## Eden Meat Market Building Damaged in Nov. 3 Fire

A grease fire caused significant damage to the Eden Main Street business

A Thursday morning fire broke out at the Eden Meat Market in the Village of Eden on Nov. 3 with three employees treated for smoke inhalation and the building – at 115 W. Main Street – has been closed until further notice.

There were no other reported injuries.

According to a Fond du Lac Sheriff's Office (FDLSO) press release, a call about a fire was received around 9 a.m. last Thursday. Deputies

from FDLSO along with firefighters from Eden and neighboring departments arrived and were able to extinguish the fire before it spread to other businesses and buildings.

"It's sad to say we have had a major fire to one of our historic businesses in the village today," read a statement from the Village of Eden. "Our hearts and prayers go out to the families and employees of the Eden [Meat Market]."

An investigation revealed that a fire in one of

the store's vents spread to bacon grease. Employees of the market attempted to extinguish the flames prior to the firefighter's arrival, but they were unsuccessful.

The Eden Meat Market has relocated its business operations and plans to honor its catering contracts. The store itself, however, will not be open for the foreseeable future. As of print time, the business was not planning on having the ability to process deer.

"We are closed at the Eden Meat Market until further notice," read a statement from the business. "We are waiting for approval from our state inspectors to identify what products are viable and what is deemed a loss. We plan to update everyone with information as often as possible. Our phone lines are open as our business office was relocated. Eden Catering is operating status quo unless otherwise personally notified by one of our team members. Please be patient as we navigate our 'new normal."



## Incidental Take Notice for Washington County

### WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) proposes to issue a permit for the "incidental taking" of a rare plant, which may result from the Newark Drive – Roadway Rehabilitation Project.

Incidental take refers to the unintentional loss of individual endangered or threatened animals or plants that does not put the species' overall population at risk.

The town of Trenton proposes to recondition 1 mile of roadway along Newark Drive from Trenton Road to Indian Lore Road in the Town of Trenton and Town of Farmington. The existing roadway is approximately 20' paved surface with 2' wide gravel shoulders. The project will look to improve the roadway to two 11-foot paved lanes and 2' wide shoulders.

Additional areas of grading and pavement reconstruction will be required along Newark Drive to improve vertical profile to minimum design standards and to install standard roadway section with ditches to address subgrade drainage concerns.

The presence of the state threatened Forked Aster is confirmed in the vicinity of the project site. DNR staff determined that the proposed project may result in the incidental taking of some plants.

The DNR concludes that the proposed project is not likely to appreciably reduce the likelihood of the survival or recovery of the species within the state, the whole plant-animal community of which they are a part of, or the habitat that is critical to their existence.

Conservation measures to minimize the adverse effect on the threatened and endangered species will be incorporated into the proposed Incidental Take Permit. Copies of the jeopardy assessment and background information on these species are available by visiting the DNR Incidental Take Public Notices webpage or upon request from DNR Conservation Biologist Stacy Rowe at 608-228-9796 or *stacy.rowe@wisconsin. gov.*

with Jim Reilly which showed me that Tom's story resonates beyond family history.

"Now Tom McCarty made a little history. Did you know that?" I did not. Jim provided context, as he grew up at the bottom of Eden Township. "Of course, we thought a lot of Tom." (By 'we,' Jim meant his brothers.) "He was such an outstanding individual, then he came to be a Marine, and he'd tell us stories about driving a Jeep. And his dad – John, he didn't understand that it was a Jeep – or what a Jeep was. And he was telling my dad that, 'My son Tom is driving a Hoop.' And my dad [William Reilly] said, 'Well I never heard of that.' 'Well, the Marines got 'em,' he [John McCarty] said." John McCarty's confusion makes sense because the Jeep was a creation coming out of World War II. There apparently was a picture of Tom with a Jeep for which this old conversation centered on. "He was telling my dad about it, and my dad said, 'Well if he's driving something, I think it's a Jeep.' Course,'

Jimmy laughed, "There's really nothing to the story other than that."

Historically, the contrast of perspective is important. Tom was seeing the foundations of a four wheeled vehicle that led to the ATV craze we live in today; John was born in 1872 and lived a life dominated by horses. According to the documentarv series "America the Story of US," the Jeep was a word that came out of the General Purpose vehicle. This "GP" likely merged into Jeep, and well over half a million were made for World War II. Tom McCarty drove at least one of them.

"Us kids – we just thought a lot of Tom." Tom was older than a lot of the Reilly boys who grew northwest of the McCartys. "I know that when he was in the Marines; I was still in grade school." Jim attended the Burrough's School located in the Ashford Township's edge south of Rohlf Cemetery. Jim credited Tom as a model for why his siblings joined the military. "I was the sixth one [Reilly boy] to go into the service."

