## i4Learning Community School to Close

The Kewaskum School Board voted 5-2 at a special meeting on Jan. 27 to close i4Learning Community School (i4L) at the end of this school year. Board members Sue Miller and Timothy Ramthun voted against the school closing.

"I know this was a tough choice, but I think we can all agree that moving forward what is going to be important is that we work together with the community and parents to try make this the best possible experience for kids," Dr. Mark Bazata, district administrator, told the board following the vote.

The decision means that the 99 students who currently attend first through fifth grade at i4L will be transferred to different schools in the fall. In addition, some students who attend Kewaskum Elementary School will be transferred to Farmington Elementary School.

According to Bazata, the school closing will not affect class sizes at the elementary schools. No teachers are expected to lose their jobs in the process.

To help prepare for the transition, two listening sessions have been scheduled for family and community members on Feb. 8 and Feb. 16 at 6 p.m. in the high school cafeteria. The district also hosted listening sessions for staff.

### Reactions

About 100 people gathered in the Kewaskum High School library for last week's meeting about i4L (formerly called Wayne Elementary School). There were no public comments allowed during the meeting, so the audience listened quietly during the meeting.

However, the crowd applauded after Board Member Sue Miller spoke about how she would like to keep the school open.

"I thought a lot about this for many weeks, and I feel the timing is still off. It seems that education has already been disrupted over the last couple years," Miller said, pointing out the fact

## West Bend's Rummel to Represent Team U.S.A.

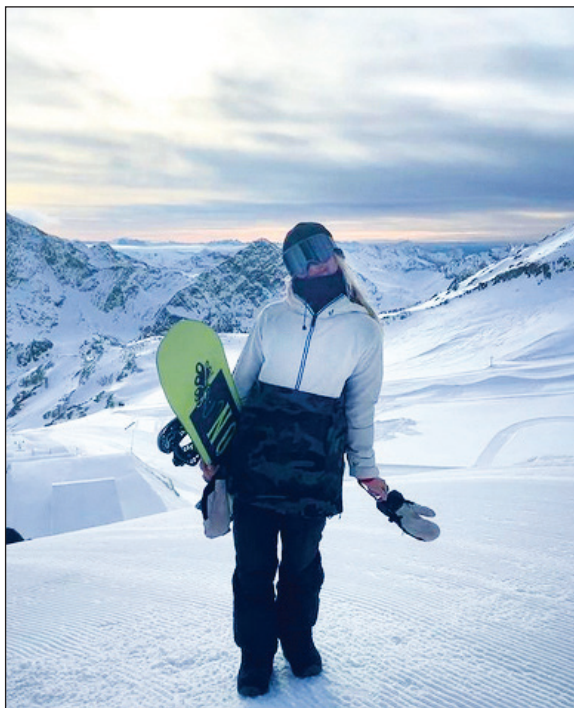
*Snowboarder has family ties to Kewaskum*

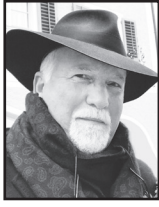

## DSPS Opens New Grant Program for Youth Fire Fighter Training Programs

*The grants of up to \$25,000 are designed to help fire departments and their technical college and high school partners develop or expand recruitment programs geared toward juniors and seniors.*

Department of Safety and Professional Services Secretary Dawn Crim visited the Sun Prairie Fire and Rescue Company Station Two last week to announce the opening of a new grant program to provide funding for youth fire fighter training programs. The grants of up to \$25,000 are designed to help fire departments, technical college partners and school districts develop or expand training programs for high school juniors or seniors. The program is open for applications, which are due February 14, 2022.

Sun Prairie Fire and Rescue Chief Christopher Garrison joined her for the announcement. Sun Prairie Fire and Rescue runs a youth fire fighter training program with the Sun Prairie Area School District and Madison College. That program allows students to meet high school graduation requirements while they earn fire fighter certification. Graduates have gone on to paid and volunteer service with Sun Prairie and other area fire departments, including Madison.

