Kewaskum Businesses To View Proposed Building

Representatives from the Zimmerman Architectural Studios will present a conceptual plan for a new Kewaskum Municipal Building and Library at the village's Shared Facilities Committee meeting on March 10.

The meeting is open to the public, and special invitations have been sent out to the business community. The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, March 10, in the Kewaskum Municipal Annex Building, 1308 Fond du Lac Ave.

Attendees will have an opportunity to view the lat-

est architectural drawing, which has a new two-story municipal building located where the Annex Building currently stands and extending across the northeast portion of the current municipal lot on Main Street in Kewaskum. If the village builds at that site, the plan is to raze both the Annex Building and the current municipal building, which is located at 204 First St. Part of the existing municipal parking lot would remain, and a second municipal parking lot would be added where the current municipal building stands.

Over the last several months, architects have re-

Traffic Problem At CMS/CHS Being Addressed

When traveling along Highway 67 in Campbellsport, you may think the road construction project has begun because of the large sign placed near Campbellsport Middle/High School. Though construction is scheduled to start later this month, this is not why the sign is there.

A problem that has come to light at Campbellsport Middle/High School is being addressed by the school district, the Campbellsport Police Department and the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Department.

Vehicles dropping off or picking up students were starting to back up along Highway 67 before and after school. This was creating a traffic problem and a safety concern so the three entities decided to work together to try to solve the problem.

"The school administrators and the police depart-

ment have noticed a problem and it seems to be getting worse with the pick up," said Police Chief Tom Dornbrook. "We have addressed the issue and hope that it helps. Last Friday we had two officers out there directing traffic and that seemed to help."

Dornbrook and Kieran Weed, Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department school resource officer, were out there directing traffic. They were also explaining to parents the proper way to drop off or pick up students.

Paul Amundson, school district administrator, explained the problem to the board of education.

"One of the issues, essentially, we had traffic backing up to the four-way stop in the mornings," Amundson said. "They were backing up and some people were dropping off right out on Highway 67. It was just a traffic mess, at both the drop off times and

DHS Announces Groups Eligible For COVID-19 Vaccine On March 1

People 65+, Teachers, And Child Care Workers Will Be Prioritized

The Department of Health Services (DHS) announced that new groups are now eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine. The newly eligible groups, initially announced in January, include in priority order: education and child care staff, people enrolled in Medicaid long-term care programs, some public-facing essential workers, non-frontline essential health care personnel, and facility staff and residents in congregate living settings.

While these groups were eligible on March 1, educators and child care providers should anticipate receiving vaccine in March and early April, and the remaining groups can plan to be vaccinated in April and May.

In recent weeks, the state's allocation of vaccine from the federal government has increased and was expected to further increase on March 1. This increase will initially be targeted to educators and child care providers.

Additionally, Wisconsin has vaccinated nearly 50 percent of residents 65 and older. Wisconsin continues to be one of the top states in the country for vaccine administration and opening up further eligibility will allow vaccinators to keep up the pace.

"Part of bouncing back from this pandemic means protecting all the educators and essential workers, many of whom have been putting their health at risk throughout this pandemic," said Governor Tony Evers. "With more than 1,281,903 doses of the vaccine already administered, we are working quickly to get more shots in arms as we have supply available. While our supply is still not enough for us to vaccinate at the rate we all want, we're going to keep working around the clock to get folks vaccinated as quickly as we can."

Due to the limited supply of vaccine doses, people 65 and older, educators, and child care workers

will be prioritized for the vaccine. Based on the current allocation numbers, it will take about two months to vaccinate these groups. Local and tribal health departments are coordinating local-specific plans to vaccinate K-12 education and child care staff. To vaccinate these priority groups, DHS will focus allocations each week on 65+ and educators to ensure both groups are getting vaccinated before moving on to other newly eligible populations.

"Everyone included in these newly eligible groups will eventually have the opportunity to get vaccinated, but we are asking everyone to practice patience and wait to schedule an appointment in order to allow those at higher risk to get vaccinated first," said DHS interim secretary Karen Timberlake. "Workers who are more likely to come in contact with the public or who are unable to avoid close contact with others are at higher risk of contracting and spreading COVID-19."

Groups eligible March 1 were recommended for the vaccine based on relative vulnerability and risk of exposure to COVID-19. This will add more than 700,000 people to the number able to get vaccinated. In recent weeks, Wisconsin's allocation has increased to approximately 90,000 doses weekly.

