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Remembering A Railroad Man

Yanke, who passed away on November 25, 2019, lived in Kewaskum from 1994 to 2013 before moving to Jackson. He worked on the Chicago and North Western Railroad for 42 years.

A railroad historian and photographer, Yanke wrote the book "The Chicago & North Western's Air Line Subdivision" in 2009. The book outlines the history of the railroad that went through Kewaskum, which is

now known as the Eisenbahn State Trail. Yanke also provided historical information about the railroad for the kiosk that stands in the municipal parking lot in Kewaskum near the Eisenbahn State Trail.

On May 8, about 40 people gathered around the bench for a dedication ceremony, as family members and friends recalled how Yanke had contributed to the railroad and the Kewaskum community.

Wisconsin State Park System Increases Outdoor Capacities

With summer right around the corner, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced that outdoor capacities for events, activities and outdoor facilities such as group campgrounds, open-air shelters and amphitheaters is increasing at properties across the State Park System.

The following changes are effective immediately:

- Volunteer group sizes can increase to 350 people outdoors with small working groups of 50 or less
- DNR-led and co-sponsored events such as naturalist activities, education programs, Friends hikes and candlelight events are now permitted for up to 350 people as long as events are outdoors
- Outdoor-only concession activities can increase to 350 people
- Outdoor group campsites will increase to maximum capacity or 350, whichever is less
- Open air shelters and amphitheaters will increase to maximum capacity or 350, whichever is less
- Special event group sizes will increase to 350
- Commercial-use application group sizes will increase to 350

While enjoying Wisconsin's state parks and other properties, visitors are expected to practice social distancing and follow the latest CDC guidelines.

Services and facilities open and available to the public include camping, bathroom facilities, dump/waste station facilities, accessible cabins, drive-up window service, concessions and firewood and open-air shelters/amphitheaters.

All other DNR facilities remain closed to the public, including nature centers, indoor group camps and headquarters. Annual park admission passes can be purchased online, over the phone by calling local properties directly, through open drive-up windows or at properties via self-registration stations.

Additionally, capacity closures may be in place at some properties this summer to promote social distancing and to help provide a safe and enjoyable experience for visitors. Visitors are encouraged to check out their favorite properties during the week, early in the morning or later in the afternoons or to visit a property that is new to them.

Eisenbahn State Trail Bridge Repaired



There is new decking on the bridge located on the Eisenbahn State Trail south of Old Fond du Lac Road in the Village of Kewaskum.

The bridge surface was deteriorating, so the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy submitted a funding request to West Bend Mutual Insurance Company's Charitable Fund for this project. The grant was approved, and the Washington County Parks Department used the funds to purchase building materials from Kettle Moraine Hardwoods.

This resulted in a need for manpower, so the Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs snowmobile club was very happy to lend a hand to help install the new surface. On Saturday, April 17, a crew of nine club members and three Washington County Park staff started to work on the job. Club members brought along their favorite cordless drills, and the county provided generators trucks, trailers and lots of screws.

The best guess was 5,570 screws were installed. The job of screwing down the planks did not get done in one day, so five club members came back the following Monday to finished screwing down the deck.

This bridge is #1701 B on the multiuse Eisenbahn State Trail, a former rail bed that is now used as a Washington County Trail system. Noon lunch was provided by Dave Goeden, of Goeden's Auto Body of St. Michaels (Kewaskum), which was really appreciated by the workers.

The Eisenbahn State Trail is part of the Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs snowmobile trail system.

loves hanging out with all the other firefighters and enjoys the camaraderie.

But Fechter says that isn't the only reason he still hangs around the department.

"He comes for the aggravation we give him," Fechter joked. "He comes down and everyone harasses him, and he harasses everybody back."

The firefighters are well known for playing jokes on one another. And there is no one they like playing a practical joke on better than on Enright. Over the years, they have even gotten the newspaper involved. The firefighters have done things like submitting comics comparing Enright to "Family Guy" and a picture of Enright seeing the first robin of the spring, even though the "robin" was actually a squirrel.

But Enright takes all the antics in stride...and gets the other firefighters back with jokes of his own.

"He's hilarious to have at the fire department because he always has a quick-witted comment about someone. He is a great friend to everybody down here," Fechter said.

The Boltonville Fire Department is an all-volunteer organization, including the fire chief position.

