Kettle Moraine Legend Downtown Harrison Reflects on Career

Kewaskum resident and entertainer will perform at village's 125th anniversary celebration in June

For anyone a certain age that has lived in the Kettle Moraine – or at least been a frequent visitor to the area's local picnics and events – might recognize one man above all others when it comes stage entertainment. But to say Harrison Townsend, known professionally as Downtown Harrison, is just one man might be somewhat misleading.

That's because Townsend, in his late 50s, is an impressionist – and a darn good one – with a range across nearly a century of music and in all genres; and he does it all with the enthusiasm and energy of a Tasmanian devil on his fifth espresso.

Folks in Kewaskum, where Townsend has lived the better part of the last 20 years, assuredly recall his performances at Kettle Kountry Kolors “back in the day” (“Man, I used to love Kettle Kountry Kolors!” said Townsend recalling the weekend long festival).

He's also been a regular performer at Party on the Pavement and, if you know anyone who has gotten married since, say, 2001, you may have been fortunate enough to have Downtown Harrison there (or one of his many personas) as the evening's entertainment.

Perhaps known to some as “that guy who does the robot” or, perhaps, “that guy who dances to ‘Thriller,’” Townsend is pleased to be remembered locally for so many different characters, a list of which includes Louis Armstrong, Frank Sinatra, Johnny Cash, Neil Diamond and Tina Turner (just to name a few). It might go without saying, but each character comes complete with signature wigs and clothing.

He can switch inimitably between all the voices in a moment. A skill so developed, now, that he's exploring performing duets or even character's performing another character's song.

“What if I had Tina Turner sing ‘Wagon Wheel?’” he asked rhetorically, providing an example that, somehow, sounded exactly like it was intended to.

It was a gift that took time to develop, said Townsend, and he was the first to admit that it was not an easy road to financial security and career victories.

“The pin-point of my whole adventure was when I got put in a foster home,” recalled Townsend, stating that he was just a child at the time. “I was living in Chicago, and the only thing that saved me, believe it or not, was singing the oldies.”

Townsend, who is a Black man, acknowledged that the “crazy thing” about his obsession with the radio and popular music was the songs he gravitated to.

“I'm a Black person singing Elvis Presley and Buddy Holly,” said Townsend with a laugh, adding that something clicked with him as a displaced youth and teen. “When I was listening to all those characters, I didn't know then, but it was God's plan.”

Townsend said his colorblind approach to learning music as a kid made him infinitely more accessible to a wider array of potential regions. The varied vocal tones – take for example the difference between Armstrong and Sinatra – also helped cultivate a broader range: He could perform R&B, but he also knew Country & Western and was an exceptional dancer and physical comedian.

He recalled watching his foster mother go to work every day, come home and prepare his meals, take care of the house and then do it all again the next day. He said that experience taught him how to be a worker, and taught him the practices he desperately needed to be a solo entertainer.

But his motivation was partly influenced by grief and strife. His mother was a recovering alcoholic, which is why he ended up in foster care.

Motivation Isn't Always Motivating

For five years now, I've partnered professionally with a private addiction rehabilitation facility, working with the clinical staff to provide exercise therapy for their clients undergoing treatment.

Physical exercise is extremely important in whole-person wellness and carries a host of benefits for those recovering from addictions of all types.

In a future column I'll talk about those benefits.

For this week, however, I want to talk to you about a former client from there, whom I'll refer to as "N".

Reality TV has given many the impression that personal trainers are "grind you into the ground" drill sergeants (which is not true), so "N" was not initially interested, but her clinical lead convinced her to try.

When I spent some time listening to her, speaking with her about goals, sharing how her recovery could benefit from regular exercise and road-mapping an action plan, her attitude completely changed: She was motivated.

In fact, she was *on fire*.

I got a text that day from one of her clinical team, saying, "Whatever you did with N... amazing work. She just told me you gave her hope to find herself again."

I was super excited – after all, I got into this career because I wanted to make a difference in peoples' lives.