“We are excited about this grant program, and we are pleased to be able to support fire service recruitment,” said Crim. “We hear from departments throughout the state that it is increasingly difficult to staff their departments with adequate levels of volunteers who are adequately trained and able to respond to calls when they come in. That puts communities—and the fire fighters themselves—at risk.”

The fire service is a key stakeholder group for DSPS. The department currently regulates fire fighter health and safety and manages the state fire prevention program. It also administers the 2% dues program, which distributes funds collected from insurers back to qualifying fire departments and the Wisconsin Technical College System for basic firefighter training expenses.

Crim says that departments throughout the state routinely share concerns about adequate staffing, particularly in all-volunteer departments in rural areas.

Chief Garrison agrees that exposing high school juniors and seniors to the fire service is an effective re-recruitment strategy, but he emphasizes that the program is about more than fire department needs.

“We started this program with the Sun Prairie School District to offer an alternate path to meeting graduation requirements for students who needed more experiential learning opportunities,” Garrison said. “This program is good for students because it exposes them to a rewarding career path or volunteer opportunity while also allowing them to earn high school credit. But it is also great for the fire service. Once we had the program up and running, we discovered that we were reaching potential recruits that we had never reached before. It is bringing much-needed diversity to our ranks of career and volunteer fire fighters.”

The DSPS grant program has funding to award \$50,000 this year and \$50,000 next year to help establish or expand similar programs in other parts of Wisconsin. Applications and grant information about the grant program are available on the DSPS website.

## KPD Accepting Support on Behalf of Officer Kohn and Family

The Kewaskum Police Department (KPD), the night of Monday, Jan. 31, recognized on its Facebook page that one of its officers, Kevin Kohn, suffered a stroke and was hospitalized on January 27.

“He is currently alert and in the early stages of working his way to recovery,” said the message, which was signed by KPD Chief Tom Bishop. “Our hearts are with him and his family at this time.”

The message noted that many in the community have been asking KPD how they can support Kohn and his family, something the KPD was happy to facilitate.

“It became abundantly clear that Officer Kohn has an overwhelming amount of love and sup-

port in our community,” wrote Bishop. “His family gave us permission to send this update, as individuals have been reaching out to our department asking where they can send cards and words of support.”

Bishop went on to say that cards, words of encouragement and gifts to the family can be delivered to the Kewaskum Police Department. Bishop went on to ask that members of the public allow Kohn and his family space at the present time.

“We will ensure [cards and messages] get to them,” said Bishop. “Please keep Kevin in your thoughts and prayers as we support him in his recovery.”

## Wis. DNR Encourages: Reduce Salt-use this Winter

*Salt pollution impacts freshwater, health and infrastructure*

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and Wisconsin Salt Wise invite the public to learn more about the impacts of road salt on the state’s drinking water, pets and freshwater ecosystems during Wisconsin Salt Awareness Week, Jan. 24-28.

### The Impacts of too much Salt

While salt keeps Wisconsin roads safe during winter, using more salt than needed comes at a price. In Wisconsin and much of the U.S., chlorides from salt are infiltrating lakes, streams and groundwater. According to Wisconsin Salt Wise, one teaspoon of salt is all it takes to make five gallons of water toxic for freshwater organisms.

The DNR measures chloride levels in Wisconsin rivers over time, monitoring cumulative chloride loading results at 26 of the state’s largest river systems. Recent studies have shown a steep increase in chloride loads. In the early 2000s, the DNR measured about 600,000 tons of chlorides annually. By 2018, that number increased to nearly 800,000 tons per year. Over 40 lakes and streams in Wisconsin have been designated as impaired by high salt concentrations.

These increased chloride loads are partly due to road salting, but chlorides also enter Wisconsin waters because of water softeners and fertilizers. Find out if your softener is salt-wise with this diagnostic tool.