### Irish on the Eden/ Ashford Border

Eden Township was more influenced in early Irish settlement. Ashford was more German speaking, but not on the northern town line. The McCartys and Johnsons in were Township's Ashford northern ends, but they likely fit in more with the South Eden crowd like the Reillys. With that in mind, some of those interviewed on the topic of South Eden claim it extends to the Johnsons and McCarty homesteads original - even though the farms of Johnson's and McCarty's are in northern Ashford Township. The Reillys, Johnsons, and McCartys had a lot in common. They were



John Ambrose McCarty spent his whole life on the farm his ancestors settled in the mid-1800s. He married Katherine Becker, and they had 10 children. His grandson Tom McCarty, who observed him as a child in the 1950s, concludes this is the best picture of his collection that reflects who grandpa was - aged from the farm, and huge hands which had boxed in his younger days, some of which was likely against his will. Irish, Roman Catholic, dairy farmers, and boxing fans. All of these farm families and homesteads are tied to the local land by the 1800s, though Johnson's and McCarty's go farther back closer to the 1850s.

Tom McCarty was the son of John Ambrose McCarty (1872-1959), who came from Thomas (1837-1905), whose dad was Michael. Michael and his wife Ann were the first Irish lineage of their family to first settle the Ashford area. Michael McCarty is buried in Byron's St. John's Cemetery on Highway 175, as that's where he attended church as there was no St. Matthews Campbellsport. in Michael settled on the farm at the end of what became Rolling Drive in northern Ashford Township. The 1880 History of Fond du Lac County says Michael and Ann (along with son Thomas) came from County Leitrim. There is something

about farming, being Irish, or both that calls people back to the land. The McCarty Farm at the end of Rolling Drive was "The Farm." "The Farm" is synonymous with the base, as many farms eventually became a family's central location. This is what happened at the McCartys, given so many had been raised there through multiple generations.

An example of the homestead serving a meeting place continued with Uncle Tom McCarty. By the 1960s, John "Bud" and Gloria were on the farm along with Bud's brother George. Tom could see two of his brothers on a Friday night, so he returned to his roots often, and sometimes weekly.


Overall, this connect to the land and Irish family are an important element to the 1950s dairy farm in southeastern Fond du Lac County.

### Spooking a Johnson

There was another Tom McCarty who helped me put the pieces together for this story. This Tom is Tom McCarty's (1912-1982) nephew and is the source who can best explain how the McCarty farm was a base. (For the purpose of the article and to avoid confusion, I will differentiate between Nephew Tom and Uncle Tom.)

Nephew Tom pointed out that the McCarty farm was also a neat place for the Johnsons to stop by. Here is a story likely from the late 1920s or early 1930s –

"I don't know if my dad 'Bud' ever told you that. That one time Jim Johnson was down [at The Farm]." This was "Old Jim," George Johnson's brother. "He used to come down and visit with my Grandpa McCarty [John Ambrose]. And Uncle Tom was upstairs, and it was in the dark on a moonless night. And Tom climbed out of the window onto the porch roof and jumped onto the porch with a sheet and came up here."

When Nephew Tom was telling me this story this fall, we were at The Farm. He was making a reference (here) to the woods kitty corner to the farmstead. Uncle Tom preempted Jim Johnson's departure from the McCarty farm house. "And he was up on the bank up here with a sheet over his head and smoking a cigarette when Jim Johnson came walking home. And he scared the living crap out of him, and Jim ran back to the farm, and Grandpa McCarty had to give him a ride home."

### **Enlisting after** Rejection

Uncle Tom worked hard on the family farm, and struggled like many to find work during the Great Depression. When the economy hit hard in the 1930s, it was difficult for him to find work. Nephew Tom thinks his uncle followed a Berg from Ashford who was in road construction, and headed up north. Besides struggling for work, Tom also had bad teeth. Old photos of the young man usually show a smile small enough to still hide teeth. Bad dental health prevented him from getting drafted.

"See, he was old when he went into the Marines," said Nephew

out one of the closets up stairs, she found all of the letters that Uncle Tom wrote to Grandma McCarty [Katherine Becker] the whole time he was in the service. Two years in, they were still dealing with getting his teeth done."

### Tom in the Pacific

Nephew Tom McCarty is a great source to understand Uncle Tom. For one, he read the letters from World War II that his uncle wrote back home. Second, he saw his uncle visiting The Farm on Friday nights after the work week end in the 1960s and 1970s. Both Toms also hunted together.