My excitement was short-lived, though: N never came to a single one of her scheduled sessions. Motivation wasn't motivating enough.

Sadly, I've seen this quite often in more than 12 years of full-time fitness coaching. In fact, when I ask someone I've met for the first time where they struggle most, their answer usually includes the words "motivation" and "accountability."

This is understandable.

Life can tug us in a hundred directions at once, and exercise (whose ratio of "awesome" to "less than awesome" varies from day to day) can often take a back seat to things that, at the time, feel more urgent – just ask any of the moms I work with how challenging it can be to prioritize self-care!

"Motivation" is the twin sibling of willpower – identical on the surface, but with its own distinct personality. And, like "willpower", relying on motivation by itself is a losing strategy.

In my April 14 column, titled "Willpower?", I talked about goal-chasing strategies that work

far better than willpower alone (telling someone, planning ahead and practicing awareness).

This week, I want to tell you about the biggest motivator *ever*; stronger than willpower, more reliable than motivation, it's the "open secret" of the fitness motivation and self mastery.

This life-changing powerhouse?

Routine. Habit.

Most of us think when we "fail" at fitness that we just didn't try hard enough: We weren't strong enough. We weren't "motivated" enough.

The truth, though, is that those who "succeed" at fitness usually do one thing differently: They make it a habit.

Habits aren't something we're naturally born with – they're learned by establishing and following patterns of behavior.

Much like developing a new skill, establishing a habit requires daily practice and consistency.

Here are three tips for establishing a new wellness habit:

First, **set up systems** that encourage you choose and use new behaviors – like planning a different route home from work that takes you past the gym instead of the bar, or scheduling the same time every day to meet that trusted friend for an exercise session.

Second, work to **reduce temptations**. This could look like taking batteries out of the remote and storing them in a drawer to make it harder watch TV and skip that walk, or storing snack foods in an out-of-sight or inconvenient area of your home.

Third, **take small steps**. Twenty minutes of daily exercise time, consistently adding more veggies in at meals, and going to bed a little earlier every night are small changes you can make to help you feel successful at goal-chasing and inspire you to take even larger steps.

Eventually, as new behavior patterns get ingrained, you find that they've become a habit and you "just do it" automatically.

Planning for success in fitness – or in any area – can be very individual, and a cookie-cutter approach doesn't work for everyone.

A good coach can help you set up systems, structure, and accountability that will work for your own lifestyle and goals.

Remember, we don't decide our future: We decide our habits, and our habits determine our future.

May Law of the Month: Share the Road

Spring is here and Wisconsinites are getting outside to enjoy our communities on their motorcycles and bicycles. With that surge in activity comes added danger on the roads.

Wisconsin State Patrol's May Law of the Month highlights the importance of sharing the road. Drivers should be cautious around smaller vehicles and motorcyclists and bicyclists need to practice safe riding techniques.

Motorcyclists and bicyclists are at a greater risk of being hurt or killed in a crash. In the past five years, the number of fatal crashes involving motorcycles in Wisconsin has increased every year. Preliminary data shows last year, 120 motorcyclists died in crashes. Nine bicyclists were killed in crashes in 2021.

"Motorcycles and bicycles are smaller and harder to see on the roads. We need drivers to look twice this time of year to avoid tragedy," State Patrol Superintendent Anthony Burrell said. "Motorcyclists and bicyclists should be alert, too. Follow all the rules of the road and be predictable so drivers aren't taken by surprise."

Under state law, bicycles are considered vehicles and must follow the rules of the road, including obeying traffic signals and using lights at night. Drivers must stay at least three feet from a bicycle when passing.

Motorcyclists must have a class M license to operate a motorcycle. They can only ride in the same lane as another motorcycle, not a vehicle.

Motorcyclists and bicyclists are encouraged to ride within their skill level and seek out training courses to learn the best safety skills.

