The Kewaskum school board members met on Thursday, May 12, with the assemblage holding its yearly reorganizational meeting before the regular school board meeting.

The reorganizational meeting began with two members, Bradley Petersen and Tim Ramthun, being sworn in and reciting an oath of office.

Next, Petersen voted to appoint Jim Leister as board president and Tim Ramthun as vice president. There were no objections from the board. Petersen then voted to appoint Stephanie Bird as board clerk and Dennis Aupperle as Board Treasurer. Again, there were no objections from the board, and all nominated board members were approved to their respective roles. The regular board meeting began directly af-

The presentation will feature Val Scrivner and Joie Liscano, who will share information about the Potawatomi culture. They also will share memories about their grandmother Maggie Kewaskum, a Potawatomi girl who was born circa 1911 and who grew up on an Indian reservation in Kansas.

The presentation will be held on Sunday, June 12, in the Kewaskum High School auditorium at 3 p.m. Doors will open at 2:30 p.m.

The presentation is free of charge, but reserva-


PAID LETTER-TO-THE-EDITOR | Hogendyk Announces Candidacy for Washington County Clerk of Circuit Court

Evers' Record Vetoes Block Common Sense Reforms

Wisconsinites rightfully demand their elected officials work toward the common good. The fact that the legislature was able to accomplish some things with the governor's signature can leave the impression that Governor Evers is some reasonable, moderate politician. I think that impression does not stand up to scrutiny

when one considers his recordsmashing veto total. Governor Evers vetoed 126 bills this session. The previous record was 90, and it had stood for almost a century. Wisconsinites need to be aware what reforms Governor Evers was vetoing as he made history.

The Legislature passed a package of bills in early 2021 to curb the excesses of executive action after the initial COVID spike had receded and vaccines were being distributed to those who wanted them. SB 38 requested a plan for when state employees would return to taxpayer funded office buildings. ABs 23 & 24 would have stopped state and county bureaucrats from unilaterally ordering a vaccine mandate or shuttering houses of worship. All of these bills were vetoed.

The Legislature passed a series of bills dealing with education, particularly on how to accommodate challenges brought to the forefront during COVID. AB 963 codified a parental bill of rights as to the parent's role in their child's public school education. SB 463 required the posting of school district curriculum materials online so local debates over curriculum could be reasoned and informed. AB 970 removed the caps on the

S. Duane "Duey" Stroebel Jr. Wisconsin Parental Choice Program so families could pick the best school for their children, a position supported in the latest Marquette Law School Poll by a margin of 58% to 33%. All of these bills were vetoed.

The Legislature passed bills to deal with rising crime. SB 119 stopped cities from receiving their full state aid, a portion intended for law enforcement, if they defunded their own local police. SB 296 provided a punishment for rioting, like what occurred during the tragic mayhem in Kenosha. AB 827 increased penalties for coordinated mob theft rings that are becoming more common. All of these bills were vetoed.

The Legislature passed SB 16 to guarantee that a child who is born alive after a failed abortion attempt must not be left to die. The Legislature also passed AB 518 to accept a visitor's concealed carry permit from another state as valid in Wisconsin. The Legislature passed AB 173 to prohibit third party special interests from funding election administration in politically targeted communities. The Legislature passed AB 993 to prevent individuals who don't search for work, skip scheduled job interviews and refuse reasonable job offers from continuing to collect unemployment benefits. The Legislature even passed a bipartisan bill to ensure more frequent reading assessments in school to identify children who are falling behind to give them extra help. You guessed it, all of these bills were vetoed.

These bills are a small percentage of his handiwork. Governor Evers' record-breaking veto explosion means dozens of great policies and reforms are not the law today. Wisconsinites should remember what wasn't accomplished this session and why.

WISCONSIN STATE PATROL APRIL LAW OF THE MONTH

Distracted driving is a growing problem on Wisconsin roads. More than 10,000 crashes involved distracted driving last year, up more than 13% from 2020.

Cell phone use is one of the most common forms of distracted driving, but any interruption that takes your eyes and mind off the road can be a distraction. That includes use of a navigation system or other device, eating, personal care, and even passengers or pets.

Texting while driving is dangerous and illegal in Wisconsin. No text, email, or social media post is worth a crash, injury, or death.

"It takes just a moment for traffic conditions to

change. That means every second matters on the roads," Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent Anthony Burrell said. "Taking your eyes off the road can change a life in an instant."

