Beach Expanded At Leonard J. Yahr County Park

A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on Friday, Aug. 20, for a newly expanded beach at Leonard J. Yahr County Park, which is located at 7999 Orchard Valley Road in the Town of Farmington.

The event was a celebration of the new beach that has been expanded from roughly 2,100 square feet to about 10,200 square feet. Attending the event were Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann, tree sponsors, Washington County Parks and Planning employees, representatives from area chambers of commerce and community members.

The beach expansion project stemmed from public demand increasing for local beach access. In April 2021, the Washington County Land Use and Planning Committee approved a conditional

Petersen fills a seat that was vacated on June 30 when Doug Gonring resigned from the board for personal reasons. Petersen, who has been serving on the district's policy committee, was selected from a field of 11 candidates who had applied for the position. ally hope that by the grace of God I can serve this community well and work with my other board members and with administration to provide the best education possible at the lowest cost to the taxpayer."

Petersen, who said he has attended every school board meeting for the past seven years, is a familiar face to the other school board members. Petersen ran unsuccessfully for the Kewaskum School Board four times before being appointed to the board this week. The first time Petersen ran for the Kewaskum School Board was in 2015,



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Kubbapalooza Coming This Weekend

You may have never heard of it, but a fun event is coming to the area this weekend — Kubbapalooza. It will pit teams against each other to see who is the best at the game Kubb.

This is a lawn game that is gaining popularity around the area and the midwest. Kubb (pronounced koob) is a lawn game where the objective is to knock over wooden blocks or kubbs by throwing wooden batons, known as kastpinnars, at them. It is thought of as a cross between horseshoes and bowling with a bit of strategy.

"Kubb is considered one of the oldest games in the world," said Stephen McDiarmid, founder of Kettle Moraine Kubb. "It's huge in Europe but has never really made it to the US. The sport has really caught on recently."

Wisconsin is one of the states helping to bring it to popularity. In 2007, Eau Claire started hosting the US National Kubb Championships, which has been televised on ESPN. The city considers itself the "Kubb Capital of North America."

The evening will start with the program, Celestial Sights of the Summer Sky, at 7:30 p.m. and end with Summer Star Gazing running from 8:45 p.m. to 11 p.m. These programs will be held on Saturday, Sept. 4, at the Ice Age Visitor Center located at N2875 Highway 67, Campbellsport, which is a half mile west of Dundee. The program is free, but donations are always gratefully accepted.

At 7:30 p.m., join Jeff Setzer of the Northern Cross Science Foundation to discover how to find fantastic planets, amazing stellar nurseries and spectacular star clusters in the summer sky. Learn how to use a basic star chart (provided free at the event) and then put your new knowledge into action by looking through large telescopes at the Summer Star Gazing Drop-In.

The astronomers from the Northern Cross Science Foundation will be setting up their telescopes of all sizes from four-inch diameters to more than 12 inches and pointing them into the night sky. Between 8:45 p.m. and 11 p.m., drop in any time and stay as long as you like to peer through the scopes to bring into focus the wonders of the night sky.

With the help of these experienced sky observers, you will spy distant planets, marvel at far away galaxies, and be awed by the beauty of a dumb-bell nebula or globular cluster. The members of the Northern Cross Science Foundation truly enjoy sharing their hobby and helping people just getting started in astronomy. Kewaskum High School Graduation Set For Wednesday, June 1

An outdoor graduation ceremony is planned for the Kewaskum High School Class of 2022 on Wednesday, June 1, at 7 p.m.

The ceremony is slated to be held on the high school football field, a tradition that was started two years ago because of the covid pandemic. A rain date is scheduled for Sunday, June 5.

The Kewaskum School Board unanimously approved the new graduation dates at a regular board meeting on August 12. Board members Timothy Ramthun and Dennis Aupperle had excused absences from the meeting.

Feedback from families about holding an outdoor graduation ceremony has been overwhelmingly positive over the last couple of years, according to Kewaskum High School Principal Scott Stier.