These safety steps are critical, whether driving in a car, on a motorcycle, or riding a bicycle:

- Share the road. Look twice for other vehicles and use turn signals to help everyone anticipate your movements.
- Watch your speed.
- Never drive or ride impaired.
- Know the rules of the road. Follow all traffic signals and laws.
- Buckle up, phone down. Avoid distractions.
- Wear protective gear.
- Scan for potential hazards in the road.

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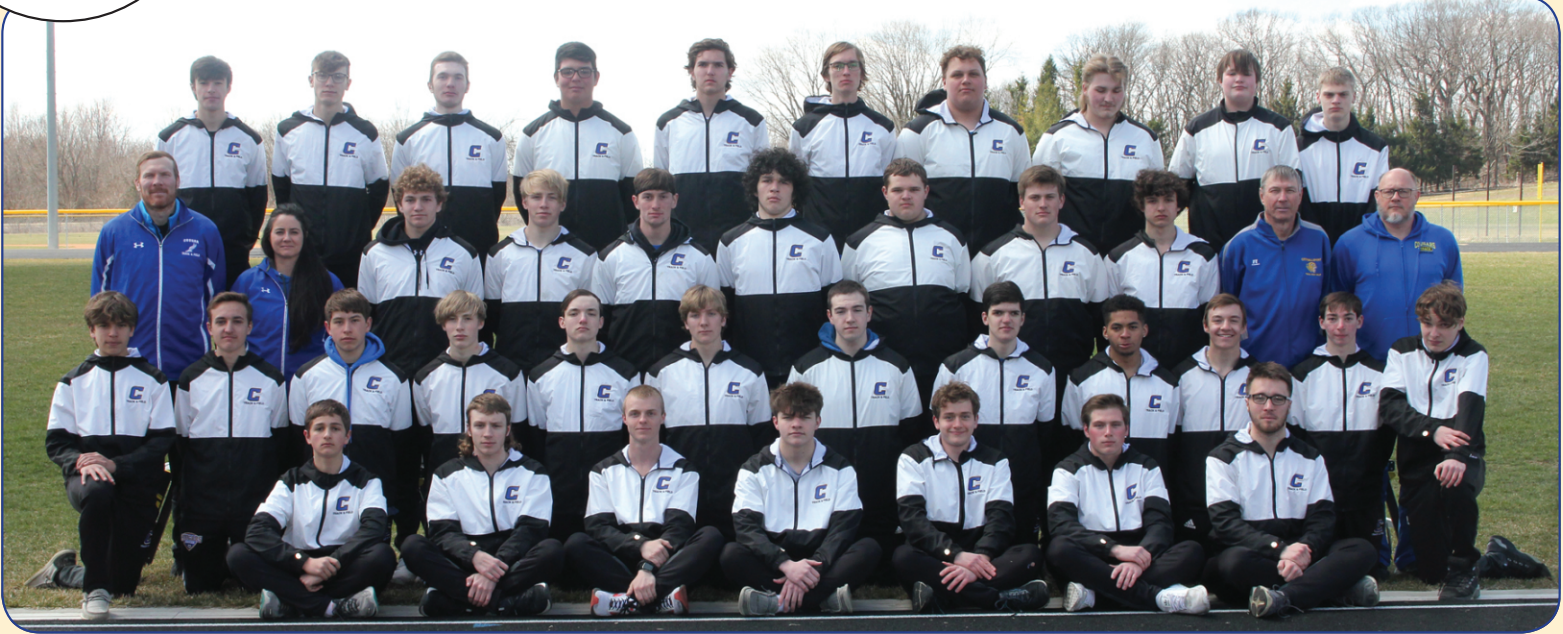

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

Despite his mom's challenges, they remained close, and when she had the opportunity to start her sober life over in Milwaukee, a 15-year-old Townsend made the bold move to go with her (despite courts in Illinois, originally, objecting to that action).

"She got her life together [in Wisconsin], and at 15, I came to visit her in Milwaukee with my sister," he said. "When we got up there, and I saw her, I told my sister: 'I'm not going back.'"