Distracted driving can have deadly consequences. Fatalities connected with distracted driving have been rising in recent years. 26 people were killed in 2019, 31 in 2020 and preliminary numbers show 40 people died in distracted driving crashes in 2021.

Wisconsin statutes (346.89) that address distracted driving include:

• Inattentive driving is prohibited; any activity that interferes with the ability to drive safely.


Summer Farm, Art, & Vendor Market at the Campbellsport Library

The presentation will be the final event of the Kewaskum Historical Society's Founder's Day Celebration, which is being held June 10-12 to commemorate the Village of Kewaskum's 125th anniversary.

About Chief Kewaskum

In 2020, I co-wrote the book "Kewaskum, Wisconsin: The Making of a Village" with Aaron Laatsch, another volunteer for the Kewaskum Historical Society. We wanted to document the early history of the village.

The first chapter of our book is about Chief Kewaskum and Native Americans. We did a lot of research for that chapter, but there had already been a start on finding Chief Kewaskum's family. A picture of man identified as Chief Kewaskum appeared in area newspapers in 1905 along with an article stating that the chief had died. Since then, the man in the photo has been identified as Chief Peter Kewaskum, a Menominee chief who worked as a riverboat pilot in the mid-1800s.

We know who Chief Peter Kewaskum's family is. I have talked with Sean Taeschner, the greatgreat-grandson of Chief Peter Kewaskum, and he has a fascinating story of Chief Peter Kewaskum's accomplishments.


However, ever since the article first appeared in the *Kewaskum Statesman* in 1905, people have had doubts that Chief Peter Kewaskum is the same Chief Kewaskum after whom the village and town were named. One objection is that there are numerous claims that Chief Kewaskum had died decades earlier. Another quandary is: How could Chief Peter Kewaskum be the same Chief Kewaskum since he was a Menominee chief, not a Potawatomi chief?

Was there another Chief Kewaskum after whom the village and town had been named?


Finding the Kewaskum Family

To try to answer that question, in writing our book, we turned to the book "Kewaskum Then And Now," written in 1976 by Mark Smucker. We were unable to speak with Smucker, who died in 1979, but we were able to look through all of Smucker's folders filled with handwritten notes and research about the history of Kewaskum.

As part of his research, Smucker wrote a letter to the U.S. Department of the Interior's Bureau of Indian Affairs, inquiring whether there were any people in the United States with the name Kewaskum. In response, he received a letter in May 1975 stating that Maggie Kewaskum had been enrolled at Haskell Indian Junior College in Kansas from Sept. 2, 1928, to May 28, 1936. She received a high school diploma from Haskell on June 4, 1934, and a diploma in Arts and Crafts on May 26, 1936. Maggie Kewaskum had two chil-

dren, Barbara Jean and Delbert Gene. That is where the trail ended in Smucker's search for the Kewaskum family.

So, as we worked on our new book about Kewaskum, we picked up the trail. It made sense that members of Chief Kewaskum's family would have been relocated to Kansas when the Potawatomi people were forced off their land in Wisconsin in the 1800s.

Although Native American records are scarce, I was able to trace Maggie Kewaskum's roots back two more generations through the magic of the Internet, some wonderful genealogy sites and numerous old newspapers. Next, I wanted to find any living relatives. With a few clicks on my computer, I tracked down where Maggie and her children had lived. I read that Maggie had died on Feb. 2, 1992, but I found the names of her grandchildren.

We wanted to get in contact with them, so we made phone calls and sent letters. We tried Facebook Messenger. No response.

So I did some more research. I found that one of Maggie Kewaskum's granddaughters, Joie, works at Blue Cross Blue Shield in Massachusetts. Even though I figured it would be nearly impossible to track down a single employee of a huge insurance

company, I decided to give it a try. I dialed the 1-800 number.

I talked with the operator, and within a minute, I was transferred to Joie's personal line. She answered the phone.

I couldn't believe it! I introduced myself and told her about our book project.

Joie had never been to Wisconsin. And she had never heard of the Village of Kewaskum. But she was extremely helpful in filling in blanks for our research.

Since the book came out two years ago, I have stayed in contact with Joie and her sister, Val. They are both well-educated, easy to talk to and kind. Val is now 60 years old and lives in Oklahoma, where she works as an Information Technology supervisor in the Defense Information Systems Agency of the U.S. Department of Defense. Joie, who is 57, works as an executive assistant for Blue Cross Blue Shield.

Joie and Val have an amazing story to tell. They have both graciously agreed to travel to Kewaskum for the celebration and give a presentation about their family and the Potawatomi culture.