Increased chloride levels have significant impacts on our daily lives, including environmental and economic effects. Nationwide, winter salt causes \$5 billion in damage to infrastructure

each year, causing corrosion of bridges, roads and other infrastructure. Road salt can also impact pets by causing irritated paws or other health concerns if ingested.

### Salt Tips For Wisconsin Residents

Reducing salt use is key to decreasing chloride loads. Follow these steps to right-size your salt use:

–Shovel: Clear walkways and other areas before the snow turns to ice. The more snow removed manually, the less salt you will need and the more effective it will be.

–Scatter: When using salt, scatter it so that there is space between the grains. A 12-ounce coffee mug of salt is enough to treat an entire 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. If you see over-salting, follow these simple steps to help educate others about salt.

–Switch: Salt won’t work when pavement temperatures drop below 15 degrees. Switch to sand for traction or a different ice melter that works at lower temperatures.

### Statewide Reduction Efforts

The DNR works to reduce chlorides at the source through permitting programs for municipalities and industries. These measures include tuning up or replacing water softeners, identifying significant chloride contributors and finding reductions, process efficiencies or improvements and instituting sewer use ordinances.

Additionally, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation works with Wisconsin counties to reduce road salt application using brine and pre-wetting road surfaces, both of which significantly reduce salt use.

the first time in hopes to grow in her teaching ability, and she received the certification.

The certification lasts for 10 years before it needs to be renewed and, in 2019, the Campbellsport educator felt that this process was valuable enough to undergo again.

Working through teaching online, the stress of covid and her other obligations, Dirmeier was able to devote 80 hours of her personal time into achieving the renewal of this certification.

Dirmeier stated that this certification is extremely important for teachers because it contains an individualized process that allows for educators to focus on how they can create a better learning environment for their students.

Dirmeier chose four components to focus on for her National Board experience: leadership, reading instruction, technology and mentoring in transition. In order to successfully grow in these areas, Dirmeier had to record herself teaching and prove to the board that she was advancing in her teaching ability, all the while showing that her students were achieving at higher levels from her instruction. She also had to do a write-up of 24 pages.

As Dirmeier reflected on this process, she stated that it was difficult to analyze every small thing that she was doing and explain how it impacted her students. The most difficult task, in her opinion, was being critical of herself.

Although the process is very challenging,

Dirmeier feels that she grew immensely as an educator throughout it.

On average, the number of teachers who have achieved the National Board Certification falls just under three percent. When Dirmeier was asked if she thinks that it is necessary to raise this surprisingly low average, she said: Absolutely.

"If you understand your instruction and how it impacts your students, it makes student achievement soar," she said. "[The National Board] process helps both teachers and students grow together."

Kathee Dirmeier and all National Board certified teachers exemplify how educators are willing to go the extra mile for the benefit of student education. She hopes that her experience shows that many teachers were continuing to focus on student success throughout the pandemic and virtual learning, even though they were markedly trying times.

Certainly, the Campbellsport School District is thrilled by Dirmeier's dedication to teaching, and assuredly hope she remains for another 10 years to try a third time.

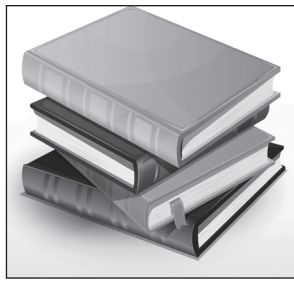
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# Eden Elementary Holds Two Literacy Contests

On Monday, Jan. 31, Eden Elementary School began the reading challenge with the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers (Early Childhood, 4K-5th) and an in-house writing contest for Kindergarten through Fifth.



The Timber Rattler Reading Challenge is an incentive-based reading program. Every two weeks, students need to meet their grade level reading goal to advance a base. After eight weeks, students who complete all four two-week segments earn a home run. This means they receive a free ticket, hot dog and soda voucher from the Timber Rattlers. that we are still in the midst of a pandemic. "When you see a high performing school, why change that?"