Townsend said, after years away from his mother, he could not fathom waiting until he was 18 to spend more time with her.

"So, I stayed," he recalled.

Townsend attended West Division Sr. High School in Milwaukee (now known as Milwaukee High School of the Arts) and got a job to help support his mother. They spent roughly one year together, and Townsend said his mom's life was improving by the day.

"Everything happened for a reason in my life," he said. "Me singing at 10 years old, being in foster care... something was being planted when it was all getting ready."

What happened next was one of the most bittersweet moments of Townsend's life, even to this day.

"My sister was an evangelist, and so she came up to visit and said one day, 'you know what, mom? We're going to baptize you.'"

"And we baptized her in the tub," recalled Townsend, his eyes swelling with tears as he takes breaks to tell the story. "She gave her life to Christ, and everyone went to bed. I get up the next morning, and I got to school, and I get a call from my sister. I come home, and my mom had passed."

Townsend said he broke down and cried in the moment. He was in shock.

"After that, I went to the funeral, and I didn't cry anymore," he explained. "I said to myself: 'Put it together, Harrison. What are the chances that your mom would give her life to Christ, repent and get baptized and die that next morning?'"

Townsend, a Christian, said he believes there was nothing coincidental about it.

"God was making sure she was ready," he said.

Townsend went on to say that, if his mother were still in his life, he would not be the same man he is today. Following her passing, Townsend said he saw the world in a different light, and the motivation to honor her memory was pivotal in laying the foundation for his career.

"I need to do this for her," he said, as well as for his eight brothers and sisters.

Townsend got to work, finding jobs in manufacturing and print throughout the years, but encouragement from co-workers – who overheard him singing along to the radio one day – inspired him to take the leap into becoming a solo entertainer.

"The Lord gave me this gift," he said, and he started booking shows as an energetic song and dance impressionist known as Downtown Harrison.

"Before I knew it, it just started getting bigger and bigger," recalled Townsend, who made the move to Grafton at some point in his adult years.

He started getting booked for shows in the Kettle Moraine, and one such event took place in Kewaskum.

"I remember driving out here before I lived here, and I thought, 'Where the heck am I going?'" he said with a laugh, miming driving and looking through his car windows. "I thought, boy this is a really a nice town. It's small. It's compact... I like it!"

Townsend, after a few years performing in the village, decided to make the move, and he rented a place by the post office for many years.

"If you would have told me I would have moved here back then, I wouldn't have believed it," he said, adding that the relocation paid immediate dividends. "This is where I think I'm supposed to be. I have a feeling this is it."

Townsend was already a hit in the village and was the toast of local picnics, but he drew attention from far and wide. Milwaukee news stations featured him throughout the years, and he was even invited to perform on America's Got Talent.

He admitted, though, that his success got to his head, and he hit rock bottom when his first marriage fell apart.

"I was not a good husband. I'm not afraid to admit it," he said point blank, stating that the lessons he learned from his failures are some of his most cherished experiences. "My ex-wife and I, now, we are close, and there's been forgiveness. But I couldn't be the husband I am today if I didn't fail at first."

Townsend said one of the most difficult things he ever had to do was apologize to his first wife's parents. He was overcome with emotion while recalling the conversation.

"I went and I apologized to her mother and father," he started before stopping, his voice cracking. "I made a bad decision. I'm not perfect. I said, 'you trusted me, and I broke that trust. Please forgive me.'"

Now remarried and blessed with amnesty, Townsend has applied the lessons learned and created an environment that celebrates his and his wife's love in conjunction with their faith.

"Everything I do for her is because of Him," he said, recognizing the unconditional love he feels from his faith as the prime example of how to love a partner. "We just have the most amazing relationship. I can't wait to carry her around when we're older."

Redemption stories certainly inspire Townsend, and he talked at length about his work in the county jail system. For a period of roughly five years, he was a professional visitor for youth in the system, offering advice and guidance when there was little to go around.