Uncle Tom stopped at The Farm more after his wife died in 1969. Once a widower, Tom would stay talking to

[Gloria] was cleaning his brothers "Bud" and George longer. He also started to share more war stories of the five and half years he gave for his country.

"And they'd be sitting in the kitchen talking. One. Two in the morning. He'd be telling war stories at that point in his life. Maybe the last two years of his life. Or three. And I was lying in bed trying to sleep, 'cause I gotta get up in the morning. I got to get up in about four hours to work. I'm trying to listen to stuff, and trying to sleep at the same time."

On one of those nights, Uncle Tom shared World War II stories in the South Pacific islands where they had bad fighting. He was driving an ambulance at that time, and they had a card game the

night before. One of the players had longer, blonde hair. The next day, Uncle Tom was hauling the wounded back as a driver, "But in front of him was a Jeep piled up with the dead guys, and [on this Jeep's back end was] this blonde kid that he was playing cards with the night before."

Tom's service didn't end abruptly with the end of World War II. Other letters indicated he remained in China were he took care of local families by providing food for them. Nephew Tom laughed, because as another

military veteran, he knows his uncle likely shouldn't have been funneling supplies.

"He was requisitioning food for them from the chow halls to feed these [Chinese], and getting fuel for 'em and that." China had not fallen to Communism yet, as this was before 1949 but after World War II. They were our ally and helped us win World War II, and Uncle Tom gave them some supplies in their postwar desperation. That being said, it probably was against policy to feed them, but evidence of Uncle Tom's **That Parent-Teacher** Conference

compassion.

Writing about family history can be difficult. I do not mean to come across telling stories accused of being "Pollyannish" or sugarcoated. Uncle Tom McCarty could be tough. Especially certain family on members.

The more I researched, the more it was apparent that this toughness was seen in his interactions with family members; and not seen by outsiders. When asked if old Tom



McCarty was firm in his behavior towards others, Jim Reilly said, "Well, he didn't have to get firm with me." Jim had only kind words. Maynard Chadwick (1932-2021) of Oakfield worked with Uncle Tom with the telephone company and had a similar respect. Maynard enjoyed working with him, and like Jim, did not have an issue with is personality.

Uncle Tom McCarty was a tough cookie. Strict, firm and forceful were adjectives family members shared. Nephew Tom pointed out the need to remember Uncle Tom's life context. For one, he had a rough life. He worked hard on the farm, he went up north for work during the Great Depression, and served our country for five and a half years. He clearly had some post-traumatic stress from the war, as indicated by the stories he shared with Bud and George at one o'clock in the morning. "I mean," Tom concluded, "You're a product of the environment that you grow up around." He added, "I always look at it that he did the best with what he had at the time." Veterans not only deserve our respect, but also understanding.

Nephew Tom elaborated on a memory at St. Matthews -

"I don't know if I was in third grade or fourth grade. Mrs. Kramer was my teacher at the time, and we went down for parent-teacher [conferences]. And I remember that in there, the first thing she asks is, 'How's old One Punch?' That's what they used to call Uncle Tom. And I get in the car, 'What the hell does she mean 'one punch'?" Then dad answered his son: "Well, he used to hit 'em one time and thev'd go down, so they called him 'One Punch." Was the teacher laughing? "Oh yea. I don't know if she had gone out with Tom. She was about his age...I'll never forget that."

All things considered, one gets the sense when it came to World War II, a few other fellow Marines accepted Tom McCarty "as is."





## **Rocky Mountain Elk Hunt/The Camps**

### MARK WALTERS COLUMNIST

I recently returned from what was an epic adventure hunting elk and mule deer while living in the mountains in southern Montana for eight nights by myself.

I think you will enjoy this series of columns as each one is very unique.

As always, thanks for reading. WEDNESDAY, OCT. 19

HIGH: 71. LOW: 46.

I left my home near Necedah driving a pickup with 354,000 miles and pulling a trailer.

The Chevy Hotel would put on another 2,600-miles flawlessly and not use a drop of oil.

I took Interstate 94 and North Dakota was loaded with ducks.

I also saw low water in every form and every state. The rivers in Montana are extremely low.

I drove to where I last hunted for elk in 2007 with then-19-year-old Ryan Moll. On that hunt, Ryan harvested a rag horn, and we both filled our mule deer tags.

This would be my fourth elk hunt and all of the past hunts have had major snowstorms on either opening day or the day before.