When the meeting ended, the majority of the audience left the library quickly and quietly. Some shared their thoughts on social media, with many calling the decision "sad."

After the meeting ended, district administration sent out a message to parents to let them know about the decision to close the school. The following day, a counselor was on hand at i4L to offer support for children if needed.

"We knew it was going to be a difficult decision. As a leadership team, we were prepared for whatever action the Board took because timely, clear communication was going to be important moving forward," Bazata said. "Our next steps will be collecting input from our families and staff on how to make this as smooth and successful a transition as possible."

### The Numbers

There currently are 736 elementary school students in the Kewaskum School District. That number is projected to grow to 804 elementary school students by 2028.

"Our schools as a whole are underutilized. Not by a little, they are underutilized by a lot. We could grow enrollment by 34 percent over the next 10 years in the elementary school and still be within those recommend paths," Board

Member Ric Leitheiser said.

The recommended capacity of Kewaskum Elementary School is 725 students, and the recommended capacity of Farmington Elementary School is 375 students. The recommended capacity of i4L is 175 students.

Transportation is not expected to be impacted by the i4L closure, according to Bazata. The current maximum bus ride in the district is 45 minutes; a train stop can add 10 to 15 minutes. The number of students who would have a longer bus ride is projected to stay the same.

However, closing the school will eliminate the current annual operating cost of \$325,000, according to Bazata. The 10-year capital/technical plan for i4L is projected to cost \$1.2 million. In addition, the district plans to sell the building and 10-acre parcel.

"When you have to find a way to get \$300,000 to \$400,000 in cost savings, it is not insignificant. It is a lot of money that can be used in a lot of different ways," Leitheiser said.

"I agree that \$300,000-plus is a lot of money for a single budget in a year. However, as a board, I don't think we have tightened the belt enough how we spend money every year," Ramthun said.

Board President Jim Leister said that the district would eventually need to hold an operational referendum in order to keep i4L open.

"That building is getting older every

day," he said.

### The Decision

The district has discussed closing i4L over the past several years. Formerly called Wayne Elementary School, i4L operated as a charter school from 2015 to 2020.

"It is very telling that 28 years ago they were in this position, they were in this position seven or eight years ago when they changed to a charter, and then we dissolved the charter in order to equalize class sizes," Board Member Stephanie Bird said. "I feel that this has just been a snowball."

"To push this off for a year or two down the road to see where those numbers are, I think we have a pretty good idea of where they are at, and I don't think it's fair to residents, parents, kids to keep pushing it off and upsetting people. I think it's time to make a decision and move on," Board Member Dennis Aupperle added.

The deciding factor for Board Member Bradley Petersen was that no teachers would lose their jobs.

"After reviewing all the facts and all the information, it is very apparent to me there is one right answer here," Petersen said.

Even after i4L closes, the district will continue to succeed, according to Leister.

"It's not the building, it's the people that make this district," Leister said.

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# KHS Grad Breaks Weight-lifting Guinness World Record

*Jaclyn Vazquez raised more than \$6,000 lifting 8,730 pounds in an hour*

Strength has a greater purpose, and on Saturday, Jan. 22, Jaclyn Vazquez (Michaels), a 1999 graduate of Kewaskum High School (KHS), broke the Guinness World Record (GWR) for the Heaviest Weight Lifted via Turkish Get-Up in a one-hour time span (female weightlifter), all the while raising more than \$6,000 for the Youth Impact Club (West Bend).

The Youth Impact Club is a suicide prevention organization at West Bend High School (East and West).

The attempt took place at THE GYM WB, a kettlebell gym in West Bend owned by Vazquez and Meghan Mueller.

Vazquez lifted 3,960 kilograms (or 8,730 pounds) over the span of 60 minutes.

The previous record was 3,008 kilograms, held by Colleen Conlon.

Vazquez did 165 Turkish get-ups using a 24kg (53-pound) kettlebell.

