### 'Baby Theresa' Cold Case Resolved

The following is a joint press release issued by the Dodge County Sheriff's Office and the Dodge County Medical Examiner

Thirteen years ago, authorities in Dodge County found a deceased baby near the Village

Until today [March, 18, 2022], the community has been left wondering if her family would ever be identified.

Today, we can provide closure: This case has been resolved.

On Wednesday, April 29, 2009, the Dodge County Sheriff's Office and the Dodge County Medical Examiner's Office responded to Lone Road in the Town of Theresa and confirmed the death of a newborn baby found abandoned in a garbage bag. The full-term, eight-pound baby girl, appeared healthy.

At that time, tests were conducted which were used to determine the cause of death for the baby.

Investigators named her "Baby Theresa" to provide her with an identity, naming her after the community closest to where she was found, the Village of Theresa.

Authorities worked tirelessly at the time



#### Closure for 'Baby Theresa'

Dodge County Sheriff Dale Schmidt addresses members of the media regarding the "Baby Theresa" cold case at the Dodge County Sheriff's Office on Thursday, March 18. Schmidt informed the media personnel attended that Karin Luttinen of Milwaukee woud be charged with concealing the infant's 2009 death. The Sheriff, after announcing the details, said that the investigation was "resolved."

to identify family members of Baby Theresa (parents, grandparents, aunts/uncles) to provide her with a respectful and dignified burial. Unfortunately, no family members could be identified and "Baby Theresa" was laid to



rest without family present on Monday, May 11, 2009, at the Lowell Cemetery in southwest Dodge County. While the family may not have been present, her community in Dodge County was there to pay their respects.

Dodge County Medical Examiner PJ Schoebel conducted his investigation of the incident and ordered an autopsy which was performed on April 30, 2009. The medical examination did not reveal evidence that supported the contention or charge that the child was murdered. The pathologist concluded that the incident was a "fetal demise" indicating that the child may have died prior to, or during birth.

For almost 13 years, the Dodge County Sheriff's Office and the Dodge County Medical Examiner's Office continued to investigate, and advances in forensic science allowed us to identify a suspect in this incident.

In 2014, the sheriff's office worked with the district attorney to file a charge against the then-unknown mother's DNA profile to prevent the six-year statute of limitations for the charges to run, thus allowing for any prosecution now, 13 years later.

In 2021, the mother was identified as Karin Luttinen from Milwaukee.

Our offices worked closely with the Dodge County District Attorney's Office to identify the correct charge in this incident.

After evaluating all the evidence, it was determined that the appropriate charge, in this case, is Concealing the Death of a Child under Wisconsin State Statute 948.23(1)(a) relating to the issue of a woman.

Concealing the Death of a Child relating to the issue of a woman is a Class I Felony punishable under statute by not more than \$10,000, or im-

prisonment by no more than threes years and six months or both.

[On March 18, Luttinen] made her initial appearance in the Dodge County Circuit Court, and we will now wait for the legal process to take its course. Today, we will not be able to release anything additional related to the investigation itself. For details, you may certainly request a copy of the criminal complaint from the courts as it is paramount that we maintain the integrity of this case throughout the criminal proceedings.

This incident shocked our Dodge County community when it occurred, but as shocking as it may be, the professionals of the Dodge County Sheriff's Office, the Dodge County District Attorney's Office and the Dodge County Medical Examiner's Office, along with our community, came together from the initial discovery of Baby Theresa's body until today.

I would like to thank all of those who worked diligently in this incident over the past 13 years. First, I would like to thank our primary investigators in this incident, Detective Vickie Brugger and Medical Examiner PJ Schoebel. They never gave up and pursued absolutely every lead imaginable since Baby Theresa was discovered in 2009. Detective Brugger was provided with every resource she needed to find closure in this case.

I would also like to thank the rest of the criminal investigative division of the sheriff's office for their support and assistance of Detective Brugger along the way. PJ Schoebel worked on this case in conjunction with Detective Brugger providing additional resources and perspectives. Both of these individuals went above and beyond to solve this

- I would also like to thank several other individuals:

- Todd Michael and the staff at Cornerstone Funeral Home donation of services;
- Matt Lober vocalist at the gravesite during the funeral;

- Dodge County District Attorney Kurt Klomberg provided legal guidance and prosecution of this case.

The Dodge County Sheriff's Office and the Dodge County Medical Examiner still mourn the death of Baby Theresa, but we are thankful that resolution has taken place. While this certainly has been a shocking discovery for us all, especially to the family of Baby Theresa, closure can now begin for all those touched.

