Blanchard Wins OTW, Muellenbach Takes Third

The Campbellsport wrestling team finished 10th out of 61 teams at the tough Lourdes Academy On the Water (OTW) wrestling tournament on Dec. 29 and 30, and Ostin Blanchard won the 126-pound title while Drake Muellenbach finished third at 120 pounds. JJ Ksiosz (12th), Sam Koth (10th) and Joseph Volz (11th) also placed.

At 126 pounds, Blanchard (21-0) received the number one seed and earned a bye the first round and then pinned his next two opponents to earn a matchup against Sullivan Ramos (10-3) of Kenosha Indian Trail in the quarterfinals. Blanchard used four takedowns to get an 8-1 victory.

In the semi-finals, he faced Mason Mau (16-2) of Belleville, ranked seventh in division two. Blanchard used a first and third period takedown with an escape in between to earn a 5-0 victory to propel him to the championship against Pierson Portrykus (14-2) of Wittenberg-Bernamwood.

Blanchard would dominate the match getting three takedowns and a reversal to win 9-2.

Blanchard only allowed three escapes and a penalty point the entire tournament.

In the 120-pound weight class, Drake Muellenbach (22-2) received the three-seed and matched his seed by finished third. Muellenbach would get a bye and two first period pins to earn a quarterfinal matchup with Griffin Jens of Hortonville, who is honorable mention in the division one rankings.

Trailing 5-2 in the third, Muellenbach would get caught on his back a few times and ended up losing 14-5. The loss fired Muellenbach up, and he dominated his opponents the rest of the way. He would get a pin and a 5-0 decision to set up a consolation semi-final against Mason Carpenter of Lourdes Academy who is ranked fourth in the state in division three.

Drake would build a 7-0 lead before pinning Carpenter in the third period to set up a third-place match against Damien Wudtke of Shawano. The two stared each other down before face-offs, but it was Muellenbach who won the battle, dominating the match 14-5.

Muellenbach would go 7-1 in the tournament. He is one win shy of his 100th career win.

At 138 pounds, Sam Koth (17-7) would go 5-3 during the two days, finishing in 10th place. Along the way, Koth would pick up an exciting 5-3 win against Kade Novak of Plymouth who pinned Koth last year, and he followed that with a come from behind 7-6 win against Kaiden DeGroff of Waupun.

Joseph Volz (18-5) finished in 11th place going 4-3 in the tournament. Volz pinned three of his four opponents and battled some tough kids in his three losses. Being a sophomore at 220 pounds is a tough task, and Volz keeps getting better each week.

JJ Ksiosz (16-6) finished in 12th place, going 4-2 in the tournament. Ksiosz also had an exciting 4-3 win against Zeke Kelly of Waupun. Ksiosz was down 3-1 with less than 20 seconds left and got an escape and takedown to win 4-3 to get him in the bloodround. He would then beat Alex Faber of Lomira 4-1 to guarantee him 12th place. Ksiosz would lose his next match 4-0. During the match, his opponent hit his tooth on the back of Ksiosz's head and cut his head open. After some strategic bandaging, he finished the match but would have to get four staples, following, and was done for the tournament. He will be ready to for the next tournament.

Karsten Krueger (15-6) went 3-2, earning two pins. Chris Meyer (17-4) also went 3-2 and got two pins. Sebastian Meyer (13-8) went 4-2 also getting two pins and Brock Bentz got his first varsity action at 285 and went 3-2 earning a couple pins, as

Ten finalists have been named in the search for the 24th member of the Packers' "FAN Hall of Fame," and voting has begun for fans to make the selection.

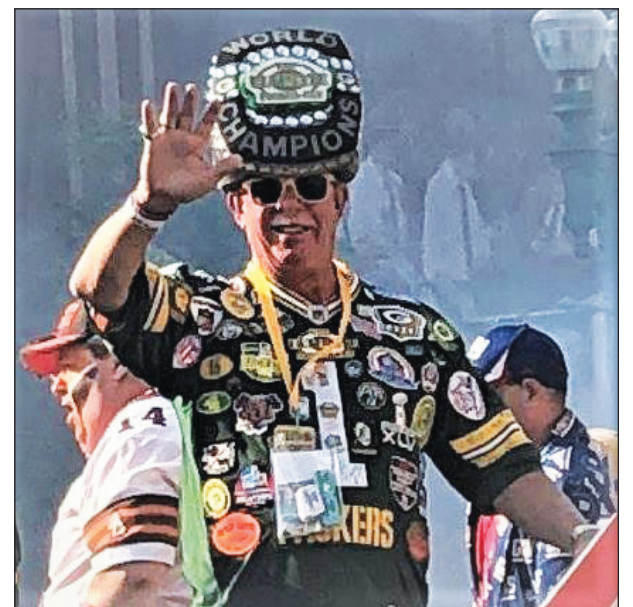

Make Gardening Your New Year's Resolution

The New Year is filled with resolutions that usually involve dieting and exercise. Gardening is a great way to help accomplish these two resolutions, while also improving your mood, reducing blood pressure, maintaining flexibility, burning calories and much more.

