King Pin Lanes have given them a lot of support. Their children all bowl there in the children's program. St. Matthew Church has been a big help to the family. Along with the Hartford Clinic, where a relative works, will be taking their children Christmas shopping for them. Employees from the West Bend Health Center, where Heather works, have been helping and donating where they can.

"It's amazing to see how everyone comes together," Adam said. "We are truly blessed with all the love and support."

Heather added, "Every-one has been reaching out and helped us out. Everybody is just so amazing in Campbellsport!"

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

The Kewaskum High School girls basketball team racked up two more wins last week, with a 68-26 victory over Berlin on Tuesday, Dec. 1, and a 68-49 victory over Ripon on Friday, Dec. 4.

Berlin Game

The Kewaskum girls basketball team traveled to Berlin on Tuesday, Dec. 1, and the team's pressure defense was

too much for Berlin to overcome. The Kewaskum Indians created 21 first-half turnovers. Combining those turnovers with eight first-half three-point field goals was a recipe for a 46-10 halftime lead. Kewaskum cruised to a 68-26 victory to move their overall record to 2-0 (1-0 in conference).

Annie Christenson led a balanced scoring attack with 12 points. Madi Dogs continued to stuff the stat sheet with 10 points, eight rebounds, five steals and two blocks. Other contributors included the Adams sisters. Morgan tallied nine points and six rebounds, and her sister, Kennedy, chipped in with eight points to go along with four assists and seven steals. Next up for the Indians is Ripon at home on Friday, 12/5.

Ripon Game

The Ripon Tigers visited Kewaskum on Friday night. Ripon started out strong and knocked down some outside shots to build a 21-15 lead about halfway through the first half. The Indians faced some first half foul trouble, but were able to counter with a 17-0 run towards the end of the first half behind Madi Dogs' 10

first half points. She finished with 13 to go along with 12 rebounds and five steals.

The second half belonged to Annie Christenson. She displayed her versatility by scoring inside, outside and converting at the free throw line. She tallied 16 of her career high 22 points in the second half and was a difference maker.

"I thought Annie's decision making was outstanding in the second half. She got buckets for us and set up some of her teammates for baskets as well. We hope she can keep this going for us heading into Waupun," said coach Russell Thull.

Dave Anderson To Retire From WIAA Executive Director Position

The WIAA Board of Control accepted the retirement of Executive Director Dave Anderson, effective on July 30, 2021, in closed session of its December meeting.

"The WIAA has been my home, my family and much of my life for the past 22 years, and I am grateful," Anderson said. "It has always been the people and purpose that has defined the quality of every work experience, and within this office and membership, there are no finer people to work with."

"I believe it is the right time because we have a great staff and a great Board of Control in place," he said. "Looking ahead at the challenges we know are going to be a part of coming out of this pandemic, I think it is a great opportunity for a new face, a new voice and new ideas moving forward."

The board will conduct a virtual meeting on December 10, to outline and determine the process for hiring a successor. Anderson, 67, assumed the role of executive director of the Association on August 1, 2009, following the retirement of Doug Chickering. He is just the fifth executive director since

the position was created in 1924.

"Dave has been an advocate for education-based sports and has always put kids first in every decision, and he has provided opportunities for them in a fair and consistent manner throughout his time at the WIAA," said board president Eric Russell. "We want to thank Dave and express our great gratitude for all his years of service. He has done an excellent job of running the WIAA, especially through this pandemic."

"Dave is very thorough and thoughtful about each of the issues that confronts this membership," he continued. "He has been diligent in exploring all the different angles before moving forward with any policies."

Under his leadership and guidance, the membership thrived during his 12-year tenure as executive director. He is credited with eliminating membership dues and fees, providing concussion insurance to every member school student-athlete and eliminating the football scenario of three games in 10 days, transitioning to five divisions in basketball and the relocating of the girls

basketball tournament to Green Bay, maintaining the association's ownership of streaming rights, implementing on-line State Tournament ticketing, advising on an improved conference realignment process, affirming the membership's sportsmanship principles, executing fiscal responsibility, and leading and navigating the association through the COVID-19 epidemic.

