



In this advent of revisioning Kewaskum, our and the human experience. village leadership has requested villager participation on August 3.

Hearing this call, my experience goes directly to this river, which we were founded on 127 years ago. From the beginning, and now more than ever, we remember: "A river runs through us."

Here is a perspective on community rivers with some questions to ponder, as well as an invitation to the visioning meeting:

- Rivers are of inherent importance to communities, beautiful and powerful systems of tremendous and unquantifiable aesthetic value.
- Rivers connect and unify communities.
- · Rivers are the connection between environmental quality and human well-being. It has been said that a river's "flow" reaches deeply into the human consciousness. Is it perhaps the energy involved in the flow of the river, or is it the flow itself that is suggestive of a living entity to have a relationship with?
- · Rivers around the world are recently being recognized legally as "persons" meaning that, under the law, they can be ascribed certain rights that can be enforced, which protect them as a vital life force. Water is life! Indeed, this freshwater is a gift that welcomes reciprocity for her care. What is your relationship with the river... any river?
- · Rivers capture human fascination. Their network-like structure noted to parallel the human circulatory or nervous systems of our own bodies.
- · Rivers remind us that everything flows, and the nature of "reality" is ever-changing.
- · Rivers reflect a fascination as a source of abundance, or devastation when we do not care for their flow.
- · Rivers are the central theme in human religions, mythology and culture. Books, poems, movies and art reflect deep connection between rivers

Sadly, we have bent rivers to our will and transported ourselves to an era of water shortages, habitat loss and species extinctions.

We mow to the river's edge where habitat is lost. We spray herbicides that flow to our river.

Many have entrained minds to see River Hill Park as a static pond rather than a river which depends on the movement of the water.

When I stand near her side, she receives whatever I need to let go of in life. When I am out for a quiet paddle, my oars come in, I let go and, playfully, I am curious where my boat will go and what I will experience. I hear anglers have similar experiences. I always come alive in/near the water.

How might we, the villagers of Kewaskum, place our attention on this river as gift? Build our relationship with it? Engage with it? Touch it? Be inspired by its sacredness?

Are we a "gateway" to someplace else?

Perhaps it is time to consider that this is about ecology of place. Young families want to grow roots in place, here and now. Perhaps, we consider "A River Runs Through Us" as our mark of community in this world.

Bring your lively "river heart" to the village planning meeting Aug. 3, 6 p.m., at the village's Annex building (and consider wearing something blue so that we can find each other).

Speak your vision of building a new generation of community focused on water as a gift knowing that what we place our attention on will grow... for the joy of it!

W.S.P. July Law of the Month Reminds Drivers that When Speed Increases, Dangers on the Roads Increase

Excessive speed is one of the most common causes of traffic crashes. Speed-related crashes in Wisconsin were up 10% in 2021; 186 people died and 6,871 were hurt in 17,597 crashes involving speed

"Crashes are more dangerous and can be more deadly when a driver is speeding," State Patrol Superintendent Anthony Burrell said. "Speed contributed to about a third of all deaths on Wisconsin roads last year. We can't let these preventable tragedies continue. We need drivers to slow down and be patient on the roads."

Slowing down allows a driver to better maintain control of the vehicle and provides more time and distance to avoid a potential crash.

State law requires drivers to follow posted speed limits. Law enforcement can also cite a driver for going too fast for conditions when there are hazards like weather, construction, or visibility issues.

Wisconsin State Patrol (WSP) troopers and in- active enforcement and public awareness.

spectors handed out more than 49,000 speeding citations in 2021 and issued more than 22,000 so far this year.

States across the country have seen a rise in risky driving behaviors like excessive speeding during the pandemic, which ultimately led to more crash injuries and fatalities.

Wisconsin State Patrol issued more than double the number of 100-plus mph citations in 2020 compared to 2019. The number rose again in 2021.

"There is no reason to drive so fast. It is reckless and puts the entire community at risk. We ask drivers to put safety first every time you get behind the wheel," Superintendent Burrell said.

Speeding is dangerous and costly. A citation comes with hundreds of dollars in fines, in addition to demerit points on your license and increased insurance premiums.