Actually, there is a fee to be a volunteer firefighter. It costs \$2 each year to volunteer. The dues are waived for anyone age 55 and older.

"It is worth it; it is so much fun. Everybody is trying to get one up on everyone else. You are constantly laughing," Fechter said. "But everyone really steps up and gets done what they need to get done."

Over the years, firefighters from other departments have gotten to know Enright and his dedication to the Boltonville Fire Department. And they appreciate his sense of humor.

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What Was Lost (14): A Postcard

The key to preserving our local history rests in the wisdom of all to keep images of the area, no matter if they can be defined in the present. Not knowing what to do with a puzzle piece is not a legitimate excuse to toss it. Here is an example of one of those pieces worth keeping.

A Message Berg To Berg

The postcard is “Scene at Ashford” and numbered 2342. It was faintly postmarked Campbellsport in late September, 1914, and mailed to a Mr. Raymond Berg of Edgar, Wisconsin. There is also a reference to a Martin Berg underneath Raymond’s name, perhaps an indication if it was returned-to-sender in Ashford, or another family member in Edgar.

The message is choppy. Punctuation was not as important as the pertinence of the message. Postcards in the early 1900s allowed a loved one to briefly know what was going on, if they were coming to town, or when they were headed back.

This is the message on the Ashford card (no corrections follow): “Hello Raymond, how are you all, we are at Aunt Len’s today are you through with cementing the barn. spouse Pa will soon start cutting corn the weather is very nice down here. we’ll go and see Mrs. Joe Berg this afternoon and intend to go to Grandpa tomorrow and then we will go to Aunt Flora. have not been there yet. did you pick the pickles already? How is Pa and Oscar [?] will come home next week ma.”

I wish more could be said about the message and the Bergs. Little information at the time of publication was found. Joseph Berg (1867-1949) is buried at St. Martin’s cemetery, and the 1910 plat map labels 120 acres that are likely his west of the hamlet of Ashford, but on the north side of today’s Highway 67. Mr. Berg’s farmhouse was less than a mile west from the Janous Blacksmith shop.

Historical Value

On the flip side of the postcard, the photo is odd and provides information that is pertinent to others than the Berg family. The picture is of an unnatural incline of three or four feet above a possible pond or river, surrounded by flat land dominating the picture’s foreground. This small hill seems unlikely to be a glacier feature in the Kettle Moraine, and yet it is in a township which today has Drumlin Drive which honors glacial remnants.

On the face of it, it is just a landscape scene with some fence lines in the background, and what is possibly the Milwaukee River. Upon further inspection, it appears it is a significant verification of Native American sites in Ashford. The following are considerations why.

(1) It is a Native American mound. Compared to the topography in the surrounding 100 yards, the incline is unconventional. Native American mounds require time and attention to construct. Such a small hill surrounded by flat land seems naturally unlikely given the shapes and curves throughout the area.

In addition, land by rivers form a



This picture rolls along a beautiful site. Is this why the photographer stopped to take her? Value is hard to place on anything. “As is” written on the back, this postcard was \$3.90 by the time it was signed, sealed and delivered via eBay in 2020. Perhaps the low price was an acknowledgment of the postcard’s problems. It’s just a nature picture, and the exact location is a mystery. Physically speaking of the postcard, the stamp fell off the back and some collectors want all the message, postmark and stamp intact. A postcard image from the early 1900s that is a black and white photo can be valuable (20 to 40 dollars), but price depends on the image. Taverns, blacksmiths or buildings still standing a century later are highly appealing. Natural landscapes, forgotten locations or unnamed persons are less desired and often tossed in a lot at an antique mall, or worse yet, in the dumpster. Thankfully, this image was preserved to promote a reflection on where it was, and what Old Ashford has left behind.

flood plain given the common rise and recessions of rivers. A small natural hill occurring here randomly is unlikely. The size of the mound matches other native mounds in the area, in the range of three to five feet high. Of course, they can be higher and shorter. Even if the water in the postcard is just a wet hole or pond, it seems even stranger that a sharp natural incline is there given the flatness around it.

(2) Location and timing. It can be argued that a river continues to bend around the mound out of view, and therefore water naturally runs through this location in Ashford. It makes sense that the Native American mound is by the river, because many mounds are by water. (Though not all, as there were mounds on hills in Ashford Township). Furthermore, the small inclines on the other side of the river matches other locations in Fond du Lac County where small mounds line both sides of a river.

