

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### **Campbellsport Superintendent Leaving** At End Of School Year

The Campbellsport Board of Education, during its Monday, Sept. 27, school board meeting approved the resignation of district administrator Paul Amundson at the end of this school year. He will be leaving the district on June 30, 2022.

Amundson wanted to give the district time to find a replacement before he done. The school board will start discussing the process to find a new district administrator at the next school board meeting.

In other business, the board approved getting a certified surveyor map of the land south of Campbellsport where the "school forest" is located. A question came up with the actual lot lines for that piece of property.

"You received a letter about the school forest," Amundson said. "It might be prudent just to get a

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### PUBLISHER'S LETTER

### The Wager

Dear Reader,

Those who truly practice the Christian faith strive to be Christ-like in our daily living. Jesus' two commands in the New Testament are to

love God, and to love others as much as we love ourselves. Following His guidance helps us connect positively to those we meet on a daily basis – we try to accept others for what they are, help people in need,



and treat others as we would have them treat

The question is, are His teachings true? More fundamentally, is there a God Who has found us through a speck of space and time, and does He actually give a damn? Or are we merely contriving our own religions and evolving spirituality throughout the ages to make ourselves feel good? This is the true test of faith – what to believe in the seeming absence of irrefutable evidence that we can see, hear, and feel.

If you are a betting man or woman, you might consider Blaise Pascal's theory on this. Pascal lived and wrote in the seventeenth century and came up with a novel thought. Suppose you had to place a bet on whether Heaven and Hell exist. What happens with each half of this wager? (I use the word "wager" intentionally, because that was the name of his essay: The Wager.)

• Option 1: You bet that Heaven and Hell exist, and you live a good, moral life. If you are right, then your reward is going to Heaven – a good outcome. And if you are wrong, at least you led a good life.

• Option 2: You bet that Heaven and Hell don't exist, and you pack your life full of sin and self-ishness. If you are right, then you aren't punished by going to Hell, because Hell doesn't exist; but in a way you are punished, because everyone will avoid you and your evil stream of wreckage. And if you are wrong, and Heaven and Hell exist, well, guess where you are going.

It's a good argument for doing what is right. As for the larger question of God's existence... each of us must answer this in the quiet of our own soul. At the end of the day, perhaps we can truly believe that God is the ultimate datapoint of all universes, with infinite and universal power; that He will bring us to an electric, indescribable field of love in an afterlife that we can't even begin to imagine now... a love so omnipotent that even Satan can't resist.

### **Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports**

### **Fatal Crash**

On Sunday, September 26, at 2:39 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a single vehicle crash at County Highway A and Indian Lore Road in the Town of Farmington. Deputies responded along with personnel from Kewaskum and Boltonville fire departments, and West Bend Intercept.

Upon arrival, life-saving efforts were performed on the driver, a 71-year-old man, but were unsuccessful. A 64-year-old woman passenger was transported to Froedtert West Bend with non-life threatening injuries. Both occupants are from the Town of Farmington.

The crash remains under investigation, although a preliminary investigation revealed the driver had lost consciousness just prior to the crash, went off the road and struck a tree.

### **Crash With Injuries**

USPS 294-060

On Saturday, Sept. 25, at 3 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a two-ve-

hicle crash located at the intersection of County Highway K and Addison Road in the Town of Addison. Deputies responded along with personnel from Allenton and St. Lawrence fire departments, Hartford Rescue and Lifestar Rescue.

The first vehicle was occupied by an adult male and female from Illinois. Both of them had to be extricated and suffered minor injuries. The second vehicle was occupied by an adult male from Hartford. He was transported to the Hartford airport, in order for a Lifenet helicopter to transport to Aurora Summit. His injuries are unknown.

The crash remains under investigation, although a preliminary investigation revealed that the offending driver had failed to stop at the intersection.

### **Infant Death Investigation**

The Washington County Sheriff's Office is investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of a four-month-old female infant at a campground in the Town of Farmington on September

21. The mother, a 38-year-old Washington County woman, called 911 at 7:34 a.m. and reported her infant was not breathing and she was attempting to drive her infant to a medical facility. Deputies were able to meet the mother on Lakeview Road at County Highway A and take over CPR from a family friend and good Samaritan until medical responders arrived on scene.

The infant was transported to Froedtert West Bend where she was subsequently pronounced deceased. The preliminary investigation suggests the baby had been sleeping in bed with the mother overnight. Washington County detectives continue to investigate the exact circumstances leading up to the tragic death.

