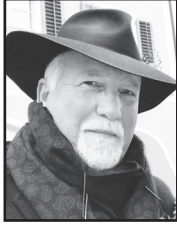

According to eye witnesses and camera footage which saw or captured the space debris in real-time, the object shone immensely bright for as long as five seconds before flaming and falling out of sight.

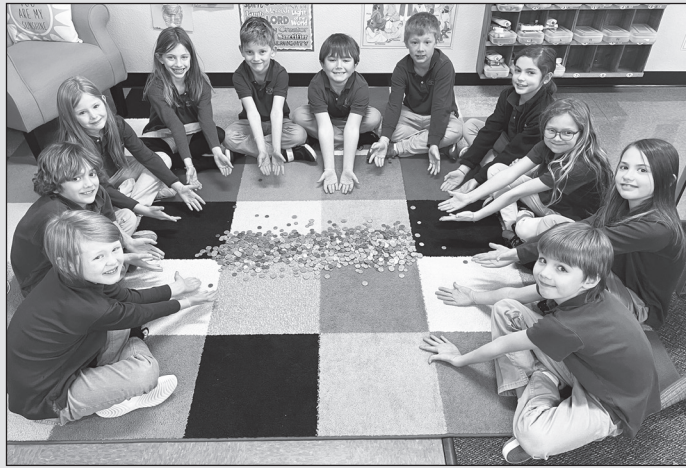
Several area residents took to social media to

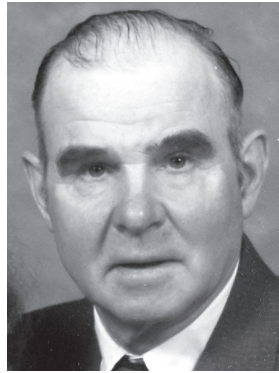

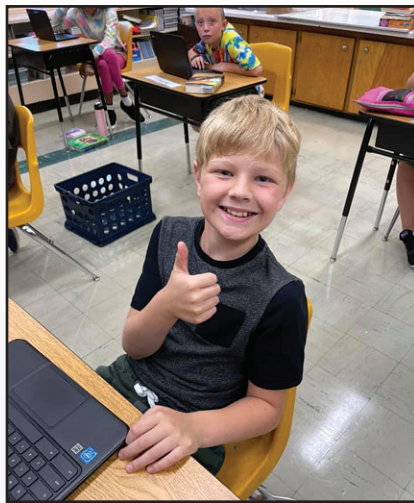

## Three Ways to Build Your Credit History

Not having a credit history, often referred to as being “credit invisible,” can make it harder to buy a home or car, finance an education, and secure banking products and other services.

Currently, more than 45 million adults in America have no credit score, according to Freddie Mac. If that describes you, don't panic. Freddie Mac is offering three strategies to take you from invisible to visible, and help you start building a credit history.

#### 1. Report rent payments.

Millions of Americans' largest monthly payment is rent. However, less than 10% of renters currently see their on-time rental payments reflected in their credit scores, putting them at a significant disadvantage to homeowners.

On-time rent payments can be used to build credit with all three major credit bureaus. If you are paying your rent on time, ask if your landlord is reporting your payments. If not, find out if they can. Although you can report rent payments yourself by paying through a rent reporting service, many such services charge fees, so it's best if your landlord reports on-time payments on your behalf.

Unfortunately, the most common way rents are reported to credit bu-

reaus today is when there's a missed payment that's gone to a collection agency. A new initiative by Freddie Mac is flipping the script by incentivizing property owners to report their tenants' on-time rental payments. Freddie Mac is providing closing cost credits on multifamily loans for owners of rental properties who agree to report payments through Esusu, a data processing and storage platform whose technology securely delivers rental payment data from property management software to credit bureaus. The program automatically unenrolls renters if they miss a payment, and it allows renters to monitor their payment data and credit score through its website and mobile app. Finally, the Esusu platform ensures compliance with

industry standards, eliminating an administrative burden that represents the single largest hurdle to reporting rental data.

“Making rent count will help solve one of the most persistent challenges facing renters who want to build credit,” says Lauren Garren, vice president and chief business officer, Multifamily, Freddie Mac. “This effort helps level the playing field for renters who prioritize making their rental payments on time.”