This mound survived up to the point of this picture being taken, and this timing (postmark of 1914) matches narratives of local history. This is about 70 years after settlers started systematically altering the area, in contrast to French fur traders who might have come around here by the mid-1600s. Though they traded animals and trapped, the

French in general did not physically alter the earthen mounds.

This mound pictured here would have survived up until 1910, probably because the local farmers avoided the creation of fields next to rivers. Because flooding makes harvest undependable in floodplains, the mound may have been spared up to that point because it was not as practical to extend a field on it.

The timing also predates tractors and heavy equipment which expedited the destruction of mounds. There also appears to be some fencing, which may have saved the mound from the plow in the late 1800s. In addition, the foreground might be cattle pasture, as the mound’s front end is cut off between the boy and the photographer’s point of view.

(3) Choice of the photo-op. It seems this site would be more than just a coincidental or a random photo op. Ashford’s pictures of this time include postcards of the Raffestein’s Tavern, St. Martin’s Church, Janous’s Blacksmith Shop and shots of the hamlet of Ashford from “out of town.”



Who is this boy? That is just one of the questions that stems from this close up of a 1914 postcard from Ashford. In addition, the split rock into the water might be one used as a portal for Indians to connect with spirit. This is a plausible suggestion, as it appears the child is standing next to, or on, a Native American mound.

Considering the collection the artist made, one must consider why the photographer then decided to take a random photo of a boy by a river. Though it could be a chance picture, it is possible it was selected due to the mound. Also, some elders of the area have pointed out that farmers in 1900 didn’t want to have natives come back to the area, so this might be why the mound isn’t labeled in this photo even though it is pictured.

(4) Petroforms a possibility. Noticeable in the foreground between the boy and the photographer are many rocks. It is possible they are petroforms (human made rock formations made into symbols or animals), as such stone formations constructed by Natives often coincided near mounds.

In addition, the stones are not ledgerock, even though some spots in Ashford Township show that stone, including just a few feet under the soil. A Native American would have known which stones would last for posterity, and although limestone and ledgerock were used often for tools, it seems likely that a harder, durable rock would be used for petroforms — especially if the formation would be next to a river or water body, where ice could play a seasonal role in long-term deterioration of the rock.

In addition, by the time this photo is taken, it is possible the rocks may no longer be in a specific formation. After all, the photo is from 1914 or earlier, when pasturing and human intervention may have altered the

ceremony. "My dad loved his career." It was not an easy job. Yanke worked 16 hours a day, sometimes seven days a week. There were days he had to walk the length of his train at night in a blizzard.

"Regardless of the hard work, he really loved railroading and appreciated its history," his son said.

Because of that appreciation for railroad history, Yanke did all of the research and wrote "The Chicago & North Western's Air Line Subdivision" over the course of 17 months while living in Kewaskum.

"He did not profit from the book and was able to write it the way he wanted to. He wrote it because he believed the history needed to be written," his son commented. "He became good friends with several people in the Kewaskum community and was able to get a lot of great information and content for the book, which is probably why the Kewaskum chapter has the most pages."

The book received good reviews in two national publications, and Yanke gave several presentations in some of the towns that were part of the Air Line. The first printing of 500 copies of Yanke's book sold out in nine months, and the second printing also sold out.

Yanke's entire family became a railroad family. As Yanke and his wife, Ellen Yanke, traveled throughout the United States and Canada with their three children, Laurie Muffler, Jim Yanke and Linda Gmach, they always found a train to ride, whether it was in a big city or in

the middle of nowhere.

"As a result, our kids learned how to use public transportation at a very young age," Ellen Yanke said.

Yanke had a sense of humor also. On one occasion, when Yanke was working as a conductor on a commuter train between Kenosha and Chicago, Ellen and the children were walking into their coach.

Yanke walked up to them and said in a stern voice, "Hey lady, if you can't control those kids, I'm going to drop you off at the next station!"

"Jim then introduced me to his regular passengers, who thought it was hilarious and they all clapped for us," said Ellen Yanke, although she admitted with a smile that she didn't think it was as funny as he did at that time.

Yanke was born on December 16, 1941, in Milwaukee. Throughout his

life, Yanke's family and his faith were important to him.