Beginning on February 23, Walgreens began receiving 36,000 first doses each week for the Federal Retail Pharmacy Program, which is up from the 18,000 allocation in previous weeks. There are multiple options for vaccinations, including community clinics, local and tribal health departments, health care providers, and pharmacies. Those eligible for vaccine should visit our eligibility page to learn more about their options.

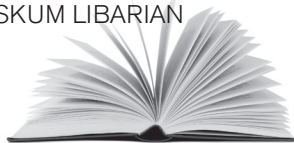

When I first started here as Library Director, I was told that there was a building project in mind, but it had been delayed for some time. Within a few months, a committee was formed to discuss the municipal building project made up of Village staff and Library and Village trustees.

One of our first tasks was hiring an architectural firm, which we successfully did. Then we spent some time looking at plans that involved three different scenarios. Out of the three, it was decided to recommend moving the municipal building to the annex site and part of the adjacent Village's parking lot.

That decision took a lot of thought and multiple discussions. It involved looking at numerous plans with the costs clearly outlined. The architectural group, Zimmerman Architectural Studios, Inc submitted a very comprehensive analysis. This analysis defined the costs of maintaining and renovating the existing building, demolishing the site we are on and building new on it or moving to a new location.

With the state of the present location and its aging infrastructure, the committee determined that is it fiscally responsible to the Village to build new. There are also substantial savings to keep the departments of the Village Administration, Library and Police Department in one building sharing the facilities.

The committee met regularly until Covid hit and have resumed meeting for several months now. All our meetings are open to the public and posted as legally required. Input from the public is always welcome and does influence decisions the committee makes. For instance, at one of our meetings, business owners expressed concern about a potential loss of parking spots. What ensued from that discussion was a parking study and a redesign of the municipal building to take up less of a footprint. So, feedback is always appreciated and definitely listened to.

I have never been involved in a building project for a library before, but one thing I have learned is to be open to compromise. My idea of a new library includes plenty of room for programs, independent and group study, and a comfortable place to just sit and read. I think that is an achievable goal. I envision, in-person story times, where children will not need to crowd upon each other to see the story being read. I see an open space for people to gather and talk books, promoting life-long learning. I know those concepts are realistic and I look forward to the day the plans come to life.

I would like to know what your visions are for a new municipal building with the library. You can stop in and let me know. Or better yet, come to one of the Shared Facilities Committee meetings. Our next one is Wednesday, March 10, at 7 p.m. in the Annex. Come to the meeting, meet the architects, take a look at potential plans and let us know what you think.

vised the plan in order to address business owners' concerns about the potential loss of parking stalls.

"We invited the business community to come and see some of the developments in terms of plans for a new municipal building on a portion of the municipal parking lot. It does impact some of the parking spaces, but significantly less than what a previous plan showed. We worked very hard to accommodate some of the business community concerns. This will be an opportunity to take a look at that," Village Trustee Dave Spenner said at the village board meeting on Monday, March 1.

The village currently has 112 stalls in the existing municipal lot. Under the proposed plan, the village would have 83 stalls in that location, plus 72 stalls in the new lot on First Street, for a net gain of 43 stalls over what currently exists.

At the meeting, a conceptual drawing the proposed new building will be presented.

"This is just kind of a footprint of the building. You are not going to be able to see the interior walls or look at how they are configured, but generally will see the square footage," Spenner said.

The proposed new two-story building has 21,590 square feet. The library, lobby and police department would be located on the first level, and the village administration and a community room would be situated on the second floor. The plan has an estimated price tag of \$8,570,416.

COVID-19 Vaccine Update: Information on Phase 1B Groups Eligible beginning March 1

According to the Fond du Lac County Health Department, on March 1st additional groups (listed below in priority order) became eligible for COVID-19 vaccination across the state. While these groups are now eligible for vaccine, due to the limited supply of vaccine doses, individuals age 65+, educators, and child care workers will be prioritized for the vaccine. Educators and child care providers should anticipate receiving vaccine in March and early April, and the remaining groups can anticipate to be vaccinated in April and May.