Wisconsin will partner with other states in the Midwest to address speed concerns for Speed Awareness Day on July 27. Law enforcement agencies in the region will focus on reducing crashes, preventing injuries, and saving lives through proactive enforcement and public awareness



Perfect Excuses

We adopted our first child in 2010 – a darling two-and-a-half-year-old girl from China with a round little face, an amazing smile... and a scream that could shatter plate glass.



fying thing on the planet; not just because I was clueless about being a parent, but because she had spina bifida, a disease we knew next to nothing about when deciding to adopt her.

We didn't know what challenges she would face as she grew up; we only knew what we were told: She would never walk.

Fortunately, no one told her.

When the naysayers "nay'ed," she "yes way'ed" and was walking unassisted before her third birthday.

Her entire life, she has been oblivious to limitations and ignorant of boundaries - smashing barriers she didn't even know existed and surprising everyone along the way.

My daughter is my hero.

This week is the 32nd anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and July 26 is "National Disability Independence Day" – a federally recognized day celebrating the 1990 signing of the ADA by President George H.W. Bush.

For me, watching, not only my daughter, but, anyone with disabilities overcome seemingly insurmountable obstacles is a reminder that our excuses are often just that: excuses. Stories we tell

ourselves to justify our own inaction.

"We have more ability than willpower," said François de la Rochefoucauld, "and it is often an excuse to ourselves that we imagine that things are impossible."

I hear a lot of "exercise excuses" in my line of work. In fact, three-of-five Americans regularly make excuses about why they can't exercise. Sometimes these are legitimate, but usually they are tales about what people imagine they can't do, or feel they don't have.

Like: "I'm too tired."

The law of inertia says an object in motion will tend to remain in motion, while an object at rest remains at rest. This is true for people: the more you avoid exercise, the harder it is to get yourself to exercise.

Here's the thing, though: Rather than use up your little remaining stamina, exercise actually boosts your energy levels.

In University of Georgia research, regular lowintensity exercise significantly increased energy levels and reduced fatigue. Even if you're "overworked," the science clearly shows that moving helps you feel energetic – while also improving sleep, which can leave you even more rested when the alarm goes off.

So ditch the canned wake-me-up beverages: Simply walking around the block a few times or spending 20 minutes on an exercise bike first thing in the morning gives you a better daily boost than that "energy" drink or triple espresso.

As a bonus, not buying those caffeinated beverages every day will keep extra cash in your wallet which brings me to my next excuse:

"I can't afford a gym membership."

Around this time of year, publishers advertise beach reads for our patrons. What truly is a beach read? Originally, it started as a marketing term for publishers about 30 years ago, promoting summer titles. I cringe when I think of a library book on an actual beach with water because I know I would end up getting it wet and sandy. Beach reads have become stereotypically synonymous with women's fiction, but I disagree. For me, a beach read is a book you read to relax. For some that could be a cozy mystery or intense thriller. For others it may be a travelogue, powerful biography or yes, women's fiction. Here are some of our new beach reads coming to you in August.

In adult fiction, Emma Donoghue releases *Haven* a historical novel that cen-

ters around three men in seventh century Ireland who travel hoping to leave the sinful world behind. They end up on an isolated island inhabited by thousands of birds and must rely on their faith to survive. *The Housekeeper* is a domestic thriller written by Joy Fielding. In this novel, hard-working Jodi hires a housekeeper to care for her aging parents who eventually take over their lives and not in a good way. Set in 18th century Amsterdam, The House of Fortune is a stand-alone companion novel to Jessie Burton's The Miniaturist. Read about Thea as a new adult and how she deals with her difficult home life by escaping to the theaters. A Most Anticipated Book of 2022 is Anthony Marra's Mercury Pictures Presents. This is touted as an epic tale of a women who reinvents herself when she moves from Mussolini's Italy to Hollywood. Look for more new book releases by Danielle Steel, William Kent Krueger, James Patterson and Sarah Addison Allen.

For non-fiction beach reads, be on the lookout for biographies, science works

and music history. *Dangerous Rhythms*: Jazz and the Underworld written by T.J. English is an engaging narrative telling the symbiotic story of jazz and the underworld, some of it forged in America's most notorious crime districts. With some fascinating astronomical events coming in August, read up on our galaxy in *The Milky Way* by Moira McTier. This book is categorized as a tell-all autobiography of The Milky Way and its history and future. If you think you know all there is about the Titanic's disaster, you may be surprised to learn hidden facts in Sinkable: Obsession, the Deep Sea, and the Shipwreck of the Titanic. Daniel Stone uncovers the story of the Titanic, not as a ship, but a shipwreck to help readers understand not only how it occurred but also what is happening with the decomposition of the vessel. Whether your beach read occurs during a warm summer evening on your patio, in a sailboat on a lake or on a beach, I hope it's relaxing and enjoyable but watch out for water and sand.