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

## New Report Finds Doctors and Public Facing Challenges in Distinguishing Early Alzheimer's Development from 'Normal Aging'

The Alzheimer's Association *Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures* report unearthed challenges both doctors and the American public face in understanding and diagnosing mild cognitive impairment (MCI), which is characterized by subtle changes in memory and thinking. It is estimated 10% to 15% of individuals with MCI go on to develop dementia each year. As the size of the U.S. population age 65 and older continues to grow (from 58 million in 2021 to 88 million by 2050), so too will the number and proportion of Americans with Alzheimer's or other dementias given increased risk of dementia with advancing age.

The special report, "More than Normal Aging: Understanding Mild Cognitive Impairment (MCI)," for the first time examined both public and primary care physicians' (PCP) understanding of real-world awareness, diagnosis and treatment of MCI and MCI due to Alzheimer's disease in the United States.

"The new Facts and Figures report shines a light on MCI, and is critical to creating awareness for strategies and resources for families on this journey," said Jennifer McAlister, program manager, Alzheimer's Association Wisconsin Chapter. "There are so many things individuals living with MCI can do to impact the progression of the disease. We want to empower people and give them confidence to seek out resources, and focus on lifestyle habits that can help them continue living their best life."

Special Report at a Glance

It is estimated 12% to 18% of people age 60 or older have MCI. While some individuals with MCI revert to normal cognition or remain stable, studies suggest 10% to 15% of individuals with MCI go on to develop dementia each year.

- About one-third of people with MCI due to Alzheimer's disease develop Alzheimer's dementia within five years.
- Despite the prevalence among aging Americans, the new report found more than four in five Americans (82%) know very little or are not familiar with MCI. When prompted with a description of MCI, more than half (55%) say MCI sounds like "normal aging."
- Seventy-five percent of PCPs say they are on the front lines of providing care for patients with MCI. However, just two-thirds feel comfortable answering patient questions related to MCI (65%) and/or discussing how MCI may be related to Alzheimer's disease (60%).
- PCPs are committed to learning more about MCI due to Alzheimer's disease and see clear benefits of making a specific diagnosis (90%). Yet, more than three-quarters of PCPs (77%) report MCI due to Alzheimer's being difficult to diagnose, and half (51%) do not usually feel comfortable diagnosing it.
- Awareness and understanding of MCI is low across all racial and ethnic groups surveyed: White Americans (18%), Asian Americans (18%), Native Americans (18%), Black Americans (18%) and Hispanic Americans (17%).

#### Workplace Shortages

This year's report also includes a new section on the dementia care workforce. According to the report, most states, including Wisconsin, will have to nearly triple the number of geriatricians who were practicing in 2021 to effectively care for approximately 10% of those 65 and older who are projected to have Alzheimer's dementia in 2050.

- In Wisconsin, there are approximately 83 geriatricians.
- By 2050, 273 geriatricians are needed to serve 10% of those 65 and older in Wisconsin.

• By 2050, 820 Geriatricians are needed to serve 30% of those 65 and older in Wisconsin.

In addition, the report looked at the number of direct care workers such as nurse aides and nursing assistants, home health aides and personal care aides needed between 2018 and 2028. To meet the demand, almost every state, including Wisconsin, needs to double the number of direct care workers.

- In 2018, there were approximately 71,820 home health and personal care aides in Wisconsin.
- $\bullet$  By 2028, Wisconsin will need 86,440 home health and personal care aides, a 20.4% increase.

### 2022 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures at a Glance

The 2022 Facts and Figures report also provides an in-depth look at the latest national statistics on Alzheimer's disease prevalence, incidence, mortality, costs of care and impact on caregivers.

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






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

During this time the students were encouraged to read books, write a brief summary, and then enter a contest to name a baby chick. We had 85 entries in our contest!



long), we had a small pool of volunteers to assist mainly with programs. Unfortunately for us, these volunteers have moved on in various ways. Here are some recent helpers that I would like to give accolades to.

I know a little about branding and the importance of a logo that reflects your institution's mission. I also know that my graphic design skills are limited. I spent a lot of time trying to create a new logo for the library. I had ideas but could not come up with anything that didn't look like a 3-year-old created it. One of the library board trustees suggested I contact someone she knew that did have a background in graphic arts. After several months of ideas and designs, a logo was created. Steve was the de-

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
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### **Evers Visits Plymouth, Signs Bill to Bolster Dairy Exports**

Gov. Tony Evers, on Tuesday, March 22, celebrated National Agriculture Day in his hometown of Plymouth — renowned for being the Cheese Capital of the World — by signing Senate Bill 827, now Wisconsin Act 207, to help bolster Wisconsin's dairy exports.

