Trinity Lutheran School In Waucousta Awarded \$10,000

When students came to school at Trinity Lutheran School (Waucousta) on Tuesday, Oct. 12, there were large cardboard boxes sitting in the back of their classroom.

The students did not know what was in the boxes. Their teacher and school principal, David Wege, told them it was a secret.

But he said it with such enthusiasm that they knew it was something huge.

They couldn't wait to find out. Finally, at 12:45 p.m., all the students in grades one through eight gathered in Wege's classroom. They tuned in for a virtual meeting, with representatives joining them from across the country.

It was then that the students learned what the surprise was: Their school had was the winner of the fifth annual Cha-Ching Money Smart Kids Pledge Challenge.

That meant that the school was receiving a \$10,000 grant from Jackson Charitable Foundation to spark financial literacy education at their school, along with \$1,000 designated for a philanthropic donation of the school's choosing.

The students broke out in applause when they heard the news.

"As a small parochial school, we often miss out on grants and donations that are awarded based on student population. The Cha-Ching

Survey Addresses Future Of i4Learning Community School

Residents in the Kewaskum School District are going to be asked whether they support closing the i4Learning Community School (i4L), formerly called Wayne Elementary School.

The question appears in a survey that is scheduled to land in residents' mailboxes during the first week of November. Residents will be asked to respond by Nov. 23. The survey, which the Kewaskum School Board approved on Oct. 14, also asks residents whether they would support raising taxes through an ongoing operational referendum instead of closing i4L. The school is located at 5760 Mohawk Road on the district's west side in the Town of Wayne. According to the survey, i4L currently serves 97 students in grades one through five, down from an average of 117 students over the past three years. Prior to last year, the school included both 4K and 5K.

Wayne Elementary School was renamed i4Learning Community School in 2015 when it became a charter school with multi-age classrooms with project-based learning. The five-year charter contract between i4L and the Kewaskum School District ended in March 2020. and staff, to explore consolidating our elementary schools to save money. The committee was led by school board members Stephanie Bird and Timothy Ramthun.

According to the survey, the ad hoc committee found:

• In the next 10 years, the i4L building will need an estimated \$1.2 million to address maintenance needs (roofing, flooring, etc.). This is higher than the other two elementary schools on a per-stu-

dent basis.

• If i4L were closed, the district would save approximately \$325,000 annually in operating ex-

Washington County Hosts Roundtable Meeting

In an effort to reach out to Latinos and Hispanics during National Hispanic Heritage Month and understand the challenges facing this community, Washington County Executive Josh Schoemann arranged the first-ever roundtable with 11 area business owners at Casa Guadalupe on Tuesday, Oct. 12. According to the last Census, there are approximately 4,400 individuals in Washington County who identify as Hispanic or Latino.

"From listening to the business owners, I wasn't surprised to learn that the primary barrier to keeping their businesses profitable is employee shortages," Schoemann said. "The government and enhanced unemployment handouts aren't the answer. Now that the deadline to receive federal extended unemployment benefits ended Sept. 4, we need to work together and hit the problem straight on by creating incentives and opportunities to attract employees and keep them here."

In addition to the workforce issue, the group also discussed barriers to business ownership, including computer skills, sound business practices, as well as how the county can connect their needs to Washington County's opportunities. Roundtable participants included Lily Alvarado, program manager for bilingual education programming and outreach at Wisconsin Women's Business Initiative Corporation (WWBIC) in Milwaukee, Peter Snyder, associ-

Fall Allergies are Here

Although we typically associate allergy season with the spring, for many allergy sufferers, the fall can be just as bad. Ragweed and mold are the biggest triggers of allergies this time of year.

Symptoms of fall allergies may include itchy nose, watery eyes, sneezing, runny nose, nasal congestion, headaches, ear itching or popping, and throat irritation. October is National Indoor Air Quality Awareness Month, which makes this the perfect time for local families to make sure their homes are properly protected from fall allergens.

According to the American Lung Association, people take an average of 21,600 breaths per day. With 80 percent of our time spent indoors, the quality of the air we breathe is very important. Children who have been forced to spend a lot of time indoors over the past year and a half may have stronger allergic reactions due to limited exposure to outdoor elements.

Fall Allergy Facts

Ragweed

Ragweed is the most comment fall allergen.

Its pollen is very small and highly concentrated. It begins to release in late August, peaks in September, and may last until the first freeze kills the plant.

Pollen counts are highest around the plants near dawn, but they can travel hundreds of miles and releases in most other areas between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

About 75 percent of people allergic to spring plants also have reactions to ragweed.

Outdoor Mold

Mold spore counts tend to rise dramatically in the autumn season with falling leaves and dying plants.