Resolve to grow your own vegetables and eat healthier in the New Year. Get your family and friends involved in planning ways to include gardening into your lives.

Explore ways to incorporate vegetables and herbs into your landscape. Vegetable gardens are not the only option. Tucking vegetables into flowerbeds, mixed borders and container gardens can expand your planting space. Look for new compact and colorful vegetable varieties that fit nicely into small spaces, planters, and ornamental gardens.

Take an inventory of any leftover seeds and make a list of those seeds and any plants you need to purchase. The earlier you order, the more likely you are to obtain the items on your list.

Don't wait to start your year of healthful gardening and eating habits. Start by growing microgreens in January. They are quick, easy and require no special equipment. Plus, recent research found that many contain as much as 25 times more nutrients than the leaves of the full-grown plant.

Organize a seed swap with family and friends in winter. It is a great way to extend your plant budget and experiment with new seeds. Turn old seeds that are no longer viable into artwork with

sheets of paper or small pieces of wood, glue, and some creativity.

Start vegetable, herb, and flower seeds indoors in late winter through mid-spring. Check the seed packet for timing and planting directions. Create a seed starting chart or mark planting dates on your calendar to ensure seeds get planted at the recommended time.

Monitor the weather and follow the recommended planting dates for sowing seeds directly in the garden and moving seedlings outdoors. Use homemade or DIY cloches, floating row covers and cold frames to jump start the season. These capture warmth near the plants for an earlier start in the garden. They can also be used to extend the end of the growing season.

Start removing weeds as soon they appear

throughout the season. These unwanted plants compete with desirable plants for water and nutrients, and many are host to disease and insect pests. Pulling weeds is also a great way to reduce stress while improving the health and beauty of your garden beds.

Harvest flowers to enjoy in summer bouquets and arrangements. Pick a few extras to share with friends. Research has found immediate and long-lasting benefits generated from the gift of fresh flowers.

Pick vegetables regularly when they are at their peak for maximum productivity, flavor, and nutritional value. Share extra produce with family, friends, and the food insecure – many of which are children – in your community. Contact your local food bank, food pantry or Feeding America to donate garden fresh produce.

Cap off your efforts with a garden party. Invite fellow gardeners to bring a dish to share that incorporates homegrown vegetables. Share recipes, garden success stories, and begin planning for the season ahead.

For the recommended timing to do these and other gardening projects, check my monthly gardening checklists.

"We are overwhelmed by everyone's support and generosity. It could not have been possible without the support of each person who participated and donated," said Fuzz Martin, president of the Board of Directors of the Wisconsin 9/11 Memorial.

Local Hunter Safety Group Urges Action Regarding ‘Hunter Nation Legislation’

A coalition of six hunting educators opposes SB-611 and AB-670

WISCONSIN HUNTER EDUCATION COALITION

Citizens of Wisconsin, your help is needed immediately! You can no longer stand by and be the “silent majority.”

There are legislative bills, Senate Bill SB-611 and Assembly Bill AB-670, that would greatly compromise the safety of all Wisconsin citizens. Already this hunting season, there have been at least three incidents involving new hunters who only took an online course. These bills would make it legal for a person having received no hunter education to be “certified” during a mentored hunt by a person having no training or has only taken the online hunter safety class, possibly, without any firearm experience.

Also, factor in concealed carry: At age 21, anyone having only been mentored, with no standardized safety training, would be eligible to obtain a concealed carry permit.

These bills, part of the “Wisconsin Sporting Freedom Package” were promoted by Hunter Nation, headquartered in Kansas.

Organizations such as Wisconsin Hunter Education Instructor Association, Wisconsin Conservation Congress, Wisconsin Wildlife Federation and other groups who knew the potential dangers of these bills, were not contacted.

SB-611 was fast-tracked through our Wis. Senate with minimum citizen input or collaboration.

The bill passed in the Senate and has been forwarded to the Assembly where it may be taken up as AB-670. It is the same bad bill as SB-611. Maybe senators didn’t really have the chance to assess SB-611, as it may have sounded reasonable. Without knowing the short and long-term ramifications, maybe they thought this would be an easy fix to an existing problem.

It’s not.

In order to avoid what happened in the Senate, we need our legislators in the Assembly to look closely and understand these bills are likely to result in an increase in hunting accidents and hunting related deaths, which have been greatly reduced over the years due to “hands-on” Hunter Education courses.