**2. Consider secured credit cards.** A secured credit card, designed for people with limited or damaged credit, requires you to pay a security deposit. The bank extends a credit line matching the amount of the security deposit, and it holds onto your deposit as collateral for as

long as you have the card. For this reason, secured credit cards don't charge the same high fees as unsecured credit cards.

Many secured cards include a graduation feature, allowing you to move to a traditional credit card after establishing a pattern of consistent payments. Some card issuers may automatically review your account to see if you can upgrade, but you may have to ask your card issuer whether you're eligible. By transitioning to an unsecured card in this way, you'll get your deposit back without negatively affecting your credit by closing an account.

#### 3. Consider store credit cards.

From retail chains to gas stations, many stores offer credit cards that tend to be easier to qualify for and usually have low credit limits, making them a good option if you're credit invisible. However, they often have high interest rates. By making periodic purchases with your store credit card and paying them off immediately, you can build a credit record and get used to managing a credit card.

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## What Does Inflation Really Mean?

In the investment world in 2021 there were few words used more frequently than the word inflation. You could not turn on investment talk shows or open the Wall Street Journal without seeing inflation discussed daily. I find that investors, and in particular retirees, do not think through the impact of inflation in a prudent manner. What I mean by that is most investors open the paper, see that the consumer price index was up almost 7% through November, and instantly believe they are getting poorer due to the loss of purchasing power of the Dollar. This is only part of the story, and inflation impacts individuals in widely disparate ways, depending on each person's financial situation. I will provide a couple of examples to illustrate.

Suppose you were retired in 2021 with a \$2 million investment portfolio, have no debt, own your house and vehicles and have no need to replace them. In your case, 2021's inflation is virtually a non-event. Here's why. Even if you had a conservatively allocated investment portfolio you likely still saw a 10-15% increase in your investment portfolio which means your \$2 million is now \$2.2 to \$2.3 million, an increase of \$200,000-\$300,000.

On the expense side of the fence, the rapid inflation of home prices was a non-event for you because you own your home, have no plans to sell it, or to buy a different one. In fact, on paper, you saw a major increase in the value of this asset that you could potentially cash-in on some day if you downsize.

Inflation mainly hit you in smaller items such as gas, utility bills, cable/internet bills, and food. Even if your entire household budget for living expenses was \$80,000 and that increased by 10%, your cost of living still only went up \$8,000 while your investments increased over \$200,000. I would say inflation was not such a bad deal for you because some of the same factors creating headline inflation of 6.8% in the Consumer Price Index are also what caused your investment portfolio to outpace your cost of living by a large margin.

Conversely, now let's suppose you are in an entirely different situation. You are working, you have little saved so you have not experienced the double-digit wealth increase from the stock market, you rent instead of own your home and just received notice of a 10% rent increase, and, on top of it all, your vehicle is failing and you need to replace it. In this situation inflation is hitting you like a Mack truck. You could easily be looking at \$20,000 in extra expenses for the year due to inflation without a corresponding wealth or income increase to offset it. Inflation is therefore a really bad event for you.

The point here is that headline inflation in the newspapers is only a small part of what inflation really means for you individually as an investor, a retiree, and your financial situation. This highlights the importance of having a comprehensive financial plan and understanding how it ties your budget and investment portfolio together.

## Is it Too Late to Reduce Your Mortgage Payment by Refinancing?

Experts say that with mortgage rates beginning to rise, refinancing your home now might be your last best chance to lower your monthly mortgage payment, as rates remain near all-time lows.

People who refinanced early in 2021 have already reaped the benefits. Borrowers who refinanced their 30-year fixed rate mortgage into another 30-year fixed rate mortgage during the first half of 2021 saved over \$2,800 in mortgage payments on principal and interest annually, according to a recent Freddie Mac research report.

But mortgage rates are rising. Indeed, in October 2021, the 30-year fixed-rate mortgage, which is the most common type of mortgage, rose to its highest point since April, surpassing 3.0%. Freddie Mac forecasts that mortgage rates will continue to rise, averaging 3.5% for the 30-year fixed in 2022. That's up from an average of 3.0% in 2021.

