## A hunting success

Matthew Buss shot an 11-point buck with his crossbow on Sunday, Oct. 24.

It was the first time Matthew ever went hunting. And he got the deer with his first shot.

But Matthew had been preparing for his big day for a long time.

### Lots of practice

Matthew, who is now 18, has watched his dad, Scott Buss, hunt for years.

"He has been with me when I hunted since he was probably 4 years old. He always sat with me," Scott said.

Scott never imagined back in those early years that Matthew would ever be able to hunt himself. After all, Matthew has Down syndrome.

But a couple years ago, someone from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) told Scott that there are a lot of kids with special needs who hunt.

"You can mentor him his whole life. As long as

### WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF REPORTS

### Death investigation

On Friday, Nov. 5, at 3:57 p.m., the Washington County Sheriff's Office 911 Communications Center received a cellular 911 call from a male individual who indicated he wanted to commit suicide. The despondent caller would not provide any other details, but communication officers were able to determine the caller was outside and at a residence in the Town of Polk. Sheriff's deputies responded to the home.

The preliminary investigation suggests two sheriff's deputies arrived nearly simultaneously and located a male individual sitting underneath a grove of pine trees on the edge of the property, adjacent to the right-of-way. Deputies began talking to the man when one deputy observed a firearm in the man's hand. Within moments of the deputy telling the man to drop the gun, the man tragically took his own life.

Since sheriff office personnel were on scene and speaking with the man at the time of the incident, the sheriff's office requested the West Bend Police Department conduct the primary investigation. This procedure maintains transparency with the public by having an independent investigation into the facts of the case.

The sequence of events this afternoon resulted in the death of a young Washington County man. The incident illustrates the tragic consequences of mental health issues in communities and the challenges public safety face. Although the sheriff's office is not naming the victim, it asks that you keep the family in your thoughts as they grieve the loss of a loved one.

Any inquiries about the case should be directed to the West Bend Police Department as the lead investigative agency.

he hunts with you, and you are there with him the whole time, you can let Matthew hunt, as long as you, his parent, are are comfortable with it,' the DNR representative told Scott.

So, Scott decided to teach Matthew how to use a compound bow. But although Matthew was able to pull the bow back, he was not strong enough to shoot it with the force required to harvest a deer.

Scott reached out to the DNR for advice, and a warden recommended that Matthew try using a crossbow.

"So, we bought Matthew a crossbow for his birthday two years ago," Scott said.

Since then, Scott has been working with Matthew, teaching him how to use the crossbow.

"First I did a lot of safety training with him. And then he had lots and lots of practice," Scott said.

### The hunt

Finally, Scott felt that Matthew was prepared to hunt. So, on Sunday, Oct. 24, he brought Matthew hunting for the first time on their property in Montello.

The two hunters, father and son, climbed into their hunting blind at 6:30 a.m.

They sat quietly and waited for about an hour. Then, at about 7:30 a.m., they saw the buck. It was a big one, with 11 points. They waited for the buck to walk within range.

Scott got Matthew all set up for the right moment. Then, as the buck walked closer, Scott told Matthew to start aiming.

Finally, he told Matthew, "If you are ready, go ahead."

Then, the deer turned sideways, and Matthew shot. It was a perfect shot.

"The deer didn't run very far, maybe 40 yards through the field, and that was it," Scott said with

The whole thing happened quickly. Matthew shot the buck at about 7:45 a.m., just an hour and 15 minutes after the hunt started.

"It was an 11-point buck; it should have been a 12 pointer, but one of the points broke off. Still, it was an 11-pointer, which is awesome - It is bigger than any deer that I've shot," Scott said. "It was Matthew's first time bow hunting with his crossbow after two years of safety training and practice, and it finally paid off for him. We are so proud of him."

### **Making memories**

Matthew will be able to remember his remarkable first hunt; his parents are having the buck mounted.

The hunt was a nice touch on what has been an incredible year thus far for Matthew.

Another highlight this year for Matthew, who is a senior at Kewaskum High School, was scoring a touchdown during a special exhibition play during the Kewaskum High School football game against Kettle Moraine Lutheran on Sept. 3.

"That was awesome, too. It was just incredible," Scott said.