The risk from these bills is liable to also cause more concerned parents to keep their children from becoming hunters.

We need your assistance in getting the word out to ensure that this legislation does not become law. Please relay this information to media representatives, sporting organizations and anyone having an interest in public safety within in your area. Contact your representatives today, and let them know that you OPPOSE SB-611 and AB-670, and so should they.

Also, tell them that you support a strong and effective Hunter Education program.

If you don’t know who your State Representative is, go to: myvote.wi.gov/en-us/ and enter your address.

Please let your legislators know you want them to reply on how they plan to vote and also tell you what they plan to do to protect hunters young and old if they vote to create a future group of untrained hunters.

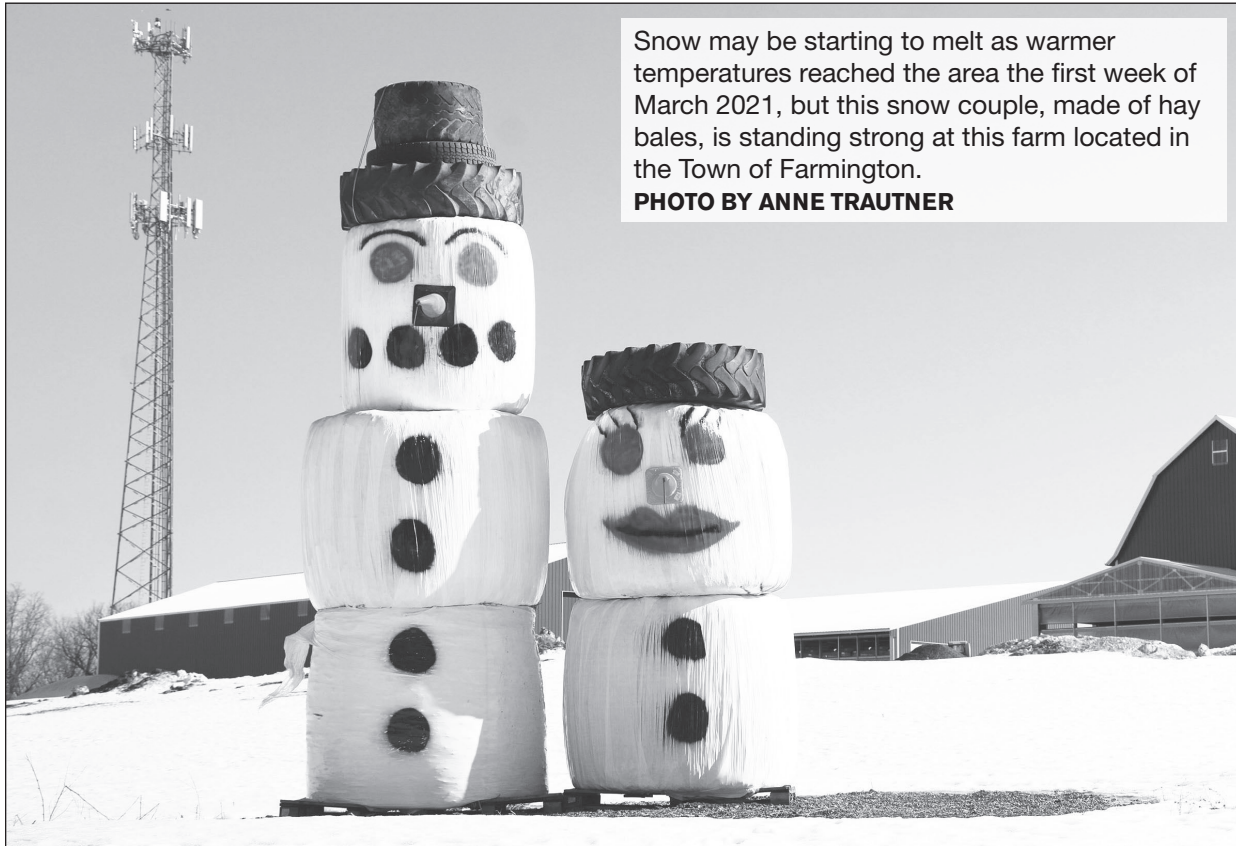

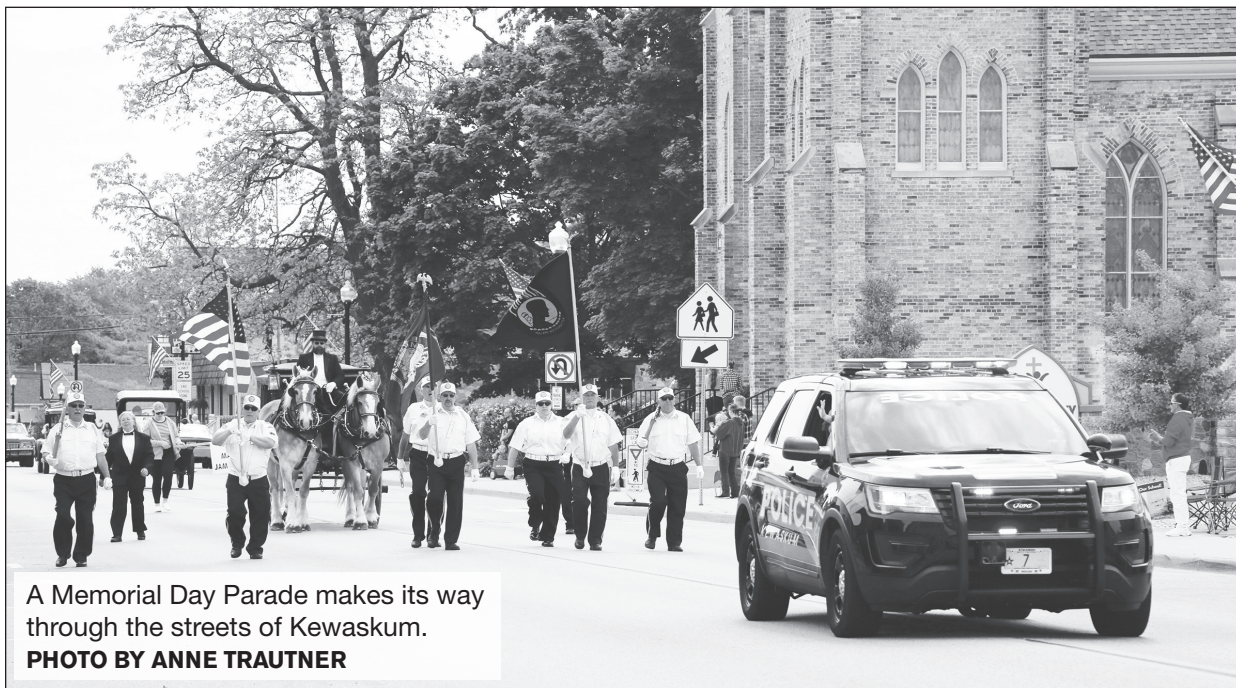

DNR Urges Ice Anglers to Protect Waterways from Aquatic Invasive Species

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and UW-Extension are asking anglers to help prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species when ice fishing this winter.

While aquatic invasive species have made their way into Wisconsin's waterways, anglers can reduce transmission by checking for and removing any mud or plant material clinging to their gear, including sleds used to haul supplies, before leaving fishing spots.