I arrived on a Wednesday with the season opening on Saturday, and I hiked the mountains as much as possible and, when I found "elk paradise", I built a spike camp near my intended hunting area and had a base camp at the base of the mountain in a U.S. Forest Service campsite. I was well aware that on opening weekend a major blizzard was forecast for the area, and I used a small tent that was well-tarped for my spike camp. My base camp was made of my pop-up of 13x8 Eskimo ice fishing shack. I put a 20x30 tarp that was heavily roped above the shack and had my usual kitchen, cot, propane

lights, heater and cook stove.

First failure: I simply cannot find the mountain pass where Ryan and I based and hunted. I am worn down from the drive, pulling a trailer on some difficult mountain roads, "backing up" often and running out of daylight.

On three occasions, I spoke with

## THURSDAY, OCT. 20 HIGH: 73. LOW: 42.

The first thing that I did this morning was begin to climb the mountain and explore.

My goal was to find open grass areas "sometimes referred to as parks"

I find more signs and keep moving; soon, I found an area where it is obvious that elk are nearby.

I keep moving.

I come to an opening where the trees are torn apart by a bull; there is some grass, and I know I have found home.

I had three trail cameras and a chip; not cellular, as they are illegal. I put the cameras on trails and am totally into the game.

Cameras can be used for pictures but not hunting, I retired them once the season began.

Montana mountain men and, though all of them tried to help me, my situation was not pretty. Major learning experience: everyone is talking grizzly bear and carrying both bear spray and pistols. There are lots of stories of bear encounters. I had spray; no pistol.

After 40 miles and lots of stress, I may have found where I camped/ hunted with Ryan [in 2007].

The weather is perfect, and I saw elk tracks on a short hike.

On this night, I slept in my trailer and, let me tell you, bear problems are a constant conversation. There are a lot of rules pertaining to cooking in tents and how you store food. where elk and mule deer feed.

I am literally on top of the world both physically and mentally and, for the first 2,000-feet, do not see anything that interests me.

I keep exploring and have forgotten my compass.

I get physical and stay on the move.



I do the nearly three-mile hike down to the base camp that I have yet to build. For three hours, I work on the most perfect base camp that, in my mind, for the last three months, I could dream up.

In the middle of the afternoon,

## A.T.V./U.T.V. Riders: Wear Your Helmet!

17 fatalities reported so far in 2022

### **WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES**

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) urges ATV/UTV riders and passengers to wear their helmets and seatbelts while out riding this fall.

So far this year. 17 people have died in ATV/ UTV crashes in Wisconsin. Most crash victims were not wearing seat belts or helmets.

According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, 71% of fatally injured ATV riders were killed in crashes involving no other vehicles in 2020. Helmets and seatbelts dramatically reduce the chance of serious injury, especially in single vehicle crashes.

"ATVs are popular for work and recreational purposes such as trail riding and hunting," said Major April Dombrowski, DNR Recreational Safety Section Chief. "Protect yourself and loved ones by always wearing a helmet. It's the single most important piece of protection an ATV or UTV rider can wear."

In addition to wearing a helmet, follow these tips for a safe ride:

· Use extra caution when operating on pavement.

· Always operate at a responsible speed and within your abilities.

• Never consume alcohol or drugs before or during your ride.

• In addition to a seat belt and helmet, wear protective clothing such as eye protection, gloves, long pants and long sleeves.

Wisconsin law requires ATV and UTV operators born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, who are at least 12 years old for an ATV (and at least 16 years old for UTV) must complete an ATV safety certification course to operate in Wisconsin (exception: on private property owned by operator's immediate family). These safety courses can be taken online or in person. A list of approved safety education classes is available on the DNR Safety Education webpage.

Wisconsin law also requires every operator involved in a crash incident to report the incident without delay to law enforcement officials. Operators must submit a written report to the DNR within 10 days of the incident.

## **Snowy Owls Spotted in Wisconsin**

### **WIS. DEPT. OF NATURAL RESOURCES**

Despite mild fall weather, snowy owl season is underway across Wisconsin.

Though one owl was spotted in Dane County from mid-July to mid-October (a very rare case of a snowy owl successfully over-summering in Wisconsin), the winter migrants now seem to be settling in.

The first likely migrants were spotted on Oct. 19 in Superior and atop the observation tower at Rib Mountain State Park in Marathon County. Another was photographed in Ashland on Nov. 1.

These are the only new arrivals reported anywhere in the lower 48 so far, aside from one along


the international border in North Dakota. Eastern Canada has seen a notable shortage of observations so far. Farther west, a few owls have moved into the Canadian Great Plains.

### Extra

Snowy owls are regular visitors to this readership area, particularly around the Kettle Moraine State Forest.

Sightings of the rare birds have been a regular annual occurance near forest and farm communities, although typically, they appear in this region when snow blankets the ground in January and February.