It was especially great for Matthew because football has always been his first love. He gets that passion for football from his mother, Terry Buss, according to Scott.

Now, in addition to being a football player, Matthew is also a hunter.

On the day he reported to Fort Lewis, his cousin was also there shipping out to Korea. "I was coming in and he was checking out," Dave said.

When Dave got there, the line for checking in was very long (about a half mile according to Dave). He figured with that line, he would never get to see his cousin before he shipped out.

Then, there was a scuffle at the front of the line where a soldier probably tried to sneak into the line, Dave thought.

"Well everybody broke the line and ran up there to see what was going on," Dave said. "I did too, but I took my duffle bag with me and when it was all over, I was the first in line. So after all that, I got checked in and was able to see my cousin."

Because of this scuffle and Dave being able to move to the front of the line, he was able to go to Korea. There was a quota of military police being taken to Korea and the rest were going to Japan. So he got to go to Korea because of that fight and the fact that Dave was the only one who thought to bring his stuff with him when checking out the fight.

"I was third in command (in his MP group in Korea)," Dave said. "I was Sergeant of Guard."

As part of the military police in Korea, Dave was on the Board of Governors with the NCO Club. Dave's participation in this club left him with some very unique responsibilities.

"I was in charge of hauling the girls, or women, for our dances," Dave chuckled. "That's what my job was."

He would take a "deuce-and-a-half" (2 1/2 ton) truck into town and find girls to bring back for the dances. They would fill the back of this truck.

His unit had four of those types of trucks and Dave was in charge of all four of them.

At his camp, the soldiers lived in huts that would fit about 30 soldiers in it. It was a little bit tight and cramped in there. Because Dave was an MP, he had different quarters that were a bit nicer and not so cramped.

"Being an MP, you had your privileges," Dave said.

Dave was drafted into the Army. His group was stationed with the 101st Airborne unit. It was funny that his military police unit was stationed with the Airborne because that is what the Army had wanted Dave to do when he was drafted, but he wanted to be an MP.

He admitted that his interest was in serving his time and then getting out of the Army. Dave wanted to get home so he could start a family and get on with his life, which is just what he did.

Dave started his own construction company

which won a lot of acclaim over the years. "I must have built about 1,000 houses around Milwaukee," he said.

### **Honor Flight**

Dave's Honor Flight was held on Saturday, Aug. 28. It was something that Dave and Chris had been talking about for a few years.

"I've been at fundraisers for it," Chris said. "We've been talking about this for years. I filled out the application after COVID."

Chris and her husband picked Dave up on that Friday and had him stay overnight at their house. They didn't stay up very late because they had to be ready to leave the house very early.

"We got up at 2:30 a.m. because we had to be at the airport by 4:30 a.m.," Chris said.

Normally the groups fly into the Washington, DC airport. This was changed for this year and had the planes fly into Baltimore and then drive to DC.

They only had about one-third the number of people on the plane as a normal Honor Flight (102 people total on two planes). The buses were also not as full as they normally would run them. This was a COVID precaution and it made it a lot easier to load and unload the planes and the buses.

Not only did it make it easier to move around, it gave them some extra time too.

"Because the numbers were so low, we got to about three more monuments than they normally do," Chris said.

"We saw everything," Dave said.

As with any Honor Flight, the group went to Arlington National Cemetery, the World War II monument, the Vietnam Memorial Wall, the Korean monument and many more.

"I was surprised by the size of the statues," Dave said.

Dave admitted that he wondered why they just didn't look at the monuments on television. He thought that would be just as good as in person. That was until he got there and saw everything and was in amazement.

The only bad thing about the trip was the weather. "It was 100 degrees," Dave said.

They had a very hot day to be walking around Washington, D.C. Organizers made sure the Veterans and their guardians were drinking enough water throughout the day.

On the flight home, they surprised the Veterans with the popular "Mail Call." Each Veteran received a packet of letters and cards from family members and some from people they didn't know. Dave still had his more than a month after the flight.

Upon landing back home in Milwaukee, they had a lot of people there to greet them.

"They had all those military people saluting us," Dave said. "They really made you feel important. Everyone treated us so well. It was a great trip."

The entire experience was something that neither of them would ever forget. It was more than they could have imagined from start to finish.

