Kewaskum Police Department Reports

No illegal substances were located on scene.

Washington County Sheriff's Office Reports

On Sept. 28, the Washington County Sheriff's Office initiated an investigation into alleged videos and still imagery that were taken without the knowledge or consent of at least ten juvenile female victims at a private residence in Washington County.

The suspect is a 17-year-old male who had been capturing the harmful material over the past year. The suspect was a student at Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School at the time of the offenses but is no longer enrolled at the school. It is believed that all the unlawful material was captured at a private residence. Washington County Sheriff's investigators have worked closely with the Kettle Moraine Lutheran administration as well as several other school districts to help iden-

tify and notify the victims. The suspect is cooperating with investigators and was booked and released from the Washington County Jail pending necessary follow-up.

Numerous felony charges are anticipated to be forwarded to the Washington County District Attorney's Office. Limited information is being released at this time because this is still an active ongoing process and for consideration to the victims and their families. The Washington County Sheriff's Office in conjunction with our educational partners appreciates everyone respecting the victim's privacy in this sensitive matter.

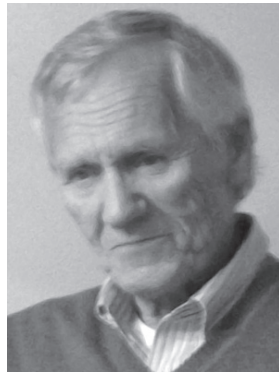

Turtle Flambeau Adventure

This week my "old" buddy Jeff Moll and I lived in our boats and hunted ducks out of my canoe on the Turtle Flambeau Flowage in Iron County. We had some serious adversity, and we overlapped that with a whole bunch of fun.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 23
HIGH: 72. LOW: 50.

It was 49 years ago that my dad the late Robert Walters took Jeff and I here, and we camped on an island and caught lots of walleye for the opener.

That was Jeff's first trip with the gang, and I guess you could say he has come a long ways in the world of being an outdoorsman, but, in reality, it was my dad that included Jeff in the Walters World of hardcore outdoors and got him started.

These days, my brother Mike calls him "Master Guide Extraordinaire" – my title for many years – and it almost makes me puke when I hear these two love birds.

So, our plan is simple:

On the Flambeau you can only camp at a designated campsite. We wanted to be close to our hunting and there was no designated campsite. We decided to anchor our boats and sleep in them.

Holy moly, this ended up being fun. Moll was in his 16-footer, and I was in the 18.6 War Eagle. My rig would be the kitchen and place for social gatherings.

The last hour before daylight, I showed Mr. "Master Guide Extraordinaire" (MGE) my duck honey hole, and it was impressive. Of course, I had to teach him the difference between a crow and a woodie but – like what dad witnessed 49-years ago – I understood and was my usual quiet self.

I might add that walking to "Duck Paradise" was brutal with a capital B. It was maybe 200 yards and every step in the chest waders you sank knee deep in the muck, and wild rice was constantly trying to trip you.

The social hours began at dark, and we were on top of the world knowing that we were going to put a whacking on some waterfowl in

Intense sweat from slogging in the mud, Ruby was fantastic with most of her retrieves, and the hunting was epic. Other than lunch and a nap, we hunted from dawn to sunset.

Sometimes we made incredible shots, and sometimes we could not have hit a duck if it was sitting on the end of our barrel.

I will tell you about Ruby, she is not trained for hand signals but what she does is, no matter how challenging the conditions, she watches the sky, and, even if she does not see where a duck falls, she figures it out. Her mother, Fire, had that same gift, and it is very cool to watch.

So, when the clouds/rain/sun hit the eastern horizon, both Jeff and I had our limit of six ducks. We were both soaked from sweat as well as rain, and we made the slog back to the boats and, believe it or not, it quit raining.

We were set to have a first-rate social extravaganza, did not take off one iota of our gear, lit the propane lantern, turned on some music and I was ready to listen to my mentee tell me what a great guide I am and how it was the best day of his life.