"Something I'd tell those kids is that none of us are better than one another, and that's how we got to sit at this table," he said. "We got to learn to love one another."

It's a message that Townsend continues to share, even at his performances. He was not shy about pointing out how people might perceive him as different, but he said he thrives in that role, and he celebrates all people's uniqueness.

He said, sometimes, a stray person or two has expressed "discomfort" with his skin color. Instead of being offended or appalled, Townsend said he applies lessons learned from his Christian beliefs.

"People say things to see how your reaction is," he said, adding that he invites confrontation when it comes to race and culture. "People weren't born to hate. Somebody taught them that. It won't stop me from loving them."

"People are always looking for the light," he continued. "Sometimes, instead, you got to be the light. That's what I try to do. I try to bring the light, and I try to be the light."

Anyone who has had the great fortune of running into Townsend throughout the course of his day has certainly felt the warm glow of his presence. Even this journalist, when I lived on Main Street in Kewaskum, would find Townsend serenading post office employees at all hours of the day.

"I know everybody down at the post office," Townsend said, as if it was the most important truth he spoke that day. "I just like to make people happy."

Of late, Townsend seemed like he was on cloud nine, himself, and he gushed excitedly about his new home on the south side of town that he built with his wife, and he expressed optimism about his career, but in particular, about humanity and all the good times he has yet to have with his village compadres at a series of shows this summer.

Townsend will perform at the 125th anniversary celebration in June as well as at Party on the Pavement.

It's a fitting time to celebrate for sure, especially for Townsend, who has been such a fixture in this community for the better part of two decades. While he likely cannot keep it going until the village's 200th anniversary, you should never say "never" for a man known as "the human robot."

"I want to embrace whatever comes next in my life," said Townsend with an enormous smile.

Certainly, all his friends and neighbors here in Kewaskum, and across the state, can't wait to see what's next.

May 11, 2017

Marcol was in town to help his friends, Steve and Charlene Rose, with a documentary film they are in the process of making.

Students at Campbellsport Elementary School chose a historical figure to write a report about and then create a display to help with the portrayal of that figure at the wax museum. Just like at a real museum, visitors had to ring a bell in order for the student, dressed as the person he or she was representing, to give a presentation.

During its May 14 meeting, the Campbellsport Village Board discussed some vandalism problems that have been occurring at Columbus Parc the past two years. The article included a list of the vandalism, which was quite extensive, including fresh poured concrete damaged with profani-



ty, bases being stolen, light bulbs broken, obscenities written on picnic tables and bathroom walls, bent and broken basketball rims and nets, damaged playground equipment, and more. Board members approved a motion to put two signs up at the park to prohibit skateboarders and in-line skaters from skating on the picnic tables and playground equipment. With the addition of the signs, the police can issue citations when the rules are not followed.

At the Town of Auburn meeting, a motion was carried to pass a resolution authorizing the town's legal council to bring a lawsuit against Robert and Ann Rudzitis for contempt of court and violation of various town ordinances if a solution cannot be met when the two parties get together for a meeting in the next couple of weeks.

Also at the Town of Auburn meeting, a motion was passed to approve the rezoning of four lots, 29 acres from EAG to RD with a deed restriction allowing only one occupancy for each lot on the Edward Kirsch property along County Highway G and Old Bridge Road. The purchase of a five foot by eight foot trailer for the approximate cost of \$980 was approved. The trailer would be used for hauling the lawn mower and other items.

On April 13, the United States Air Force Band of Mid-America, under the direction of Captain Donald Schofield, performed at Fond du Lac High School. Area band directors were allowed to send representatives from their bands to perform with the Air Force Band. Campbellsport representatives were Sarah Newman and Sarah Quackenboss.