The newly eligible groups, in priority order, include:

- Educators and child care (Priority Group)
- Individuals enrolled in Medicaid long-term care programs
- Some public-facing essential workers
- Non-frontline essential health care personnel
- Congregate living facility staff and residents

Educator And Child Care Priority Focus

Starting March 1, Fond du Lac County Health Department will be focusing vaccination efforts on next eligible groups in priority order, starting with educators and child care. The health department has been in contact with organizations and schools who are eligible within this group.

If you are employed by an entity within this group, please look to your employer to share vaccination information when available. If your organization has not been reached out to by the health department, please contact us at 920-929-3085 Ext 4.

Remaining Eligible Phase 1B Groups

For the other newly eligible groups, the health department is collecting preliminary information through an interest form from Fond du Lac County

organizations that employ staff who fit into these groups and individuals enrolled in Medicaid long-term care programs. If you believe your organization has employees who fall into these groups, please designate one person from your agency to fill out the form.

When it is time for your group to be vaccinated, the health department will contact you or your organization with next steps to register for public health vaccination clinics. The interest form does not guarantee a vaccine appointment. Phase 1b interest form link: <https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/MZSPYJZphase1interest>.

Fond du Lac County Health Department and community partners are committed to vaccinating all current and future eligible groups as safely and efficiently as possible. However, it will take time to vaccinate all of the eligible groups to date as the vaccine supply remains limited.

Wisconsin Department Of Health Services Launches COVID-19 Vaccine Provider Map

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) released a new resource aimed at helping people connect with vaccine providers. The Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccine provider map is designed to improve transparency in the vaccine distribution process, by identifying where vaccine is being sent across the state. It is also intended to help Wisconsinites more easily find and connect with vaccine providers in their area.

“Wisconsin continues to make great strides in vaccinating people all across the state,” said DHS interim secretary Karen Timberlake. “We want to provide as many options as possible for people who are currently eligible to access COVID-19 vaccine. This map will help to illustrate those options.”

The map displays COVID-19 vaccine providers and community-based vaccination clinics that are actively vaccinating in Wisconsin. Vaccine sites are coded by shape and color to indicate whether they are open to all eligible populations, only open to specific eligible groups, or targeting their own clients or patients.

Users can select a site from the map to find contact information and populations served by each location, or consult the table underneath. At this time, DHS plans to update the map every two weeks with data reported by vaccine providers. Therefore, depending on timing, it is possible that vaccine providers may have already administered or scheduled

out their remaining doses.

All sites shown on the map require pre-scheduled appointments, and availability is not guaranteed. Wisconsinites can visit the DHS COVID-19 vaccination page for more information about options.

In just over two months, Wisconsin vaccine providers have administered more than 1.3 million doses of COVID-19 vaccine and more than half of Wisconsinites age 65 and older have received at least one dose. Vaccine eligibility is slated to open up on March 1 to next groups, including education and child care workers, people enrolled in Medicaid long-term care programs, some public-facing essential workers, non-frontline essential health care personnel, and facility staff and

residents in congregate living settings.

It will take many months to vaccinate all Wisconsinites, and it is important to double-down on ways to stop the spread as we continue rolling out the vaccine. COVID-19 vaccines are, and will be, an important tool in controlling the pandemic. Masking up, staying physically distant, washing hands, and getting tested continue to be crucial tools for protecting ourselves and our communities against COVID-19.

Envision Greater Fond du Lac Partners With Fond du Lac County To Administer Survey Of Internet Access And Service

Envision Greater Fond du Lac is partnering with Fond du Lac County to complete a county-wide survey assessment of broadband internet access and service. All residents are encouraged to complete the short survey detailing their home internet capabilities.

Broadband internet access became more important than ever during 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic. It became the primary delivery method of education and business connections, and many healthcare providers quickly adapted to provide services via telehealth.

However, this also highlighted the inequity of internet access across our county and quickly made finding a solution a greater priority. In 2020, Fond du Lac County and Envision Greater Fond du Lac formed a taskforce to participate in the Broadband Connectors Pilot by the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC).

This pilot program provided technical assistance to help the county become better prepared to apply for broadband expansion grants. Fond du Lac County was one of only six communities selected to participate in the program.

“Based on our best current estimates,

we think that 11 percent of county residents do not have internet access at home, whether that be due to a lack of availability or because it is cost-prohibitive,” James Cleveland, vice president of economic development at Envision Greater Fond du Lac, said. “Taking steps to improve internet access for residents will elevate the quality of life and create a more equitable county for all.”