"I could only describe it as life-changing," Chris said. "Everyone should go. It was amazing."

# New scholarship available for first responders



### The Kermis and a Coin


A circular item laid somewhere in the midst of soil, gravel, rocks and what some would consider clean fill. I picked it up on an April day this spring, and realized it was a coin. There was no monetary worth to this currency, but she was rich in history. Once I was able to read it, I got chills from luck, appreciation and what's ever on the other side. Only one person ever taught me on this Dutchman of Ashford, whose name is on the trade item. It took the fall to realize that the token, which was good for five cents "at the bar" of William Leisses, filled in answers on the Kermis.

### **Enter Wilhelm Leisses**

Wilhelm Leisses is Dutch if you ask Benny Hall, William's great grandson and honey connoisseur. Benny's dad was Florian Hall, whose mom was Agatha Leisses Hall. Agatha was the daughter of William Leisses of the bar token. William's name on his grave marker is "Wilhelm," and is used the rest of the article.

What we know about Wilhelm was that he was associated with the cheese factory in Ashford in the late 1800s. Records also indicate that he was the postmaster of Ashford in the 1890s. His name on records has a tendency to be misspelled, as a cursive L in Leisses could be confused as an S. He married a Regina Berg; they had three children which lived to adulthood: Agatha, Albert and Olive. Wilhelm passed away abruptly in 1900.

There is a lot of information we don't know in regard to Wilhelm. The cause of his death wasn't discussed much with the family afterwards. Benny Hall said that was still unclear. In addition, a veteran's marker is on his grave, but it is not certain where his military service extended. Born during

the Civil War, his options of service would be military force on Native Americans of the late 1800s or the Spanish American War of 1898, but by the latter Wilhelm was in his late 30s. His ownership of the tavern in Ashford is vaguely defined. We don't know when his era started. It seems to be his by the 1890s for certain.

The bigger question is whether Wilhelm is Dutch. His father Johann was born in the 1820s, and came to America through Amsterdam, which Benny points as evidence he was Dutch. In contrast, if he was German he would have left port at Hamburg, Germany.

When Johann Leisses died in 1912, outlasting his son by over a decade, the death notice mentioned "a pioneer settler of Wisconsin" passed by his daughter, Mrs. Charles Wagner, in Ashford Township. Find A Grave's website is more specific, and notes that Johann, the first Leisses in Ashford, came from Hollenfels, which is within the canton (district) of Mersch within Luxembourg. Luxembourg is small, and there are only two cantons today which don't touch a foreign country. So Johann was in the heart of present day Luxembourg.

The problem is one could probably call the Leisses Luxembourger, German or Netherlandish. The family summation matches 1800s maps of Europe, because Luxembourg was known as the Catholic Netherlands. It is assumed they spoke German within Ashford. Johann was born in

"Luxembourg, Germany," according to the Fond du Lac Commonwealth Reporter's coverage of his

Looking at a map is very important in regard to where the Leisses came from as Luxembourg touches France, Belgium and Germany. It is only about 220 miles to get from Johann's hometown to Amsterdam. At the time of publication, less information was available on Johann's wife (Wilhelm's mother), Maria Blasius Leisses, as she had already died in 1880.

### "Na Buba na bald is Kirmess"

The Leisses story is one of a cultural merger within Ashford. They apparently were Luxembourgers who consider themselves Dutch and spoke German. Here's an example of this cultural mixture in the center of Ashford Township 111 years ago, as we celebrate another Kermis this Nov. 14 with chili and chicken dumpling soup at St. Martin's.

There were two headings for what was going on locally in Ashford in the Nov. 2, 1911 edition of the Campbellsport News. The first heading was "ASHFORD," and the subtitle was "Na Buba na bald is Kirmess." There was nothing news related to those two headings after the titles, as the next news story shared that "Frank Thelen and son Michael spent Thursday in Fond du Lac."

When you said "Kirmess" in 1911 you said it all. German was the language in Ashford in the early 1900s, but there are qualifications to the meaning of the aforementioned phrase. "Na buba" is better spelled today in German as "na bube," meaning "well boy." The 1911 'buba' could technically be a spelling error, but if read as written, is then both spoken and phonetically accurate. "Na bald" means soon, but by the time the paper used "is," the heading went back to English. Any true German knows "is" is "ist" auf Deutsch. More initially confusing, "Kirmess" may be spelled as if it were Dutch. Is this original spelling of the word tied to Wilhelm Leisses running the tavern which held the event?