Because the graduation ceremony is set for a Wednesday, schedules will be rearranged so that seniors will complete final exams prior to the ceremony, according to Dr. Mark Bazata,

Although graduation was held on a Friday night for the past two years, administration did not recommend either a Friday night or a Saturday graduation this year to avoid interfering with the WIAA schedule.

Because temperatures can be at least 15 degrees warmer on the artificial turf, Stier recommended that the ceremony not be held before 7 p.m.

The board considered holding an indoor graduation in the air-conditioned high school gym on Sunday, June 5. Board Member Sue Miller voiced concern that a Wednesday evening may be difficult for parents because of their work schedules. But in the end, the board decided the best option was to plan an outdoor ceremony with a rain date.

"I love the idea of having it outside and having a backup day," Miller said.

when he was an 18-year-old senior at Kewaskum High School. He ran again for the position in 2016, 2017 and 2018.

"Mr. Petersen brings a youthful perspective to this board, which we've talked about how diverse we are in different areas of expertise and experience, age and gender, we've got a good mix. He brings a youthful element to the table," Board Member Timothy Ramthun said. "But the thing that really got me was I think he has better attendance coming to board meetings than some board members. He hasn't missed a board meeting in seven and a half years.... The gentleman ran for the position four times as well, so when you think of genuine desire and genuine intent, he was my number one for those reasons. He earned it."

To fill the vacancy, the board first requested letters of interest from community members. Then, the board interviewed candidates on August 4.

At Monday night's meeting, each school board member shared his or her top three choices in order verbally. Board Member Dennis Aupperle, who was unable to attend the meeting in person, participated in the meeting virtually. every third choice was worth one point. Voting was based on the interviews and letters of interest that the 11 candidates wrote.

Petersen, who was on everyone's list of top three choices, placed first in the process with 14 points. He was followed by Nathan Weseman with six points; Randy Reysen and Rhett Engelking tied for third place with five points each.

In his interview, Petersen expressed his dedication to the Kewaskum School District.

"I was born and raised in this community; 24 years I have lived here. One day, I will be buried here, at the Town of Scott Church. For the last seven years, I have attended every single school board meeting," Petersen said during his interview. "I have so much pride in my school and in my community. I think if you cut me, not only would I bleed red, white and blue; I think you'd probably find some green in there too."

When asked about his vision for education and the Kewaskum community, Petersen replied that his vision was "building an inclusive learning environment that will ready kids for college and the workforce, or both. But I think an all-inclusive learning environment where all students feel safe to come to school every day and express themselves, whether I agree it or not, it doesn't matter, but as long as everybody is able to express themselves freely and engage in the classroom every single day, ask questions, I think that is very important."

He also told the board that he thinks being open, honest and transparent is key.

"What I don't envision for education in the community is critical race theory and the 1619 Project. As I talked to a lot of community members over the past couple weeks when I applied for this position, those are very hot button issues for community members," Petersen said during his interview.

According to his letter of interest, Petersen's to three priorities are: curriculum, student involvement in the community and fiscal responsibility.

At Monday's meeting, board members expressed their appreciation for all the candidates and acknowledged that it was a difficult decision.

"I appreciate the fact that we had 11 candidates, and I think they were all very strong. We are only going to be able to select one," said Board Member Ric Leitheiser, adding that he encourages all the candidates to run for the school board next spring. "I would like to see 11 people running for that position in the spring. I think that would be fantastic."

For every first choice, a candidate received three points; every second choice earned two points; and

involve replacing the narrow and deteriorating bridge structure built in 1950 with a safer and wider bridge. Another significant highlight of this project is the addition of a 12-foot-wide, multi-use path along the south side of the bridge. The bridge serves as an important connector for the Ice Age Trail. The path will provide a safe, barrier separated river crossing for hikers within the Kettle Moraine State Forest.

It will also provide an established crossing for snowmobile trail riders in the winter.

Motorists are asked to follow the posted detour route, which will utilize U.S. Highway 45, State Highway 28 and State Highway 144. A detour route will also be posted for Ice Age Trail users. The route will follow along State Highwav 28 and the Eisenbahn State Trail. Information about the closure and detour will be posted at various locations along the trail in the area.