The Turkish get-up (TGU) is full body movement that starts on the floor with the weight at one's side. The bell is pressed up, and then the body is sent through a series of movements to reach a standing position with the bell held overhead. Then, the entire movement is reversed back down to the floor.

Why the Turkish get-up?

The TGU is very symbolic.

When dealing with mental illness, it often becomes difficult to get up. Moving around under the weight of the world seems impossible. Vazquez wanted to help those who struggle to get up and help them find the strength they need to rise when the weight gets heavy.

Vazquez lost her brother to suicide and hopes the funds raised during the GWR attempt help make more youths aware of both mental illness and suicide prevention methods.

Vazquez, as of print time, was in the process of submitting evidence to Guinness World Records for official approval of the record.

## Arrest Made in Connection to Neosho Bank Robbery

The following is a press release from the Dodge County Sheriff's Office (DCSO) regarding a bank robbery in the Village of Neosho on Wednesday, Jan. 26. Portions of this release were edited for convention and clarity:

"The Dodge County Sheriff's Office has made an arrest in connection with the bank robbery that occurred on Wednesday, Jan. 26, 2022 at the Horicon State Bank in Neosho.

"The suspect is also suspected to be involved in a robbery that took place in Jefferson County.

"Alan Schade, 43, of Columbus, was taken into custody Thursday evening and has been booked into the Dodge County [Detention Facility].

"All persons are innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

"This expeditious, yet thorough investigation, was a collaborative effort between the [DCSO], the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office, the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) and the Dodge County District Attorney's Office.

"Various other law enforcement agencies also assisted in the inves-

tigative process, and Sheriff Dale Schmidt would like to express extremely high praise for all involved in this investigation as this was a true team effort in identifying and arresting a suspect so quickly. The process included [DCSO] communications officers and [members] of the patrol division.

"Sheriff Dale Schmidt would also like to thank the public for understanding that when incidents like this occur, [DCSO] is not [always able to] release details of the criminal activity that occurred. It is always of utmost importance to maintain the integrity of the investigative process.

"Frequently, in these types of investigations, law enforcement will only provide information that the public needs to know, as releasing information in an ongoing investigation can have detrimental consequences.

"No additional details will be released by [DCSO] at this time as [the situation] continues to be an ongoing investigation."

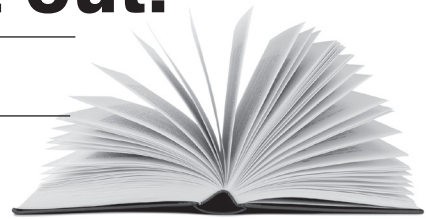

# Campbellsport Hunter Education Class Offered to Public

The Campbellsport Hunter Education Program urges all individuals interested in hunting to enroll in a Wisconsin DNR Basic Hunter Education Course. The 2022 course will be held on the March 15, 17, 22 and 24 from 6-8:15 p.m. at the Campbellsport Public Library (220 N. Helena St.); and on March 26, at the Dundee Sportsmen's Club in Campbellsport from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. (N3019 State Road 67). It is mandatory to attend all the sessions unless there is a reasonable excuse.

Students younger than 18 must be accompanied by an adult or guardian the first night of class for registration. Please note the course materials and examinations are all written at a sixth grade reading and comprehension level.

Registration prior to the course is mandatory and can be done online by going to <https://gowild.wi.gov/>. Check Upcoming classes...Click on Hunter as class, choose county of Fond du Lac and enroll.

The class fee is \$10 and is payable at first class for all individuals that wish to attend and covers all necessary materials. Students are asked to only bring a notebook and pencil. All other materials and equipment is furnished throughout the course.

Anyone born on or after January 1, 1973, must have completed a hunter education course and show the certificate to purchase any hunting license in Wisconsin. Wisconsin law requires anyone younger than 16 to be accompanied by a par-



ent or guardian over 18 while hunting or using a firearm for any purpose. However, young people who complete the hunter education course and receive a certificate are eligible to hunt and use firearms without supervision at age 14.