Completing the survey assessment is only the first step toward the goal of making internet access available to all residents. Following the survey, the data must be mapped and analyzed before working together with internet providers to apply for and secure grant funding to implement internet upgrades and service expansion. Once the residential survey is completed for households, the taskforce will move on to conducting a separate internet access survey for county businesses.

A classroom will be located in the building. In addition, the company plans to launch different products from the new training facility. It also is where research and development will take place.

Fleischman said that the company plans to make cosmetic changes to the building, which at one time housed a gas station.

“We will redo the exterior and the interior of the building just to freshen it up. It has a great shell,” Fleischman said.

The addition of the two Cambellsport buildings reflects the company’s growth.

“We try to expand about 20 percent every year. We want to provide a lot of opportunity for our people; a lot of people are looking to grow in their careers that they have with us,” Fleischman said. “We believe if a tree isn’t growing, it is dying. Growth causes lots of change, and changes can be good for organizations.”

What Can You Do?

Not only does Drexel want to provide for its employees, but it wants to care for the people in its communities.

“Our mission is to ‘Supply. Happiness.’ We really try to live our mission every day. We try to help whoever needs help,” Fleischman said.

Fleischman also relies heavily on his faith. A parishioner of Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Kewaskum, he has a favorite Bible quote that speaks to him: “Much will be required of the person entrusted with much.” (Luke 12:48)

“We have been very blessed at Drexel with opportunities. But with much that has been given, much is required. So, we feel that we have a responsibility to give back to our communities,” Fleischman said.

Because of that philosophy, Drexel has made numerous donations. For example, Drexel made a substantial donation last fall for a new homeless shelter in Fond du Lac.

Fleischman was inspired to help after reading an article in The Cambellsport News about homelessness. Then, when his sister Laura Fleischman reached about the need for a shelter in Fond du Lac, he knew what to do. Drexel became the cornerstone sponsor of a homeless shelter in Fond du Lac.

The name of the shelter, St. Katharine Drexel Shelter, is fitting.

“Obviously there is the name association with Drexel. But then when you look into the life of St. Katharine Drexel, it brings you very much back to that Bible quote,” Fleischman said.

St. Katharine Drexel was born in 1858 to one of Philadelphia’s wealthiest families.

“She literally went around the country as a young child because she was from an affluent family and saw a lot of homelessness and a lot of poor people, and a lot of problems,” Fleischman said.

According to the story, when St. Katharine Drexel had the opportunity to meet the pope, she asked him: “What is the Catholic Church going to do about

all these problems?”

Pope Leo VIII answered, “What are you going to do about it?”

St. Katharine Drexel left that meeting and became a nun. She used her inheritance to work for justice among the poor and oppressed. She built missions and schools, and is known for her work to help Native Americans and African Americans.

“She dedicated her life to God and helping people. What a wonderful thing,” Fleischman said.

St. Katharine Drexel Shelter

The St. Katharine Drexel Shelter is a project led by the Solutions Center Inc. (SCI) and St. Vincent de Paul of Fond du Lac County (SVdP). The shelter will be built on SVdP property located at 330 N. Peters Ave. in Fond du Lac.

The estimated \$5.5 million investment will create more than 20,000 square feet to serve the homeless population of Fond du Lac county. The shelter will provide safety, security and a path to home for the estimated 150 people, singles and families, who experience homelessness in Fond du Lac County on any given day.

The one-story year-round shelter is the first of its kind in Fond du Lac County. The shelter, which is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2021, will house up to 15 families in the Family Shelter, and up to 12 women and 24 men in the Singles Shelter.

The St. Katharine Drexel Shelter will offer comfortable, home-like spaces: kitchens, dining

rooms, technology, teen and youth space, and an outdoor playground. Resource centers will be located on the lower level for community resources to provide residents with things such as employment assistance, advocacy, counseling and housing searches.

“The partnership between SVdP and the SCI, along with the initial business community support, has been amazing” stated Amy Loof, director of homeless services for the Solutions Center, Inc. “This new shelter allows us to continue the work we are already doing on an even greater level. There are over 30 families on our wait list currently, and every day more are

calling. This new shelter gives us the foundation to not just provide more bedrooms and safe spaces, but also the programming needed to work towards the ultimate goal of permanent housing.”

