'Words Cannot Describe' – Wisconsin Resident Visits Ukraine Amid Crisis

Camp Vista Director Andrew Fidziukiewicz of Eden, Wis., and a native of Poland, visited Ukraine in March amid the Russian invasion. He provided the below information and words of reflection to share with our readers.

ANDREW FIDZIUKIEWICZ CAMP VISTA DIRECTOR

During my travels, I saw the difference that even the smallest gift could make.

I visited the city of Sokolka, Poland, then Przemysl, and its train station, which is the closest one to the Ukrainian border. I also crossed the border into the beautiful, historical town of Lviv, where I experienced the Russian airstrike that hit the petroleum plant located on the edge of the city.

What I saw was a firsthand encounter of despair, tragedy and sorrow of so many people affected by this disastrous war. Words cannot describe what I have witnessed, but all I can say is that: What I saw, I hope, no one would ever have to experience for themselves.

| LETTER TO THE EDITOR |

Reader Views State Senator's Critiques of Evers' Vetoes as Unfair

In the May 19 [edition of this newspaper], District 20 Wis. State Sen. Duey Stroebel (R–Saukville) wrote about Wis. Gov. Tony Evers' vetoes on what Mr. Stroebel considered "common sense" reforms.

One element of Stroebel's opinion that was ignored was the reason Gov. Evers vetoed these bills.

So, according to the veto explanations, published from the Office of the Governor, I will attempt to provide this information:

SB 296 – the "Riot Bill" – and AB 827: concerned penalties for rioting. The bills were vetoed because they duplicate existing laws and could criminalize non-violent protestors.

SB 119: concerned "defunding local police". It was vetoed because it set onerous restrictions on local governments to set their budgets. Instead, Gov. Evers proposed increases in aid and levy limit flexibility so local governments could govern "as they see fit".

SB 16: concerned preventing a child who is born alive after a failed abortion attempt cannot be left to die. It was vetoed because state law already provides these protections.

AB 963: a parental bill of rights to parents. It was vetoed because parents, educators and school boards already work together to do what's best for our children. Gov. Evers feels support for our schools, not division, is the best tool in education, and this bill is unnecessary.

AB 970: removing caps on the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program, was vetoed because it created an unfunded \$1,000 per-student education account reimbursement program. It could have a

\$500 million impact on taxpayers in a school year, which would be fiscally irresponsible.

SB 463: required the posting of school curriculum materials online. This bill would require a list of bibliographic information on every piece of material or activity covered in a school year. It was vetoed because no appropriation, staff or resources were established in the bill to maintain this list. Also, federal laws already exist that require policies and procedures to respond to parents' concerns about instructional materials.

AB 173: prohibits third parties from funding election administration in politically targeted communities. It was vetoed because, as demonstrated during the pandemic, these funds were utilized by election administration, according to existing state and federal law, to provide a safe election. Gov Evers has faith in local governments, election administrators and poll workers to follow existing election laws.

You can find all of these veto explanations at *docs.legis.wisconsin.gov*.

Mr. Stroebel's term ends in 2025 but, due to gerrymandering, which he wholeheartedly supports, his re-election is likely guaranteed.

Gov. Evers election relies on all of Wisconsin voters.

The Wisconsin State Legislature was in session from Jan 18, 2022 to March 8, 2022. I would hope for the rest of the year, since he has the time, Mr. Stroebel would be somewhat fair in his complaints against Gov. Evers.

In just the span of a day when I went to help on the Ukrainian side, more than 31,000 refugees crossed the Ukrainian/Polish border, and this was surprisingly a "manageable" number. There have been times where more than 150,000 refugees crossed the border in just one day.

Each of these refugees has their own tragic story, and here are a few that touched my heart:

1. A mother with a child from the Donbas area said that she had time to pack only two suitcases of just necessary things. In the middle of her fleeing journey, she had to leave one behind at a transfer area because there was no more room, as there were so many people and not enough room for belongings.

2. A woman I spoke with said that,

as she found refuge in Poland, she received a call that her house was totally destroyed and two of her sons were missing on the battle front. She was praying at every moment of the day for her sons to be found.

3. The war created panic and uncertainty in Ukraine. Ukrainians in the areas effected by war have just one basic need and desire, and that is to have a meal each day. Some try to leave the war zones but are unable to, due to Russians blocking humanitarian convoys.

These stories don't even scratch the surface of the devastation that is happening in Ukraine, and the effects it has on surrounding areas.

