Campbellsport Plans to Open **Second Tax Incremental District**

A public hearing regarding "TID #2" will take place on Thursday, June 23

A new tax incremental district (TID) could be coming to the Village of Campbellsport, as the municipality has unveiled plans and boundaries for TID #2 in anticipation of a public hearing to be held on the matter this Thursday, June 23, at 5:45 p.m. in the village's Municipal Center at 470 Grandview Ave.

Tax incremental districts, which were introduced in the State of Wisconsin roughly five decades ago, allow municipalities to reinvest collected property taxes (from homes and businesses within the TID) back into the same district over a specified timeframe. Typically, the goal of a TID is to stimulate new public infrastructure, offset redevelopment costs and provide motive for business development and growth all the while limiting or eliminating costs to village taxpayers.

"It's proven to be one of the most successful tools to encourage development," said Campbellsport Village Administrator Charlie Kurdy.

Kurdy, who joined the village in 2020, is a native of West Milwaukee, and he saw first hand, growing up, how beneficial TIDs can be to underdeveloped or underutilized spaces; American Family Field (then known as Miller Park) in West Allis utilized TIDs for the project, which entirely reshaped the portion of Milwaukee County.

"It allows a municipality to partner with developers, and we can give them different tools for financial incentive, land incentives, debt reimbursements... all dependant upon what type of development and how much development," explained Kurdy.

Campbellsport's first TID program was launched in 2011, according to Kurdy. TID #1 is located at the south end of the village - south of Campbellsport Dive, east of County Road W and west of County Road V. Several of the businesses located in the district were recruited to build into TID #1, and the new Valley View sub-

I've had writer's block.

Audit, Sewage Rates and Vandalism the Topics at Campbellsport Village Meeting

The Campbellsport Village Board of Trustees met on Monday, June 13.

At the meeting, two presentations were given and many members of the community came to take part in the discussion.

The first presentation was given by Bryan Grunewald of Clifton Larson Allen (CLA). It was stated that this is the first year Campbellsport is using the CLA firm for auditing. Grunewald in-

formed the board of the village's audit results and compared Campbellsport's balances from 2020 to 2021. There was nothing major to note from his findings, as the village was shown to be in good financial health.

Grunewald did make a mention of sewer rates, a segment which all municipalities will be monitoring closely in the near future.

"The village shows no red flags but, because of possible inflation, it is important to stay on top of operating costs," he said, suggesting that another sewage rate hike could be prudent in the near

Next, Joe DeYoung from MSA presented information on storm water drainage. There have been concerns among community members regarding flooding when it rains with some residents in attendance stating that they have been dealing with yard and basement flooding for many years.

It was stated that the main flooding issue occurs along Popler Street.

DeYoung pointed out that the purpose of his presentation was solely to inform the community about possible options and to communicate pressing concerns. He highlighted that there is not one solution to this issue that will solve everyone's problems; there are only options that may assist in reducing concerns.

DeYoung showed a map of Campbellsport and explained the current draining system. He then went on to show placement of four possible ponds that could be dug to help reduce the amount of water flowing through the community during a storm. DeYoung stated that any one of the four potential ponds would help control the water but there would likely still be issues.

It was suggested, for the present, that it is best to keep exploring different opportunities that may present themselves as time goes on to help mitigate future flooding issues.


No decisions or actions were made regarding this discussion.

Finally, Campbellsport Police Chief Tom Dornbrook gave his monthly report to the board. The Chief discussed the vandalism in Firemans Park and in the public bathrooms. He stated that, after posting about the damages on Facebook, those who were involved came forward and the department was able to deal with the issues.

Unfortunately, because of repetitive vandalism, the bathrooms at the park will be locked until further notice.

The board went into closed session and reconvened to open session to adjourn.

division was also part of the first village TID.

"It covered all of what used to be called the Huspen Farm area, and the intention was to encourage the development of our business park along Industrial Parkway," said Kurdy.