The Kermis (today's Ashford spelling) has a different origin. But anyway you spell it, kermis is basically a European mixture of "church" and "mass," as typically a church service is given in honor of the saint in celebration.

Those who knew Ashford in the mid-1900s will explain the colloquial dialect was convoluted. Ashford wasn't just German, but also English, in what became a unique vernacular. Think about what it would be like to be speaking German at St. Martin's School in the 1920s, but an Ashford family subscribing to a local paper written in English (if they subscribed).

Those who know Ashford well know that those in the 1930s spoke German. But the geography of ancestors is layered just as much as the Leisses family. Some point out that the settlers of Ashford were Alsace-Lorraine, a region flipped between France and German in the world wars. Along with the French perspective, it has been argued that the common barn of the area with an overhang was a "French style" barn. However, it's apparent if they were French, they spoke or understood German.

So did Wilhelm Leisses speak German? Benny concluded yes, but qualified the location in which the family came from. "First of all, if they lived that close to the border [of Germany], they could probably speak French, German, Dutch. Whatever. They could do it all. And in those areas, depending on where you came from. It's just like down south, everybody had their accent. They spoke it with their accent .... So you could tell where they were from, and it didn't always sound right. And that's why the spelling is so off." He said it is "what we call PLUT Deutsch versus High German."

Benny pronounced it as "Plut," but linguistics spell this a "Plautdietsch" or an "East Low German" a "Plattdeutsch" or a "Neiderdeutsch." Because spelling was not a concern for old Ashford, we'll go with the "plut." Benny used the Thelen family as a great example of understanding this localized dialect in the mid-1900s of Ashford. Any comments and additions to this language's history is appreciated, and needs to be documented for this spoken history is fading quickly. Fittingly, Wilhelm Liesses (an alleged Dutchman from Luxembourg, Germany) spelled his name on the coin in English (William). Benny noted that his grave probably says Wilhelm because it accustomed the cemetery stone matching the baptismal name.

### "The Hall" in Ashford

In last week's article on the Kermis, it was clear modern day memories can extend to loved ones passed who had recalled the tavern and hall around 1910 in Ashford. We now can get into the 1890s and include more detail.

Previously trapped on the era of Rafenstein's owners, it was time to check Roderick Reese's records published on the Village of Campbellsport's website. His notes on the settlement of Ashford and its businesses are in R-023, an online document. Reese's work was likely done in the 1970s and 1980s. Accordingly (p.28), Frank Thelen purchased 50 acres in Section 17 in 1850 and established a saloon. "It is on the north side of Highway 67 in Ashford. This was the first saloon in the Town of Ashford." There is a big jump to "Mrs. Antone Thelen" who Reese cites as owning it in 1906. Then "Lowrenz Rafenstein" (Lorenz is the first name on his headstone—1872-1935) had a "Hotel & Saloon" starting in the same building as 1907. Rafenstein's is more common with those in their eighties today, and is verified by many. Ownership turns to Frank Fell in 1925, then his wife Clara in 1933. Michael Schill took over in 1937. All of the above in this paragraph comes from Reese's records.

Condensing those alive today to tell stories, they recollect that Rafensteins ran a great Kermis for their grandparents or parents. They also recall a party to behold in the 1940s and 1950s, and one that continued with John and Paula Fleischman once they took ownership and revived the Kermis in the 1950s and 1960s. But there is a gaping hole of documentation of what happened in the old days prior to "Mrs. Antone Thelen." This is where Willhelm Leisses comes back into play.

### The Farmer's Home

Reese's reference to a "Mrs. Antone Thelen" is a direct tie to Leisses. Benny Hall's family history includes documentation of a "Farmer's Home." This dance hall and tavern is the same building that stands open today on Highway 67, where the Kermis was consistently held in the first half of the 1900s. Wilhelm Leisses ran this tavern by the 1890s, and Benny has a copy of a photo that is connected to his "Uncle Vinny," Vincent Schmitt, who spent a great deal of time tending to St. Martin's Cemetery. Schmitt's photo of the tavern is dated 1893, and corroborates with other pictures of the tavern later owned by Rafensteins.