"I am looking forward to being in Wisconsin; I have never been there before. I am looking forward to the trip to where our ancestors traveled through and seeing Kewaskum," Val said.

"I am really excited to be there and to share our family with everyone," Joie added.

As for this reporter, I am excited to meet Joie and Val in person. I hope that many people from Kewaskum are able to attend their presentation.

- A ban on cell phone use by probationary license holders.
- A hand-held ban for all drivers in work zones, emergency, and roadside response areas.
- A texting ban for all drivers.
- Using devices for visual entertainment is prohibited for drivers.

All drivers are at risk of distracted driving crashes. In 2019, 72% of Wisconsin drivers involved in distracted driving crashes were older than 25.

Texting is one of the most dangerous distractions. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for five seconds. At 55-miles-perhour, that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed.

Drivers are urged to put their phones away when behind the wheel. If you need to text, pull over and stop the vehicle.

"Make a commitment to stop distracted driving. Always buckle up and put the phone down while driving. Every trip. Every time," Superintendent Burrell said.



What Was Lost: Some Math to Consider

Recently, many people have been coming forward with their own questionable trees. Where they bent by Native Americans? Is this even plausible? The answer could be yes, and their documentation and stories around them are appreciated.

Previous articles explained how the trees could have been bent, and possible examples. The following is some math to consider in regard to what might be left, as it is important for logic to enter the equation of these storied trees.

Two-hundred Feet to a Trail Tree In a 1941 publication of *The Scientific Monthly*, Dr. Raymond E. Janssen noted a trail marker tree bent by natives could be as close to every few hundred feet (p.25). However, Janssen was already concerned that we had lost so many trail trees by 1940.

His comments pertained to trails of the Great Lakes area closer to Chicago. He documented his conclusions on the Highland Park area. Around 1910, there were 11 in that chain of trail trees, but by 1940 there were only seven survivors. Janseen concluded: "Undoubtedly, they were originally spaced at relatively close intervals." But by World War II "buildings and civic development" took their toll (p.27). However, he reaffirmed the distance of the closest trail trees in the chain were less than two hundred feet apart, the most distant consecutive trail trees were

spaced more than half a mile. Quickert's 1923 Description

The next question would be how close were the trail trees in the Fond du Lac County, Washington County and Dodge County vicinity. Dodge County could be tricky to estimate trail trees, as one came close to Horicon Marsh there was less forested lands. But there is a significant publication by Carl Quickert (1869-1951) that gives great pause as one contemplates trail tree span in what was around Washington County.

In *The Story of Washington County*, published in 1923, he writes: "The ground was covered with forest of maple, oak, beech, elm, basswood, cedar, birch, hickory, butternut, and other trees; they were so dense that one could not see for more than a few rods in any direction," (p. 23).

This requires the definition of a "rod." There are different lengths used as synonyms, but a rod appears to be about 16 and a half feet. Other sources may have claimed less or more, but certainly a rod is less than 30 feet. I am using rod as defined by U.S. survey methods as 16.5 feet. Given a rod is certainly less than 30 feet, and a Washington County settler couldn't see more than (Quickert's) "a few rods in any direction," it seems very likely one could not see in some forest parts more than 200 feet ahead. This would suggest that a trail tree would be required within 200 feet, especially when pushing into the Kettle Moraine and its hills

of Washington County and lower Fond du Lac County.

Furthermore, Quickert's analysis suggests that even the lowlands were packed: "Between the trunks the wild vine hung its festoons. The many streamlets, creeks and rivers, fed by thousands of bubbling springs, were lined with willow, alder, and lilac. The lowlands had been picked out by tamarack and juniper," (p.23).



5 Years Ago May 25, 2017

This week's issue included a tribute to those from our area who served our nation and passed on; listing Memorial Day services and ceremonies as well as the names of those who are no longer with us, where they are buried and the war in which they served.

Another mathematical concern is the Old Northwest, the territory created in the 1780s that was divided into five states: Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin. A sliver of Minnesota was also part of the Northwest Territory north/ north east of the Mississippi River's origins and west of the St. Croix River.