Instead, another steady rain began, we actually laughed about it and sat up until the 1 a.m. and gave each other crap.

It was another wonderful night underneath the tarps and, at 4 a.m., it was a slog back to the canoe for more ducks and more memories.

I remember the look dad gave me 49 years ago when Jeff was Jeff a few times and about all I can say is: You were right dad!

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Free Fentanyl Test Strips Now Available Statewide

Distribution part of efforts to reduce drug overdose deaths

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) last week announced that 120,600 fentanyl test strips have been distributed to organizations across the state to help prevent drug overdose deaths. Drugs mixed with fentanyl are the leading cause of overdose deaths in Wisconsin.

“Wisconsinites who use drugs are more likely to encounter fentanyl than ever before,” said DHS Secretary-designee Karen Timberlake. “Tragically, many people who use drugs have no idea they are ingesting fentanyl until it’s too late. That’s why we need to empower our family members, friends, and neighbors who use drugs to have as much information as possible to protect their safety. Fentanyl test strips are a critical tool in our efforts to save lives.”

Fentanyl test strips are dipped into drug residue dissolved in water. Within minutes, a person can know whether the drug contains fentanyl. A tiny amount – as little as two grains of salt – is enough to kill someone. With information from the test, a person can take steps to reduce their risk of an overdose. In Wisconsin, fentanyl is present in many drugs, including cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine, as well as pills made to resemble prescription medications. Because fentanyl is unable to be detected by sight, taste, smell, or touch, people taking drugs not purchased from a licensed pharmacy should always use fentanyl test strips. Fentanyl test strips do not provide information about the amount or strength of fentanyl in a drug supply.

The first phase of the DHS fentanyl test strip distribution program is a partnership with tribal nation health clinics, county health and human services departments, county and municipal health departments, and organizations that work with people who inject drugs. These agencies are receiving fentanyl test strip packages directly from the manufacturer. Each package contains one fentanyl test strip and instructions on how to use it. The participating organizations are handing out the packages at no cost. A map of pick-up locations is available on the DHS website.

There is no limit on the number of fentanyl test strips that someone can receive through this program. Participating organizations have access to an unlimited supply of packages. Other types of organizations are expected to be eligible to participate in the program in future phases.

In 2020, there were 812 overdose deaths in Wisconsin where illegally manufactured fentanyl was considered to be probable or suspected in contributing cause of death. Recognizing the value of fentanyl test strips in reducing the harms of drug use, Gov. Tony Evers signed legislation in March to allow the test strips to be used in Wisconsin.

The first phase of the fentanyl test strip distribution program is funded by \$1.25 million from Wisconsin’s share of the American Rescue Plan Act, and is one of many strategies DHS is using to reduce the harms of drug use. Since 2019, 134,280 doses of NARCAN® have been distributed at no cost through community agencies to people who use opioids or drugs that could be mixed with opioids, and their families and friends. NARCAN® is the opioid overdose reversal drug. So far this year, more than 5,000 overdoses have been reversed with NARCAN® distributed through this program. NARCAN® also can be purchased at more than 500 pharmacies without a prescription under a standing order. Locations where NARCAN® is available can be found on the DHS website. DHS also encourages hepatitis C and HIV screening as part of an ongoing drug user health initiative.

Additional fentanyl test kits and doses of NARCAN will be purchased and distributed with funds made available from the National Prescription Opiate Litigation settlement funds.

More People Now Eligible to Give Blood or Platelets with the Red Cross

Restrictions lifted for many who spent time in certain European countries

The American Red Cross invites individuals who spent time in the U.K., Ireland or France and have never tried to give blood due to concerns over variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (vCJD) – related to mad cow disease – to give blood and help save lives.

Recently, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration updated its blood donor eligibility guidance on vCJD, eliminating the deferral for those who spent time in the U.K., Ireland and France between 1980 and 2001. In alignment with FDA changes, the Red Cross began accepting donations Oct. 3 from individuals who have not tried giving blood before due to the prior donation criteria. In combination with prior eligibility updates in 2020 for those who spent time in other European countries, this new change effectively eliminates the deferral related to vCJD for all donors.