When Wilhlem Leisses died in 1900, his wife Regina must have retained ownership of the bar. She apparently staved in the tayern, and soon married an Anton Thelen. She and Anton had one child who died, and soon Anton died in 1903. This left a "Mrs. Antone Thelen" to pass on ownership to the Rafensteins according to Reese's records.

We know that Joe Serwe (1863-1942) said the tavern held the same Kermis going back to the 1890s. Therefore, at this point we are left to wonder who owned the tavern before Leisses. Did he buy the tavern from the Frank Thelen who established the saloon around or after 1850? Anton Thelen died (1871-1903) at age 32. His father was a "Franz

Thelen" (1820-1881), according to the website Find A Grave.

This may conclude full ownership history of the tavern, given "Franz Thelen" (website) is probably the same "Frank Thelen" (Reese's records) who established the bar. Because he built the bar, his life was probably dedicated to it until the end. He was only about 60 when he died, and his son Anton was too young (9 or 10 at the time) to take over the business. It may be at that point that Wilhelm started to take over the tavern and hotel. In theory, Wilhelm was older than Anton by 10 years, potentially being a close mentor to Anton. Clearly after Wilhelm died Anton was associated with the tavern, given Wilhelm and Anton's same widow owned the tavern in 1906. This would make even more sense if Anton's dad had built the bar Anton himself worked back into.

There's at least one person who could vouch or counter the connection to the Thelens and Wilhelm Leisses mentioned above. And that's the man who lost the bar token in rural Ashford Township more than 120 years ago. It's a wonder if the coin came out for use on the night of the "Kirmess."

The group connected through Facebook, with members helping one another reach new goals. The group is open to runners of all levels - beginners and medal winners alike. Through social media, they encourage one another and share information about various races, such as Abigail's Run for Endurance.

In April 2020, since many races were canceled due to covid, the group created a virtual 5K. The next month, the runners had a personal miles challenge and a group 5K run. That June brought a team miles challenge.

The group is open to anyone in the area who wants to speed walk or run. To join, visit the Kewaskum Area Running Group on Facebook. Runners of all levels are welcome.
























































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### Cathedral Concert planned for Nov. 14

The Fond du Lac Symphonic Band will present its 45th annual Cathedral Concert at St. Paul's Cathedral on Sunday, Nov. 14. Concerts at St. Paul's have been held every November since 1976, with the exception of 2020 due to pandemic restrictions. Under the direction of Music Director Dale Shipe and Associate Conductor Jill Wagner, the concert will begin at 3 p.m.

The highlights of this fall's Cathedral Concert include works by John Rutter, William Walton, Arturo Marquez, Morton Gould and Gioachino Rossini.

When one hears the name John Rutter, it is most often in conjunction with his choral works. Paul Noble has done a masterful job in A John Rutter Christmas, taking a variety of John Rutter's Christmas Carols and arranging them for the modern-day symphonic band. William Walton is well known for his composition, Crown Imperial. At this year's Cathedral Concert, the band will perform a different work of Walton's entitled Spitfire Prelude. It is considered one of Walton's finest marches and was written for the 1942 movie. "The First of the Few."

Danzon No. 2 by Arturo Marquez, first published in 2012, with its driving Latin rhythms, is a popular, rousing and infectious work from Mexico. Morton Gould's Ballad for Band is a wonderful work that explores all of the rich sonorities that are possible with a symphonic band.

Gould's composition was written in 1946, and inspired by African-American spirituals.

La Cambiale di Matrimonio is the first of Rossini's 35 operas, composed when he was 18 years old. Frank Hudson, a good friend of Music Director Dale Shipe, is the arranger of this Rossini overture. Hudson is a retired Major from the United States Air Force.

The final two works are based on Christian hymns. Let the Amen Sound by Travis Cross is a set of variations on the hymn: Praise to the Lord, and Nicaea by William Hines is a setting of the hymn Holy, Holy, Holy.

In keeping with long-standing tradition, the concert will close with the band singing John Rutter's The Lord Bless You and Keep You, with an accompaniment newly-arranged for small wind ensemble by local music educator and composer, Dr. David Thompson.