In addition to the industrial park and Valley View, TID #1 also encompasses Soaring Eagle subdivision. At present, Kurdy said the village is wrapping up the first phase of this project with additional development inside the industrial park expected in the next few months. He anticipated that TID #1 would become financially sustainable in the next few years.

"So it will not be a burden to the taxpayers," added Kurdy. "This is the goal of every TID."

With the first TID already showing signs of success, Kurdy and village officials believe now is an ideal time to roll out a second. In addition to adding new portions of the village to a TID, TID #2 will also absorb portions of TID #1. TID #1 is set to expire in 2032.

The boundaries of TID #2 will include unfinished portions of Valley View, and will (roughly speaking) include parcels between the Eisenbahn State Trail and S. Fond du Lac Ave (Hwy. V), as well as portions of the neighborhood north of Precision Drive and west of Firemans Park. A good portion of "uptown" – Campbellsport's Main Street drag – is included in the TID; both sides of the street from Firemans Park to Elm Street (with some exceptions) are included.

Development in the village, outside the TID districts, has grown exponentially the last few years both in scope, cost and demand. Just a few years ago, according to Kurdy, dozens of empty lots stood ready for development and construction, but some subdivisions now only have a few spaces available. In addition, the average assessed value for a home has risen in the village with some homes (not yet built) being sold for more than \$400,000.

"The intention for TID #2 is to take that momentum and elongate that," said Kurdy, adding that, should TID #2 be approved, the village would cap-

italize on tax increment for projects planned for this summer.

He added that this would be a significant boon for TID #2, as TID #1 (which was founded at a time when less development was happening across the village) took several years of village funding to get it up and running.

Already, there are several development companies ready to break ground in TID #2 this year.

Kurdy is particularly excited about the opportunities for uptown, and he hopes residents will agree that collaborative development between the bike trail and Poplar Street will only aid Campbellsport's community-first identity as it seeks to re-grow its population during this next census period.

While the village saw a population decline in the last census (a large portion of which were residents from the former convent), the data (particularly the applications for new home permits) has signaled to Kurdy that Campbellsport will regain, quickly, the numbers it lost from the 2020 figures.

A lot of that growth will, in part, be on the messaging of the village, and Kurdy is eager to work with future developers, homeowners and business leaders, as the presumed launch of TID #2 will serve as a significant message that this village intends to grow and improve.

"We are here, we are ready, we are prepared and this is what we can offer you," said Kurdy, saying that now, more than ever, people are viewing Campbellsport as the perfect locale to work, live and play. "We're trending in the right direction... It makes my job really easy to go out and brag about Campbellsport, because we already have so much to offer."

Property Re-evaluation Letters to be Mailed Soon

Village of Kewaskum property owners can expect letters imminently, which will detail a new valuation process for homes and businesses spaces, as Kewaskum officials respond to a new state law dictating that all communities be valued at 100% of market value, and that the last assessments be kept within 10% of that value.

The three-year process to re-evaluate home and business values will not have an effect on this year's tax bill. The new assessments will be effective on Jan. 1, 2023.

The assessor will consider just the exterior of the property when determining the market value; no entrance into homes or businesses is necessary.

It was unknown the last time the village took part in a re-evaluation process.

Property valuations are vital to local, regional and state government, as the individual values pool into municipalities' assessed and equalized values. A given village's equalized value, and whether or not it has increased or decreased in given timeframes, determines, in some cases, what state and federal funding might be available, and also will dictate, to some degree, how much a municipality can tax its residents for goods and services.

for your brain are the ones that are least processed. Research published in 2021 found that a steady diet of highly processed foods resulted in memory problems and brain inflammation, increasing the risk of developing dementia, Alzheimer's and other neurological diseases.

"Highly processed foods" include those with heavily refined carbohydrates, saturated fats and low fiber (things like chips, white bread, sugary snacks, hot dogs, processed lunchmeats and "fake meat" burgers).