“For many years, the Red Cross has heard from people who have spent time in these countries – often members of the military and their families – hoping for the opportunity to donate blood or platelets,” said Greg Novinska, Regional Donor

Services Executive with the American Red Cross. “We now welcome all donors who may have spent time in Europe and avoided blood donation as a result to join us in our lifesaving mission to help patients in need.”

More blood donors – especially type O donors – are urged to donate now to prevent disruptions to essential medical care this fall. Book a time to give by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or by calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767). As a thank-you, all who come to give Oct. 16-31, 2022, will receive a \$10 e-Gift Card by email to a merchant of choice.

Changes in progress for those with a Red Cross donor record

Those who have tried to give with the Red Cross and have been previously deferred from donating will be contacted by the Red Cross once system records are updated. This deferral is more complex to remove than others as there are decades of donors in the Red Cross system who have been deferred under the previous FDA requirements. Individuals who have questions about their donor record can contact the Red Cross Donor and Client Support Center at 1-866-236-3276.

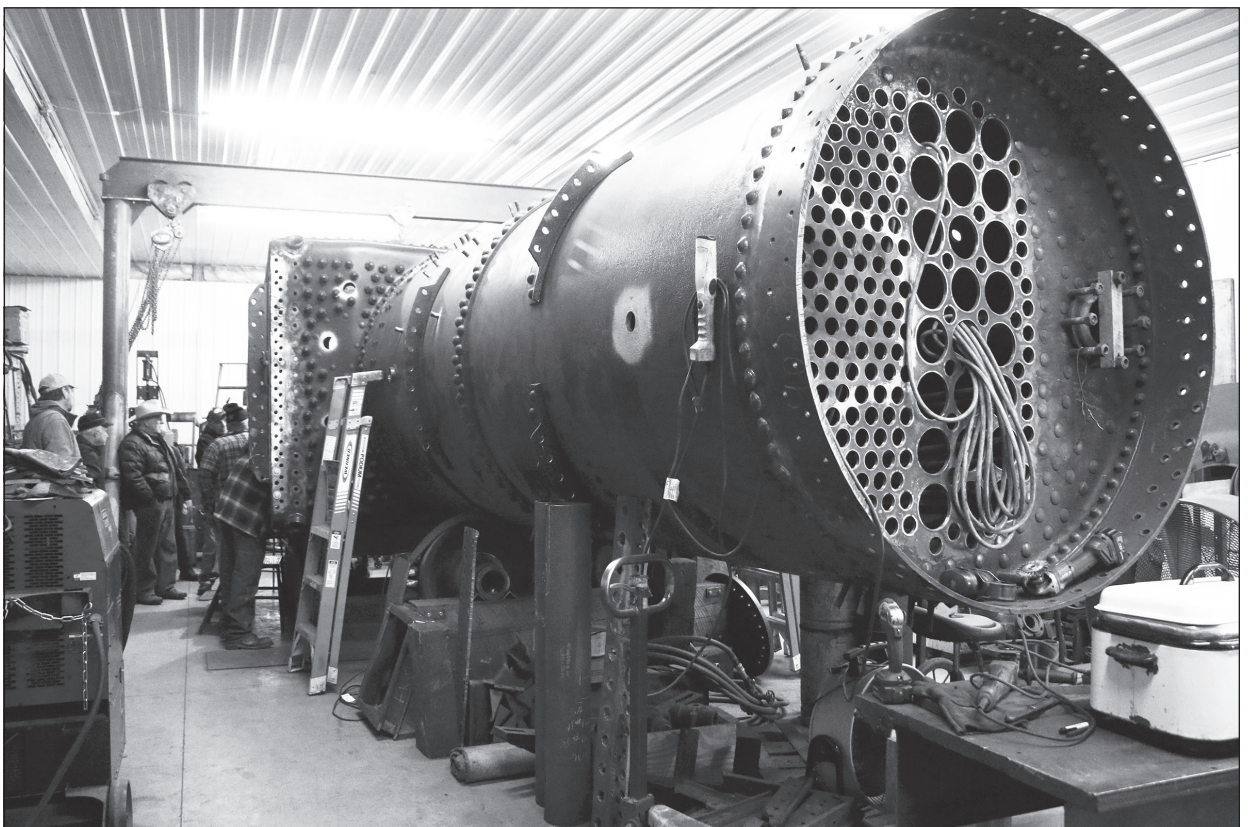

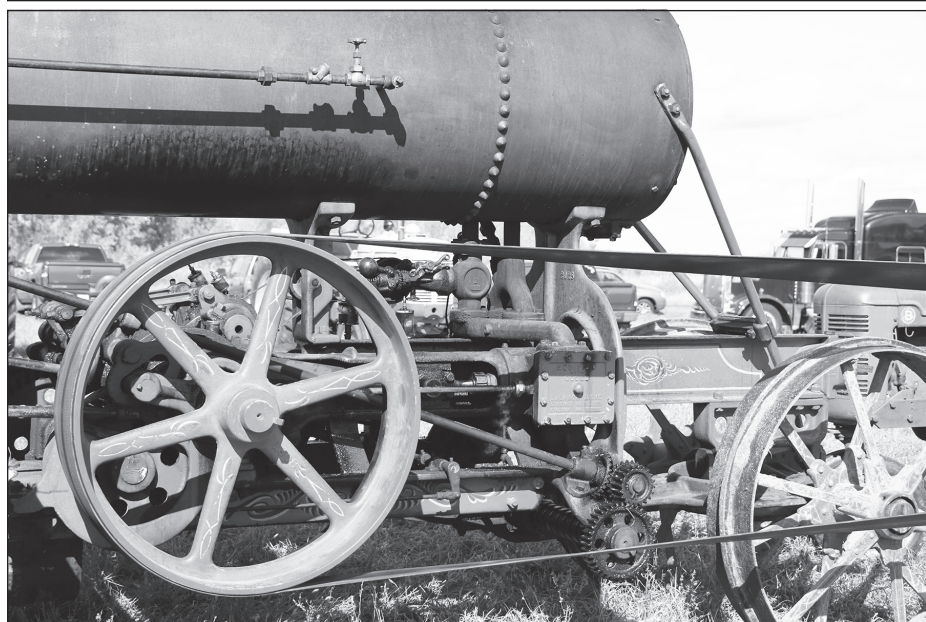

to finish in second.

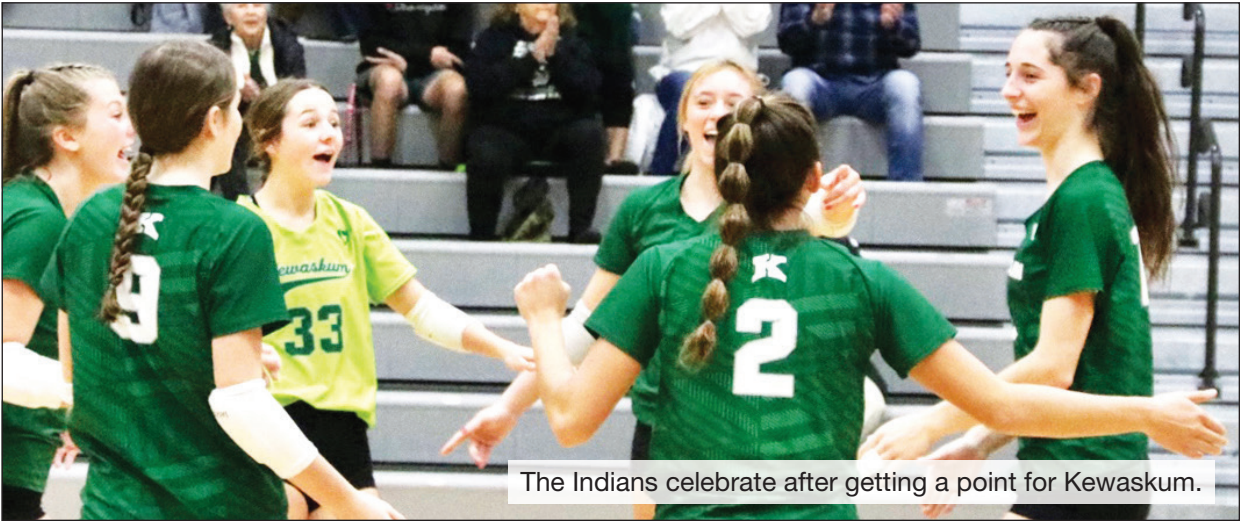
“The girls played an amazing match on Thursday against KML to go undefeated in the Duals,” stated Coach Laine Leitzke.