The concert will be preceded with a 30-minute organ recital by Thomas Heindenreich, who was recently appointed Canon Musician at St. Paul's Cathedral, as well as Organist in Residence at Nashotah House Theological Seminary in Nashotah. Heidenreich completed bachelor's and master's degrees in organ performance at Westminster Choir College in New Jersey, and anticipates completing his Doctor of Musical Arts at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music in December 2021.

There is no admission charge for the concert. A free-will offering will be received.

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
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

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

# Campbellsport has tough loss against Mayville

Through the first half of Friday night's Division 5 WIAA level three playoff game, it looked like Campbellsport could rise above Mayville once again.

Back on Oct. 15, the Cougars spoiled the Cardinals' chances at a conference title all their own with an 18-13 win. At the end of the season, three teams would tie for first place in the Flyway Conference: Campbellsport, Mayville and St. Mary Springs.

After Campbellsport and Mayville devastated their opponents in levels one and two of the state tournament, they were set to meet again in round three.

"It's always nerve-racking playing a team twice," shared Mayville head coach Scott Hilbur. "You want to keep the things that work well and try to improve the things that didn't work so well the first time. You never really quite know if they are going to do something different."



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The game started hot with Blake Schraufnagel scoring the Cardinals' first touchdown on a 68-yard run. However, the Cougars promptly responded with a 55-yard touchdown by Joseph Gardner.

Both defensive lines kept either team from scoring again in the first quarter, allowing the game to remain tied at seven points.

The second quarter began with Campbellsport in scoring position. Cole Kaehne proceeded to make the touchdown from one yard out. The Cougars bumped the score to 14-7.

Schraufnagel made another 30-yard touchdown at 8:48 in the second. The Cougars managed to stay just above the Cardinals at 14-13.

Kaehne answered for the Cougars again with a short four-yard touchdown, and the second quarter ended with Campbellsport leading Mayville 21-13.

With no loss of energy from the crowd after halftime, Campbellsport started with the ball in the third quarter, but Mayville was quick to regain possession.

After Cadon Hardesty made a catch at the 28-yard line, Schraufnagel ran it in for his third touchdown of the night. The Cardinals shortened the Cougars lead to 21-19.

Gardner would charge down the field for a first and goal for Campbellsport. Campbellsport's quarterback Mitchell McCarty snuck in from the one-yard line for the touchdown. The third quarter ended with the Cardinals still trailing the Cougars 27-19.

Mayville retained possession and was looking to score at the top of the fourth quarter. It was the teamwork by Ty Hockers pushing through for the one-yard touchdown and Schraufnagel running the ball in on the two-point conversion that tied the game at 27 points.

Fired up after tying the game, Mayville's defense stopped Campbellsport from regaining the lead before getting the ball back.

Braedon Vollmer would make the last touchdown of the night leading the Cardinals to victory. The final score was 34-27.

"We knew Mayville was a good program and it was going to be a battle," said Campbellsport head coach Todd Wondra. "It was a great game and atmosphere to be a part of, and, unfortunately, we came out on the wrong end this time."

"It turned into a dogfight, and fortunately for us, we came out on top," said Hilbur. "I really have to tip my hat to our offensive line which has just been playing magnificently this year. It gets better every week."

It was the Cougars' earlier loss against Springs this season that Wondra believes helped his boys see their potential.

"Back in the non-conference games, we didn't know how good we could possibly be," Wondra said. "This team has been undersized against everyone we faced this season, but there was no fear in this group, and they weren't backing down to anyone."

"I am just so proud to see how this team has grown and come together as a family," Wondra added. "Hopefully, being a part of this season and the success we were able to have will make our younger kids that much more hungry to put in the time to hopefully keep CHS football as a contender."

As the Mayville Cardinals advance in the tournament, they will be facing fourth-seeded Belleville on Friday, Nov. 12, at 7 p.m. in McFarland.

## Deer donations help Wisconsinites in need

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages hunters to donate Wisconsin-harvested deer to the department's Deer Donation Program to help stock food pantries this holiday season and support residents in need throughout the state.

Since the program began in 2000, hunters have donated over 94,000 deer, totaling more than 3.8 million pounds of venison distributed to Wisconsin food pantries.

