The St. Kilian of 1951



Recently, I came into contact with a folded sheet of paper titled "Annual Financial Report of St. Kilian Congregation." The record was on one sheet of typewriter paper, folded in half to create four pages. With over 70 years passed, it serves a great example of how a random item can tell the story of a community.

First, it documents who was part of the Catholic parish that hugged the township lines of Wayne and Ashford. The church on the hill in lower Fond du Lac County served as a meeting location for many neighbors of the unincorporated hamlet and the surrounding farmland. Old church reports are crucial to save for they become an unofficial census of an area.

Second, such images prod the memory of those who have roots in St. Kilian, and are over 70 years





of age. Hopefully, the names listed will trigger recollections of present-elders of the older members of the parish they knew in their childhood.

Third, there is a valuable cultural element from the 1950s. If our checkbooks and our cash flow indicate what we value, it is interesting to see the donations to the church, and the selected disbursements by the congregation.

Fourth, there is a due for church pews. St. Kilian Church had many parishioners who sat in assigned seats during mass, for which dues were paid for, apparently, annually. These designated seats did not exist in my memory of the 1980s, but the tradition of these family assigned seats remained. There was a tendency for people to sit in "their spot" long after dues were assessed in the tenure of Fr. Reichel, who led St. Kilian from

First breaking in a wave that rolled across the nation from west; Seattle and LA to east, they became standard fixtures on sitcoms such as *Friends* (Central



Perk) and *Frasier* (Cafe Nervosa). They, of course being coffee houses.

Still, despite the explosion of them in Fond du Lac over the last couple decades, these aren't something you'd expect to see in small towns such as Kewaskum or Campbellsport. Usually a local diner; Fussy Feebies or the Eden Cafe served that purpose. Yet here they are.

The Coffee Corner Bistro in Kewaskum was established, as a sign announces, in 1995. Blond furniture against spackled wall, pale above dark with painted tin ceiling rouses an atmosphere rivaled only by the aroma of a freshly brewed pot of joe.

At the Blue Door Coffee Company in Campbellsport, the digs have that deliberate simply finished look with an open ceiling (visible HVAC pipes) suspended above and beyond the brick and slanted panes display case. Off towards the side a large overhead door with glass panels gives a good gander at the streetlife; a steady stream of traffic bound towards or from lower town.

What better place to meet friends or family and reconnect during increasingly hectic hours of busy daily routine? Seems time gets away on all of us. Not to mention the ceaseless demands for our attention. Especially if you're tied to one of those ever present links to the outside world; a cell phone.

Take a load off at one of the glass topped tables built from 2 by 4 studs. Or cruise by the drive up window. Sometimes, just a few minutes spent either with company or alone in such quaint surroundings are enough to release all the pent up feelings of a day which has got up and gone wrong from the start. Now isn't that a whole sight better?



AN **Outdoorsman's** Journal North of the Border, 1989 to 2022 MARK WALTERS COLUMNIST

This week's column is different and tells a heck-of-a-story.

The story dates back to 1989, when I first started writing, and was living in the Canadian bush while I was the camp manager at Chimo Lodge, and it carries on to last week when I went to Red Lake, Ontario, Canada, to visit with former Chimo owners Peter and Elizabeth Hagedorn for Pete's 84th birthday. I also spent time with my good friends Duane Riddel and Doug Vandussen who have been pals of mine since 1988.

This column was called "North of the Border" back in '89, and I wrote for *The Poynette* Press.

I would hand write it from a bear stand on Friday nights and give it to an American who would mail it once they crossed the border.

SEPTEMBER 1, 1989

I am living at Bear Berry Outpost which is 110 air-miles from Red Lake.

Pete flew me and my golden retriever, Ben, here with about 12 hours' notice, and my job is to cut all the timber for a 28x24-foot cabin, and then build as much of it as possible as time would allow.

To do this, I would travel by boat from where we had an existing cabin and would tow an empty boat behind me.

Pete did not want me working alone, so he had Zygmunt Wesolowski and Andv Novak as my helpers. Zygmunt was a retired gold-mine worker, and Andv was a retired Red Lake postmaster.

A side story is that

food every Friday.

A typical day: I was the cook and the boss, and we worked hard each day dropping the biggest, straightest jack pine and spruce that we could find, which often was about a mile away from camp.

Everything was hand peeled, and the boats were heavily loaded.

Zygmunt was from Poland and, in 1939, was captured by the Germans when he was 17 and put into a labor camp until 1945. Andy Novak joined the English II Corps after the Germans invaded Poland and saw a lot of action.

Our best timber was on a ridge line, and the entire forest floor had a foot of moss.

Most of my day was spent cutting or loading and unloading boats. Zygmunt ran a saw, peeled and loaded; he was incredibly strong. Andy was a laborer, and a very good man.

On one particular day of cutting, I am by the boats, Zygmunt is on top of the ridge and drops a big jack. I watch it directly fall on Andy, and it appears he is dead and is 100-percent under the

tree. Zygmunt is crying uncontrollably. We cut a chunk of jack below and above Andy and lift it off from him.

Andy appears dead.

A minute later, Andy opens his eyes.

10 minutes later: He is back to work.

That foot of moss on the forest floor, no doubt, helped save Andy from getting hurt.

Pete Hagedorn is at my house; Selina is in her senior year at Necedah High School.

Pete tells me that he has sold Chimo Lodge and Outposts; though I did not show it, that re-