Kewaskum Football Beats Sheboygan Falls and Claims Outright E.C.C. Title

For the first time since 2017, the Kewaskum Indians claimed the East Central Conference (ECC) title with a win Friday night over Sheboygan Falls with a score of 42-26.

The Indians offense kicked into high gear amassing a season high in points (42) while chewing up the Falcon defense for 406 total yards.

Leading the way for the visitors was quarterback Ryan Cook who threw for 124 yards and scored one touchdown. He also rushed for 67 yards.

Dillan Steger was the team's leading rusher with 82 yards and two touchdowns, while Hunter Loser also rushed for 79 yards and scored one touchdown. Continuing the rushing attack was Dylan Soyk who added 58 yards and two touchdowns.

Finally, through the air, Cook found Owen Parish for 28 yards and a touchdown.

Carson Rolf also added a long reception of 38 yards to the mix.

Kewaskum's defense remained stout on Friday night and only surrendered 69 yards rushing to the hosts.

Nick Deheck, Donny Zillmer, Soyk and Steger each finished with four tackles each.

Given the rainy conditions, it was hard to believe neither team had a turnover.

Kewaskum now enters the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) playoffs as a number-two seed.

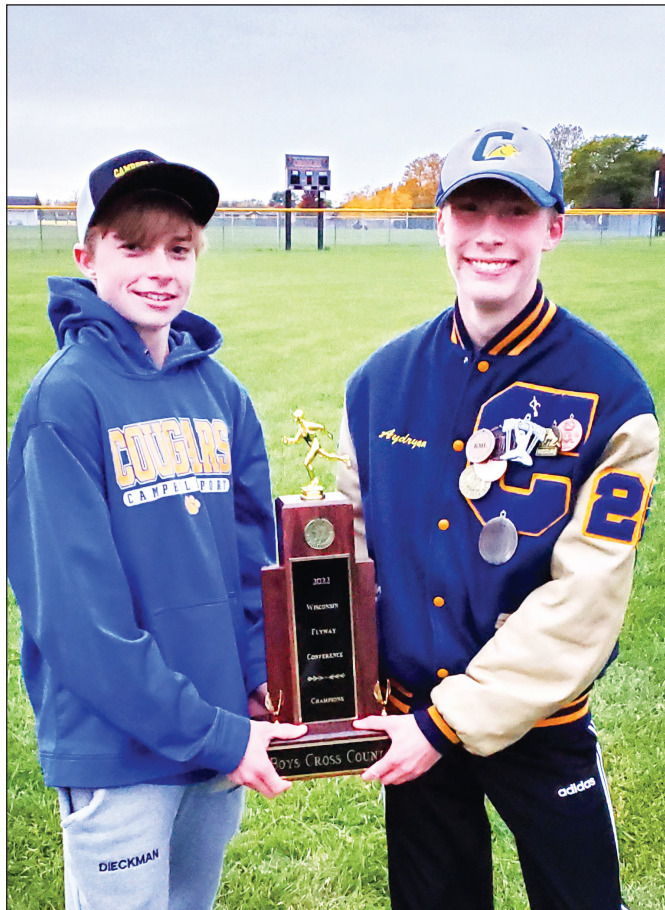