Through the Deer Donation Program, the DNR works with partnering meat processors to distribute thousands of pounds of donated venison to Wisconsin food pantries.

"Whether by harvesting an extra deer or donating the only deer they shoot, Wisconsin hunters have the chance to support their communities during the holiday season," said Sarah Wyrick, DNR Wildlife Damage Program Assistant. "We thank all deer hunters, meat processing and non-profit partners who help make this program a success for those in need."

Those looking to support the Deer Donation Program can also do so through a monetary donation when purchasing a hunting or fishing license or a Wisconsin State Park pass.

### Food insecurity In Wisconsin

Approximately one in 12 Wisconsin households did not have enough food before the COVID-19 pandemic began in early 2020, and research shows this number continues to rise, according to the University of Wisconsin's Food Security Project.

Additionally, the Wisconsin Food Security Projects reports that food insecurity makes it harder for children to thrive in and out of school, increases the risk of health problems for children and adults, makes it more difficult to manage chronic conditions, and contributes to short-term and long-term stress for children and families.

### How to donate Wisconsin-harvested deer

Hunters interested in donating a Wisconsinharvested deer to the DNR's Deer Donation Program can follow these steps:

- Field dress your deer. Handle the carcass with care.
- Register your deer through Game Reg. Make a note of your registration confirmation number and keep it on hand when dropping off your deer.
- Test your deer for CWD if harvested from a CWD-affected county that requires testing before taking the deer to a processor. To find a CWD sampling location near you to submit samples from Wisconsin-harvested deer free of charge, visit the DNR's "Sampling For Chronic Wasting Disease" webpage. Test results are usually available from the DNR within two weeks.
- Call ahead! Contact one of the participating processors before dropping off your deer to make sure they have space to accept it. More processors may be added later in the season, so check back if you don't see one currently in your area.
- If donating a Wisconsin-harvested deer that is being tested for CWD, inform the processor at the time of the donation and provide your CWD barcode number. The processor will hold onto the donated deer until results are known and before distributing to an area nonprofit.
- Drop off your deer at a participating processor.

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# Learn to hunt with the DNR's Mentored Hunting Program

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages anyone interested in giving hunting a try to consider purchasing a mentored hunting license.

The Mentored Hunting law allows new hunters of any age to pair up and hunt with an experienced mentor before completing a Hunter Safety course. The two hunt within arm's reach of each other, allowing the mentee to learn and ask questions while enabling the mentor to keep a close eye on safety and provide guidance as the hunt unfolds.

### **Mentees And Mentors**

A mentee may be either:

- Any person under age 12, regardless of whether they have completed a required hunter education course.
- Any other person who has not completed a required hunter education course and is not exempt from the hunter education requirement.

A mentor is an individual who meets all of the following requirements:

- Age 18 or older.
- Is the mentee's parent or guardian, or has the permission of the mentee's parent or guardian. This does not apply if the mentee is age 18 or older.
- Has completed a required hunter education course, or is otherwise exempt\* from the hunter education requirement.
- Mentors with the appropriate license and harvest authorizations may carry a firearm and hunt alongside their mentee.

### **Mentored Hunting Program rules**

Mentees must stay within arm's reach of their mentor. Mentees under 18-years-old are not allowed to possess or use handguns for hunting.

Both mentor and mentee must comply with all hunting laws, including season, bag limit and weapon regulations; and proper hunting approvals such as license, permit and harvest authorization must be acquired for the season.

A complete list of mentored hunting program rules are avilable on the DNR website.

Those interested in mentored hunting must purchase a mentored hunting license through the DNR's Go Wild online license portal. The cost for a mentored hunting license is the same price as a regular hunting license. If the license is the first the individual has purchased for certain species in the last 10 years, it may be eligible for the first-time buyer discounted price of \$5.

More information on mentored hunting is available on the DNR website.

### More ways to learn

In addition to the Mentored Hunting program, new or interested hunters can participate in the DNR's Learn to Hunt programs that combine classroom and field instruction to learn how to hunt safely and ethically in Wisconsin.

The DNR-sponsored Hunt For Food programs also provide a more in-depth Learn to Hunt experience for newer adult hunters and their families with a focus on sustainable harvest of wild game. For more information and enrollment instructions visit the DNR's Hunt For Food page.


