American Legion Hall To Get New Roof

American Legion Robert G. Romaine Post 384 is getting a new roof on the post's building located on Fond du Lac Avenue in Kewaskum.

Work is slated to begin this week on the project. The new flat roof will replace the roof that was installed in 1958. It will take about one week to complete the work, according to Frank Lopez of JF Lopez Roofing.

The old roof was made up of roll tarpaper that was covered with hot tar mix and not much insulation. The roof has been patched several times and was cracking, sagging, ponding with water (adding extra weight) and leaking.

The Legion's original plan was to replace the old roof with a gabled roof. However, construction costs have gone up dramatically over the past year, so members decided that it was not affordable.

"What they thought was going to be a \$50,000 project turned out to be \$120,000. So, the post members made a motion and passed it to rethink

Dear Reader


We live in a fragile and complicated ecosystem governed by fallible men and



WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORTS

Fatal Motorcycle Crash

On Sunday, July 18, at 6:27 p.m. the Washington County Dispatch Center received a 911 call reporting a motorcycle versus tree crash in the 4900 block of Hubertus Road in the Village of Richfield. Witnesses reported the motorcycle operator was wearing a helmet but severely injured and began CPR shortly after locating the unconscious

Deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Office, along with members of the Richfield Fire Department, responded to the scene. The operator, a 23-yearold Washington County male resident, was transported to Community Memorial Hospital in Menomonee Falls and later flown to Froedtert Medical Center in Wauwatosa. The Sheriff's Office was later notified the operator of the motorcycle died due to the injuries sustained in the crash.

An initial investigation showed that the motorcycle was traveling eastbound on Hubertus Road at a high rate of speed when it failed to negotiate a sharp curve in the roadway. The motorcycle operator's name was not released at press time.

The crash remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and no further information will be released.

This is the fourth fatal motor vehicle crash for Washington County in 2021.



Multistate Outbreak of Salmonella Typhimurium **Includes Wisconsin**

Health Services (DHS), Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, Consumer Protection, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the U.S. Food & Drug Administration (FDA), and local health departments are involved in an ongoing investigation of an outbreak of Salmonella Typhimurium.

Current public health data indicates that pre-packaged salad greens produced by BrightFarms, Inc. of Rochelle, IL, are the source of a Salmonella Typhimurium outbreak in Wisconsin and Illinois. Nine people are infected with one hospitalization (four in Wisconsin, five in Illinois). Illnesses started between June 10 to June 15, 2021.

"At this time, DHS urges consumers not to purchase, eat, or serve BrightFarms branded pre-packaged salad greens," says DHS communicable diseases supervisor Ryan Wozniak, "Consumers and food service establishments who have BrightFarms salad greens with any 'best-by' date should not eat, serve or sell any of the recalled products."

DHS also advises consumers to check their refrigerators for any leftover product and throw it away. Produce drawers and refrigerator surfaces should be cleaned thoroughly after throwing out the product. These packaged salad greens are sold in disposable plastic containers at various grocery stores, and are labeled with the phrase "fresh from Rochelle, IL." BrightFarms salads from the IL farm are distributed to at least these four states: Illionois, Indiana, Iowa, and Wisconsin.

Salmonellosis is caused by Salmonella bacteria that are spread by eating or drinking contaminated food or water, or by direct or indirect contact with fecal matter from infected people or animals. Symptoms of salmonellosis include diarrhea, abdominal pains, fever, and vomiting can start six hours after eating a contaminated product and last for several days. Bloodstream infections can occur, but are rare, and can be quite serious in young children and older adults. Most people recover from salmonellosis on their own, but some may require extra fluids to prevent dehydration.

If you have consumed any of the BrightFarms brand pre-packaged salad greens and are experiencing symptoms of salmonellosis, contact your health care provider. Consumers experiencing symptoms should also contact their local health department.

our plan. They had been planning for years to put a gabled roof on this, to make it more aesthetically pleasing. But the prior goal was to preserve the building by securing the roof," Post Commander John Koerble said.

Before going forward with the new plan, Koerble sent letters to the major donors to get their blessing on the project.

"I got calls from half of them saying thank you," Koerble said.

Had the Legion members decided to build a gabled roof, they would have gone over \$60,000 into debt, according to Koerble. However, nobody wanted to go into debt.

"It was basically putting a toupee on the building, and not doing anything that you couldn't do for under \$40,000. Our mission is not to go into debt to put a toupee on this

place," Koerble said. "This way we will leave our seed money where it is and let it to continue to generate interest."

The Legion received a quote to replace the roof for under \$40,000 to replace the old roof and reflash the sides. When completed, the roof will be raised about 10 inches, according to Koerble.

"It was a hard decision, but we are not here to impress you with our building, we are here to impress you with our services to veterans," Koerble said.