Wisconsin Power and Light Company, an Alliant Energy company, received unanimous approval from the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin on its Certificate of Authority application to construct Alliant Energy's first owned wind farm, Cedar Ridge Wind Farm. The wind farm will consist of 41 wind turbines spread out over a 12.2-square mile area in the townships of Eden and Empire. When complete, Cedar Ridge Wind Farm will generate between 60 and 99 megawatts of energy, or enough to power between 15,000 and 25,000 average residential homes. The wind farm is expected to be operational by the end of 2008 at an estimated cost of approximately \$180 million.

Three small projects will need to be done on North Helena, Ladwig, and Spring Streets. Problems were found while the construction of the sanitary sewer in that area was going on. The village board approved replacing drainage piping that was in bad shape. The construction company doing the work told the village they would charge only for time and material costs.

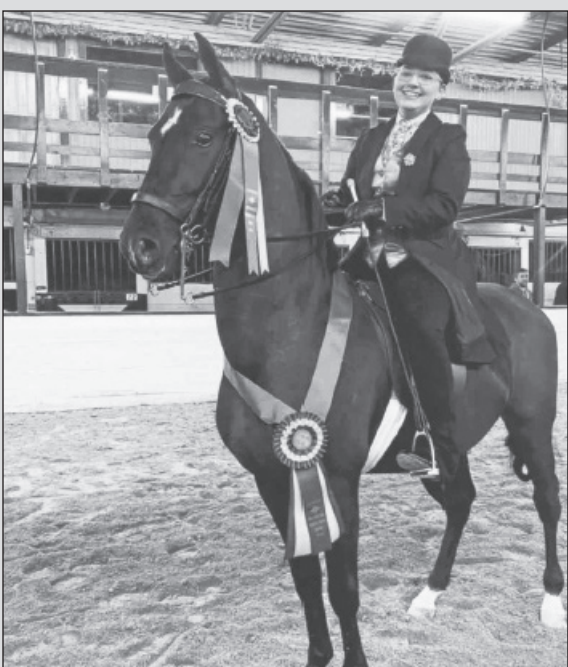

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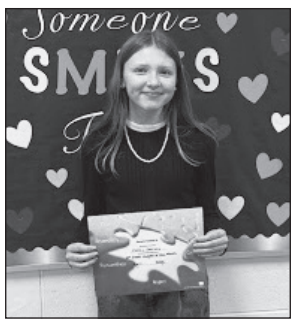

Turkey Hunting/Let the Good Times Roll

This week's column is about what is annually one of the best weekends of my year, and that is when I turkey hunt with my 21-year-old daughter, Selina Walters.

FRIDAY, APRIL 29
HIGH: 41, LOW: 28

This hunt would take part on a food plot that Selina and I have had the privilege to hunt turkey on for about 15 years. It is located close to my house in northern Juneau County, has a small pond and is surrounded on three sides by an oak and pine forest.

Selina and I would be hunting in a blind, and I was glad for that, as the now-normal cold rain and strong winds would be the theme for much of our three-day hunt.

I did not know if we would hunt this afternoon as Selina had to work and had class; she is a junior at UW-Stevens Point.

When she pulled in the driveway late this afternoon, she said she wanted to, so we patterned her 12-gauge and it was off to the hunt where we did not see a bird, but the two of us did some serious catching up, as we simply do not get to see

each other very much, anymore.

Tonight, it was puppy time for Selina as Ruby's pups are now four-weeks-old, and pups have always been a big part of her life when she is home.

HIGH: 39, LOW: 34

Thankfully, it wasn't raining when we started our hunt, but it was not long after and the rain started and, though there were breaks, it was nasty.

I had put a camouflage tarp on top of our blind, had a heater inside and life was very good.

There were turkey gobbling before daylight and for maybe 30 minutes afterwards, but then they went silent.

For me, this was a morning of deep thought. I put it together that 28 years ago – to the day – my father passed away from an apparent heart attack. I am 60. My dad was 60! The weekend before he passed away, we had camped and turkey hunted near Mazomanie. We had plans for the following weekend to fish on Lake Michigan and, yes, I was writing this column at the time, and my dad was a very big part of it.