Anderson came to the WIAA in 1998 as an assistant to the director, and in 2002 he was named deputy director after having been promoted to assistant director a year earlier.

Prior to becoming the executive director, Anderson was responsible for student-athlete eligibility, officials licensing, interpretation of rules, tournament administration and planning, and committee leadership in the sports of football, baseball, wrestling, hockey and softball, as well as the medical advisory committee and wrestling's seven-percent committee.

In addition to his duties with the WIAA, Anderson has also been involved at the national level. He served on the National Federation of State High School Association's Hockey Rules Committee and was a voting member of the Federation's Football Rules Committee.

Prior to joining the WIAA, Anderson served as athletic director at Sun Prairie High School from 1991 until joining the WIAA. He has enjoyed a lengthy career in athletics. He began his career as a faculty member at D.C. Everest High

School in Schofield from 1976-1979. He also served as head track and field coach, assistant football coach and assistant basketball coach.

In 1979, he accepted a position as a graduate assistant at the University of Wisconsin and worked on the football coaching staff. In 1981, he joined the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire football staff and was an instructor in physical education. After one season, he accepted the position of defensive coordinator and part-time physical education instructor at Montana State University from 1982-1983.

He returned to the University of Wisconsin as an assistant football coach from 1983-1986 and served as the defensive coordinator in 1986. From 1987-1990, Anderson was the defensive coordinator at Miami of Ohio University.

Anderson graduated from UW in 1976 with a degree in physical education. He received a master of science degree in physical education with an emphasis in athletic administration from UW in 1981.

The WIAA, as defined by its Constitution, is a voluntary, unincorporated, and nonprofit organization. The membership oversees interscholastic athletic programs for 514 senior high schools and 48 junior high/middle level schools in its membership.

DNR Seeking Data On Water Quality Of Lakes, Streams And Rivers

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is seeking data on the water quality of lakes, streams and rivers in our state. Every two years, the DNR requests Wisconsinites and interested groups submit their biological, chemical and physical surface water data.

Along with department data, submitted data will be used to assess the quality of our state's water resources and pinpoint problem areas. In accordance with the Clean Water Act, the DNR uses these assessments to prepare a statewide Integrated Water Quality Report which includes an updated list of impaired waters.

Data will be accepted from December 7, 2020, through January 15, 2021.

The DNR is especially interested in data that:

- Documents improvement due to implementation of pollution control practices;
- Documents healthy waters;
- Supports planning for restoration or protection of water bodies;
- Identifies public health risks;
- Is from water bodies in the Fox River (Southeast) basin, or Grant, Platte, Sugar or Pecatonica River basins; and

•Could be used for water quality criteria development in addition to assessments.

Data must be submitted electronically, and the information must be submitted in specific Excel spreadsheet formats, along with quality assurance documentation.

Required elements include:

- A Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP);
- Data in the specified Excel spreadsheet format (template provided);
- Locational information in specified spreadsheet format (template provided); and
- General information about the submitter.

Templates and further

instructions are available on the Surface Water Public Participation webpage. Data received as PDF files or in other hard copy formats will not be accepted.

Guidance on minimum data requirements and how the DNR evaluates data is available in the draft 2022 Wisconsin Consolidated Assessment and Listing Methodology (WISCALM). This guidance is currently undergoing revisions for the 2022 reporting cycle, and the 2022 version is on the DNR website.

2021 State Park Admission Passes On Sale

Anyone looking for the perfect holiday gift for outdoor enthusiasts can purchase the new 2021 Wisconsin State Park admission sticker or trail pass just in time for the holidays.

The 2021 state park stickers and state trail passes are on sale now. Get ahead of the fun and give those looking to find an adventure access to some of the most scenic areas in Wisconsin, including thousands of miles of trails, dozens of beaches and a wide variety of outdoor recreation opportunities.

"We are excited to offer annual admission passes online this year in addition to at properties and on the phone," said Diane Brusoe, DNR fish, wildlife and parks deputy division administrator. "With winter quickly approaching, visitors can get their passes easier than ever and make the most of a year of outdoor recreation fun."