Invasive species are non-native plants, animals and diseases that cause great ecological, environmental or economic harm. Aquatic invasive species can crowd out native plants and animals and threaten the quality of boating and fishing in Wisconsin waters.

Two common non-native aquatic plants in Wisconsin include the curly-leaf pondweed and Eurasian watermilfoil which remain hardy in winter giving them an advantage over native aquatic plants. Although the plant-like algae starry stonewort, a relative newcomer aquatic invasive species in Wisconsin, dies back for winter, its tiny, star-shaped bulbils may be present in the mud drawn up from augers. The larvae of invasive snails and mussels can also be found in the water and mud during winter.

A few minutes of preventative action can help preserve and protect waterways for generations to come. Before stepping onto the ice to fish and when leaving, ice anglers should:

- Inspect boats, trailers and equipment for attached aquatic plant, animals or mud
- Remove all attached plants or animals
- Drain all water from boats, motors, livewells, buckets and other equipment
- Never move live fish away from a waterbody
- Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash

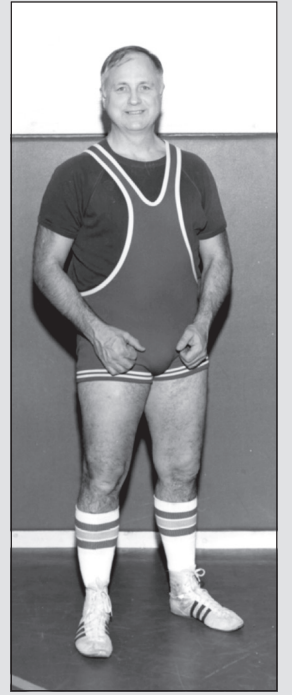
Gerald "Sarge" Marking will be honored after the CHS vs. NFDL/Springs dual

Section 6.6 is amended to read:

6.6 Minimum Lot Size
The following conditions apply toward the minimum lot sizes for a farm or nonfarm residence:

1. For a farm, the owner must have at least 5 acres

2. By special use, the creation of a separate parcel for a new nonfarm residence or the conversion of a farm residence to a nonfarm residence must be at least one acre.