William F. "Bill" Smith, 92, passed away on August 19, 2021. He was born in Fond du Lac on February 7, 1929,

to James and Marie (Cody) Smith. Bill spent his entire life on the land that he was raised on in Eden.

In 1943, as a young teen, he quit St. Mary Springs Academy and enlisted in the US Navy,

Bill was a very good musician, playing in several entertainment bands over the years. He was an exceptional drummer and mastered the bass violin and taught himself how to play the trumpet. When Bill came home from the service, he learned how to fly airplanes, holding his commercial pilot certificate. He was a lifetime member of the EAA. Bill really enjoyed flying his Beechcraft Baron, which he often flew to the family cabin near Minocqua. He was a life member of Fond du Lac Elks Lodge #57. Bill enjoyed hunting and fishing. At the age of 67, he started downhill skiing again. It became his passion until the end of his life. Bill competed in NASTAR Alpine races all over the U.S. winning several medals in his age category. He was never the pretty skier, but he was the fastest. Bill's final ski run was made at 90 years old at Indianhead in Michigan, on a trip with many of his skiing friends from the Sly Fox and Galendesprung Ski Clubs; whom he had so many wonderful memories with, on the many ski trips around the world he took with them.

If there is one thing to be said from his life is this: Bill was born during the depression a poor farm kid, who willingly, as a child, went to serve his country in a foreign land for the country he loved and daily flew a flag until the day he died. He came back a poor kid with only a ninth grade education and worked hard for what he had and with little knowledge of business. No matter what happened in life, he never gave up. Bill never complained; not about money, pain, or being tired. He just kept going with an enthusiasm for life and living. At 87 years old Bill said, "I want to go back to work, I'm bored." There's a lot to be learned from that kind of perseverance and a love of life in good times and bad.



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Heroes Of The Holyland | Biography of Gordon G. Immel

Gordon "Gordy" George Immel was born on March 12, 1939, to Walter and Dora (Becker) Immel. He had five brothers and three sisters and grew up on the family dairy farm in Dotyville. He attended St. Paul's Lutheran School in Mt. Calvary.

His brothers Raymond "Bud" and Vernon were drafted into the Army, while Lyle and Harlan joined the Navy. In 1956, Gordon joined the Air Force at age 17.

After basic training in San Antonio, TX, Gordy completed his Air Police training at Lackland Air Force Base in Texas. After training, there was a 17-day furlough before reporting to New York and eventually Europe.

He was picked for duty with the 38th Air Police Squadron in France. After the long flight to Frankfort Germany, he remembers being told not to drink too much of that good German beer. He doesn't think anyone listened. The next day they took the long eight-hour train ride to Laon Air Base France.

The French base at Laon had been seized by the Germans in 1940 during the Battle of France and was used as a Luftwaffe military airfield during the occupation. During the Liberation of France, the base was seized by Allied ground forces and turned over to the United States Army Air Forces. The airfield at Laon became one of the busiest American bases on the continent during the remainder of WWII. When the war ended, the airfield was closed and turned over to the French Air Ministry.

In 1950, the air base at Laon was offered to the United States Air Force by the French Air Ministry as part of their NATO commitment, a result of the Cold War threat of the Soviet Union. Laon was an emergency "backup" airfield, consisting of a runway with minimal facilities intended for use by NATO air forces to disperse their aircraft in case of war. It was peace time and the 38th Air Police Squadron provided security to the base. Gordy mainly worked the 3-11 shift and initially his time there was "kind of boring." During this time, the USAF sent him to Wiesbaden Air Base, Germany to finish his high school education.

On May 1, 1957, the responsibility to train sentry dogs was taken over by the Air Force from the Army. In June, Gordy and 17 other airmen were picked to participate in the USAF Sentry Dog program. They were sent to Army Quartermaster School in Lenggries, a small town in Bavaria, Germany. The Quartermaster Corps procured dogs for the Air Force as sentry dogs to relieve manpower shortages in guarding airfields, material, and equipment. Gordy remembers the flight because the pilot announced they were flying over "enemy territory" East Germany.