The 2021 stickers and passes for admission to parks, forests, recreation areas and trails are valid from the date of purchase through December 31, 2021. The vehicle admission stickers provide access to more than 60 state parks, forests and recreation areas across Wisconsin. The stickers are required on all motor vehicles visiting state parks and recreation areas. Some state forest and trail parking areas also require the sticker.

A state trail pass is required for all people age 16 or older biking, in-line skating, horseback riding, cross-country ski-

ing, or off-highway motorcycling on specific state trails. A state trail pass is not required for walking or hiking.

An admission sticker costs \$28 for Wisconsin residents or \$38 for non-residents. If there is more than one vehicle registered to the same household, additional state park stickers are available for \$15.50 for residents and \$20.50 for non-residents. A senior citizen annual sticker for \$13 is available for Wisconsin residents 65 years of age and older. Annual trail passes are \$25 for residents and non-residents.

Resident and non-resident annual admission stickers are available online, at state park facilities statewide and over the phone. State trail passes are available only at individual properties or over the phone.

Customers can purchase stickers over the phone by calling the DNR at 1-888-305-0398 between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., seven days a week, to place their order. Customers need to order stickers and passes online or over the phone by Friday, Dec. 11, to receive them before the holidays.

Help Shape Deer Management In Wisconsin

Wisconsinites have two upcoming opportunities to weigh in on deer hunting across the state. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will host virtual public meetings in each county to discuss deer management December 7-18.

Every three years, County Deer Advisory Councils (CDACs) provide recommendations to the DNR that help determine the herd size objective (increase, decrease, maintain) for their county. Councils are made up of a chair and alternate-chair, who are members of the Wisconsin Conservation Congress, and seven members of the public who represent various stakeholder groups.

CDACs provide the people of Wisconsin greater input into local deer management decisions and are important for shaping the next three years of deer hunting and management in the state.

The fall of 2020 marks the end of the last three-year cycle and meetings are being held this winter to determine the herd size objectives for the next three years (2021-2023). Councils develop their recommendations using two meetings separated by a public input period to provide transparency and multiple opportunities for public input.

During the preliminary

objective setting meetings December 7-18, Councils will meet via teleconference to review deer herd metrics and harvest data from the last three years and to provide a preliminary recommendation on the herd size objective for the next three years. The DNR will also share preliminary recommendations on deer management unit and zone boundaries.

Find out when meetings will be held for each county and how to listen in by visiting the CDAC Find page. Additional questions can also be sent via email to: DNR-CDACWebMail@wisconsin.gov. The meetings are open to all, and attendees are not required to submit a comment to attend.

The Washington County meeting will be held on Tuesday, Dec. 15, at 6:30 p.m. The call-in number is 855-947-8255 and the passcode is 311-45. The Sheboygan County meeting will be held on Thursday, Dec. 17, at 7 p.m. The call-in number is 888-582-3528 and the passcode is 9371-123. The Fond du Lac County meeting was held on Wednesday, Dec. 9.

Following the preliminary meetings, the DNR will hold an online public comment period on each county's management recommendations January 4-13, 2021. Each council will then

reconvene in late January to discuss the public input received and finalize their recommendations to the DNR. Final Council recommendations will be shared with the Natural Resources Board at their February meeting.

In addition to the CDAC meetings, the DNR hosted a virtual public meeting to gather public input on issues and concerns regarding the current white-tailed deer hunting season. This public input will be shared with the Deer Stakeholder Committee, convened by the DNR, to make recommendations for the deer hunting season.

The Deer Stakeholder Committee has been at work since early October 2020 to identify a deer hunting framework and potential programs to accomplish three objectives:

- to address concerns and areas of conflict expressed by the snowmobiling, forestry and agriculture communities;
- to provide deer hunting opportunities that are easy to understand and that will support hunter recruitment, retention and reactivation; and
- to provide the best available tools to achieve population objectives and reduce the prevalence of deer with Chronic Wasting Disease.

For all my local readers, I can't thank you enough for all the support you gave me and my family for the sudden loss of my father Donald "D.P." Peterson. The day after Thanksgiving I got a call from the emergency room at St. Agnes Hospital in Fond du Lac that my father had fallen in the check-out line at Festival Foods and was at the hospital in a critical state. By the time I arrived, the surgeons delivered the news I've dreaded my entire life — your dad has died.

