At 132 pounds, the Cougars' Ostin Blanchard,


ranked fourth at 126 pounds, wrestled up a weight class to go after two-time conference champion Bryce Crowley of Omro who is also ranked third in the state at 132.



The first library established in the seventh century BC was a repository of knowledge. Archival documents, scholarly texts and works of literature, were kept in this establishment located in ancient Middle East and people were not allowed to take them home or else face the wrath of the gods. Libraries did not start circulating materials to the public until 1725 when the first circulating library was opened in Scotland and offered readers the chance to get their hands on books they could not afford to purchase. Many libraries were for-profit businesses at the time and lent books for a fee.

Libraries have evolved in many ways; one difference is how materials are circulated. Many patrons are used to checking out books, music, magazines, and DVDs from our library. We also have Wi-Fi hotspots and previously have had Kindles and other e-readers available for our patrons to take home. We no longer have the Kindles, but back then we were circulating things, as a Library of Things. This idea to circulate non-traditional objects has been around about 50 years, with tool libraries and seed libraries and more. I have had an interest in this trend of having item available for checkout that could be construed as unusual. My setback was space. With 3,500 square feet of library space and every inch in use, there is not a good place to store or display



a Library of Things. Late last year, we cleaned the workroom and got rid of many old, unusable items and lo and behold, a shelf was emptied! Now I am still limited in space and cannot add larger items to our Library of Things collection. You won't see crockpots, telescopes, or kayaks in our catalog, but we do have an assortment of items that you can check out for a week which I plan on adding to as space and budget permits.

First, I have several items aimed at people with memory loss. We have a 35-piece puzzle, tactile squares and reminiscence cards all proven to help people inspire conversations and connections. Under the baking category, there are cake pans of varying designs and cookie cutters. This is so helpful when you are planning a themed party and don't want to purchase these special items. All we ask is that they are returned clean and dry. Right now, we have dinosaurs and a crown, but check back for more varieties. For children, look for coding kits such as Makey Makey and a loom and pom pom maker. If you looking to try Pilates but are just unsure, check out our portable Pilates bar with printed exercises. We even have a stud finder which I have used to hang posters at the library. I encourage you to come and check out our binder of our Library of Things and participate in this ever-changing library trend today.

5 Years Ago February 16, 2017

Residents living at the apartment complex at 222 Braatz Dr. lost their homes after fire broke out in the apartment building on February 10. 

was able to silence Schisel for the first eight minutes of the frame.

Junior Madi Dogs displayed her dominance on both ends of the court, as the versatile guard finished with 16 points, nine rebounds and three steals. Her play in the second helped to push the lead to double digits for the Indians.

A few late three-pointers from junior Haley Butschlick, and free throws from junior Morgan Adams, helped ward off a late rally by the Huskies, and Kewaskum escaped with a 57-52 victory.

Defensive Slog Favors Kewaskum

Two days later, Kewaskum had "round two" with conference rival the Kettle Moraine Lutheran (KML) Chargers.

KML had been playing quite well leading into this game, and proved to be one of the best defensive teams the Indians have faced this season, but it was still Kewaskum on top at the end, 37-29.

Kewaskum turned the ball over 12 times in the first half, which resulted in the Indians facing a halftime deficit of one point.

"KML shoots a lot of three pointers," said Kewaskum head coach Russ Thull. "They can heat up in a hurry if you give them open looks. They knocked a few down in the first half, and when they were missing, we weren't doing a good enough job rebounding those misses."

The story that turned the tides in the second half, though, was the defense of Kewaskum.

The Indians had consistently been holding opponents to significantly lower scores than each teams' average: They held New Holstein 20-points under its average without two starters and, in the second half of the KML game, Kewaskum dug in and made it extremely difficult for them to score.

KML made it interesting with a late three-point make, but, ultimately, Kewaskum buckled down and maintained a commanding lead for the eight-point win. This season, it was the first victory for the Indians in which they trailed at halftime.

The duo of Dogs and Christenson shouldered much of the offense, as Christenson finished with 10, and Dogs finished with 13 to go along with 15 rebounds.

Next up for the Indians is Waupun on Feb. 11. They hosted Berlin after print time on Tuesday, Feb. 3.

If the Indians were to win both games, they would be tied for first place in the East Central with Waupun.

Postseason seeding will take place on Saturday, Feb. 12, with early projections placing Kewaskum as a twoseed, but possibly as high as a oneseed: A win at Waupun on Friday could, feasibly, give the Inidans a shot at spot number-one.

Dreikosen said there weren't really any expectations of the team, and they were projected to win just two games.



I have often written about the 50 falls in a row that I have hunted deer in northern Juneau County while camping with family and friends; and how four people evolved from a tent to 25 people putting up a steel pole barn for two weeks on public land and than taking it down.

When it was just my father – the late Robert Walters – my brothers – Tom and Mike – and then Jeff Moll, we would camp next to some Milwaukee guys that were very tough and a whole-heck-of-a-lot-offun. Those guys were Lynn Halboth, Tony Wagner and the late Larry Sowle.

All three of my eventual pals are about 14 years older than me and took me under their wing when I turned 18 and would stay at camp after my family left. 