So is it time to refinance your home loan? To help you make an informed decision, Freddie Mac is offering answers to commonly asked questions about the refinancing process:

- What does refinancing mean? When you refinance your mortgage, you're applying for a new mortgage to replace your current one, which will result in a new rate, term and monthly payment. The most common type of refinance is a no cash-out refinance, in which you're refinancing the remaining balance on your mortgage.

- When should I consider refinancing? Generally speaking, refinances make the most financial sense when average interest rates are at least half a percentage point lower than the interest rate on your current mortgage. Another reason to consider refinancing is if your financial situation has improved, allowing you to secure a loan with a shorter term

and own your home sooner. Finally, if you currently have an adjustable-rate mortgage (ARM) and it's adjusting upward, you may wish to convert to a fixed-rate mortgage that provides you with the security of consistent payments.

- Who should handle my refinance? You don't have to use your current lender to refinance your loan. In fact, it's in your best interest to shop around and compare multiple lenders' loan estimates in search of the best terms and cost. It may take more time, but even a difference as small as one-quarter of a percentage point can save you thousands of dollars over the life of your home loan. The good news? Rates are often negotiable. In other words, you can ask lenders to match the rate quoted by another lender.

There may be no time like the present to lock in the lowest possible rate and receive the highest monthly savings. ## Winter on the Ice

This past week, I fished and winter camped on backwaters of the Mississippi River near Prairie Du Chien. My good buddy Gary Howe, former longtime owner (I think four generations) of *The Courier Press* and a few other papers, spent each day on the ice with me and, as usual, we had a very good time.

WEDNESDAY, JAN. 12  
HIGH: 30, LOW: 24

This would be my first trip of the year wherein I would use my Polaris 550 Classic snowmobile. I love this rig: It lets me go wherever I need to and rocks when I hit the throttle.

There would be one slight problem, and it was entirely my fault.

Last year on the last trip of the year, the choke switch broke on it, and I just remembered that problem.

To start the machine – if the engine is cold – I have to use a jackknife to work the broken choke out and then attach a vise grips to it.

Anyways, I am super excited, Gary is already on the ice, and I meet him as I am pulling two fully loaded Otter Sleds with gear; and I still had to return to the truck for two more.

I mistakenly thought that this was a northern pike/pan fishing trip but would soon find out it was pretty much a pan fishing trip and, as such, some reregging would take place.

As soon as I reached Gary, I spoke with Jackson Finney and his brother, Cal Bunders, who were fishing and catching some beautiful perch.

Long story short, for the next three days, Jackson would be at my camp long before daylight. He is a very diehard fisherman – who almost exclusively fishes with I Fish Pro 2.0s, which is similar to a tip up/spinning rod combo that is very efficient and a relaxing way to fish.

THURSDAY, JAN. 13  
HIGH: 37, LOW: 28

Today was a great day on the ice across all of the northern tier states: No wind, pleasant temperatures and a few fish were biting.

By no way was it easy, but slowly they added up, and one of my first fish of the day was a 13.5-inch crappie that I caught on a glow and lime green

“Demon” tipped lure with two spikes.

I cooked bacon and eggs for my crew in the morning and in the afternoon; it was homemade chili and, as usual, Gary and I laughed a lot.

For well more than 20 years, the two of us have been competitive when together, and we love giving each other a hard time. Thankfully, today, Gary

could not catch a cold if it was injected into his nose, so he was quiet. Generally speaking, he totally kicks my butt.

There were a lot of people on the ice, and everyone was pleasant and gave each other space.

I spoke a few times with a couple of local guys – Al O'Brien and Jim Barbian – and these fellas knew how to catch fish. They had quite the mess of large crappie, perch, bass and bluegill, and I watched Jim catch a dandy northern pike with a jig pole.

At night, it was just Ruby and myself, and I really enjoy my time on the ice in my Eskimo “Fatshack”. I put a layer of carpet that is made for ice shacks on the floor, ran a propane light, set up a kitchen and listened to the radio.

So far this year, my trips have made for a very wet floor as the ice is melting in my shack, as I believe – until this trip, anyway – the ice has not been real hard.

The last morning Jackson was at camp long before daylight, and Gary arrived soon after.