He cared for others as well. Toward the end of his career on the railroad, he counseled railroaders who were traumatized by fatal accidents or suicides that they witnessed while

working on trains.

"Jim was good at helping people understand that there is nothing that they could have done, and they were not at fault in these cases," Ellen Yanke said. "Jim was a special human being."

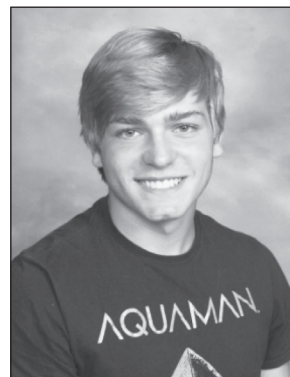

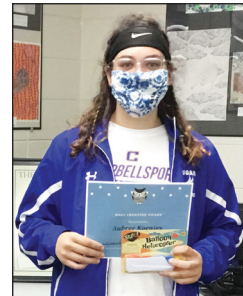

A grant from the Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium funded two student research projects this year. Christina Othon, associate professor of physics, applied for the grant aimed at contributing to NASA's research program "Examining Hydration Mechanisms of Osmolytes for Food Stabilization."

The \$9,500 award funded projects were by Brianna Bembenek '22 of Campbellsport, who worked on a protein simulation study to study molecular interactions; and Ian Murray '23 of Madison, who worked on an automation programming project.

Othon offered the project opportunity to physics and computer science students.

"Brianna Bembenek is conducting a molecular docking simulation that tests for interactions between small molecules, known as compatible osmolytes, and protein systems," Othon says.

Bembenek used Autodock Vina, developed by researchers at the Scripps Research Institute. Her simulations were run on the MUC3 cluster at Hope College, part of the Midwest Undergraduate Computational Chemistry Consortium of which Ripon College is a member, and which is partially funded by the National Science Foundation.

"This is my first experience with the computational modeling of larger molecules, such as proteins and carbohydrates, as well as with writing scripts using coding programs," Bembenek said. "By allowing me to expand the fields of research that I have worked with, this opportunity has provided invaluable experience that I hopefully can apply in graduate school and use in the future with a career in drug design. Currently, we have started data collection using Autodock after optimizing the research procedure and computer scripts. We also hope to begin data analysis very soon once this data is collected."

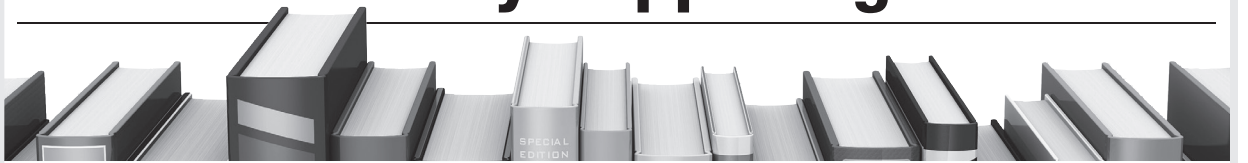

Fully Vaccinated People Can Resume Activities Without Masks

On May 13, the CDC released updated guidance that fully vaccinated people can resume activities they did before the pandemic, including participating in indoor and outdoor activities — large and small — without wearing a mask or physically distancing.

Fully vaccinated people can also refrain from testing following a known exposure unless they are residents or employees of a correctional or detention facility or a homeless shelter.

A person is considered fully vaccinated against COVID-19 if it has been two or more weeks since they got the second dose in a two-dose series (such as Pfizer or Moderna), or one dose of a single-dose vaccine (such as Johnson & Johnson). This updated guidance solidifies our confidence in COVID-19 vaccines and reflects the effectiveness of vaccines in preventing the spread of disease.

“This new guidance for fully vaccinated people is an exciting step forward,” said DHS secretary-designee Karen Timberlake “The science is clear: if you are fully vaccinated, you are protected, and you can start doing the things that you stopped doing because of the pandemic. For vaccinated people, this means returning to the Wisconsin way of life we all enjoy.”

With these guidance updates, there are important exceptions where everyone, including those who are fully vaccinated, should continue to wear a mask. Mask wearing should continue in health care settings, K-12 schools, correctional and detention

facilities, homeless shelters, and public transportation as well as places where masks are required by local or tribal health laws, rules, and regulations, including local businesses and workplaces.