Wisconsin is now sitting at number 29 in the League of American Bicyclists most recent Bicycle Friendly States Rankings. Once ranked number two in the Nation, Wisconsin enjoyed a place in the top ten until 2017, after we became the only state in the country to repeal our Complete Streets policy.

This ranking is a call to action for states to invest in bicycling

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infrastructure and forward for Wisconsin? bicycle-friendly legislation. Unfortunately, for the last half-decade, our state hasn't done enough. Like many other states, on a bipartisan basis Wisconsin legislators and Gov. [Tony] Evers agreed to make it easier for people to ride e-bikes in Wisconsin. Frankly, this was low-hanging fruit. Much, much more needs to be done to improve bicycling options, safety, and infrastructure in Wisconsin.

So, what is the path

1. Accept and Distribute Federal Infrastructure dollars. Wisconsin currently ranks 49th out of 50 states in the amount of money we spend on biking and walking at just \$0.85 per capita. To move up in the ranking, Wisconsin needs to spend at least 2% of our federal transportation funds on biking and walking.

Wisconsin's Bicycle Report Card: Needs Significant Improvement

Since 2014 appor-Wisconsin tions just \$17.4 million in Transportation Alternatives (TAP) main money (the source of funds for trails). Half of this is then instead allocated to roads.

The new feder-Infrastructure al Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA, also called the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, or BIL) is infusing \$283 million in additional federal highway aid into Wisconsin this year. Still, WisDot's proposed adjustment to the current state budget requests an increase of \$10.5 million FED to the Department's federal TAP appropriation the bare minimum required for the state to qualify for IIJA funds. Wisconsin can and should do more.

2. Update the state's bike plan. Our last

state-wide bike plan was created in 2010 during the Thompson Administration. It is called the "Wisconsin Bicycle Plan 2020" and officially expired two years ago. WisDOT's proposed "Active Transportation Plan" is slow in getting started and will have less emphasis on improvements specific to bicycles. Wisconsin needs to get to work on creating a new bike plan to improve on our low ranking in bike friendliness and to reflect the dramatic growth in bicycling by our state's citizens.

Improve 3. equitable access to trails. The TAP program is designed to prioritize high needs communities. In Wisconsin, these communities are both urban and rural.

Milwaukee In County, only 8% of people in neighborhoods experiencing inequality live within two miles of a trail. Development of the 30th Street Corridor Trail and an extension to the KK River Trail would increase that number to 66% of residents, according to a 2017 study by the Rails To Trails Conservancy. We need to get this done.

While the TAP program provides critical dollars for trails, the required 20% local match often means that smaller rural communities are unable to apply. Wisconsin could ensure more equitable distribution of TAP by waiving the match as Ohio has done. What's more, the IIJA requires that technical assistance is provided to communities that need help in developing viable funding proposals. If this were done for smaller communities, or areas outside of urban centers, it would enable Wisconsin to develop a more complete statewide network of trails.

4. If we can fix the d*** roads, let's fix the d*** trails. Wisconsin is one of only two states with no funding mechanism (like a tax) to support the DNR's maintenance needs. DNR-owned facilities have millions of dollars of deferred maintenance and have to rely on camping fees, trail passes, and hunting licenses to generate revenue. Trail passes provide less than 25% of the management funds needed for Wisconsin's 44 state trails.

In 2009, Minnesota passed the Legacy Amendment, increasing sales tax by 0.375% until 2034 to support clean water, outdoor preservaheritage tion, arts and culture, and parks and trails. Minnesota ranks 5th on the LAB list. If Wisconsin can increase taxes to support building American Family Field, can't the same be done to protect our legacy of world class outdoor recreation?

5. Adopt a new statewide Complete Streets Policy. Complete Streets prioritize the safety of all roadway users over the speed of moving cars. In 2009 the Wisconsin state legislature passed a Complete Streets Law which in part stated that the Wisconsin DOT shall refuse to provide any state and federal funds to highway reconstruction projects that don't include bicycle and pedestrian ways i.e. sidewalks and/or marked or unmarked bike lanes.

that the program was costing the state \$7 million over a two-year period. Conversely, streets built with the needs of all users in mind are a proactive investment in public health and safety and in the \$2.52 billion-dollar economic engine that is Wisconsin's cycling industry.