On the weekend of

May 22, Selina's life will change, at least for the summer. She will take her last final on Friday, and, the next day, two roommates that she honestly is like sisters with will graduate from UW-Stevens Point and over at UW-Eau Claire, while her longtime boyfriend, Isaac LaBudda, will also graduate.

By Monday morning, she has to be moved out of her home and then she will drive to Eureka, Montana, by herself to start a summer internship/job with the U.S. Forest Service, which begins on Wednesday.

Selina will be in northwest Montana, 10 miles from the Canadian border, and she told me today that she is buying a kayak when she gets there.

So, we are enjoying

life, and, for the most part, we are keeping the rain out, and we are gabbing away like we always do, but in a very quiet way.

Just like that, a turkey gobbles and it seems close, but due to the forest cover – in a lot of cases – you don't see them until they are in range.

Both Selina and I have tags and, just like that, we see two heavy-bodied long-beards appear, and life is very good.

Kind-of-bad-luck comes our way when they are literally walking just out of range around our setup. I told Selina that I would give a call, and I let it fly, pretending that I was a hen just begging for some loving.

One of the toms was not quite as smart as the other, and Selina let it fly with a solid turkey load and, at 31-yards, that gobbler was toast.

Nothing mattered anymore, we would hunt that day, the next and I would on Tuesday.

Three times Selina shot turkey on prom weekend. Once she shot one at Rod Bensley's, and she has that tail in her room. Her first bird – this was her ninth – was a double beard at the age of 11 and, like when she heads to Montana, the story goes on and on.

I am not fibbing when I say this, which is something that I have always said:

“Get your kids involved in the outdoors, and you will have a friend for life.”

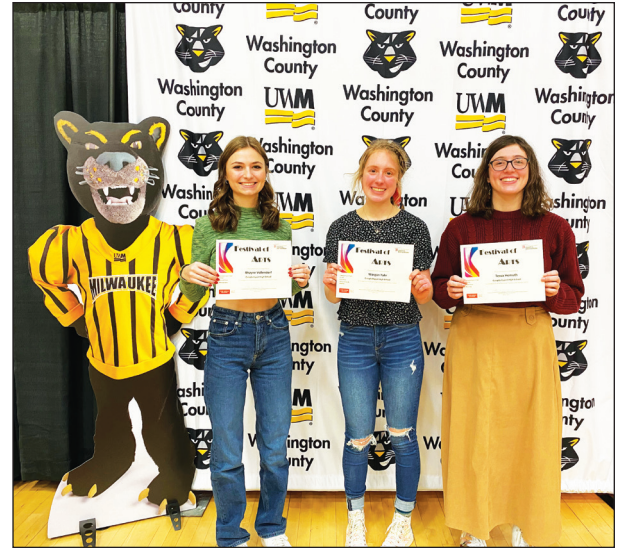

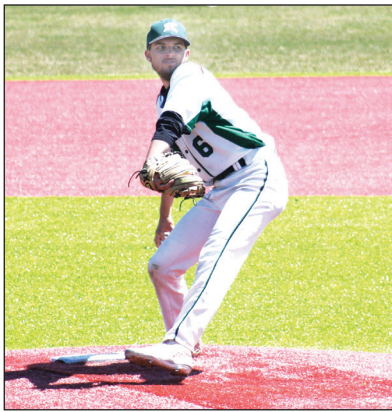

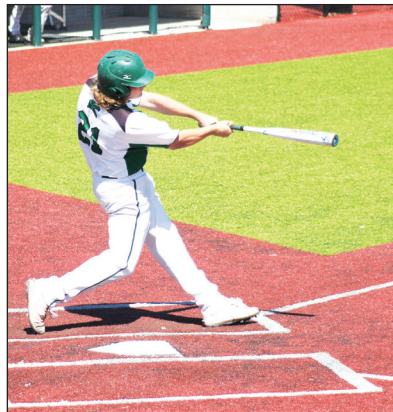