All WI Recreational Safety Students are required to obtain a WI DNR Customer ID Number and will also be required to provide that WI DNR Customer ID Number along with students personal information to the instructor when registering for the class. You can obtain a WI DNR Customer ID Number 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. by calling WI DNR Customer Service at 1-888-936-7463, visiting a WI DNR Service Center during their regular scheduled hours or by going to <https://gowild.wi.gov/>.

The hunter education course instills in students the knowledge and skill to be a responsible and safe hunter. The basic course consists

of 10 lessons. Students learn how hunting accidents are caused and how they can be prevented. Hunter responsibility and safety are stressed throughout the classes.

Hunter education graduates receive a certificate that is accepted in every state, Canadian Province, and Mexico.

Classes will cover hunting topics such as hunting equipment and methods, rules and regulations, hunter ethics and responsibility, first aid and survival, principles of wildlife management and basic firearm knowledge and safety.

The course is taught by Wisconsin DNR Certified Hunter Education Instructors.

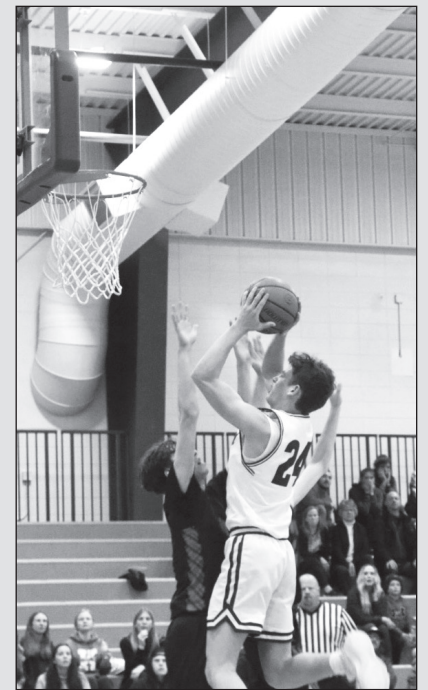

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# CHS Senior Angler Zurn Named to WIFA Hall of Fame

*The Wisconsin Interscholastic Fishing Association inducted the Cougar after consecutive Master Angler award-winning seasons*

There are an infinite number of terms and colloquial phrases that go hand-in-hand with the ancient sport of fishing, but perhaps none so universal as: "Better late than never."

Anglers are revered for their patience, and so should be Campbellsport High School (CHS) senior Colton Zurn, whose consecutive Master Angler Awards received in 2019 and 2020 earned him a spot in the Wisconsin Interscholastic Fishing Association (WIFA) Hall of Fame, the announcement for which came back in December 2021.

"A long overdue congratulations to senior Colton Zurn on his state finish the past two years," said CHS Ice Fishing Team coach Danielle Dreher, adding that Zurn also was inducted into the state's most prestigious listing of interscholastic fishermen and fisherwomen. "Colton has been working on this annually since his freshman year."

Dreher said it was a monstrous

2020 that pushed Zurn into the upper echelon of Wisconsin's student/anglers.

In the 2020 season, Zurn caught 15 total fish, many of which were once-in-a-lifetime catches for even the most dedicated of fishers (the largest measuring five feet in length). His final total included the following

(species, size): walleye, 28.25"; quillback, 23"; whitefish, 22.5"; white sucker, 20"; channel catfish, 29"; carp, 33"; northern pike, 35.25"; redhorse, 26"; smallmouth, 21"; sturgeon, 60"; king salmon, 41"; brown trout, 29"; burbot, 27"; crappie, 12"; rockbass, 11".

"We are beyond proud of Colton,

his motivation, dedication and amazing finish!" said Dreher.

Zurn is taking the success on the water in stride, and is just happy to be recognized doing something he loves.

"It feels good to be successful in something that I love to do," he said. "I hope to be able to always use these skills to catch fish and maybe someday teach somebody else."