While research found that the negative brain effects of this "standard American diet" could be offset by adding dietary DHA (found in salmon, tuna and "omega-3" supplements like fish oil), it's best for your brain and your body to limit heavily processed foods and choose more whole grains, fewer processed meats (like hot dogs and lunchmeats), foods high in fiber and lots of vegetables.

And, as your car benefits from the occasional fuel additive, your brain can also get a boost from certain add-ins. Supplementing healthy nutrition habits with antioxidants can provide even more protection against inflammation, and help reduce the effects of stress and aging.

In addition to DHA, ask your doctor about the health benefits of adding vitamins A, C and E, as well as CoQ10 (co-enzyme Q 10).

Regarding alcohol: In the largest study of its kind, an analysis of 36,000 adults found that just seven drinks per week can literally shrink your brain. When increased to 2 drinks per day, the effect was the equivalent of more than two years of brain aging.

If long-term brain health is your goal, then limiting alcohol consumption to no more than a couple drinks per week is your healthiest bet.

Turning Off and Tuning Out

We'll talk more next week about how sleep and stress can affect brain health, and steps you can take to improve both.

Until then, remember that we don't decide our future: we decide our habits, and our habits determine our future.

Kewaskum Sewer Lateral Bills Due in October

The Kewaskum Board Village of Trustees met on Monday, June 20, and at the meeting a public hearing was held to discuss the sanitary sewer laterals.

The project to repair and update property laterals took place back in 2014, but the bill is now being delivered to residents. Any person who has a home or a business located in the region of this assessment is responsible for covering the cost of the sewer lateral that was repaired or replaced.

Concerned residents were in attendance and asked several questions during the public hearing. The board acknowledged public comments and tried to address concerns as best as they could. Each individual had their own situation regarding the matter, and the board agreed to go over each issue at a separate meeting.

Many of the residents had questions such as: "How much do we actually owe?", "Why did this bill take eight years for us to receive?" and "Can we have an extension on the payment?"

The board stated that residents should expect to get the final bill by the end of next week with the total amount due expected to be \$2,288.33 per property.

The board revised the resolution and prolonged the date that community members have to pay this amount. Originally, residents were being asked to pay the bill by September 1 if they did not wish to use a loan for the payment. Instead, residents have until October 31 to pay in full.

The other payment option, for those affected, is to use a loan through the village. This loan would last for five years with a five percent interest rate. Members of the board stated that this is the normal loan rate for street projects.

Trustees expressed empathy for the confusion regarding this situation. The village has been resolving issues with the DOT, and many of the costs along the way were unknown, mak-

seeking men and couples to volunteer throughout Wisconsin.

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
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Arenz, Ritchie, Loehr, Schmidt Take Home PDTR A-main Hardware

With the arrival of Memorial Day signaling the unofficial start of summer, the final weekend of May typically follows suit in triggering when the racing season kicks into high gear in the state.

Although the temperatures again stayed on the cool side and a late afternoon shower swept over the track, a host of competitors checked The Plymouth Dirt Track for their

first night of action of the 2022 season at the third-mile clay oval at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds in Plymouth on Saturday, May 28.

In the 25-lap Kristine Hartmann Pleasant View Realty A main, defending PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Travis Arenz of Sheboygan Falls cruised to his third Plymouth Dirt Track Racing main event triumph of the 2022 campaign. Justin Ritchie of New London came out

on top in the thrilling back-and-forth 25-lap Sheboygan's Country B93.7 Late Model A main. 2017 PDTR

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Grand National champ Matt Loehr of Dotyville notched his second Oostburg Automotive Grand National A-main triumph of the 2022 season, while Travis Schmidt Waldo claimed the victory in the 25-lap Next Step Insurance B Mod A main in his first outing of the 2022 season at The Plymouth Dirt

Track. The initial start of the 360 Sprint Car A main was negated when Nick Daywalt of Slinger and 2018 PDTR champion Justin Miller of Plymouth made hard contact along the front stretch to bring out the first of the event's two caution flags.