Training at the Army Quartermaster School was hard, with a lot of the training in the surrounding Bavarian mountains. The nights were much better, where they would frequent an EM (Enlisted Member) Club where you could get a burger for 20 cents and a beer for 10 cents. The Sentry Dog training took about two months. Gordy was matched up with his dog, a German Shepard named Arno-R-692. Sentry Dogs were worked on a short leash and were taught to give warning by growling or barking. The dogs accompanied the AP on patrol and gave him warning of the approach or presence of strangers within the area protected. They were especially valuable for working in the dark when attack from cover or the rear was most likely. When Gordy's unit returned to Laon with their dogs, his Sargent Rice appointed him Flight Leader, putting him in charge of 17 troops and dogs. He would remain at his post in Laon until his honorable discharge in 1960. The Air Force tried to convince Gordy to re-enlist and be an Air Police Instructor at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas. He would've re-enlisted had they stationed him at Chaumont Air Base in Illinois. He thought Texas was too hot compared to what he was accustomed to in Wisconsin. It's interesting to note that Lackland AFB is where the U.S. Armed Forces has been training its military working dog teams since 1958 and it

remains to this day as the Department of Defense Military Working Dog School. The school is responsible for procuring all dogs for the DoD and training dogs and handlers for all branches of the military. It is the world's largest training center for military dogs and handlers and is also home to the largest veterinary hospital for military working dogs.

Gordy received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award and Good Conduct Medal. He never saw combat, with the Korean War ending in 1953 and the official US involvement in the Vietnam War wasn't until 1965. But the Cold War and the tension between the United States and USSR was always in the minds of our military men at the time, especially those stationed overseas in Europe. Gordy remembers the military building the underground silos and shelters in case of a nuclear attack. He was thankful to return home to the family farm in Dotyville. All five brothers returned safely home from their respective service. After his service, Gordy tried life away from the farm for a short time but eventually returned. He would purchase the farm from his father in 1967. He married Carolyn Engel, who grew up across the road from the Immel farm, on September 11,

1965. Together they had five children, Todd (Jill), Jackie (Joe) Welsh, Ted, Tim (Cindy), and Jodi (Scott) Kuhnke. There are seven grandchildren (one deceased), six great-grandchildren, three step grandchildren and five step great-grandchildren.

Dedicated to a life of farming, Gordy has never really taken much time away for hobbies. When he was younger, he enjoyed playing baseball, bowling, snowmobiling, and going to the local racetracks in Plymouth and Slinger. He is still a huge NASCAR fan and also has Green Bay Packers season tickets, although he doesn't go as often now as he used to. He still stays in touch with some of his 38th Air Police Squadron members and has attended several reunions, which they hold every two years.

In 1990, Gordy and Carolyn travelled to Europe for their wedding anniversary. They

use permit application for the expansion of Leonard J. Yahr Beach. The project was proposed as part of the County Executive Josh Schoemann's 2021 recommended budget.

Expanding the beach involved removing trees and clearing brush along the shoreline. New trees are being planted in the park to mitigate impacts from the removal of trees.

Last week's celebration included the ribbon cutting and recognition of tree sponsors, followed by music provided by Clay Schaub. Food was available for sale by Lottza Mottza pizza, and the 1840 Traveling Beer Garden Show was at the park. In addition, Paddlebreak Adventures was on site so that park visitors could rent out kavaks, canoes, and inflatable tubes and paddleboards.



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Leonard J. Yahr Park County Park opened in 2007, the newest addition to the Washington County Parks System. The park encompasses 65 acres.

The land had previously been owned by the Carl Erler family since the late 1800s and was used

as a sawmill, which was converted into a sulfur match factory in the late 1870s. In addition to offering the expanded swimming beach (no lifeguard provided), Leonard J. Yahr Park features a fishing pier, lakefront picnic area, carry-in only boat launch (no fee required), playground equipment, heated flush restroom, hiking trail, reservable shelter and prairie area.

Garage Fire

It is believed at this time that the fire originated from the lawn mower.

The building is believed to be a total loss, along with multiple vehicles and other contents from inside. Total property loss is estimated to be approximately \$200,000.