The post will use remaining funds to improve the facilities.

"The outside deck needs work, so we are going to fix that. And we are going to go through the inside with the eye of the bride's mother," Koerble said. "It is a rental hall, and we have weddings and things in there."

5 Years Ago July 28, 2016

Ten Kewaskum High School students participated in a two-week Health Care Career Academy at St. Joseph's Hospital. Each student visited 10 of 16 departments. To become involved, students had to fill out an application. From there, students were selected to go through an interview process. The students didn't get any credit for attending the academy, but they said the lessons made the experience valuable.

The Kewaskum School District's Long Range Planning Committee is recommending that the district goes forward with a \$28.4 million plan to improve its middle school and high school facilities. Board members are expected to vote on the recommendation. If approved, the district will go to referendum on November 9. If the plan goes through, the impact on the mill rate is projected to be between 25 and 48 cents, and will most likely land around 36 cents.

United Way of Washington County is celebrating 80 years of improving lives and community conditions. During this anniversary year, the organization plans to feature stories about local residents who have been involved with and/or benefitted from United Way programs.

Vernon Jung of Kewaskum was one of three Moraine Park Technical College's district board members to be sworn in and reappointed on July 11.

Of the 230 notices that went to village residents regarding delinquent water and sewer accounts, 200 are now current and 30 signed payment agreements. Those who had been delinquent had received notice that water would be disconnected on July 11 if bills were not paid. An ordinance repealing and recreating the municipal code's section on delinquent water bills had been approved July 18. The article included that information.

The Mid-Wisconsin Federated Library System, representing Washington and Dodge Counties, and the Eastern Shores Library System, representing Ozaukee and Sheboygan Counties, are proposing to merge systems. The proposal is supported by all five libraries in the current Mid-Wisconsin System and was unanimously approved at the July 21 Administrative Committee meeting. A recommendation has been sent to the County Board for final approval at its August meeting.

accepting flag, the Pietschmann and a contingent of escort riders will depart from Ooga Brewing Company at 9:30 a.m on Sunday, carrying the flag to its next Wisconsin stop in Fennimore.

"By luck of the draw, I served during peacetime," Pietschmann explained. "Now I have an opportunity to serve again, serving those who sacrificed so much more than me.'

Pietschmann said he is honored to have been asked to accept and carry the flag during this leg of the Patriot Tour.

"I was blown away. They asked if I was interested and I kept asking if it was real," he said.

Serving in the U.S. Air Force from 1976 to 1980 as an avionics repair specialist, Pietschmann tested and repaired on-board radios and navigation systems for F-111D aircraft stationed with the 27th Tactical Fight Wing at Cannon Air Force Base, New Mexico. A native of West Bend, Pietschmann has a history of involvement and service. He is a member of American Legion Post 36, Sons of the American Legion Squadron 36 and the American Legion Riders of Wisconsin District

"I really believe in the Nation of Patriots organization because it is truly a grassroots entity. Strangers from around the country rally around the flag and deliver it from group to group. 



Kewaskum Village Board Members Help Resident

Carlotta Hanson has lived in the Village of Kewaskum since 1987 and has always paid her water bill on time.

Typically, her bill runs about \$120 a month. However, in June, she received a water bill for

Hanson, who is on a fixed income, did not know how she was going to pay that. Plus, she did not know why her bill was so much higher than normal. She had not used any extra water.

"I have lived the same as always," she said.

She had not done extra laundry or washed her car. Because of the pandemic, she had not even had any family members visit her.

Village employees tested the water meter to make sure it was working properly. Everything checked out. Dennis Aupperle, working foreman for the village's Department of Public Works, suggested that Hanson document the meter readings to determine if there is a leak anywhere in Hanson's home.

Hanson has been keeping a detailed log each

But Hanson's bill was due on Tuesday, July 20, and she didn't know how she was going to make the payment. So, she came to the Village Board meeting on Monday, July 19, and pleaded her case.

Unfortunately, Village President as Scheunemann pointed out at the meeting, the board historically does not make exceptions for water bills if a homeowner's water meeting is working correctly.

The best that the board seemed to be able to do was to make an extended payment schedule for

But Scheunemann was moved by Hanson's plight and wanted to help. So, he offered to personally pay the first down payment of \$250 for

Hanson's bill.

Village Trustee Dave Spenner quickly followed suit and offered to pay another \$250 to help cover Hanson's bill.

Grateful for the help, Hanson paid the remaining balance at Village Hall on Tuesday morning.

"I'll admit it was as much of a mercy to my soul as it was a mercy to Mrs. Hanson. At best, we would have gotten an extended payment plan out of the board. I hate denying fee waiver in these cases, but subjective waiver is difficult...when do you give it as a board? My Christian conscience would bother me if it was left at that," Scheunemann said about his act of kindness. "Trustee Dave Spenner deserves all the credit for matching the pledge. I do know he lives in Gospel grace."