The new shelter will be the first brick-and-mortar facility collaboration between SVdP and SCI. It represents the long-term partnership that will continue between the two agencies in order to help clients become self-sufficient and able to secure permanent housing. Almost 20 other local agency partners are part of the local collaboration that strives to meet the needs of this population within Fond du Lac County.

Also critical to the success of this project are the many businesses in the area that have stepped up to commit to this need.

“We made a combined commitment to the community to provide safe and structured emergency shelter for singles and families experiencing homelessness and we are cementing this through the new shelter collaboration.” Loof said. “SVdP and SCI, along with the 20-plus other local agencies is an example of the power of collaboration that can serve the greater good of the entire county.”

An expanded “Home Starts Here” community campaign is scheduled to kick off this spring.

the pick up times. What we're doing now is before school we lock those doors (door A near the high school office) and move all the traffic to doors B and C. Just to be able to move cars up and off the street."

Amundson explained that you also had a problem with cars being able to exit the parking lots. Traffic was also backed up going to the west, so anyone trying to turn east out of the school parking lot could not because of the traffic.

He also told board members that they may look into making the driveway in front of the school a one-way during drop off and pick up times. Amundson has been working with Dornbrook and Weed to find a solution.

One thing they are trying on a temporary basis is the road sign. It is located on Highway 67 just west of the intersection of Highways 67 and V. The sign tells motorists they are not allowed to stop along Highway 67.

In addition, the school district send a letter home to parents explaining the problem and how parents should be dropping students off at the school. It states that Door A will now be closed right before and after school so student need to enter by

Doors B and C. It also tells parents that the police department will issue tickets to anyone who stops along Highway 67.

Dornbrook and Weed will also continue to direct traffic for a short time to help motorists learn the proper procedures for dropping off and picking up students at the school.

"Eventually it will be up to the drivers of vehicles to obey the new rules so that we can minimize the risk to students, crossing guards, and others," Dornbrook said.

Amundson told board members, "We are training the students and parents and whoever is dropping them off."

The Kewaskum Village Board approved a new village logo on Monday, March 1.

The new logo features an arrowhead and feathers, and contains the village's slogan: "Gateway to the Kettle Moraine."

The logo is a modification the village's 125th anniversary logo. That logo was designed by Jennifer Sterr, who won a logo contest that was run by the Kewaskum 125th Anniversary Founder's Day Celebration Committee.

The arrowhead and feathers are a subtle nod to Chief Kewaskum, a Potawatomi chief after whom the village was named. The feathers are white and "Kewaskum green."

The slogan "Gateway to the Kettle Moraine" was created by the Kewaskum Businessmen's Association in 1941.

The Village of Kewaskum was incorporated in 1895. The 125th anniversary logo was revealed in January 2019. Shortly after that, the village board began discussing the village's need for new branding.

For its letterhead, the village previously used a line drawing of Kewaskum's welcome sign on Highway 45 that says, "Welcome to Kewaskum, Gateway to the Kettle Moraine State Forest, Fishing, Hunting, Swimming, Hiking."

- The village board voted on February 15

to cease work on a proposed community garden.

- The village board requested on March 1 that Village Administrator Matt Heiser check with other municipalities that are considering ending contracts with Advanced Disposal.

- The village board voted on March 1 to renew an agreement with the Mid-Moraine Municipal Court.

- The village board scheduled a residency due process hearing for Village Trustee Sarah Severance, to be held on Monday, April 12.

Wisconsin Students Outperform National Average On AP Exams

Public school graduates in Wisconsin once again performed above the national average on Advanced Placement exams while in high school, a report showed.

The College Board's national report showed 26 percent of Wisconsin's Class of 2020 scored a three or higher

on a five-point scale on AP exams during high school. The report ranks Wisconsin 11th among all states in that category, with 24.4 percent being the national average.

While Wisconsin Class of 2020 data indicated a slight decrease from the previous year of students scoring

a three or higher on AP exams (26.2 percent), it represents a growth of 8.1 percentage points from the Class of 2010 (17.9 percent). Of the 68,956 AP exams taken by the Class of 2020, psychology (8,921), English language and composition (7,781), and United States history (5,937) accounted for the top

three subjects.

In total, Wisconsin public and private high school students earned 51,793 AP qualifying scores of three, four, or five in 2020. These scores translate into 155,379 potential college credits, a potential tuition and fee savings of \$47,235,216.

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Campbellsport Board Of Education Approves 2021-2022 Calendar

After some discussion, members of the Campbellsport Board of Education approved the 2021-2022 district calendar.