The updates from CDC show that our vaccines are working in the real world. Studies have found them to be approximately 90 percent effective at preventing COVID-19 disease, hospitalization, and death.

While we have a strong supply of vaccine in Wisconsin, DHS acknowledges that there are systemic and structural barriers that can make it harder for certain communities to get vaccinated. DHS, along with our local and tribal partners continue to actively work to address these disparities and minimize barriers to vaccine access.

As part of our Vaccine Outreach grant program, over 100 partner organizations across Wisconsin are working as trusted messengers to build vaccine confidence, engage in targeted outreach, and reduce barriers that hinder vaccine access for marginalized or underserved Wisconsinites. We encourage everyone to get vaccinated against COVID-19 so they may begin returning to the activities they enjoy.

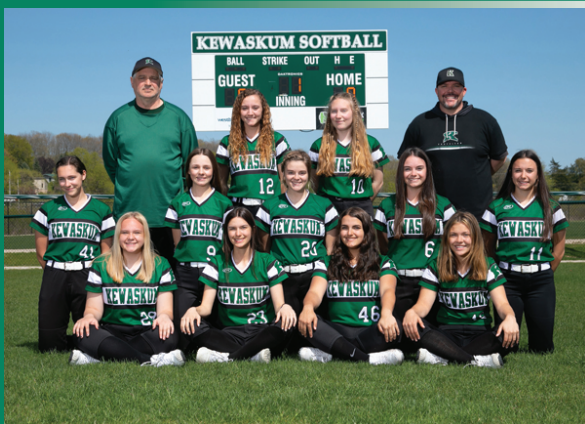

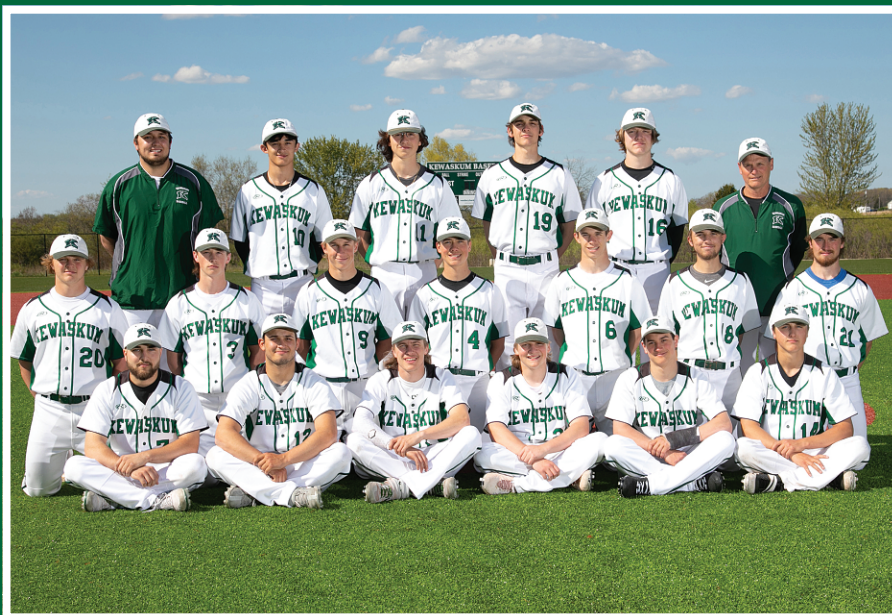

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM
ORDINANCE NO. 21-01
ORDINANCE TO CREATE 46-66 OF CHAPTER 46 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE ADULT SCHOOL CROSSING GUARDS

Section 1. That Sections 46-66 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to Adult School Crossing Guards, should be created as follows:

46-66 - ADULT SCHOOL CROSSING GUARDS.

(1) AUTHORIZATION. The Chief of Police shall employ and release from employment, on behalf of

the Village, as many adult persons as needed to act as school crossing guards and alternates therefor. Such employment is determined to be a governmental function and constitutes appointment pursuant to Wis. Stats. 349.215.

(2) GENERAL DUTIES. School crossing guards shall:

(a) Assist school children in the immediate vicinity of schools to cross intersections safely.

(b) Influence and encourage school children to refrain from crossing public streets except at regular crossings.

(c) Direct school children not to cross streets as such times when the presence of traffic renders such crossing unsafe.

(d) Maintain an orderly movement of pedestrian and vehicular traffic consistent with the safety of the children attending school in the Village.