He suffered a heart attack, we were shocked, stunned! My dad, who some of my buddies thought would live forever, was gone that instantly.

For readers who didn't know my dad, he was an athletic, sports, and fitness freak. He worked out at the YMCA every day, biked nearly 500 miles a summer — so he says — and played competitive softball into his 60s. How could this fit man who had rather little health problems, ate good, and exercised, die out of the blue?

My answer is the Lord wanted him and I should be very happy for the life he provided me, and the love he shared with my family. My dad was extremely close with all four of his children, I weigh in as the oldest at 58. My brother Brian is next in line at 55, my sister Michelle (Burns) just turned 53 on Sunday, and my little brother Darrin just hit the 50-year club.

There weren't many of our sporting events that he missed in his

life. The only thing that slowed him down was when Giddings & Lewis went on strike in the mid to late '70s. My dad worked at G & L in Fond du Lac as an electrician/wireman for 40 years.

A lot of locals might remember my dad out at Campbellsport High School refereeing a girls or boys basketball game. He was a WIAA basketball official for more than 40 years and refed many games in the Flyway with his partner Kenny Krueger, one of his childhood friends.

My dad didn't miss many Campbellsport wrestling matches in the past 30 years. He was always my little security blanket sitting in the crowd — always felt more confident when dad was in the gym.

He was such a proud grandpa when his two grandsons (Parker and Spencer) made it to the state wrestling tournament in the same year. Not to mention he always had a proud smile watching his granddaughters (Peyton and Lexi) battling it out at the Campbellsport-New Holstein soccer games. His latest prodigy is my sister's daughter Megan who is a star cross country runner for Appleton West High School.

Of course I'm sure some of you saw him around the area dancing up a storm. He loved to dance whenever there was live music. He would simply have a blast at the Campbellsport 4th of July celebration when the Doo-Wop Daddies would play at the bandstand.

At the Eden Fire-

men's picnic he loved doing some cha-cha or swing with his dance buddies Yvonne Buechel and Betty Rozek. The Monday Night music at Buttermilk Park in Fond du Lac was always on my dad's calendar. I'd get snapchats from the Costello's and St. Mary's of my dad putting on a dance clinic out on the dance floor.

Music was a very important part of his life that he passed down through his kids and grandkids. We always had Franki Valli and the Four Seasons blaring on the living room stereo when we were growing up. My dad was huge lover of Doo-Wop groups from the 1950s (mainly his childhood and teenage years). Some of his favorite groups were The Coasters, The Platters, The Drifters, and The Clovers. His all-time favorite song is the beautiful "Cara Mia" done by Jay and the Americans.

The last thing I'll mention about my dad is his humor. He always had a joke (or several) and he was quick to make one. He loved the humor of greats like George Carlin, Buddy Hackett, and Mel Brooks. He always had a jag trick he'd pull on the grandkids or a saying that would have all of us laughing our pants off! He had the uncanny ability to make a lot of different people laugh.

I will miss the smile of my dad every day, but nothing can ever take away all the great times we've shared in our life together. I'll sign off with his signature saying "Yo, D.P. here."

Snowmobilers: Time To Complete Required Safety Certificate Course

Wisconsin is the birthplace of snowmobiling and continues to offer some of the best snowmobiling opportunities you are likely to find, especially in northern Wisconsin.

More than 200,000 registered snowmobiles hit Wisconsin's 25,000 miles of groomed trails each winter, which means safety is an important part of the ride.

Fall is the ideal time to take the first step of preparing for the upcoming snowmobile season by completing the safety course. The safety course seeks to ensure snowmobilers of all ages are safe while they are

having fun on the trails. The course is required for operators born on or after January 1, 1985 and who are 12 years of age or older.

Snowmobile safety is critical. In 2019, 16 fatal snowmobiling accidents occurred, with the top contributing factors being speed and operator error.

The safety course costs \$10 and includes six hours of classroom instruction with two optional hours of hands-on instruction or a simulated ride. For those age 16 and older, the course may be completed online.