We had our best fishing of the trip in what would be a four-inch snowfall. Gary found an area with hungry bluegill, and I joined him, and we kicked some butt. Jackson caught some sumo crappie on his I Fish Pros, and the snow kept falling.

The wind makes breaking camp a bit less fun and, let me tell you, the drive back to Necedah was a challenge between the snow on the road and black ice.

Gary Howe says he has not caught as many perch in the last five years combined as he has this winter.

I dropped the sled off to get fixed, and I truly am hoping that we have good ice until the end of March.

Have you noticed that the sun is hanging around longer?

Annex Building (adjacent to the 9/11 Memorial) and put up the shared-facilities building there.

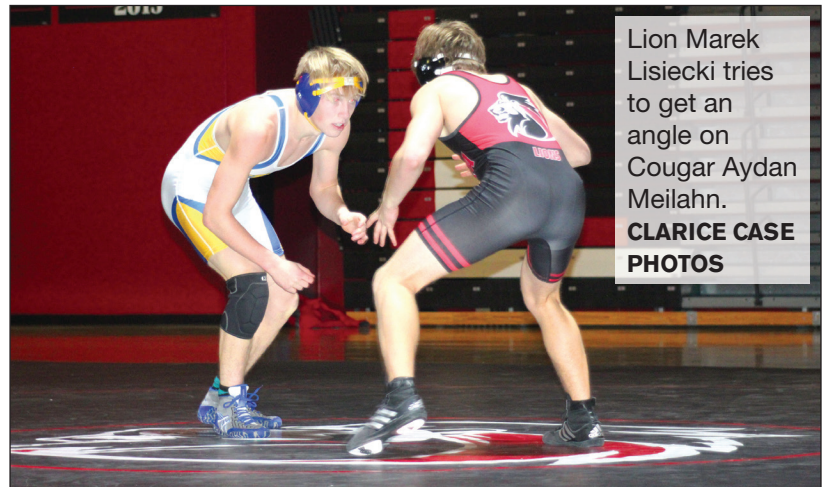
To date, the committee has fielded public concerns revolving around the project, particularly relating to parking. Some residents are concerned that the new shared-facilities building will eliminate parking stalls off Main Street.

Village Administrator Adam Gitter stated that the building project would only reduce a fraction of the space presently available and that alternative expansions for parking lots that access Main Street businesses have also been in-discussion.

Gitter views the project as a means to enhance downtown Kewaskum and provide a larger amount of necessary space for departments such as the police station and library.

The Kewaskum Police Department (KPD), in particular, has been struggling with tighter-than-appropriate space for many years and, according to village officials and members of KPD, a newer facility would increase efficiency and provide a safer environment for officers.

Specifically, village officials hope to provide local law enforcement with better locker rooms, more storage space and

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# Piitmann to be Enshrined in WFCFA Hall of Fame

*The Kewaskum athletic director spent 16 years as the KHS football head coach*

The 43rd enshrinement into the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame will take place outside Madison at the Marriott West on Saturday, April 2, and among the 12 new members inducted in the 2022 class will be former Kewaskum High School (KHS) football head coach Jason Piitmann.

Piitman was born in Waukon, Iowa, on Dec. 14, 1969, to Gerald and Diane Piitmann.

He graduated from Waukon High School in 1988, where he was a four-sport athlete in football, basketball, track and baseball.

Piitmann graduated from the University of Iowa in 1994 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. He also earned a Masters of Education in 2009 from Viterbo University.

He taught and coached three different schools in Iowa from 1994 to 1999.

In 1999, Piitmann moved to Kewaskum and coached multiple sports including junior varsity football. That same year, the KHS football team made its first Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) playoff appearances since the 1983 state runner-up Kewaskum team

In 2001, Piitmann became the athletic director at KHS.

From 2000 to 2002, Piitmann was the varsity defensive coordinator under Tim Rohlinger. The Indians won the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC) championship in 2001, the first for the school since 1983. The team also made the playoffs each year from 2000 to 2002.

Piitmann became the head football coach at KHS in 2003.