In December, Gov. Evers signed Assembly Bill 314, now 2021 Wisconsin Act 92, which required the Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP) to work collaboratively with the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation to increase the value of Wisconsin's milk and dairy, meat, crop, and other product exports by 25 percent by June 30, 2026. The bill was modeled after legislation originally proposed by Gov. Evers during his 2020 State of the State address, during which the governor announced a package of legislation and a special session of the Legislature as part of a three-pronged plan to support and invest in Wisconsin's farmers

and rural communities. Funds for the Wisconsin Initiative for Agricultural Exports were released by the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee last

Wisconsin Act 207, which the governor signed today, allows the DATCP to supplement these efforts by investing \$883,160 from an existing, unused appropriation to be used for the newly created agricultural exports program for the purpose of promoting dairy exports.

"We're darn proud to be America's Dairyland, and I'm glad to be celebrating National Agriculture Day right here in Plymouth-the Cheese Capital of the World-to sign bipartisan legislation to help continue supporting Wisconsin dairy," said Gov. Evers. "Our dairy industry is not only core to our economy, but it's core to who we are as a state. This bipartisan legislation builds on our work to expand and increase our dairy exports so folks around the globe can experience the high-quality

dairy products we know and love produced right here in Wisconsin."

Gov. Evers has long advocated for strategic investments in Wisconsin's agricultural exports, starting in his 2019-21 biennial budget when he proposed a \$200,000 investment to develop the Wisconsin Initiative for Dairy Exports. Unfortunately, that provision was rejected by the Legislature during the budget process. Following this and following the governor's 2020 State of the State address and special session call, the Legislature failed to pass the governor's special session proposal. Gov. Evers again proposed investing in Wisconsin's agriculture exports in his 2021-23 biennial budget. Gov. Evers signed the 2021-23 budget last summer, marking the first time that state funding has been allocated to DATCP's International Agribusiness Center to help promote Wisconsin agriculture exports.

### Chequamegon Bay/True Adventure

This week's column is about winter camping on the ice in what, at first, was brutal weather conditions on Chequamegon Bay, which is Lake Superior at Ashland and north. Along for this trip was Rick Miotke of Baraboo, Doug Cibulka of Portage, Jeff Moll of Niagara, and Greg Steinhauer of Waunakee. All of these guys are between 56 and 63 and are tough as nails.

FRIDAY, MARCH 11 HIGH: 14, LOW: 6 (WINDCHILL,

Due to the fact that there is two feet of snow on top of the ice, driving a truck or an ATV on Chequamegon Bay is not advisable, as you break through the crust to your axles, hit a slush layer and are very stuck.

This meant that Jeff Moll's 1996 Artic Cat, "Bear Cat", and my Polaris "Classic" would be hauling man, gear and dog about two miles from shore out on the bay.

There was a sustained 23-mile-perhour wind today that made everything from trips out on the ice, building camp and setting tip ups seem like you were in Siberia; any exposed skin was in trouble in the blink of an

This would be my eighth and last winter camping trip of the season, and I was really excited as we would be targeting brown trout, splake, northern pike and perch with a hopeful bonus of walleye or coho.

Jeff, Doug and I did this trip last year and kicked butt on browns, splake and gators.

We built camp, had three hours of daylight left, fished hard and caught very little.

Chequamegon Bay is generally very reliable in mid-March but due to the fact that up to this trip no

warm run off was coming into the bay, the hot bite was not happening.

#### **SATURDAY, MARCH 12**

HIGH: 19, LOW: -7

At first light this morning, the wind was horrible, the air temp was the same and my planned warmweather ice-camping trip was not meant to be.

For the first time, my snow machine would not start, and I could not pull out the pull cord. Fishing was slow, but steady, on this trip,

Doug Cibulka would have the most luck/action using tip ups and live hait, and he caught our first brown trout, which made us all very happy. Doug also caught a 26-inch gator, not a big

fish, but a start, and he was winning the five-dollar bet for both

Doug's gator was froze solid in lit-

erally seconds!

Jeff Moll caught a 17-inch splake, very good eating fish, and Rick Miotke iced a 10-inch perch.

There were some smaller gators caught, but that was our catch on a truly brutal day.

#### **SATURDAY, MARCH 13** HIGH: 35, LOW: 14

Rick Miotke had lodging in Ashland and each morning would show up on Moll's Bear Cat and was a strictly business type of fishermen. All of his gear is well thought out, and the best, and Rick fishes hard.

On the other side of the coin, served supper, shrimp hotdish, at 3:30 a.m. this morning, and my former Poynette High School buddies and I told story after story about our days when we were kids - all of us were friends and were wild and crazy!

The fishing got a bit better today with the warmer weather but was still slow.