The original calendar given to the board was rejected on a 5-2 vote. This calendar had students starting school on Wednesday, Sept. 1, and finishing on Thursday, June 2.

Board members didn't like the fact that students would come back for three days after Memorial Day. They wanted to see the students complete their last day on Friday, May 27, right before the Memorial Day weekend begins.

"Your coming back after the Memorial Day holiday for three days. How much is really getting done on those days," asked Mike Weiss. "I can't see why we can't find three days where we can get the kids out. Are we listening to our constituents?"

District administrator Paul Amundson stated that he worked with school personnel to come up with the calendar. He also stated that currently the district has

enough instructional hours in the year to meet the state mandate with about seven-and-a-half extra days. This gives the district days that can be missed because of weather or other things without the need to make those days up.

"We asked the staff," Amundson said. "We asked them specifically if they would rather be done before Memorial Day or spread those days out throughout the year and they wanted them throughout the year. We talked with the staff and we worked in the number days for professional development. I value the teachers input but this is your decision. It (extra days) allows us a cushion."

Weiss said, "I appreciate the staff's input in all this, but let's not forget about the parents input too."

Board members decided to find a way to add three days during the school year and get out of school before Memorial Day. They decided to shorten the Easter break by one day, took away one vacation day from mid-January and will absorb the third day with those extra hours.

This then gives the students a final day of school on Friday, May 27. They will still start the school year on Wednesday, Sept. 1. The new calendar was approved on a 6-1 vote.

It was announced at the board meeting the senior Joseph Krahn has earned a Herb Kohl Student Excellence Scholarship.

At the February 15 board meeting, it had been announced that Krahn is also the valedictorian for the Class of 2021. Alexis Feucht is the salutatorian.

2020/2021 School Year

Heidi Retzer, parent and high school teacher, reported to the board about how things have gone this school year. At a previous board meeting, some board members stated they would love to know how school was going after sending the high school students back full-time.

"I would like to share some of my experiences," Retzer said. "Of my six classes, I have four that have live-stream students. We cannot continually get them to engage. When I project videos, they really have a hard time seeing and hearing those. I have found it is very

difficult to meet all of the individual needs. It is hard to manage."

She explained that not only is she teaching all of her in-person classes, but she has to work with the online students as well. Retzer explained that she visits those learning virtually on a regular basis to deliver hard copies of some of the assignments.

"I am not complaining," she said. "I just want to mention this for looking forward. My frustrations are very similar to social studies or math (Retzer teaches many at-risk students). The number of kids we have struggling are so much more than in the past.

"I have found out of my 28 years in teaching here, that this has been the mostly difficult and taxing in trying to meet students' needs. I don't feel that I am able to do a good job at either one because I feel like I am splitting my time. Some days I don't feel that I am meeting anyone's needs."

Amundson added, "There are always days that don't go well but the frequency of those days this year seem to be multiplied. And our staff is excellent. They feel that frustration that they are not meeting those needs."

Board members questioned Retzer and Steph Waldschmidt about how their own children, who are students in the district, are doing this school year.

Retzer explained that her son is a good student and has done well in the virtual learning. He would have some frustrations with his advanced classes like chemistry and math. Retzer was quick to point out that most high school students have struggled in virtual learning with those types of classes that are more hands-on and in-person learning.

Waldschmidt stated that she has one child who loves the virtual learning and excels at it. Another child prefers in-person learning and really doesn't like the virtual learning.

"I feel that if the kids are engaged and we can get them to talk, then it is a very different experience," Waldschmidt said. "I feel that if we can't laugh through this, we won't get through this. We are in one shaky boat and just been dumping water out. I've been super impressed."

Amundson stated that this what he is seeing across the district this year. Some students are doing very well in the virtual learning model and others have done much better with the in-person learning.

All in attendance agreed that they are hoping to get back to a normal model of education in the next school year.

Sturgeon Spearing Ends After Good Season

Sunday, Feb. 28, marked the final day of the 2021 sturgeon spearing season. It was a unique year with good water clarity and solid ice throughout the entire season. The DNR heard numerous stories from around the system, including first-timers, good family time and some giant sturgeon.

Across the system this season, 291 juvenile females, 737 adult females, and 803 males were harvested for a total of 1,831 fish.