One thing in particular Zurn is eager to pass along: Ice fishing can often be more rewarding than boat angling.

"Try it," he said. "Try it because of how rewarding it can be; sometimes you can catch more fish on the ice than in a boat."

### Climate Change on the Petenwell Flowage

Ever since 1989, I have been doing a weekly outdoor adventure and writing about it. Generally, I camp, and my travels take part all over Wisconsin and sometimes "The U.P." and, often, much further.

My home is located 1.5 miles from the Petenwell Flowage, which is Wisconsin's second largest lake.

I have not ice fished or winter camped on the Petenwell in more than 10 years, but this week I did during a very cold spell, and I really enjoyed myself on a body of water that has been putting out some excellent walleye fishing this winter.

**MONDAY, JAN. 24**

**HIGH: 14, LOW: -10**

My life has been having some really positive twists lately, so I was not going to let a forecast of minus-22 (without the wind chill) bother me.

This trip would be cool from the get go.

First reason: I only had to drive seven miles to where I drove on the ice. As the crow flies, my house was maybe five miles away.

Michelle Chiaro would accompany me at first and later in the trip. Today she had another reality check into my way of life. It was cold and it was windy and once before dark – and twice after dark – Michelle had

flags go up on her tip-ups. Especially after dark, she got beat up bad, but in each case – after a very long fight – she landed a catfish in the six-pound range.

I watched this gal almost literally freeze her fingers off, and I coached her through each fight. In our minds, until the fish was seen, we were hoping it was a walleye.

The last cat was caught about 8 p.m., her tip up was spooled and the fight lasted a very long time.

After the catfish was caught, she was declared the "Catfish Queen," and I had the biggest mess of frozen 50-pound Power Pro line that I have

ever tried to re-spool; the line laying on the ice and very frozen. I spent 15 minutes outside working on it and felt like my fingers could fall off. I brought it in the shack, stubbornly worked on it for a half hour, and got it.

I also caught two keeper walleyes and, shortly after that, watched a very nervous woman from Arkansas drive her car off the lake to shore in the dark.

**TUESDAY, JAN. 25**

**HIGH: 8, LOW: -16**

I love this weather; I hope we make 30-inches of good ice this winter and that people can snowmobile and ski as much as they desire.

Come spring, let our lakes and wetlands get replenished and our crops grow healthy.

The last night – I could see by their tracks – a pair of coyotes came within 10 feet of my shack. Coyotes work the ice in the winter and go to each frozen over hole looking for minnows that fishermen discarded. If you want the 'yotes to get the minnow and not the crows: kick a little snow on them.

The following is a method that helps me catch fish with a tip up: For walleye, I use a #14 treble hook. On

one hook, I put a medium shiner, and on the another – going the opposite direction – I put a rosey, which, I believe, is an orange fathead. This two-some swims erratically, and I believe the orange of the rosey and the flash of the shiner can be pretty effective.

Here is a couple of tips that I encourage fishermen and women to do: When you catch a fish that you are going to release, please do not let its eyes freeze. Think about that fish's miserable existence, because it has been blinded.

Here is another really important piece of information: You catch a "slobasauras" – maybe a northern pike, walleye or a bass – and your intention is to release it after a photo. Ample research has been done which shows that a fish held vertically, instead of horizontally for a picture, is going to die. Their internal organs cannot tolerate being held that way when out of the water.

Just before this trip, my daughter, Selina, who is a junior at UW-Stevens Point (double-majoring in water sciences and fisheries), informed me that she has taken a very cool internship near Eureka, Montana this summer.

This info triggered this thought from me: I need to go visit Selina, and I need to apply for a big game elk/deer license for this fall and do some scouting when I go visit her.

Soon, I will find out if I was successful in being awarded a bear tag for this fall. I think that I will, and that means a summer of baiting.

I used to hunt elk until I became a single parent. I want to go by myself and can't get it off my mind.

Love the ice, love the outdoors!