To anyone who has provided material or financial relief to those in crisis: I assure you, your donations were heaven-sent to these people who don't know if they will see their families, or even tomorrow.

If you can imagine being in a position where you don't know if you will ever see your brothers, sons and husbands again, or how you will eat or even where you will sleep, please pray for the people for whom this is a reality.

Thank you, again, for everyone's generosity and for your prayers. Our community efforts were able to provide food and other support to the refugees who have nothing.

In these two weeks I spent abroad, I have not only experienced the need and desperation and the tragedy of people. but also I have experienced the solidarity and the big and generous heart of our community.

On behalf of the Ukrainian people affected by the war with Russia, I would like to sincerely thank everyone for their prayers and tremendous financial support. We were impressed at your response to a crisis that seems so far away from our little Village of Eden.

Together, we raised \$17,221, which included \$9,209 raised by the Shepherd of the Hills Parish, alone.

These donations were shared with the refugees in my hometown of Suprasl, Poland, and beyond, as I went to help in areas spanning wider than places I planned on going to.

Thank you, and God bless you all!



'Raised from the Ashes' Camp Vista to Celebrate Rebuilding of Chapel

A blessing and festival will take place at the camp's grounds on Saturday, June 4

It was heart-wrenching scene in the north Kettle Moraine Forest on October 24, 2018, at Camp Vista located in the southeast section of Osceola township: the Catholic summer retreat's chapel, named Our Lady of the Vista, at the remote site just west of Long Lake, had burned to the ground.

Remaining after the fire, the cause of which remains "undetermined", was just a chimney and the structure's foundation. The fire was discovered by a local at roughly 5 a.m., but the bulk of the damage had been done by the time nearly one dozen local fire departments arrived at the scene.

Countless items were lost: a large wooden cross that hung inside that included a time capsule and two wooden altars (crafted by a carpenter from local trees) were listed among the most-cherished items burned into the ether.

What was not lost, however, according to Camp Vista Manager Andrew Fidziukiewicz, was his and the community's resolve. Almost as quickly as the chapel burned a vision to rebuild it was brewing. Money was raised from across the state, and by 2020, the hope of reconstruction had come to fruition.

Fidziukiewicz's vision will finally become a reality on Saturday, June 4, as a brand new chapel on the grounds will be officially opened alongside a holy mass and blessing of the new Our Lady of Hope Vista Chapel at 4 p.m. Throughout the day, Fidziukiewicz and camp staff will host the Vista Festival from noon to 9

p.m. (including the 4 o'clock service). Archbishop Jerome Listecki will

Archbishop Jerome Listecki will be present to bless the new facility, and the public is welcome to attend and celebrate at the outdoor festival, which will include food stations, outdoor music and fun and games for all ages.

The new chapel broke ground – after roughly one-and-a-half years of fundraising – on March 13, 2020.

"Coincidentally, that same day – just a few hours later – the White House declared the coronavirus a national emergency," stated Camp Vista's website. "As a result, our retreat was closed for the entire year."

The pandemic caused a dramatic cut in the camp's income, and the organization stated that it earned "just enough" funds since to remain in operation all the while rebuilding the chapel. The group had planned to unveil the building in September of last year, but was forced to delay until the present.

All things considered, it has been a tough four years for the Christian retreat, but the optimism has never ceased, and Fidziukiewicz is looking forward to seeing the community again after so many tribulations.

"All are invited!" said an enthusiastic Fidziukiewicz, who added that folks would be wise to bring their own folding chairs on Saturday.

In addition to the holy mass, blessing and outdoor fun, a schedule of concerts and activities will also take place inside the newly reconstructed chapel.

Fidziukiewicz asked that those planning to attend be so kind as to RSVP by e-mailing *campvista@outlook.com*.

Anything for a Coho

Thirty-three years ago this week I was living in the Canadian bush and was the camp manager at Chimo Lodge and Outposts; a fly in fishing camp.

It was my second season, and I had made an agreement with Dick and Molly Emerson who owned the *Poynette Press*, to write a weekly column about my six months in the bush.

When I came home in November, this column which at the time was called "North of the Border" – was very popular and, this week, I am writing for 65 papers, and I love my job.

TUESDAY, MAY 17 HIGH: 53, LOW: 36

One reason that cold weather in mid-May is a good thing is that coho salmon, which migrate north each spring, continue to swim in shallow water.