The sheriff's office would like to extend its gratitude to the good Samaritans, the responding deputies, Fillmore First Responders, Newburg Rescue and West Bend Intercept, all of whom attempted lifesaving efforts on the infant.

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### Heroes Of The Holyland — Ambrose Lisowe, Sr.

Ambrose Lisowe, Sr. was born in Brothertown on April 26th, 1926, the oldest child of Irene and Leo Lisowe. He grew up during the Great Depression, helping his family on their farm.

Ambrose had three brothers, Claude, Martin, and Marvin, and one sister, Mary. When he got to school age, he walked the one-anda-half miles (both ways) to school in Jericho. Occasionally if they were in town, or the weather was too cold, his dad or a neighbor would give him a ride home. After graduating eighth grade, he went back to helping his family on their farm.

Ambrose was drafted into the US Army on January 4, 1946. His parents, fearful of losing their oldest son, decided to have another child so they wouldn't have time to think about his death if he did not come home. Mary was born while her 20-year-old brother was serving in the Army.

Ambrose went to basic training at Camp Crowder in Minnesota. After basic training, he served as a hospital orderly at Oliver General hospital in Augusta, Georgia. He was discharged on May 6, 1947.

In 1951, Ambrose's brother Martin was drafted in the Army and served as a cook in Korea until being discharged in April 1953.

Besides his brother, Ambrose had four brothers-in-law who served in the military:

- · David Heller was drafted into the Army in 1966, serving in Vietnam as a truck driver until being discharged as an E5 specialist in 1968.
- Wilbert Stecker was drafted into the Navy, serving from 1945-1946 in maintenance as a fireman 2nd class. He was stationed in the port of Oregon.
- · Herman Stecker enlisted and served in the Navy in 1952 serving on the USS Gilmore.
- Allen Stache was drafted into the Navy from 1952-1955, serving as Fireman I on the USS Marion County.

Ambrose met his future wife while driving his best friend, Pat Amel and his date, Lorna Stecker home from a dance. After Pat fell asleep in the back seat, Ambrose talked to the pretty redhead as he drove her home to Hilbert, asking her out on a date, and the rest was history.

They dated a few years, and were married on February 8th, 1950, in Potter. Ambrose and Lorna have 10 children: Jim, Don, Jerry, Karen, Rosemary, Chuck, twins Mariann and Marilyn, Ambrose, Jr., and Joe.

In the early 1960s, Ambrose saw a farm he really liked and told himself that one day he was going to buy that

farm. In 1965, he and Lorna bought the 200-acre Paul Langenfeld farm, one of the bigger farms of that time.

In 1971, Ambrose and Lorna's oldest son, Jim was drafted in the army, driving truck on convoys in Thailand and Cambodia for five months before being assigned to drive the colonel's jeep. He was discharged in April of 1972, as an E4 Sargent.

Ambrose and Lorna's daughter Karen married Duane "Jack" Heller who was drafted into the Army in 1969, serving as a Mortar Combat Sargeant. He was discharged in July of 1971 as an E5 Sargent.

As their family grew to include spouses and grandchildren. Ambrose and Lorna bought neighboring farms, and all three generations could be found working on the farm. In 1979, Ambrose and Lorna consolidated the farms by forming A&L Lisowe and Sons, Incorporated. By this time they did custom work for area farmers, besides their own field and farm work.

Ambrose has always loved farming. As a true farmer, it's still his favorite subject to talk about. While

Ambrose managed the operation of the farm, Lorna handled all the bookwork, oftentimes working late into the evenings, accounting for every penny.

Ambrose has three grandchildren who enlisted in the service. His grandson, Allen Lisowe (Jerry) enlisted in the Army from 19921995, and was discharged as an E4 Specialist, serving as a cook in South Carolina.

His granddaughter Jenny Warner enlisted in the Air Force in 1993 because her grandpa and dad, Jim, served, and she wanted to trav-

### KEWASKUM'S DAYS GONE BY

#### **5 Years Ago** October 6, 2016

Farmington resident Gordon Haberman is one step closer to bringing Saudi Arabia to justice for any role it may have played in the terrorist attacks that killed his daughter. Andrea Haberman was in the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. Congress on September 28 resoundingly voted to override President Barack Obama's veto of the Justice Against Sponsors of Terrorism Act. New legislation allows families of those killed in the terrorist attacks that day to sue Saudi Arabia. Haberman is one of 19 people who served on the national JASTA family committee that developed and presented the anti-terrorism bill to U.S. legislators. The committee represents more than 9,000 family members and survivors of the 9/11 attacks.