Polesitter Blake Wondra of Fond du Lac grabbed the lead on the opening lap and passed the first three laps before outside front row starter Tony Wondra of Campbellsport rode the high groove to sweep into the lead in turn two on lap four.

On lap 12, 2008 PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Lance Fassbender of Burnett worked the high line to pressure Blake Wondra for the runner-up spot the two drivers continued to duel for the position as the leaders began to weave their way through slower traffic on the fast and challenging third-mile clay oval track surface.

On lap 16, Arenz, who started eighth, surged past Fassbender and Blake Wondra along the outside line and quickly closed the gap on the leader. Two laps later, Arenz secured the lead from Tony Wondra and began to open up a solid cushion before the second and final caution flag appeared on lap 22 when Alex Pokorski of West Bend spun in turn three and was collected by Fassbender, who was forced to retire from the race, while Pokorski restarted at the rear of the field.

Following a singlefile restart with less than five laps remaining, Arenz bolted out to a commanding lead over Tony Wondra en route to his 13th career PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main win, 25th career Midwest Sprint Car Association main event triumph

third A-main victory in four outings at The Plymouth Dirt Track this year.

Two-time PDTR 360 Sprint Car champion Brandon McMullen of Oshkosh, charged from his 18th starting spot to finish a strong second, Tony Wondra finished third, Blake Wondra placed fourth and sixth starter Brandon Berth of Cascade rounded out the top five.

Outside front row starter Turk Letizia of Milwaukee bolted into the lead on the drop of the green flag of the 25lap Late Model A main. On lap 4, four-time defending PDTR Late Model champ Justin Schmidt of Cleveland, who started sixth, dove low to pressure the high-riding Letizia for the lead.

On lap 5, the first of two caution flags appeared when Sawyer Specht of Sheboygan Falls spun in turn two. Following the restart, Justin Ritchie, who started eighth, moved into third with fourtime PDTR Late Model champ Brad Mueller of Random Lake following into fourth from his fifth starting spot.

With the high-riding Letizia continuing to fend off the lowrunning Schmidt for the lead, the second and final caution was displayed on lap 11 for debris. On the restart, Ritchie flexed his muscle to utilize the high line to challenge Schmidt for second.

However, Schmidt battled back to surge ahead of Ritchie and move in to pressure Letizia for the lead once again as the top three drivers dueled in very tight quarters for the remainder of the race.

Letizia and Schmidt waged a heated backand-forth, side-by-side battle over the ensuing six laps before Letizia finally surged ahead. However, it was Ritchie's turn next as he bolted up to the high groove to seize second from Schmidt on lap 19. Three laps later, Ritchie dove underneath Letizia to seize the top spot on lap 22.

Letizia crossed under to the low groove to challenge Ritchie on the next lap, but Ritchie proved to be too strong

as he held on over the final two laps to secure his fifth career PDTR Late Model A-main victory and his first Late Model victory of the 2022 season at The Plymouth Dirt Track.

Letizia had to settle for second, Justin Schmidt took third, 11th starter Jim Schmidt of Cleveland placed fourth and Mueller rounded out the top five.

Visiting driver Nick Schumacher of Eagle seized the lead on the opening lap of the 25-lap Grand National A-main from his outside front row starting spot with third starter Matt Loehr sliding into second.

On lap 3, Loehr dove underneath Schumacher in turn four to take over

the top spot. By lap 10, Loehr had built up a full straightaway cushion over Schumacher.

Three laps later, Luke Scholten of Oostburg, who started eighth, worked his way into third before the first of two caution flags appeared on lap 14 when Plymouth Dirt Track newcomer Joshua Koslowski of Chilton spun in turn two. On the restart, Scholten moved in to pressure Schumacher for second along the outside groove. However, Schumacher successfully fended off Scholten's advances.