The Kewaskum Fire Department was assisted by Boltonville Fire, Allenton Fire, Kohlsville Fire, West Bend Fire, Jackson Fire and Campbellsport Fire.

Motorcycle Crash With Injury

This is thanks to Eric Anderson. He and his wife lived in Sweden for a few years while he attended graduate school. Kubb is considered to be a nordic lawn game with Sweden and Norway as the hot spots.

When Anderson moved back to Eau Claire, he and his wife brought the game back with them and started teaching it to as many as they could. They started a club and the US tournament.

This is how Stephen and Chris McDiarmid became involved with the game. The couple owned a wine and cheese business near Coloma. They move a little over a year ago to the Kettle Moraine area.

"My wife and I started playing about seven years ago," Stephen said. "One of our customers (Anderson) told us we had to learn this game. He showed us how to play one afternoon and we loved it. He spent a long time in Sweden and when he moved back to Eau Claire, he brought it with him."

The McDiarmids are now hoping to introduce Kubb to everyone around the Kettle Moraine area. Before moving here, the couple would vacation here all the time. They started a club called the Kettle Moraine Kubb, otherwise known as KMK, in 2012.

"We just enjoy playing it and want to introduce it to others," Stephen said. "We're currently playing on Wednesday nights at Jugs. It's a great way for people to learn it."

Jug's Hitching Post Saloon & Grill in Kohlsville will be the home of the Kubb Grass Games this Saturday, Aug. 28. This is the first part of Kubbapalooza this weekend. Registration is at 8:30 a.m. with the first round of play at 9 a.m.

Then on Sunday, the fun continues in the sand. The Tiki Beach Resort on Kettle Moraine Lake, in between Dundee and Waucousta, is hosting the Kubb Sand Games on August 29th. Registration is at 9:30 a.m. with the first round starting at 10 a.m.

What Is Kubb

As explained, it is a lawn game that is a combination of horseshoes and bowling, with a bit of strategy. But, Kubb can be more than that.

"It's probably the simplest game I've ever played," Stephen said. "It's a fun game to play and a really social game. There is no defensive aspect to it."

The playing field is called a pitch. The field size is five meters (16.404199 feet) by eight meters (26.246719 feet).

There are 10 kubbs which are rectangular wooden blocks, one larger wooden piece called a king. six batons and six field marking pins. The king is set up in the middle of the field with five kubbs set up in a row along the outside line of each side.

"The point of the game is to knock down the kubbs on the other side of the field and then the king," Stephen said. "The game is never the same and that's what I love about it. It's a lot of fun."

There can be anywhere from two to six players per team. The batons have to be thrown underhand. No one keeps score in this game. It ends when one team knocks over the king piece in the middle, which cannot be knocked down until all your team's kubbs are down.

"I would say the average game is 20 to 25 minutes," Stephen said. "Everybody and anybody can step in and play Kubb. The dynamic is so fun. It lends itself to a lot of enjoyment."

If you want to start playing Kubb at home, you can find sets for sale on the internet. Stephen said that Menards had carried the sets at one point, probably since the company is based in Eau Claire.

If you can, take the time to check out this fun outdoor game and give it a try. Kubbapalooza this weekend will be a great way to see it in action and cheer on the teams competing.

Regal Ware has announced that it is in negotiations to sell the Kewaskum manufacturing facility. Regal Ware currently occupies a portion of the 580,000 square foot building for the cast aluminum cookware division and the outlet store. James Moran, Regal Ware's senior vice president of corporate administration, stated employees were made aware of the pending sale a number of weeks ago and that an offer to purchase the facility has been accepted. Moran went on to say that Regal Ware would lease a quarter of the building to continue the cast aluminum cookware division that employs 30-50 people. It is expected the closing will be mid-September of this year.