For years, Isabelle Muckerheide routinely sent in articles to the Statesman about her family reunions. The most recent submission was published two weeks ago. Isabelle passed away September 20 at the age of 96.

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

survey. I am checking that out and have calls out to several surveyors.'

Board members agreed with that thinking.

"It's a good idea for us to have it," said Danielle Neitzel. "I don't think it is an unnecessary cost on our end."

The board also approved the bus contract with Johnson Bus for the school year. They also approved an FFA field trip to Indianapolis for the National FFA Convention.

Eden Elementary School principal Jenni Tamblingson presented the board members with bags of flavored popcorn as a treat to say thank you for their service to the school board. She did that in recognition of the upcoming school board convention.

"It's important that we honor and recognize your service to the community," Tamblingson said. "On behalf of the administration, our staff and our students, we thank you."

### COVID-19

During the annual meeting on Monday, Sept. 20, Amundson gave residents an update on the district's plan with the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic. He explained that things are going well so far this school year. There are some staff and students out right now either testing positive for COVID or quarantining because of exposure.

"We are attempting everything we can to keep students in school," Amundson said. "We depend on parents keeping their students home if they are sick and our staff staying at home if they are sick."

He reiterated those comments at this week's meeting.

"Our numbers in the school still fluctuate," he said (about 13 percent of the student body was sick last Thursday). "This is low even for flu season. Numbers at the state and county level seem to be plateauing. We're not there and we're not recommending that (mask mandate) at this time."

He explained that the district is currently work-

ing with the Department of Public Instruction to set up COVID-19 testing in the school district.

"One other thing we are going to do in the district, we are going to be providing testing in our schools," Amundson said. "It will take a couple weeks to get going. That will be available for students, staff and family members. We're looking at two people in the district set up to give those vaccines to students with parent consent or to adults.

"We are still asking parents to keep the kids home if they are sick. We are also getting more of the testing kits so we can test in the school district."

#### 2015 Referendum

During the annual meeting, Amundson also gave a summary of the 2015 building referendum. This referendum saw its completion this year. The first bond of \$10,000,000 was taken out in 2017. The second bond of \$13,400,000 was taken out in 2018. All money for this project had to be used by June 30 of this year.

Amundson explained that all three phases of the referendum were completed. The first was the replacement of the 1935-1938 portion of the middle/high school building along with remodeling and updating in other portions of the building. The next phase was changing the HVAC system at Eden Elementary School.

The final phase was changing the HVAC system in the north hall of the high school. This portion was completed this summer.

The amount the district borrowed for the project was \$23,400,000. The actual costs for the three projects was \$22,503,764,66. This left \$1,058,999.55 not used on the project.

"The board is going to have to deal with this," Amundson said. "Once we get this audited, the board will be paying down the debt service as recommended by our financial advisors. Not all of it was spent, but we will turn it around and pay off debt service with that."

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



## The Pitt Stop BY JASON PITTMANN | KHS ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

### From My Perspective

First off, I have never claimed to be one to know it all — about ANY subject. However, I have made observations over the years in my chosen professions of education and athletics. I would like to share a few of those with you in this column.

To begin with, perspective is everything. In my positions I am always having to remind myself to try to put on the other person's shoes or see through their eye glasses so I can have an idea of where they are coming from if they have a dialogue with me. I think that is important for everyone to do.

Today I will look mainly at coaching. I think it is important that everyone involved in an athletic program look through the same glasses. Being in Kewaskum I always refer to greencolored glasses. If we have some people looking from a personal perspective and some through the glasses of the team or program, there is the distinct possibility of disagreement.

That is where it is important for us to have as many people as possible looking from a similar perspective. Does this mean that everything will be without issue and there will be zero problems? Of course not, but it does help people to give pause before saying things, because they need to look at a different perspective.

Sometimes I hear complaints of favoritism. For many years I have told my students and athletes that I do have "favorites." I am human. My favorite students and athletes are those that are on time (early, in my book), prepared, give their best effort, and be a good person. None of the four things I listed are things that I personally impact for any of the students I've worked with over the years. They have 100 percent ownership of those categories. I would venture to guess that any employer asks for the same three things from anyone they hire.