The Lake Winnebago harvest accounted for 1,467 fish consisting of 249 juvenile females, 660 adult females, and 558 males. This year's Lake Winnebago harvest was the highest since the 2015 season.

This season lasted the entire 16 days, though it did come close to reaching the 90 percent triggers. This year's Lake

Winnebago harvest was driven by the favorable water clarity around portions of the lake as spearers fishing zones one, two and three reported they could see the bottom in most areas.

The final day's harvest showed 50 fish harvested on Lake Winnebago. Many spearers had already pulled their shacks for the season resulting in minimal spearing effort around the lake during the final day. This year, Stockbridge Harbor led all registration stations recording 303 fish. It was closely followed by Harrison Town Hall, which registered 290 fish.

Overall this season, 77 harvested fish weighed over 100 pounds, making up 4.2 percent of the total system-wide harvest. The percentage of fish weighing over 100 pounds in the 2021 harvest is similar to

the 2019 and 2020 harvests. Over the past few seasons, the fish have been generally leaner, likely due to a diet consisting of more red worms than shad in recent years.

Hold Yourself Accountable

Officiating is a Great Way to Give Back and Stay in the Game

We have wound down the winter season for high school athletics in Wisconsin. I cannot help but think about all of the people who have made the events happen, multiple times a week, at schools all over the state. Without the scorekeepers, scoreboard operators, announcers, ticket takers, and chaperones, we would not be able to run our athletic contests, but the ones who do not receive the credit they deserve are the officials.

I started officiating while I was in college. Iowa had summer baseball and softball for high school athletics, so I was able to do that in the evenings to make some extra money. I also got involved in officiating intramural sports at The University of Iowa — basketball, football, and softball. It was fun and helped line my pockets with some spending cash.

I took a break from officiating when I was coaching and being the athletic director, but I have since renewed my licenses in basketball, baseball, and softball. Why? Well, for one thing, there is a need! A big need! Many of our officials are getting up there in age and we do not have enough younger officials coming in to keep pace with those who are retiring or backing off on their schedules.

On top of helping fill a need, officiating is a great way to stay tied to sports — whether you are officiating at the youth, middle school, high school, or even higher levels. It is a great way to get exercise. It can be enjoyable. The money is good. There is an investment in equipment (depending on the sport) and uniforms. You have to license with the WIAA and take a rules test. The

process to get started is NOT difficult. You do have to be a "student" of the game to be well versed enough in the rules to do a good job.

I will be very honest with you. There is a negative side of officiating. Poor sportsmanship from spectators, athletes, and coaches. Unfortunately, that area has gotten worse over time — to the point that we currently have legislation possible at the State Capitol to make stricter consequences for those who harass or assault an official.

While we require our coaches to take a rules test, I often feel that coaches should also have to do some officiating — even if it is not the sport in which they coach. I also think it would be beneficial for spectators and athletes to take a rules test, so they gain a greater appreciation for the information officials need to know — as well as exercising judgement and communicating well with all involved. On the plus side — unsportsmanlike behavior is a small portion of what we deal with.

There are openings at ALL levels — from youth sports on up. Personally, I spend most of my time officiating youth, middle school, and non-varsity high school sports. It IS fun!

My last reason to encourage people to get involved in officiating is to give back. If you took part in sports growing up, it is a great way to stay engaged in sports and help those who are currently playing, just as someone helped by officiating when you were playing.