Three bids had been obtained to furnish and install main entry doors at the Kewaskum Middle School. The bidders included Laforce for \$43,880, Rinderle Door Co. for \$44,111, and Consolidated Doors Inc. for \$55,907. The project was completed for \$43,880. The Washington County Health Department reports five dead crows found in West Bend (one), Germantown (two), the Town of Wayne (one), and the Town of Farmington (one) have tested positive for West Nile Virus. West Nile Virus is spread to humans through the bites of infected mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes get the virus by feeding on infected birds. This mosquito season, two humans have been identified with West Nile Virus in Wisconsin.

Work will be done from US Highway 41 to US Highway 45. The project is expected to cost \$2.02 million and 80 percent will be paid with federal funds, 20 percent with state funds.



VILLAGE OF EDEN EDEN, WISCONSIN SEWER USER CHARGES **ORDINANCE RATES IS** AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

An Ordinance fixing the Rates to be charged by the Village of Eden for Sewage Service to the Owners and Occupants of Benefitted Property to Provide Funds for the Retirement of Bonds as they Mature with Interest thereon, and to pay the cost of the management, maintenance, operation, repair, and depreciation of the sewage system and wastewater treatment plant.

The Village Board of the Village of Eden does ordain as follows:

SECTION I: The quarterly sewer use charge for each class of user shall be as follows:

SECTION III: Payment for sewer service shall become due 20 days after the end of the billing quarter or 20 days after the date of the billing as shown on the bill. Bills not paid on time shall be considered delinquent and shall be increased by a penalty of 5%.



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Wisconsin To Offer Additional COVID-19 Vaccine Dose To People Who Are Immunocompromised

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) supports the recommendation that some immunocompromised people are recommended and eligible to get an additional dose of Pfizer (ages 12 and up) or Moderna (ages 18 and up) COVID-19 vaccine following a completed series.

"Our nation's leading medical experts have reviewed the available data and made this recommendation to improve protection against COVID-19 for some of our most vulnerable populations," said DHS secretary-designee Karen Timberlake. "Clinical experts reviewing data from the first months of administering COVID-19 vaccines have determined that certain medical conditions and treatments keep people from building the full immunity we would expect from the original two-dose mRNA vaccine series."

After rigorous review of all available data, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) authorized the additional dose for certain immunocompromised people on Thursday. On Friday, August 13, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) voted unanimously to recommend an additional dose for individuals with specific medical conditions or who are receiving treatments that are associated with moderate to severe immune compromise.

This includes people who have:



- Been receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood.
- Received an organ transplant and are taking medicine to suppress the immune system.
- Received a stem cell transplant within the last two years or are taking medicine to suppress the immune system.
- Moderate to severe primary immunodeficiency (such as DiGeorge syndrome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome).
 Advanced or untreated HIV infection.
- Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids, alkylating agents, antimetabolites, transplant-related immunosuppressive drugs, cancer chemotherapeutic agents classified as severely immunosuppressive, tumor-necrosis (TNF) blockers, or other drugs that may suppress your immune response.

"The science has shown that those with weakened immune systems often do not develop the same level of immune response after their initial COVID-19 vaccine series as those with uncompromised immune systems," said Dr. Ryan Westergaard, chief medical officer for the Bureau of Communicable Diseases. "Fortunately, studies show that a third dose can help bolster the immune response in these individuals to achieve the same strong protection from the virus that those who are not immunocompromised were able to develop with just the twodose series. If you are not included in this new group of individuals recommended for an additional dose. you should be reassured that the data shows good protection with the one or two-dose COVID-19 vaccine series at this time."

The additional dose of mRNA

COVID-19 vaccine should be administered at least 28 days after completing the primary COVID-19 vaccine series. ACIP recommends that patients should receive the same vaccine product as the first two doses. However, if that is not feasible, a dose of the other mRNA COVID-19 vaccine is permitted. If you think you may be eligible, or are interested in additional information about the recommendation for an additional dose of COVID-19 vaccine, visit the DHS COVID-19 Additional Dose webpage.

At this time, fully vaccinated people who are not moderately or severely immunocompromised do not need an additional COVID-19 vaccine dose. As more information on additional, or booster, doses for the general public becomes available, DHS will update the public. It is important that until further guidance is released, those who are especially vulnerable to COVID-19 infection have adequate opportunity to get access an additional dose.