Wisconsin's full report card can be found at https://drive.google.com/ drive/folders/1hNS1CKRe i1skdulyNFRcFjp7q8Z1HL 8b. A D+ average is a poor reflection of Wisconsin's outdoor recreation reputation, strong bicycle manufacturing heritage and the spirit of our committed cycling community. Cycling is good for Wisconsinites, and good for Wisconsin's economy. The University of Wisconsin 2019 study concludes that cycling contributes over \$2.52 billion dollars to our economy each year.

With projects in every corner of our state waiting to be completed, now is the time to act for Wisconsin cyclists. While the legislature is currently out of session, engaging with state elected officials on the importance of cycling options, infrastructure, and safety is necessary to turn the wheel and get our state back on course.



I couldn't help Dan, and he couldn't help me. We were on our own, and that's how it had to be.

Our rifles were a real problem, because they hung up on the mountain wall and it was very hard to lift them over our heads and find a place for them to rest.

Dan's seven millimeter got most of its front sight worn off and hundreds of scars in the stock. The last hour of our experience had both of us praying, scared to death and – in the back of our minds – thinking that at least one of us wasn't going to make it out alive.

I was generally about 20 feet above Dan and scared I was going to take him out with a falling rock or my own falling body. Once, I caused an estimated 25 pound rock to directly fall and strike Dan on the shoulder. I hopelessly watched my buddy do what I figured was his death fall, and then miraculously catch himself.

To make a long story short, we made that climb, hit the top with eight inches of snow, darkness moments away, and we were physically and mentally shot.

Sixteen inches of snow fell, and the next morning's elk hunting was not a top priority for either of us.

This was the most dangerous experience Dan Berry or I have ever had in our lives.

Miracle on a Montana Mountain

It seems some of the best trips I go on begin with adversity of some sort.

This week, you will find out that my Montana elk hunt began in a very scary way.

SATURDAY, OCT. 23, 2004 HIGH: 41, LOW: 20

Our plan was a simple one, or so it seemed to us, for our self-guided elk and mule deer hunt in the Gallatin National Forest near Bozeman, Montana.

Jeff Neitzel and a friend of his, Dan Clark of Belgrade, Montana, planned to hike about 10,000 feet and spend the night before the opener on the mountain. They hoped that at sunrise, hunters climbing the mountain would push elk toward them.

Dan Berry of New Lisbon and I would make the climb together and set up a quick camp with the same plan. Our base camp is a simple and comfortable cabin at the foot of the mountain.

We woke up this morning to a light snow fall. By the time we parked Dan's truck at about 6,000 feet, there were four inches on the ground, and it was adding up fast.

Dan and I were supposed to follow a rocky creek in a mountain gorge leading to the top.

At some point on the planned two-and-a-half-hour trek to just about 10,000 feet, we were supposed to cut to our left to a forested area.

Bad luck came our way when blinding snow combined with fog and a lack of knowledge of the area caused Dan and I to miss the forested and safe route.

What happened over the next three hours is still very difficult for me to write about. I hand wrote this story four days later from a mountain top.

Thinking we were on the right course, Dan and I came to a very narrow spot in the canyon where the only way up was to spread our arms and legs and shimmy up the side of the mountain. Thinking our challenge would be short – while carrying 35-pound packs and rifles – we made the




Dan Berry at the very start of a mountain trek that became a very dangerous situation.

100-foot vertical climb.

At this point, visibility was down to about 300 feet, and we came to a rock wall that we thought would end after another 50 yards of dangerous climbing. Dan and I made the climb by putting our rifles above us on the mountain wall and literally scaling the rock wall two feet at a time.

Snow that had now accumulated to six inches and made grabbing and holding onto rocks just as terrifying as any fall would have been. With both of us clinging to a rock, we realized a fact neither of us will ever forget: We couldn't climb down and

had a 1,000-foot wall to scale.

We had no climbing equipment, no experience, a snowstorm, a pack to carry and a rifle to push two feet ahead of us with each pull up.

Three times, Dan asked me for help, because he was stuck or exhausted. Three times, I did the same, as I became hung up on ledges that I tried to go over by putting my body and backpack on the outside of a rock and pulling up while dangling over a 1,000-foot drop.

Kewaskum just couldn't stop the offense.