Over the next 16 seasons, he helped lead the program to 140 wins against 39 losses. KHS teams had 10 consecutive years with 10 or more victories, and won or shared eight conference championships in the EWC and the East Central Conference (ECC). In that span, the KHS football team qualified for the WIAA playoffs 13 consecutive years from 2005

to 2016. From 2005-2008, the Kewaskum Indians advanced to Level-4 of the WIAA playoffs. The teams from 2009, 2010, 2015 and 2016 qualified for Level-3 of the WIAA playoffs. Overall, Piitmann-coached teams in that span were 23-13 in the postseason.

In 2016, Piitmann was on the coaching staff for the North WFCFA All-Star Game. He has been involved with the WFCFA in various capacities over the years. He was honored by the WFCFA as a District Coach of the Year three times (2005, 2008, 2011) and as a Region Coach of the Year once (2011).

Piitmann was also selected as the Green Bay Packers Coach of the Week in 2008. Piitmann coached many outstanding young men during his tenure and is proud of what they have become in their personal and professional lives.

Piitmann and his wife Jamie – who met in 1998 – will be within one week of celebrating their 21st anniversary at the April 2 enshrinement ceremony. The couple has been blessed with three wonderful children: Anna, Lia and Dane.

males or spayed females is \$3.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog or one-half of these amounts if the dog became five (5) months of age after July 1, of the license year. The governing body of any town, village, or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. Any person who keeps multiple dogs or operates a kennel may apply for a multiple dog license. The fee is \$35.00 for twelve (12) dogs or less and additional \$3.00 for each dog in excess of twelve (12).

Dog licenses may be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year. Dog owners should notify their treasurer if their dog is given away or has died, so that you will not be considered delinquent. An affidavit of death is available.

**PENALTY**

Every owner of a dog 5 months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1, will be assessed a late fee of \$5.00.

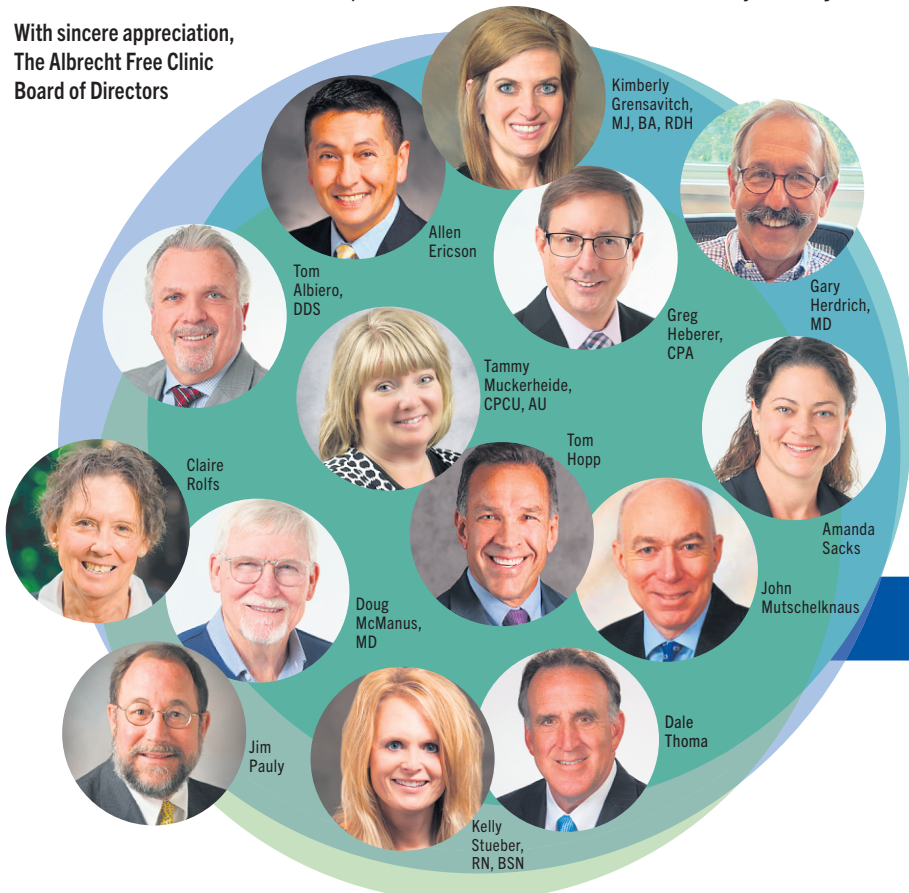