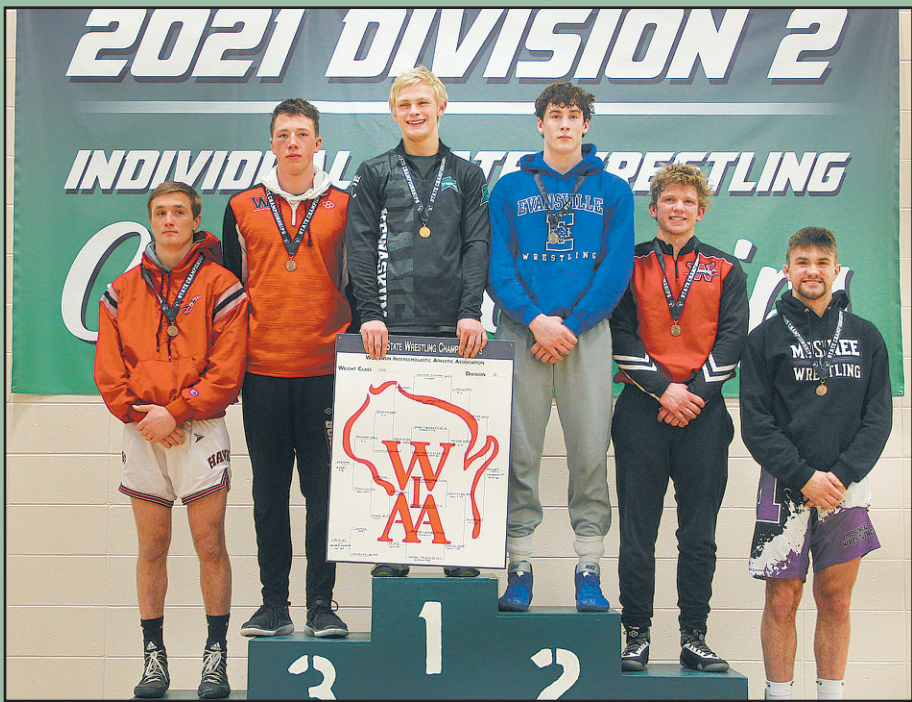

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing or online at MyVote.wi.gov.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter or you may apply for an absentee ballot online at MyVote.wi.gov. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make an application for an absentee ballot by mail, by fax, by email, in person or at MyVote.wi.gov.

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:

5:00 pm on Thursday, April 1, 2021.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. 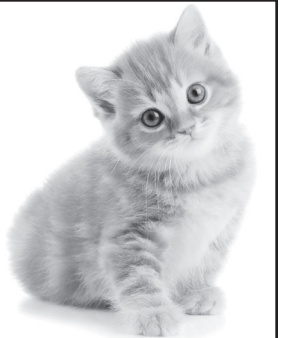
Making Lemonade Out Of Lemons: Fond du Lac Area Lemonade Day To Offer Drive-Thru Experience For Students

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UW Health Offers Strategies For Managing Psychological Impact Of COVID-19

COVID-19 often takes a toll on the mind as well as the body, especially for those long-haulers who experience lingering symptoms of the disease. One study out of the University of Oxford found that in patients with no previous psychiatric history, a diagnosis of COVID-19 was associated with an increased incidence of developing a first psychiatric diagnosis in the following 14 to 90 days after contracting the virus.

The most prevalent psychological conditions reported were anxiety disorders, insomnia, and dementia. Issues with fatigue, sleeping difficulties and cognitive difficulties (brain fog, memory issues and difficulty concentrating) were also common.

“When COVID-19 symptoms continue to linger, people can start feeling anxious or depressed because they begin to worry that consequences of the disease will never go away,” says Shilagh Mirgain, distinguished health psychologist at UW Health. “This not only highlights the need for psychological treatment and coping strategies that address the mental health toll of COVID-19 but

also underscores the need for a public health response that acknowledges and addresses the pandemic’s mental health consequences.”

Mirgain says the disruption to people’s social, work, and exercise routines (as well as the limited access to typical coping strategies) are often worse for long-haulers, but even those with mild cases of COVID-19 may have lingering symptoms that can make it feel like the disease has upended their life.

Here are some strategies that Mirgain says can help us more effectively manage the psychological impact of a COVID-19 diagnosis and improve our quality of life:

•Develop a tolerance for uncertainty: Focus on what you can control. Practice mindfulness to live in the moment and let go of stress and anxiety, be kind to yourself during the difficult moments, and recognize that others are going through similar things and that you are not alone.

•Pace Your Level of Activity: Take breaks, be aware of how much energy you have and create a strategy for

how you approach your activities. Prioritize using your energy and time for those things that are most important. Allow others to step in to lighten the load.

•Grieve the losses: Take time to grieve the losses of the pandemic and the changes that a COVID-19 diagnosis brought. Know that you can create a new normal and move forward.

•Meaning and purpose (MAP): Making meaning and cultivating purpose involves taking action in ways that feel more authentic and true to one’s inner self and one’s unique path in life. Ask yourself: what do I want to be about in the face of this difficulty?

•Strengthen your support: Stay connected to your support team, consider joining a COVID-19 recovery group, let people know what kind of support would be helpful to you. Set boundaries around what is not helpful to you and speak up about what you need. Seek professional care by talking with your physician about your experience and setting up an appointment with a behavioral health specialist.

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