Meanwhile, Loehr remained in control at the front of the pack before the second and final caution flag waved on lap 22 when Koslowski spun again in turn two. Polesitter Shane Long of Sheboygan Falls grabbed the lead of the 25-lap B Mod A main on the opening lap with outside front row starter Andy Welter of Hartford following in second.

On lap 2, 2018 PDTR B Mod champion Tim Sheppard of Beaver Dam moved up to challenge Welter for second before the first of two caution flags was displayed on lap four when Spencer Long of Sheboygan Falls stalled in turn one.

Following the restart, Sheppard and Welter continued their heated duel for second before fourth starter Travis Schmidt slipped past Welter to take over third. When the leaders caught the reader of the field on lap 15, Sheppard cut the gap on Shane Long significantly.

As part of this process, Dr. Jogal will work with primary care providers, as well as public health and com-

munity agencies, to review and analyze population and patient data related to clinical care and community outcomes, evaluate performance, reveal trends, and identify opportunities.

This work will help to identify unmet needs within the community and be- Dr. Sachin Jogal gin to engage community

members in their own physical and mental care, gather summary information for prevention and treatment interventions, and enhance ongoing communication between community members and health care services.

"We are truly blessed in this community to have individuals and organizations that are so willing to come together to develop thoughtful plans and action steps that will ultimately benefit children, families, and adults



in this area," says Dr. Jogal. 'We have all the right tools data, support, expertise, and most importantly passion to effectively identify health issues and improve the health outcome of residents of Fond du Lac County and surrounding areas."

The goal of CSI is to de-

crease the stigma of mental illness through education, expand crisis intervention and community trauma response services, increase access to mental health providers and to support safe schools and healthy students in Fond du Lac County. That goal will be achieved by reducing violent behaviors, educating on ATODA prevention, supporting social and emotional outcomes for school readiness and school-age students, partnering with community mental health providers, and supporting early intervention and school readiness for young children.



AN Outdoorsman's JOURNAL

SELINA WALTERS COLUMNIST

Mark Walters experienced a loss in his family, and he was unable to provide a column for this week, and he will take a hiatus for portions of this summer. The following is written by his daughter, Selina, about her upcoming work experience in Montana.

I was hoping to do this story later in the summer to cover everything I will do in Montana, but since we ended up having to do this so abruptly, I'll fill you in on all of the steps I have been taking to become a professional in natural resources.

At the end of May, I finished my junior year at UW-Stevens Point where I am double-majoring in fisheries and aquatic sciences and water resources, minoring in soil science and obtaining a certificate in wetland science.

This last year for me, though, has been focused around learning outside of the classroom.

I was the secretary of the UWSP American Fisheries Society (AFS) this last year, and next year will be the vice president. Through AFS, I was able to meet and network with a variety of fisheries professionals; assist in a brook trout movement study where we electro-fished and pit-tagged individuals, did fyke net surveys on the Wisconsin River and helped out with the data collection during the lake sturgeon spawn.

My proudest accomplishment of the year, by far, though, was doing a research project assessing different riparian habitats and macroinvertebrate drift and participating in the UWSP Jim and Katie Krause CNR Research Symposium.

To say it briefly, my study was assessing how different land uses (forested, wetland and agriculture) on the Little Plover River affected the number and composition of aquatic and terrestrial macroinvertebrates present at each site.

Before I started, I was extremely intimidated by the idea of doing research and, honestly, did not think

that I would be capable of doing it on my own.

Luckily, I got to work with a great mentor and friend, Rachael Valeria, who had done the project two years before and was doing a similar project on brook trout diets and riparian land use.

This project was a huge steppingstone for me, and I am so grateful that I had the opportunity to do it; especially because this project helped me get a new job during the school year, which I absolutely love.

At the beginning of the spring semester, I started a job working in the Aquatic Biomonitoring Lab (ABL) on campus where I sort aquatic macroinvertebrate drift samples.