Mold thrives in moist conditions like piles of damp leaves. Counts often jump in early autumn as leaves fall from trees but before the drier humidity conditions of winter set in. Rainy autumn and winter seasons may lead to very high outdoor mold counts that can last several days after each rainfall.

Gardening in mulch or dirt, farming or hiking in the woods can also increase exposure to mold spores this time of year.

Top Five Tips to Keep Your Home Allergy-Free This Fall

The First Heat - Dust mites, mold and other allergens in a home's vents can be activated when people turn on the heat the first time in the fall. Before running the heat, get your air ducts cleaned and change the filter. The National Air Duct Cleaners Association (NADCA) suggests cleaning air ducts every three-five years. It is recommended to use filters with a MERV (Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value) rating between 8 and 10 and a thickness of one inch.

Keep the Outdoors Out - When coming inside, it is important to remove shoes and wipe down pets to avoid tracking in allergens. Wear a mask when raking leaves to avoid breathing mold spores and change clothes after doing yard work to prevent the spread of pollen around the house. Limit your pets' time outside and wipe them down to remove pollen when they come indoors.

Purify the Air - Most air purifiers have HEPA filters that remove up to 99 percent of airborne allergens, including pollen, dust and pet dander and mold spores. A mid-priced model can cost \$50-125, for a room-sized system. Place it in your bedroom,

penses and would sell the building. According to the district's bus company, if i4L closed, the maximum time students spend on a bus would not increase.

The survey states that a recent Kewaskum area population study predicts elementary student enrollment across the district will stay steady (between 822 and 849 students) over the next 10 years.

However, in a study presented to the Kewaskum School Board on Oct. 14. one projection from Community Planning & Consulting shows the population of elementary school students going up to 871 students in 2025.

Kewaskum Elementary School has a capacity of 725 students; Farmington Elementary School has a capacity of 375 students and i4L has a capacity of 175 students.

The survey also asks residents for feedback on their overall satisfaction with the Kewaskum School District, including the district's communication, student learning and finance. The school district plans to use the survey to develop a plan to guide future decisions, according to Dr. Mark Bazata, district administrator. Feedback will help the district identify what is going well and find areas for improvement.

The staff enjoys knowing that they are meeting the physical needs of the students and ensuring that their stomachs are being fed to ensure their brains are ready for additional learning in the classroom, according to a press release from the school district.

October 11-15 is designated National School Lunch Week (NSLW). This year's theme is WILD About School Lunch. President John F. They rely heavily on mobile devices, social network substantially, are used to instant connection and can easily multitask between work and entertainment on all their devices. The internet is their major source of information. Digital immigrants have had to learn technology and some still rely on print for information over technology. 4,000 MPTC Scholarship Opportunity Announced For A 2022 KHS Graduate










Mikaela Marquardt answers a Ripon serve as Kewaskum goes on to claim a victory over Ripon in a home game on Oct. 7.





A winning streak in sports can create a lot of pressure from game to game. The tension builds each week as teams want to be the one to break your streak. The same can be said for losing streaks, the pressure of winning a game can seem overbearing and out of reach when your team hasn't tasted victory.

I for one can attest to the pressure that mounts when a winning streak is on the line every night. When I arrived at Campbellsport, the Cougar Wrestlers had an amazing conference winning streak that covered nearly two decades. Talk about pressure when I took over for Sarge. We were able to run that streak to 218 straight dual meet wins until 2001. The excitement from week to week and year to year was incredible.

In football, winning streaks can take years to add up because you only play nine to 14 games a season. Recently, Kimberly had a 70game winning streak that was broke by Fond du Lac a couple years ago; at the time it was the longest winning streak in the nation for football.

The Muskego football team was starting to put together a run like Kimberly, but their 41game winning streak was snapped a couple of weeks ago by Oconomowoc. The current longest streak in the state of Wisconsin is 17 straight wins by Cumberland. As far as conference winning streaks in Wisconsin, Regis is the leader with 29 straight wins. Bangor had the record until two weeks ago when Luther snapped their streak at 40. One of Campbellsport's old EWC foes, Plymouth, has won 20 straight conference games.

On the other side of the coin is the notso-friendly losing streaks. Nobody wants to be a part of these unfavorable records. Unfortunately, some football teams in the state haven't walked off the field a winner in quite some time. Eau Claire North endured a lot of pain the last six seasons as they entered this season with a 49-game losing streak. The streak was finally broken at 51 games as they defeated La Crosse Logan 20-14 in week three. Eau Claire North is still the owner of the state's longest conference losing streak as they have dropped 44 straight games in the Big Rivers Conference.

The current longest losing streak in the state for football is held by Wayland Academy at 43 games. North Fond du Lac of the Flyway Conference is second on the list at 41 games. North Fondy has not won a conference football game since October 13 of 2013. Another local team, West Bend West, has gone dry in the win department; the Spartans have lost 35 straight games, including 30 in the conference.