Please keep in mind that there is a significant difference in the timing of available trail marker trees surviving. Ohio became a state in 1803, and was an industrial powerhouse by the late 1800s, giving us many U.S. presidents like Rutherford B. Hayes (1877-1881), James Garfield (1881) and Benjamin Harrison (1889-1893). The point being, Ohio was heavily developed by the time Wisconsin was only 20 years old. Given 45 years separated the first (Ohio-1803) and last full state (Wisconsin-1848) coming out of the Northwest Territory, it's important to recognize the difference in time allowed for trail trees to survive and still be shaped. Even the source mentioned above (Janssen) — largely on Illinois trees, probably should adjust 30-40 years when ap-

plied to some Wisconsin trees which were allowed to live, grow and be reshaped by Natives around the 1830s, and maybe later when considering

squatters hung around Washington County after statehood.

In short, the timing of urbanization of Chicagoland applied to trail tees is very different when applied to rural townships around Highway 28 running through Washington and Dodge counties in Wisconsin.

A Local Equation

It is very hard to prove that a trail tree was bent by Natives. I understand that very well. But over the course of articles, I have tried to lay some arguments on trees that likely are trail trees or Native-bent trees. Rest assured there are many questionable trees excluded from the pile for publication.

So take a conservative estimate. Assuming Janssen was correct, a trail tree bent by natives could be every 200 feet. To be cautious let us triple the equation of trail tree distance. For the math, let us say in the woodlands of lower Fond du Lac County and Quickert's old Washington County, a trail tree had to be every 200 yards (600 feet).

In a typical township, the distance was six miles by six miles, dividing into often tidy 36 square sections. Using intervals that are wider than what Janssen documented, it is very easy to conclude at least 50 trail trees could have been in what became the length of a township in the areas of Washington and Fond du Lac Counties. This is because a mile (5,280 feet) should be multiplied by

You can access AtoZdatabases at home or in the library. If you have questions and you are in the library, ask a staff member. I spent one Saturday helping a patron create mailing lists from a map search. I will tell you; I was not an expert on what they needed, but we were able to go through the help sections and they came away with a very workable list. If you have questions using the database from home, there are many help features included. It's called AtoZUniversity and they state that "at AtoZU, our mission is to provide quality education that will strengthen the knowledge of both patrons and librarians."

They offer online classes Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 10:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

There is a course about basic searching on AtoZdatabases. This covers the three quick search options, goes through key features of each database, and shows how to generate lists including printing, downloading, and emailing options. Another course is, "How to Find a Job, Résumé Writing & Ace an Interview." In that class they generate lists of job opportunities, go over job tips, and look at various résumé templates and tips. If you have a business, the class "How to Find New Customers & Grow Your Business" may be for you. This class shows how using AtoZdatabases strengthens client lists and can increase the foot traffic within your business. It also covers topics such as generating lists, emailing data, creating matrices, and figuring out who your competition is.

Besides the classes, there is a comprehensive help section that includes articles, how-to videos and live chat. When I was assisting the patron with mailing lists, we used the live chat and it was valuable.

I hope you take advantage of AtoZdatabases and then come on in and tell me about it.

the length of miles in most townships (six) divided by the space (600 feet) separating one average trail marker tree to the next. This math suggests over 50 trees could have been bent in a chain in what became one individual township. Mind you, this equation only concludes one trail running through what became a township — not places where paths crossed. And clearly given the significance of sites in the area, there are some townships which could have had intersecting trails.

As a reminder, the above estimate is conservative. Some trail trees were likely less than 200 feet away from each other — not 600 feet. It is possible some townships had more than 100 trail trees existing 300 years ago. fields or villages. Even if 10 percent would still be alive, many are gone because of the intentional altering of our landscape in the past 200 years.

It is in that context that the surviving trail trees (probably less than five percent of a township's original trail trees) would be three to five trees. I am confident in time some townships in the vicinity will bare proof of more than three surviving trail trees. When that time comes, maybe we will have a clearer vision of what has been lost.

For good measure, may you be left with this: in lower Fond du Lac County, two trail marker trees are just over a mile apart. In between them, on a direct line remains open farm fields and a few fence lines. There are no remaining woods in between which date back to statehood. It seems a safe assumption there were other trail trees in between when the two nearest remaining remnants of the old forested lands of 1850 are batting a thousand. So how many trail marker trees are out there? Most of those answers are buried in the soil. But some stand resolute as a testament to people as great as the distance their moccasins traversed. Your pictures, interest, and questionable trees are all worth bringing forward as we try to salvage some pieces the trail puzzle.



of the Flyway Championship, however, later that night, the Cougars got some help as Mayville nipped W.L.A. 3-2.


With the W.L.A. loss, the Campbellsport Cougars won the Flyway Championship outright.