Rick caught a brown and a 27.5inch gator, which put him in the gator lead. Doug caught a 21.5-inch splake. A few small perch and several smelt were caught and, about an hour after dark, I had a light go on with one of my tip ups, and I caught

a 23-inch walleye.

The walleye got us in a happy mood and, soon, the Sunday Night Festivities began and, low

and behold, Greg served us lasagna just after 3 a.m.

**MONDAY, MARCH 14** HIGH: 43, LOW: 29

Rick is the president of The Baraboo River Chapter of KAMO and had a meeting tonight, so we had to break camp and get him to shore on the first trip. Just before we said goodbye, Doug C. gets a flag, and we all watched him catch a 31.5-inch gator, which beat Ricks in the last second.

Greg was the last one on the ice, and he caught a 22-inch splake, which was our biggest, but the contest ended when we took Rick in, so Doug won the brown, splake and gator bets. Rick

took the perch, and I was all smiles with the walleye.

Trips like this with five guys that are no longer kids are serious tests of the aging process and we did incredibly well with next to no sleep and in very adverse conditions the first two days.

I will miss the ice!





### **Stress and your Health**

You're stressed. No, seriously – you are.

But that's not necessarily a bad thing. Some stress is actually necessary to maintain your physical and mental health. Remember the movie *The Matrix*?

In one scene, Agent Smith tells Morpheus that the Matrix was originally designed to be a perfect world without suffering or pain, where everyone was

"It was a disaster," he said. "No one would accept the program."

Your body and mind rely on occasional, moderate doses of stress to keep you alert and sharp, boost



your immune system, strengthen your heart and help build to mental and emotional resilience to deal with more major life events.

Let's back up a moment and look at what "stress" is.

You probably already associate "stress" with the uneasiness, tension and anxiety you feel when something "bad" happens – like a flat tire, or an unexpected meeting with the boss. But stress is also caused by anything different, new or changed in your routine – like a vacation, or a job promotion with completely different

responsibilities.

The word "stress" describes your body's response to these events: "stress hormones" including adrenaline and cortisol increase your heart rate, sharpen vour senses, and stimulate a sudden burst of energy.

At moderate levels, this is a good thing.

It trains your body and mind to "adapt and overcome." But constant everyday stress - like being stuck in a job you hate or living through a global pandemic – can add up over time and have serious, negative health effects.

Studies suggest that 70% of doctor visits are directly related to

Constant stress causes insomnia, inflammation, indigestion, and chronic headaches. It raises your risk of heart disease, cancer, and type 2 diabetes. It weakens your immune system, making you more likely to get sick, and is a direct cause of depression.

At this point, you're probably getting stressed just reading this! Well here's some good news: a huge study of over 200,000 people found that chronic stress could largely be offset by good nutrition and exercise.

#### **NUTRITION**

Stress creates greater nutritional demands on the body, so chronic stress can make even a slight nutritional deficiency much, much worse.

One strategy to overcome this is to avoid eating emotionally. I tend to be an emotional eater, so I, like many people, usually reach for cookies instead of carrots when I'm stressed out.

To beat that, I try to always be aware of my emotional triggers, and "take five" before giving in to an emotional craving. Instead of immediately reaching for that pack of Oreos, try squeezing a stress ball,

going for a quick walk or drinking a big glass of water.

Most of your daily nutrition should be foods high in vitamins and fiber. Foods like whole grains, meats and fish, nuts, fruits and vegetables can bust the effects of stress and help reduce the inflammation that causes chronic pain and other health issues.

And caffeine?

Moderate daily amounts (a couple regular-sized cups of coffee) can boost your mood, make you more alert and fight feelings of fatigue.

But caffeine actually stimulates those stress hormones we talked

about earlier, so too much can backfire and make you feel nervous, tense and jittery.

#### **EXERCISE**

Exercise isn't rocket science, but it *is* chemistry! Physical exercise helps reduce the negative effects of stress by lowering your body's stress hormone levels, while increasing production of endorphins – the natural mood-boosting chemicals your body makes that reduce pain and help you feel good

Plus exercise gives you a healthy outlet for all that pent-up frustration, anger and anxiety that stress can trigger! Findings consistently show that one exercise session provides a calming effect that can last for several hours.

Any activity that gets your heart pumping harder, your lungs breathing deeper, and your skin

sweating for 20 to 30 minutes will work!

Exercise can also power-up your mind by increasing certain brain proteins that enhance mental abilities, reduce anxiety and fight depression.

Stress is your body's chemical response, but that chemical response is influenced by your mind and your mindset. Mindset is a third component that can help you overcome the effects of stress.