Other Village Matters

In other action at Monday's Village Board meeting, the board:

- Voted unanimously to approve the request of Larry Bayer/Stellar Abodes LLC to split and rezone the new parcels abutting Prospect Drive from M-1 Limited Manufacturing to RD-1 Two Family Residential the parcel of land located at 667 Trading Post Lane to allow for two duplex lots on Prospect Drive.
- Voted 5-1 to approve the request of St. Lucas Lutheran Church to combine the parcel located at 1410/1420 Parkview Drive with the parcel located at 1428 Parkview Drive and rezone the parcel located at 1428 Parkview Drive from RS-2 Single Family – Residential to I-1 Institutional. Village Trustee Richard Laubach voted no; Scheunemann abstained.
- Voted 5-1 to approve the request of St. Lucas Lutheran Church to combine the parcels located at Parkview Drive and 1433 Parkview Drive with the parcel located at 1417 Parkview Dr. and rezone the parcels located at Parkview Drive and 1433 Parkview Drive from RS-2 Single Family -

Residential to I-1 Institutional. Laubach voted no; Village Scheunemann abstained.

• Voted unanimously to approve paying \$5,000 to Zimmerman Architectural Studios to develop an option to build a new Village Hall/Public Library building onto Railroad Street, as well as razing the existing building. The analysis will be completed on July 29.

The new analysis will include a conceptual block floor plan and sequence scheduling to avoid as much disruption as possible. The analysis also will include a conceptual cost estimate including all sitework costs and soft costs for razing the building, new construction on the existing site, donated land and a portion of Railroad Street. Included in the complete cost estimate, the village's shared facilities committee would like to see costs associated with transitioning to temporary space if needed. The two following options to develop the project are in the fee proposed: a single-story building that may require utilizing portion of Railroad Street; and a two-story building contained completely on the current site is included in this fee.

- Unanimously approved paying \$36,707.41 to allow parking on both sides of Fond du Lac Avenue between Roseland and Knights Avenue when the Wisconsin Department of Transportation redoes Highway 45/Fond du Lac Avenue.
- · Unanimously voted to authorize submission to the Department of Justice Body Camera Grant Program.
- Unanimously voted to approve the maximum penalty amount for the Mid Moraine Municipal Court's bond schedule from \$500 to \$1,000.
- Unanimously voted to change the term of the Mid Moraine Municipal Court judge from a twoyear term to a four-year term.

Wisconsin Beachgoers: Be Aware Of Blue-Green Algae Risks

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is reminding beachgoers and their pets to watch for blue-green algae and know the risks. Blue-green algae can cause illness if swallowed or inhaled in water droplets, or irritation if rubbed on the skin under clothing.

Blue-green algae, or cyanobacteria, are photosynthetic bacteria often called "pond scum." Bluegreen algae are most often green but can also be blue, tan, reddish-purple or brown. Blue-green algae generally grow in lakes, ponds and slow-moving streams when the water is warm and enriched with nutrients like phosphorus or nitrogen.

When environmental conditions are just right, blue-green algae can increase in number. Most species are buoyant and will float to the surface, where they form scum layers or floating mats known as a "blue-green algae bloom." In Wisconsin, blue-green algae blooms generally occur between mid-June and late September, although in rare instances, blooms have been observed in winter, even under the ice.

Stay Safe On And Offshore

Since most lakes in Wisconsin are not tested for blue-green algae, it is important to know what it looks like and always assess conditions before

Stay safe by following best practices, including:

- •Do not swim in water that looks like "pea soup," green or blue paint, or that has a scum layer or puffy blobs floating on the surface.
- •Do not boat, water ski, etc., over such water (people can be exposed through inhalation).
- •Do not let children play with scum layers, even
- •Do not let pets or livestock swim in, or drink, waters experiencing blue-green algae blooms.
- •Always take a shower after encountering any surface water (whether or not a blue-green algae bloom appears to be present; surface waters may contain other species of potentially harmful bac-

teria and viruses).

•Try to avoid swallowing lake water, no matter how clean it looks, since it may have bacteria, viruses, or parasites in it that could make you sick.

Keep Pets Safe

Blue-green algae can have harmful effects on humans and pets. However, because dogs love to spend time in the water, they are not deterred by surface scum and often swallow a lot of water while swimming. If they consume large quantities of blue-green algae when they drink the water, and if those blue-green algae happen to be producing toxin(s), the animals can become very ill, and even die.

Symptoms of blue-green algal toxin poisoning may range from lethargy and loss of appetite to seizures, vomiting and convulsions. Dogs are particularly susceptible to blue-green algal poisoning because scums can attach to their coats and be swallowed during self-cleaning. To keep dogs safe, choose the clearest water possible for dogs to swim in and keep dogs out of areas with accumulations of blue-green algae or any dense particulate matter.