(3) CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT. All school crossing guards shall be employed subject to the following conditions:

(a) They shall have no police powers and are specifically determined not to be police officers or policemen within the meaning of §62.13, Wis. Stats., as may be amended from time to time.

(b) They may have hours of employment as shall be determined by the Chief of Police.

(c) The Chief of Police shall have the authority to assign school crossing guards to such localities as shall be best suited to afford protection to those persons attending school in the Village.

(d) While on duty, they shall wear insignia or uniforms which designate them as school crossing guards, and shall use signs or signals to direct traffic to stop at school crossings. Said insignia or uniforms and signs or signals shall be furnished

by the Police Department for use while on duty and returned to the Police Department upon termination of employment.

(e) To be eligible for appointment as an adult school crossing guard, such person shall not be less than 18 years of age.

(f) They shall follow the Village of Kewaskum Employee Handbook.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.


Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law.

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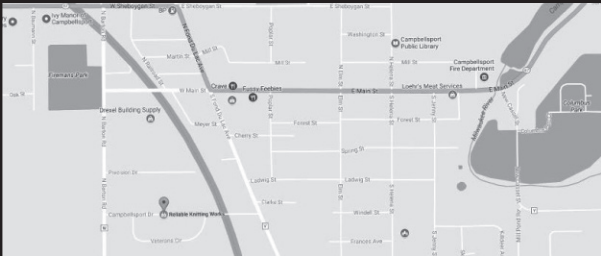



original formation.

In addition, because natives were kicked out of the area, it is possible some were still in the process of making stone formations, so the petroform shapes are not even finished. Although many historians claim such rock formations are ancient; one should be aware that it seems illogical that the natives living in the 1800s would not have been aware of the use of such stones.

For example, it would be impossible for Native Americans to use the Medicine Wheel rock formation today if there was no link to the past that connects them to their ancestors who built it. The continuation of the Medicine Wheel today is logical evidence that such petroforms and symbols never ceased in their usage.

(5) Portal rock? Along the lines of questioning if there was a petroform by this mound, there is a rock a few feet off the boy's shoulder into the river. That is the only large rock on that side of the picture.

But this stone is split, which possibly could be a portal. Such rocks in different locations of the country are evidence of the native belief that splitting a rock could provide an avenue to the spirits underneath the soil. That is just a plausible suggestion, not an answer.

Additional Questions To Consider

There are a lot more questions than answers with this photo. Here are some that come to mind:

Who is the boy? He appears under 10, probably born around 1900. It is hard to say that the postcard is from the year postmarked (1914). He also appears to be holding a box, but was it for lunch or fishing? If this boy lived to adulthood and had children by the late 1920s, it is possible those descendants are still alive.

Is the mound recent? Many historians conclude mounds were made long ago, in some cases well over 1,000 years back. It is amazing that a mound next to a river would maintain its form perfectly despite an attachment to a river.

Not only is this image a mound, it might verify they were more closely made during European settlement (1840s) than originally thought. One should also be aware that it is a fact that there are other mounds within 10 miles of this image that look like this mound, both on rivers and marshy areas.

Where is this? Ashford has many rivers, including the Milwaukee and Rock tributaries. This should be near Ashford hamlet versus Ashford Township in general, but it hard to say for certain. Any suggestions would be appreciated. At the time of publication, it was just clear that this

is an Ashford postcard, not where exactly this picture was taken. It is possible, too, that this mound has been destroyed.

What is the origin of the photo? We still really don't know why the picture was taken. First, who decided to make the card? There has to be a reason why this spot was chosen. And why did the Berg's decide to send this image? Maybe that was the only card left to send at the post office or general store. Then again, maybe the Bergs knew the boy by the river.

Do you preserve your images? Our historic pictures get lost in many ways. Ignorance for one, with many unaware of what the photo is. Some are overwhelmed by death, and toss the pile from grandpa's trunk into the fire. And then others don't have faith in the future of preservation. In a bitterness of mortality, I have seen some question the point of saving images at all.

Please be considerate of the time after, and before you. Sometimes collections might answer both questions for those in the future and those about the past, despite one's inability to see the puzzle piece's purpose in the present. This postcard was lucky. Thanks to those involved in preserving it. Let's hope there are more. And better yet, maybe we can locate the image.

Mangan-Fischer Receives Award