The water that I am talking about is Lake Michigan, and this week's outdoor adven-

ture took place at the Port of Kenosha, as I was paddle-trolling out of my canoe.

I have taken part in this type of experience about once a year for 20 years; some years I paddle in the middle of the summer and push myself all night, as there is generally less wind and boat traffic.

The coho action is in late April to, maybe, June 1.

I put in at the marina in Kenosha, and when I paddled back after dark, I slept in the backseat of the "Chevy

Hotel."

During this late afternoon, until about an hour after dark, I did not see one other watercraft on Lake Michigan, and it was quite chilly.

I used a Helix 7 for electronics a 2x6 C clamped to my gunnels with 3 Scotty, rod holders and I also have a Coleman propane lantern that is screwed to the 2x6.

Two of the rod holders were loaded with trolling rods that were rigged with dodger/fly combinations that had a left and a right planer board to pull them away from my canoe.

My other rig was a spinning rod with 12-pound test line, and I was using a deep diving crankbait on it.

ity of paddling a canoe and fishing this style: It is hard to paddle fast enough to make your lures attract a fish, and it is crazy-hard to land a fish once you get a hookup (which, in my case, is rare).

So I reach 40-feet of water, which is maybe 1.5 miles from shore, all is well in my world and one of my rods with a flasher fly starts bending, and I can see a coho jumping like a bunny 35-feet behind the board.

At this point nothing, not even death matters.

First thing I have to do is quit going into the wind or else my other two lines are guaranteed to get real ugly with each other and with the rod with the coho on it.

Literally the first time the Helix 7 showed 40-feet, my crankbait got whacked, and it was fish on.

The game is much easier in a canoe with a spinning rod and no planer board. I did not worry about the other lines and, just like that, I had coho number-two flopping in the belly of my rig and, this time, I pulled a beer out and thoroughly enjoyed the moment.


I have come to realize that the way I paddle troll, which is by squatting on my knees, has a mental and physical max of five hours. At about three-and-a-half hours, I start to lose most feeling, and, at four, I couldn't swim if I had to. At five hours, it literally takes me a lengthy period of time to get out of the canoe when I reach shore, and I pray there is no one watching.

After another wonderful night in the back seat of The Chevy Hotel, I put five-anda-half hours on Lake Michigan and had one chance. It was one of those jumping coho's and it was on a flasher fly.

On one of its jumps, it was a home run for the fish, and it was a good thing for the coho, because when I catch a salmon in a canoe, the chance of it getting released is about as slim as gas going back to two-bucks-a-gallon.

Live large while you have the option!

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


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

Office of the Fond du Lac County Clerk To the voters of Fond du Lac County:

Notice is hereby given of a special election to be held in Fond du Lac County on June 7, 2022, at which the officer named below shall be nominated. The name of the candidates for office, whose nomination have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, in the sample

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

state their name and address

show an acceptable form of photo identification*

sign the poll book

*If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth and then proceed to a machine to cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked. A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. When using an electronic ballot marking device to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

<u>Spoiling Ballots</u>
If a voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, the voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device

The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

The following is a sample of the official ballot:

Sample Ballot Special Election for County Executive June 7, 2022

Notice to voters: if you are voting on Election Day, your ballot must be initialed by two (2) election inspectors. If you are voting absentee, your ballot must be initialed by the municipal clerk or deputy clerk. Your ballot may not be counted without initials (see end of ballot for initials).

General Instructions If you make a mistake on your ballot or have a question, ask an election inspector for help (absentee voters: contact your municipal clerk). 

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

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Erickson Collects First Career PDTR 360 Sprint Car Win

With the touring stars of the Tezos All Star Circuit of Champions in town for the series' fifth annual appearance at The Plymouth Dirt Track at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth, a contingent of Wisconsin-based drivers used their local knowledge to steal the spotlight with 10-time Bumper to Bumper Interstate Racing Association champion Bill Balog of Hartland leading the way en route to his third career All-Star Circuit of Champions 410 Sprint Car Series main event victory in the All Stars-IRA Shootout Saturday, May 21.

Balog, who earned his first career All Star Circuit of Champions A-main victory at The Plymouth Dirt Track last year, led a Wisconsin sweep of all three podium positions in the 30-lap All Stars-IRA Shootout A main, as Danny Schlafer of Sussex placed second and Sheboygan's Scotty Thiel finished third.