The last part of this column will deal with the responsibilities of the students. If a student has a question about playing time, I believe it is incumbent upon them to initiate a conversation if they are not sure why the situation is what it is. It is their experience and I want them to take ownership of it.

I hear from people that it is hard to put a student in a position like that. I agree that it can be daunting for some, but that it is also an opportunity for growth. It is a chance for them to spread their wings as a young adult and learn how to have a conversation like that now, instead of the first experience being when in the "real world" as an adult.

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM ORDINANCE NO. 21-05 ORDINANCE TO AMEND 95-74(a)(4) OF CHAPTER 95 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE PRIVATE SWIMMING POOLS

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Sections 95-74(a)(4) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to Private Swimming Pools, should be amended as follows:

Sec. 95-74. - Accessory use regulations.

Accessory uses are permitted in any district as may be specified in the appropriate district regulations or herein. An accessory use building permit shall be required where specifically noted in section. Accessory are permitted only uses after their principal structure is present or under construction. The and/or location use requirements stipulated elsewhere in this Ordinance may be modified for accessory uses as follows:

- (a) Accessory uses and detached accessory structures. Accessory uses and detached accessory structures shall be permitted in the rear yard otherwise unless only. specified. Accessory structures shall not occupy more than 20 percent of the rear vard in all districts except the business and manufacturing district where such structures shall not occupy more than 50 percent of the rear yard.
- 4. Private swimming pools. Private swimming pools, upon the issuance of a building permit, provided that:
- a. All private swimming pools shall be surrounded by a fence or wall not less than four feet or more than six and one-half feet in height designed to prevent unguarded entry to the pool. There shall be no opening in said fence or wall larger than six square inches. The space between the bottom of a

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fence and the surface underneath shall not exceed four inches. Sidewalls of aboveground pools which are at least four feet high may be used in lieu of a fence.

b. Access to private swimming pools shall be controlled to prevent unguarded entry into a pool. Access to inground pools shall be controlled by a self-closing and selflatching gate and all such gates shall be kept closed and securely locked at all times when the pool is unattended. Latches shall be located at least three and one-half feet above ground, deck, stairs. When not completely fenced, all ladders, steps, or other means of access to an aboveground pool shall be removed and/or designed to prevent access, such as a tip-up ladder, when the pool is unattended.

- c. Swimming pools shall not be constructed directly under or over electric transmission lines or within 15 feet of such lines. If the electric lines are underground, this separation distance may be reduced to five feet. All electrical to connections а swimming pool shall be properly grounded so that no electrical current can be discharged into any part of the swimming pool or surrounding fence. All electrical installations shall comply with the National Electric Code or these regulations, whichever are more restrictive.
- d. All pools shall be maintained in such a way create a as to not nuisance, hazard, eyesore, or be a detriment to public health, safety, or welfare. The drainage of any pool may not be discharged onto adjoining property. The pool may, however, be drained into village streets or gutters which empty into the village's storm sewer.
- e. Equipment shall be provided for the disinfection of all pool water. No gaseous chlorination shall be permitted.
- f. No lighting installed around swimming pools shall throw any rays onto adjacent properties.
- g. Heating units, pumps, and filter equipment shall be adequately housed and muffled in such a manner as not to create a nuisance. Such equipment shall be located no closer than ten feet to a lot line.
- h. There shall be an unobstructed areaway around all pools of at least three feet in width.
- i. No private swimming pool shall be located closer than ten feet to a lot line and detached structures, with the exception of air playsets, conditioners, patios, and compost bins. The zoning administrator

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may grant a waiver from the requirement that a swimming pool be located at least ten feet from a structure and permit such swimming pool within five feet of the structure. The zoning administrator shall consider the health, safety, general welfare, and aesthetics of the proposed construction before granting such a waiver.

j. Private swimming pools, together with other accessory structures regulated by section 95-74, shall not occupy more than 50 percent of the rear yard area.

k. Exempt pools. Storable swimming or wading pools with maximum а dimension of 10 feet and a maximum wall height of 24 inches, and which are so constructed that it may be readily disassembled for storage and reassembled to its original integrity, are exempt from the provisions of this section provided they are securely covered or emptied when not in use.

Section 2. Severability. The several sections of Ordinance this are declared to be severable. If any section or portion thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful or unenforceable, such decision shall apply only to the specific section or portion thereof directly specified in the decision, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections or portions thereof of the Ordinance. The remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Anv other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this are hereby Ordinance repealed as to those terms that conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law.