Essentially, agencies like the DNR send us drift samples which contain aquatic insects from all kinds of waterbodies. By looking at the composition of macroinvertebrates you can make an assumption about the quality of the water and habitat in that area.

Jeff Dimick runs the lab and has instilled his obsession with macroinvertebrates onto many of his student employees, including me.

Shortly after I finished school, I drove out to Eureka, Mont. where I

am working as a fisheries biotechnician for the U.S. Forest Service.

This is my first summer traveling for a job, and I am so happy that this

is where I ended up!

Eureka is a small town that the Rocky Mountains run through and largely composed of land owned by the forest service, so there is more natural land than developed, which I love!

Most of my job, so far, has entailed gauging streams to see the amount of discharge running through them. Many of the streams that we gauge are high mountain streams that rely on snow melt to flow, so it is important to see how the flows change as the course of the summer goes on.

Since I have gotten here, it has been relatively cool – there haven't been many days above 70 – rain has been pretty consistent and, when I got here, a lot of the snow was still on the mountains.

Last summer it was apparently in the 90s almost all summer and very dry, so the weather is variable; but this summer's weather is not very common.

Recently, it down-poured here for two days straight and highs were in the 50s, which resulted in more snow on the mountains after much of it had already melted.

Many of these streams were already starting to fill up from the regular snow melt, and now with the additional rain and snow up on the mountains, streams that we gauge are hitting record highs and there is flooding going on.

Soon, I will get into more fish electroshocking and habitat surveys, which I am really looking forward to. We also do a variety of other random small jobs as they come up; last week I went with my bosses to try

Mercury Marine, a division of Brunswick Corporation (NYSE: BC), announced the confirmed final results of the 44th Annual Mercury National Walleye Tournament. The competition among 282 two angler teams took place June 11-12 on Lake Winnebago and parts of the Fox and Wolf rivers watershed.

The top prize package goes to the team made up of Brad Vetter of Campbellsport and Jon Boedeker of Allenton, whose 10 walleyes (the competition limit) weighed in at 29 pounds, 10 ounces. With this outstanding haul, the team earned the grand prize package comprising a LUND 1875 Impact XS fish and ski boat equipped with a Mercury 150hp Pro XS outboard, a Mercury 9.9hp ProKicker outboard, a MotorGuide trolling motor, \$5,000 cash and 2022 championship plaques. The prize package is valued at more than \$55,000.

In addition to elation, one of the first reactions from Vetter was relief. "Finally!" he said. "This feels really good."

The pair became friends in high school, fishing and playing baseball together. Since then, they have fished this two day tournament nearly every year for more than 15 years, finishing among the top 10 on several occasions. "We've had some really nice bags, but to put two nice bags together, that's what we had struggled with," Vetter said.

According to Boedeker, the team made several decisions that paid off this year. "We spent most of the two days jigging. We moved quite a bit, mostly fishing the upper part of the system," he said.

The competition was tight, with only 1 pound, 5 ounces separating the first place and third place finishes.

In all, this year's field of competitors caught 1,924 walleyes weighing a total of roughly 3,282 pounds. Billed as a catch and release competition with incentives to bring healthy fish to the weigh ins, the tournament

included the services of Mercury release boats. Throughout each day's weigh in process, these boats shuttled live fish back to the lake for release into their habitat. Fisheries experts participated in the weigh ins and deemed nearly 97% of the caught fish to be fit for return to the lake. Those fish that were not fit for return to the lake were properly processed and donated to local charities.

This tournament also upheld its annual custom of donating \$10 per entry to Fish America Foundation and \$15 per entry to Walleyes for Tomorrow. In 44 years, the Mercury National Walleye Tournament has donated upwards of \$500,000 to conservation projects, including efforts benefiting Lake Winnebago and the Fox and Wolf rivers watershed.

MotorGuide provided prizes to the

top 80 teams, with a total estimat-Mercury, LUND Boats and ed cash value of prizes exceeding \$120,000.