Follow these tips to keep pets safe:

- •Do not let pets swim in, or drink, waters experiencing blue-green algae blooms or noticeably green water.
- •Keep dogs out of shallow, stagnant waters where blue-green algae may be growing on the bottom and dislodged by disturbance. If people shouldn't swim there, dogs shouldn't either.
- •Always offer fresh, clean water for pets to drink instead of lake water.
- ·Always wash dogs off with clean water immediately after they swim, so they don't lick any algae from their fur.

•Supervise pets when they are outside so they don't eat algal scum accumulated on the shore, floating mats of algae or drink lake water.

•If a pet eats grass, avoid using lake water for

lawn irrigation if blooms are present.

•If there's any doubt about what is in the water, keeping pets out is the safest course of action.

Symptoms of water intoxication (from swallowing too much water) and heatstroke in dogs include vomiting, diarrhea, lethargy, and loss of coordination. Give dogs plenty of breaks from swimming and retrieving in lakes, avoid having dogs bite at splashed water as a game and use flat objects for retrieval instead of balls. Always provide shade and fresh, clean water to drink.

The public is encouraged to report significant blue-green algae blooms to the DNR at DNRHABS@wisconsin.gov. Please include the location of the bloom, the name of the water body, nearest town, county, the size and duration of the bloom and overall and close-up photographs for verification. The DNR is unable to test all reported blooms.

Festival Of Summer

Last year was the year of disappointment for a lot of people with the Covid-19 pandemic wiping out nearly every type of festival last summer. For the first time in the history of the event, Summerfest in Milwaukee was cancelled. For any music lover who enjoys seeing live shows, this was a major punch to the stomach.

Summerfest started in 1968 at the Henry Maier Festival Park along the shoreline of beautiful Lake Michigan. Billed as the "World's largest music festival," the Big Gig draws roughly 800,000 people annually to the event. This year Summerfest has decided to run things a little differently. Normally the event is held in late June and runs until around the fourth of July. Summerfest will be held in September this year over three weekends (Sept 2-4, 9-11, and 16-18).

Summerfest has drawn some of the biggest names and acts over its 50 plus years of existence. The list of music legends runs deep with the Summerfest acts that have headlined the main stages. Dolly Parton (1969), Johnny Cash ('74), The Beach Boys ('75), Eric Clapton ('83), Paul Simon ('87), Rod Stewart ('89), Cher ('90), Whitney Houston

('91), Metallica ('92), Stevie Wonder ('98), Britney Spears (2000), Prince (2004), Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers (2006), Rolling Stones (2015), and Paul McCartney (2016) are just a handful of greats that have rocked Summerfest over the past half century.

A couple of memorable Summerfest headliners left Milwaukee with some interesting stories. In 1970, Sly and the Family Stone played before 100,000 people, they were an hour late and the place almost turned into a riot. In 1972, comedian George Carlin was a headliner. After his set, he was escorted off the stage and arrested by police for using profanity during his act.

Personally I have witnessed some of my favorite concerts at Summerfest. I made a list of some of my favorites but I didn't rate them (which is rare because I love ranking things).

•Chrvches in 2019. My daughter and a friend of ours scored VIP passes and watched this great band from the front row.

•Huey Lewis & The News in 1984. I drove my sister and three of her friends to see Huey during the peak of his career, a very energetic concert!

•Flock of Seagulls/Great White/Five Card Studs/ Rick Springfield in 2018 with my brother and his wife. We had a blast just bopping from one act to another.

•The Eagles with my wife in 2013. My favorite band of all-time (seen them 10 times) closed out Summerfest with an incredible set of all their classic songs.

•Neil Diamond in 2012 with Cindy. We had lawn seats which weren't the best but we got to listen to one of the greatest musicians of all time.

•Journey & Def Leppard with my wife and kids on July 4th, 2018. We splurged for really good seats and sung our tails off all night.

•Justin Bieber in 2010 with Sean Kingston opening up. Cindy and I took our daughter Peyton and our niece Lexi because, yes — we had "Bieber Fever."

•Jimmy Buffett with Cindy in 1991. We scored 15th row tickets about an hour before the show from a scalper — money well spent.

Three-time and defending PDTR Late Model champion Justin Schmidt of Cleveland notched his second consecutive and fourth overall 25-lap Sheboygan's County 93.7 Late Model A-main victory of the 2021 season.

Two-time PDTR Grand National champ Don Sorce Jr. of West Allis rolled to his first A-main triumph of 2021, while 2017 PDTR B Mod champion Justin Green of Sheboygan Falls made the most of a fill-in driving opportunity behind the wheel of Spencer Long's 59s machine to earn the victory in the 25-lap B Mod main event.