In the 25-lap Plymouth Dirt Track Racing 360 Sprint Car A main, Justin Erickson of Plymouth notched his first career main event triumph.

The initial start of the 30-lap All Stars-IRA Shootout main event was negated after Brandon Spithaler of Renfrew, Penn. hit the wall in turn three. After a complete restart, Bill Balog jumped into the lead from the pole position as Danny Schlafer, who started on the outside of the front row, slipped into second and fourth starter Parker Price-Miller of Kokomo, Ind. moved up into third.

By lap five, Balog caught the rear of the field and began to negotiate his way through lapped traffic, which allowed Schlafer to cut the lead considerably. The second and final caution flag flew on lap 10 when Blake Nimee of Oswego, Ill. spun against the turn two wall.

Scotty Thiel, who started third, dove underneath Schlafer to briefly take over second place before the two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion regained the runner-up spot several laps later.

Balog, who is in his second season as full-time competitor with the All Star Circuit of Champions, had to deal with dense lapped traffic on the lightning fast and relatively narrow track surface over the final 10 laps of the event, but he skillfully sliced his way through the gaggle of slower cars to extend his lead over Schlafer in the closing laps en route to his third career All Star Circuit of Champions A-main victory, 133rd career IRA main event triumph and fifth straight A-main victory in his last five starts in All Stars and IRA competition at Plymouth.

The victory earned Balog \$6,600, including \$600

in bonus money courtesy of Newton-based Mulch Express of Wisconsin through the Gr8 Challenge, which awarded \$100 to the leader of lap 8 of the All Stars-IRA A-main and an additional \$500 if the leader on lap 8 went on to win the race.

"This is what we want to do running with the All Stars," Balog said. "We want to get feature wins and better finishes than we have been getting. We've been struggling a bit at some of the tracks we've been to with the All Stars this year. For some reason, we were good tonight. I wish the All Stars would come to Wisconsin a little more often. I have to thank all of my guys and supporters for helping to make this happen and all of the great fans here for helping to make us feel so comfortable and welcome the few times we get to race here now."

Schlafer, who owns 23 Plymouth Dirt Track Racing 360 Sprint Car A-main victories and has yet to record an IRA A-main win, had to settle for an IRA career-best second-place finish.

"I can't be too upset to run second to Bill because he's the king of Wisconsin Sprint Car racing," Schlafer said. "To run second is a hell of a night for us and to do it with the All Stars is an honor. My crew is what puts me here. I may get all the credit as the driver, but they make me look good."

Thiel placed third, Price-Miller was fourth and Kyle Reinhardt of Neptune City, N.J. finished fifth after starting seventh.

The opening lap of the 25-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car A main saw 2018 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Justin Miller of Plymouth and Justin Erickson, who started fourth, dueled side by side over the first two laps before Erickson surged into the lead in turn two on lap 3.

By lap 6, Erickson proceeded to bolt out to a full-straightaway advantage over Miller before encountering lapped traffic for the first time on lap 10.

Two laps later, the first of two caution flags appeared when Chris Larson of Franksville spun in turn two. On the restart, Tim Haddy of Waupun, who started on the pole, used the high groove to turn to surge past Miller into second place,

Miller battled back on lap 15 as Haddy and Miller swapped the runner-up spot back-and-forth over the next five laps before Haddy regained the position on lap 20. One lap later, Larson spun again in turn four to bring out the second and final caution flag of the race.

Erickson controlled the ensuring single-file restart and held on over the final four laps to collect his first career PDTR 360 Sprint A-main victory.

Haddy finished second, Miller wound up third, defending PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Travis Arenz of Sheboygan Falls, who started 18th, charged up through the field to place fourth and 2011 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Ben Schmidt of Plymouth, who started fifth, rounded out the top five.

Justin Peck of Monrovia, Ind. won the 12-lap All Stars-IRA B main. Two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Kurt Davis of South Milwaukee won the 15-lap PDTR 360 Sprint Car B main.

In All Stars-IRA qualifying, Parker Price-Miller led the way by establishing a new PDTR track record with a lap of 10.895 seconds to shatter Scotty Thiel's previous track record of 11.300 set on July 1, 2021.

2008 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett earned overall fast qualifier honors in the PDTR 360 Sprint Car division with a lap of 12.696 seconds.

The third PDTR program of the 2022 campaign, which was sponsored by JDL Automotive, drew a strong field of 36 All Stars-IRA 410 Sprint Cars and 31 PDTR 360 Sprint Cars.




